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How can I use this with my children?

These worksheets give your child a simple sentence and asks them to use adjectives and adverbs to make them more interesting and exciting. Can they add extra detail to make the sentences more fun?

How does this help my children's learning?

Being able to use adjectives and adverbs to extend and improve sentences is a great way for your child to develop their writing. These worksheets give your child a chance to practise using this skill.

Ideas for further learning:

For an added challenge, your child could try using a fronted adverbial in the sentences. This is when the adverb appears at the start of the sentence (Slowly, the mouse crept out of the hole).
