The City of National City is coordinating with the County of San Diego Health Human Services Agency, and other agencies to take measures to monitor and reduce the spread of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19). The World Health Organization has declared the outbreak a global pandemic and local and state emergencies have been declared providing reprieve from certain public meeting laws such as the Brown Act.

As a result, the City Council Meeting will occur only online to ensure the safety of City residents, employees and the communities we serve. A live webcast of the meeting may be viewed on the city's website at www.nationalcityca.gov. For Public Comments see "PUBLIC COMMENTS" section below.

ORDER OF BUSINESS: Public sessions of all Regular Meetings of the City Council / Community Development Commission - Housing Authority (hereafter referred to as Elected Body) begin at 6:00 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday of each month. Public Hearings begin at 6:00 p.m. unless otherwise noted. Closed Meetings begin in Open Session at 5:00 p.m. or such other time as noted, and after announcing closed session items, convenes into a Closed Meeting. If a workshop is scheduled, the subject and time of the workshop will appear on the agenda. The Mayor and Council members also sit as the Chairperson and Members of the Board of the Community Development Commission (CDC).

REPORTS: All open session agenda items and reports as well as all documents and writings distributed to the Elected Body less than 72 hours prior to the meeting, are available for review on the City's website at www.nationalcityca.gov. Regular Meetings of the Elected Body are webcast and archived on the City's website at www.nationalcityca.gov.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: There are multiple ways you can make sure your opinions are heard and considered by our City Council as outlined below:

Submit your public comment prior to the meeting: To submit a comment in writing, email PublicComment@nationalcityca.gov, provide the agenda item number and title of the item in the subject line of your email. Public comments or testimony is limited to up to three (3) minutes. If the comment is not related to a specific agenda item,

indicate General Public Comment in the subject line. All email comments received by 1:00 p.m. on the day of the meeting will be emailed to the City Council Members and made a part of the official record.

Register online and participate in live public comment during the meeting: To provide live public comment during the meeting, you must pre-register on the City's website at https://www.nationalcityca.gov/publiccomment by 1:00 p.m. on the day of the regular meeting to join the City Council Meeting.

***Please note that you do not need to pre-register to watch the meeting online, but you must pre-register if you wish to speak.

Once registered, you will receive an email with a link from Zoom to join the live meeting. You can participate by phone or by computer. Please allow yourself time to log into Zoom before the start of the meeting to ensure you do not encounter any last-minute technical difficulties.

***Please note that members of the public will not be shown on video; they will be able to watch and listen and speak when called upon. Public microphones will be muted until it is your turn to comment.

Each speaker is allowed up to three (3) minutes to address the City Council. Please be aware that the Mayor may limit the comments' length due to the number of persons wishing to speak or if comments become repetitious or unrelated.

All comments are subject to the same rules as would otherwise govern speaker comments at the meeting. Speakers are asked to be respectful and courteous. Please address your comments to the City Council as a whole and avoid personal attacks against members of the public, City Council, and city staff.

INTERPRETATION SERVICES: To use the Zoom interpretation feature you must first Pre-Register on Zoom. Once logged into Zoom to use the interpretation feature, please scroll to the bottom of the Zoom screen (where the meeting controls are), click on the interpretation icon (world), and select English as your language. If you are joining using the Zoom mobile app (cell phone, tablet, etc.), please press the ellipsis (...), then Interpretation, and then choose your language.

WRITTEN AGENDA: With limited exceptions, the Elected Body may take action only upon items appearing on the written agenda. Items not appearing on the agenda must be brought back on a subsequent agenda unless they are of a demonstrated emergency or urgent nature, and the need to take action on such items arose after the agenda was posted.

CONSENT CALENDAR: Consent calendar items involve matters which are of a routine or noncontroversial nature. All consent items are adopted by approval of a single motion by the City Council. Prior to such approval, any item may be removed from the consent portion of the agenda and separately considered, upon request of a Councilmember, a staff member, or a member of the public.

Upon request, this agenda can be made available in appropriate alternative formats to persons with a disability in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. <u>Please contact</u>

Background

On December 21, 2021, the City Council voted to change the way the City Councilmembers are elected, transitioning to district based elections for the four City Councilmember seats. The Mayor would remain elected at-large. This transition requires that the City create districts and adopt a boundary map.

On Thursday, February 3, 2022, the City Council conducted the first required Public Hearing to provide information to the public on the districting process, the permissible criteria to be considered to draw district boundaries, and the process on how to submit draft maps for consideration, as well as to receive public comment. One verbal comment was received from Ken Seaton-Msemaji and three (3) written comments received from Rocina Lizarraga, Joan Rincon, and Evangline Meneses. In attendance were consultants from Redistricting Insights, SVPR Communications, and City staff. One member of the public registered for the meeting and attended via Zoom.

On Saturday, February 5, 2022, Community Workshop was held to provide information to the public on the process of creating districts for elections and the process on how to submit draft maps for consideration, as well as to receive public comment. The demographer provided an explanation on the districting process, and provided mapping tool training. Four (4) verbal comments were received from Cynthia Suero-Gabler, Gloria Cooper, Ken Seaton-Msemaji, and Mitz Lee. In addition, one (1) written comment was received from Thelma De Castro. In attendance were consultants from Redistricting Insights, SVPR Communications, and City staff. Five members of the public registered for the meeting and attended via Zoom.

The four (4) districts must be drawn using the 2020 census data and in compliance with the FAIR MAPS Act (Act), which was adopted by the California Legislature as Assembly Bill 849 and took effect January 1, 2020.

Under the Act, the maps are drawn and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority:

- 1. Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act.
- 2. Geographically contiguous
- 3. Undivided neighborhoods and "communities of interest" (socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)
- 4. Easily identifiable boundaries
- 5. Compact (do not bypass one group of people to get a more distant group of people)
- 6. Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party.

The Statutory Process for moving to district-based elections requires at least four (4) public hearings. This will be the second required public hearing to consider moving to by-district elections. The City Council and public will receive a presentation by Matt Rexroad of Redistricting Insights, who has been hired by the City to assist with the demographic analysis. The presentation is an overview of the districting process, the foundational legal principles involved, and the criteria used in developing district boundaries. All meetings will be held virtually and Public Comment will be received both written/verbal following the presentation.

The community is encouraged to participate in a series of five public meetings (see below for schedule), which will include four Public Hearings and one Community Workshop and Informational Session. Due to the COVID Pandemic all meetings will be held via Zoom. Staff has also created a District Elections webpage on the City website at www.nationalcityca.gov/government/redistricting to provide updated information throughout the process.

Community Outreach

The City has partnered with a consultant, Redistricting Insights, to utilize 2020 Federal Census data to determine district options for consideration. The City is working collaboratively with Falcon Strategies to engage the community and distribute information in multiple languages to ensure participation from all segments of the community.

To date outreach has included:

- 1. City Social Media (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter) and the City website (District Elections) page.
- 2. The City website page and social media includes translations of all documents in Spanish, and Tagalog.
- 3. Legal Noticing (English, Spanish, Tagalog) in The Star News, El Latino, and the Filipino Press. Also available on the City Bulletin Boards at City Hall and the City website Districting page.
- 4. Interviews with the City Clerk on Telemundo TV, NBC and CBS
- 5. Kiosks set up at the Library to assist with online mapping tool
- 6. Assistance at Library with the paper map drawing process
- 7. Livestreaming of public meetings on the City website and videos posted for future viewing.

The public is requested to continue to provide input regarding communities of interest and other local factors that should be considered while drafting district maps. A community of interest under the relevant Elections Code for the City is "a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation."

Possible features defining communities of interest might include, but are not limited to:

- School districts;
- Natural and artificial boundaries dividing line such as major roads, hills, or highways'
- Area around parks and other neighborhood landmarks;
- Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns; and
- Shared demographic characteristics, such as:
 - Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic insolation;
 - Languages spoken at home; and
 - Single-Family and Multi-Family Housing Unit areas.

Features that are not included in defining communities of interest are relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.


APAC has also submitted a PowerPoint Presentation with additional details. The PowerPoint and copies of the five maps received are included as attachments to this report.

- Representation on local level positions
- National City has not had Filipino/AAPI on its City Council for years
- Representation matters





v. REDISTRICTING

- Redistricting in the United States is the process of drawing electoral district boundaries.
- Redistricting happens every 10 years as a result of the new census numbers; addresses changes in the population.
- Since National City has never had districts, the process we are embarking on is called "Districting" instead of "Redistricting."
- The process will be called "Redistricting" in 2030 when the Census is taken, and National City will need to redraw the district lines.

THINGS TO CONSIDER WHEN DRAWING THE LINES

Equal Population

 Each Council District should contain roughly ¼ of the city's population

Contiguity

• Council Districts should be composed of contiguous territory

Geographically Compact

Nearby areas should not be bypassed for more distant populations

Communities of Interest

 Council Districts should try to preserve communities who have similar legislative concerns who could therefore benefit from cohesive representation

Reasonable Access

 Council Districts should provide reasonable access between population centers

Natural Boundaries

 Council Districts should be bounded by natural boundaries, street lines, and/or City boundary lines
