

The giant pangolin is one of eight species of pangolin found on two continents: Asia and Africa. Some of these eight species are: the white-bellied pangolin, black-bellied pangolin, giant pangolin, Chinese pangolin, and Indian pangolin.

Pangolins are solitary and secretive. They cannot see very well and do not have teeth. Instead, they use a long and sticky tongue to catch their prey. Their tongue can be longer than their own body. The dusty-brown scales protect pangolins from predators like lions and leopards.

How do the scales protect them? Pangolins roll into a tight ball — so tight that even a person cannot pry open this ball of armour. This is important because the pangolin's scales are its only form of defence. Although hyenas and big cats are its main predators, the pangolin often encounters them without getting hurt.

So, who is the pangolin's biggest enemy? It's us.
