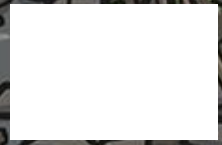

What is a Rainforest?

Rainforests are very wet and warm places, due to high rainfall. They are home to millions of tropical plants and animals.

Our atmosphere depends heavily on the oxygen that is produced and all the carbon dioxide that is absorbed by the plants of the rainforests. They are very important to us and have been called “The Earths Lungs”.

Rain forests are found near the equator as the climate is perfect for them to exist.



Tropical Rainforests of the World

Rainforests cover about 6% of the earth's surface but are home to over half of the world's species of plants and animals.

Layers of the Rainforest

Rainforests are divided into four main layers, where different types of animals live, depending on their environmental needs.

From the top to the bottom, they are called:

Canopy

3-4m tall. Contains majority of trees and very leafy. Inhabited by insects, birds, reptiles, mammals and more.

Understory Layer

Contains many large leaf plants and home to birds, snakes, lizards and large predators such as Jaguars and Leopards.

Emergent

3-4m tall. Contains majority of trees and very leafy. Inhabited by insects, birds, reptiles, mammals and more.

Forest floor

Bottom of the rainforest, quite dark. Contains very little vegetation due to low levels of sunlight. Inhabited by insects and fungi.

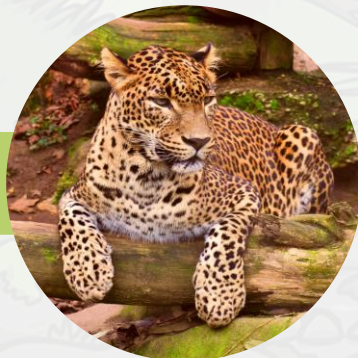
