1. Assure adequate right-of-way is preserved and dedicated for existing and future planned corridors to accommodate growth, including corridors established in the Transportation System Plan.
2. Assure that street improvements be completed along existing and future planned corridors concurrent with development that abuts or encompasses corridors established in the Transportation System Plan.
3. Clearly define appropriate mitigation measures to address impacts from growth and provide flexibility to achieve this.

In a 10/26/21 Council workshop, staff presented related proposed KMC amendment 4.13, to codify and consolidate requirements for mitigation of development impacts, and to assure consistent expectations for staff and developers as they work together on proposed developments.

Proposed Ordinance 5947 adds new section 4.13 to Kennewick Municipal Code.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS
FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 4.13 of the Kennewick Municipal Code, be, and the same hereby is, added to
read as follows:

4.13.010: - Purpose

The purpose of this Chapter is to address mitigation for development impacts in a consistent
manner.

4.13.020: - Definitions

- (1) *Development* is as defined in KMC 18.09.540.
- (2) *Mitigation* is as defined in KMC 18.09.1300.

4.13.030: - Determination of Direct Impact

Before any development is given the required approval or is permitted to proceed, the official or
body charged with deciding whether such approval should be given shall determine direct
impacts, if any, that are a consequence of the proposed development and which require
mitigation, considering, but not limited to, the following factors:

- (1) Predevelopment versus post-development need for services such as city streets,
sewers, water supplies, drainage and stormwater retention facilities, parks,
playgrounds, recreational facilities, schools, police services, fire services and
other municipal facilities or services;
- (2) Likelihood that a direct impact of a proposed development would require
mitigation due to the cumulative effect of such impact when aggregated with the
similar impacts of future development in the immediate vicinity of the proposed
development;
- (3) Size, number, condition and proximity of existing facilities to be affected by the
proposed development;
- (4) Nature and quantity of capital improvements reasonably necessary to mitigate
specific direct impacts identified as a consequence of the proposed development;
- (5) Likelihood that the users of the proposed development will benefit from any
mitigating capital improvements or programs;

- (6) Any significant adverse environmental impacts of the proposed development identified in the process of complying with the environmental policy, KMC Chapter 4.08, or the State Environmental Policy Act, RCW 43.21C.010 et seq.;
- (7) Consistency with the city's transportation system plan, comprehensive plan and any of its subparts;
- (8) Likelihood of city growth by annexation into areas immediately adjacent to the proposed development;
- (9) Appropriateness of financing necessary capital improvements by means of local improvement districts;
- (10) Whether the designated capital improvement furthers the public health, safety or general welfare; and
- (11) Any other facts deemed by the city to be relevant.

4.13.040: - Costs

The cost of any investigations, analysis or reports necessary for a determination of direct impact shall be borne by the developer.

4.13.050: - Mitigation of Direct Impacts

The official or body charged with granting the necessary approval for a proposed development shall review a developer's proposal for mitigating any identified direct impacts and determine whether such proposal is an acceptable mitigation measure considering the cost and land requirements of the required improvement and the extent to which the necessity for the improvement is attributable to the direct impacts of the proposed development. No official or body shall approve a development unless provisions have been made to mitigate identified direct impacts that are consequences of such development.

4.13.060: - Methods of Mitigation

- (1) The methods of mitigating identified direct impacts required as a condition of any development approval may include, but are not limited to, dedication of land to any public body, off-site improvements, on-site improvements, and other capital or noncapital methods that may effectively reduce direct impacts.
- (2) In lieu of a dedication of land or to mitigate a direct impact that has been identified as a consequence of a proposed development, the city may approve a voluntary payment agreement with the developer, provided no such agreement shall be required as a condition of approval, and shall be subject to the following provisions:
 - (a) The official or body approving development must find that the money offered will mitigate or is a satisfactory alternative to mitigate the identified direct impact, and is adequate to allow the City to perform the mitigation improvements if necessary.

- (b) The payment shall be held in a reserve account and may only be expended to fund a capital improvement or program agreed upon by the parties to mitigate the identified direct impact.
- (c) The payment shall be expended or encumbered in all cases within applicable time limitations of Chapter 82.02 RCW, unless otherwise agreed to by the developer.
- (d) Unless the property owner elects to defer payments authorized in KMC 13.16.140 and 3.90.110, any payment not expended or encumbered within applicable time limitations shall be refunded to the property owners of record at the time of the refund with interest at the rate earned in the city's reserve account applicable at the time of refund. If the payment is not expended or encumbered within the applicable time limitations due to delay attributable to the developer, the payment shall be refunded without interest.
- (e) Property owners entitled to a refund and/or interest under the provisions of this chapter may voluntarily and in writing waive their right to a refund for a specified period of time in the interest of providing the designated capital improvement or other capital improvement or program identified by the property owner and acceptable to the city.
- (f) The developer may voluntarily and in writing waive on behalf of the developer and subsequent purchasers the right to interest and/or a refund in order to facilitate completion of an improvement. Under no condition shall such a waiver be required as a condition of approval. Such waiver shall be recorded with the county where the property is situated and shall be binding on subsequent owners.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

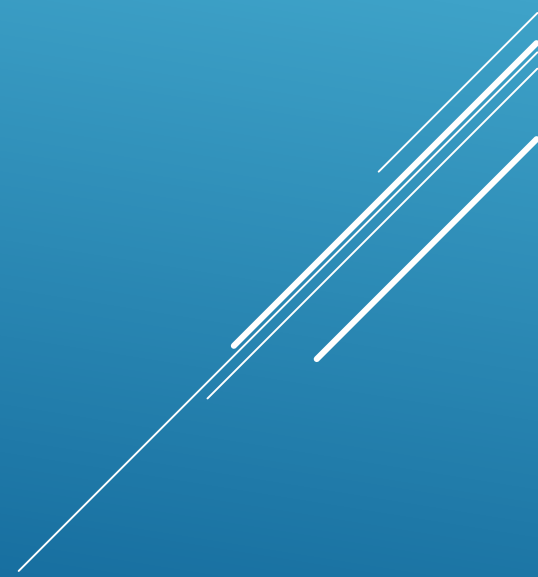

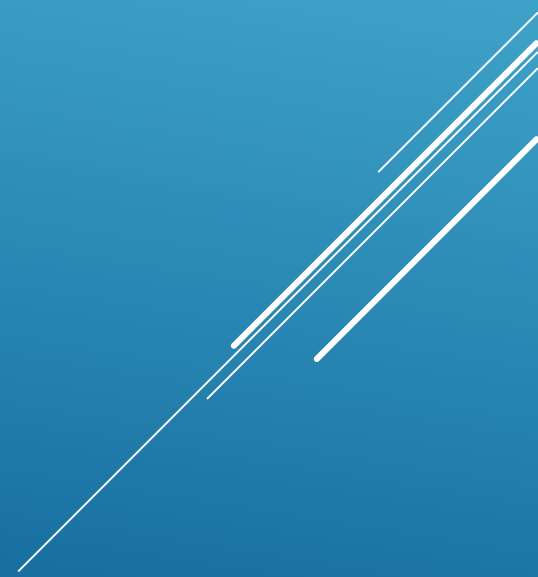

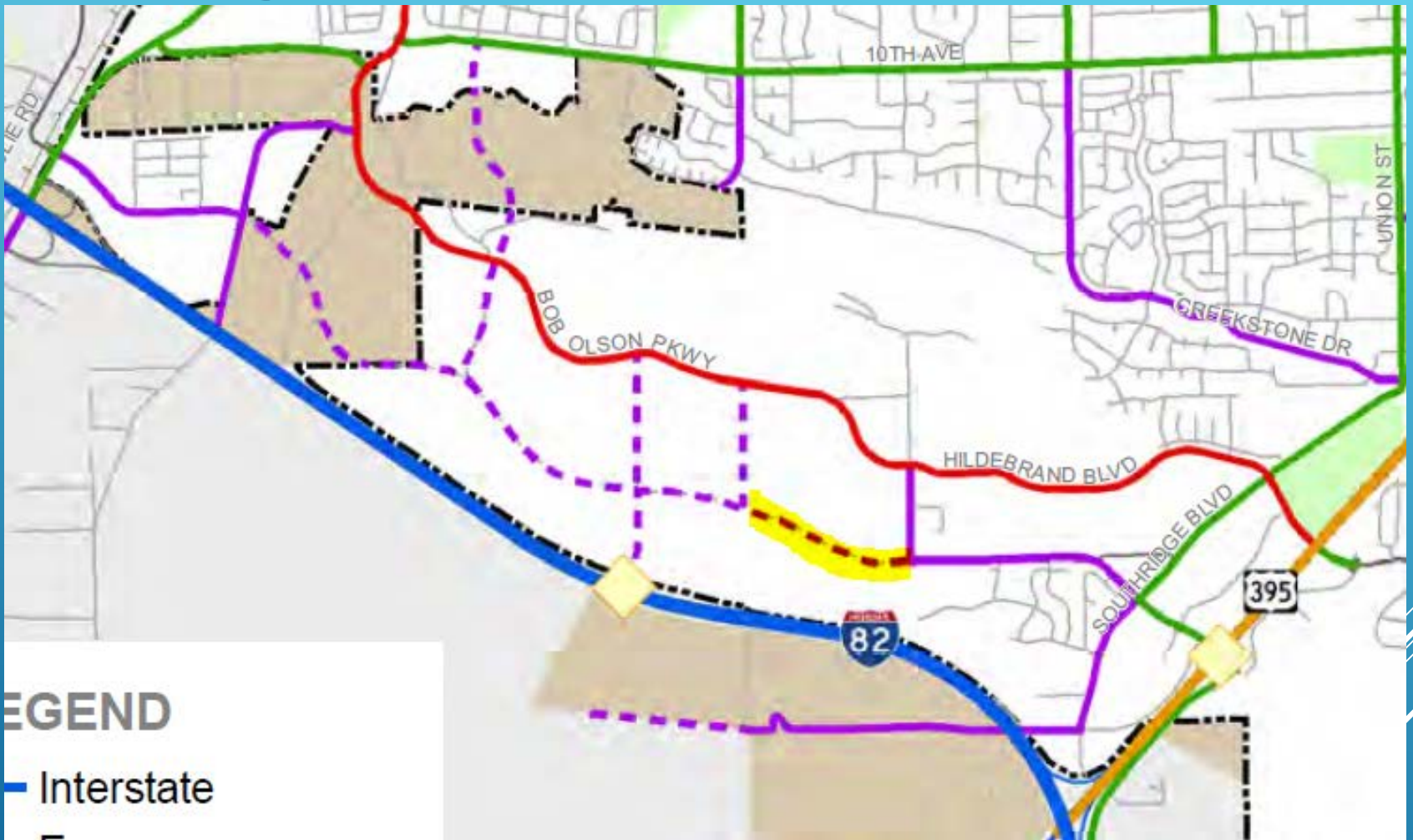

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO REQUIRED PUBLIC AND PRIVATE
IMPROVEMENTS ADDING SECTION 5.56.065 TO THE KENNEWICK
MUNICIPAL CODE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS
FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 5.56.065 of the Kennewick Municipal Code, be, and the same hereby is,
added to read as follows:

5.56.065: - Required Public and Private Improvements

- (1) The developer shall provide the improvements required by this section if the developer engages in any activity that requires a development permit, except as noted in subsection (11) below.
- (2) Right-of-way adjacent to and within proposed development must be dedicated and improved consistent with the requirements of this section, unless different requirements are imposed by the city as part of the development application process.
- (3) Ingress/egress and utilities easements, tracts or alleys may be permitted subject to the conditions established in the city of Kennewick Public Works Standard Specifications.
- (4) The Standard Specifications in KMC 5.56.040 establish the improvements that must be installed, based on the classification of the various rights-of-way within the city. The developer shall, consistent with the provisions of this section, install all improvements established in KMC 5.56.040 along the frontage of each right-of-way that abuts and traverses the subject property, commensurate with the impacts of the development, including all corridors adopted in the City's Transportation System Plan and the City's Comprehensive Plan. At a minimum, half-street improvements shall be required on the abutting side of the right-of-way and a minimum 10-foot lane on the side of the right-of-way opposite the frontage.
- (5) The Public Works Director shall have the authority to adopt and modify standards for ingress/egress and utilities easements, tracts or alleys which may be determined subject to the conditions and standards established in the Standard Specifications.
- (6) Additional dimensions and improvements. The developer may increase the dimensions of any required improvement or install additional improvements within the right-of-way with the written consent of the Public Works Director.

- (7) Authority to require dedication. If a right-of-way abutting the subject property has inadequate width based on the requirements in KMC 5.56.040, the developer shall dedicate a portion of the subject property parallel to the right-of-way and equal in width to the difference between the present right-of-way width and the width required by KMC 5.56.040 for that right-of-way required per the functional classification of the street. The Public Works Director may waive additional dedication or may permit dedication of a lesser amount of the subject property for additional right-of-way width if:
- (a) It is likely to anticipate that, within the near future, the property across the right-of-way from the subject property will be required to dedicate property for public right-of-way; or
 - (b) The reduction in the required right-of-way width will nonetheless provide adequate room for all improvements, infrastructure and functions within the right-of-way. For the purpose of determining the rough proportionality of right-of-way dedication to the development's impacts, the city may require up to 300 square feet of right-of-way dedication per average daily trip generated by the development. Interior streets to the developments are not part of this calculation. Dedicated right-of-way is in addition to the required easements for utilities and sidewalks. All dedications under this subsection shall be by conveyance through a statutory warranty deed or plat or binding site plan.
- (8) Partial right-of-way improvements. Where a right-of-way abutting the subject property does not, even after dedications required under subsection (7) of this section, contain adequate width to install all of the improvements required within that right-of-way under this section, the developer shall install improvements within the right-of-way which will provide a safe and efficient right-of-way and which will facilitate completion of all right-of-way improvements required in this section at a later date. The specific extent and nature of improvements, where full right-of-way width is not available, will be determined by the Public Works Director on a case-by-case basis.
- (9) Easements. The Public Works Director may require the developer to grant such easements over, under and across the subject property as are reasonably necessary or appropriate under the circumstances, including but not limited to easements for the following:
- (a) Pedestrian access and sidewalks.
 - (b) Street lighting.
 - (c) Traffic control devices.

- (10) The city may require the developer to pave or install additional improvements within rights-of-way, either abutting or not abutting the subject property. This may include traffic signals, channelization, turn lanes, and other improvements necessary or appropriate to improve traffic circulation and safety, the need for which is directly attributable to development of the subject property. Where appropriate, the Public Works Director may permit the developer to fulfill the developer's obligation under this section by paying to the city the pro rata share of the costs of the required improvements attributable to development of the subject property, as determined by the Public Works Director. The city may also require the developer to provide traffic studies and other data describing the traffic impacts of the proposed development, the need for improvements under this section, and the reasonable pro rata share of the costs of these improvements to be borne by the developer.
- (11) Exceptions to the requirements of this section include the following:
- (a) The developer need not comply with the provisions of this section if, within the immediately preceding four years, public improvements were installed along the subject property as part of any subdivision or discretionary land use approval under this or any prior zoning code.
 - (b) The developer need not comply with the provisions of this section if the proposal is to locate a personal wireless services facility (PWSF) on the subject property.
 - (c) The developer need not comply with the provisions of this section if the proposal is for facade improvements only.
 - (d) Tenant improvements, unless the proposed improvements add additional floor area.
 - (e) If the required improvement is part of a larger project that has been scheduled for construction in the city's adopted six-year transportation improvement plan, the Public Works Director may permit the developer to fulfill the developer obligation under this section by paying to the city the pro rata share of the costs of the required improvements attributable to the development of the subject property, as determined by the Public Works Director. For purposes of determining the developer's pro rata share, funds received by the city from any federal, state, or local grant for the project shall be excluded from the total cost of the planned six-year transportation improvement.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Ordinance 5953, repealing Appendices A-7 through A-11 of KMC 18.68 Shoreline Management.

Motion for Consideration

I move to adopt Ordinance 5953.

Summary

On September 21, 2021, City Council adopted Ordinance 5927 amending the City of Kennewick's Shoreline Master Program (SMP) contained in KMC 18.68: Shoreline Management. Kennewick's SMP has eleven appendices associated that provide background, analysis and regulations specific to the Kennewick's shorelines. Appendices A-7 through A-11 are copies of existing chapters of the Kennewick Municipal Code.

In 2009, Kennewick adopted amendments to it's previous SMP to bring it into consistency with the Shoreline Management Act (SMA) and the Growth Management Act (GMA) as required by state statute. The requirement to be consistent with GMA also came with timelines for jurisdictions throughout the state to complete the update. Kennewick chose to be proactive in completing this update ahead of time and was classified as an "early adopter", completing the task 4 years ahead of schedule. At the time, existing portions of the Kennewick Municipal Code were added as appendices and were used specifically to regulate the shoreline area. This strict approach at integrating specific regulations in order to be consistent with GMA was used frequently at the early stages of updates across the state. Over time this approach created inconsistency in regulation between lands developed within the shoreline area and those developed outside of the shoreline area because code provisions would be amended in the body of the municipal code, but the same section in the SMP would not be amended. Staff has therefore proposed, with support from the Department of Ecology, that these appendices be repealed.

This issue was presented to the City Council at the September 21, 2021 Council meeting, however it was not included in the 59 page ordinance.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the approval of the 2022 Draft Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Annual Action Plan as prepared by the Community Development Block Grant Advisory Committee (Committee) and Staff.

Motion for Consideration

I move approval of the 2022 Draft Community Development Block Grant Annual Action Plan and funding recommendation as prepared by the CDBG Committee and Staff.

Summary

The City of Kennewick is an entitlement City as granted by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and so is an annual recipient of CDBG and HOME funds.

HUD regulations stipulate certain eligible uses for these funds and require the City to submit a five-year plan as to community needs followed by an Annual Action plan that specifies how the needs will be addressed using the available funds. The amount of the 2022 grant has not yet been established, but historical indications are that the Block Grant will be approximately \$675,000 with an additional \$198,000 in HOME funds. The Committee held a virtual Public Hearing in late summer to gather community input after which applicants were given four weeks to submit applications for grant funding. The Committee reviewed the applications and conducted oral presentations and virtual interviews with the applicants.

The Committee and staff considered the objectives on the Consolidated Plan and the Allocation Policy as they established the recommendation for the funding summary that is attached. The decision to fund a project was also based on any past experience with the applicant, their ability to obtain funding elsewhere, and the benefit to Kennewick low- and moderate-income residents.

THIRD YEAR ACTION PLAN

INTRODUCTION (AP15)

The Cities of Richland, Kennewick and Pasco are entitlement communities under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Each city is eligible to receive federal funds annually from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. Each city is separately responsible for planning and administering housing and community development activities within their jurisdiction, and implementing, monitoring, and reporting to HUD on the use of CDBG funds.

Richland, Kennewick and Pasco, as contiguous units of local government, entered into a Cooperative Agreement in 1995 to form the Tri-Cities HOME Consortium. The agreement was amended in 2007 to include an automatic renewal clause. At least every three years the Cooperative Agreement is re-evaluated by each city to determine continued participation in the Consortium and to propose change. The Tri-Cities HOME Consortium is eligible to receive annual federal HOME dollars from HUD under the HOME Investment Partnership Program authorized under Title II of the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act, as amended. Richland serves as the lead entity for the Tri-Cities HOME Consortium, and acts as the administrative, monitoring and reporting agency to HUD.

As each of the three cities share a common set of goals and directions for meeting the community development and affordable housing needs of lower income persons, the cities collaboratively prepared a 2020-2024 Tri-Cities Regional Consolidated Plan. The Plan provides the community with an assessment of needs and market conditions, establishes priority needs, sets goals to respond to the identified needs, and establishes outcome measures to serve as a basis for developing Annual Action Plans.

The activities proposed in the 2022 Annual Action Plan will be funded by CDBG allocations, program income, and existing unallocated funds. The City of Kennewick also has the option as an entitlement community to apply for a Section 108 Loan guarantee in an amount not to exceed five times its current year annual CDBG allocation.

If the 2022 CDBG funding is above the anticipated amount listed under “Expected Resources”, the additional funds could be applied to the infrastructure projects. If CDBG funding is below the anticipated amount, the shortfall in funds will be covered through the expenditure of existing unallocated previously awarded funds. Should the amount of unallocated funds not be enough to cover the shortfall, the scope of the infrastructure projects will be reduced commensurately and the Public Service project awards will each be reduced to reflect the expenditure of no more than 15% of the entitlement.

Leveraging Funds and Matching Requirements (AP15)

The Cities of Richland, Kennewick and Pasco are supportive of efforts by other agencies to apply for or leverage other funding sources that might become available during the year. City staff will be available to provide written and verbal support of projects that will meet a housing and community development need as identified in the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan, and, within staffing capacity, will assist other organizations that implement portions of the Plan to apply for funds from other local, state, or federal resources.

Each city, as a participating jurisdiction of the Consortium, must make a permanent contribution to show support of affordable housing in the community. The contribution is considered to be a match for federal HOME dollars and must be 25% of the funds drawn from the jurisdiction’s HOME Investment Trust Fund Treasury account, excluding funds identified for administering the HOME program and program income. Match obligations are satisfied by permanent non-federal investment in, or contribution to, HOME assisted or HOME eligible projects by reduction or contribution from the City’s General or other non-federal funds, reduced cost for land purchased below appraised value, reduced financing fees from lenders and appraisers, grants for affordable housing from non-federal sources, donated construction/housing materials, and volunteer labor.

Allocation Priorities and Barriers (AP35)

Funding priorities are consistent with those stated in the Strategic Plan. The City of Kennewick intends to maximize the use of limited resources to ensure the highest benefit within the capacity to administer the program. Reduced funds have increased the challenge. Given the limited capacity, bricks and mortar projects resulting in visual physical improvements are important when those projects reduce barriers for physically impaired persons; result in the acquisition, construction or improvement to public facilities; and/or, result in neighborhood preservation and revitalization. High priority is also placed on projects that would result in enhancing the economic opportunities of residents.

The City likewise places a priority on bricks and mortar projects that result in the creation or preservation of housing for the elderly or populations with special needs. The City also funds social services to address community needs including projects to assist seniors or populations with special needs and disadvantaged youth.

Whenever feasible, projects that leverage additional funds and/or are coordinated with community partners are emphasized and given priority. The City does not anticipate obstacles to meeting the underserved needs addressed in the projects (within the anticipated funding levels).

GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION (AP50)

All of the City’s infrastructure improvements are located in low and moderate-income areas as defined by Census Tracts. Low and moderate-income Public Service projects are located throughout the City.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Introduction (AP55)

In 2022, HOME goals are included in reporting by the City of Richland, the HOME lead.

A goal of the three Cities is to provide decent affordable housing for its residents. To support this effort each city has programs to address this need. The following provides a general overview of the types of programs and projects that supports this effort.

- HOME – Down Payment Assistance Program. Each City provides a down payment program, providing funds for low and moderate income first time homebuyers.
- HOME – CHDO. Support efforts of a CHDO to develop single-family homeownership units.
- HOME – TBRA. The Consortium has created a Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program to support affordable housing. Using a subrecipient, the Consortium provides HOME funds to assist tenants with rent and utilities.

PUBLIC HOUSING

Actions to Support Public Housing Needs (AP60)

The City of Kennewick will help address the needs of public housing and activities in 2022 by continuing to work closely with and supporting efforts of the Kennewick Housing Authority. The City and Authority will continue to coordinate housing activities throughout the City.

There are a variety of assisted affordable housing options available in the Tri-Cities. HUD and the State of Washington (Washington State Housing Trust Funds and Washington State Housing Finance Commission Tax Credits) subsidized housing programs have generated an inventory of housing; the majority of those are family units.

Actions to Encourage Residents (AP60)

The Kennewick Housing Authority (KHA) Governing Board includes one position designated as a Resident-Assisted Commissioner. The position is currently vacant but is being advertised to be filled. Public Housing residents are encouraged to attend Resident Council meetings to discuss how to become more self-sufficient. The meetings are temporarily curtailed due to COVID-19 social distancing requirements. KHA also periodically provides information via notices to all residents.

KHA has hosted flu and COVID-19 vaccination clinics for residents and the general public this year. The clinics are a new service, and they provide the best access for tenants and especially the elderly, that want to limit their exposure to others.

The Kennewick Housing Authority encourages Section 8 participants to get their “Ducks in a Row for Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership”. This program provides an opportunity to utilize their rental assistance payment for homeownership; however due to COVID-19, many participants are not actively shopping for homes. KHA’s lobby is closed, but lease up and rental assistance continue with most services being provided remotely or by individual appointment in order to adhere to the Governor’s Proclamations during the pandemic in order to keep everyone as safe as possible.

HOMELESS AND OTHER SPECIAL NEEDS ACTIVITIES (AP65)

The three cities will continue to be involved in the Benton Franklin Human Services planning efforts. The BFHS developed a plan for the homeless with the express purpose of giving nonprofit and government

agency providers a “road map” of actions to follow to reduce homelessness in Benton and Franklin Counties. The plan is a concerted effort by numerous agencies, including the three cities, to develop a common understanding of the needs of the homeless and to agree upon a coordinated plan to improve services and housing for homeless. The goal of the plan is to move homeless individuals and families through a continuum of housing and supportive services leading them to permanent housing with the highest level of self-sufficiency they can achieve.

Assessing Individual Needs (AP65)

Richland, Kennewick and Pasco will continue to encourage cooperation in sharing information to identify existing resources that might be available to meet the needs of the homeless, or those at risk of becoming homeless. Staff from the City will also participate, if available, and support the annual Point-in-Time Count in Benton and Franklin counties scheduled for January 2022.

Addressing Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing Needs (AP65)

Emergency Solutions Grant funds are not directly administered by the Continuum of Care. However, the Continuum consults on funding decisions. The cities do not address emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless, except through their involvement with Benton Franklin Community Action Committee (BFCAC) and Benton Franklin Human Services. The three cities do not receive ESG funds but will continue to support the development of homeless housing through community resources such as, potentially, the HOME program and 2060 and 2163 Recording Fee resources, as they have in the past.

Transitions to Permanent Housing and Homeless Prevention (AP65)

Kennewick purchased and rehabilitated a two-story 4-bedroom home to serve as transitional housing for homeless veterans. This facility has been in operation since 2010 and has housed many individuals for varying lengths of time. The facility is run by the Columbia Basin Veterans Coalition.

In 2010, the City purchased and rehabilitated a 4-plex to serve as transitional housing. Two of the units are used for housing victims of domestic violence and the other two are used for housing families recovering from substance abuse. The facility is jointly run by Domestic Violence Services of Benton and Franklin Counties and Elijah Family Homes.

Assistance with Discharge Housing and services (AP65)

Except for involvement with BFCAC, the three Cities do not provide assistance to those being discharged from publicly funded institutions or receiving assistance from public or private agencies.

BARRIERS TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING (AP75)

The purchase price and downpayment of a home generally serves as a significant barrier to affordable homeownership opportunities, particularly for lower income households. Local HUD-funded housing

programs provide affordable housing opportunities for lower-income households by financing down payment assistance.

All three cities encourage infill development to preserve older neighborhoods, and support increase of housing densities in areas where adequate public facilities and services (police and fire protection, schools, water, sewer, and drainage) are in place or can easily be provided.

OTHER ACTIONS (AP85)

Because of the layout of the Tri-Cities, Benton and Franklin Counties are taking a regional approach for addressing obstacles to underserved needs. One of the challenges to meeting underserved needs by any one group is the lack of staff capacity, financial resources, and supportive services necessary to address all needs. The City attends, supports, and is an active member of Continuum of Care, an organization comprised of local non-profit, housing, public service, correctional, and government agencies throughout Benton and Franklin counties. By maintaining open communication, collaboration, and partnering efforts among all groups, and reducing duplication of effort, more needs of lower income people can be met.

Actions to Meet Underserved Needs (AP85)

Decent housing can be made available to those below 30% median income by joining forces with community advocates such as Benton Franklin Community Action Committee and the Department of Human Services to provide affordable housing for this underserved population. Typical projects to meet this goal would be family shelter, domestic violence shelter, developmentally disabled and chronically mentally disabled housing, elderly housing, migrant farmworker housing, homeless prevention rapid rehousing programs, and state and local housing trust funds. The City supports the efforts of local non-profit agencies to meet needs of underserved populations.

Actions toward Affordable Housing (AP85)

The City will continue to support the efforts of various nonprofit agencies, housing authorities and CHDO's to provide affordable housing opportunities for special needs populations. City staff will be available to assist in identifying potential funding sources and provide technical assistance within staff capacity, and will remain receptive to forming partnerships with other entities to assure vulnerable populations are able to reside in decent, safe housing.

Actions to Reduce Lead-Based Paint Hazards (AP85)

The City will undertake the following actions in program years 2020-2024 to increase community awareness of lead based paint and its hazards. The City will provide education on lead based paint including information on Safe Work Practices, actions to take when rehabbing or remodeling a home, and steps to take if exposure to lead hazards is suspected.

The pamphlets “Renovate Right” and “Protect Your Family from Lead in Your Home” published by Washington Department of Commerce and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will be distributed to all potential housing clients, and be available via online links from the City’s website.

Actions to Reduce Number of Poverty-Level Families (AP85)

Several activities may be undertaken to decrease cost-burdens for lower income people such as the various housing programs offered by the City and the Tri-Cities HOME Consortium. The City supports economic development projects that create jobs or provide education or training to enable people to become self-sufficient and have an opportunity to work at living wage jobs. Targeted revitalization of neighborhoods should increase the ability to impact the lives of lower income residents who reside there, and promote these areas as a desirable place to live with connectivity to other desirable neighborhoods.

Actions to Develop Institutional Structure (AP85)

The City will pursue various activities outlined in the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan to strengthen and coordinate actions with housing, nonprofit, and economic development agencies. Staff will continue to participate in the Continuum of Care Task Force to assist in the coordination of government agencies, nonprofit organizations, housing developers, social service providers, and Continuum of Care providers to meet the needs of the homeless. Kennewick staff will participate in the Point-in-Time Count of the homeless, used to measure community trends. The City will, within staff capacity, continue to encourage and support joint applications for resources and programs among housing and service providers.

Actions to Enhance Coordination (AP85)

The City supports efforts by other agencies to apply for, or leverage other funding sources that might become available during the year. City staff will be available to provide written and verbal support of projects that meet a Housing and Community Development need as identified in the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan, and will assist other organizations to apply for funds from other local, state or federal resources within staff capacity.

I move to adopt Ordinance 5949.

Summary

At the October 19, 2021 Council meeting, the date of November 16, 2021 was set for a public hearing, and all conditions of proper notice have been fulfilled.

Jose Chavallo and Tammy Steele are requesting the vacation of a portion (50' x 258') of public right-of-way abutting 1026 and 1048 North Lincoln Street. This vacation will help facilitate the construction of a proposed 220 to 260 unit multi-unit apartment complex (See attached map). As a result of vacating this portion of North Lincoln Street, the applicant will be required to construct a new access point to North Kellogg Street at the northern leg of West Okanogan Loop, which will maintain two access points for the Columbia Addition neighborhood south of the applicant's property.

Public Works has assessed this section of North Lincoln Street and determined that with the construction of the new access point, this section of North Lincoln Street is will no longer be needed. Vacating this portion of North Lincoln Street includes the requirement that the developer sign and record the attached agreement, meeting certain requirements for construction of improvements, prior to finalizing the vacation.

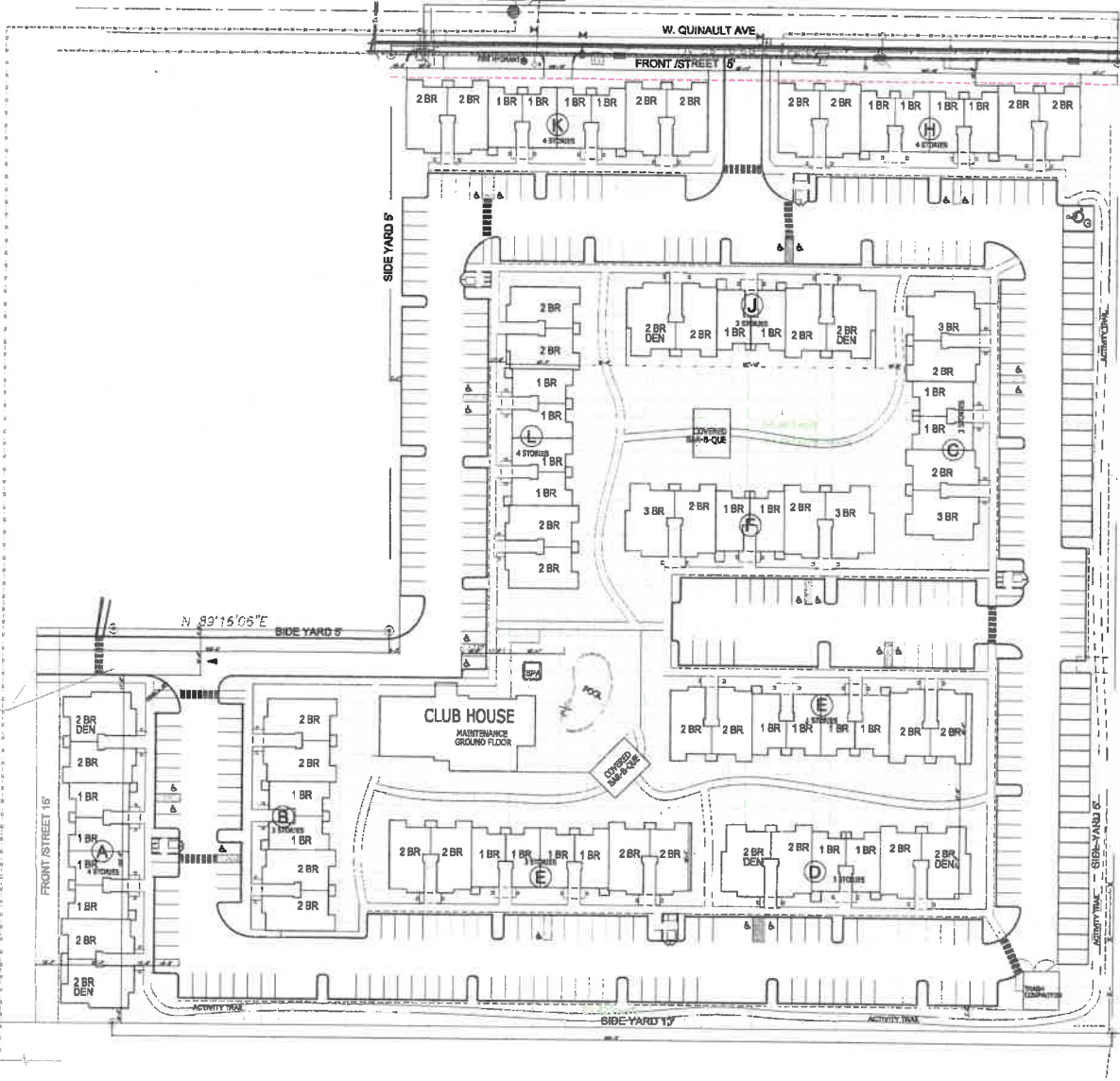

The Council adopt Resolution 21-12, authorizing the City Manager to sign a Developer Preliminary Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement for Colorado Street Utilities construction.

Motion for Consideration

I move to adopt Resolution 21-12.

Summary

Kennewick Municipal Code 5.60 establishes procedures for Developer Latecomer Reimbursement Agreements for reimbursement of utilities and arterial/collector streets constructed by developers.

Staff received an application from Tri Cities Development Company, LLC to establish a reimbursement area and cost assessments for a latecomer agreement, in association with the extension of sanitary sewer, water and storm drainage main line utilities in future Colorado Street, to approximately 650-ft south of Bob Olson Parkway, and the southern boundary of future Fire Station No. 6. Total estimated costs are \$23,644 sewer, \$58,422 water and \$37,192 storm drainage - totaling \$119,258.

Jaycee Structure LLC is the owner of property on the west side of future Colorado Street and the potential future beneficiary of these utility extensions. The latecomer agreement would establish a potential pro rata reimbursement from the current or future owner of the Jaycee Structure property, should they connect to these utilities in the next 20 years.

Notice of the proposed Latecomer Agreement, along with property owner's rights, have been mailed to all affected property owners of record as shown on the records of the Benton County Assessor.

Following the public hearing, Council may reject, accept or modify the proposed latecomer agreement and preliminary determination of area boundaries and assessments. Additional information is included in an attached staff memo.

THIS AGREEMENT entered into this date by and between the City of Kennewick, Washington hereinafter called "City," and Tri Cities Development Company, LLC, hereinafter called "Owner;"

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City has, by resolution adopted by the City Council, on the _____ day of _____, 20 ____, approved the construction of facilities by the Owner(s) to a certain tract of land and established a preliminary or land assessment reimbursement area and preliminary pro rata share of costs, NOW THEREFORE,

IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. Owner(s) of land herein described and set forth in Exhibit A shall construct at his (their) expense, the facility as per construction plans signed and approved by the City Engineer and as described in Exhibit A. Said facility shall be constructed in accordance with the City Standard Specifications and Drawings in effect governing the construction and specifications for facilities of such type, and subject to the approval of the City Engineer or his agent.

Exhibit A: includes legal description of owner property together with a written description of the improvements proposed to be constructed that will benefit the properties in the reimbursement area, together with a legal description of the property that have contributed to the cost of the improvements.

2. It is the intent of the Developer Preliminary Latecomers Agreement, that for a period of 15 years for a street project, or 20 years for any utility (water, sanitary sewer or storm drainage) project from date of final acceptance of the project by the City, that any person, firm, or corporation owning real estate and not contributing to the original cost of such facility, who subsequently connects into or uses the same, shall pay a fair pro rata share of the cost of construction of said facility in accordance with the schedule and reimbursement area map set forth in Exhibit B, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth.

Exhibit B: includes a description of each tract of land within the reimbursement area, with the preliminary assessment amount contemplated to be assessed against each property. (Preliminary reimbursement area assessment roll).

3. Upon completion of construction of the extension and its acceptance by the City Engineer, the facility shall become a part of the municipal system of the City.

Maintenance and operation costs of said facilities after acceptance shall be borne by the City, except for work and corrections covered by the contractor's one-year warranty bond.

4. It is the intent of the Developer Preliminary Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement that following completion of construction and passage of a Developer Final Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement, by the City Council, that no person, firm, or corporation shall be granted a permit or be authorized by the City to connect into or use any such facility, or extensions thereof, during the period of time prescribed in Paragraph (2) of this contract without first paying to the City, in addition to any and all other costs and charges made and assessed for such connection or use, the amount required by the provisions of the contract under which the facility so connected onto or used or constructed, as set forth in Exhibit B. All amounts so received by the municipality, less a handling, processing and administration fee equal to ten percent (10%) of the reimbursement collected, shall be remitted to the Owner(s) or assignee within sixty (60) days after the receipt thereof. After expiration of this time prescribed in Paragraph 2 of the contract, City standard fees in effect at the time will apply.
5. It is the intent of the Developer Preliminary Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement, that following passage of a Developer Final Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement by the City Council, that whenever any connection is made onto the facility described in Paragraph (1) under this contract without such payment having first been made in accordance with Exhibit B, the City may remove or cause to be removed, such unauthorized connection and all connecting lines or pipe located in the facility right-of-way, and dispose of such material removed without any liability whatsoever.
6. Owner(s) hereunder is/are an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the City.
7. Owner(s) agree to pay to the City a handling, processing, and administrative fee of ten percent (10%) of all reimbursements collected by the City on behalf of the owner.
8. Owner(s) release and waive any claims for any liability of the City, its officials, agents, and employees in the establishment and enforcement of the Developer Preliminary and Final Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement.
9. It is the intent of the Developer Preliminary Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement that following completion of construction and passage of a Developer Final Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement, by the City Council, that the City shall not be responsible for locating any beneficiary or survivor entitled to benefits by or through a Developer Final Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement. Any funds collected under the Developer Final Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement that are unclaimed by Owner(s) after ninety (90) days from the payment of each latecomers assessment, shall be returned to the parties making payment to the City, if they may be reasonably found, minus a ten percent (10%) city handling, processing and administration fee. After one hundred and twenty (120) days from the payment of each latecomers

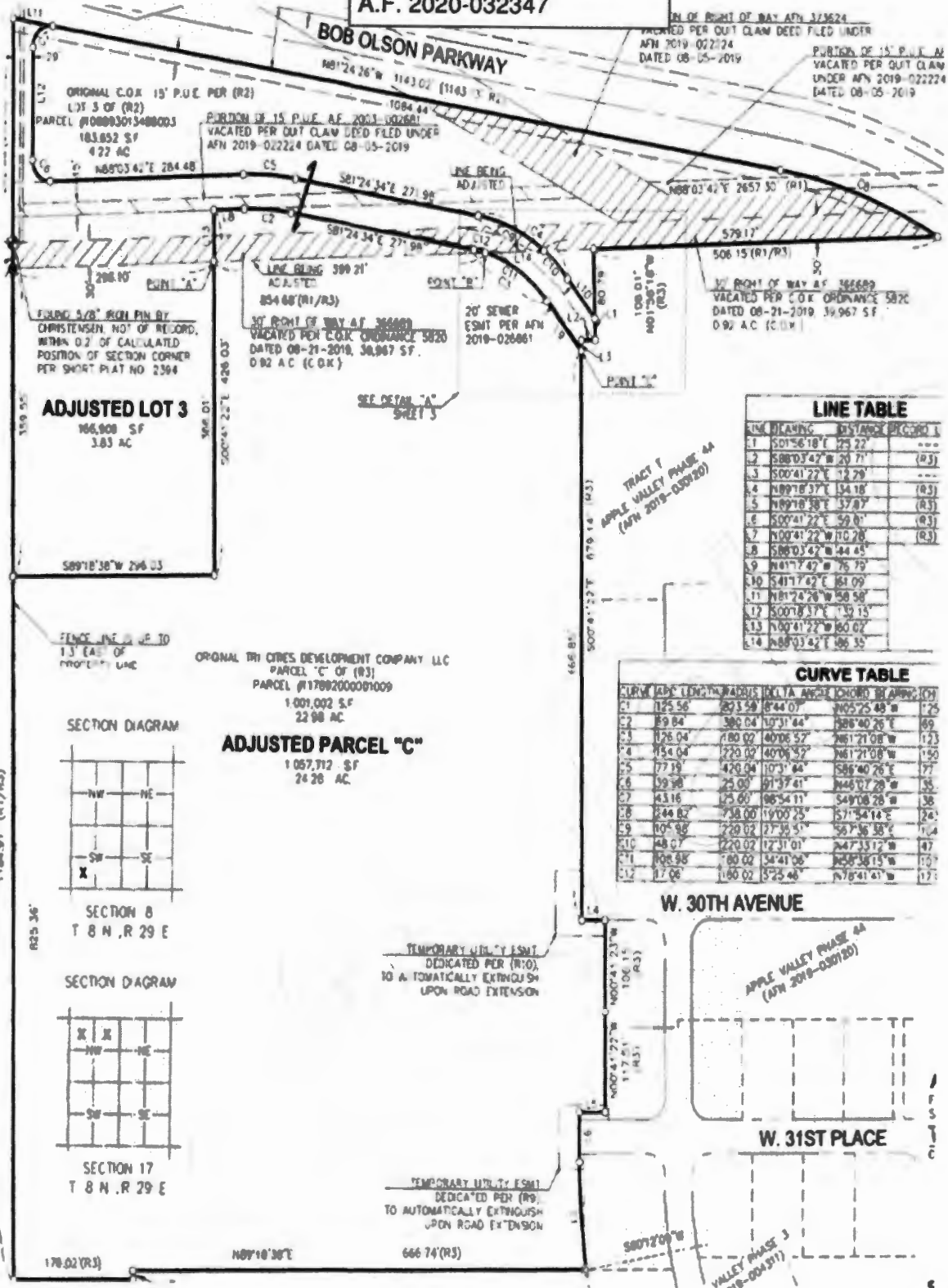

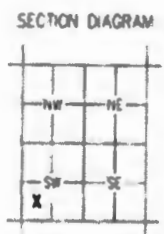

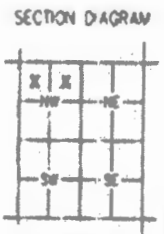

Subject: Developer Preliminary Latecomers Reimbursement Agreement – Colorado Street Utilities

Project Description

Tri Cities Development Company, LLC (“Developer”) is constructing utilities and the east half of Colorado Street from Bob Olson Parkway to approximately 650-ft south, to the southern property line of the future Kennewick Fire Station No. 6.

A portion of the construction will benefit a large property on the west side of Colorado Street adjacent to the construction limits. In particular, the sanitary sewer, water and storm drainage main lines are of benefit to the adjacent property on the west side of Colorado owned by Jaycee Structure LLC. Other work being performed by the Developer to solely benefit their own property is not eligible for a latecomer reimbursement agreement.

By terms set forth in a 3/10/2019 Memorandum of Agreement between the Developer and City, the Developer is constructing utilities and the east half of Colorado Street with no additional cost to the City of Kennewick.

Assessment Reimbursement Area

The property adjacent to the work area along the west side of Colorado Street is determined to be the potential beneficiary of Developer’s construction, and prorata shares are as determined below.

Benefitting Property (Jaycee Structure LLC):

Adjusted Parcel C as shown on Record Survey 5006 as recorded in Volume 1 of Surveys, Page 5006, Auditor File Number 2018-009389, records of Benton County, Washington.

Benefits

The Jaycee Structure LLC property along the west side of future Colorado Street benefits by their future use of the utilities constructed by Developer. Estimated prorata shares of the construction, design, and permitting costs are determined on the following table.

Additional Eligible Costs

Other items paid by the Developer are eligible costs include the 5% Public Works permit fee, the 8% design fee (both based on construction costs); and the latecomer application fee, which is: [\$500 x 3 utilities (sewer & storm drain), + \$200 x 1 benefitting properties] = \$1,700, plus an inflationary fee adjustment of the ENR Construction Cost Index for Seattle, from the ordinance date (8/2013) to present (8/2021). Per <https://www.mortenson.com/cost-index/seattle>, index is 149/107 = +39.25%. Application fee is 1700 x 149/107 = \$2,370.

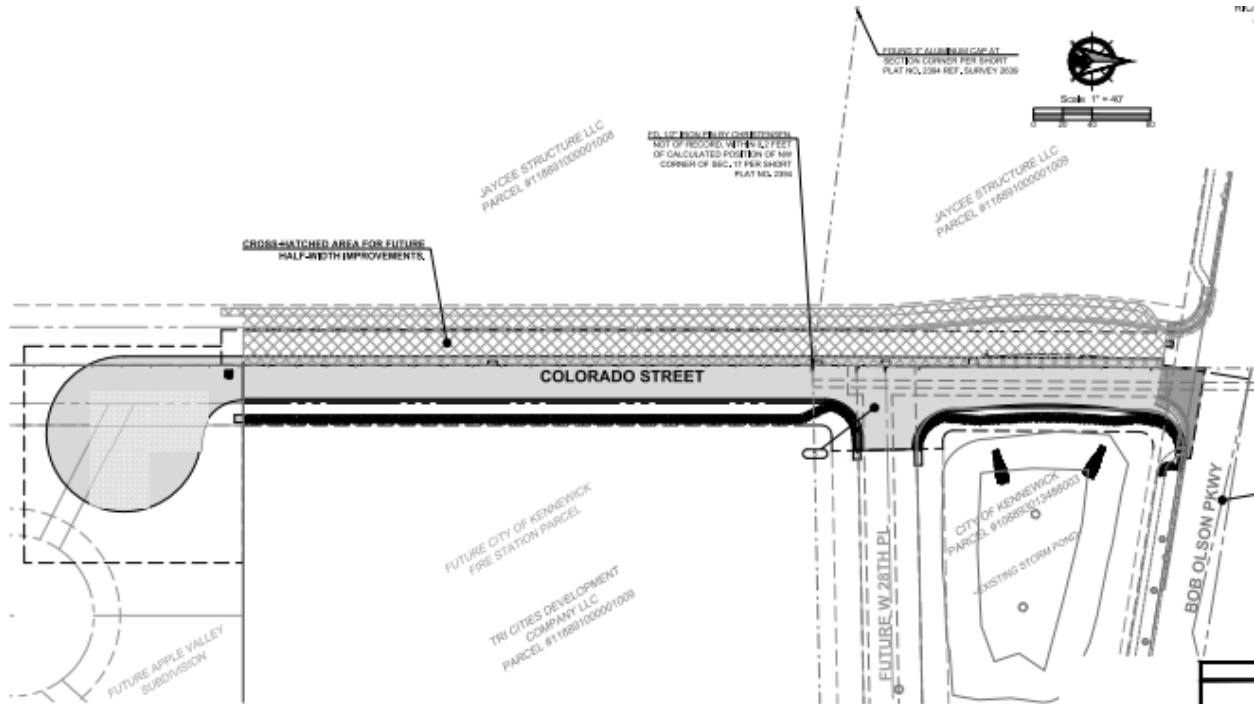
Term and Timing of Reimbursements

Per KMC 5.60.030, latecomers can be for 20 years for utility improvements (sanitary sewer, water and storm drainage).

If the Jaycee Structure LLC property develops within the 20-year period, following approval of a final latecomer's reimbursement agreement, they will be required to pay for their above estimated shares for each utility they connect to, with amounts finalized following completion of construction.

As for timing of payment, reimbursement from the Jaycee Structure LLC property will be required at the time they (or subsequent owners) require a Public Works permit to develop any portion of their property that requires connection to or use of a particular utility (sanitary sewer, water or storm drainage) constructed by Developer.

Motion for Consideration

I move to adopt Ordinance 5950.

Summary

State law requires that the City prepare a mid-biennium budget review and modification between September 1st and December 31st of the first year of the biennium. The mid-biennium review of the City's financial position provided at the November 9th workshop meeting and this budget adjustment serve to fulfill that requirement.

The budget adjustment ordinance provides an opportunity to formally appropriate items previously approved by Council and to bring matters of special interest to Council's attention. It may be used to update revenue estimates and appropriate for unanticipated expenditures. This is the second adjustment to the City's 2021/2022 biennial budget. Significant items include:

- To appropriate \$16,062,000 for Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds awarded to the City under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).
- To revise projections for Regular Sales and Optional Sales tax for the biennium.
- To appropriate estimated General Fund transfer to the Cash Reserve Fund based on the annual change in the consumer price index (CPI).
- To appropriate a FEMA grant award reimbursing expenses at the mass vaccination site.
- To appropriate City Assistance funding for KPD body/dash camera purchases.
- To appropriate for additional costs associated with scheduled general governmental fleet replacements due to supply chain issues.
- To appropriate HSIP grants for the Pedestrian Crossing Safety project and Photometric Data Collection & Study.

Alternatives

None recommended.

Fiscal Impact

Total increase in appropriations of \$34,616,114 to the City's 2021/2022 adjusted biennial budget, which represents an 8.7% to the current adjusted budget overall. However, the majority of the proposed increase is attributable to the City's ARPA Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds award. The proposed increase to the adjusted budget would be approximately 2% without budget adjustments for the ARPA program included.

Recommendation

That Council hold a public hearing and take testimony on the property tax levy for 2022 and adopt the 2022 property tax levy.

Motion for Consideration

I move to adopt Ordinance 5951.

Summary

Ordinance 5951 establishes the City's annual property tax levy for 2022. As discussed at the November 9th City Council workshop, the proposed 2022 levy ordinance is based on the most recent preliminary assessed valuation (AV) information provided by the Benton County Assessor on November 3rd and results in a proposed 2022 levy of \$14,416,944, which would be an increase of \$363,810 from the prior year's levy. Of this total increase, \$221,867 is attributable to new construction value added to the City's tax rolls for the year. The remaining increase of \$141,943 is attributable to a 1% increase from the prior year's (base) levy as authorized under state law.

Based on information provided by the County Assessor's Office, the City's assessed value increased by approximately \$691.5 million for the year to just over \$8.4 billion. This increase includes \$122.1 million in new construction value and \$569.4 million from the revaluation of existing properties within Kennewick, which represents a 7.4% increase in the value of those properties.

Based on the proposed 2022 levy and current AV, the proposed levy rate for 2022 would be \$1.71 per \$1,000 of AV, or a reduction of 11¢ per thousand of AV when compared to the prior year. For the owner of a median value home of \$215,500 in Kennewick, assuming a 7.4% increase in AV and the proposed levy rate of \$1.71, the amount of property tax paid to the City would increase by \$3.56 in 2022, or approximately 30¢ per month.

As is the case every year, staff will finalize the levy with the County in January based on the final AV amounts provided and the intent of this ordinance.

Alternatives

None recommended. Council could adopt the property tax levy ordinance without the 1% change to the base levy allowed by state law and approved by voters under Initiative 747.

Fiscal Impact

The 2022 property tax levy is estimated to generate a total of \$14,416,944 in revenue. Of this amount, \$67,000 would be allocated to the City's Fire Pension Fund and an estimated \$370,274 would be allocated to the Capital Improvement Fund and be used for a portion of the debt service for the bonds issued as part of the City's Local Revitalization Financing (LRF) program in Southridge as required by state law. The remaining \$13,979,670 would be allocated to the City's General and Street Funds.

CITY OF KENNEWICK FOR THE YEAR 2022 IN ACCORD WITH STATE
LAW

WHEREAS, the City Manager has provided the City Council with updated information on the financial resources available in the 2021/2022 biennial budget as submitted by the Treasurer at the November 9, 2021, Council workshop; and

WHEREAS, the City Council and City Manager have considered the City's anticipated financial requirements for the remaining fiscal biennium and the ensuing year; and

WHEREAS, notice of a hearing on the proposed property tax levy was published and a public hearing was held at a regular meeting of the Kennewick City Council on the 16th day of November, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the City's actual general operating levy amount from the previous year, excluding the amount to be refunded under RCW 84.55.070, was \$14,053,134; and

WHEREAS, the population of the City is more than 10,000; NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. A tax for the following sums of money, or as much thereof as may be authorized by law, including all previously certified totals that may have been adjusted according to RCW 84.56.430, to defray the expenses and liabilities of the City of Kennewick, be, and the same is hereby levied for the purpose specified against all taxable property in the City for the fiscal year 2022 which includes a 1.01% increase over the actual operating levy amount from the previous year:

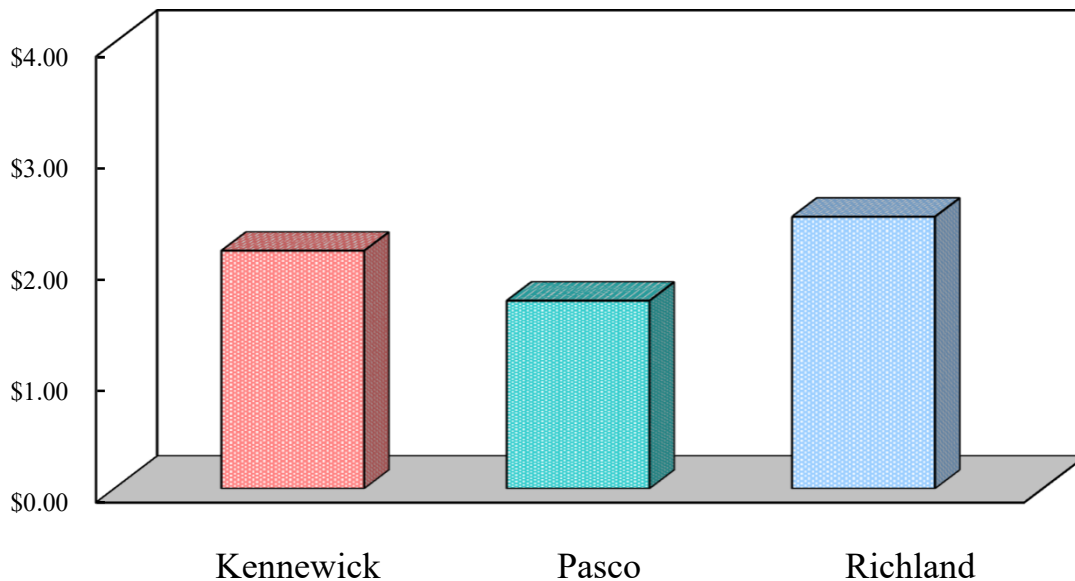
Where does your tax dollar go?

Summary

The 2021/2022 biennial budget set forth a strategic plan for the city and staff to implement during the biennium. That strategic plan became the organization and City Manager goals for the biennium that are in alignment with Council's goals and priorities. The goals are identified in the attached presentation and performance review.

During the workshop on November 9th, the City Manager reviewed the biennial goals and accomplishments for the first year of the 2021/2022 biennium. During that workshop, a recommendation was made to condense the evaluation process by combining the steps where council conduct an executive session and then the Mayor and Mayor Pro-Tem meet with the City Manager to discuss the results of the executive session. In lieu of those two steps, the City Manager recommended that her performance review discussion occur in an open public meeting rather than an executive session.

In keeping with the City's core values and responsible government priority area objectives, as well as Council's and the City Manager's desire to have open public transparency, the modification is suggested as a trial for this year only and then to determine next year if Council would like to change the process to this format versus what is currently set forth in the Kennewick Administrative Code.

Alternatives

To hold an executive session to discuss the City Manager's performance as described in the Kennewick Administrative Code (KAC).

Fiscal Impact

Each 1% increase results in a \$171 salary increase per month.
