# Background

### Columbia Park event provides the community with a fireworks show intended to reduce violations of the city fireworks code.

- Event management has passed from non-profit to non-profit.
  - Regional Chamber through 2017, Water Follies 2018-2019, Carousel Foundation 2021.
  - Not a viable fundraiser.
  - Event staffing on a national holiday has been a challenge.
- The barge used to launch the fireworks from the river was decommissioned after the 2017 show. Fireworks launched from the shoreline in 2018, 2019, and 2021.
  - Park road closures shut down the Golf Tri-Plex and Bite at the Landing operations.
  - Fireworks "exclusion zone" limits viewing and parking areas.



Limitations on Regulatory Enforcement

#### Martin v. City of Boise

- September 2018 the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that enforcement of ordinances that prohibit sleeping or camping on public property against homeless individuals is unconstitutional when those individuals do not have a meaningful alternative, such as barrier free shelter space or a legal place to camp.
- Court ruled that shelter space is not "available" if homeless individuals are required to participate in religious instruction in exchange for shelter.
- Martin does not cover individuals who do have access to adequate temporary shelter but choose not to use it.
- Even when shelter is unavailable, an ordinance may prohibit sitting, lying, or sleeping outside at certain times in certain locations.
- An ordinance may prohibit obstruction of rights-of-way or the erection of certain types of structures.

#### Hosting Homeless by Religious Organizations — ESHB 1754 effective June 2020

- Religious organization may host the homeless on property owned or controlled by the religious organization whether within buildings located on the property or elsewhere on the property outside of buildings.
- The City is prohibited from enacting regulation or taking other action which imposes conditions other than those necessary to protect public health and safety and that do not substantially burden the decisions or actions of a religious organization regarding the location of housing or shelter.
- Legislation restricted city authority to limit the duration of encampments, to regulate safe parking program, sets forth criteria for regulating small houses, ability to limit simultaneous outdoor encampments.
- Codes in effect prior to June 2020 are grandfathered as long as they do not categorically prohibit hosting of the homeless and have not been found by a court to violate RLUIPA – the Religious Land Use Institutionalized Persons Act 42 U.S.C. § 2000cc
- KMC 18.42.105 Temporary Homeless Encampment Permit; KMC 18.12.255 Encampment Conditions

**Panhandling** - *City of Lakewood v. Robert Willis* (2016) Washington State Supreme Court struck down two sections of the City of Lakewood's panhandling ordinance as unconstitutional restrictions on First Amendment rights of individuals — sidewalks and intersections considered traditional public forum which prohibits imposing restrictions based upon content of persons speech; begging is protected conduct.

KMC 10.08.020 Disorderly Conduct – prohibits intentionally obstructing vehicular or pedestrian traffic, without legal authority.

Signs Discouraging Support for Panhandling

**Sit Lie Laws** – The "Sit – Lie" ordinance prohibits sitting or lying on the sidewalk or public rights of way; during limited hours of the day; within limited geographic boundary; intended to address public health and safety and safeguard economic viability of commercial areas.

Notice requirement before enforcement can take place.

Certain Exemptions Required – sitting or lying due to medical emergency or due to sensory, mental or physical disability; allows use of wheelchair, walker or similar device; operating or patronizing a business with permission to occupy the sidewalk;

KMC 10.08.140 Sitting, Lying on Sidewalk in Designated Zone

#### Anti- Camping Ordinance and Homeless Encampment Removal — KMC 9.54

- •Prohibits use of public parks, streets, sidewalks, trails, city owned or maintained property for camping purposes or storage of personal property;
- •72 hour notice provided prior to removal of an encampment, litter, garbage and debris discarded, personal property stored for 60 days;
- •Individuals are provided referral to services; criminal enforcement suspended if no emergency shelter space available or the individual is actively seeking services.

**Blake Decision** - February 2021 Washington Supreme Court in *State v. Blake* held that Washington's strict liability drug possession statute was unconstitutional because the lack of a mental state could result in punishment for innocent conduct.

- •In response legislature passed ESHB 5476 which amended RCW 69.50.4013; the new law added a "knowledge" requirement to the statute, but also reduced the penalty for simple possession of controlled substances from a felony to a misdemeanor and requires law enforcement to divert the *first two* potential offenses for simple drug possession instead of referring cases to the prosecutor.
- •The law is set to sunset in July 2023 unless the legislature takes action to amend. The City amended its codes to incorporated RCW 69.50.4013 by reference to allow the City to prosecute these cases when the circumstances warrant.
- •Until recently there was no formal plan or process to address the diversion requirement, local agencies developed their own process. The State recently funded the "Recovery Navigator Program" to facilitate referral to services and case management in each county what that will look like is TBD.

#### Police Limitations -

- Police Reform Legislation eliminated ability of law enforcement to perform Terry Stop reasonable force to detain an individual based upon reasonable suspicion a crime has been committed.
- Covid Booking Restrictions limits the types a crimes that will be booked into jail typically disorderly, trespass, sit-lie, drug possession not included; even when booked not held pending outcome of the case.
