We use I/my/mine/me to talk about ourselves

We use you/your/yours/you to talk about the person we are talking to. It can be singular or plural, formal or informal.

We use she/her/hers/her to talk about someone who identifies as female.

We use he/his/his/him to talk about someone who identifies as male.

We use it/its/it to talk about singular objects.

We use we/our/ours/us to talk about a group of people that includes ourselves.

We use they/their/theirs/them to talk about plural people and plural objects. We use 'they' when a person's gender is unknown, irrelevant or when someone has chosen to use this pronoun.
