# Homonyms: Homophones and Homographs



**Homophones** are words that sound the same but have different meanings or different spellings. For example, night and knight.

The word 'homophone' comes from Greek – 'homo' means 'same' and 'phone' means 'sound' or 'voice'.

**Homographs** are words that share the same spelling but have different meanings. They do not necessarily sound the same (so may be pronounced differently).

For example, wind and wind.

The <u>wind</u> howled outside as the storm raged.

I began to <u>wind</u> the string around the parcel.

The suffix 'graph' means written, so homographs are words that are written the same way.

The word 'homonym' comes from the Greek 'homonymos', which means 'having the same name'. A **homonym** is a word with the same spelling or pronunciation as another, but with a different meaning or origin. A homonym may be a homograph or homophone.


#### Homograph Hunt
