I can go to the cinema.	Implies the speaker is allowed or able to go to the cinema.	
I may go to the cinema.	Implies that going to the cinema is a possibility.	
I must go to the cinema.	Implies that going to the cinema is a necessity.	
I shall go to the cinema.	Implies that the speaker is determined to go to the cinema.	
I will go to the cinema.	Implies that the speaker is certain that they will go to the cinema.	
I could go to the cinema.	Implies that the speaker is considering going to the cinema.	
I might go to the cinema.	Implies that the speaker is considering going to the cinema.	
I should go to the cinema.	Implies that the speaker feels an obligation to go to the cinema.	
I would go to the cinema.	Implies a condition - the speaker would go if something else happened. (This doesn't work as a sentence: I would go to the cinema if xyz is preferable.)
