

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
Colour by Word Class

Silly Sentences



Once you have your card, you have to act out what it says. You can't use any words or make any noises. The rest of the players have to try to guess what you are doing.




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Adjectives/Adverbs Elimination Game

Have a go at this fun game which can get the whole family involved. It's easy to set up and doesn't involve many resources.

You will need:

- 2 or more players
- a timer (you could use a phone or device timer here)
- paper
- pencils or pens



Instructions:

- 1. Decide on how many people are playing. You will need one person to be in charge of thinking of words and timing (this can be the same person).
- 2. Make sure everyone has a piece of paper and a pencil.
- 3. The person who is timing needs to think of a word.
 - a noun works best if you're doing an adjective (for example, castle)
 - a verb works best if you're doing adverbs (for example, running)
- 4. As soon as the word has been said, the timer for 1 minute begins.
- 5. Everyone else has to write down as many adjectives or adverbs as they can think of which might describe the noun or verb.
- 6. When the timer ends, everyone has to stop writing and you can count up how many words each player thought of.
- 7. You may want to use the person who timed it to check that all the words are correct.

- 8. Whoever has the most words wins!
- 9. Play again with a different word.

Extension:

To make this harder, you could restrict which adjectives are allowed. For example:

- only adjectives or adverbs begin with letters a m
- don't count any adjectives or adverbs that someone else has too
- only adjectives or adverbs with 5 or more letters

Adjectives Scavenger Hunt



If the weather is nice, this scavenger hunt is a great way to get some fresh air and exercise. However, it can be done inside if the weather isn't great.

How many of the following things can you find? They are all based around an adjective. You can set this up as a game/race or do it on your own. Draw or write the name of what you have found in the box.

Can you add three ideas of your own? Remember they have to be based around adjectives.

You will need:

- Adjectives Scavenger Hunt Sheet (printed)
- a pencil
- optional: a timer

Instructions:

- 1. Print out the Adjectives Scavenger Hunt Sheet (next page). Make sure to print out more than one if you are playing with friends or family members.
- 2. Get a pencil ready.
- 3. If you are using a timer, have it ready.
- 4. Go! Explore your area (outdoors and indoors) and see if you can find an item which fits in each category. Draw or write it in the box.
- 5. If you are playing with other people, whoever is the quickest wins!



Home Activity Ideas



Create your own version of snap by writing some matching adjectives and adverbs out on a piece of paper. Carefully cut them out and turn them face down so you can't see the words. Shuffle them around and play! You are trying to get a

matching pair.

Twinkl Tip:

Card can work better as you can keep and reuse them. It also means there is no cheating and trying to read through the paper!

Baking Fun

This is a really fun one! Make some simple biscuits or cupcakes (recipes can be found on our site). Use icing to spell out your adjective words. You could do one letter on each biscuit or cupcake or try the whole word. The best part - you get to eat them afterwards! Or, get someone to give you some instructions as you bake. For example, 'mix slowly' or 'ice wildly'.

Book Hunt

Choose your favourite book and hunt for adjectives and adverbs words like a word detective! Which words come up the most? Can you make a list and then write your own story?

Hoop Games

• Set out hoops with an adverb written in chalk inside each one. Use bean bags or balls and ask an adult to shout out an adjective. Throw the bean bag or ball into the correct matching hoop.

- Repeat the above but instead of using a ball or bean bag, you have to run and stand inside the correct hoop.
- Set up as above but this time, grab a brush (a new toilet brush or clean brush from your dustpan set can work well). You will need a bucket full of water too. When your partner shouts one of the matching adjectives out, dip your brush in the water and 'scrub' away the word.
- Have a go at creating your own hoop game!

Water Squirter Games

On a sunny day, there is nothing better than cooling down with water squirters. Have fun as well as doing some learning. What's better, you might get to squirt a friend or member of your family!

- Set up the hoops (like in the hoop games) and write some adverbs using chalk, one in each hoop. When your partner shouts out an adjective, squirt that hoop with your squirter.
- Set up an adverb wall by printing out or writing some adverbs onto pieces of paper. Stick them onto a wall or fence panel. When your partner shouts out an adjective, squirt the word!
- Twinkl Tip: If you can, laminate or put the paper inside a plastic folder or wallet. This means you can reuse them!
- Repeat either of the above but this time use a bucket of water and a sponge and throw the sponge at the right word.
- If you have a group of people to play with, attach an adverb word card to the front of each person's t-shirt. When a partner calls out the matching adjective, squirt the person.
