## **Active and Passive Voice**

## **Active verbs**

Verbs can have an **active** or **passive** voice. When a verb is **active**, the **subject** of the sentence is doing the action. For example:

The cat sat on the mat.

Here, cat is the **subject**, sat is the **active** verb, and the mat is the object.

## Passive verbs

Contrast this with the **passive** voice of the verb:

The mat was sat on by the cat.

Here, the mat is the **subject** and is suffering the action of being sat on by the cat.

The wall was <b>painted</b> by the man.		<b>√</b>
The ball was <b>thrown</b> at the window by the naughty girl.		<b>√</b>
The naughty girl <b>threw</b> the ball at the window.	<b>√</b>	
You must not <b>run</b> across the road.	<b>√</b>	
You could get <b>run</b> over!		<b>√</b>
