Future Tenses

Simple Future

Simple Future is also known as Future Simple and describes events which will take place. **e.g.**

I will bake You will bake (singular) He/She/It will bake We will bake You will bake (plural) They will bake

Future Continuous

Future Continuous is also known as Future Progressive and describes events which will take place, over time.

e.g.

I will be baking You will be baking (singular) He/She/It will be baking We will be baking You will be baking (plural) They will be baking

Future Perfect

Future Perfect describes events which will be finished before another action takes place. **e.g.**

I will have baked You will have baked (singular) He/She/It will have baked We will have baked You will have baked (plural) They will have baked

Future Perfect Continuous

Future Perfect Continuous is also known as Future Perfect Progressive and describes events which will have taken place for some time and not yet be finished. **e.g.**

I will have been baking You will have been baking (singular) He/She/It will have been baking We will have been baking You will have been baking (plural) They will have been baking

Past Tenses

Simple Past

Simple Past is also known as Past Simple and describes events which happened at a specific time, but are now completed. **e.g.**

I baked You baked (singular) He/She/It baked We baked You baked (plural) They baked

Past Continuous

Past Continuous is also known as Past Progressive and describes events which happened in the past, over a period of time. **e.g.**

I was baking You were baking (singular) He/She/It was baking We were baking You were baking (plural) They were baking

Past Perfect

Past Perfect describes completed events of the past which happened before another action took place. **e.g.**

I had baked You had baked (singular) He/She/It had baked We had baked You had baked (plural) They had baked

Past Perfect Continuous

Past Perfect Continuous is also known as Past Perfect Progressive and describes actions that were in progress before some other actions and continued until that time. **e.g.**

I had been baking You had been baking (singular) He/She/It had been baking We had been baking You had been baking (plural) They had been baking

Present Tenses

Simple Present

The Simple Present can be used to describe something that happens regularly, to give an instruction, to describe something that has been arranged or to talk about the future after certain conjunctions have been used (after, when, before, as soon as, until).

e.g.

I bake You bake (singular) He/She/It bakes We bake You bake (plural) They bake

Present Continuous

Present Continuous is also known as Present Progressive and describes events which are happening right now in the present moment. **e.g.**

I am baking You are baking (singular) He/She/It is baking

We are baking You are baking (plural) They are baking

Present Perfect

The Present Perfect can be used for the following situations: to describe something that happened in the past and is continuing today; an action that was completed recently; and for an action that did not happen at a specific time. **e.g.**

I have baked You have baked (singular)

He/She/It has baked We have baked You have baked (plural) They have baked

Present Perfect Continuous

Present Perfect Continuous, also known as Present Perfect Progressive, describes events which started at some point in the past that may not be finished. **e.g.**

I have been baking You have been baking (singular) He/She/It has been baking We have been baking You have been baking (plural) They have been baking
