




Read the following passage carefully:

He and Lucja enjoy working together as they have been best friends since Sanjeev opened the café 4 years ago.

Identify all the verbs in this passage.



Using the Present Tense

There are four different present tenses. Discuss with a partner how each one is made so you can identify them.

Tense	Example
Simple present tense	I make pancakes.
Present progressive tense	I am making pancakes.
Present perfect tense	I have made pancakes all morning.
Present perfect progressive tense	I have been making pancakes since 6pm.

Using the Present Perfect Tense


The present perfect tense describes events which started in the past and have continued up until now. It is different from the simple past e.g. the simple past = I sprinkled sugar on my pancake. The present perfect = I have sprinkled sugar on my pancake.

I **have made** 45 pancakes.

You **have made** chocolate pancakes.

He/she has made lemon pancakes.

Uses 'has' or 'have' and the past participle of the verb, e.g. I have baked



We **have made** too many pancakes.

They **have made** lots of pancakes.

Using the Present Perfect Tense

Change these simple present tense sentences into the present perfect tense: **Example:**

I cook pancakes.

I have cooked pancakes.

1. I build a stack of pancakes.

I have built a stack of pancakes.

2. She invites her friends to a pancake-flipping contest.

She has invited her friends to a pancake-flipping contest.

3. Henry buys flour from the shop.

Henry has bought flour from the shop.

4. They eat six pancakes each.

They have eaten six pancakes each.

We are used to using the simple past tense.
Change these present tense sentences to the past tense:

I flipped pancakes.

2. Paul wants strawberries as a pancake topping.

Paul wanted strawberries as a pancakes topping.

3. Bobby mixes the pancake batter.

Bobby mixed the pancake batter.

4. John's cafe offers three different types of pancakes on their menu.

John's cafe offered three different types of pancakes on their menu.

Using the Past Tense

There are **four** different past tenses.

Discuss with a partner how each one is made so you can identify them.

Tense	Example
Simple past tense	I mixed the batter.
Past progressive tense	I was mixing the batter.
Past perfect tense	I had mixed the batter.
Past perfect progressive tense	I had been mixing the batter.
