Summary							
The City of Kennewick handles all of its criminal and civil cases in Benton County District Court through an Interlocal Agreement with Benton County. The attached 2023 Interlocal Agreement for District Court Services with Benton County is a renewal of the existing Interlocal. The current Interlocal Agreement is scheduled to expire at the end of this year. City staff have worked with Benton County to negotiate a renewal of the District Court Agreement. On November 29, 2022, the Benton County Board of Commissioners approved the 2023 District Court Interlocal Agreement with the City of Kennewick. The term of the 2023 District Court Interlocal Agreement is five years. As with the previous District Court Interlocal, the City will pay a pro rata share of the District Court budget in an amount equal to the ratio of the total number of violations filed by the City of Kennewick, whether infractions or criminal violations, to the total number of: (1) violations filed by all jurisdictions in District Court, plus, (2) felony complaints filed in District Court, plus (3) small claims cases filed, plus (4) civil cases filed, plus (5) petitions for anti-harassment orders. The one significant change to the Interlocal with Benton County is the addition of an administrative fee. Per the Interlocal, the City will pay to the County a monthly administration fee in the amount of 5% of the expenditures in the prior month from the Benton County General Fund, Fund 0010, District Court Department 111. The Interlocal Agreement provides for the creation of an Advisory Committee which will review and make recommendations regarding the District Court Interlocal Agreement.

2023 INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN BENTON COUNTY AND THE CITY OF KENNEWICK FOR DISTRICT COURT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is effective January 1, 2023, by and between the CITY OF KENNEWICK, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called "City" and BENTON COUNTY, a political subdivision of the State of Washington, hereinafter called "County".

WHEREAS, the County has an established District Court System; and

WHEREAS, a municipal department of the Benton County District Court for the City was established by the Benton County Commissioners pursuant to the adoption of the Benton County District Court Districting Plan on June 8, 1973, under Chapters 3.38 and 3.46, Revised Code of Washington; and

WHEREAS, in 2009 the City and the County agreed to terminate the City's municipal department and that the County would provide the services of its District Court System to the City pursuant to an Interlocal Agreement authorized by RCW 39.34.180 and executed in July and August of 2009 by the City and the County, respectively; and

WHEREAS, the District Court Districting Plan was amended on August 31, 2009, and is consistent with this Interlocal Agreement; and

WHEREAS, under the parties' 2019 agreement, the City currently pays its pro rata share of the Judges' salaries and benefits, the salaries and benefits of the District Court personnel, and all other costs of District Court, except for the costs of a Mental Health Court and Veteran's Court, based on the City's share of usage of District Court; and

WHEREAS, the 2019 agreement expires December 31, 2022, and the parties wish to set forth their agreement commencing January 1, 2023; NOW THEREFORE,

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT - Page 1

BE IT AGREED by and between the parties as follows:

(1) **District Court Services.** The County and its District Court shall furnish to the City the facilities and services of the Benton County District Court for all cases filed by the City in the District Court, over which District Court has jurisdiction, for purposes of enforcing violation of state statutes or city ordinances committed by persons within the City's jurisdiction that constitute gross misdemeanors, misdemeanors, or civil infractions. Nothing in this Agreement shall permit the City to regulate the administration of the court. District Court services shall include the use of the County's Mental Health and Veterans courts, if any, for City defendants that meet the participation requirements so long as the County imposes an additional sales tax of three-tenths of one percent authorized by RCW 82.14.450, commonly referred to as the Public Safety Tax.

(2) Compensation.

- (a) <u>Calculation of Percentage of Usage</u>. The parties have determined, and do hereby agree, that in return for the facility usage and services of District Court, the City shall pay to the County, the City's pro rata share of the total costs of and overhead of the District Court, including the salaries and benefits of the District Court Judges. This pro rata share shall be an amount equal to the ratio of the total number of violations filed by the City, whether infractions or criminal violations, to the total number of: (1) violations filed by all jurisdictions in the District Court, plus (2) felony complaints filed in District Court, plus (3) small claims cases filed, plus (4) civil cases filed, plus (5) petitions for anti-harassment orders. The payment of such pro rata share of costs by the City constitutes a fair reimbursement to the County for the facility usage and services of District Court, and the parties agree that no separate filing fee shall be required from the City for the cases it files in District Court under this Agreement.
- (b) <u>Costs to be Allocated by Percentage</u>. The total costs allocated by paragraph 2(a) above shall include, but are not limited to, the salaries and benefits of the District Court Judges, salaries and benefits of the District Court personnel and all other costs of and overhead for the District Court, excluding: (i) the costs of public defense for criminal defendants in District Court, which shall be reimbursed by the City pursuant to a separate agreement between the parties; and (ii) the costs of a Mental Health Court and a Veteran's Court established under chapter 2.30, RCW that are reflected in a budget separate from the County's General Fund Budget for expenses payable from the Public Safety Tax Budget.
- (c) <u>Time Period for Determining Percentage</u>. The ratio described above in paragraph 2(a) shall for each year be based on the figures for the twelve-month time period consisting of the preceding July through June, unless the Presiding District Court Judge notifies the County and the City that a different 12-month period will be used for such calculations.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT – Page 2

- (d) <u>Credit for Probation Assessments</u>. The County will give the City a credit each month in the billing set forth in paragraph (3) below equal to the amount of revenue received in the prior month in the form of probation assessment payments in criminal cases prosecuted by the City.
- (e) Administration Cost: In addition to the amounts owed under Sections 3(a) through 3(d) above, the City shall pay a monthly Administration Fee in the amount of five percent (5%) of the expenditures in the prior month from the Benton County General Fund, Fund 0010, District Court Department 111.
- (3) **Billings.** The County will invoice the City monthly for the City's pro rata share of the expenses incurred by District Court in the preceding month. All sums due to the County from the City shall be paid within thirty (30) days of mailing of such invoice, via regular mail or electronic mail.
- (4) **Distribution of Revenues to the City.** All money received by the District Court pursuant to court action in a case filed by the City, including penalties, fines, bail forfeitures, fees and costs, except as otherwise provided herein, shall be paid by District Court to the City; provided, that the County may retain all money received as payments of assessments for probation costs ordered in the City's cases. The City shall not be entitled to any revenue received by District Court other than revenues received pursuant to court action in a case filed by the City.
- (5) **City Obligations with Respect to Revenues.** The District Court shall provide the City a Remittance Summary prepared by the Washington State Administration of the Courts (AOC) for the appropriate time period at the same time it makes a payment to the City under paragraph (4) above. It shall be the City's obligation to pay from the revenues, including interest revenues, that it receives pursuant to paragraph (4) above, all amounts due and owing to the State of Washington and to deposit that portion of the revenues that it retains in accordance with law. The City agrees to hold the County harmless with respect to any claims or allegations that the City has not remitted the required amounts to the State of Washington.
- (6) **Term.** This Agreement shall be effective upon execution by the parties and recording with the Benton County Auditor and shall remain in effect through December 31, 2027, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the terms of this Agreement or extended by written amendment.
- (7) Termination and Notice of Termination. This Agreement is terminable by either party without cause if such party provides written notice of intent to terminate in accordance with RCW 3.50.810 and 35.20.010. Any such notice from the City must be received by the Chairperson of the Benton Board of County Commissioners by the statutorily required date, and any such notice from the County must be received by the Mayor of the City by the statutorily required date.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT - Page 3

- (8) **Ownership of Property.** All real and personal property used in the operation of District Court has been and shall continue to be acquired by the County, owned by the County and may be disposed of in the discretion of the County.
- (9) Waiver of Binding Arbitration. Provided that this Agreement is not earlier terminated pursuant to the terms stated above, this Agreement will expire on December 31, 2027, unless a written renewal Agreement is executed prior to such date. The City and the County waive and release any right to invoke binding arbitration under RCW 3.62.070, 35.20.010, 39.34.180 or other applicable law as related to this Agreement, any extension or amendment of this Agreement, or any discussions or negotiations relating thereto.
- (10) Advisory Committee. The appropriate costs and overhead of the District Court shall be determined by the County legislative authority. An advisory committee composed of the Chairperson of the Board of Benton County Commissioners or his or her designee, the Presiding Judge of the District Court, the District Court Administrator, and a designee from each city within the County that pursuant to agreement pays a pro rata share of the cost of District Court will meet prior to the adoption of each General Fund Budget by the County to review that portion of the General Fund Budget pertaining to District Court and may make a recommendation on such budget to the County legislative authority. Such committee may also make a recommendation to the Presiding Judge regarding any requested change in the twelve-month period used to allocate costs for the following year. Additionally, such committee shall meet in odd numbered years prior to September 15th of each such year to conduct a mid-budget review for the benefit of the City's annual budget preparation process.
- (11) **Indemnification Regarding City Ordinances.** The City agrees that the County does not assume any liability or responsibility for or release the City from any liability or responsibility which arises in whole or in part from the existence or effect of City ordinances, rules or regulations, policies or procedures. If any cause, claim, suit, action or administrative proceeding is commenced in which the enforceability and/or validity of any City ordinance, rule, regulation, policy or procedure is at issue, the City shall defend the same at its sole expense and if judgment is entered or damages are awarded against the City, the County, or both, the City shall satisfy the same, including all chargeable costs and attorney fees. This provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- (12) **General Indemnification.** The City and the County each agree to defend and indemnify the other and its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees and agents against all claims, losses, damages, suits, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, to the extent they arise out of, or result from, the negligence or willful misconduct of the indemnitor or its elected or appointed officials, officers, employees and agents in the performance of this Agreement. The indemnitor's duty to defend and indemnify extends to claims by the elected or appointed officials, officers, employees or agents of the indemnitor or of any contractor or subcontractor or indemnitor. The indemnitor waives its immunity under Title 51 of the Revised Code of Washington solely for the

purpose of this provision and acknowledges that this waiver was mutually negotiated. This provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

- (13) **Captions.** The paragraph and subsection captions used in this Agreement are for convenience only and shall not control or affect the meaning or construction of any provisions of this Agreement.
- (14) Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire Agreement and understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior oral or written understandings, agreements, promises or other undertakings between the parties, including but not limited to the interlocal agreement executed by the parties in 2015 for District Court Services.
- (15) Governing Law. This Agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws and court rules of the State of Washington in effect on the date of execution of this Agreement. In the event any party deems it necessary to institute legal action or proceedings to ensure any right or obligation under this Agreement, the parties agree that such action shall be brought in a court of competent jurisdiction situated in Benton County, Washington.
- (16) **No Third Party Rights.** Except as expressly provided herein, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to permit anyone other than the parties hereto to rely upon the covenants and agreements herein contained nor to give any such third party a cause of action (as a third party beneficiary or otherwise) on account of any nonperformance hereunder.

(17) **Amendment or Waiver.** This Agreement may not be modified or amended except by written instrument approved by resolution or ordinance duly adopted by the City and the

County. No course of dealing between the parties or any delay in exercising any rights hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any rights of any party.





This recognition of service credit will affect annual leave accrual as outlined in Article 12 of the collective bargaining agreement, as well as advancement through the career development program as outlined in Article 23 of the collective bargaining agreement. This recognition of service credit will not affect priority for shift assignments or time off bids. This provision

will not have retroactive effect, but will take effect immediately in the next full payroll period following execution of this agreement.

This recognition of service credit will affect annual leave accrual as outlined in Article 12 of the collective bargaining agreement. This recognition of service credit will not affect priority for shift assignments or time off bids. This provision will not have

AGREEMENT FOR NORTHWEST HIDTA PROGRAM ASSISTANT SERVICES

THIS Agreement for Northwest HIDTA ("HIDTA") program assistant services ("Agreement") is made by and between the CITY OF KENNEWICK, a political subdivision of the State of Washington, as a fiscal fiduciary for HIDTA (the "City"), and SEAN BLUMENKRANTZ, an individual (the "Contractor").

In consideration of the mutual benefits and covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. SCOPE OF SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY CONTRACTOR.

Contractor agrees to perform program assistant services for HIDTA. Program assistant services include, but are not limited to:

- 1.1 Overseeing installation and maintenance of commonly used electronic and/or telecommunication equipment, by contracted vendors, and ensuring work performed and products provided meet requirements;
- 1.2 Ensuring compliance with all relevant policies and guidance concerning equipment and technology procurement and inventory thereof;
- 1.3 Conducting audits, inspections, preventive maintenance, and repairs to ensure optimum performance of electronics, systems, and equipment;
- 1.4 Developing, installing, and maintaining the HIDTA computer network, related systems, and the daily on-site operation thereof;
- 1.5 Supporting other hardware and software used internally and externally;
- 1.6 Offering expert guidance and support to HIDTA staff and affiliates regarding the procurement, use, maintenance, and control of the highly specialized hardware and software; and
- 1.7 Performing other duties as directed by competent authority.

2. TIME OF PERFORMANCE.

This Agreement shall govern services rendered beginning January 1, 2023, and ending December 31, 2023, unless this Agreement is terminated earlier as provided in Section 11.

3. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

Contractor is and shall at all times be an independent contractor and is not to be considered an agent, employee, or servant of the City. The parties agree that the Contractor is not entitled to any benefits or rights enjoyed by employees of the City. The Contractor specifically has the right to direct and control Contractor's own activities in providing the agreed services in accordance with the specifications set out in this Agreement. The City's only responsibility under this Agreement is to administer the Grant Agreement between ONDCP and the City ("Grant/Award") by supplying ONDCP the proper documentation regarding any payments due to the Contractor, and disbursing such funds to the Contractor. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to render the parties partners or joint ventures.

The Contractor will report to the HIDTA executive director ("executive director"), or designee, and will serve at the will of HIDTA. The Contractor will be required to comply with all requirements for employment established by HIDTA. This Agreement is subject to the review and approval of the executive director.

4. CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT.

Employment is contingent on the qualification for and maintenance of a National Security Clearance at the appropriate level, with the minimum level required being secret.

5. COMPENSATION.

This Agreement, particularly the payment by the City to the Contractor of a salary and travel reimbursement, is contingent on funding by a Grant/Award and made available through ONDCP. Provided sufficient funding is available, the City will pay the Contractor a total salary of \$81,743.34 for the services provided under this Agreement. Payment will be made in twenty-four (24) substantially equal, semimonthly installments. In addition to this salary, and provided sufficient funding is available, the City will reimburse the Contractor for necessary travel expenses incurred during the performance of the Agreement.

6. **OWNERSHIP**.

All reports, plans, specifications, all forms of electronic media, and data and documents produced in the performance of this work shall remain the property of HIDTA. The City reserves the right to access any records pertaining to the City of Kennewick.

7. CHANGES.

No changes or additions shall be made in this Agreement except as agreed to by all parties and reduced to writing and executed with the same formalities as are required for the execution of this Agreement.

8. **REVIEW AND APPROVAL.**

Upon submittal of any report or other information required by the scope of services to be performed, the executive director, or designee, upon review may accept such work or reject it, or request such modification or additions as it deems appropriate.

9. HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNIFICATION.

The Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers harmless from any and all claims, injuries, damages, losses, or suits, including attorney fees, arising out of or in connection with the performance of this Agreement, except for injuries and damages caused by the sole negligence of the City.

It is further specifically and expressly understood that the indemnification provided herein constitutes the Contractor's waiver of immunity under Industrial Insurance, Title 51 RCW, solely for the purposes of this indemnification. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties. The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

The Contractor's obligation shall include, but not be limited to, investigating, adjusting, and defending all claims alleging loss from action, error, or omission or breach of any common law, statutory, or other delegated duty by the Contractor, Contractor's employees, agents, or subcontractors.

10. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS.

The Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws in performing this Agreement, including laws governing discrimination.

11. TERMINATION.

11.1 Each party understands that funding is currently available to support this Agreement through December 31, 2023, but that funding is contingent upon legislative appropriation. Should loss of funding occur during the period covered by this Agreement, the City or HIDTA may terminate this Agreement with thirty (30) days advance notice. In that instance, the City will pay the Contractor for services performed up to and including one-half (1/2) of the month in which the termination is effective, assuming funding is available.

- 11.2 HIDTA may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the Contractor for any other reason or no reason. In that event, the City shall pay the Contractor only for services provided. A final, pro-rata payment shall be made in accordance with Section 5 of this Agreement.
- 11.3 Termination shall not affect the rights of HIDTA, the City, or the Contractor under any other paragraph herein.

12. NON-ASSIGNMENT.

The Contractor shall not sublet or assign any of the rights, duties, or obligations covered by this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the City.

13. CONFLICTS BETWEEN ATTACHMENTS AND TEXT.

Should any conflicts exist between any attached exhibit or schedule and the text of this Agreement, the text shall prevail.

14. GOVERNING LAW AND STIPULATION OF VENUE.

The laws of the state of Washington shall govern this Agreement and any lawsuit regarding this Agreement must be brought in Benton County, Washington.

15. SEVERABILITY.

Should any clause, phrase, sentence, or paragraph of this Agreement be declared invalid or void, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

16. INTEGRATION.

This Agreement is intended to replace all previous Agreements between the parties with respect to the terms of this Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to work to be performed by the Contractor for the City, and there are no representations, warranties, or commitments, except as set forth in this Agreement.

17. NON-DISCRIMINATION.

The Contractor shall not discriminate against any person or persons because of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, or any other protected class status in the conduct of its operation hereunder and shall comply with all federal and state laws relating to discrimination.

Conversely, HIDTA shall not discriminate against the Contractor because of race, color, sex, national origin, or any other protected class status, and shall comply with all federal and state laws relating to discrimination.

18. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to work to be performed by the Contractor for the City, and there are no representations, warranties, or commitments, except as set forth in this Agreement.

19. CERTIFICATION REGARDING DEBARMENT, SUSPENSION, INELIGIBILITY.

If federal funds are the basis for this contract, the Contractor certifies that neither the Contractor nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participating in this contract by any federal department or agency. If requested by the City, the Contractor shall complete and sign a Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility, and Voluntary Exclusion form. Any such form completed by the Contractor for this Agreement shall be incorporated into this Contract by reference.

AGREEMENT FOR NORTHWEST HIDTA FINANCIAL MANAGER SERVICES

THIS Agreement for Northwest HIDTA ("HIDTA") financial manager services ("Agreement") is made by and between the CITY OF KENNEWICK, a political subdivision of the State of Washington, as a fiscal fiduciary for HIDTA (the "City"), and JULIE CHRISTINE, an individual (the "Contractor").

In consideration of the mutual benefits and covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. SCOPE OF SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY CONTRACTOR.

Contractor agrees to perform financial manager services for HIDTA. Financial manager services include, but are not limited to:

- 1.1 Establishing and/or revising and maintaining operating policies and procedures for management of funds;
- 1.2 Preparing annual budget estimates and coordinating budget submissions to HIDTA's executive director ("director"), executive board, and the Office of National Drug Control Policy ("ONDCP");
- 1.3 Disseminating guidelines and instruction material for preparation of budget submission and program objectives;

Motion for Consideration

I move to authorize the City Manager to sign the supplemental Agreement No. 1 with JUB Engineers, Inc., for the engineering design for the WWTP Non-Potable Water System (P2113).

<u>Summary</u>

An alternative to constructing a potable water air-gap for onsite utility water uses, a preferred approach is to utilize reclaimed effluent water already produced at the "tail end" of the WWTPs processes. While evaluating the current onsite potable water usage history it was noted that, the WWTP is the highest potable water user within the City. By converting the onsite utility water usage over from potable to WWTP reclaimed effluent it will save potable water, energy, and will free up existing potable water treatment capacity that can be utilized in the future for growth.

The original agreement signed on September 9, 2021, authorized JUB Engineers, Inc., to perform a detailed design, bidding support, and construction phase services.

Supplemental Agreement No. 1 provides additional time to complete the detailed design, bidding support, and construction phase services described in the original Scope of Services. Supplemental Agreement No. 1 also provides an expanded Scope that includes design and construction services for connecting backup power to the WWTP's Administration Building.

Provisions

I. Scope of Work

The Agency shall provide all the work, labor, materials, and services necessary to perform the project which is described and set forth in detail in the "Project Description" and "Type of Work."

When the State acts for and on behalf of the Agency, the State shall be deemed an agent of the Agency and shall perform the services described and indicated in "Type of Work" on the face of this agreement, in accordance with plans and specifications as proposed by the Agency and approved by the State and the Federal Highway Administration.

When the State acts for the Agency but is not subject to the right of control by the Agency, the State shall have the right to perform the work subject to the ordinary procedures of the State and Federal Highway Administration.

II. Delegation of Authority

The State is willing to fulfill the responsibilities to the Federal Government by the administration of this project. The Agency agrees that the State shall have the full authority to carry out this administration. The State shall review, process, and approve documents required for federal aid reimbursement in accordance with federal requirements. If the State advertises and awards the contract, the State will further act for the Agency in all matters concerning the project as requested by the Agency. If the Local Agency advertises and awards the project, the State shall review the work to ensure conformity with the approved plans and specifications.

III. Project Administration

Certain types of work and services shall be provided by the State on this project as requested by the Agency and described in the Type of Work above. In addition, the State will furnish qualified personnel for the supervision and inspection of the work in progress. On Local Agency advertised and awarded projects, the supervision and inspection shall be limited to ensuring all work is in conformance with approved plans, specifications, and federal aid requirements. The salary of such engineer or other supervisor and all other salaries and costs incurred by State forces upon the project will be considered a cost thereof. All costs related to this project incurred by employees of the State in the customary manner on highway payrolls and vouchers shall be charged as costs of the project.

IV. Availability of Records

All project records in support of all costs incurred and actual expenditures kept by the Agency are to be maintained in accordance with local government accounting procedures prescribed by the Washington State Auditor's Office, the U.S. Department of Transportation, and the Washington State Department of Transportation. The records shall be open to inspection by the State and Federal Government at all reasonable times and shall be retained and made available for such inspection for a period of not less than three years from the final payment of any federal aid funds to the Agency. Copies of said records shall be furnished to the State and/or Federal Government upon request.

V. Compliance with Provisions

The Agency shall not incur any federal aid participation costs on any classification of work on this project until authorized in writing by the State for each classification. The classifications of work for projects are:

- 1. Preliminary engineering.
- 2. Right of way acquisition.
- 3. Project construction.

Once written authorization is given, the Agency agrees to show continuous progress through monthly billings. Failure to show continuous progress may result the Agency's project becoming inactive, as described in 23 CFR 630, and subject to de-obligation of federal aid funds and/or agreement closure.

If right of way acquisition, or actual construction of the road for which preliminary engineering is undertaken is not started by the close of the tenth fiscal year following the fiscal year in which preliminary engineering phase was authorized, the Agency will repay to the State the sum or sums of federal funds paid to the Agency under the terms of this agreement (see Section IX).

If actual construction of the road for which right of way has been purchased is not started by the close of the tenth fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the right of way phase was authorized, the Agency will repay to the State the sum or sums of federal funds paid to the Agency under the terms of this agreement (see Section IX).

The Agency agrees that all stages of construction necessary to provide the initially planned complete facility within the limits of this project will conform to at least the minimum values set by approved statewide design standards applicable to this class of highways, even though such additional work is financed without federal aid participation.

The Agency agrees that on federal aid highway construction projects, the current federal aid regulations which apply to liquidated damages relative to the basis of federal participation in the project cost shall be applicable in the event the contractor fails to complete the contract within the contract time.

VI. Payment and Partial Reimbursement

The total cost of the project, including all review and engineering costs and other expenses of the State, is to be paid by the Agency and by the Federal Government. Federal funding shall be in accordance with the Federal Transportation Act, as amended, 2 CFR Part 200. The State shall not be ultimately responsible for any of the costs of the project. The Agency shall be ultimately responsible for all costs associated with the project which are not reimbursed by the Federal Government. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed as a promise by the State as to the amount or nature of federal participation in this project.

The Agency shall bill the state for federal aid project costs incurred in conformity with applicable federal and state laws. The agency shall minimize the time elapsed between receipt of federal aid funds and subsequent payment of incurred costs. Expenditures by the Local Agency for maintenance, general administration, supervision, and other overhead shall not be eligible for federal participation unless a current indirect cost plan has been prepared in accordance with the regulations outlined in 2 CFR Part 200 - Uniform Admin Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, and retained for audit.

The State will pay for State incurred costs on the project. Following payment, the State shall bill the Federal Government for reimbursement of those costs eligible for federal participation to the extent that such costs are attributable and properly allocable to this project. The State shall bill the Agency for that portion of State costs which were not reimbursed by the Federal Government (see Section IX).

1. Project Construction Costs

Project construction financing will be accomplished by one of the three methods as indicated in this agreement.

Method A – The Agency will place with the State, within (20) days after the execution of the construction contract, an advance in the amount of the Agency's share of the total construction cost based on the contract award. The State will notify the Agency of the exact amount to be deposited with the State. The State will pay all costs incurred under the contract upon presentation of progress billings from the contractor. Following such payments, the State will submit a billing to the Federal Government for the federal aid participation share of the cost. When the project is substantially completed and final actual costs of the project can be determined, the State will present the Agency with a final billing showing the amount due the State or the amount due the Agency. This billing will be cleared by either a payment from the Agency to the State or by a refund from the State to the Agency.

Method B – The Agency's share of the total construction cost as shown on the face of this agreement shall be withheld from its monthly fuel tax allotments. The face of this agreement establishes the months in which the withholding shall take place and the exact amount to be withheld each month. The extent of withholding will be confirmed by letter from the State at the time of contract award. Upon receipt of progress billings from the contractor, the State will submit such billings to the Federal Government for payment of its participating portion of such billings.

Method C – The Agency may submit vouchers to the State in the format prescribed by the State, in duplicate, not more than once per month for those costs eligible for Federal participation to the extent that such costs are directly attributable and properly allocable to this project. Expenditures by the Local Agency for maintenance, general administration, supervision, and other overhead shall not be eligible for Federal participation unless claimed under a previously approved indirect cost plan.

The State shall reimburse the Agency for the Federal share of eligible project costs up to the amount shown on the face of this agreement. At the time of audit, the Agency will provide documentation of all costs incurred on the project. The State shall bill the Agency for all costs incurred by the State relative to the project. The State shall also bill the Agency for the federal funds paid by the State to the Agency for project costs which are subsequently determined to be ineligible for federal participation (see Section IX).

VII. Audit of Federal Consultant Contracts

The Agency, if services of a consultant are required, shall be responsible for audit of the consultant's records to determine eligible federal aid costs on the project. The report of said audit shall be in the Agency's files and made available to the State and the Federal Government.

An audit shall be conducted by the WSDOT Internal Audit Office in accordance with generally accepted governmental auditing standards as issued by the United States General Accounting Office by the Comptroller General of the United States; WSDOT Manual M 27-50, Consultant Authorization, Selection, and Agreement Administration; memoranda of understanding between WSDOT and FHWA; and 2 CFR Part 200.501 - Audit Requirements.

If upon audit it is found that overpayment or participation of federal money in ineligible items of cost has occurred, the Agency shall reimburse the State for the amount of such overpayment or excess participation (see Section IX).

VIII. Single Audit Act

The Agency, as a subrecipient of federal funds, shall adhere to the federal regulations outlined in 2 CFR Part 200.501 as well as all applicable federal and state statutes and regulations. A subrecipient who expends \$750,000 or more in federal awards from all sources during a given fiscal year shall have a single or program-specific audit performed for that year in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200.501. Upon conclusion of the audit, the Agency shall be responsible for ensuring that a copy of the report is transmitted

promptly to the State.

IX. Payment of Billing

The Agency agrees that if payment or arrangement for payment of any of the State's billing relative to the project (e.g., State force work, project cancellation, overpayment, cost ineligible for federal participation, etc.) is not made to the State within 45 days after the Agency has been billed, the State shall effect reimbursement of the total sum due from the regular monthly fuel tax allotments to the Agency from the Motor Vehicle Fund. No additional Federal project funding will be approved until full payment is received unless otherwise directed by the Director, Local Programs.

Project Agreement End Date - This date is based on your projects Period of Performance (2 CFR Part 200.309).

Any costs incurred after the Project Agreement End Date are NOT eligible for federal reimbursement. All eligible costs incurred prior to the Project Agreement End Date must be submitted for reimbursement within 60 days after the Project Agreement End Date or they become ineligible for federal reimbursement.

X. Traffic Control, Signing, Marking, and Roadway Maintenance

The Agency will not permit any changes to be made in the provisions for parking regulations and traffic control on this project without prior approval of the State and Federal Highway Administration. The Agency will not install or permit to be installed any signs, signals, or markings not in conformance with the standards approved by the Federal Highway Administration and MUTCD. The Agency will, at its own expense, maintain the improvement covered by this agreement.

XI. Indemnity

The Agency shall hold the Federal Government and the State harmless from and shall process and defend at its own expense all claims, demands, or suits, whether at law or equity brought against the Agency, State, or Federal Government, arising from the Agency's execution, performance, or failure to perform any of the provisions of this agreement, or of any other agreement or contract connected with this agreement, or arising by reason of the participation of the State or Federal Government in the project, PROVIDED, nothing herein shall require the Agency to reimburse the State or the Federal Government for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damage to property caused by or resulting from the sole negligence of the Federal Government or the State.

XII. Nondiscrimination Provision

No liability shall attach to the State or Federal Government except as expressly provided herein.

The Agency shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the award and performance of any USDOTassisted contract and/or agreement or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR Part 26. The Agency shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR Part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of USDOT-assisted contracts and agreements. The WSDOT's DBE program, as required by 49 CFR Part 26 and as approved by USDOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as a violation of this agreement. Upon notification to the Agency of its failure to carry out its approved program, the Department may impose sanctions as provided for under Part 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31 U.S. C. 3801 et seq.).

The Agency hereby agrees that it will incorporate or cause to be incorporated into any contract for construction work, or modification thereof, as defined in the rules and regulations of the Secretary of Labor in 41 CFR Chapter 60, which is paid for in whole or in part with funds obtained from the Federal Government or borrowed on the credit of the Federal Government pursuant to a grant, contract, loan, insurance, or guarantee or understanding pursuant to any federal program involving such grant, contract, loan, insurance, or guarantee, the required contract provisions for Federal-Aid Contracts (FHWA 1273), located in Chapter 44 of the Local Agency Guidelines.

The Agency further agrees that it will be bound by the above equal opportunity clause with respect to its own employment practices when it participates in federally assisted construction work: Provided, that if the applicant so participating is a State or Local Government, the above equal opportunity clause is not applicable to any agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of such government which does not participate in work on or under the contract.

The Agency also agrees:

(1) To assist and cooperate actively with the State in obtaining the compliance of contractors and subcontractors with the equal opportunity clause and rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

(2) To furnish the State such information as it may require for the supervision of such compliance and that it will otherwise assist the State in the discharge of its primary responsibility for securing compliance.

(3) To refrain from entering into any contract or contract modification subject to Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, with a contractor debarred from, or who has not demonstrated eligibility for, government contracts and federally assisted construction contracts pursuant to the Executive Order.

(4) To carry out such sanctions and penalties for violation of the equal opportunity clause as may be imposed upon contractors and subcontractors by the State, Federal Highway Administration, or the Secretary of Labor pursuant to Part II, subpart D of the Executive Order.

In addition, the Agency agrees that if it fails or refuses to comply with these undertakings, the State may take any or all of the following actions:

(a) Cancel, terminate, or suspend this agreement in whole or in part;

(b) Refrain from extending any further assistance to the Agency under the program with respect to which the failure or refusal occurred until satisfactory assurance of future compliance has been received from the Agency; and

(c) Refer the case to the Department of Justice for appropriate legal proceedings.

XIII. Liquidated Damages

The Agency hereby agrees that the liquidated damages provisions of 23 CFR Part 635, Subpart 127, as supplemented, relative to the amount of Federal participation in the project cost, shall be applicable in the event the contractor fails to complete the contract within the contract time. Failure to include liquidated damages provision will not relieve the Agency from reduction of federal participation in accordance with this paragraph.

XIV. Termination for Public Convenience

The Secretary of the Washington State Department of Transportation may terminate the contract in whole, or from time to time in part, whenever:

(1) The requisite federal funding becomes unavailable through failure of appropriation or otherwise.

(2) The contractor is prevented from proceeding with the work as a direct result of an Executive Order of the President with respect to the prosecution of war or in the interest of national defense, or an Executive Order of the President or Governor of the State with respect to the preservation of energy resources.

(3) The contractor is prevented from proceeding with the work by reason of a preliminary, special, or permanent restraining order of a court of competent jurisdiction where the issuance of such order is primarily caused by the acts or omissions of persons or agencies other than the contractor.

(4) The Secretary is notified by the Federal Highway Administration that the project is inactive.

(5) The Secretary determines that such termination is in the best interests of the State.

XV. Venue for Claims and/or Causes of Action

For the convenience of the parties to this contract, it is agreed that any claims and/or causes of action which the Local Agency has against the State of Washington, growing out of this contract or the project with which it is concerned, shall be brought only in the Superior Court for Thurston County.

XVI. Certification Regarding the Restrictions of the Use of Federal Funds for Lobbying

The approving authority certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, that:

(1) No federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any federal contract, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.

(2) If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with this federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit the Standard Form - LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.

(3) The undersigned shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at

all tiers (including subgrants, and contracts and subcontracts under grants, subgrants, loans, and cooperative agreements) which exceed \$100,000, and that all such subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification as a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

XVII. Assurances

Local agencies receiving Federal funding from the USDOT or its operating administrations (i.e., Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration) are required to submit a written policy statement, signed by the Agency Executive and addressed to the State, documenting that all programs, activities, and services will be conducted in compliance with Section 504 and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).



PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT

This Purchase and Sale Agreement (hereinafter "Agreement") is entered into on this _____ day of _____, 2022, between the CITY OF KENNEWICK, a municipal corporation (hereinafter "Seller" or "City") and BENTON COUNTY, a political subdivision of the State of Washington (hereinafter "Purchaser") for establishing the terms and conditions for the sale of real property (hereinafter "Property").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Seller is the owner of real property located in Benton County, Washington, which real property is described more particularly below; and

WHEREAS, Seller wishes to sell such real property and Purchaser wishes to purchase such property under certain terms and conditions as set forth below.

AGREEMENT

The parties covenant and agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Purchase and Sale</u>. Subject to the terms of this Agreement, Seller agrees to sell, and Purchaser agrees to purchase:
 - (a) That certain parcel of real property commonly known as the Fire Station 3 property located at 7400 West Quinault Avenue, Kennewick, Washington, which is legally described as follows:

Parcel # 1-3299-200-0001-001.

THAT PORTION OF THE NORTHWEST QUARTER OF SECTION 32, TOWNSHIP 9 NORTH, RANGE 29 EAST, W.M., BENTON COUNTY, WASHINGTON, LYING EASTERLY OF NORTH BELFAIR STREET RIGHT OF WAY AND ALSO LYING EASTERLY AND NORTHEASTERLY OF WEST QUINAULT AVENUE RIGHT OF WAY AND ALSO LYING SOUTHWESTERLY AND NORTHWESTERLY OF THE FOLLOWING DESCRIBED LINE:

COMMENCING AT THE NORTHWEST CORNER OF SAID SECTION 32; THENCE SOUTH 00°31'00" WEST ALONG THE WEST LINE THEREOF 792.40 FEET; THENCE SOUTH 89°10'00" EAST 660.00 FEET; THENCE SOUTH 89°10'00" WEST 338.76 FEET; THENCE SOUTH 00°31'00" WEST 338.76 FEET; THENCE SOUTH 44°48'56" EAST 68.18 FEET TO THE EASTERLY RIGHT OF WAY OF NORTH BELFAIR STREET RIGHT OF WAY AND THE BEGINNING OF SAID LINE; THENCE LEAVING SAID RIGHT OF WAY SOUTH 44°48'56" EAST 484.13 FEET; THENCE SOUTH 45°11'04" WEST 400.00 FEET TO THE EASTERLY RIGHT OF WAY LINE OF SAID WEST QUINAULT AVENUE AND THE TERMINUS OF SAID LINE.

Containing: 3.0 acres (130680.00 square feet) more or less, a structure and to the extent there is any remaining personal property, all personal property within the structure.

The above is hereinafter referenced as the "Property".

- 2. <u>Purchase Price/Financing</u>. The purchase price for the Property is One Million one hundred twenty nine thousand three hundred and thirty dollars (\$1,129,330.00). At closing as described in section 11 below, the purchase price is payable in cash by Purchaser to the escrow agent, subject to such adjustments and prorations as set forth in this Agreement.
- 3. <u>Payment of Deposit</u>. Within ten (10) business days following the last party's execution of this Agreement and delivery of a fully executed original thereof to the other party, Purchaser will deposit with the escrow agent set forth below, Five Thousand and 00/100ths Dollars (\$5,000.00), which shall constitute a deposit and be held in an interest bearing trust account. This deposit ("Deposit") shall be applied to the purchase price.
 - (a) Purchaser agrees that the Deposit/earnest money shall be paid to Seller if the Purchaser does not terminate this Agreement in accordance with its terms, and the Purchaser fails to subsequently close the sale.
 - (b) If Purchaser appropriately terminates this Agreement under the terms hereof, the Deposit/earnest money shall be returned to Purchaser.
- 4. <u>Escrow and Escrow Agent</u>. Seller and Purchaser hereby agree that the following title insurance company will act as the Escrow Agent:

- 5. <u>Inspection Period:</u>
 - (a) Between the effective date of this Agreement and closing, or the earlier termination of this Agreement, Purchaser and its authorized agents, contractors, and consultants, shall have the right to go upon the Property at reasonable times for the purpose of inspecting each and every part thereof to determine its present condition and, at Purchaser's sole cost and expense, to prepare such reports, tests, and studies as Purchaser deems appropriate, including, but not limited to, surveys, soil tests, engineering studies and environmental tests. Before conducting any

invasive or intrusive testing such as borings or test holes, Purchaser shall give Seller at least forty-eight (48) hours prior written notice, and shall coordinate the date and time of such testing to enable Seller's representatives and/or consultants to be present to take duplicate samples and record the methods used by the Purchaser's consultants. The Purchaser's inspection period shall not exceed 90 (ninety) days from the effective date of the Agreement unless otherwise agreed to by both parties in writing.

- (b) Purchaser agrees to repair any damage to the Property resulting from any activities of Purchaser or its agents or consultants on the Property before closing. Purchaser agrees to defend, indemnify and hold the Seller harmless from any and all damages, expenses, claims, or liabilities (including, but not limited to, attorney's fees and costs) arising out of any activities of Purchaser or its agents or consultants on or about the Property before closing, except to the extent that the same results from the Seller's negligence. Purchaser shall not be liable for any inspection claim resulting from Purchaser's discovery of any pre-existing condition (including, but not limited to, the existence of any hazardous materials) in, on, under or about the Property or any exacerbation of a pre-existing condition in, on, under or about the Property, except to the extent that the exacerbation results from the negligent act or omission of Purchaser or its agents or consultants.
- 6. <u>Title</u>. Title shall be acceptable to Purchaser following a review of the Preliminary Commitment as contemplated at paragraph 7 below. All title insurance charges for the policy referenced in paragraph 7 below in the amount of the purchase price shall be paid by Seller, except for the cost of any special endorsements requested by Purchaser and cancellation fees shall be paid by Purchaser.
- 7. Preliminary Commitment. Within thirty (30) days from the last party's execution of this Agreement, Seller shall furnish Purchaser with a preliminary report/commitment from Chicago Title for a Standard form Buyer's policy of title insurance with respect to the Real Property, together with a copy of each document forming the basis for each exception referenced therein. Purchaser shall have the right to object to any exception to title set forth in the preliminary report within thirty (30) days of its receipt from Seller of said preliminary report/commitment. Purchaser shall advise Seller of any title objections after its receipt of the report/commitment or its receipt of any supplemental information thereto reflecting the Escrow Agent's receipt and review of the survey necessary to remove all survey exceptions or conditions in the title commitment. If within fifteen (15) days after its notice to Seller, Purchaser has not received evidence satisfactory to it that such unsatisfactory items can and will be removed at or prior to closing at Seller's sole cost and expense, then Purchaser may elect to (a) terminate this Agreement and receive a full refund of the deposit, (b) waive such defects, or (c) continue this Agreement in effect pending their removal. Removal of unsatisfactory items or their waiver shall be a condition of closing. If Purchaser does not make an election within thirty (30) days of its notice to Seller, Purchaser shall be deemed to have waived the defects. Purchaser's right to terminate this Agreement because of title objections is exercisable in Purchaser's sole discretion.

8. <u>Due Diligence; Inspection Period</u>.

- (a) Within thirty (30) days following the last party's execution of this Agreement, Seller shall provide Purchaser with the title commitment described in paragraph 7 above, together with all relevant documents relating to the Property, including, but not limited to, copies of all easement, parking, service, maintenance or management agreements with respect to all or portions of the Property; and all existing surveys, soil studies, engineering studies, environmental studies and other reports and studies relating to the Property or its use or development in the possession of Seller.
- Purchaser shall have 90 days from the date the last party executes this Agreement (b) (the "Inspection Period") within which to conduct an examination of the Property, including examinations of title, lease reviews, engineering tests, soils tests, water percolation tests, ground water tests, environmental examinations, market studies, appraisals, and any other tests or inspections which Purchaser shall have deemed necessary or desirable for the purpose of determining whether the Property is suitable for uses permitted under applicable zoning laws ("Due Diligence Materials"). Purchaser's decision regarding suitability may be made in Purchaser's sole discretion. On or before the expiration of the Inspection Period, the Purchaser shall notify Seller in writing, with a copy to Escrow Agent, whether Purchaser intends to purchase the Property or terminate this Agreement. If Purchaser elects to purchase the Property, then the Inspection Period shall terminate and Purchaser's obligation to purchase and Seller's obligation to sell the Property shall remain, subject to the other terms and conditions of this Agreement. If Purchaser elects not to purchase the Property, then this Agreement shall be void and of no further force and effect, and the deposit shall be returned to Purchaser. In the event Purchaser fails to notify Seller in writing of its election to purchase the Property or terminate this Agreement prior to the expiration of the Inspection Period, then Purchaser shall be deemed to have elected to terminate this Agreement.
- 9. <u>Pro-rations</u>. Real Property taxes, if any, and any applicable annual assessments shall be prorated as of closing. All expenses, fees and sums owing or incurred for the Property for periods prior to closing shall be paid by Seller, when and as due.
- 10. <u>Possession</u>. Purchaser shall be entitled to sole possession of the Property at closing.
- 11. <u>Closing</u>. Unless Purchaser has elected to terminate the Agreement as set forth herein, the sale shall be closed in escrow with the Escrow Agent within thirty (30) days following Purchaser's removal of contingencies and notice to the Seller of its intent to purchase the property in accordance with section 8(b) above.
 - (a) At closing, Seller will deposit in escrow a duly executed statutory warranty deed conveying the Property to Purchaser free and clear of all defects and encumbrances and subject only to those exceptions that Purchaser approves; a

FIRPTA affidavit; a settlement statement prepared by Escrow Agent and signed by Seller; a duly executed real estate excise tax affidavit; a certificate reaffirming as of the closing date that all of Sellers representations and warranties under this Agreement are true and correct; such other agreements, if any, as may be necessary to resolve problems related to any contingencies; keys to the Property; and all other documents and monies required of it to close this transaction in accordance with the terms hereof. All such documents shall be in form satisfactory to Purchaser's counsel.

- (b) At closing, Purchaser will deposit in escrow the purchase price and any other monies required of it to close the transaction in accordance with the terms hereof; a duly executed and completed real estate excise tax affidavit; any additional documents as may be reasonably required by Escrow Agent to consummate the closing, including a signed settlement statement.
- 12. <u>Closing Costs</u>. Seller shall pay excise, transfer, sales and other taxes incurred in connection with the sale, the title insurance premium for the standard form Buyers policy of title insurance, and one-half of the escrow fees. Purchaser shall pay the inspection fee, recording fees on the deed, and one-half the escrow fee (excluding cancellation charges). Purchaser will pay the fees of experts retained by it. Each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees, except as otherwise expressly provided herein.
- 13. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be signed in counterparts which, taken together, shall constitute the complete Agreement.
- 14. <u>Actions During Term</u>.  - (d) Low-impact development
- Not required to use compost products if:
 - (i) not available within a reasonable period of time
 - (ii) does not comply with existing purchasing standards
 - (iii) does not comply with federal or state health, quality, and safety standards
 - (iv) prices are not reasonable or competitive



RCW 43.19A Other Requirements

- Priority to purchasing from companies that produce compost products locally and which meet state or national standards.
- Must develop education and outreach strategies through jurisdiction's comprehensive solid waste management plan pursuant to RCW <u>70A.205.045</u>.
- Must begin reporting by December 31, 2024.
- Staff Recommend adoption of Ordinance 5999

CITY OF KENNEWICK ORDINANCE NO. 5999

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO PUBLIC WORKS CONSTRUCTION STANDARDS AND ADDING A NEW DEFINITION 5.56.030 (9) AND A NEW SECTION 5.56.216 COMPOST PROCUREMENT AND EDUCATION TO THE KENNEWICK MUNICIPAL CODE

WHEREAS, in March 2022, ESSHB 1799 was signed into Washington law. The primary goal of the law is to increase the diversion of organic materials going to landfills in order to reduce methane emissions—landfills are a significant source of methane emissions; and

WHEREAS, as more organic materials are diverted and recycled, it is critical the compost manufactured be procured by local jurisdictions and others to support the economic viability of these processes and programs. It is well established compost production and use provide significant environmental benefits to our soil and food. ESSHB 1799 encourages most cities and counties in Washington adopt a compost procurement ordinance by January 1, 2023.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. There is hereby added a new subsection 5.56.030 (9) to the Kennewick Municipal Code, to read as follows:

5.56.030: - Definitions.

(9) Finished Compost Product means a product created with "composted material" as defined in RCW 70A.205.015(3). Finished Compost Products include, but are not limited to, 100% finished compost or blends that include compost as a primary ingredient. Mulch is considered a Finished Compost Product if it contains a minimum of sixty percent composted material. Bark is not a Finished Compost Product.

(Ord. 5999 Sec. 1, 2022; Ord. 5655 Sec. 1, 2016; Ord. 5203 Sec. 2, 2007; Ord. 2788 Sec. 1(part), 1983; Ord. 1295 Ch. III, Sec. 1, 1965)

<u>Section 2</u>. There is hereby added a new section 5.56.216 to the Kennewick Municipal Code, to read as follows:

5.56.216: - Composting Procurement and Education.

(1) The City shall consider the purchase of finished compost products for use in public projects in which compost is an appropriate material in City projects or on City land, provided it is not cost prohibitive to acquire. Cost prohibitive is defined as a product purchasing cost that exceeds ten percent (10%) of the cost of another product that would serve the same purpose. Procurement costs will include the product cost and all associated transportation and delivery charges.

ORDINANCE 5999 - Page

- (a) The City is not required to use compost products if:
 - (i) Compost products are not available within a reasonable period of time;
 - (ii) Compost products that are available do not comply with existing purchasing standards; (iii) Available compost products do not comply with federal or state health, quality, or safety standards; and
 - (iv) Compost purchase prices are not reasonable or competitive.
- (b) Before the transportation or application of compost products under this section, the City must ensure compliance with department of agriculture pest control regulations provided in chapter 16-470 WAC.

Pursuant to RCW 43.19A.130, The City will strive to purchase an amount of finished compost products equal to or greater than fifty percent (50%) of the amount of organic materials delivered to the compost processor from sources within the City.

- (2) Pursuant to RCW 43.19A.150, the City shall purchase finished compost products from companies producing compost locally, are certified by a nationally recognized organization, such as the US Composting Council, and produce finished compost products derived from municipal solid waste compost programs while meeting quality standards adopted by the Department of Transportation or adopted by rule by the Department of Ecology. If locally produced compost is not available, compost shall be sourced from outside the region, with preference given to products sourced as close as possible to the City. The City defines "local" as compost providers located within a 50-mile radius of the City limits. Proof that locally produced compost was not available at the time of purchase or was cost-prohibitive shall be documented.
- (3) In order to meet the general policy, the City shall plan for compost use in the following categories:
 - (a) Landscaping projects;
 - (b) Construction and post-construction soil amendments;
 - (c) Applications to prevent erosion, filter stormwater runoff, promote vegetative growth, or improve the stability and longevity of roadways; and
 - (d) Low-impact development of green infrastructure to filter pollutants or to keep water onsite, or both.

This plan will be re-assessed each December 31st of even-numbered years, beginning in 2024 and thereafter as part of the reporting obligations in Section 5.

(4) The City shall conduct educational outreach to inform residents about the value of compost and how the jurisdiction uses compost in its operations each year.

- By December 31, 2024, and each December 31st of even-numbered years thereafter, the City shall report the following information to the Department of Ecology:
 - (a) Total tons of organic material diverted (from landfills) each year;
 - (b) The volume and cost of composted material purchased each year; and
 - (c) The source(s) of the finished compost product purchased.
- (6) Pursuant to RCW 43.19A.160 the City shall use compost products to the maximum extent economically feasible to meet the requirements established in RCW 43.19A.120.
- (7) If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or other portion of this Ordinance or its application to any person is, for any reason, declared invalid, illegal or unconstitutional in whole or in part by any court or agency of competent jurisdiction, said decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.
- (8) Upon approval of the Prosecuting Attorney's Office, the Clerk of the Board is authorized to make any necessary corrections to any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or other portion of this Ordinance for scriveners or clerical errors, references, ordinance numbering, section/subsection numbers, and any reference thereto.

(9) This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on January 1, 2023. (Ord. 5999 Sec. 2, 2022)

CITY OF KENNEWICK ORDINANCE NO. 6000

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK GRANTING A NON-EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE TO LIGHTSPEED NETWORKS, INC. DBA LS NETWORKS TO CONSTRUCT, INSTALL, OPERATE, MAINTAIN, REPAIR, OR REMOVE FIBER OPTIC CABLES WITHIN THE PUBLIC WAYS OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK

WHEREAS, the Kennewick City Council passed Ordinance 5412 on May 15, 2012, adopting the classification of non-chartered code city for the City of Kennewick; and

WHEREAS, Article 11, Section 11, of the Washington State Constitution provides that the City of Kennewick "may make and enforce within its limits all such local police, sanitary and other regulations as are not in conflict with general laws;" and

WHEREAS, the Kennewick City Council, by Section 35A.11.020 of the Revised Code of Washington, through Section 35A.13.230 of the Revised Code of Washington, has any authority ever given to any class of municipality or to all municipalities of this state, and all powers possible for a city or town to have under the Constitution of this state, and not specifically denied to code cities by law, which may be exercised in regard to the regulation or use of public ways and property of all kinds and improvements thereto; and

WHEREAS, Section 35A.47.040 of the Revised Code of Washington authorizes the City to grant, permit, and regulate non-exclusive franchises for the use of public ways; and

WHEREAS, LightSpeed Networks, Inc. dba LS Networks (Franchisee) has applied to the City of Kennewick, Washington for a non-exclusive franchise to enter, occupy, and use public ways to construct, install, operate, maintain, and repair fiber optic facilities to offer and provide telecommunications service for hire, sale, or resale in the City of Kennewick; and

WHEREAS, the 1934 Communications Act, as amended by the 1996 Telecommunications Act, 47 USC § 151, et seq., relating to telecommunications providers recognizes and provides state and local government authority to manage the public rights-of-way and to require fair and reasonable compensation on a competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory basis; and

WHEREAS, Washington's Telecommunications Services Act, 2000 Wash. Laws, chapter 83, as amended, RCW Ch. 35.99, relating to telecommunications providers recognizes and provides Washington cities authority to require franchises and use permits for constructing, installing, operating, maintaining, repairing, or removing telecommunication facilities in public rights-of-way; and

WHEREAS, a franchise is a legislatively approved master permit granting general permission to a service provider to enter, use, and occupy the public ways for the purpose of locating facilities subject to requirements that a franchisee must also obtain separate use permits from the City for use of each and every specific location in the public ways in which the franchisee intends to construct, install, operate, maintain, repair or remove identified facilities; and

WHEREAS, a franchise does not include, and is not a substitute for any other permit, agreement, or other authorization required by the City, including without limitation, permits required in connection with construction activities in public ways which must be administratively approved by the City after review of specific plans; and

WHEREAS, the grant of a non-exclusive franchise requires submission to the City Attorney, an affirmative vote of at least a majority of the entire City Council and publication at least once in newspaper of general circulation; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the franchise terms and conditions contained in this ordinance are in the public interest; NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> <u>Definitions.</u> For the purposes of this Ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations will have the meanings given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural include the singular, and words in the singular include the plural. Words not defined will have the meaning ascribed to those words in the Kennewick Municipal Code unless inconsistent herewith.

"Cable Television Service" means the one-way transmission to subscribers of video programming and other programming service and subscriber interaction, if any, that is required for the selection or use of the video programming or other programming service.

"City" means the City of Kennewick, Washington, its agencies, departments, and divisions.

"City Property" means and includes all real property owned by the City, other than public ways, including without limitation, City parks, and all property owned in fee by the City.

"Conduit" means optical cable housing, jackets, or casing, and pipes, tubes, or tiles used for receiving and protecting wires, lines, cables, and communication and signal lines.

"Costs" means costs, expenses, and other financial obligations of any kind whatsoever.

"Dark Fiber" means properly functioning optical cable which is not used or available for use by Franchisee or the general public.

"Effective Date" means five days following the publication of this Franchise or a summary thereof occurs in an official newspaper of the City as provided by law.

"Emergency" means a condition of imminent danger to the health, safety, and welfare of property or persons located within the City including, without limitation, damage to persons or property from accidents or natural consequences, such as storms, earthquakes, riots or wars.

"Existing" means in actual physical being upon the effective date of this Franchise.

"Facilities" means all of the plant, equipment, fixtures, appurtenances, and other facilities necessary to furnish and deliver telecommunications services, including but not limited to poles with cross arms, poles without cross arms, wires, lines, conduits, cables, communication and signal lines and equipment, braces, guys, anchors, vaults, and all attachments, appurtenances, and appliances necessary or incidental to the distribution and use of telecommunications services.

"Fiber Optics" means the technology of guiding and projecting light for use as a communications medium.

"Franchisee" means the person to whom this Franchise is granted by the Council pursuant to this Franchise and the lawful successor, transferee or assignee of said person subject to such conditions as defined herein.

"Governmental Use" means use by the City, State, or agencies or departments of the United States for the transmission of information by wire, radio, optical cable, electromagnetic, or other similar means both internally and externally within or between their various agencies, departments, and divisions.

"Incremental Costs" means the actual and necessary costs incurred which exceed costs which would have otherwise been incurred. Incremental costs shall not include any part, portion, or proration of costs, of any kind whatsoever, including without limitation overhead or labor costs, which would have otherwise been incurred.

"Information" means knowledge or intelligence represented by any form of writing, signs, signals, pictures, sounds, or any other symbols.

"Optical Cable" means wires, lines, cables and communication and signal lines used to convey communications by fiber optics.

"Overhead Facilities" means facilities located above the surface of the ground, including the underground supports and foundations for such facilities.

"Person" means natural person, joint venture, joint stock association or company, partnership, firm, association, club, company, corporation, business, trust, or organization.

"Personal Wireless Services" means commercial mobile services, unlicensed wireless services, and common carrier wireless exchange access services, as defined by federal laws and regulations.

"Public Street" means any highway, street, alley or other public right of way for motor vehicle travel under the jurisdiction and control of the City which has been acquired, established, dedicated or devoted to such purposes.

"Public Way" means and includes all public streets, utility easements, and other rights-of-way, now or hereafter owned by the City, but only to the extent of the City's right, title, interest or authority to grant a license or franchise to occupy and use such public streets, utility easements, or other rights-of-way for telecommunications facilities. "Public way" does not include City property; State highways; land dedicated for roads, streets, and not opened and not improved for motor vehicle use by the public; structures, including poles and conduits, located within the public way; federally granted trust lands or forest board trust lands; lands owned or managed by the state parks and recreation commission; or federally granted railroad rights of way that are not open for motor vehicle use.

"Street Tree" means any tree located in, or that portion over-hanging, any public way and any tree planted on private property near a public way at the direction of the City.

"Telecommunications Service" means the transmission of information by wire, radio, optical cable, electromagnetic, or other similar means for hire, sale, or resale to the general public.

"Telecommunications Service" excludes the over-the-air transmission of broadcast television or broadcast radio signals.

"State" means the State of Washington, its agencies, departments, and governmental subdivisions, and all agencies, departments, and divisions of its agencies, departments, and governmental subdivisions.

"Underground Facilities" means facilities located under the surface of the ground, other than underground foundations or supports for overhead facilities.

"Utility Poles" means poles, and cross arms, devices, and attachments directly affixed to such poles which are used for the transmission and distribution of electrical energy, signals, or other methods of communication.

Section 2. Franchise.

A. The City grants to Franchisee, subject to the terms and conditions of this Franchise, a non-exclusive franchise to enter, occupy, and use public ways for constructing, installing, operating, maintaining, repairing, and removing wireline facilities necessary to provide telecommunications services. Except as expressly provided otherwise in subsections 4(E)(1)-(4) and 17(A) and (B), and 18(B), Franchisee shall construct, install, operate, maintain, repair, and remove its facilities at its expense.

- B. Nothing in this Franchise grants authority to Franchisee to enter, occupy, or use public ways for constructing, installing, operating, maintaining, repairing, or removing wireless communication facilities.
- C. Nothing in this Franchise grants authority to Franchisee to enter, occupy, or use City property.
- D. Any rights, privileges, and authority granted to Franchisee under this Franchise are subject to the legitimate rights of the police power of the City to adopt and enforce general ordinances necessary to protect the safety and welfare of the public, and nothing in this Franchise excuses Franchisee from its obligation to comply with all applicable general laws enacted by the City pursuant to such power. Any conflict between the terms or conditions of this Franchise and any other present or future exercise of the City's police powers will be resolved in favor of the exercise of the City's police power.
- E. Nothing in this Franchise excuses Franchisee of its obligation to identify its facilities and proposed facilities and their location or proposed location in the public ways and to obtain use and/or development authorization and permits from the City before entering, occupying, or using public ways to construct, install, operate, maintain, repair, or remove such facilities.
- F. Nothing in this Franchise excuses Franchisee of its obligation to comply with applicable codes, rules, regulations, and standards subject to verification by the City of such compliance.
- G. Nothing in this Franchise shall be construed to limit taxing authority or other lawful authority to impose charges or fees, or to excuse Franchisee of any obligation to pay lawfully imposed charges or fees.
- H. Nothing in this Franchise grants authority to Franchisee to impair or damage any City property, public way, other ways or other property, whether publicly or privately owned.
- I. Nothing in this Franchise shall be construed to create a duty upon the City to be responsible for construction of facilities or to modify public ways to accommodate Franchisee's facilities.
- J. Nothing in this Franchise grants authority to Franchisee to provide or offer cable television service.
- K. Franchisee may use the wireline facilities authorized by this Franchise for the transmission of information used to provide personal wireless services only as expressly provided in this Franchise.

- L. Nothing in this Franchise shall be construed to create, expand, or extend any liability of the City to any third party user of Franchisee's facilities or to otherwise recognize or create third party beneficiaries to this Franchise.
- M. Nothing in this Franchise shall be construed to permit Franchisee to unlawfully enter or construct improvements upon the property or premises of another.
- N. Nothing in this Franchise authorizes Franchisee to enter or construct improvements on, in, under, over, across, or within any property or right-of-way of any third party without that party's permission.

<u>Section 3.</u> <u>Term.</u> Authorization granted under this Franchise shall be for a period of five (5) years from the effective date of this Franchise. The franchise will automatically renew for one successive period of five (5) years unless terminated at the end of the term by either party by written notice to the other party no less than 180 calendar days prior to the end of the term.

Section 4. Location of Facilities.

- A. Franchisee must place its facilities underground except as otherwise expressly provided herein. Subject to the terms and conditions of this Franchise, Franchisee may place optical cable, optical cable housing, and splicing connections on existing utility poles as overhead facilities if approved by the owner of the utility poles. All other facilities, including, without limitation, facilities required to operate or maintain such optical cable and optical cable housing, and splicing connections must be underground facilities if they are located in a public way.
- B. Franchisee's facilities shall not unreasonably interfere with the use of public ways or City property by the City, the general public, or other persons authorized to enter, occupy, or use public ways or City property. Whenever new facilities will exhaust the capacity of a public way to reasonably accommodate future users or facilities, the Franchisee shall provide nondiscriminatory access to its facilities to future users and facilities.
- C. Franchisee shall not impair or damage any City property, public way, other ways or other property, whether publicly or privately owned.
- D. Franchisee shall provide the City with information in such form requested by the City which accurately reflects the horizontal and vertical location and configuration of all of Franchisee's facilities. Franchisee shall provide the City with updated information annually or upon request by the City.
- E. Franchisee shall relocate its facilities at the request of the City when there is construction, alteration, repair or improvement of a public way. Franchisee shall complete the relocation by the date specified by the City, unless the City, or a reviewing court, establishes a later date for completion, after a showing by Franchisee that the relocation

cannot be completed by the dates specified using best efforts and meeting safety and service requirements. Franchisee shall relocate its facilities at its expense except:

- (1) Where the Franchisee had paid for the relocation costs of the same facilities at the request of the City within the past five (5) years, the Franchisee's share of the cost of relocation will be paid by the City if it requested the subsequent relocation.
- (2) Where the Franchisee has an ownership share of the existing utility poles upon which its optical cable and optical cable housing is located as overhead facilities, the additional incremental cost of underground to aerial relocation, or as provided for in an approved tariff if less, will be paid by the City if it required the underground relocation.
- (3) Where the City requests relocation of underground facilities solely for aesthetic purposes, the cost of relocation shall be paid by the City; provided, however, in no event shall a request by the City to relocate overhead facilities to underground be considered to be made for aesthetic purposes. Franchisee is authorized to place optical cable and optical cable housing on existing utility poles as overhead facilities only as an exception to pre-existing City policies which require undergrounding, and the cost of relocating overhead facilities to underground shall be paid by the Franchisee except as provided in Section 4(E)(2).
- (4) Where the construction, alteration, repair or improvement of a public way is primarily for private benefit, the Franchisee may seek reimbursement from the private party or parties for the cost of relocation in the same proportion as their contribution to the costs of the project; provided, however, in no event shall the City be considered a private party for purposes of seeking reimbursement under this section.
- F. Franchisee shall relocate its facilities at its expense at the request of the City in the event of an unforeseen emergency that creates an immediate threat to the public safety, health or welfare.

Section 5. Pole, Structures and Property Owned by Others. Franchisee must obtain written approval from the owners of utility poles, structures and property not owned by Franchisee prior to attaching to or otherwise using such poles, structures or property, and provide proof of such approval to the City. The City makes no representation and assumes no responsibility for the availability of utility poles, structures, and property owned by third parties for the installation of Franchisee's facilities. The City shall not be liable for the unavailability of utility poles, structures, and property owned by third parties for any reason whatsoever. The installation of facilities by Franchisee on or in the poles, structures, or property owned by others shall be subject to and limited by the owner's authority to enter, occupy, and use public ways. In the event that the authority of the owner of poles, structures, or property to enter, occupy, and use the public ways either expires, terminates, or is cancelled, the authority of Franchisee to construct, install, operate, maintain, and repair Franchisee's facilities at such locations may be immediately cancelled at the sole option of the City. The City shall not be liable for the costs for removal of facilities arising from expiration, termination, or cancellation of any pole owner's authority to enter, occupy, or use public ways for any reason whatsoever.

Section 6. Construction and Installation Requirements.

- A. The technical performance of the facilities must meet or exceed all applicable technical standards authorized or required by law, regardless of the transmission technology utilized. The City will have the full authority permitted by applicable law to enforce compliance with these technical standards.
- B. All installations of facilities will be durable and installed in accordance with good engineering, construction, and installation practices.
- C. All facilities shall be constructed and installed in such manner and at such points so as not to inconvenience public use of the public ways or to adversely affect the public health, safety or welfare and in conformity with plans approved by the City, except in instances in which deviation may be allowed by the City.
- D. The plans shall conform to all federal, state, local, and industry codes, rules, regulations, and standards. Franchisee must cease work immediately if the City determines that Franchisee is not in compliance with such codes, rules, regulations, or standards, and may not begin or resume work until the City determines that Franchisee is in compliance. The City shall not be liable for any costs arising out of delays occurring as a result of such work stoppage.
- E. Neither approval of plans by the City nor any action or inaction by the City shall relieve Franchisee of any duty, obligation, or responsibility for the competent design, construction, and installation of its facilities. Franchisee is solely responsible for the supervision, condition, and quality of the work done, whether it is performed by itself or by its contractors, agents, or assigns.
- F. Before constructing or installing facilities, Franchisee shall provide and maintain a restoration bond written by a corporate surety acceptable to the City in an amount equal to at least one hundred percent of the estimated cost of removing Franchisee's facilities and restoring public ways and other property to as good a condition as existed prior to construction or installation of facilities. Each such bond shall remain in full force and effect until at least sixty (60) days after completion of construction or installation, and shall warrant all restoration work for a period of one year following completion.

Section 7. Coordination of Construction and Installation Activities and Other Work.

- A. Franchisee shall coordinate its construction and installation activities and other work with the City and other users of the public ways at least annually or as determined by the City.
- B. All construction or installation locations, activities and schedules shall be coordinated, as ordered by the City, to minimize public inconvenience, disruption or damages.

- C. At least two (2) business days prior to entering a public way to perform construction and installation activities or other work, Franchisee shall give notice, at its cost, to owners and occupiers of property adjacent to such public ways indicating the nature and location of the work to be performed. Such notice shall be physically posted by door hanger. Franchisee shall make a good faith effort to comply with the property owner or occupier's preferences, if any, on location or placement of underground facilities, consistent with sound engineering practices.
- D. Franchisee shall make available and accept the co-location of property of others within trenches excavated or used by Franchisee in the public ways provided the costs of the work are fairly allocated between the parties.
- E. Franchisee shall provide the City with a schedule of its proposed construction or installation activities and other work in, around, or that may affect the public ways or City property once determined by the Franchisee.
- F. The City shall give reasonable advance notice to Franchisee of plans to open public ways for construction or installation of facilities; provided, however, the City shall not be liable for damages for failure to provide such notice. When such notice has been given, Franchisee shall provide information requested by the City regarding Franchisee's future plans for use of the public way to be opened. When notice has been given, Franchisee may only construct or install facilities during such period that the City has opened the public way for construction or installation.
- G. In the event of an unexpected repair or emergency, Franchisee may commence such repair and emergency response work as required under the circumstances, provided Franchisee shall notify the City as promptly as possible before such repair or emergency work commences or as soon thereafter as possible if advance notice is not practicable.

Section 8. Temporary Removal, Adjustment or Alteration of Facilities.

- A. Franchisee shall temporarily remove, adjust or alter the position of its facilities at its cost at the request of the City for public projects, events, or other public operations or purposes.
- B. If any person requests permission from the City to use a public way for the moving or removal of any building or other object, the City shall, prior to granting such permission, require such person or entity to make any necessary arrangements with Franchisee for the temporary removal, adjustment or alteration of Franchisee's facilities to accommodate the moving or removal of said building or other object. In such event, Franchisee shall, at the cost of the person desiring to move or remove such building or other object, remove, adjust or alter the position of its facilities which may obstruct the moving or removal of such building or other object, provided that:

- (1) The moving or removal of such building or other object which necessitates the temporary removal, adjustment or alteration of facilities shall be done at a reasonable time and in a reasonable manner so as to not unreasonably interfere with Franchisee's business, consistent with the maintenance of proper service to Franchisee's customers;
- (2) Where more than one route is available for the moving or removal of such building or other object, such building or other object shall be moved or removed along the route which causes the least interference with the operations of Franchisee, in the sole discretion of the City;
- (3) The person obtaining such permission from the City to move or remove such building or other object may be required to indemnify and save Franchisee harmless from any and all claims and demands made against it on account of injury or damage to the person or property of another arising out of or in conjunction with the moving or removal of such building or other object, to the extent such injury or damage is caused by the negligence of the person moving or removing such building or other object or the negligence of the agents, servants or employees of the person moving or removing such building or other object; and
- (4) Completion of notification requirements by a person who has obtained permission from the City to use a public way for the moving or removal of any building or other object shall be deemed to be notification by the City.
- C. The City may temporarily remove, adjust or alter the position of Franchisee's facilities as the City may determine to be necessary, appropriate or useful in response to any public health or safety emergency. The City shall not be liable to Franchisee or any other party for any direct, indirect, or other damages suffered as a direct or indirect result of the City's actions.
- D. The temporary removal, adjustment or alteration of the position of Franchisee's facilities shall not be considered relocation for any purpose whatsoever.

Section 9. Safety and Maintenance Requirements.

- A. All work authorized and required under this Franchise will be performed in a safe, thorough, and workmanlike manner.
- B. Franchisee, in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local safety requirements shall, at all times, employ ordinary care and shall use commonly accepted methods and devices for preventing failures and accidents which are likely to cause damage, injury, or nuisance to occur. All facilities, wherever situated or located, shall at all times be kept in a good, safe, and suitable condition. If a violation of a safety code or other applicable regulation is found to exist by the City, the City may, after discussions with Franchisee, establish a reasonable time for Franchisee to make necessary repairs. If the repairs are not made within the established time frame, the City may make the repairs itself at the cost of the Franchisee or have them made at the cost of Franchisee.

- C. Franchisee, and any person acting in its behalf shall use suitable barricades, flags, flagmen, lights, flares, and other measures as required for the safety of all members of the general public during the performance of work, of any kind whatsoever, in public ways to prevent injury or damage to any person, vehicle, or property.
- D. Franchisee shall maintain its facilities in proper working order. Franchisee shall restore its facilities to proper working order upon receipt of notice from the City that facilities are not in proper working order. The City may, after discussions with Franchisee, establish a reasonable time for Franchisee to restore its facilities to proper working order. If the facilities are not restored to proper working order within the established time frame, the City may restore the facilities to proper working order or have them restored at the cost of Franchisee.

Section 10. <u>Removal of Unauthorized Facilities.</u> Within ninety (90) days following written notice from the City, Franchisee shall, at its expense, remove unauthorized facilities and restore public ways and other property to as good a condition as existed prior to construction or installation of its facilities. Any plan for removal of said facilities must be approved by the City prior to such work. Facilities are unauthorized and subject to removal in the following circumstances:

- A. Upon expiration, termination, or cancellation of this Franchise;
- B. Upon abandonment of the facilities. Facilities shall be deemed abandoned if they are unused by Franchisee for a period of ninety (90) days;
- C. If the facilities were constructed or installed prior to the effective date of this Franchise; unless such facilities were constructed or installed upon the condition of subsequent approval of this Franchise with the consent of the City;
- D. If the facilities were constructed, installed, operated, maintained, or repaired without the prior issuance of required use and/or development authorization and permits;
- E. If the facilities were constructed or installed or are operated, maintained or repaired in violation of the terms or conditions of this Franchise; or
- F. If the facilities are unauthorized for any reason whatsoever.

Provided, however, that the City may, in its sole discretion, allow a Franchisee to abandon facilities in place. No facilities may be abandoned in place without the express written consent of the City. Upon consensual abandonment in place of facilities, the facilities shall become property of the City, and Franchisee shall submit to the City an instrument in writing, to be approved by the City, transferring to the City the ownership of such facilities. The failure of Franchisee to submit an instrument shall not prevent, delay, or impair transfer of ownership to the City.

Section 11. Restoration of Public Ways and Other Property.

- A. When Franchisee, or any person acting on its behalf, does any work in or affecting any public way or other property, it shall, at its own expense, promptly remove any obstructions therefrom and restore, at Franchisee's cost, such ways and property to as good a condition as existed before the work was undertaken, unless otherwise directed by the City.
- B. If weather or other conditions do not permit the complete restoration required by this section, the Franchisee shall temporarily restore the affected ways or property. Such temporary restoration shall be at the Franchisee's cost, and Franchisee lessee shall promptly undertake and complete the required permanent restoration when the weather or other conditions no longer prevent such permanent restoration.
- C. All restoration work is subject to inspection and final approval by the City. If restoration is not made to the satisfaction of the City within the established timeframe, the City may make the restoration itself at the cost of Franchisee or have them made at the cost of Franchisee.

Section 12. Use and/or Development Authorization and Permits. Franchisee shall obtain use and/or development authorization and required permits from the City and all other appropriate regulatory authorities prior to constructing or installing facilities or performing other work in a public way. The City must act on applications for use and/or development authorization or required permits within thirty (30) days of receipt of a completed application, unless Franchisee consents to a different time period.

- A. Franchisee shall provide the following information for all facilities that it proposes to construct or install:
 - (1) Engineering plans, specifications and a network map of the proposed facilities and their relation to existing facilities, in a format and media requested by the City in sufficient detail to identify:
 - a. The location and route of the proposed facilities;
 - b. When requested by the City, the location of all overhead and underground public utility, telecommunication, cable, water, sewer, drainage and other facilities in the public way along the proposed route;
 - c. When requested by the City, the location(s), if any, for interconnection with the telecommunication facilities of others;
 - d. The specific trees, structures, improvements, facilities and obstructions, if any, that Franchisee proposes to temporarily or permanently alter, remove or relocate.
 - (2) If Franchisee is proposing to install overhead facilities, evidence of Franchisee's authorization to use each utility pole along the proposed route together with any conditions of use imposed by the pole owner(s) for each pole; if the overhead facilities are subsequently relocated underground, the Franchisee shall relocate underground at no cost to the City.

- (3) If Franchisee is proposing to install underground facilities in existing ducts or conduits within the public ways, information in sufficient detail to identify:
 - a. Evidence of ownership or authorization to use such ducts or conduits;
 - b. Conditions of use imposed by the owner(s) of the ducts or conduits;
 - c. If known to Franchisee or reasonably ascertainable to Franchisee, the total capacity of such ducts or conduits; and
 - d. If known to Franchisee or reasonably ascertainable to Franchisee, amount of the total capacity within such ducts or conduits which will be occupied by Franchisee's facilities.
- (4) If Franchisee is proposing to install underground facilities in new ducts or conduits within the public ways:
 - a. The location proposed for new ducts or conduits;
 - b. The total capacity of such ducts or conduits; and
 - c. The initial listing of collocated facilities located within Franchisee constructed or installed ducts or conduits.
- (5) A preliminary construction schedule and completion date together with a traffic control plan in compliance with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) for any construction.
- (6) Information to establish that the applicant has obtained all other governmental approvals and permits to construct and operate the facilities.
- (7) Such other documentation and information regarding the facilities requested by the City.
- B. The requirements of this section do not apply to installation of optical cable necessary to connect a customer of Franchisee to a previously approved facility; provided that neither excavation nor trenching in the public right of way is required, that the optical cable does not cross a distance of more than twenty feet from its point of connection to the approved facility and the point where it exits the public right-of-way, that the optical cable connection meets or exceeds all applicable technical standards required by law, that the optical cable construction, and installation practices and does not interfere with the public use of the public ways, or adversely affect public health safety or welfare, that the optical cable connection is constructed and installed to conform to all federal, state, local, and industry codes, rules, regulations, and standards, and that the optical cable connection does not damage or impair the City's urban forest.
- C. The requirements of this section do not apply to repair or maintenance of previously approved overhead facility; provided that the location and size of the previously approved facility is not materially changed, that no additional new facilities are constructed or installed, that the repair or maintenance activities are conducted in accordance with good engineering, repair, and maintenance practices and do not interfere with the public use of the public ways, or adversely affect public health, safety, or welfare, that maintenance or repair activities conform to all federal, state, local, and industry codes, rules, regulations, and standards, and that the repair or maintenance activities comply with Chapter 5.56 of the Kennewick Municipal Code.

D. Franchisee shall not be granted development authorization or issued permits for construction or installation of new facilities unless Franchisee is in full compliance with the provisions of this Franchise and all of Franchisee's existing facilities have been expressly approved by the City in writing.

Section 13. Hold Harmless and Assumption of Risk.

- A. Hold Harmless.
 - (1) Franchisee hereby releases, covenants not to bring suit and agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servants, agents, and representatives against any and all claims, costs, damages, judgments, awards, or liability, of any kind whatsoever, to any person, including claims by Franchisee's own employees to which Franchisee might otherwise be immune under Title 51 RCW, arising from injury or death of any person or damage to property arising out of the acts or omissions of Franchisee, its officers, employees, servants, agents or representatives.
 - (2) Franchisee further releases, covenants not to bring suit and agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servants, agents, and representatives from any and all claims, costs, damages, judgments, awards, or liability to any person, including claims by Franchisee's own employees, including those claims to which Franchisee might otherwise have immunity under Title 51 RCW, arising out of Franchisee's exercise of the rights, privileges, or authority granted by this Franchise which are made against the City, in whole or in part, due to the City's ownership or control of the public ways or other City property, by virtue of the City permitting the Franchisee's entry, occupancy or use of the public ways, or based upon the City's inspection or lack of inspection of work performed by Franchisee, its officers, employees, servants, agents or representatives.
 - (3) These hold harmless covenants include, but are not limited to claims against the City arising as a result of the acts or omissions of Franchisee, its officers, employees, servants, agents or representatives in barricading, instituting trench safety systems or providing other adequate warnings of any excavation, construction, or work in any public way or other public place in performance of work or services permitted under this Franchise.
 - (4) Franchisee further agrees to indemnify, hold harmless and defend the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servants, agents, and representatives against any claims for damages, including, but not limited to, business interruption damages and lost profits, brought by or under users of the Franchisee's facilities as the result of any interruption of service due to damage or destruction of the user's facilities caused by or arising out of damage or destruction of Franchisee's facilities, except to the extent any such damage or destruction is caused by or arises from the active sole negligence of the City.

- (5) In the event of liability for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damages to property caused by or resulting from the concurrent negligence of Franchisee and the City, Franchisee's liability hereunder shall be only to the extent of Franchisee's negligence.
- (6) It is further specifically and expressly understood that the hold harmless covenants provided herein constitutes the Franchisee's waiver of immunity under Title 51 RCW. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties.
- (7) Inspection or acceptance by the City of any work performed by Franchisee at the time of completion of construction or installation shall not be grounds for avoidance of any of these hold harmless covenants. Said hold harmless obligations shall extend to claims which are not reduced to a suit and any claims which may be compromised prior to the culmination of any litigation or the institution of any litigation.
- (8) In the event that Franchisee refuses the tender of defense in any suit or any claim, said tender having been made pursuant to the hold harmless covenants contained herein, and said refusal is subsequently determined by a court having jurisdiction (or such other tribunal that the parties shall agree to decide the matter), to have been a wrongful refusal on the part of Franchisee, then Franchisee shall pay and be responsible for all of the City's costs for defense of the action, including all reasonable expert witness fees and reasonable attorneys' fees and the reasonable costs of the City, including reasonable attorneys' fees of recovering under this hold harmless clause.
- B. Assumption of Risk.
 - (1) Franchisee assumes the risk of damage to its facilities located in the City's public ways from activities conducted by third parties or the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servants, agents, or representatives. Franchisee releases and waives any and all claims against the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servants, agents, and representatives for damage to or destruction of the Franchisee's facilities except to the extent any such damage or destruction is caused by or arises from active sole negligence of the City.
 - (2) Franchisee bears sole responsibility to insure its property. Franchisee shall ensure that its insurance contracts waive subrogation claims against the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servants, agents, and representatives, and Franchisee shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servants, agents, and representatives against any and all subrogation claims if it fails to do so.

Section 14. Insurance. Franchisee shall obtain and maintain, at its cost, worker's compensation insurance and the following liability insurance policies insuring both Franchisee and the City, and its elected and appointed officers, officials, agents, employees, representatives, engineers, consultants, and volunteers as additional insureds against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the exercise of the rights, privileges, and authority granted to Franchisee:

- A. Comprehensive general liability insurance, written on an occurrence basis, with limits not less than:
 - (1) \$1,000,000.00 for bodily injury or death to each person;
 - (2) \$1,000,000.00 for property damage resulting from any one accident; and
 - (3) \$5,000,000.00 in aggregate for each respectively.
- B. Automobile liability for owned, non-owned and hired vehicles with a limit of \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence.
- C. The liability insurance policies required by this section shall be maintained by Franchisee throughout the term of this Franchise, such other periods of time during which Franchisee's facilities occupy public ways, and while Franchisee is engaged in the removal of its facilities. Franchisee shall provide an insurance certificate, together with an endorsement naming the City, and its elected and appointed officers, officials, agents, employees, representatives, engineers, consultants, and volunteers as additional insureds, to the City prior to the commencement of any construction or installation of any facilities pursuant to this Franchise or other work in a public way. Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. Payment of deductibles and selfinsured retentions shall be the sole responsibility of Franchisee. The insurance certificate required by this section shall contain a clause stating that coverage shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability. Franchisee's insurance shall be primary insurance with respect to the City, its officers, officials, employees, agents, consultants, and volunteers. Any insurance maintained by the City, its officers, officials, employees, consultants, agents, and volunteers shall be in excess of the Franchisee's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- D. In addition to the coverage requirements set forth in this section, each such insurance policy shall contain an endorsement in a form which substantially complies with the following:

"It is hereby understood and agreed that this policy may not be canceled nor the intention not to renew be stated until 10 days after receipt by the City, by registered mail, of a written notice addressed to the Kennewick City Manager of intent to cancel or not to renew for reason of nonpayment of premium and until 30 days after receipt by the City, by registered mail, of a written notice addressed to the Kennewick City Manager of intent to cancel or not to renew for reason."

E. At least ten (10) days prior to said cancellation or non-renewal, Franchisee shall obtain and furnish to the City replacement insurance policies meeting the requirements of this section. <u>Section 15.</u> <u>Security Fund.</u> Franchisee shall establish and maintain a security fund in the amount of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000), at its cost, with the City by depositing such monies, bonds, letters of credit, or other instruments in such form and amount acceptable to the City. No sums may be withdrawn from the fund by Franchisee without consent of the City. The security fund shall be maintained at the sole expense of Franchisee so long as any of the Franchisee's facilities occupy a public way.

- A. The fund shall serve as security for the full and complete performance of this Franchise, including any claims, costs, damages, judgments, awards, or liability, of any kind whatsoever, the City pays or incurs, including civil penalties, because of any failure attributable to Franchisee to comply with the provisions of this Franchise or the codes, ordinances, rules, regulations, standards, or permits of the City.
- B. Before any sums are withdrawn from the security fund, the City shall give written notice to Franchisee:
 - Describing the act, default or failure to be remedied, or the claims, costs, damages, judgments, awards, or liability which the City has incurred or may pay by reason of Franchisee's act or default;
 - (2) Providing a reasonable opportunity for Franchisee to first remedy the existing or ongoing default or failure, if applicable;
 - (3) Providing a reasonable opportunity for Franchisee to pay any monies due the City before the City withdraws the amount thereof from the security fund, if applicable; and
 - (4) Franchisee will be given an opportunity to review the act, default or failure described in the notice with the City or his or her designee.
- C. Franchisee shall replenish the security fund within fourteen (14) days after written notice from the City that there is a deficiency in the amount of the fund.
- D. Insufficiency of the security fund shall not release or relieve Franchisee of any obligation or financial responsibility.

Section 16. Taxes, Charges, and Fees.

A. Franchisee shall pay and be responsible for all charges and fees imposed to recover actual administrative expenses incurred by the City that are directly related to receiving and approving this Franchise, any use and/or development authorizations which may be required, or any permit which may be required, to inspecting plans and construction, or to the preparation of a detailed statement pursuant to RCW Ch. 43.21C. Regular application and processing charges and fees imposed by the City shall be deemed to be attributable to actual administrative expenses incurred by the City but shall not excuse Franchisee from paying and being responsible for other actual administrative expenses incurred by the City.

- B. Franchisee shall pay and be responsible for taxes permitted by law.
- C. In addition to penalties and other remedies for which Franchisee may be subjected, the City reserves the right to impose site-specific charges for placement of structures used to provide personal wireless services. Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, such charges shall be an amount equal to at least one hundred percent (100%) of the costs of construction or installation of such structures.
- D. Franchisee shall pay an administrative fee for franchise renewal to the City of One Thousand Two-Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,250.00).

[LB1] Section 18. Access to Facilities and Universal Service.

- A. Franchisee shall provide access to its facilities by hire, sale, or resale on a nondiscriminatory basis. If Franchisee purports to serve the general public, it shall make its telecommunications services available to any customer within its franchise area who shall request such service whenever feasible, without discrimination as to the terms, conditions, rates or charges for the Franchisee's services; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall prohibit Franchisee from making any reasonable classifications among differently situated customers.
- B. Franchisee shall provide Internet access to users of City property, at locations requested by the City, if it is practicable. Franchisee and the City may enter into a separate agreement or agreements regarding the allocation of costs to construct, install, operate, maintain, repair, and remove facilities needed to provide such access; provided, however, that nothing herein shall require the City to accept construction or installation of facilities on City property.

<u>Section 19.</u> <u>Acquisition of Facilities.</u> Upon Franchisee's acquisition of any facilities in the public way, or upon any addition or annexation to the City of any area in which Franchisee has facilities, such facilities shall immediately be subject to the terms of this Franchise without further action of the City or Franchisee.

Section 20. One-Call System. Franchisee is responsible for complying with the provisions of Washington's One-Call statutes: RCW Ch. 19.122.

Section 21. Vacation of Public Ways. The City reserves the right to vacate any public way which is subject to rights, privileges, and authority granted by this Franchise. If Franchisee has facilities in such public way, the City shall reserve an easement for Franchisee.

Section 22. Duty to Provide Information. Within ten (10) days of a written request from the City, Franchisee shall furnish the City with all requested information sufficient to demonstrate:

A. That Franchisee has complied with all requirements of this Franchise;

- B. That taxes, fees, charges, or other costs owed or payable by Franchisee have been properly collected and paid; and
- C. Franchisee's obligations under this section are in addition to those provided in subsection 4(E).

Section 23. Records.

- A. Franchisee will manage all of its operations in accordance with a policy of keeping its documents and records open and accessible to the City. The City will have access to, and the right to inspect, any documents and records of Franchisee and its affiliates that are reasonably necessary for the enforcement of this Franchise or to verify Franchisee's compliance with terms or conditions of this Franchise. Franchisee will not deny the City access to any of Franchisee's records on the basis that Franchisee's documents or records are under the control of any affiliate or a third party.
- B. All documents and records maintained by Franchisee shall be made available for inspection by the City at reasonable times and intervals; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be construed to require Franchisee to violate state or federal law regarding subscriber privacy, nor shall this section be construed to require Franchisee to disclose proprietary or confidential information without adequate safeguards for its confidential or proprietary nature.
- C. One copy of documents and records requested by the City will be furnished to the City at the cost of Franchisee. If the requested documents and records are too voluminous or for security reasons cannot be copied or removed, then Franchisee may request, in writing within ten (10) days of the City's request, that the City inspect them at Franchisee's local office. If any documents or records of Franchisee are not kept in a local office and/or are not made available in copies to the City, and if the City determines that an examination of such documents or records is necessary or appropriate for the enforcement of this Franchise, or to verify Franchisee's compliance with terms or conditions of this Franchise, then all reasonable travel and related costs incurred in making such examination shall be paid by Franchisee.

Section 24. Assignment or Transfer. Franchisee's rights, privileges, and authority under this Franchise, and ownership or working control of facilities constructed or installed pursuant to this Franchise, may not, directly or indirectly, be transferred, assigned or disposed of by sale, lease, merger, consolidation or other act of Franchisee, by operation of law or otherwise, except as provided herein, or without the prior written consent of the City, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed. Any transfer, assignment or disposal of Franchisee's rights, privileges, and authority under this Franchise, or ownership or working control of facilities constructed or installed pursuant to this Franchise, may be subject to reasonable conditions as may be prescribed by the City.

- A. No rights, privileges, or authority under this Franchise shall be assigned, transferred, or disposed of in any manner within twelve 12 months after the effective date of this Franchise.
- B. Absent extraordinary and unforeseeable circumstances, no facility shall be assigned, transferred, or disposed of before construction of the facility has been completed and restoration has been performed to the satisfaction of the City.
- C. Franchisee and the proposed assignee or transferee shall provide and certify the following information to the City not less than one hundred and fifty (150) days prior to the proposed date of assignment, transfer, or disposal:
 - (1) Complete information setting forth the nature, terms and condition of the proposed assignment, transfer, or disposal;
 - (2) Any other information reasonably required by the City; and
 - (3) A transfer application fee in an amount to be determined by the City to recover actual administrative costs directly related to receiving and approving the proposed assignment, transfer, or disposal.
- D. No assignment, transfer, or disposal may be made or shall be approved unless the assignee or transferee has the legal, technical, financial, and other requisite qualifications to operate, maintain, repair, and remove facilities constructed or installed pursuant to this Franchise and to comply with the terms and conditions of this Franchise.
- E. Any transfer, assignment, or disposal of rights, privileges, and authority under this Franchise or ownership or working control of facilities constructed or installed pursuant to this Franchise, without prior written approval of the City pursuant to this section shall be void and is cause for termination of this Franchise.
- F. Any transactions which singularly or collectively result in a change of fifty percent (50%) or more of working control of the Franchisee, or working control of affiliated entities having ownership or working control of Franchisee, or of control of the telecommunications capacity or bandwidth of Franchisee, shall be considered an assignment or transfer requiring City approval. Transactions between affiliated entities are not exempt from City approval. City approval shall not be required for mortgaging purposes or if said transfer is from Franchisee to another person controlled by Franchisee.
- G. All terms and conditions of this Franchise shall be binding upon all successors and assigns of Franchisee and all persons who obtain ownership or working control of any facility constructed or installed pursuant to this Franchise.

<u>Section 25.</u> <u>Violations, Noncompliance, and Other Grounds for Termination or</u> <u>Cancellation.</u>

- A. This Franchise, and any right, privilege or authority of Franchisee to enter, occupy or use public ways may be terminated or cancelled by the City for the following reasons:
 - (1) Violation of or noncompliance with any term or condition of this Franchise by Franchisee;
 - (2) Violation of or noncompliance with the material terms of any use and/or development authorization or required permit by Franchisee;
 - (3) Construction, installation, operation, maintenance, or repair of facilities on, in, under, over, across, or within any public way without Franchisee first obtaining use and/or development authorization and required permits from the City and all other appropriate regulatory authorities;
 - (4) Unauthorized construction, installation, operation, maintenance, or repair of facilities on City property;
 - (5) Misrepresentation or lack of candor by or on behalf of Franchisee in any application or written or oral statement upon which the City relies in making the decision to grant, review or amend any right, privilege or authority to Franchisee;
 - (6) Abandonment of facilities;
 - (7) Failure of Franchisee to pay taxes, fees, charges or costs when and as due; or
 - (8) Insolvency or bankruptcy of Franchisee.
- B. In the event that the City believes that grounds exist for termination or cancellation of this Franchise or any right, privilege or authority of Franchisee to enter, occupy or use public ways, Franchisee shall be given written notice, and providing Franchisee a reasonable period of time not exceeding thirty (30) days to furnish evidence:
 - (1) That corrective action has been, or is being actively and expeditiously pursued, to remedy the violation, noncompliance, or other grounds for termination or cancellation;
 - (2) That rebuts the alleged violation, noncompliance, or other grounds for termination or cancellation; or
 - (3) That it would be in the public interest to impose some penalty or sanction less than termination or cancellation.
- C. In the event that Franchisee fails to provide evidence reasonably satisfactory to the City as provided in subsection (B) of this section, the City shall refer the apparent violation, noncompliance, or other grounds for termination or cancellation to the City Council. The City Council shall provide the Franchisee with notice and a reasonable opportunity to be heard concerning the matter.
- D. If the City Council determines that the violation, noncompliance, or other grounds for termination or cancellation arose from willful misconduct or gross negligence by Franchisee, then, Franchisee shall, at the election of the City Council, forfeit all rights, privileges and authority conferred under this Franchise or any use and/or development authorization or permit granted by the City, and this Franchise and any such use and/or development authorization or permit may be terminated or cancelled by the City Council.

The City Council may elect, in lieu of the above and without any prejudice to any of its other legal rights and remedies, to pursue other remedies, including obtaining an order compelling Franchisee into compliance or to take corrective action, or to recover damages and costs incurred by the City by reason of Franchisee's actions or omissions. The City Council shall utilize the following factors in analyzing the nature, circumstances, extent, and gravity of the actions or omissions of Franchisee:

- (1) Whether the misconduct was egregious;
- (2) Whether substantial harm resulted;
- (3) Whether the violation was intentional;
- (4) Whether there is a history of prior violations of the same or other requirements;
- (5) Whether there is a history of overall compliance; and
- (6) Whether the violation was voluntarily disclosed, admitted or cured.
- E. The City Council's choice of remedy shall not excuse Franchisee from compliance with any term or condition of this Franchise or the material terms of any use and/or development authorization or required permit by Franchisee. Franchisee shall have a continuing duty to remedy any violation, noncompliance, or other grounds for termination or cancellation. Further, nothing herein shall be construed as limiting any remedies that the City may have, at law or in equity, for enforcement of this Franchise and any use and/or development authorization or permit granted to Franchisee.

Section 26. Notices.

A. Any regular notice or information required or permitted to be given to the parties under this Franchise may be sent to the following addresses unless otherwise specified:

B. Franchisee shall additionally provide a phone number and designated responsible officials to respond to emergencies. After being notified of an emergency, Franchisee shall cooperate with the City and make best efforts to immediately respond to minimize damage, protect the health and safety of the public and repair facilities to restore them to proper working order. Annually, on request of the City, Franchisee will meet with City emergency response personnel to coordinate emergency management operations and, at

least once a year, at the request of the City, actively participate in emergency preparations.

<u>Section 27.</u> <u>Non-Waiver</u>. The failure of the City to exercise any rights or remedies under this Franchise or to insist upon compliance with any terms or conditions of this Franchise shall not be a waiver of any such rights, remedies, terms or conditions of this Franchise by the City and shall not prevent the City from demanding compliance with such terms or conditions at any future time or pursuing its rights or remedies.

Section 28. Eminent Domain. This Franchise is subject to the power of eminent domain and the right of the City Council to repeal, amend or modify the Franchise in the interest of the public. In any proceeding under eminent domain, the Franchise itself shall have no value.

Section 29. Limitation of Liability. Administration of this Franchise may not be construed to create the basis for any liability on the part of the City, its elected officials, officers, employees, servant, agents, and representatives for any injury or damage from the failure of the Franchisee to comply with the provisions of this Franchise; by reason of any plan, schedule or specification review, inspection, notice and order, permission, or other approval or consent by the City; for any action or inaction thereof authorized or done in connection with the implementation or enforcement of this Franchise by the City; or for the accuracy of plans submitted to the City.

Except for a party's indemnification obligations set forth herein and except for claims arising from a party's intentional misconduct (including employee conduct), in no event shall either party be liable to the other party for any indirect, incidental, special, punitive or consequential damages whatsoever, arising out of, or in connection with, this agreement, including but not limited to, lost profits, lost revenue, loss of goodwill, loss of anticipated savings, loss of data, incurred or suffered by either party.

<u>Section 30.</u> <u>Damage to Facilities.</u> Unless directly and proximately caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of the City, its affiliaties, employees or representatives, the City shall not be liable for any damage to or loss of any facilities as a result of or in connection with any public works, public improvements, construction, excavation, grading, filling, or work of any kind on, in, under, over, across, or within a public way done by or on behalf of the City.

Section 31. Governing Law and Venue. This Franchise and use of the applicable public ways will be governed by the laws of the State of Washington, unless preempted by federal law. Franchisee agrees to be bound by the laws of the State of Washington, unless preempted by federal law, and subject to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of Washington. Any action relating to this Franchise must be brought in the Superior Court of Washington for Benton County, or in the case of a federal action, the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Washington at Richland, Washington, unless an administrative agency has primary jurisdiction.

<u>Section 32.</u> <u>Severability.</u> If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Franchise or its application to any person or entity should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of

competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality will not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Franchise nor its application to any other person or entity; provided that, if any term or condition of this Franchise relating to Franchisee's right, privilege, or authority to place optical cable, optical cable housing, and splicing connections on existing utility poles as overhead facilities is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, Franchisee's authority to construct, install, operate, maintain, or repair overhead facilities shall be deemed void *ab initio*, any overhead facilities shall be deemed to be unauthorized, and Franchisee shall be authorized only to place facilities underground.

Section 33. Miscellaneous.

- A. Equal Employment and Nondiscrimination. Throughout the term of this Franchise, Franchisee will fully comply with all equal employment and nondiscrimination provisions and requirements of federal, state, and local laws, and in particular, FCC rules and regulations relating thereto.
- B. Descriptive Headings. The headings and titles of the sections and subsections of this Franchise are for reference purposes only and do not affect the meaning or interpretation of the text herein.
- C. Costs and Attorneys' Fees. If any action or suit arises in connection with this Franchise, the substantially prevailing party will be entitled to recover all of its reasonable costs, including attorneys' fees, as well as costs and reasonable attorneys' fees on appeal, in addition to such other relief as the court may deem proper.
- D. No Joint Venture. Nothing herein will be deemed to create a joint venture or principalagent relationship between the parties, and neither party is authorized to, nor shall either party act toward third persons or the public in any manner that would indicate any such relationship with the other.
- E. Mutual Negotiation. This Franchise was mutually negotiated by the Franchisee and the City and has been reviewed by the legal counsel for both parties. Neither party will be deemed to be the drafter of this Franchise.
- F. Third-Party Beneficiaries. There are no third-party beneficiaries to this Franchise.
- G. Actions of the City or Franchisee. In performing their respective obligations under this Franchise, the City and Franchisee will act in a reasonable, expeditious, and timely manner. Whenever this Franchise sets forth a time for any act to be performed by Franchisee, such time shall be deemed to be of the essence, and any failure of Franchisee to perform within the allotted time may be considered a material breach of this Franchise, and sufficient grounds for the City to invoke any relevant remedy.

- H. Entire Agreement. This Franchise represents the entire understanding and agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter and supersedes all prior oral and written negotiations between the parties.
- I. Modification. The parties may alter, amend or modify the terms and conditions of this Franchise upon written agreement of both parties to such alteration, amendment or modification. Nothing in this subsection shall impair the City's exercise of authority reserved to it under this Franchise.
- J. Non-exclusivity. This Franchise does not confer any exclusive right, privilege, or authority to enter, occupy or use public ways for delivery of telecommunications services or any other purposes. This Franchise is granted upon the express condition that it will not in any manner prevent the City from granting other or further franchises in, on, across, over, along, under or through any public way.
- K. Rights Granted. This Franchise does not convey any right, title or interest in public ways, but shall be deemed only as authorization to enter, occupy, or use public ways for the limited purposes and term stated in this Franchise. Further, this Franchise shall not be construed as any warranty of title.
- L. Contractors and Subcontractors. Franchisee's contractors and subcontractors must be licensed and bonded in accordance with the City's ordinances, rules, and regulations. Work by contractors and subcontractors is subject to the same restrictions, limitations and conditions as if the work were performed by Franchisee.

<u>Section 34.</u> <u>Acceptance of Franchise.</u> Within thirty (30) days after the passage and approval of this ordinance, this Franchise may be accepted by the Franchisee by its filing with the City Clerk an unconditional written acceptance thereof. Failure of the Franchisee to so accept this Franchise within said period of time shall be deemed a rejection thereof by the Franchisee, and the rights, privileges, and authority herein granted shall, after the expiration of the 30-day period, absolutely cease and terminate, unless the time period is extended by ordinance duly passed for that purpose.

Section 35. Publication. The City Clerk is authorized and directed to publish a summary hereof in accordance with Revised Code of Washington §§ 35A.13.200 and 35A.12.160.

<u>Section 36. Effective Date.</u> This ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law, but if, and only if, the Franchisee has endorsed this ordinance and accepted the terms and conditions thereof prior to 30 days after passage.




BOUNDARY SKETCH



Approval Criteria

KMC 4.12.110 (7): Approval Criteria. The City may approve Comprehensive Plan Amendments and area-wide zone map amendments if it finds that:


- (a) The proposed amendment bears a substantial relationship to the public health, safety, welfare, and protection of the environment;
- (b) The proposed amendment is consistent with the requirements of Chapter 36.70A RCW and with the portion of the City's adopted Comprehensive Plan not affected by the amendment;
- (c) The proposed amendment corrects an obvious mapping error; or
- (d) The proposed amendment addresses an identified deficiency in the Comprehensive Plan.
- (e) A rezone shall be treated as an area-wide map amendment when:
 - i. It is initiated by the City and a significant class of property is similarly affected by the proposed rezone; and
 - ii. It is either:
 - A. Based upon an adopted or ongoing comprehensive planning process or undertaken to ensure compliance with or to implement the provisions of the Growth Management Act; or
 - B. Part of the process that includes amending text for this title where such amendments will have a significant impact on a large area of the City.

Additional Factors

KMC 4.12.110 (8) : Additional Factors. The City must also consider the following factors prior to approving Comprehensive Plan Amendments:

- a) The effect upon the physical environment;
- b) The effect on open space and natural features including, but not limited to, topography, streams, rivers, and lakes;
- c) The compatibility with and impact on adjacent land uses and surrounding neighborhoods;
- d) The adequacy of, and impact on community facilities, including utilities, roads, public transportation, parks, recreation, and schools;
- e) The quantity and location of land planned for the proposed land use type and density and the demand for such land;
- f) The current and projected project density in the area; and
- g) The effect, if any upon other aspects of the Comprehensive Plan.

Planning Commission Action Summary

CPA-2022-0010 (OS to LDR)

The Kennewick Planning Commission conducted a hybrid public hearing on 15 August 2022. All interested parties were notified to come before the Commission and be heard. After reviewing the staff report and all oral and written facts and opinions, Commissioner Helgeson moved that the Planning Commission concur with the findings and conclusions contained within staff report CPA-2022-0010 and recommend to City Council approval of the proposed change in land use designation.

Findings:

- 1. The applicant is Dave Retter, Retter & Co., 329 N Kellogg St, Kennewick, WA 99336.
- 2. The owner is Libra Inc. (RJ and DC Hoch), 2921 S Auburn PI, Kennewick, WA 99337.
- 3. The request is to change the land use designation from Open Space (OS) to Low Density Residential (LDR).
- 4. The application was received on 2 May 2022 and was routed for review to various City departments and other local, state and federal agencies for comment on 9 June 2022.
- 5. The site is currently served by municipal water and sewer.
- 6. Access to the site is currently provided from S Washington Street.
- 7. The proposed amendment is adjacent to Open Space and Low Density Residential designated lands.
- 8. A Determination of Non-Significance was issued on 18 July 2022 for this application. The appeal period for the determination ended on 1 August 2022.
- 9. A public hearing notification sign was posted on site 28 July 2022.
- Notice of the public hearing for this application was published in the Tri-City Herald on 31 July 2022. Notices were also mailed to property owners within 300 feet of the site on 28 July 2022.
- 11. The proposed amendment bears a relationship to the public health, safety, welfare and protection of the environment in that it will not allow the property to be rezoned to a zoning district that will permit uses which may have the potential to negatively impact the public health, safety, welfare and protection of the environment.
- 12. This proposed amendment is consistent with the requirements of Chapter 36.70A RCW and with the portion of the City's adopted comprehensive plan not affected by the amendment.
- 13. The proposed amendment does not correct an obvious mapping error.
- 14. This request will not address an identified deficiency in the Comprehensive Plan.

CONCLUSIONS:

- 1. Pursuant to Chapter 4.08 of the Kennewick Municipal Code, the lead agency has determined that the proposed amendment does not have a probable significant adverse impact on the environment.
- 2. The proposed amendment will change the land use designation for the subject parcel from Open Space (OS) to Low Density Residential (LDR).
- 3. The proposed amendment is consistent with the City of Kennewick Comprehensive Plan and will have minimal impact on other aspects of the plan.
- 4. The proposed amendment will allow for a low density subdivision associated with the existing equestrian facility.
- 5. Future development of the site has the potential to affect the traffic and park system. Park and Traffic Impact Fees will be determined by the type of development and assessed at the time of development.
- 6. Access to the site will remain via S Washington Street.

The motion was seconded by Commissioner Gregory. The motion passed unanimously, with Commissioners Stolle, Helgeson, Gregory, Short, and Chairman Morris all in favor.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF KENNEWICK'S COMPREHENSIVE PLAN (CPA 2022-0010, Richmond and Diane Hoch)

WHEREAS, the City of Kennewick, by and through its City Council, and pursuant to the Growth Management Act, directed the Planning Commission of the City of Kennewick to review and update the Comprehensive Plan for the purposes of coordinating all plans and programs relating to the physical and social development of the Kennewick Urban Growth Area and the people therein; and

WHEREAS, the City of Kennewick, in accord with the Growth Management Act and RCW 36.70A.130 and implementing municipal regulations, has directed the Department of Community Planning and the Planning Commission to review and update the plan annually; and

WHEREAS, appropriate public notice has been given and a public hearing held by the Planning Commission on August 15, 2022, concerning the proposed changes, and the same has been reviewed by the Department of Commerce for the review required under RCW 36.70A.106; NOW, THEREFORE:

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The following amendment is made to the City of Kennewick Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map as adopted by Resolution 07-12:

1. CPA 2022-0010 – 10.35 acres located at 2600 S. Washington Street (Open Space (OS) to Low Density Residential (LDR)).

Here to answer any questions; proposal put together months ago, with interest rates raising the market changes. First concept to make this happen; if we wanted to make it the maximum number of units, then that's what would have happened. This is our proposal.

Justin Wyant 2314 S. Benton Place Kennewick 99337

Expressed concerns about directly north of the site there is a shelter belt of old growth trees with hawks, owls, falcons, kestrels and is a unique area. Questioned the environmental impact for 13 houses to be sandwiched in that space.

Staff Comments:

Mr. Halitsky noted that staff elicited comments from Fish & Wildlife relative to the proposal and will do so again for any potential re-zone and subdivision proposals for this area; did not receive any formal comment from any environmental agency yet.

Dave Retter, Owner's Representative – the owner has owned this property for a long time; when he approached us with this idea we said we would do our best to accommodate that; piece of ground surrounded by low density residential and the entire parcel could be developed with multiple homes; the owner could have sold it to a production builder instead.

DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST

The applicant requests to change 10.4 acres from Open Space to Low Density Residential.

COMPLIANCE WITH TITLE 4 (ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES)

KMC 4.12.110(7): Approval Criteria. The City may approve Comprehensive Plan Amendments and area-wide zone map amendments if it finds that the request meets one or more of the following:

- <u>The proposed amendment bears a substantial relationship to the public health, safety, welfare, and protection of the environment;</u> The proposed amendment will not allow the property to be rezoned to a zoning district that will permit uses which may have the potential to negatively impact the public health, safety, welfare and protection of the environment.
- <u>The proposed amendment is consistent with the requirements of Chapter 36.70A RCW and with the portion of the City's adopted comprehensive plan not affected by the amendment;</u> This amendment is consistent with the requirements of Chapter 36.70A RCW and with the portion of the City's adopted comprehensive plan not affected by the amendment.
- 3. <u>The proposed amendment corrects an obvious mapping error; or</u> This request does not correct a mapping error.

4. <u>The proposed amendment addresses an identified deficiency in the Comprehensive Plan.</u> *Table 2: Land Use Inventory* of the Comprehensive Plan identifies a deficit in lands designated as Open Space within the City. That said, 9.1 acres will remain as Open Space under the applicant's proposal.

KMC 4.12.110(8): Additional Factors. The City must also consider the following factors prior to approving Comprehensive Plan Amendments:

- <u>The effect upon the physical environment;</u> The proposal will allow for a small, 13-lot subdivision for patrons of the adjacent equestrian center. The subject parcel is surrounded by lower density, residential development, and the proposal is consistent with that aesthetic. As mentioned above, 9.1 acres of the current site will be reserved as Open Space. With much of that located to the south, east, and west, the area designated as Open Space will act as a buffer to existing residential neighborhoods. New construction shall be consistent with the adopted Single-Family Residential Design Standards.
- The effect on open space and natural features including, but not limited to topography, streams, rivers, and lakes;
 The applicant's proposal will remove 10.4 acros of Open Space for use as low Density Peridential.

The applicant's proposal will remove 10.4-acres of Open Space for use as Low Density Residential. The proposed development is clustered to preserve existing natural features and wetlands on-site. As indicated above, 9.1 acres of the subject property will be maintained as Open Space.

3. <u>The compatibility with and impact on adjacent land uses and surrounding neighborhoods;</u>

The proposal is consistent with existing land use patterns surrounding the property, which is designated as Low and Medium Density Residential. As indicated above, new development will be required to meet the adopted Single-Family Residential Design Standards, which mandate landscaping and lighting requirements to minimize impacts to adjacent properties.

- 4. <u>The adequacy of, and impact on community facilities, including utilities, roads, public transportation, parks, recreation, and schools;</u> The future use of the property will determine the adequacy and impact on community facilities. Currently, public amenities such as water and sewer exist along S Washington Street adjacent to the subject property. Neither the Public Works nor the Fire Departments have commented on the proposed application. Both will have an opportunity to comment and require upgrades once a future development application is submitted.
- 5. <u>The quantity and location of land planned for the proposed land use type and density and the demand for such land;</u> Comprehensive Plan Table 2: Land Inventory identifies a deficit of roughly 651-acres of land designated as Open Space within the City. Conversely, there is a surplus of 1,476-acres of land designated as Low Density Residential. The transfer of 10.4-acres from Open Space to Low Density Residential will not substantially effect either inventory. As previously mentioned, 9.1-acres of the subject parcel will remain Open Space. In addition, the single-family residential subdivision

envisioned will be consistent with existing development surrounding the property.

6. <u>The current and projected project density in the area; and</u>

The subject property is currently zoned Open Space and developed with an existing equestrian center. The proposed Low Density Residential designation allows single-family residential development with a minimum lot size of 7,500 square feet if rezoned as Residential, Low Density (10,500 square feet is rezoned to Residential, Suburban). Thus, a change in designation of 10.4

acres has the potential for 43-60 single-family lots depending on a future rezone to either RS or RL. The applicant currently envisions 13 lots.

<u>The effect, if any upon other aspects of the Comprehensive Plan.</u>
 The proposed change will not affect any other aspects of the Comprehensive Plan.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Staff has received no public comment either for or against the proposed amendment to date.

AGENCY COMMENTS

In a letter dated 22 June 2022, the Washington Department of Ecology indicated the subject property is located in an area that once held an historic orchard. Ground contamination from pesticides containing arsenic may be present. Soil testing is required and remediation may be necessary prior to any ground disturbing activities.

ANALYSIS OF REQUEST

The proposal is to change the land use designation of 10.4-acres from Open Space to Low Density Residential. As indicated in Exhibit A-3, the applicant's intent is to develop a 13-lot subdivision to accommodate patrons of the on-site equestrian center with nearby housing opportunities. The potential subdivision will access both S Washington Street and W 27th Avenue, and be clustered to avoid wetlands present on site and preserve 9.1-acres of currently designated Open Space.

Though the Comprehensive Plan identifies a current deficit in land designated as Open Space, with a surplus of land designated Low Density Residential, a change of 10.4-acres is not significant to either inventory. Moreover, the parcel has only been designated as Open Space since 2008, when a Comprehensive Plan Amendment (CPA 07-03) changed the land use designation from Low Density Residential. The subject parcel is surrounded by low and medium density residential subdivisions, and the future subdivision is consistent with that density. In addition, as currently drawn the potential residential development will be buffered from established residential neighborhoods to the south, east, and west by land designated Open Space. Columbia Canal Number 3 flanks the north property line.

Overall, the applicant's proposal is congruous with existing development patterns in the area. Future development is required to meet city regulations relative to zoning, traffic, landscaping, and lighting, and must be consistent with the Single-Family Residential Design Standards.

To date, no public comment has been received either for or against the applicant's proposal.

FINDINGS

- 1. The applicant is Dave Retter, Retter & Co., 329 N Kellogg St, Kennewick, WA 99336.
- 2. The owner is Libra Inc. (RJ and DC Hoch), 2921 S Auburn Pl, Kennewick, WA 99337.
- 3. The request is to change the land use designation from Open Space (OS) to Low Density Residential (LDR).
- 4. The application was received on 2 May 2022 and was routed for review to various City departments and other local, state and federal agencies for comment on 9 June 2022.
- 5. The site is currently served by municipal water and sewer.
- 6. Access to the site is currently provided from S Washington Street.
- 7. The proposed amendment is adjacent to Open Space and Low Density Residential designated lands.

- 8. A Determination of Non-Significance was issued on 18 July 2022 for this application. The appeal period for the determination ended on 1 August 2022.
- 9. A public hearing notification sign was posted on site 28 July 2022.
- 10. Notice of the public hearing for this application was published in the Tri-City Herald on 31 July 2022. Notices were also mailed to property owners within 300 feet of the site on 28 July 2022.
- 11. The proposed amendment bears a relationship to the public health, safety, welfare and protection of the environment in that it will not allow the property to be rezoned to a zoning district that will permit uses which may have the potential to negatively impact the public health, safety, welfare and protection of the environment.
- 12. This proposed amendment is consistent with the requirements of Chapter 36.70A RCW and with the portion of the City's adopted comprehensive plan not affected by the amendment.
- 13. The proposed amendment does not correct an obvious mapping error.
- 14. This request will not address an identified deficiency in the Comprehensive Plan.

CONCLUSIONS

- 1. Pursuant to Chapter 4.08 of the Kennewick Municipal Code, the lead agency has determined that the proposed amendment does not have a probable significant adverse impact on the environment.
- 2. The proposed amendment will change the land use designation for the subject parcel from Open Space (OS) to Low Density Residential (LDR).
- 3. The proposed amendment is consistent with the City of Kennewick Comprehensive Plan and will have minimal impact on other aspects of the plan.
- 4. The proposed amendment will allow for a low density subdivision associated with the existing equestrian facility.
- 5. Future development of the site has the potential to affect the traffic and park system. Park and Traffic Impact Fees will be determined by the type of development and assessed at the time of development.
- 6. Access to the site will remain via S Washington Street.



Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Pre-Threshold Consultation for the 2600 S. Washington Street Comprehensive Plan Amendment, proposed by Dave Retter. We have reviewed the environmental checklist and have the following comment.

TOXICS CLEAN-UP

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on your proposed project.

Historical aerial photos indicate a portion of the properties within the footprint of your proposed changes were occupied by orchard during the time period when lead arsenate was applied as a pesticide, often resulting in shallow soil contamination from lead and/or arsenic. **Ecology requires soil sampling** if vacant, commercial, industrial or agricultural properties are converted to residential use as there may be an increased risk of exposure to soil with elevated concentrations of arsenic and lead.

Ecology can provide sampling services at no cost. If sampling indicates elevated levels of lead and arsenic, there are simple steps that can be taken to reduce exposure to the public and Ecology can provide free technical assistance.

Additionally, Ecology uses Model Remedies to guide cleanup for lead and arsenic pesticide contamination in historical orchards of Central Washington. The Model Remedy document is an excellent source of technical guidance, and is available at https://apps.ecology.wa.gov/publications/documents/2109006.pdf



17. The proposed amendment is consistent with all applicable provisions of the Kennewick Municipal Code, including those adopted by reference from the Comprehensive Plan.

Conclusions:

- 1. Approval will implement the Comprehensive Plan Land Use Designation of Commercial.
- 2. Approval will not result in an increase of adverse environmental impacts.
- 3. Approval will implement Commercial Goals 2 and 3 of the City of Kennewick Comprehensive Plan.
- 4. Approval will result in the promotion of public necessity, convenience and/or general welfare.
- 5. The proposed Change of Zone complies with KMC 18.51.070(2).

Recommendation:

Staff has reviewed the application and recommends that the Planning Commission concur with the findings and conclusions contained in staff report COZ-2022-0011 and recommends approval to City Council.






Land Use Map



Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Pre-Threshold Consultation for the Ridgeline Drive Development. We have reviewed the environmental checklist and have the following comment.

WATER RESOURCES

If you plan to use water for dust suppression at your project site, be sure that you have a legal right. In Washington State, prospective water users must obtain authorization from the Department of Ecology before diverting surface water or withdrawing ground water, with one exception. Ground water withdrawals of up to 5,000 gallons per day used for single or group domestic supply, up to 5,000 gallons per day used for industrial purposes, stock watering, and for the irrigation of up to one-half acre of non-commercial lawn and garden are exempt from the permitting process. Water use under the RCW 90.44.050 exemption establishes a water right that is subject to the same privileges, restrictions, laws and regulations as a water right permit or certificate obtained directly from Ecology. Temporary permits may be obtainable in a short time-period. The concern of Water Resources is for existing water rights. In some instances water may need to be obtained from a different area and hauled in or from an existing water right holder.



Background and Overview

This property has been in the City of Kennewick's Urban Growth Boundary since 1996. The annexation area is located east of 5577 S Kent Street and north of 37123 S Olympia Street. The site is vacant and sloped from the NE to SW with areas that exceed 40%.

Urban growth

The annexation area lies within Kennewick's Urban Growth Area (UGA). The Growth Management Act established UGAs with the intent that future growth within cities be directed to areas where urban services are available or easily extended. UGAs are typically established adjacent to existing urban development. The existing land use designation for the annexation area is Low Density Residential.

Zoning

The proposed zoning for this area is Residential, Suburban (RS) which requires that each parcel be at least 10,500 square feet in size. It also allows the keeping of farm animals at a rate of one animal per half acre if the parcel is at least 30,000 square feet in size.

Infrastructure


This parcel is currently not served with city water, sewer or streets. The closest city utilities are in S Kent Street, which is 125 feet to the west of the site. Access to the site will be from S Kent Street and SR 397 to the south once the site is developed.

Findings

- 1. The annexation area lies entirely within the urban growth area.
- 2. Upon annexation, assumption of existing City indebtedness will be required by the property owners within the annexation area.
- 3. The zoning for the annexation area will be Residential, Suburban (RS).
- 4. Water and Sewer services do not exist in the annexation area. Water and sewer utilities are required to be extended by the site developer.
- 5. Access to the site is required to be extended from S Kent Street and SR 397 by the site developer.
- 6. Benton County #1 is currently the first responder to this area for fire and emergency medical services. Kennewick Fire Department provides backup. Should the area be annexed, Kennewick Fire Department will take the role as the first responder to the area for fire and medical services.
- 7. Benton County Sheriff is currently the first responder to this area. Kennewick Police Department currently provides backup. Should the area be annexed, Kennewick Police Department would be the first responder with Benton County Sheriff providing backup when needed.
- 8. The 60% petition was received on September 14, 2022.
- 9. A request for a Determination of Sufficiency was mailed to the Benton County Assessor on September 14, 2022. The Determination of Sufficiency was issued September 20, 2022.
- 10. Notice of the public hearing for this annexation was posted on November 17, 2022 in three locations in the annexation area as required by RCW 35A.14.130. One posted at 557 S Kent Street, one at the entrance to the Benton County Quarry on S Olympia Street and one at 37129 S Olympia Street.
- 11. Notice of the public hearing for this annexation was published in the Tri-City Herald on November 18, 2022 as required by RCW 35A.14.130.
- 12. Notices were mailed to the Benton County Treasurer, Benton County Assessor, Benton County Fire District #1 and appropriate utilities on September 27, 2022 as required by RCW 35A.14.801.

Recommendation

Staff recommends that City annex this area by adopting Ordinance 6001.



OPERATING AGREEMENT OF COLUMBIA BASIN DEVELOPERS OF KENNEWICK, LLC

THIS AGREEMENT of Columbia Basin Developers of Kennewick, LLC (the "Company") is made and entered into as of September 22, 2020, by the undersigned who by execution of this Operating Agreement ("Agreement") memorialize their membership in the Company. This Agreement supersedes and replaces the Operating Agreement dated January 1, 2012, as well as any other prior Operating Agreements of the Company.

ARTICLE I FORMATION OF COMPANY

- 1.1 *Formation*. The Company was originally formed on October 7, 1998, when the Certificate of Formation was executed and filed with the office of the Secretary of State in accordance with and pursuant to the Act.
- 1.2 *Name*. The name of the Company is "Columbia Basin Developers of Kennewick, LLC."
- 1.3 Principal Place of Business. The principal place of business of the Company is located at 7045 W. 31st Place, Kennewick, WA 99338. The Company may locate its place of business at any other place or places as the Members may from time to time deem advisable.
- 1.4 *Registered Office and Registered Agent*. The Company's registered agent and the address of its registered office in the State of Washington are as follows:

The registered office and registered agent may be changed by the Members from time to time.

ARTICLE II MEMBERS

2.1 *Members.* The names, current capital contributions, and percentages of interest of the members are set forth in **Exhibit A**, as amended or restated from time to time.

ARTICLE III MANAGEMENT

3.1 *Management*. The Company shall be managed by its Members.

3.2 Limitations on Authority of Members. No single Member has the authority to do the following acts without consent of a majority of the Members: (a) borrow money in excess of \$10,000.00; (b) sell any Company property or asset having a fair market value over \$10,000.00; (c) enter into any contract involving an anticipated total expenditure of over \$10,000.00; (d) do any act that would make it impossible to carry on the ordinary business of the Company; (e) compromise any claim over \$10,000.00; or (f) affect the status of the Company for Federal income tax purposes. "Majority" means consent from at least 51% of the Members.

ARTICLE IV CAPITAL CONTRIBUTIONS

- 4.1 *Members' Capital Contributions*. Each Member's contributions are set forth in **Exhibit A** hereto and each member is entitled to the number of Units set out in **Exhibit A**.
- 4.2 Additional Contributions. No Member shall be required to make any additional Capital Contributions. The Members may be permitted to make additional Capital Contributions if the Members determine such additional Capital Contributions are necessary or appropriate in connection with the conduct of the Company's business. In such event, all Members shall have the opportunity (but not the obligation) to participate in such additional Capital Contributions on a pro rate basis. Any additional Capital Contributions shall entitle the Member to additional ownership and adjustment of the sharing ratio.
- 4.3 *Capital Accounts.* A separate Capital Account will be maintained for each Member.

ARTICLE V ALLOCATIONS

- 5.1 Allocations of Net Profits and Net Losses from Operations. Except as may be required by § 704(c) of the Internal Revenue Code, net profits, net losses, and other items of income, gain, loss, deduction and credit shall be apportioned among the Members in proportion to their respective percentage interests in the Company.
- 5.2 *Monthly Distributions*. The Members shall decide the amount and type of monthly distributions to be paid to the Members.
- 5.3 *Interim Distributions.* From time to time, the Members shall determine in their reasonable judgment to what extent, if any, the Company's cash on hand exceeds the current and anticipated needs, without limitation, for operating expenses, debt service, reserves, and mandatory distributions, if any. To the extent such excess exists, the Members shall make distributions to each Member in accordance with their percentage interest or as otherwise decided.

- 5.4 *Limitation on Distributions*. No distributions shall be declared and paid unless, after the distribution is made, the assets of the Company are in excess of all liabilities of the Company, except liabilities to Members on account of their Capital Accounts.
- 5.5 *Rights of Return of Contribution*. Except as provided in Article VI, no Member has a right to have his membership interest redeemed or his capital contribution returned prior to the termination of the Company.
- 5.6 *Losses.* Losses shall be borne by the Members according to their percentage interest in the Company.

ARTICLE VI

BANKRUPTCY, DEATH, DISABILITY, WITHDRAWAL OR RESIGNATION OF MEMBER

- 6.1 *Triggering Event.* Upon the bankruptcy, death, disability, withdrawal or resignation of any member, judgment against any Member, or involuntary transfer of any units, the Company shall continue only at the option of the remaining Member(s). If the remaining Members elect to continue the Company, they shall have the option to purchase the withdrawing member's interest. The decision to continue or dissolve the Company, and to exercise the option, shall be made within ninety days from the event causing the withdrawal.
- 6.2 *Disability.* "Disability" shall be defined for purposes of this Operating Agreement as the effective date that due to a physical or mental condition a member is no longer capable of performing the essential functions of his/her job on a consistent and regular basis. In such an event, if the holders of the remaining Units in the Company elect to continue the Company, the disabled member shall receive the Purchase Price for his/her Membership interest.
- 6.3 *Withdrawal or Resignation.* Any Member of the Company may withdraw or resign at any time by giving written notice to all other Members of the Company. The withdrawal or resignation of any Member shall take effect upon receipt of notice thereof or at such later time as shall be specified in such notice; and, unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation or withdrawal shall not be necessary to make it effective.
- 6.4 *Purchase Price.* The Purchase Price of the Membership interest shall be the capital contribution of the Selling Member at the time of bankruptcy, death, disability, withdrawal or resignation. The bankruptcy, death, disability, withdrawal or resignation of a Member shall not entitle the Member, or the successor of the Member, to receive any distribution from the Company except in accordance with the terms of this Operating Agreement. Neither the Selling Member, nor the successor to such Member, shall be entitled to the return of his/her capital

contribution until the dissolution and termination of the Company or, if the remaining Member(s) elect to continue the Company, as set forth in Paragraph 6.5.

- 6.5 *Notice and Payment.* For purposes of exercising the option to purchase under this Operating Agreement, notice of exercise of the option shall be given to the Selling Member or his/her successor. The notice shall be within the times set forth in Paragraph 6.1 and payment of the capital contribution shall be made no later than one year after the occurrence of the event triggering the option to purchase or dissolve.
- 6.6 *Return of Capital Contribution.* Return of the Capital Contribution shall be made in cash or certified funds. The Purchasing Member(s) must also indemnify the Selling Member(s) from and against any and all indebtedness and other obligations of and to the Company and any and all guarantees, accommodations, and suretyships associated with any and all indebtedness and other obligations of the Company.

ARTICLE VII MISCELLANEOUS

- 7.1 *Governing Law.* This Agreement will be construed, and the rights, duties, and obligations of the parties will be determined in accordance with, the laws of the State of Washington, including but not limited to RCW 25.15 (the Washington Limited Liability Company Act).





OLYMPIA STREET, SOUTH OF THE KENNEWICK IRRIGATION DISTRICT DIVISION 4 CANAL AND NORTH OF STATE ROUTE 397 AND PROVIDING FOR ZONING CLASSIFICATION THEREOF OF RESIDENTIAL, SUBURBAN (RS) (AZ 21-02, COLUMBIA BASIN DEVELOPERS, LLC)

WHEREAS, the hereinafter described tract of land located East of South Olympia Street, South of the Kennewick Irrigation District Division 4 Canal and North of State Route 397 to be annexed to the City of Kennewick is not now incorporated and is contiguous to the City of Kennewick and situated in Benton County, Washington; and

WHEREAS, a good and sufficient petition has been filed for the annexation of this territory which complies with the requirements of law; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the aforesaid real property, notice of a desire for annexation was heretofore given by property owners holding more than ten percent (10%) in value of the assessed valuation of said real property, and pursuant to RCW 35A.14.120, the City Council has determined that it would require the assumption of indebtedness of the City of Kennewick contracted prior to or existing at the time of annexation; and

WHEREAS, notice of the time and place for hearing said petition was given by posting and publication as required by law and shown by the Affidavit of Posting and Affidavit of Publication now on file with the City Clerk; and

WHEREAS, the matter was duly considered by the City Council of the City of Kennewick at said hearing, and it was finally determined by said Council that annexation will be made with the assumption of indebtedness of the City of Kennewick contracted prior to or existing at the time of annexation; and

WHEREAS, it appears to the City Council that it would be beneficial to the residents of such nonincorporated area and to the residents of the City of Kennewick to annex the same; NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENNEWICK, WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Annexation of Real Property. That the real property described as follows:

THAT PORTION OF THE NORTHEAST QUARTER OF THE SOUTHWEST QUARTER AND THAT PORTION OF THE SOUTHEAST QUARTER OF SECTION 24, TOWNSHIP 08 NORTH, RANGE 29 EAST, W.M., LYING SOUTHWESTERLY OF THE KENNEWICK IRRIGATION DISTRICT CANAL RIGHT-OF-WAY, RECORDS OF BENTON COUNTY, WASHINGTON,

be and the same hereby is annexed to the City of Kennewick, and is hereby declared to be within the corporate limits of the City of Kennewick. Said property is located within Benton County, Washington.

Section 2. Zoning Classification. That the zoning classification shall be Residential, Suburban (RS).

Section 3. Property to be Part of City. That said territory thus annexed to the City of Kennewick from and after the effective date of this ordinance shall be part of the City of Kennewick.

<u>Section 4.</u> <u>Assumption of Prior Indebtedness</u>. The property within the annexed territory above-described shall be taxed or assessed to pay indebtedness of the City of Kennewick contracted prior to or existing at the time of such annexation. The annexed property shall not be released from taxes or assessments levied against it or from liability for payment of outstanding bonds or warrants issued prior to such annexation.

<u>Section 5.</u> <u>Copy of Annexation to be Filed and Recorded</u>. That a copy of this annexation shall be filed with the Board of County Commissioners of Benton County, Washington, in the manner required by law and also recorded in the Records of Benton County, Washington.

<u>Section 6</u>. <u>Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall take full force and effect five (5) days from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.
