# Years 5 and 6: Modal Verbs and Adverbs of Possibility Board Game

This game is a fun and exciting way to practice using modal verbs and adverbs of possibility – one of the targets of the Years 5 and 6 English curriculum. Use the following instructions to help you play the game. This game can be played by 2-4 players.

### Equipment needed:

- game board
- adverb of possibility sentence cards
- modal verb sentences cards
- · modal verb or adverb of possibility cards
- a die
- a coloured counter for each player (or can be something small such as a toy figure or a counter from another game)

### Preparation

Print the game board and cards beforehand. Cut out the cards ready for play and place them in the correct position on the game board. Tip: You may wish to glue the game board and game cards onto card before cutting them out. That way, the game can be used many times to help reinforce your child's knowledge of modal verbs and adverbs of probability.

### **Instructions**

- 1. All players start on the start square. To decide who goes first, each player takes a turn at rolling the die. The player with the highest number goes first.
- 2. Take it in turns to roll the die and move that number along the board. Each player only has one turn (even if they roll a six).

- 3. If you land on one of the question squares Adverb of Possibility Sentences, Modal Verb Sentences or Modal Verb or Adverb of Possibility?, you have to answer one of those question cards. If it if an Adverb of Possibility Sentence card or a Modal Verb Sentence card, get another player to read it out for you.
  - Adverb of Possibility Sentences: For this card, the person whose turn it is has to think of an appropriate adverb of possibility to complete the sentence. If the other players agree that it is a sensible adverb of possibility that fits the sentence, that player will move forward 2 spaces. If the player answers incorrectly, they have to move back 2 spaces.
  - Modal Verb Sentences: Another player will read out the challenge on the card and the
    answers. The player whose turn it is then has to choose the correct modal verb for the
    answer. If they get it right, the player can move forward 2 spaces. If the player answers
    incorrectly, the player moves back 2 spaces.
  - Modal Verb or Adverb of Possibility? Select a card from the pile. The player then has to think of a sentence using that modal verb or adverb of possibility. If the other players agree that the sentence makes sense, the player will move forward 1 space. But, if they can't think of a sentence or it doesn't make sense, the player moves back 1 space.
- 4. The winner is the person that reaches the FINISH square first.
