

<u>Summary</u>

Interest in a micromobility regional pilot program in 2019 brought to light that current code provisions in the Kennewick Municipal Code do not adequately accommodate or appropriately regulate operation of newer technologies, including privately-owned motorized scooters, electric bikes, and electric personal assistive mobility devices such as segways and hoverboards.

Council requested that City Staff review existing codes pertaining to these devices and propose recommended amendments for their use and regulation. After some delay due to the pandemic, a Micromobility Cross-Functional Team made up of members from Parks, Economic Development, Traffic Safety, KPD, Planning, and the City Attorney's Office was formed in 2021. The group met on several occasions to discuss what guidelines to recommend regarding the operation of Motorized Personal Transportation Devices (MPTDs) in the City of Kennewick. This presentation is a summary of those recommendations.

MOTORIZED PERSONAL TRANSPORTATION IN THE CITY OF KENNEWICK

June 28, 2022

MICROMOBILITY TEAM

- A Micromobility Cross-Functional Team made up of members from Parks, Economic Development, Traffic Safety, KPD, Planning, and the City Attorney's Office met on several occasions throughout 2021 and 2022 to discuss what guidelines to propose regarding the operation of Motorized Personal Transportation Devices (MPTDs) in the City of Kennewick.
- The team is proposing a new ordinance regulating the operation of MPTDs (e-bikes and scooters) as well as modifications to KMC 11.98 to avoid inconsistency and to address regulation of Electric Personal Assistance Mobility Devices (EPAMDs). It is proposed that Kennewick Municipal Code Chapter 11.94 "Motorized Foot Scooters" would be repealed.

STATE LAW

Legislation passed in 2018 and 2019 regarding electricassisted bicycles ("e-bikes"), motorized foot scooters, and Electric Personal Assistive Mobility Devices (EPAMDs) provided definitions of the terms used to describe these mechanisms of transportation and also provided regulations for their use. See ESSB 6434 (2018) and ESHB 1772 (2019).

These statutes give local jurisdictions the power to regulate the use of motorized foot scooters and all classes of e-bikes on roadways, paths, sidewalks, and other facilities under their jurisdiction or control. Local jurisdictions may also regulate the use of EPAMDs in more limited situations.

RELEVANT DEFINITIONS – E-BIKES

"Electric-assisted bicycle" means a bicycle with two or three wheels, a saddle, fully operative pedals for human propulsion, and an electric motor. The electric-assisted bicycle's electric motor must have a power output of no more than seven hundred fifty watts. The electric-assisted bicycle must meet the requirements of one of the following three classifications:

- (1) "Class 1 electric-assisted bicycle" means an electric-assisted bicycle in which the motor provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of twenty miles per hour;
- (2) "Class 2 electric-assisted bicycle" means an electric-assisted bicycle in which the motor may be used exclusively to propel the bicycle and is not capable of providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of twenty miles per hour; or
- (3) "Class 3 electric-assisted bicycle" means an electric-assisted bicycle in which the motor provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of twenty-eight miles per hour and is equipped with a speedometer.

RELEVANT DEFINITIONS – SCOOTERS

"Motorized foot scooter" means a device with two or three wheels that has handlebars, a floorboard that can be stood upon while riding, and is powered by an internal combustion engine or electric motor that has a maximum speed of no greater than twenty miles per hour on level ground. For purposes of this section, a motor-driven cycle, a moped, an electric-assisted bicycle, or a motorcycle is not a motorized foot scooter. RCW 46.04.336.

RELEVANT DEFINITIONS - EPAMDS

"Electric Personal Assistive Mobility Device (EPAMD)" means

- (1) a self-balancing device with two wheels not in tandem, designed to transport only one person by an electric propulsion system with an average power of seven hundred fifty watts (one horsepower) having a maximum speed on a paved level surface, when powered solely by such a propulsion system while ridden by an operator weighing one hundred seventy pounds, of less than twenty miles per hour or
- (2) a self-balancing device with one wheel designed to transport only one person by an electric propulsion system with an average power of two thousand watts (two and two-thirds horsepower) having a maximum speed on a paved level surface, when powered solely by such a propulsion system, of less than twenty miles per hour. RCW 46.04.1695.

RELEVANT DEFINITIONS - MPTDS

Motorized personal transportation device" (MPTD) shall be a motorized device for personal transportation deemed to include motorized foot scooters, class 1, class 2, and class 3 electric-assisted bicycles, and all other similar devices, but shall exclude motorized wheelchairs, motor driven cycles, mopeds, motorcycles, pocket motorcycles, and electronic personal assistive mobility devices.

EXAMPLES











LOCAL AUTHORITY - RCW 46.61.710

E-Bikes and Scooters

- Local jurisdictions may restrict, regulate, or otherwise limit the access and use of electric-assisted bicycles and motorized foot scooters on facilities, properties, and rights-of-way under their jurisdiction and control.
- Any regulations for shared use paths that span jurisdictions must be consistent to be enforceable.

EPAMDs

- Local jurisdictions may prohibit operation on roadways in their jurisdiction with a speed limit greater than 25 mph.
- Local jurisdictions may restrict speed in congested locations but must be designated – cannot restrict speed in entire community or in nonrestricted areas.
- Local jurisdictions may regulate operation of EPAMDs in areas used for recreation, open space, habitat, trails or conservation purposes.

PROPOSED REGULATIONS

Proposed/amended ordinances will regulate use of:

- 1) "Motorized Personal Transportation Devices" (MPTDs)
 - Includes e-bikes (all classes), motorized foot scooters, and similar devices.
 - Excludes motorized wheelchairs, motor driven cycles, mopeds, motorcycles, pocket motorcycles, and electric personal assistive mobility devices.
- 2) "Electric Personal Assistive Mobility Devices" (EPAMDs)
 - State law definition adopted, includes things like segways, hoverboards, and electric unicycles.
 - Regulations differ from MPTDs due to differences in what local jurisdictions are allowed to regulate under State law.

MPTD General Requirements:

- Must obey rules of the road applicable to motor vehicles.
- May not park on a public sidewalk in a way that interferes with access. The City may remove illegally parked motorized personal transportation devices.

MPTD Operational Requirements:

- Must be 16 years of age or older to operate on roadways, shoulders, or alleys.
- Must be 5 years of age or older to ride on or be towed by.
- Additional passengers may only ride on designated seats and in a compliance with manufacturer guidelines for passenger transport.
- May not tow devices or persons unless using a device manufactured for that specific purpose that is used in accordance with manufacturer guidelines.
- Bicycle helmets are required for operators, passengers, and those being towed on roadways, shoulders, or alleys.
 - Exception for rented MPTDs for those 18 and older.

MPTD Equipment Requirements:

- Must have functioning lamp on front that emits white light visible for at least 500 feet if used at any time from a half hour after sunset to a half hour before sunrise.
- Must have red rear reflector or red lamp visible from all distances of up to 600 feet to the rear if used at any time from a half hour after sunset to a half hour before sunrise.
- Must have an engine muffler if powered by an internal combustion engine.
- Must have a rear brake.
- May not modify or enhance design or construction from manufacturer standards.

MPDT Allowed Locations:

- Parks
 - Allowed on the shared-use paths in Columbia Park, Zintel Canyon, and other locations as determined by the Parks Commission.
 - In all other parks, only allowed on public streets, in parking lots/areas, or in other locations where motorized vehicular use is allowed.
- Sidewalks
 - Electronically powered allowed.
 - Gas powered only allowed if there is no alternative to travel over a sidewalk as part of a bicycle or pedestrian path.
 - Operation on sidewalks is limited to speeds less than 10 miles per hour. MPTDs must yield to pedestrians and give an audible signal before passing.
- Public Trails and Multi-Use Pathways
 - Permitted on specifically identified paths or trails only allowed on Spirit of American Trail, Sacagawea Heritage Trail, the paved pathway that begins near the intersection of 4th Avenue and Union Streets and runs Northwest to Edison Street, and other paths or trails identified by the Parks Commission.
 - Speed limit on Pathways or Trails is 15 mph when one or more other users are present.
 Consistent with Richland as required by RCW 46.61.710.
- Streets
 - Not allowed on Limited Access Highways.
 - MPTDs other than e-bikes operated on roadways with a speed limit greater than or equal to 25 miles per hour must use dedicated bike lane.

EPAMD Regulations:

EPAMDs may be operated on roadways, sidewalks, and hardpacked, graveled, or paved City Park trails in accordance with the following:

- Operator must be at least 16 years of age to ride on roadways, shoulders, or alleys;
- Operators must wear approved bike helmet on roadways, shoulders, or alleys;
- May not operate on fully controlled limited access highways or on roadways with a speed limit greater than 25 miles per hour;
- Operator must obey posted speed limits;
- Operators must adhere to rules of the road; and
- Operator must yield to pedestrians and human-powered devices at all times and must give an audible signal before overtaking and passing a pedestrian.

ADA ACCESSIBILITY

The Americans with Disabilities Act requires covered entities to allow people with disabilities who use EPAMDs or scooters into all areas where members of the public are allowed to go.

Both proposed ordinances contain exceptions to regulations when EPAMDs or scooters are operated by a person with a mobility impairment caused by a physical disability who uses that device to enhance that person's mobility.

Wheelchairs are defined separately from EPAMDs in the proposed amendments and are allowed access anywhere pedestrians are permitted. State law governs the use of wheelchairs on roadways as well as safety and equipment requirements.

ENFORCEMENT

- Enforcement as a last resort, will focus on education and gaining voluntary compliance.
- Violation of regulations that is not a violation of other traffic or criminal laws is punishable by a civil infraction with a base penalty of \$50.
