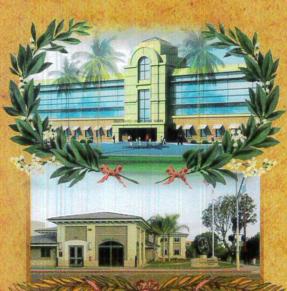

Residency requirements are listed if required in the chart above. If filling a resident requirement, applicant must reside within the City of National City at the time the application is submitted to be considered for the resident position.

Appointment:

Per City Council Policy #107 (D)(7):

The Mayor will make the motion to appoint (naming the appointee) and Councilmembers may second the motion. The City Clerk will then take a roll call vote of the City Council. A majority vote of the City Council will be required for the appointment. If, the majority of the City Council choose to deny the proposed appointment, the Mayor would propose an alternative candidate from the current application pool, or could choose to reopen the application period and return to City Council with a different applicant for consideration.

If the Mayoral Appointment is not approved by the majority of the City Council, that applicant is removed from the pool for that seat. The Mayor will return to a future meeting with a substitute Mayoral appointment.

Per City Council Policy #107 (D)(14)(3): Attendance

A Commissioner or Member of a Board, Committee, or Commission must be present at least one hour, or 50% of the entire meeting, whichever is less, to be counted as present for purposes of attendance.

Per City Council Policy #107 (D)(14)(3): Mandatory Training and Filing Requirements:

Commissioners and Members of Board, Committee, or Commission, as appointed by the legislative body, are entrusted with certain responsibilities and concomitant training and reporting. The following are requirements of Commissioners and Members of Boards, Commissions, and Committees. This training is required to be completed within 30 days of appointment or notification.

- 1. Oath of Office (Article XX of the California Constitution, and California Government Code Section 36507)
- 2. Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) Statement of Economic Interest Form 700 Filing (California Government Code Section 87100 et seq)
- 3. AB1234 Ethics Training (California Government Code Section 53235.1(b))
- 4. Anti-Sexual Harassment Training
- 5. Brown Act Training
- 6. Social Media Training
- 7. Any training required by State LavP, a Toede raf 448, or City Policies.

All training is offered in a variety of formats including in person, via Zoom, and training website/software, and pre-recorded video. Currently, these are all requirements of the Mayor and City Council, and City staff.

Per City Council Policy #107 (D)(10) **Re-appointment beyond two terms. Anyone wishing to be reappointed to any Board, Commission, or Committee and has <u>served two or more full terms already must be approved by a four-fifths vote of the City Council</u>. If all five members of the City Council are not present, or if one member abstains or recuses their vote, the four-fifths requirement shall be changed to require only a simple majority.

PURPOSE

To establish a procedure to serve as a guide in making appointments to various City Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The City currently has the following Boards, Commissions, and Committees to which this Policy applies:

Mayor's Appointments:

- 1. Board of Library Trustees
- 2. Community and Police Relations Commission
- 3. Park, Recreation, and Senior Citizens Advisory Committee
- 4. Public Art Committee
- 5. Sweetwater Authority
- 6. Traffic Safety Committee
- 7. Veterans and Military Families Advisory Committee

City Council Appointments:

- 1. Civil Service Commission
- 2. Planning Commission
- 3. Housing Advisory Committee including Ex-Officio Members
- 4. Port Commission

POLICY

Appointment Process

- A. Opportunity to apply. All interested individuals shall be given an opportunity to submit applications for vacancies on City Boards, Commissions, and Committees. Incumbent Appointees are not automatically re-appointed but are required to fill out an abbreviated application provided by the City Clerk, indicating their interest in continuing to serve.
- B. Unexpired terms. If an incumbent Appointee was appointed to fill an unexpired term and the Appointee serves for less than one year in that position, the Council may reappoint the incumbent without considering other applicants.
- C. Vacancies. When vacancies occur, the following procedure shall be followed:
 - Schedule vacancy. When a term is expiring or expires, public notice of the vacancy shall be made, inviting interested individuals to submit applications for the vacancy on a form provided by the City Clerk on the City website.

Unscheduled vacancy. An unscheduled vacancy shall be filled according to

Government Code Section 54974, which generally provides as follows: Whenever an unscheduled vacancy occurs, whether due to resignation, death, termination, or other causes, a special vacancy notice shall be posted in the Office of the City Clerk, the City website, outside City Hall on the Bulletin Board, and on City social media platforms not earlier than twenty (20) days before or not later than twenty (20) days after the vacancy occurs. The City Council shall not make a final appointment for at least ten (10) working days after posting the notice in designated locations. The notice's posting and application period shall be thirty (30) calendar days. However, if it finds that an emergency exists, the City Council may, fill the unscheduled vacancy immediately. According to this section, a person appointed to fill the vacancy shall serve only on an interim basis until the final appointment.

The end of term for the members of Boards, Commissions, and Committees generally occurs in an annual rotation during the months of March and September. Appointments will be considered at those times unless a vacancy resulting from a resignation results in the lack of a Quorum on the Board, Commission, or Committee, in which case the appointment could occur at the time of the unscheduled vacancy in accordance with the procedure set out above.

- 3. Government Code Section 40605, and National City Municipal Code Title 16, grants the Mayor, with the City Council's approvals, the authority to make all appointments unless otherwise explicitly provided by statute. The exceptions are:
 - 1. Civil Service Commission
 - 2. Planning Commission
 - 3. Housing Advisory Committee including Ex-Officio Members

The City Council fills vacancies on these bodies.

- D. Implementation. Implementation of Council policy for appointment to Boards, Commissions, and Committees requires the following:
 - 1. Per Government Code Section 54972, on or before December 31 of each year, the City Council shall prepare a list of appointments of all regular and ongoing Boards, Commissions, and Committees appointed by the City Council. The City Clerk will prepare the list of all regular and ongoing Boards, Commissions, and Committees appointed by the Mayor or the City Council. The list shall contain a list of all terms that will expire during the next calendar year, the incumbent appointee's name, the appointment date, the term's expiration date, and the position's necessary qualifications. It shall also include a list of all

Boards, Commissions, and Committees whose members serve at the City Council's pleasure and the qualifications required for each position. This Local Appointments List shall be made available to the public on the City website.

- 2. Notice. A public notice for vacancies must be placed in the newspaper of general circulation within the City, on the City's website, City Hall Bulletin Boards, and City social media platforms.
- 3. Expiration of term. All appointees will receive a letter as their terms expire asking if they would like to re-apply for the position.
- 4. Applications. Applications shall be available on the City website and in the City Clerk's Office. Submissions must be received before the advertised deadline for consideration for the appointment. All applications will be retained in the City Clerk's Office for one year from the date the application was submitted. During the one-year retention period of the application, an applicant shall be considered for other vacancies on Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The City Clerk's Office will notify the applicant being considered for an appointment to confirm that they are still interested in volunteering.
- A member may only serve on one (1) Board, Commission, or Committee at a time.
 If an applicant applies for another position on a different Board, Commission, or
 Committee, that applicant will forfeit the prior seat and a vacancy will occur per
 policy.

6. Interviews:

- a. Mayor Appointments: Interviews for Mayoral appointments will be conducted by the Mayor outside of the public meeting and scheduled by the Mayor's Office.
- b. City Council Appointments: Interviews for the four (4) Civil Service Commission, Planning Commission, Housing Advisory Committee, and Port Commission who serve at the City Council's pleasure and are appointed by the City Council as a body will be interviewed in the public forum at a City Council Meeting as described below.

7. Mayoral Appointments:

The Mayor will make the motion to appoint (naming the appointee) and Councilmembers may second the motion. The City Clerk will then take a roll call

vote of the City Council. A majority vote of the City Council will be required for the appointment. If the majority of the City Council choose to deny the proposed appointment, the Mayor shall either propose an alternative candidate from the current application pool or choose to reopen the application period and return to the City Council at a future City Council Meeting with a different applicant for consideration. If a Mayoral Appointment is not approved by the majority of the City Council by confirmation, that applicant is removed from the pool for that seat. The Mayor will return to a future meeting with a substitute Mayoral appointment.

- 8. For City Council Appointments, the Interview Process is as follows:
 - a. The City Clerk will provide an overview of the Board, Commission, or Committee(s) with current vacancy (ies). The Mayor will introduce the applicant and two (2) questions will be asked of each applicant on behalf of the City Council.
 - b. Each applicant is given two (2) minutes to make a brief introduction of themselves and their qualifications to the City Council.
 - c. Mayor and City Councilmembers will ask questions of each applicant. All applicants must be asked the same questions.
 - d. Total time per applicant is five (5) timed minutes with time allowed for clarification at the discretion of the City Council, not to exceed ten (10) minutes total per applicant.
 - e. All appointments and interviews before the City Council will be scheduled as needed to fill unexpected vacancies, with every effort to be made before an individual's term expires. Interviews may take place at one meeting, with appointments made at a subsequent meeting.
- 9. Vacancies for City Council Appointed Positions. If the vacancy is for a City Council appointed position, and there is more than one (1) applicant for a given position, the voting process will proceed as follows: Once the interviews are complete, each Councilmember votes for their choice via a written ballot provided by the City Clerk. Each Councilmember shall print and sign their name on the ballot. All ballots shall be considered a public record and be open to inspection by the public. The ballots are passed to the City Clerk who announces the number of votes for each candidate.

If the appointment process is conducted via a virtual meeting the process is the same except the ballot/vote process. The City Clerk's Office will provide a Vote Sheet (a piece of paper electronically) with the name of each applicant to be considered. The Mayor will count to three (3) and the Council will hold their vote sheet up in front of their face to make sure it is captured on the camera during the live virtual meeting. The City Clerk will tally the votes and will then confirm the votes with a verbal roll call. The applicant with the most votes is appointed.

In the event of a tie, each Councilmember votes again until one (1) candidate has the majority vote and is declared to be the newly–appointed member of the Board, Commission, or Committee.

10. Re-appointment beyond two terms. Anyone wishing to be re-appointed to any Board, Commission, or Committee and has served two or more full terms already must be approved by a four-fifths vote of the City Council. If all five members of the City Council are not present, or if one member abstains or recuses their vote, the four-fifths requirement shall be changed to require only a simple majority.

11. Report to Council:

All applications received for vacancies, whether Mayoral Appointment or City Council Appointment, will be attached to the staff report to Council. All applications will have private personal information redacted (name, street numbers and name of street address, and phone number). This redacted information is in alignment with Government Code Section 6255(a) because the public interest served by not disclosing the applicant's personal, private information and protection of the applicant's right to privacy outweighs the public interest served by disclosing that information.

- 12. An automatic vacancy upon becoming a Non-Resident. An unscheduled vacancy automatically occurs when a resident holding an appointment position on a City Board, Committee, or Commission becomes a non-resident by moving out of National City limits. When an unscheduled vacancy occurs due to a resident becoming a non-resident, the unscheduled vacancy may be filled as follows:
 - a. A special vacancy notice shall be posted in the Office of the City Clerk, and in other places as directed by the City Council, not earlier than 20 days before or not later than 20 days after the vacancy occurs. Final Appointment at a City Council Meeting shall not be made by the Appointing Authority for at least 10 working days after the posting of the notice in the City Clerk's Office.

b. The Appointing Authority may appoint the former resident to a Non-Residential position if a Non-Residential position is vacant.

However, the Appointing Authority may, if it finds that an emergency exists, fill the unscheduled vacancy immediately. A person appointed to fill the vacancy shall serve only on an acting basis until the final appointment is made pursuant to this section.

- 13. Only City Residents may be elected to Chair and Vice-Chair positions. To be eligible to be elected as the Chairperson of a City Board, Committee, or Commission, the member must be a resident of the City.
- 14. Resignations, Attendance, Training, and Removals

Resignation:

If a Commissioner or Member of a Board, Committee, or Commission is unable to continue serving because of health, business requirements, or personal reasons, a letter of resignation shall be submitted to the City Clerk, who will present to the City Council.

Attendance:

Regular attendance at meetings is critical to be effective operation of City Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The City Council relies on the advice of the City's Boards, Commissions, and Committees, which is the result of discussions among appointed members. The City Council anticipates that members of Boards, Committees, and Commissions shall make every reasonable effort to attend all regular and special meetings of their respective Boards, Commissions, and Committees, and to be prepared to discuss matters on their respective agendas.

A Commissioner or Member of a Board, Committee, or Commission shall be considered removed from any advisory board under the following conditions:

- 1. A Commissioner or Member of a Board, Committee, or Commission with unexcused absences from three consecutive regularly scheduled meetings.
- 2. A Commissioner or Member of a Board, Committee, or Commission misses more than 25% of the advisory body's meetings in a calendar year.

3. A Commissioner or Member of a Board, Committee, or Commission must be present at least one hour, or 50% of the entire meeting, whichever is less, to be counted as present for purposes of attendance.

Excused Absences:

An "excused absence" is only granted when absolutely necessary and preapproved if at all possible. The City Council encourages Boards, Commissions, and Committees to refrain from scheduling meetings on cultural and religious holidays in order to encourage full participation by all Commissioners, Board Members, and the public. The pre-approval of excused absences will be by the body as a whole and documented in the meeting minutes.

Excused absences are listed as follows:

- 1. Illness of the Commissioner or Member of the Board, Committee, or Commission, their family member, or their personal friend;
- 2. Business commitment of the Commissioner or Member of the Board, Committee, or Commission that interferes with the attendance at a meeting;
- 3. Attendance of the Commissioner or Member of the Board, Committee, or Commission at a funeral, religious service or ceremony, wedding, or other similarly-significant event; or
- 4. Other reason for which the Commissioner or Member of the Board, Committee, or Commission has given notice to the Chairperson or Secretary of their unavailability fifteen (15) days in advance, as long as the unavailability is not expected to last longer than 30 days.

Removal:

The Secretary or Lead of each Board, Commission, or Committee will report the attendance to the Office of the City Clerk on a monthly basis. If the attendance or absences fall within these guidelines, the Office of the City Clerk will prepare a report to City Council for review and possible removal of the Commissioner, Member, or Alternate sitting on the Board, Committee, or Commission. Any Commissioner, Member, or Alternate sitting on a Board, Committee, or Commission may be removed from office at any time by a simple majority vote of the City Council at a regularly scheduled Council meeting with or without cause.

Mandatory Training and Filing Requirements:

Commissioners and Members of Board, Committee, or Commission, as appointed by the legislative body, are entrusted with certain responsibilities and

concomitant training and reporting. The following are requirements of Commissioners and Members of Boards, Commissions, and Committees. This training is required to be completed within 30 days of appointment or notification.

- 1. Oath of Office (Article XX of the California Constitution, and California Government Code Section 36507)
- 2. Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) Statement of Economic Interest Form 700 Filing (California Government Code Section 87100 et seq)
- 3. AB1234 Ethics Training (California Government Code Section 53235.1(b))
- 4. Sexual Harassment Training
- 5. Brown Act Training
- 6. Social Media Training
- 7. Any training required by State Law, Federal Law, or City Policies.

All training is offered in a variety of formats including in person, via Zoom, training website/software, and pre-recorded video. Currently, these are all requirements of the Mayor and City Council, and City staff.

Removal:

Failure to complete any of these requirements within 30 days of the appointment date or date of notification is cause for automatic removal.

EXPLANATION:

SUMMARY

Under current adopted legislation of Assembly Bill 481, this Annual Report complies with the established guidelines for California Government Code Section 7072, which outlines the requirements for the use, training, approval, and procurement of existing "military equipment" and future military equipment acquisitions, in accordance with, California Assembly Bill 481 (AB-481), codified in California Government Code sections 7070-7075. Additionally, this procedure outlines the fiscal impact and specific descriptions of existing military equipment within the Department's inventory.

BACKGROUND

On September 30, 2021, the Governor of the State of California approved AB-481 requiring law enforcement agencies to obtain approval of the applicable governing body (Mayor and City Council), by adoption of a military equipment use policy. The National City Police Department was required to seek City Council approval of their military equipment use procedure by ordinance at a regular open meeting prior to taking certain actions relating to the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment. The City Council adopted the Police Department's military use equipment policy and procedure on March 15, 2022, with the adoption of Ordinance 2022-2496.

Assembly Bill 481 allows the governing body to approve the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment within its jurisdiction only if it determines that the military equipment meets specified standards. The ordinance is subject to annual City Council review to determine whether, based on an annual military equipment report, the standards set forth in the approving ordinance have been met. The City Council may renew the authorizing ordinance, disapprove authorization for

particular military equipment where standards have not been met, or require modifications to this military equipment use procedure to address any non-compliance with standards.

Finally, Assembly Bill 481 requires the publication of this military equipment use procedure and the annual military equipment report on the Department's website. The military equipment use procedure and annual report must be posted on the website at least 30 days prior to the Council meeting.

The National City Mayor and City Council approved the 2022 Annual Report on April 18, 2023, via Resolution #2023-44.

FISCAL IMPACT

The items below are being requested for approval as required by AB 481: The costs are estimated with tax and shipping costs and will be purchased with general funds and grant funds.

BINDING REQUIREMENTS

The National City Police Department retains and employs a wide variety of "military equipment" to assist in safely achieving the furtherance of its mission statement to maintain public safety by providing the highest quality police services to our community. While the inventory of military equipment is varied, the mere possession of the equipment does not warrant its use for every incident.

Per California Assembly Bill 481, without the approval of the of Annual Use Report as well as the National City Police Department's Policy 706 and Procedure 706, the police department will be unable to equip police officers responding to critical incidents.

During this reporting period there were no required changes to Policy 706 and Procedure 706 and the standards set forth in Ordinance 2022-2496 have been met.

Staff recommends that the Mayor and City Councilmembers approve the proposed Assembly Bill 481 Military Equipment Annual Report, titled "National City Police Department AB 481 2023 Annual Report," renew ordinance 2022-2496 with no amendments, and authorize the purchase of additional military equipment to include two mid-size unmanned aerial vehicles with accessories, two small unmanned aerial vehicles for indoors with accessories, one tactical wheeled robot, one Lenco Bearcat Armored Rescue vehicle and two SWAT rifles.

Under current adopted legislation, this Annual Report complies with the established guidelines under California Government Code Section 7072, which outlines the requirements for the use, training, approval, and procurement of existing "military equipment" and future military equipment acquisitions in accordance with California Assembly Bill 481 (AB-481), codified in California

Government Code sections 7070-7075. Additionally, this report outlines the fiscal impact and specific descriptions of existing military equipment within the Department's inventory.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

Appropriations for the purchase of the two Unmanned Aerial Vehicles, two Daniel Defense Rifles, one Tactical R/C Robot equipment, estimated at \$21,031, is included in the Police Department's FY2024 budget. The funding for the Lenco Bearcat Armored Rescue Vehicle, estimated at \$463,000, will come from a federal UASI grant that was awarded in late 2023 but will not be received until October 2024. At that time, acceptance of the grant funds and corresponding budget adjustment will go before the City Council for approval.

Executive Summary

On September 30, 2021, California Governor Gavin Newsom approved Assembly Bill 481, requiring law enforcement agencies to obtain approval from the applicable governing body (Mayor and City Council), by adoption of a military equipment use policy. The National City Police Department is required to seek City Council approval of their Military Equipment Use Policy at a regular open meeting prior to taking certain actions relating to the funding, acquisition, and use of military equipment.

Assembly Bill 481 allows the governing body to approve the funding, acquisition, and use of military equipment within its jurisdiction, only if it determines that the military equipment meets specified standards. The Military Equipment Use Policy is subject to City Council review to determine whether the standards set forth in Assembly Bill 481 have been met, based upon an Annual Military Equipment Use Report.

Finally, Assembly Bill 481 requires publication of the Military Equipment Use Policy and the Annual Military Equipment Use Report on the Department's website.

Assembly Bill 481

California Government Code section 7072 states the following:

(a) A law enforcement agency that receives approval for a military equipment use policy pursuant to Section 7071 shall submit to the governing body an annual military equipment report for each type of military equipment approved by the governing body within one year of approval, and annually thereafter for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The law enforcement agency shall also make each annual military equipment report required by this section publicly available on its internet website for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The annual military equipment report shall, at a minimum, include the following information for the immediately preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment:

- (1) A summary of how the military equipment was used and the purpose of its use.
- (2) A summary of any complaints or concerns received concerning the military equipment.
- (3) The results of any internal audits, any information about violations of the military equipment use policy, and any actions taken in response.
- (4) The total annual cost for each type of military equipment, including acquisition, personnel, training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrade, and other ongoing costs, and from what source funds will be provided for the military equipment in the calendar year following submission of the annual military equipment report.
- (5) The quantity possessed for each type of military equipment.
- (6) If the law enforcement agency intends to acquire additional military equipment in the next year, the quantity sought for each type of military equipment.
- (b) Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing an annual military equipment report pursuant to this section, the law enforcement agency shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the general public may discuss and ask questions regarding the annual military equipment report and the law enforcement agency's funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

In addition to maintaining the highest levels of public safety, The National City Police Department is committed to transparency, public trust, community partnerships, and compliance with the law. As such, the Department has authored the following 2023 Annual Military Equipment Use Report in accordance with annual reporting requirements set forth in California Government Code section 7072.

Introduction

The National City Police Department possesses and utilizes a variety of equipment to safely resolve critical incidents and restore public safety. Some of the equipment is categorized as "military equipment" according to Assembly Bill 481. The use of such equipment may greatly assist the department in the furtherance of its mission. The National City Police Department's Mission; "In partnership with our community, the National City Police Department is committed to providing the highest level of service and public safety. We will pursue this commitment with an unwavering resolve while always respecting the rights and dignity of those we serve." While the inventory of military equipment varies, the use may not be necessary for every incident.

The National City Police Department recognizes that critical incidents can be unpredictable and very dangerous to both officers and the community. Therefore, having a variety of equipment options may assist incident commanders, specialized units and officers in bringing those incidents to a swift and safe resolution. The use of military equipment is restricted to certain instances and in some cases only by certain officers and/or units. The use of the Department's military equipment is continuously evaluated and the use of such equipment by department personnel is influenced by the totality of the circumstances, public safety, officer safety, civil rights, State law, and information available at the time of the equipment's use.

It is incumbent upon incident commanders, supervisors, individual officers, and specific specialized units to recognize the particular circumstances wherein military equipment should be employed to enhance the safety of the public and officers, and to bring a critical incident to a safe resolution.

This Annual Military Equipment Use Report outlines a summary of military equipment usage guidelines, inventory, fiscal impact, complaints, and reported concerns for the time period of March 2, 2023 – March 1, 2024.

Definitions

Pursuant to AB-481, the following definitions are applicable only to the Department's current military equipment inventory and potential future military equipment acquisitions for operational needs. (For a more detailed list, refer to Government Code section 7070, for "military equipment" as defined within the Assembly Bill.)

"Governing body" means the National City, City Council and Mayor.

"Military equipment" means the following:

- Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAV's) and Robots: Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles. This definition applies to the Department's inventory of small Unmanned Aircraft Systems (sUAS) and SWAT robots.
- 2. Armored Personnel Carrier: Commercially produced wheeled personnel carrier used for law enforcement purposes.
- 3. Multi-Purpose Wheeled Vehicles: Command and Control vehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operational control and direction of public safety units. This definition applies to the following vehicles:
 - a. Mobile Command Vehicle
 - b. Crisis Negotiations Team (CNT) Van
 - c. Sky Watch Tower
- 4. Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature. However, items designed to remove a lock, such as bolt cutters, or a handheld ram designed to be operated by one person, are specifically excluded from this definition. This definition applies to all of the Department's inventory of breaching shotguns, and breaching shotgun rounds, which are all maintained by the SWAT team.
- 5. Ammunition of .50 Caliber or Greater: however, standard issue shotgun ammunition is specifically excluded from this definition.
- 6. Specialized Firearms / Ammunition less than .50 Caliber: including assault weapons as defined in Sections 30510 and 30515 of the Penal Code, with the exception of standard issue service weapons and ammunition of less than .50

- caliber that are issued to officers, agents, or employees of a law enforcement agency or a state agency.
- 7. Any firearm or firearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles.
- 8. "Flashbang" grenades and explosive breaching tools, "tear gas," and "pepper balls," excluding standard, service-issued handheld pepper spray. This definition applies to all of the Department's inventory of flashbangs, pepper ball launchers and related ammunition. Additionally, this definition applies to all of the Department's inventory of various chemical agents and chemical agent delivery systems maintained by the SWAT Unit. These delivery systems are capable of dispersing chemical agents via burning, expulsion, liquid, or fog.
- 9. The following projectile launch platforms and their associated munitions: 40mm projectile launchers, "bean bag," rubber bullet, and specialty impact munition (SIM) weapons. This definition applies to all of the Department's inventory of 40 mm projectile launchers, which include 40 mm multi-launchers and bean bag shotguns, as well as all associated munitions. This definition also applies to the Department's inventory of SIM ammunition and SIM modified weapons utilized by the SWAT Unit, In-Service Training Unit, and Police Academy for training.
- 10. Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight.
- 11. "Military equipment" does not include general equipment not designated as prohibited or controlled by the federal Defense Logistics Agency.

"Military equipment use policy" refers to the National City Police Department Policy and Procedure and means a publicly released, written document governing the use of military equipment by the Department that addresses, at a minimum, all of the following:

- 1. A description of each type of military equipment, the quantity sought, its capabilities, expected lifespan, and product descriptions from the manufacturer of the military equipment.
- 2. The purposes and authorized uses for which the Department proposes to use each type of military equipment.

- 3. The fiscal impact of each type of military equipment, including the initial costs of obtaining the equipment and estimated annual costs of maintaining the equipment.
- 4. The legal and procedural rules that govern each authorized use.
- 5. The training, including any course required by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training, that must be completed before any sworn member is allowed to use each specific type of military equipment to ensure the full protection of the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties and full adherence to the military equipment use policy.
- 6. The mechanisms to ensure compliance with the military equipment use policy, including which independent persons or entities have oversight authority, and, if applicable, what legally enforceable sanctions are put in place for violations of the policy.
- 7. The procedures by which members of the public may register complaints or concerns or submit questions about the use of each specific type of military equipment, and how the Department will ensure that each complaint, concern, or question receives a response in a timely manner.

Outreach and Community Engagement

The National City Police Department is committed to being "A trusted community partner since 1887" with the community of National City. As the department aspires to enhance our community relationships, we want to ensure we are transparent in the way our department operates and engages with the public. The National City Police Department frequently displays select military equipment during outreach and community events as a means of public awareness, transparency, education, and building relationships.

The National City Police Department believes in Community Engagement and the opportunity to enhance relations. Therefore, within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing the annual report, the department shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the department should discuss the report and respond to public questions regarding the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

Summary of Military Equipment

The National City Police Department's inventory of military equipment is varied and may fluctuate regularly, in particular the consumable items such as ammunition, chemical agents, or less lethal systems. This fluctuation in the inventory is based on several factors such as use for training, maintenance, deterioration, expiration, and manufacturer's guidelines for replacement. The National City Police Department recognizes that critical incidents are unpredictable and can be very dynamic in nature, and the mere possession of the military equipment does not warrant its use for every incident. A variety of military equipment options can greatly assist incident commanders, officers, and specific units in bringing those incidents to a peaceful resolution in a peaceful and safe manner. The use of military equipment is restricted for use only in certain instances and in some cases only by certain units or officers trained and certified for it use.

The following sections outline the various types, descriptions, and guidelines for the use of military equipment from March 2, 2023 – March 1, 2024.

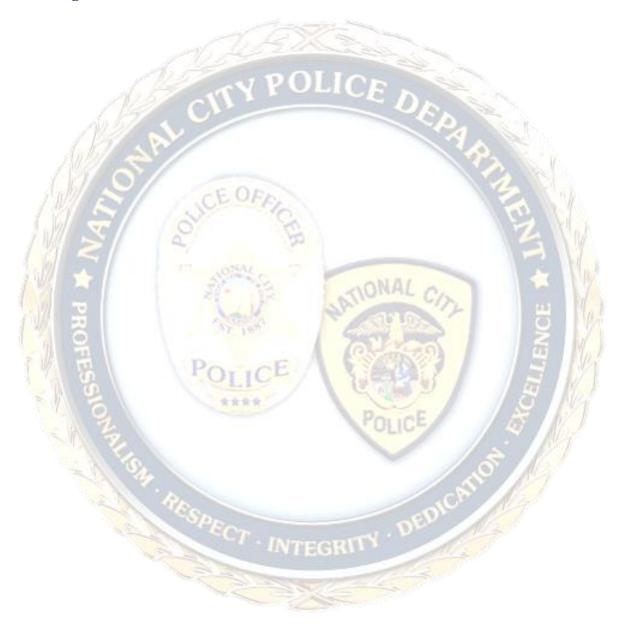

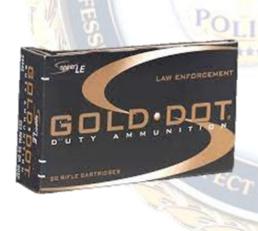

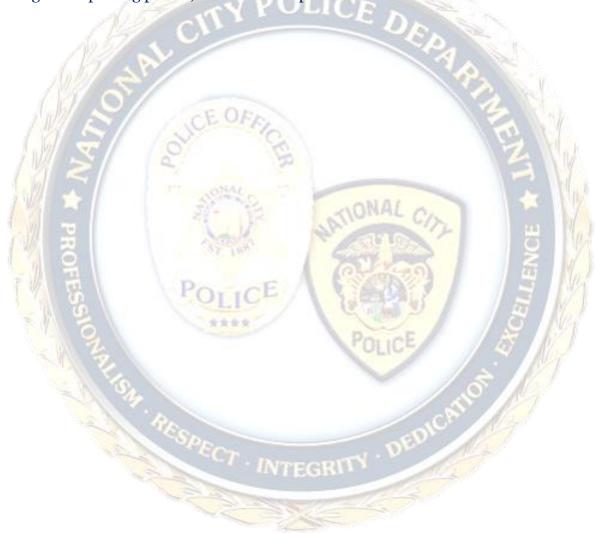

Internal Audit

The department conducted an audit on Military Equipment Use for this annual reporting period. The results are listed below.

Results

The department had purchased fifteen (15) additional patrol rifles in 2020, prior to last year's AB481 reporting requirements, which brought our listed inventory from (40), which was documented on the approved Military Equipment Use Policy, to fifty-five (55). This update has been reflected in the inventory section of this report.

The department had (27) shotguns documented under the "shotgun" category, as well as (7) documented under the less lethal "shotgun" category in the Military Equipment Use Policy. Less Lethal conversion kits (orange stocks and fore-ends) had already been purchased to convert the existing inventory of lethal shotguns to less lethal shotguns. This report updates the correct numbers of Lethal and Less Lethal Shotguns.

The department purchased additional .308 rifle ammunition as a result of changes in the industry standard of rifle ammunition, purchase cost and availability. The rifle ammunition was of the same manufacturer and of the same caliber, but was a different model than documented in the Military Equipment Use procedure. Due to the fact that the item is a consumable item, and based on the factors addressed above, additional ammunition was ordered to maintain a supply. This information was updated in this report and addressed here as well as in Attachment A.

706.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for the approval, acquisition, and reporting requirements of military equipment (Government Code § 7070; Government Code § 7071; Government Code § 7072).

706.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include (Government Code § 7070):

Governing body – The elected or appointed body that oversees the Department.

Military equipment – Includes but is not limited to the following:

- Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles.
- Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicles or armored personnel carriers.
- High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles (HMMWV), two-and-one-half-ton trucks, five-ton trucks, or wheeled vehicles that have a breaching or entry apparatus attached.
- Tracked armored vehicles that provide ballistic protection to their occupants.
- Command and control vehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operational control and direction of public safety units.
- Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.
- Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature. This
 does not include a handheld, one-person ram.
- Firearms and ammunition of .50 caliber or greater, excluding standard-issue shotguns and standard-issue shotgun ammunition.
- Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber, including firearms and accessories identified as assault weapons in Penal Code § 30510 and Penal Code § 30515, with the exception of standard-issue firearms.
- Any firearm or firearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles.
- Noise-flash diversionary devices and explosive breaching tools.
- Munitions containing tear gas or OC, excluding standard, service-issued handheld pepper spray.
- TASER® Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and long-range acoustic devices (LRADs).
- Kinetic energy weapons and munitions.
- Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight.

706.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the National City Police Department that members of this department comply with the provisions of Government Code § 7071 with respect to military equipment.

706.3 MILITARY EQUIPMENT COORDINATOR

The Chief of Police should designate a member of this department to act as the military equipment coordinator. The responsibilities of the military equipment coordinator include but are not limited to:

- (a) Acting as liaison to the governing body for matters related to the requirements of this policy.
- (b) Identifying department equipment that qualifies as military equipment in the current possession of the Department, or the equipment the Department intends to acquire that requires approval by the governing body.
- (c) Conducting an inventory of all military equipment at least annually.
- (d) Collaborating with any allied agency that may use military equipment within the jurisdiction of National City Police Department (Government Code § 7071).
- (e) Preparing for, scheduling, and coordinating the annual community engagement meeting to include:
 - 1. Publicizing the details of the meeting.
 - 2. Preparing for public questions regarding the department's funding, acquisition, and use of equipment.
- (f) Preparing the annual military equipment report for submission to the Chief of Police and ensuring that the report is made available on the department website (Government Code § 7072).
- (g) Establishing the procedure for a person to register a complaint or concern, or how that person may submit a question about the use of a type of military equipment, and how the Department will respond in a timely manner.

706.4 MILITARY EQUIPMENT INVENTORY

The following constitutes a list of qualifying equipment for the Department:

706.5 APPROVAL

The Chief of Police or the authorized designee shall obtain approval from the governing body by way of an ordinance adopting the military equipment policy. As part of the approval process, the Chief of Police or the authorized designee shall ensure the proposed military equipment policy is submitted to the governing body and is available on the department website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue (Government Code § 7071). military equipment policy must be approved by the governing body prior to engaging in any of the following (Government Code § 7071):

- (a) Requesting military equipment made available pursuant to 10 USC § 2576a.
- (b) Seeking funds for military equipment, including but not limited to applying for a grant, soliciting or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers.
- (c) Acquiring military equipment either permanently or temporarily, including by borrowing or leasing.
- (d) Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or other use of military equipment within the jurisdiction of this department.
- (e) Using any new or existing military equipment for a purpose, in a manner, or by a person not previously approved by the governing body.
- (f) Soliciting or responding to a proposal for, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use, or collaborate in the use of military equipment.
- (g) Acquiring military equipment through any means not provided above.

706.6 COORDINATION WITH OTHER JURISDICTIONS

Specific guidelines for the use of military equipment by allied agencies is outlined in Procedure 706.

706.7 ANNUAL REPORT

Upon approval of a military equipment policy, the Chief of Police or the authorized designee should submit a military equipment report to the governing body for each type of military equipment approved within one year of approval, and annually thereafter for as long as the military equipment is available for use (Government Code § 7072).

The Chief of Police or the authorized designee should also make each annual military equipment report publicly available on the department website for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The report shall include all information required by Government Code § 7072 for the preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment in department inventory.

706.8 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing the annual report, the Department shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the Department should discuss the report and respond to public questions regarding the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

706.1 MILITARY EQUIPMENT PROCEDURES

PURPOSE

This policy establishes guidelines for the acquisition, funding, use and reporting of "military equipment," as the term is defined in Government Code section 7070. This policy is provided to fulfill the obligations set forth in Assembly Bill No. 481. These obligations include but are not limited to seeking approval on specific items deemed to be military equipment and requirements related to compliance, annual reporting, cataloging, and complaints regarding these items.

POLICY

It is the policy of the National City Police Department that there are legally enforceable safeguards, including transparency, oversight, and accountability measures in place to protect the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties before military equipment is funded, acquired, or used.

PHILOSOPHY

The acquisition of military equipment and its deployment in our communities may impact the public's safety and welfare. The public has a right to know about any funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment by local government officials, as well as a right to participate in any government agency's decision to fund, acquire, or use such equipment. Decisions regarding whether and how military equipment is funded, acquired, or used should give strong consideration to the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties, and should be based on meaningful public input.

PROCEDURE

- A. DEFINITIONS
- Governing Body The elected or appointed entity that oversees the National City Police Department
- 2. Military Equipment Any of a wide variety of items as defined by California Government Code section 7070, subsections (c)(1) through (c)(16).
- B. GENERAL
- 1. The Department shall obtain approval of the governing body annually prior to engaging in any of the following activities:
- (a) Requesting military equipment made available pursuant to Section 2576a of Title 10 of the United States Code.
- (b) Seeking funds for military equipment including, but not limited to, applying for a grant, soliciting or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers.
- (c) Acquiring military equipment either permanently or temporarily, including by borrowing or leasing.

- (d) Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or other use of military equipment within the territorial jurisdiction of the governing body.
- (e) Using any new or existing military equipment for a purpose, in a manner, or by a person not previously approved by the governing body pursuant to general order.
- (f) Soliciting or responding to a proposal for, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use, or collaborate in the use of, military equipment.
- (b) In seeking the approval of the governing body, the Department shall submit a proposed military equipment use policy, or subsequent amendments, to the City Council and the public via the law enforcement agency's internet website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue.
- C. MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE CONSIDERATIONS
- 1. The military equipment acquired and authorized by the Department is:
- (a) Necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
- (b) Reasonably cost effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
- 2. Military equipment shall only be used by a Department employee after applicable training, including any course required by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training, has been completed, unless exigent circumstances arise.
- 3. On occasion, the Department may be required to assist other law enforcement agencies in a formal Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Request (LEMA) or support with day to day operational collaboration (i.e. pursuits, investigative unit assistance, joint law enforcement operations, etc.). In certain mutual aid or operational collaboration circumstances, it may be necessary for sworn Department members to utilize military equipment in order to fulfill an assigned mission (i.e. civil unrest, SWAT requests, barricaded suspects in a vehicle, etc.). When sworn Department members utilize military equipment in instances of mutual aid or law enforcement collaboration, the following shall apply:
- (a) Department members are required to adhere to the Department's Military Equipment policy and <u>all</u> policies and procedures outlined within the National City Police Department's Policy and Procedures Manual, regardless of operational jurisdiction.
- (b) Should the National City Police Department request mutual aid from another law enforcement agency <u>within the City of National City</u> and military equipment is required during the course of the response, the following shall apply:
- i. The National City Police Department shall remain in charge of the overall incident command.
- ii. The Incident Commander or their designee shall brief the supervisor from the assisting agency and inform them of the mission, enforcement posture, and any pertinent information related to the incident.

iii. Military equipment used by any member of this jurisdiction shall be approved for use and in accordance with this Department policy. Military equipment used by other jurisdictions that are providing mutual aid to this jurisdiction shall comply with their respective military equipment use policies in rendering mutual aid. If the Incident Commander is informed of or witnesses the utilization of military equipment by an assisting agency inconsistent with the guidelines outlined in this procedure, the Incident Commander may elect to cancel the request for mutual aid or re-assign the assisting agency to a different support mission.

D. MILITARY EQUIPMENT REPORTING CONSIDERATIONS

The Department shall submit an annual military equipment report to City Council that addresses each type of military equipment possessed by the Department.

- 1. The Department shall also make each annual military equipment report publicly available on its internet website for as long as the military equipment is available for use.
- 2. The annual military equipment report shall, at a minimum, include the following information for the immediately preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment:
- (a) A summary of how the military equipment was used and the purpose of its use.
- (b) A summary of any complaints or concerns received concerning the military equipment.
- (c) The results of any internal audits, any information about violations of the military equipment use policy, and any actions taken in response.
- (d) The total annual cost for each type of military equipment, including acquisition, personnel, training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrade, and other ongoing costs, and from what source funds will be provided for the military equipment in the calendar year following submission of the annual military equipment report.
- (e) The quantity possessed for each type of military equipment.
- (f) If the Department intends to acquire additional military equipment in the next year, the quantity sough for each type of military equipment.

E. CATALOGING OF MILITARY USE EQUIPMENT

- 1. All military use equipment kept and maintained by the National City Police Department shall be cataloged in a way which addresses each of the following requirements:
- 2. The manufacturer's description of the equipment.
- 3. The capabilities of the equipment.
- 4. The purposes and authorized uses for which the Department proposes to use the equipment.
- 5. The expected lifespan of the equipment.
- 6. The fiscal impact of the equipment, both initially and for on-going maintenance.

7. The quantity of the equipment, whether maintained or sought.

F. COMPLIANCE

- 1. The Department Internal Affairs Division will ensure that all Department members comply with this policy. Internal Affairs will conduct an annual audit with the assistance of the Range Staff. The Chief of Police or designee will be notified of any policy violations and, if needed, the violation(s) will be referred to the Internal Affairs and handled in accordance with National City Police Department's Policy and Procedures. All instances of non-compliance will be reported to City Council via the annual military equipment report.
- 2. Any member of the public can register a question or concern regarding military use equipment by contacting the National City Police Department's Internal Affairs Unit.
- 3. Any member of the public can submit a complaint to any member of the Department and in any form (i.e. in person, telephone, email, etc.). Once the complaint is received, it should be routed to the Internal Affairs Unit for investigation.

G. FUNDING

The Department shall seek council approval for military equipment, including, but not limited to, applying for a grant, soliciting or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers.

1. The Department has authority to apply for funding prior to obtaining council approval in the case of exigent circumstances. The Department shall obtain council approval as soon as practicable.

- 2. When the military items are classified as "consumable ammunition or munitions," the National City-City Council gives the police department prior approval to purchase such items. This will be granted without re-occurring approval for the following:
- (a) When stocks of military equipment that has been previously authorized have reached significantly low levels or are exhausted, the Department may re-supply consumable items in order to reach an operational level. The Department may resupply the consumable items in that calendar year without prior City Council approval to maintain essential availably for the Department's needs.

The City of National City ("City") engages outside legal support for specialized areas. Matters involving the San Diego Unified Port District require specialized expertise related to the Public Trust Doctrine and other specialized laws, regulations and policies involving the waterfront. The City Attorney's Office negotiated a new retainer agreement with Devaney Pate Morris & Cameron, LLP. AGREEMENT FOR LEGAL SERVICES BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF NATIONAL CITY AND DEVANEY PATE MORRIS & CAMERON, LLP

THIS AGREEMENT FOR LEGAL SERVICES (the "Agreement") is made as of the ____day of January, 2024 between THE CITY OF NATIONAL CITY, a municipal corporation, (the "CITY") and DEVANEY PATE MORRIS & CAMERON, LLP, (the "FIRM"). This Agreement sets forth the parties' mutual understanding concerning legal services to be provided by the FIRM and the fee arrangement for said services.

- Article 1. Retainer. The CITY hereby retains the FIRM to assist in representing the CITY in connection with matters related to San Diego Port District, subject to this Agreement.
- Article 2. <u>Effective Date and Term.</u> This Agreement shall be effective on January _____, 2024 and continue until written notice of cancellation. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by either party with sixty (60) days' written notice to the other. Notice of termination by the FIRM shall be given to the City Attorney.
- Article 3. Scope of Services. The CITY shall have the right in its sole discretion to determine the particular services to be performed by the FIRM under this Agreement. These services may include the following: Consultation with the City Attorney and City Management on land use matters concerning bayfront development, securing entitlements for bayfront development, advocating City matters before the San Diego Unified Port District, advocating City development programs before the California Coastal Commission, aiding in developing funding sources from the San Diego Unified Port District, providing strategic methodologies to advance the City's interest along the bayfront, advice and counsel to the City Council, and communications with City staff as per the attached Proposal Letter. In addition, the City may increase the scope of work with the FIRM's agreement, and such additional work will be confirmed via a letter that shall bring such work within the scope of this agreement. It is expected that the FIRM will work with the City Attorney and CITY staff.
- **Article 4.** <u>Compensation</u>. Compensation paid under this Agreement shall be as set forth in the Proposal Letter.
- A. The FIRM shall not use more than one attorney for the same specific task without the CITY'S approval. The FIRM may use the minimum number of attorneys for this engagement consistent with good professional practice after consulting with and obtaining approval by the CITY.
- B. The FIRM agrees to document a plan and budget consistent with the scope of services described above in Article 3 to be agreed to by the City Attorney and the FIRM. The CITY shall not be obligated to pay the FIRM amounts not discussed, budgeted, and agreed to before being incurred by the FIRM.

- C. The CITY has appropriated or otherwise duly authorized the payment of an amount not to exceed \$25,000.00 for the Services identified in Article 3. In no event shall the total fees plus out-of-pocket disbursements exceed this amount without written authorization of the CITY.
- D. The FIRM shall keep the CITY advised monthly as to the level of attorney hours and client services performed under Article 1. The FIRM will charge the CITY for travel time from the FIRM'S San Diego Office.
- E. The CITY further agrees to reimburse the FIRM, in accordance with the procedures set forth in this Article, for telephone, fax, mail, messengers, federal express deliveries, document reproduction, client-requested clerical overtime, lodging, and similar out-of-pocket expenses charged by the FIRM as a standard practice to its clients generally, with the exception of travel and meals. In any billing for disbursements, the FIRM shall provide the CITY with a statement breaking down the amounts by category of expense. The following items shall not be reimbursed, unless the CITY has specifically agreed otherwise:
- (1) Word Processing, clerical or secretarial charges, whether expressed as a dollar disbursement or time charge.
- (2) Storage of open or closed files, rent, electricity, local telephone, postage, receipts or transmission of telecopier documents, or any other items traditionally associated with overhead.
 - (3) Photocopy charges in excess of \$.15 (fifteen cents) per page.
- (4) Auto mileage rates in excess of the rate approved by the Internal Revenue Service for income tax purposes.
- (5) Secretarial overtime. Where case requirements demand overtime, the CITY will consider reimbursement on a case-by-case basis. The CITY will not reimburse overtime incurred for the convenience of the FIRM'S failure to meet deadlines known in advance.
- (6) Equipment, books, periodicals, research materials, Westlaw/Lexis or like items.
- (7) Express charges, overnight mail charges, messenger services or the like, without the CITY'S prior consent. The CITY expects these expenses to be incurred in emergency situations only. Where case necessity requires the use of these services, the CITY will consider reimbursement on a case-by-case basis.
 - (8) Travel and meals.
 - (9) Late payment charge or interest after 30-days of receipt of approved invoice.
- F. Bills from the FIRM should be submitted to Barry Shultz., City Attorney, 1243 National City Boulevard, National City, CA 91950-4301. The individual time and disbursement records customarily maintained by the FIRM for billing evaluation and review purposes shall be made available to the CITY in support of bills rendered by the FIRM.
- G. The FIRM agrees to forward to the CITY a statement of account for each one-month period of services under this Agreement, and the CITY agrees to compensate the FIRM on this basis. The FIRM will consult monthly with the CITY as to the number of attorney

hours and client disbursements which have been incurred to date under this Agreement, and as to future expected levels of hours and disbursements.

- H. Billing Format. Each billing entry must be complete, discrete and appropriate.
 - (1) Complete.
- (a) Each entry must name the person or persons involved. For instance, telephone calls must include the names of all participants.
 - (b) The date the work was performed must be included.
 - (c) The hours should be billed in .10 hour increments.
- (d) The specific task performed should be described, and the related work product should be reference ("telephone call re: tria! brief," "interview in preparation for deposition").
- (e) The biller's professional capacity (partner, associate, paralegal, etc.) should be included.
- (2) Discrete: Each task must be set out as a discrete billing entry; neither narrative nor block billing is acceptable.
 - (3) Appropriate.
- (a) The CITY does not pay for clerical support, administrative costs, overhead costs, outside expenses or excessive expenses. For example, the CITY will not pay for secretarial time, word processing time, air conditioning, rental of equipment, including computers, meals served at meetings, postage, online research, or the overhead costs of sending or receiving faxes. Neither will the CITY pay for outside expenses such as messenger delivery fees, outside photocopying, videotaping of depositions, investigative services, outside computer litigation support services, or overnight mail.
- (b) The CITY will pay reasonable late charges and the City will pay approved monthly invoices within 30 calendar days of receipt.
- I. Staffing. Ralph Hicks will be the primerify responsible attorney. Ultimately, staffing is a CITY decision, and the CITY'S representative may review staffing to ensure that it is optimal to achieve the goals of the engagement at the least cost.
- (1) Paralegals are to be used to the maximum extent possible to enhance efficiency and cost-effectiveness. All tasks typically considered associate work should be considered for assignment to a paralegal. Written authorization from the CITY must be had before associate hours billed exceed paralegal hours billed.
- (2) Once an attorney is given primary responsibility for an engagement, that person should continue on the legal matter until the matter is concluded or the attorney leaves the FIRM. The CITY will not pay the costs of bringing a new attorney up to speed.
- (3) If more than one attorney is going to perform the same task, prior approval from the CITY must be had. This includes document review.

- Article 5. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. The FIRM shall perform services as an independent contractor. It is understood that this contract is for unique professional services. Accordingly, the duties specified in this Agreement may not be assigned or delegated by the FIRM without prior written consent of the CITY. Retention of the FIRM is based on the particular professional expertise of the individuals rendering the services required in the Scope of Services.
- Article 6. <u>Confidentiality of Work.</u> All work performed by the FIRM including but not limited to all drafts, data, correspondence, proposals, reports, and estimates compiled or composed by the FIRM pursuant to this Agreement is for the sole use of the CITY. All such work product shall be confidential and not released to any third party without the prior written consent of the CITY.
- Article 7. Compliance with Controlling Law. The FIRM shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, regulations, and policies of the federal, state, and local governments as they pertain to this Agreement. In addition, the FIRM shall comply immediately with any and all directives issued by the CITY or its authorized representatives under authority of any laws statutes, ordinances, rules, or regulations. The laws of the State of California shall govern and control the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- Article 8. Acceptability of Work. The CITY shall cecide any and all questions which may arise as to the quality or acceptability of the services performed and the manner of performance, the acceptable completion of this Agreement and the amount of compensation due. If the FIRM and the CITY cannot agree to the quality or acceptability of the work, the manner of performance, or the compensation payable to the FIRM in this Agreement, the CITY or the FIRM shall give to the other written notice. Within ten (10) business days, the FIRM and the CITY shall each prepare a report which supports their position and file the same with the other party. The CITY shall, with reasonable diligence, determine the quality or acceptability of the work, the manner of performance or the compensation payable to the FIRM.
- Article 9. <u>Indemnification</u>. The FIRM agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold the CITY and its agents, officers, employees, and volunteers harmless from and against all claims asserted or liability established for damages or injuries to any person or property, including injury to the FIRM'S employees, agents, or officers, which arise from or are connected with or caused or claimed to be caused by the acts or omissions of the FIRM and its agents, officers, or employees in performing the work or other obligations under this Agreement, and all expenses of investigating and defending against same; provided, however, that this indemnification and hold harmless shall not include any claims or liability arising from the established sole negligence or willful misconduct of the CITY, its agents, officers, employees, or younteers.
- Article 10. <u>Insurance</u>. The FIRM, at its sole cost and expense, shall purchase and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement, the following insurance policies:
- A. Professional Liability Insurance (errors and omissions) with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per claim.

- B. Automobile Insurance covering all bodily injury and property damage incurred during the performance of this Agreement, with a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident. Such automobile insurance shall include owned, non-owned, and hired vehicles. The policy shall name the CITY and its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers as additional insureds, and a separate additional insured endorsement shall be provided.
- C. Commercial General Liability Insurance, with minimum limits of either \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$4,000,000 aggregate, or \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate with a \$2,000,000 umbrella policy, covering all bedily injury and property damage arising out of its operations, work, or performance under this Agreement. The policy shall name the CITY and its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers as additional insureds, and a separate additional insured endorsement shall be provided. The general aggregate limit must apply solely to the "location". The "location" should be noted with specificity on an endorsement that shall be incorporated into the policy.
- D. Workers' Compensation Insurance in an amount sufficient to meet statutory requirements covering all of FIRM'S employees and employers' liability insurance with limits of at least \$1,000,000 per accident. In addition, the policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the CITY. Said endorsement shall be provided prior to commencement of work under this Agreement.
- E. The aforesaid policies shall constitute primary insurance as to the CITY, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers, so that any other policies held by the CITY shall not contribute to any loss under said insurance. Said policies shall provide for thirty (30) days prior written notice to the CITY's Risk Manager, at the address listed in subsection G below, of cancellation or material change.
- F. If required insurance coverage is provided on a "claims made" rather than "occurrence" form, the FIRM shall maintain such insurance coverage for three years after expiration of the term (and any extensions) of this Agreement. In addition, the "retro" date must be on or before the date of this Agreement.
- G. The Certificate Holder for all policies of insurance required by this Section shall be:

H. Insurance shall be written with only insurers authorized to conduct business in California that hold a current policy holder's alphabetic and financial size category rating of not less than A:VII according to the current Best's Key Rating Guide, or a company of equal financial stability that is approved by the CITY'S Risk Manager. In the event coverage is provided by non-admitted "surplus lines" carriers, they must be included on the most recent List of Approved Surplus Line Insurers ("LASLI") and otherwise meet rating requirements.

- I. This Agreement shall not take effect until certificate(s) or other sufficient proof that these insurance provisions have been complied with, are filed with and approved by the CITY'S Risk Manager. If the FIRM does not keep all insurance policies required by this Article 10 in full force and effect at all times during the term of this Agreement, the CITY may treat the failure to maintain the requisite insurance as a breach of this Agreement and terminate the Agreement as provided herein.
- J. All deductibles and self-insured retentions in excess of \$10,000 must be disclosed to and approved by the CITY. CITY reserves the right to modify the insurance requirements of this Article 10, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurance, coverage, or other special circumstances.
- K. If the FIRM maintains broader coverage or higher limits (or both) than the minimum limits shown above, the CITY shall be entitled to the broader coverage or higher limits (or both) maintained by the FIRM. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the CITY.
- Article 11. <u>Drug Free Work Place</u>. The FIRM agrees to comply with the CITY'S Drug-Free Workplace requirements. Every person awarded a contract by the CITY for the provision of services shall certify to the CITY that it will provide a drug-free workplace. Any subcontract entered into by the FIRM pursuant to this Agreement shall contain this provision.
- Article 12. <u>Non-Discrimination Provisions</u>. The FIRM shall not discriminate against any subcontractor, vendor, employee or applicant for employment because of age, race, color, ancestry, religion, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, physical handicap, or medical condition. The FIRM will take positive action to insure that applicants are employed without regard to their age, race, color, ancestry, religion, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, physical handicap, or medical condition. Such action shall include but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The FIRM agrees to post in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment any notices provided by the CITY setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.
- Article 13. Notification of Change in Form. The FIRM has the right to effect changes in form including but not limited to the change in form from a partnership to a professional law corporation; the change in form of any partner or partners from an individual or individuals to a professional law corporation; the change in form of any corporate partner or partners to any individual partners. The CITY shall be promptly notified in writing of any change in form.
- Article 14. Notices. In all cases where written notice is to be given under this Agreement, service shall be deemed sufficient if said notice is deposited in the United States mail, postage paid. When so given, such notice shall be effective from the date of mailing of the notice. Unless otherwise provided by notice in writing from the respective parties, notice to the Agency shall be addressed to:

On behalf of Devaney Pate Morris and Cameron I am pleased to submit the firm's proposal to provide special counsel legal and strategic consulting services to the City of National City in connection with the National City's bayfront redevelopment, Port of San Diego funding opportunities, Coastal Commission advocacy, project entitlement services and general business matters involving the Port of San Diego.

Firm Introduction

The DPMC firm is a local firm whose mission is passionate public service and commitment to local cities such as National City. We currently provide City Attorney contract services to the City of Del Mar and a host of special purpose and college districts. AGREEMENT FOR LEGAL SERVICES BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF NATIONAL CITY AND KREISBERG LAW FIRM LLP

THIS AGREEMENT FOR LEGAL SERVICES (the "Agreement") is made as of the _____ day of April, 2024 between the CITY OF NATIONAL CITY, a municipal corporation, (the "CITY") and KREISBERG LAW FIRM LLP, (the "FIRM"). This Agreement sets forth the parties' mutual understanding concerning legal services to be provided by the FIRM and the fee arrangement for said services.

- **Article 1.** Retainer. The CITY hereby retains the FIRM to assist in representing the CITY in connection with as-needed, general legal services regarding labor relations and labor negotiations matters, subject to this Agreement.
- Article 2. <u>Effective Date and Term.</u> This Agreement shall be effective on April _____, 2024, through April 31, 2025. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by either party with sixty (60) days' written notice to the other. Notice of termination by the FIRM shall be given to the City Manager.
- Article 3. Scope of Services. FIRM shall provide, as-needed, general legal services regarding labor relations and labor negotiations matters, including the following: perform the full range of services related to the negotiation, drafting and implementation of MOUs, including proactively advising on current legal trends and issues related to labor negotiations and agreements. Compensation for these "labor relations and labor negotiations" services shall be as set forth in Article 4 of this Agreement.

Upon request, FIRM may provide other labor and employment legal services, including representing the CITY in unfair labor practice, arbitration, litigation, mediation, fact-finding, appeals and other hearings that may relate to labor relations and labor negotiations, as well as advising the CITY on non-labor related employment law matters. Compensation for these "other labor and employment legal services" shall be as set forth in Article 4 of this Agreement..

- **Article 4.** <u>Compensation</u>. Compensation paid under this Agreement shall be an hourly rate of \$355/hour.
- A. The FIRM shall not use more than one attorney for the same specific task without the CITY'S approval. The FIRM may use the minimum number of attorneys for this engagement consistent with good professional practice after consulting with and obtaining approval by the CITY.
- B. The FIRM shall keep the CITY advised monthly as to the level of attorney hours and client services performed under Article 3.

- C. The CITY further agrees to reimburse the FIRM, in accordance with the procedures set forth in this Article, for telephone, fax, mail, messengers, federal express deliveries, document reproduction, client-requested clerical overtime, lodging, and similar out-of-pocket expenses charged by the FIRM as a standard practice to its clients generally, with the exception of meals. In any billing for disbursements, the FIRM shall provide the CITY with a statement breaking down the amounts by category of expense. The following items shall not be reimbursed, unless the CITY has specifically agreed otherwise:
 - (1) Word Processing, clerical or secretarial charges, whether expressed as a dollar disbursement or time charge.
 - (2) Storage of open or closed files, rent, electricity, local telephone, postage, receipts or transmission of telecopier documents, or any other items traditionally associated with overhead.
 - (3) Photocopy charges in excess of \$.15 (fifteen cents) per page.
 - (4) Auto mileage rates in excess of the rate approved by the Internal Revenue Service for income tax purposes.
 - (5) Secretarial overtime. Where case requirements demand overtime, the CITY will consider reimbursement on a case-by-case basis. The CITY will not reimburse overtime incurred for the convenience of the FIRM'S failure to meet deadlines known in advance.
 - (6) Equipment, books, periodicals, research materials, Westlaw/Lexis or like items.
 - (7) Express charges, overnight mail charges, messenger services or the like, without the CITY'S prior consent. The CITY expects these expenses to be incurred in emergency situations only. Where case necessity requires the use of these services, the CITY will consider reimbursement on a case-by-case basis.
 - (8) Meals.
 - (9) Late payment charge or interest. Due to the nature of the CITY'S payment process, the CITY will not pay any late charges or interest charges to bills. Every effort will be made to pay bills promptly.
 - D. Bills from the FIRM should be submitted to Ben Martinez, City Manager, 1243 National City Boulevard, National City, CA 91950-4301. The individual time and disbursement records customarily maintained by the FIRM for billing evaluation and review purposes shall be made available to the CITY in support of bills rendered by the FIRM.
 - E. The FIRM agrees to forward to the CITY a statement of account for each one-month period of services under this Agreement, and the CITY agrees to compensate the FIRM on this basis. The FIRM will consult monthly with the CITY as to the number of attorney hours and client disbursements which have been incurred to date under this Agreement, and as to future expected levels of hours and disbursements.
- F. Billing Format. Each billing entry must be complete, discrete and appropriate.

(1) Complete.

- (a) Each entry must name the person or persons involved. For instance, telephone calls must include the names of all participants.
 - (b) The date the work was performed must be included.
 - (c) The hours should be billed in .10 hour increments.
- (d) The specific task performed should be described, and the related work product should be reference ("telephone call re: trial brief," "interview in preparation for deposition").
- (e) The biller's professional capacity (partner, associate, paralegal, etc.) should be included.
- (2) Discrete: Each task must be set out as a discrete billing entry; neither narrative nor block billing is acceptable.

(3) Appropriate.

- (a) The CITY does not pay for clerical support, administrative costs, overhead costs, outside expenses or excessive expenses. For example, the CITY will not pay for secretarial time, word processing time, air conditioning, rental of equipment, including computers, meals served at meetings, postage, online research, or the overhead costs of sending or receiving faxes. Neither will the CITY pay for outside expenses such as messenger delivery fees, outside photocopying, videotaping of depositions, investigative services, outside computer litigation support services, or overnight mail.
- (b) Due to the nature of the CITY'S payment process, the CITY will not pay any late charges. Every effort will be made to pay bills promptly.
- G. Staffing. Every legal matter should have a primarily responsible attorney and a paralegal assigned. Ultimately, staffing is a CITY decision, and the CITY'S representative may review staffing to insure that it is optimal to achieve the goals of the engagement at the least cost.
- (1) Paralegals are to be used to the maximum extent possible to enhance efficiency and cost-effectiveness. All tasks typically considered associate work should be considered for assignment to a paralegal. Written authorization from the CITY must be had before associate hours billed exceed paralegal hours billed.
- (2) Once an attorney is given primary responsibility for an engagement, that person should continue on the legal matter until the matter is concluded or the attorney leaves the FIRM. The CITY will not pay the costs of bringing a new attorney up to speed.
- (3) If more than one attorney is going to perform the same task, prior approval from the CITY must be had. This includes document review.
- Article 5. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. The FIRM shall perform services as an independent contractor. It is understood that this contract is for unique professional services. Accordingly, the duties specified in this Agreement may not be assigned or delegated by the FIRM

without prior written consent of the CITY. Retention of the FIRM is based on the particular professional expertise of the individuals rendering the services required in the Scope of Services.

- Article 6. <u>Confidentiality of Work</u>. All work performed by the FIRM including but not limited to all drafts, data, correspondence, proposals, reports, and estimates compiled or composed by the FIRM pursuant to this Agreement is for the sole use of the CITY. All such work product shall be confidential and not released to any third party without the prior written consent of the CITY.
- Article 7. Compliance with Controlling Law. The FIRM shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, regulations, and policies of the federal, state, and local governments as they pertain to this Agreement. In addition, the FIRM shall comply immediately with any and all directives issued by the CITY or its authorized representatives under authority of any laws statutes, ordinances, rules, or regulations. The laws of the State of California shall govern and control the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- Article 8. Acceptability of Work. The CITY shall decide any and all questions which may arise as to the quality or acceptability of the services performed and the manner of performance, the acceptable completion of this Agreement and the amount of compensation due. If the FIRM and the CITY cannot agree to the quality or acceptability of the work, the manner of performance, or the compensation payable to the FIRM in this Agreement, the CITY or the FIRM shall give to the other written notice. Within ten (10) business days, the FIRM and the CITY shall each prepare a report which supports their position and file the same with the other party. The CITY shall, with reasonable diligence, determine the quality or acceptability of the work, the manner of performance or the compensation payable to the FIRM.
- Article 9. <u>Indemnification</u>. The FIRM agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold the CITY and its agents, officers, employees, and volunteers harmless from and against all claims asserted or liability established for damages or injuries to any person or property, including injury to the FIRM'S employees, agents, or officers, which arise from or are connected with or caused or claimed to be caused by the acts or omissions of the FIRM and its agents, officers, or employees in performing the work or other obligations under this Agreement, and all expenses of investigating and defending against same; provided, however, that this indemnification and hold harmless shall not include any claims or liability arising from the established sole negligence or willful misconduct of the CITY, its agents, officers, employees, or volunteers.
- **Article 10.** <u>Insurance</u>. The FIRM, at its sole cost and expense, shall purchase and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement, the following insurance policies:
- A. **Professional Liability** Insurance (errors and omissions) with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per claim.
- B. **Automobile Insurance** covering all bodily injury and property damage incurred during the performance of this Agreement, which insurance shall apply to all owned, non-owned and hired vehicles.

- C. Commercial General Liability Insurance, with minimum limits of either \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$4,000,000 aggregate, or \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate with a \$2,000,000 umbrella policy, covering all bodily injury and property damage arising out of its operations, work, or performance under this Agreement. The policy shall name the CITY and its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers as additional insureds, and a separate additional insured endorsement shall be provided. The general aggregate limit must apply solely to the "location". The "location" should be noted with specificity on an endorsement that shall be incorporated into the policy.
- D. **Workers' Compensation Insurance** requirement will be waived by the City if there are six (6) employees or fewer, consistent with state law.
- E. The aforesaid policies shall constitute primary insurance as to the CITY, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers, so that any other policies held by the CITY shall not contribute to any loss under said insurance. Said policies shall provide for thirty (30) days prior written notice to the CITY's Risk Manager, at the address listed in subsection G below, of cancellation or material change.
- F. If required insurance coverage is provided on a "claims made" rather than "occurrence" form, the FIRM shall maintain such insurance coverage for three years after expiration of the term (and any extensions) of this Agreement. In addition, the "retro" date must be on or before the date of this Agreement.
- G. The Certificate Holder for all policies of insurance required by this Section shall be:

- H. Insurance shall be written with only insurers authorized to conduct business in California that hold a current policy holder's alphabetic and financial size category rating of not less than A:VII according to the current Best's Key Rating Guide, or a company of equal financial stability that is approved by the CITY'S Risk Manager. In the event coverage is provided by non-admitted "surplus lines" carriers, they must be included on the most recent List of Approved Surplus Line Insurers ("LASLI") and otherwise meet rating requirements.
- I. This Agreement shall not take effect until certificate(s) or other sufficient proof that these insurance provisions have been complied with, are filed with and approved by the CITY'S Risk Manager. If the FIRM does not keep all insurance policies required by this Article 10 in full force and effect at all times during the term of this Agreement, the CITY may treat the failure to maintain the requisite insurance as a breach of this Agreement and terminate the Agreement as provided herein.

- J. All deductibles and self-insured retentions in excess of \$10,000 must be disclosed to and approved by the CITY. CITY reserves the right to modify the insurance requirements of this Article, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.
- K. If the FIRM maintains broader coverage or higher limits (or both) than the minimum limits shown above, the CITY shall be entitled to the broader coverage or higher limits (or both) maintained by the FIRM. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the CITY.
- **Article 11.** <u>Drug Free Work Place</u>. The FIRM agrees to comply with the CITY'S Drug-Free Workplace requirements. Every person awarded a contract by the CITY for the provision of services shall certify to the CITY that it will provide a drug-free workplace. Any subcontract entered into by the FIRM pursuant to this Agreement shall contain this provision.
- Article 12. <u>Non-Discrimination Provisions</u>. The FIRM shall not discriminate against any subcontractor, vendor, employee or applicant for employment because of age, race, color, ancestry, religion, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, physical handicap, or medical condition. The FIRM will take positive action to insure that applicants are employed without regard to their age, race, color, ancestry, religion, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, physical handicap, or medical condition. Such action shall include but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The FIRM agrees to post in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment any notices provided by the CITY setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.
- Article 13. <u>Notification of Change in Form</u>. The FIRM has the right to effect changes in form including but not limited to: the change in form from a partnership to a professional law corporation; the change in form of any partner or partners from an individual or individuals to a professional law corporation; the change in form of any corporate partner or partners to any individual partners. The CITY shall be promptly notified in writing of any change in form.
- Article 14. Notices. In all cases where written notice is to be given under this Agreement, service shall be deemed sufficient if said notice is deposited in the United States mail, postage paid. When so given, such notice shall be effective from the date of mailing of the notice. Unless otherwise provided by notice in writing from the respective parties, notice to the Agency shall be addressed to:

Appropriation of Funds in the amount of \$500,004 for the Clean Mobility Options (CMO) Voucher Program for the Free Ride Around National City (FRANC) Shuttle Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution Entitled, "Resolution of the City Council of the City of National City, California, Authorizing the Appropriation of Grant Funds in the amount of \$500,004 for the Clean Mobility Options (CMO) Voucher Program for the Free Ride Around National City (FRANC) Shuttle Program."

BOARD/COMMISSION/COMMITTEE PRIOR ACTION:

Not Applicable.

EXPLANATION:

On August 3, 2021, City Council adopted Resolution 2021-104 authorizing the participation in the Clean Mobility Options (CMO) Voucher Pilot Program from the California Air Resources Board for the Free Ride Around National City (FRANC) Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV) System.

On December 6, 2022, City Council adopted Resolution 2022-196 thereby appropriating \$999,996 from the Clean Mobility Options (CMO) Voucher Program for the Free Ride Around National City (FRANC) Shuttle Program.

On June 20, 2023, City Council adopted Resolution 2023-83 awarding an agreement with Circuit Transit, Inc. to provide the FRANC program, and Resolution 2023-89 authorizing an appropriation in the amount of \$400,000 for funding from the San Diego Port District for the FRANC program.

Additional funding was available through CALSTART, Inc. which permitted the City of National City to be eligible for additional funding for the FRANC project. On May 30, 2023, a request for additional funding in the amount of \$500,004 was submitted by the City's Director of Public Works/City Engineer at the time, an authorized signer, and was subsequently approved.

On November 8, 2023, Voucher Agreement Number MP20W1A-19 between the City of National City and CALSTART, Inc. was executed to accept the additional funding in the amount of \$500,004, amending the initial award of \$999,996 to an amount not-to-exceed \$1,500,000 (See Exhibit A).

The additional funding was approved for increased costs associated with:

- Labor projected for NEV Drivers, including increased hours of operation
- Administration including participation in CMO events and training
- NEV Vehicles capacity parts and purchases

- Construction/Engineering
- Consultant/Engineering
- Coordination efforts with associated agencies
- Insurance compliance

Staff recommends City Council approve the resolution as stated.

Amendment 01 to Voucher Agreement Number MP20W1A-19 Between CALSTART, Inc. and City of National City

This Amendment number 01 ("Amendment") is dated for convenience as of November 8, 2023 and is made to Voucher Agreement Number MP20W1A-19 between City of National City ("Awardee") and CALSTART, Inc. ("CALSTART"), executed February 9, 2022 ("Agreement"). The purpose of this amendment is to increase funding and extend period of performance.

Recitals

- On April 2, 2019, CALSTART executed grant agreement number G17-CMDC-01 with the State of California Air Resources Board ("CARB").
- On February 9, 2022, voucher agreement number MP20W1A-19 was executed between City of National City ("Awardee") and CALSTART to perform tasks under the FRANC Program (the "Project") funded under CARB agreement number G17-CMDC-01 for a period of performance from February 9, 2022 through February 9, 2027 for an amount not to exceed nine hundred ninety-nine thousand nine hundred ninety-six and no/100 dollars (\$999,996).

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises herein, and for good and valuable consideration, the Parties agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

- The period of performance for the Agreement is hereby modified as follows:

From: February 9, 2022 to February 9, 2027 To: February 9, 2022 to September 5, 2027

The period of performance includes up to 15 months for project design, planning and construction (Planning and Construction Period), and a minimum of 4 years of service operation (Project Operation Period). Clean mobility projects funded by this program must be fully operating for at least 4 years.

The strategy for FRANC will be one of fiscal responsibility, locked into an agreement for services for the 4-year operational period, between Circuit and the City of National City. Since the last submittal and in the interest to get the FRANC program up and running in a expeditious manner the City decided to procure NEV Shuttles services through a cooperative procurement process "piggy-backing" on to San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) awarded contract for Regional Flexible Fleet Services- Category 6, NEV Shuttles. The City has tied its contract to Circuit (the awardee). The current contract with Circuit is for three years with two 1-year extensions. It is the intent to have Circuit operate the 4th year as well, but final budgets, service hours and driving hours will all be refined over the next 6 to 8-month period.

It is anticipated that construction on the Solar charging storage area will be complete, and we will have a solid six months of ridership data to be able to determine if ridership demand is needing a third Gem vehicle. We will also know what resources are available after construction is complete and what other revenue sources such as advertising revenues are available to offset program costs. This three-year contract is based on an agreement that solidifies the monthly service billing that will occur on a regular basis that covers all operational costs including labor, vehicle amortization, public relations, marketing, promotion, branding, administration, vehicle registration, vehicle maintenance, vehicle repair, data collection on use and ridership surveys, and required insurance for two Gem 6 vehicles. The City of National City is providing the up-front planning, coordination, and construction of capital projects at the 8th Street Trolley Station. This effort will result in a publicly released request for bids and an agreement to construct the solar panel system, the shade structure, the storage facility, the electrical and meter connections and the payments of any electrical bills that are beyond what the solar array system will produce. The City of National City will also take the lead in accounting, billing, and administration of the overall grant.

The system will be adaptable and flexible based on ridership. If ridership warrants the use of more than 2 NEVs, and existing funds and revenues are not enough to cover the costs of another NEV and driver, then additional funding will be pursued. The commitment is to provide the service, availability of the service, and the visibility of the program that will drive the ridership to capacity. The system will be anchored at the 8th Street Trolley Station once the Solar charging facility is constructed in a publicly visible location. Although the system will be a "ondemand" system using smart phones and the "Ride Circuit" application, the vehicles will circulate throughout the day to remind possible transit riders and other members of the public about the service. Key target riders will include Seniors, Sailors, and Community College Students.

3. Describe your strategies for ensuring vehicles and equipment continue to serve the community if operation discontinues after the 5-year voucher agreement term.

If there are shortfalls in the budget, sponsorships will be part of the strategy to close the gap. The project has obtained and formalized a sponsorship from the Port of San Diego in July. This sponsorship will cover the 4th year of operations to the amount of \$273,628 (assuming \$18,000 for admin. covered by CalStart) and will have \$154,856 to cover any over-runs in the years 1-3 of operations or any expansion of the number of NEVs or driver time. It is the intent of this grant to operate beyond the 4 years of operation, based on a successful program and on the ability to cover the \$273,628 per year operating costs through sponsorships and advertising and potential affordable fees or supplemented by voluntary tips.

As stated above, the program and the condition of the two NEV GEM6 vehicles will be able to extend past the 4 years of operation. It is the intent of National City to have the NEVs remain with Circuit into the future, but if appropriate National City will take over the ownership of the two vehicles and will be responsible for maintenance, registration, and insurance on these vehicles either by National City or through a future operational partner if different than Circuit. The primary objective would be to have the FRANC program continue at this location on the 8th Street Trolley Station parking lot. In addition to the vehicles, the solar panels, solar shade structure, the electrical infrastructure would all persist into the future and would continue to produce energy that could be used by these vehicles or other vehicles used in a subsequent NEV shuttle program.

The meter, electrical panels, solar shade structure, and solar panels and associated solar infrastructure would have at least a 20-year life and would be able to continue with clean energy production. This system could be turned over to MTS to run some form of transit support using electricity or could be directed to carshare, electric carshare or other charging uses at the station. The storage cage could be modified to support a bike and scooter cage for transit customers at this location, with controlled gate access and locking opportunities like bike stations at other MTS mobility hubs.

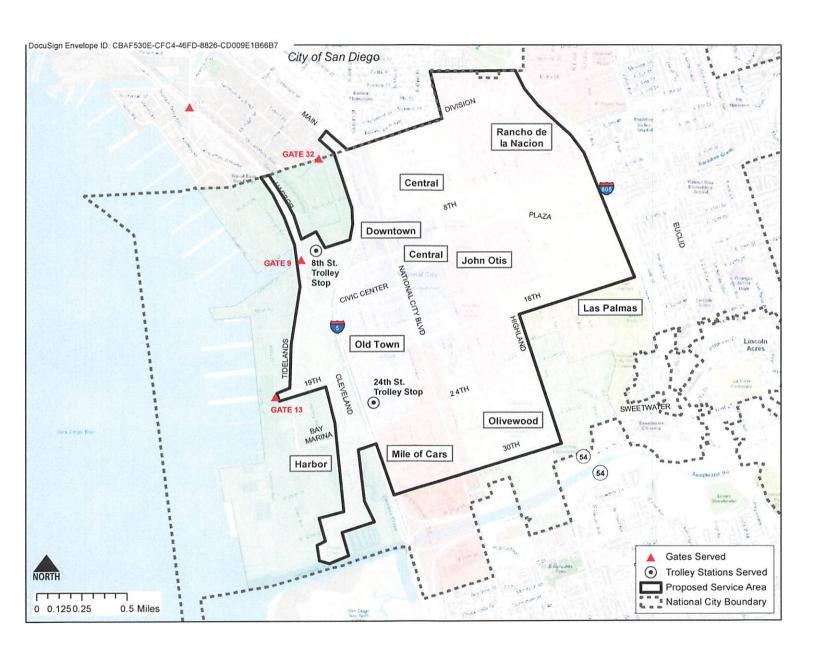

- WHEREAS, on August 3, 2021, City Council adopted Resolution 2021-104 authorizing the participation in the Clean Mobility Options (CMO) Voucher Pilot Program from the California Air Resources Board for the Free Ride Around National City (FRANC) Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV) System; and
- **WHEREAS**, on December 6, 2022, City Council adopted Resolution 2022-196 appropriating \$999,996 from CMO Voucher Program for the FRANC Shuttle Program; and
- **WHEREAS**, on June 20, 2023, City Council adopted Resolution 2023-83 awarding an agreement with Circuit Transit, Inc. to provide the FRANC program; and
- **WHEREAS**, on June 20, 2023, City Council adopted Resolution 2023-89 authorizing an appropriation in the amount of \$400,000 for funding from the San Diego Port District for the FRANC program; and
- **WHEREAS**, additional funding was available through CALSTART, Inc. which permitted the City of National City to be eligible for additional funding for the FRANC project and on May 30, 2023, a request for additional funding in the amount of \$500,004 was submitted and subsequently approved; and
- WHEREAS, on November 8, 2023, Voucher Agreement Number MP20W1A-19 between the City of National City and CALSTART, Inc. was executed to accept the additional funding in the amount of \$500,004, amending the initial award of \$999,996 to an amount not-to-exceed \$1,500,000; and
- **WHEREAS**, City staff recommends authorizing the appropriation of funds in the amount of \$500,004 for the Clean Mobility Options (CMO) Voucher Program for the Free Ride Around National City (FRANC) Shuttle Program.

Approval of the Fourth Amendment to the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for the Metro Wastewater Joint Powers Authority as a Participating Agency of the Metro Wastewater JPA.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution Entitled, "Resolution of the City Council of the City of National City, California, authorizing the Mayor to execute the Fourth Amendment to the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for the Metro Wastewater Joint Powers Authority which Amends Sections 3.02 and 3.05 of the Joint Powers Agreement as a Participating Agency of the Metro Wastewater Joint Powers Authority."

BOARD/COMMISSION/COMMITTEE PRIOR ACTION:

Not Applicable.

EXPLANATION:

The City of National City is a member of the Metro Wastewater Joint Powers Authority (Metro JPA) which was created to provide a common voice for all of the participating agencies in the region who transmit wastewater flow to the City of San Diego for treatment at the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant. The Metro JPA agreement requires some clean up and minor adjustments to keep the organization reflective of the recent organizational assessment.

This proposed Fourth Amendment makes two (2) Amendments to the joint powers agreement to reflect updates in officers for the Metro JPA.

Amendment 1 amends Section 3.02, Treasurer and Auditor, by expanding the definition to allow the Metro JPA Board to appoint anyone authorized by the Joint Powers Law to be Treasurer / Auditor, whereas currently the language of the JPA only allows the Finance Manager or Director to one of the Participating Agencies to be designated as the Treasurer / Auditor.

Amendment 2 amends Section 3.05 by striking the provision that requires the Metro JPA's Legal Advisor to also be counsel to one of the Participating Agencies. This strikeout is proposed to avoid potential or perceived conflicts of interest, although it does not preclude the Metro JPA's legal advisor from also being Legal Counsel to one of the Participating Agencies.

Neither Amendment changes either of the current appointments for Treasurer/Auditor or Legal Advisor.

FOURTH AMENDMENT TO JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT FOR THE METRO WASTEWATER JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY TO AMEND SECTION 3.05 OF THE JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT

This Fourth Amendment to the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for the Metro Wastewater Joint Powers Authority is made effective as of July 1, 2024, in the County of San Diego, State of California by each of the Participating Agencies of the Metro Wastewater JPA, a Joint Powers Agency ("JPA") existing and organized pursuant to the provisions of Government Code section 6500 *et seq*.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, on October 25, 2000, the City of Coronado, a municipal corporation; the City of Del Mar, a municipal corporation; the City of El Cajon, a municipal corporation; the City of Imperial Beach, a municipal corporation; the City of La Mesa, a municipal corporation; the Lemon Grove Sanitation District, a political subdivision of the State of California, the City of Poway, a municipal corporation; Padre Dam Municipal Water District, a political subdivision of the State of California; and the County of San Diego (on behalf of: the Winter Gardens Sewer Maintenance District, a maintenance district established pursuant to California Streets & Hwys. Code section 5820 et seq.; the Lakeside/Alpine Sanitation District, a political subdivision of the State of California; and the Spring Valley Sanitation District, a political subdivision of the State of California) (the "Participating Agencies") entered into a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement ("Agreement"), creating the JPA for the purpose of taking responsibility, actions, and decisions pertaining to the Regional Waste Water Disposal Agreement; and

WHEREAS, on February 12, 2003, the Otay Water District was added as a Participating Agency of the JPA; and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2003, the City of National City was added as a Participating Agency of the JPA; and

WHEREAS, on October 17, 2007, the City of Chula Vista was added as a Participating Agency of the JPA; and

WHEREAS, Article VIII, Section 8.05 of the Agreement allows for amendments of the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Participating Agencies wish to make certain amendments to reflect updates in officers and employees of the organization.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- A. Pursuant to Article VIII, Section 8.05 of the Agreement, each of the Participating Agencies hereby amend the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for the Metro Wastewater JPA, as follows:
 - 1. Article III, Section 3.02 is hereby revised in its entirety to read as follows:
 - **3.02 Treasurer and Auditor**. The Treasurer and Auditor may be any person(s) duly appointed by the Board and permitted to serve as the JPA Treasurer and/or Auditor pursuant to Government Code Sections 6505.5 and/or 6505.6. The Treasurer shall be the depository, shall have custody of all of the accounts, funds, and money of the JPA from whatever source, and shall have the duties and obligations set forth in Government Code sections 6505, 6505.5 and/or 6505.6 as applicable, and shall assure that there shall be strict accountability of all funds and reporting of all receipts and disbursements of the JPA. The officer performing the duties of Auditor shall have the duties and obligations set forth in Government Code section 6505, 6505.5 and/or 6505.6, as applicable.
 - 2. Article III, Section 3.05 is hereby revised in its entirety to read as follows:
 - **3.05 Legal Advisor**. The Board shall have the power to appoint the legal advisor of the JPA who shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Board.
- C. All other terms and conditions of the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for the Metro Wastewater JPA shall remain in full force and effect and shall remain binding upon each of the Participating Agencies.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution Entitled, "Resolution of the City Council of the City of National City, California, Creating Two (2) New Job Classifications for the Roles of Emergency Manager and Fire Division Chief, Revising the Community Services Officer Job Classification, and Amending the Management Compensation Plan Salary Schedule."

BOARD/COMMISSION/COMMITTEE PRIOR ACTION:

The Civil Service Commission approved the two (2) new job descriptions and updating of one existing classification description at their meeting on March 27, 2024.

EXPLANATION:

The National City Fire Department (NCFD) has been a cornerstone of our community's safety and emergency response for many years. As the needs and demands of emergency management continue to evolve, it is imperative that our department remains adaptable and well-equipped to address any challenges that may arise. In alignment with this commitment, the proposal to establish new classifications for Emergency Manager and Fire Division Chief positions has been developed.

The Emergency Manager position is designed to address the increasing complexity and frequency of emergencies, including natural disasters, technological accidents, and other emergencies that may impact our community. This role will be responsible for developing comprehensive emergency management plans, coordinating response efforts with other agencies, and ensuring our department's readiness to effectively respond to any situation. With the rise in extreme weather events and other emergencies, having a dedicated Emergency Manager will enhance our department's ability to mitigate risks and protect the lives and property of our citizens. It is recommended to create the Management Salary Band of \$100,318.40 annually to \$121,950.40 annually.

The Fire Division Chief position will provide strategic leadership and oversight, either over the Community Risk Reduction Division or the Operations Division of the Fire Department. When assigned to the Community Risk Reduction Division, this role will be responsible for supervising fire prevention operations, implementing training programs, ensuring compliance with relevant codes and standards. When overseeing the Operations Division, this role will be responsible for the supervision and management of all of the emergency readiness and response operations of the department. The Division Chief will fill in and assume the responsibilities of the Fire Chief during their absence. By establishing this position, we aim to enhance operational efficiency,

promote professional development among our personnel, and maintain the highest standards of service delivery. It is recommended to create the Management Salary Band of \$142,741.05 annually to \$184,143.83 annually.

The establishment of these new classifications reflects our department's commitment to proactive planning, professional development, and community safety. By investing in these leadership roles, we will enhance our capacity to respond to emergencies, protect our citizens, and uphold the mission of the National City Fire Department.

The Police Department recently recruited for the position of Community Services Officer and determined that current Police Cadets, Police Explorers and youth in the community were unable to meet the minimum qualifications for their Community Services Officer position. The Human Resources Department and Police Department determined that the previous qualifications limited the number of candidates for this position. It is recommended that the job description be revised to allow those candidates with varied qualifications to apply and be considered for this position.

As changes are made to salaries or classifications, the City is required to adopt a revised salary schedule in a public meeting. The attached salary schedule meets the California Public Employees Retirement Systems (CalPERS) pay rate reporting requirements in accordance with Government Code Section 20636 defining "Compensation Earnable" and the California Code of Regulations (CCR) Section 570.5.

NCMEA is supportive of the revision to the existing classification.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

A budget adjustment of \$24,395 was approved by the City Council on April 2, 2024 as part of the mid-year budget status report to cover the estimated Fiscal Year 2024 cost of the reclassifications. The annual ongoing cost of \$79,000 will be reflected in the Fiscal Year 2025 proposed budget for the Fire Department.

DEFINITION

Under general direction of the Fire Chief, the Fire Division Chief is responsible for the administration of either the Fire Operations Division or the Fire Prevention Division; serves as acting Fire Chief in the absence of the Fire Chief; and performs other related duties as required.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

The Fire Division Chief works a 40 hour exempt FLSA week and has primary responsibility over either the Fire Operations Division or the Fire Prevention Division. The Fire Operations Division Chief's primary responsibility is to manage all suppression personnel and operational readiness. The Fire Prevention Division Chief will manage Community Risk Reduction (CRR), this will include acting as the Fire Marshal for the City and contract agencies.

EXAMPLES OF TYPICAL DUTIES

The following duties and responsibilities are representative of those typically performed by positions assigned to this classification. Any single position may not perform all of these duties and/or may perform similar related tasks not listed here.

General (applies to all divisions):

- Serves as Acting Fire Chief in the absence of the Fire Chief.
- Performs management, supervisory, and administrative work in coordination of assigned division activities.
- Assists with the development and monitors the department budget; prepares staff reports on various subjects.
- Develops, plans, organizes, implements, and directs fire training programs; provides general knowledge and technical instruction for Fire personnel, City employees, citizens, and other fire agencies.
- Attends City Council Meetings and civic functions as directed.
- Attends meetings and committees in place of the Fire Chief, when directed by the Fire Chief.
- Performs an active role in the City's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) as needed.
- May represent the department as the Public Information Officer at emergency incidents.
- Develops and ensures implementation of department policies and procedures.
- Performs other related work as required.

Fire Operations Division:

- Monitors fires and other emergency calls. Responds to large incidents to assist in the incident command/management.
- Manages emergency response forces and administrative staff which includes application of the Incident Command Management System, deployment of personnel and equipment, and related fire ground functions.
- Oversees the entire fire and rescue delivery system, ensuring that the system functions as designed and that policies and procedures are adhered to.
- Manages the training of entry-level personnel as well as the continuing educational training of current department members.
- Coordinates department activities with other City departments and outside agencies.
- Serves as the Department's representative on local operational groups.

Fire Prevention Division:

- Acts as Fire Marshal for the City and contract agencies.
- Leads, supervises, and coordinates all aspects of the Community Risk Reduction Division.
- Conducts and oversees fire and hazard investigations at emergency scenes.
- Interprets, inspects, and enforces building and fire codes.
- Conducts internal plan reviews with various departments and agencies including Planning, Building, Engineering, County of San Diego, etc.
- Conducts pre-development meetings with stakeholders at the Fire Administration counter.
- May act as the City's Designated Infectious Control Officer.
- Manages the City's Hazardous Materials California Environmental Reporting System (CERS) and Certified Unified Program Agencies (CUPA).
- Prepares, documents and presents arson cases to the District Attorney, and testifies in court as an expert witness.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

Any combination equivalent to training and experience that could likely provide the required knowledge, skills, and abilities will be qualifying. A typical way to obtain the required knowledge, skills, and abilities would be:

<u>Training/Education:</u> an associate's degree in any fire or emergency related field; <u>or</u> an associate's degree in another field <u>and</u> a fire science certificate, California Company Officer/Fire Officer certification, or Chief Officer Certification; **AND**

Experience: at least two (2) years of experience as Fire Battalion Chief or Deputy Fire Marshal with the National City Fire Department or other municipal fire department.

Highly Desirable (Fire Prevention Division): at least two (2) years of experience as a Fire Marshal with increasing responsibilities related to Fire Prevention.

Knowledge and Skills in: Firefighting principles and the techniques and equipment employed in fire suppression; local, county, state, and federal laws and regulations pertaining to fire suppression/prevention; principles and practices of administration, leadership, training methods, communications, and group instruction; emergency medical methods and the City's fire, emergency medical, and dispatch delivery systems.

<u>Ability to</u>: Train and manage people; maintain discipline and morale; keep records; take effective courses of action in emergency situations; maintain effective working relations with others; analyze problems and apply various problem-solving techniques.

Under general direction from the Fire Chief, the Emergency Manager is responsible for planning, coordinating, and responding to disasters and emergencies to protect lives and property; and perform related work as required.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

This is a one (1) incumbent management class. The employee in this class has full professional management and full supervisory authority in planning, organizing, and directing the full scope of operations within the assigned division/department. May oversee and coordinate assigned support staff.

EXAMPLES OF TYPICAL DUTIES

The following duties and responsibilities are representative of those typically performed by positions assigned to this classification. Any single position may not perform all of these duties and/or may perform similar related tasks not listed here.

- Provides staff support to the Fire Chief, Police Chief, and City Manager's Office to coordinate actual or potential emergency preparedness or response efforts.
- Serves as the City's liaison on emergency preparedness issues with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, State of California Office of Emergency Services, San Diego County Office of Emergency Services and other local municipalities, and the Emergency Manager Working Group.
- Coordinates training programs and emergency operations center exercises to prepare City department staff to respond quickly and effectively to emergencies.
- Coordinates the submittal and administration of State Homeland Security Grants (SHSG), Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) Grants, Fire Act Grants, Staffing For Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER), and other grants.
- Researches, analyzes, and prepares complex grant applications and seeks alternate funding sources for various City projects.
- Advises departments on their emergency plans and coordinates interdepartmental activities.
- Processes federal and state reimbursement claims for the City's costs during and after declared emergencies.
- Oversees, coordinates, and conducts a variety of emergency related community education programs including Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) and LISTOS disaster preparedness programs.
- Develops and oversees the City's emergency operations center; evaluates and regularly updates emergency plans.
- Maintains awareness of new developments in the field of emergency preparedness and disaster relief; incorporates new developments as appropriate into programs/plans.

- Participates in the preparation and administration of the Department's budget; submits budget recommendations; monitors expenditures.
- Performs other related duties as assigned.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

Any combination equivalent to training and experience that could likely provide the required knowledge, skills, and abilities will be qualifying. A typical way to obtain the required knowledge, skills, and abilities would be:

<u>Training/Education:</u> A Bachelor's degree in emergency management, fire science, business, public administration, or a related field from an accredited college or university; or an Associate's degree <u>and</u> Certified Emergency Manager (CEM) designation from the International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM) or Certified Emergency Management Specialist by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services; **AND**

Experience: at least four (4) years of experience in emergency management, administrative, operational, and analytical assignments.

Principles and practices of disaster preparedness plans; hazardous biological and chemical substances and materials; health and environmental safety rules and regulations; protocols of State, Federal, and local agencies, including Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and California Office of Emergency Services (OES); principles and techniques of administration, organization, and operation of municipal government, and the principles, practices, and methods used in the conduct of municipal government; report preparation, information analysis, and management audit techniques; and methods of research and analysis.

EXPLANATION:

The applicant proposes to construct a 3-story, 1,757 square-foot single-family residence on an existing 2,285 square-foot lot adjacent to Interstate 805. Due to the size and shape of the lot, a variance is being requested for the minimum lot area, maximum stories, and side and rear yard setbacks for the Small Lot Residential (RS-2) zone. In addition, the applicant is requesting tandem parking and parking in the front yard setback area.

The Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing on April 1, 2024, and voted to recommend approval of the request with a modified setback based on the attached findings and recommended Conditions of Approval. The attached Planning Commission staff report describes the proposal in detail.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

Staff Recommendation

Staff is recommending approval of the Zone Variance (variance) request, subject to the recommended conditions in the attached resolution and a determination that the project is exempt from CEQA.

Executive Summary

The applicant proposes to construct a 3-story, 1,757 square-foot single-family residence on an existing 2,285 square-foot lot adjacent to Interstate 805. Due to the size and shape of the lot, a variance is being requested for the minimum lot area, maximum stories, and side and rear yard setbacks for the Small Lot Residential (RS-2) zone. In addition, the applicant is requesting tandem parking and parking in the front yard setback area.

Site Characteristics

The project site is comprised of a 2,285 square-foot vacant parcel located on East 4th Street. The triangular-shaped lot is a remnant parcel from the right-of-way acquisitions for the construction of Interstate 805. The lot is of a substandard size and shape for the RS-2 zone and would not allow for the construction of a home without the granting of a variance. There is 50 feet of street frontage along East 4th Street on the north side of the lot, approximately 106 feet of frontage along the angled portion of the lot abutting Caltrans right-of-way to the south and west, and the lot is approximately 91 feet deep along its eastern boundary. Both the size and shape of the lot result in a constrained buildable area when required setbacks are accounted for. The property has an existing driveway and curb cut that is proposed to be used for the new home. The property is zoned RS-2 and has a Low-Medium Density Residential General Plan designation. Staff would like to note that the pending Focused General Plan Update proposes to rezone this property to the Minor Mixed-Use Corridor (MXC-1) zone, which would significantly alter the development standards of the site. Staff has concluded that a variance would still be needed for parking in a setback area should the new zone be approved.

Proposed Project

The applicant is proposing to construct a single-family residence with an attached one-car garage on a vacant lot. No accessory dwelling units are proposed. The 1,757 square-foot residence is planned to be three stories in height with the upper level having 519 square feet of living space. The front yard setback and side yard setback abutting Interstate 805 will be met. However, the applicant is requesting a reduced interior yard setback and rear yard setback. Due to the irregular lot shape, the rear lot line from which the setback is measured is

approximately 21 feet closer than the "point" of the triangle. In addition to height and setbacks, the applicant is requesting to have a parking space in front of the one-car garage. This would result in tandem parking, which is when vehicles are parked end-to-end, and parking in the front yard setback area. Neither are permitted in the Land Use Code for the RS-2 zone. The location of the parking is also part of the variance request.

<u>Analysis</u>

General Plan

This project contributes to infill development, which is encouraged by the General Plan:

Policy LU 4.3: Promote infill development, redevelopment, rehabilitation, and reuse efforts that contribute positively to existing neighborhoods and surrounding areas.

The proposal also provides an additional home ownership opportunity, which is consistent with the City's Housing Element.

The land use designation for the subject property is Low-Medium Density Residential, which allows for a density of up to nine dwelling units per acre. While the proposed development of the lot would result in a density of over 19 dwelling units per acre, the underlying zone permits at least one single-family residence per lot. Overall density in the vicinity is tempered by a larger average lot size and the abutting freeway.

Land Use Code

The Land Use Code (LUC) includes development standards by zone as well as general standards for all districts. For the RS-2 zone, there are standards for minimum lot area, setbacks, and maximum height among others. Design standards for off-street parking and loading affect the City as whole. The proposed single-family residence would not meet several requirements within the LUC and is requesting a zone variance to deviate from the prescribed rules.

As discussed above, the 2,285 square-foot property is irregularly-shaped and logically presents challenges to the development of a single-family residence that would not exist on an ordinary lot. The minimum lot area required by the LUC for the RS-2 zone is 5,000 square feet. With the development of the abutting

freeway, the lot has been reduced in size and shape and has remained in a vacant state for several decades. All other lots on this street in the same block exceed the minimum lot size. The request for a variance for a reduced minimum lot area would allow for the development of a lot that would otherwise have little practical use.

Setbacks requirements for the RS-2 zone include a 20-foot front yard setback, five-foot side yard setbacks, and a 25-foot rear yard setback. In order to construct the proposed residence, the applicant is requesting a reduced (four-foot) interior yard setback on the east side of the property and a reduced (14-foot) rear yard setback on the south side of the property. Irregular-shaped lots have a modified definition of a "rear lot line" that further impacts this property. The applicant's plans show a three-foot deviation from the required rear-yard setback. However, staff measurements indicate the requested setback is approximately 14 feet, which is noted in the attached exhibit (Exhibit A-Revised).

The requested deviation from setback rules is minimized by the design of the proposed structure. Each level ranges in size form 519 square feet of livable space on the first floor to 719 square feet on the second floor. Due to the smaller floor plans, the applicant is proposing a third floor comprised of 534 square feet of living space. This third floor exceeds the maximum number of stories (two) within the RS-2 zone, but does not exceed the overall height limit of 35 feet. The variance request for a third floor would allow for more practical living space within the proposed building footprint.

In addition to the requests for modified building standards for the proposed single-family residence, the applicant is also requesting a variance for the location of parking spaces on the property. Generally, one covered space and one uncovered space is required for new single-family residences. The applicant is proposing to have a one-car garage in conformance with zoning requirements. However, there is no practical location for an uncovered space due to the size of the lot. The applicant proposes to locate the uncovered space in front of the attached garage, which would result in the creation of tandem parking and an encroachment into the front yard setback.

Mailing

All property owners and occupants within 300 feet are required to be notified of a public hearing for a CUP application. Notice of this public hearing was sent to 18 occupants and owners.

Department Comments

Comments were provided by the Fire Department related to standard requirements for new developments. No other comments were received. The Fire Department comments have been incorporated as conditions of approval.

Public Comment

No public comments were received as of the writing of this staff report.

Findings for Approval

The Municipal Code contains three required findings for Zone Variances as follows:

Variances from the terms of Title 18 shall be granted only when, because
of special circumstances applicable to the property, including size, shape,
topography, location or surroundings, the strict application of Title 18
deprives such property of privileges enjoyed by other property in the
vicinity and under identical zoning classification.

The property is less than half the minimum lot size required in the zone, which restricts the normal buildable area afforded standard-sized lots. Furthermore, the triangular shape of the lot modifies the shape of the area that could be developed. Given the size and shape of the lot, there is no room to build a residence of a typical size with appropriate parking without encroaching into the required property setbacks and exceeding the maximum height of two stories.

2. Any variance granted shall be subject to such conditions as will assure that the adjustment thereby authorized shall not constitute a grant of special privileges inconsistent with the limitations upon other properties in the vicinity and zone in which such property is situated.

Instances exist of properties within the RS-2 that do not meet the same zoning regulations for which the applicant is requesting relief. Developed properties with less than 5,000 square feet of lot area east of Interstate 805 are not common, but they do exist along the freeway and Division Street. There are also several properties with irregular shapes that do not conform to setback regulations. Instances of reduced setbacks also occur within reverse corner lots and within entire subdivisions abutting topographic variations. Single-family residences that do not meet the maximum height are found throughout National City. Notably, several Victorian-style mansions incorporate a third story. The RS-2 zone also includes houses of every decade of construction since the 1880s. A large

number of these residences were developed prior to regulations restricting tandem parking and parking in the front yard setback. Residents commonly park vehicles in a manner similar to the request made by the applicant.

3. A variance shall not be granted for a parcel of property which authorizes a use or activity which is not otherwise expressly authorized by the zone regulation governing the parcel of property.

The request is to construct a single-family home, which is a permitted use in the RS-2 zone. The property is also required to have at least two parking spaces per the LUC, which the applicant intends to provide. Parking in and of itself is required and allowed in all zones throughout the City.

One additional finding is required for this project:

4. The proposed project has been reviewed in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The proposed project has been reviewed in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and has been determined to be categorically exempt from environmental review pursuant to Class 3, Section 15303 (New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures) for which a Notice of Exemption will be filed subsequent to approval of this Zone Variance. Class 3 consists of construction and location of limited numbers of new, small facilities or structures among other similar projects. One single-family residence, or up to three single-family residences in an urbanized area are explicitly provided for under this exemption. The proposed project is to construct one single-family residence.

Conditions of Approval

Standard Conditions of Approval related to new development projects are included as well as comments from the Fire Department. An additional condition requests an updated site plan in conformance with the revised Exhibit A.

Summary

The proposed single-family residence is a permitted use for which the applicant is requesting several variances. The lot has a size and shape that would make it impractical to construct an ordinary single-family residence in conformance with applicable regulations within Land Use Code. Staff is recommending approval of

the variance request for reduced lot area, reduced setbacks, increased height, and the location of parking spaces subject to the Conditions of Approval.

Options

- 1. Find the project exempt from CEQA under Class 3 of the CEQA Guidelines Section 15303 or other exemption and approve 2023-17 Z subject to the conditions included in the Resolution, and based on the findings included in the Resolution or other findings to be determined by the Planning Commission; or,
- 2. Find the project not exempt from CEQA and/or deny 2023-17 Z based on the attached findings, or findings to be determined by the Planning Commission; or,
- 3. Continue the item to a specific date in order to obtain additional information.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the application for a Zone Variance is hereby approved subject to the following conditions:

General

1. This *Zone Variance* authorizes a single-family residence to deviate from requirements for minimum lot area, minimum yard setbacks, the location of parking spaces, and maximum height at a vacant parcel on East 4th Street (APN: 557-050-32). Except as

- required by conditions of approval, all plans submitted for permits associated with the project shall conform to the revised Exhibit A, as amended by the Planning Commission, Case File No. 2023-17 Z, dated 2/12/2024.
- 2. Before this Zone Variance shall become effective, the applicant and the property owner both shall sign and have notarized an Acceptance Form, provided by the Planning Division, acknowledging and accepting all conditions imposed upon the approval of this permit. Failure to return the signed and notarized Acceptance Form within 30 days of its receipt shall automatically terminate the Zone Variance. The applicant shall also submit evidence to the satisfaction of the Planning Division that a Notice of Restriction on Real Property is recorded with the County Recorder. The applicant shall pay necessary recording fees to the County. The Notice of Restriction shall provide information that conditions imposed by approval of the Zone Variance are binding on all present or future interest holders or estate holders of the property. The Notice of Restriction shall be approved as to form by the City Attorney and signed by the City Manager or assign prior to recordation.
- 3. Within four (4) days of approval, pursuant to Fish and Game Code 711.4 and the California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 753.5, the applicant shall pay all necessary environmental filing fees for the San Diego County Clerk. Checks shall be made payable to the County Clerk and submitted to the National City Planning Department.
- 4. This permit shall become null and void if not exercised within one year after adoption of the resolution of approval unless extended according to procedures specified in Section 18.12.040 of the Municipal Code.

Building

5. Building plans and permits shall be required to meet current California Building, Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing, Accessibility, Green, and Energy Codes.

Engineering

 Applicant shall obtain all necessary permits from the Engineer Department related to the proposed project. For more information contact the Engineer Department at 619-336-4380

Fire

- 7. Plans are to be designed, fabricated and installed to code.
- 8. Project to be in compliance with the current editions of NFPA, CFC 2022 Edition, title 19 and local City of National City Municipal Codes.
- 9. Fire Sprinklers which will be required, shall be directly submitted to the National City Fire Department under separate permit for review and permitting. Fees along with 3 sets of plans including all "Cut Sheets and Calculations" shall be included upon

- submittal. Plan review shall be a 30-day plan review process or 21 working days. No over the counter plan reviews accomplished/no exceptions. It shall be unlawful to occupy any portion of the building or structure until the required fire detection, alarm and suppression system have been tested and approved.
- 10. Buildings or portions of buildings or facilities exceeding 30 feet in height measured vertically from the centerline of the street adjacent to the project—above the lowest level of fire department vehicle access shall be provided with approved fire apparatus access roads capable of accommodating fire department aerial apparatus.
- 11. Overhead utility and power lines shall not be located over the aerial fire apparatus access road or between the aerial fire apparatus road and the building. Other obstructions shall be permitted to be placed with approval of the fire code official.
- 12. One or more of the required access routes meeting this condition shall be located not less than 15 feet and not greater than 30 feet from the building, and shall be positioned parallel to one entire side of the building. The side of the building on which the aerial fire apparatus access road is positioned shall be approved by the fire code official.
- 13. Aerial fire apparatus roads shall have a minimum unobstructed width of 26 feet, exclusive of shoulders, in the immediate vicinity of the building or portion thereof.
- 14. Fire hydrants to be located throughout the project as not to have a separation distance greater than 300 feet. Fire hydrants to be located within 300 feet of all locations which are roadway accessible. (Measurement starts from nearest existing fire hydrant to project)
- 15. The following items pertain to fire hydrants:
 - a) Size and location, including size and number of outlets and whether outlets are to be equipped with independent gate valves.
 - b) Fire hydrant to be of three outlet design.
- 16. Fire hydrants to be marked by use of blue reflective marker in the roadway. *Information on required fire hydrants back-flow devices, etc; can be acquired from Sweetwater Authority. All pipe and their appliances, shall meet industry/code standards for underground use.*

Planning

- 17. Prior to issuance of a building permit for this project, a revised drawing in conformance with the revised Exhibit A in the case file shall be submitted to the Planning Division.
- 18. A landscape and underground irrigation plan shall be submitted with building permit plans as part of the construction permitting process in compliance with Land Use Code Chapter 18.44 (Landscaping).

<u>Indemnification Agreement</u>

The Applicant shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City, its agents, officers, and employees from any and all claims, actions, proceedings, damages, judgments, or costs, including attorney's fees, against the City or its agents, officers, or employees, relating to the issuance of this permit including, but not limited to, any action to attack, set aside, void, challenge, or annul this development approval and any environmental document or decision. The City will promptly notify the Applicant of any claim, action, or proceeding. The City may elect to conduct its own defense, participate in its own defense, or obtain independent legal counsel in defense of any claim related to this indemnification. In the event of such election, the Applicant shall pay all of the costs related thereto, including without limitation reasonable attorney's fees and costs. In the event of a disagreement between the City and Applicant regarding litigation issues, the City shall have the authority to control the litigation and make litigation related decisions, including, but not limited to, settlement or other disposition of the matter. However, the Applicant shall not be required to pay or perform any settlement unless such settlement is approved by the Applicant.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be transmitted forthwith to the applicant and to the City Council.

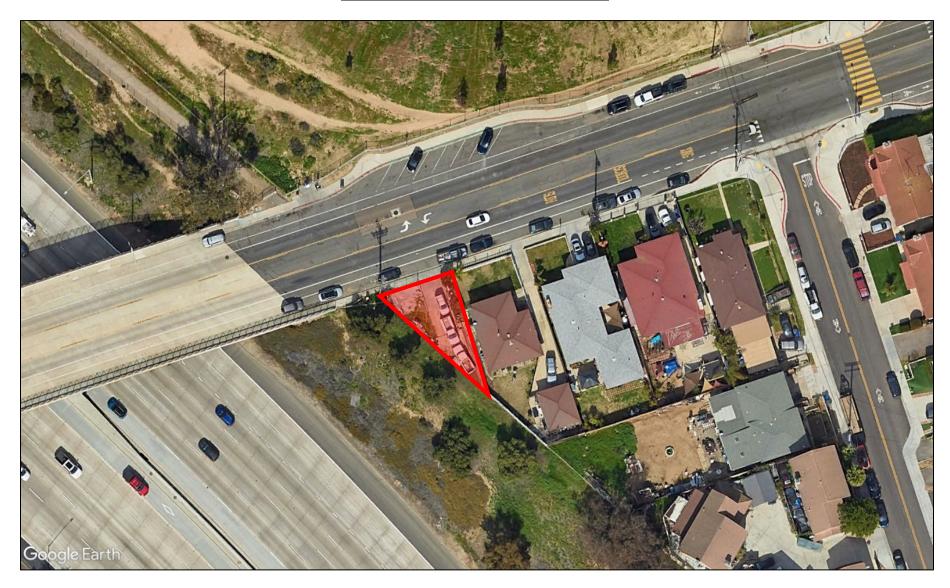

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission of the City of National City considered a Zone Variance for a new single-family residence to be located at East 4th Street (APN: 557-050-32) at a duly advertised public hearing held on April 1, 2024, at which time oral and documentary evidence was presented; and,

WHEREAS, at said public hearings the Planning Commission considered the staff report contained in Case File No. 2023-17 Z maintained by the City and incorporated herein by reference along with evidence and testimony at said hearing; and.

WHEREAS, this action is taken pursuant to all applicable procedures required by State law and City law; and,

WHEREAS, the action recited herein is found to be essential for the preservation of public health, safety, and general welfare.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Planning Commission of the City of National City, California, that the testimony and evidence presented to the Planning Commission at the public hearing held on April 1, 2024, support the following findings, which are hereby made:

1. That the property is less than half the minimum lot size required in the zone, which restricts the normal buildable area afforded standard-sized lots. Furthermore, the triangular shape of the lot modifies the shape of the area that could be developed. Given the size and shape of the lot, there is no room to build a residence of a

typical size with appropriate parking without encroaching into the required property setbacks and exceeding the maximum height of two stories.

- 2. That instances exist of properties within the RS-2 that do not meet the same zoning regulations for which the applicant is requesting relief. Developed properties with less than 5,000 square feet of lot area east of Interstate 805 are not common, but they do exist along the freeway and Division Street. There are also several properties with irregular shapes that do not conform to setback regulations. Instances of reduced setbacks also occur within reverse corner lots and within entire subdivisions abutting topographic variations. Single-family residences that do not meet the maximum height are found throughout National City. Notably, several Victorian-style mansions incorporate a third story. The RS-2 zone also includes houses of every decade of construction since the 1880s. A large number of these residences were developed prior to regulations restricting tandem parking and parking in the front yard setback. Residents commonly park vehicles in a manner similar to the request made by the applicant.
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- required by conditions of approval, all plans submitted for permits associated with the project shall conform to the Exhibit A-Revised, Case File No. 2023-17 Z, dated 2/12/2024, as amended by Planning Commission on April 1, 2024.
- 2. Before this Zone Variance shall become effective, the applicant and the property owner both shall sign and have notarized an Acceptance Form, provided by the Planning Division, acknowledging and accepting all conditions imposed upon the approval of this permit. Failure to return the signed and notarized Acceptance Form within 30 days of its receipt shall automatically terminate the Zone Variance. The applicant shall also submit evidence to the satisfaction of the Planning Division that a Notice of Restriction on Real Property is recorded with the County Recorder. The applicant shall pay necessary recording fees to the County. The Notice of Restriction shall provide information that conditions imposed by approval of the Zone Variance are binding on all present or future interest holders or estate holders of the property. The Notice of Restriction shall be approved as to form by the City Attorney and signed by the City Manager or assign prior to recordation.
- 3. Within four (4) days of approval, pursuant to Fish and Game Code 711.4 and the California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 753.5, the applicant shall pay all necessary environmental filing fees for the San Diego County Clerk. Checks shall be made payable to the County Clerk and submitted to the National City Planning Department.
- 4. This permit shall become null and void if not exercised within one year after adoption of the resolution of approval unless extended according to procedures specified in Section 18.12.040 of the Municipal Code.

It shall be unlawful to occupy any portion of the building or structure until the required fire detection, alarm and suppression system have been tested and approved.

Buildings or portions of buildings or facilities exceeding 30 feet in height measured vertically from the centerline of the street adjacent to the project above the lowest level of fire department vehicle access shall be provided with approved fire apparatus access roads capable of accommodating fire department aerial apparatus.
- 11. Overhead utility and power lines shall not be located over the aerial fire apparatus access road or between the aerial fire apparatus road and the building. Other obstructions shall be permitted to be placed with approval of the fire code official.
- 12. One or more of the required access routes meeting this condition shall be located not less than 15 feet and not greater than 30 feet from the building, and shall be positioned parallel to one entire side of the building. The side of the building on which the aerial fire apparatus access road is positioned shall be approved by the fire code official.
- 13. Aerial fire apparatus roads shall have a minimum unobstructed width of 26 feet, exclusive of shoulders, in the immediate vicinity of the building or portion thereof.
- 14. Fire hydrants to be located throughout the project as not to have a separation distance greater than 300 feet. Fire hydrants to be located within 300 feet of all locations which are roadway accessible. (Measurement starts from nearest existing fire hydrant to project)
- 15. The following items pertain to fire hydrants:
 - a) Size and location, including size and number of outlets and whether outlets are to be equipped with independent gate valves.
 - b) Fire hydrant to be of three outlet design.
- 16. Fire hydrants to be marked by use of blue reflective marker in the roadway. Information on required fire hydrants back-flow devices, etc; can be acquired from Sweetwater Authority. All pipe and their appliances, shall meet industry/code standards for underground use.

SUBJECT:

Introduction of an Ordinance Amending Section 9.07 (Food Caterers and Catering Equipment Rentals) of the National City Municipal Code.

RECOMMENDATION:

Introduce the Ordinance

BOARD/COMMISSION/COMMITTEE PRIOR ACTION:

Not Applicable.

EXPLANATION:

The City has regulations in the Municipal Code (NCMC) related to food sales from mobile food vending vehicles (e.g., food trucks, trailers, etc.) under NCMC 9.06 and from sidewalk vendors under NCMC 13.30. In addition to the above-referenced Municipal Code sections, food sales are also permitted as part of a temporary event (Temporary Use Permit), as regulated by Chapter 15.60 (Temporary Use Permits) and in relation to private catering operations in Chapter 9.07. All activities associated with the above Code sections are also required to abide by the regulations of the Department of Environmental Health and Quality (DEHQ). Since the COVID-19 pandemic smaller businesses that do not have the capacity or capital to offer food sales have turned to outside food sales. In the case of establishing or niche businesses, mobile food vendors are not always an option due to location, lack of established clientele, or property size. Many have turned to more permanent non-kitchen based alternatives, such as parking lot-based vendors or similar (carts, tables, etc.). However, sidewalk vendors are limited to street rights-of-way, and Title 18 typically requires that all uses be conducted in enclosed buildings.

Proposal

Staff is suggesting an amendment to Chapter 9.07 (Food Caterers and Catering Equipment Rentals) to address food vending covered under the existing DEHQ permitting framework. The intent is to allow smaller service businesses such as bars or markets that do not have kitchens to offer limited food sales on the property. The City of San Diego has similar allowances, as does the City of Los Angeles, which has removed almost all barriers to outside food vending in recent years.

Analysis

DEHQ regulates three primary exterior food activities:

Mobile Food Facilities (e.g., food trucks)

- **Temporary Food Facilities** (e.g., temporary community event)
- Satellite Food Service Operations (e.g., restaurant, market ~ business with interior food preparation facilities)

The first two bulleted items are covered under existing Code sections for mobile food vending vehicles and Temporary Use Permits. Satellite Food Service Operations are for a restaurant or market to produce food in the business on site and serve it outside. There is also **private event catering**, which does not typically require anything from the City other than be associated with a permitted event and have a business license.

However, there is also **Direct-sales catering**, which means any catering where food is sold or served to individual consumers as members of the public (i.e., all catering other than private event catering). Direct-sales catering is only allowed at a permitted **catering host facility** that meets DEHQ requirements at the time the catered food is served. A Catering host facility generally requires restroom facilities, sinks for cleaning dishes, adequate power, and potable water.

Direct-sales catering allows "limited food preparation", which is defined as one or more of the following:

- 1. Heating, frying, baking, roasting, popping, shaving of ice, blending, steaming or boiling of hot dogs, or assembly of non-prepackaged food.
- 2. Dispensing and portioning of non-potentially hazardous food or dispensing and portioning for immediate service to a customer of food that has been temperature controlled until immediately prior to portioning or dispensing.
- 3. Holding, portioning, and dispensing of any foods that are prepared for satellite food service by the onsite permanent food facility or prepackaged by another approved source.
- 4. Holding, portioning, and dispensing of any foods that are prepared by a catering operation.
- 5. Slicing and chopping of non-potentially hazardous food or produce that has been washed at an approved facility or slicing and chopping of food on a heated cooking surface during the cooking process.
- 6. Cooking and seasoning to order.
- 7. Juicing or preparing beverages that are for immediate service, in response to an individual consumer order, which do not contain frozen milk products.
- 8. Hot and cold holding of food that has been prepared at an approved permanent food facility.
- 9. Reheating of food that has been previously prepared at an approved permanent food facility and held at temperatures required by this chapter.

Limited food preparation does not include any of the following:

- 1. Slicing and chopping potentially hazardous food, other than produce, unless it is on the heated cooking surface.
- 2. Thawing.
- 3. Cooling of cooked, potentially hazardous food.
- 4. Grinding raw ingredients or potentially hazardous food.
- 5. Washing of foods.
- 6. Cooking of potentially hazardous foods for later use.
- 7. Handling, manufacturing, freezing, processing, or packaging of milk, milk products, or products resembling milk products.

Staff has provided a draft ordinance which amends Section 9.07 to define DEHQ requirements and defer to their permitting process. There is also a requirement for a City business license and to maintain access to required parking spaces, as these types of uses will typically occur within parking lots.

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

The ordinance being proposed is considered exempt from CEQA because it is not a project as defined in Section 15378. If approved, there would be no construction occurring or an increase in vehicle trips; therefore, there would not be any potential to result in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment.

<u>Summary</u>

Staff is suggesting amending the Municipal Code to allow smaller businesses with limited resources to expand their ability to serve their customers. If approved, this Ordinance will allow for outside food sales on a limited basis, subject to County health permit regulations. The amendment would also make National City consistent with other similar jurisdictions. If this ordinance is introduced, staff will return with an ordinance for adoption at the next City Council meeting. Subsequent amendments to Title 18 (Zoning) will follow to add cross-references related to the amended Chapter 9.07, including a recommendation from the Planning Commission.

Chapter 9.07 FOOD CATERERS AND CATERING EQUIPMENT RENTALS

9.07.010 Definitions.

Whenever in this article, the following terms are used, they shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

- A. "Caterer" means a business which prepares food for a catering function for events such as, but not limited to, picnics, weddings, banquets, parties, gatherings.
- B. "Catering vehicle" means a vehicle upon which food, beverages and related service equipment are transported related to a catering function.
- C. "Catering function" means any event where a caterer provides food for a person or persons at other than an existing health regulated establishment. A catering function shall not include those functions that are conducted by persons engaged or employed in youth organizations, churches, church societies, private clubs or other nonprofit associations of a religious, philanthropic, civic improvement, youth development, social, political, or educational nature which purchase food, food products, or beverages, for service without charge to their members or to the general public at fund-raising events, for consumption on or off the premises at which the food, food products, or beverages are served or sold, if the service or sale of such food, food products or beverages does not constitute a primary purpose or function of the club or association, and if no employee or member is assigned full-time to care for or operate equipment used in such an arrangement.
- D. "Catering equipment rental establishment" means an establishment that provides food service utensils such as dishes, tableware, pots and pans to caterers or to the public but does not provide catering services.
- E. "Department" means the San Diego Department of Environmental Health and Quality Services.
- F. "Direct-sales catering" means any catering where food is sold or served to individual consumers as members of the public (i.e., all catering other than private event catering).
- G. "Catering host facility" means a fixed facility established and regularly operated for purposes other than food service.
- H. "Satellite Food Service" means a remotely located food service operation that is conducted on the same property as, in reasonable proximity to, and in conjunction with and by, a fully enclosed permanent food facility.

9.07.020 Application of legislation.

The provisions of Division I, Title 6, of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances and the California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law Code (CRFC)

(CURFFL) relative to food handler training and the preparation and distribution of food are hereby made applicable to caterers and caterer operations.

9.07.030 Health permits and fees.

Persons operating as caterers and catering equipment rental establishments are considered to be operating a health regulated establishment and are subject to public health permit requirements as specified in the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances. Such persons shall pay the permit fees prescribed for restaurants in Section 9.04.170 of this code and shall be subject to penalties for delinquent fee payment as set forth in Section 65.104 and 65.105 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances.

9.07.040 Notification of catering events.

When requested by the <u>deputy director of environmental health services</u> <u>Director of Environmental Health of San Diego County</u>, caterers shall notify the department of the time, date and location of each catering function in a manner specified by the department.

9.07.050 Potentially hazardous foods.

All potentially hazardous foods as defined in Section 27531 113871 of the California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law Code that are stored, held, transported or served by a caterer must be protected from contamination and kept at temperatures as required by the California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law Code.

9.07.060 Toilet facilities.

Adequate toilet and handwashing facilities, as determined by the deputy director of environmental health services, must be reasonably available in the vicinity of any location where food is prepared or served.

9.07.070 Catering vehicles.

No person or company shall operate or cause to be operated a catering vehicle without complying with the following:

- A. Such person or company shall have a valid health permit as required by Section 61.192104 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances.
- Foods and food containers shall be carried in compartments with cleanable interior surfaces.
- C. Vehicles shall be maintained in a clean condition.

9.07.080 Catering equipment rental establishment.

No person or company shall operate or cause to be operated, a catering equipment rental establishment without complying with the following:

A. All food service equipment shall be stored in a building that meets the requirements of the California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law Code.

B. All food service equipment such as dishes, glasses, tableware, pots and pans shall be cleaned and sanitized by methods prescribed in the California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law Code.

9.07.090 Direct-sales catering.

No person or entity shall engage in direct-sales catering without complying with the following:

- A. <u>Direct-sales catering is only allowed at a permitted catering host facility that meets the requirements of section 61.306 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances at the time the catered food is served.</u>
- B. <u>Direct-sales catering food service may only occur at a permitted catering host facility that meets the requirements of section 61.307 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances at the time the catered food is served.</u>
- C. All catering host facilities shall obtain appropriate permits as required by section 61.303 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances.
- D. No required parking spaces or access to the same shall be blocked or impeded in any way by direct-sales catering activity.
- E. <u>A City business license shall be required for the entity engaged in direct-sales catering (separate from the licensed business premises).</u>
- F. No alcohol may be sold or served by any direct-sales caterer.

9.07.100 Satellite Food Service.

No person or entity shall conduct satellite food service operations without complying with the following:

- A. All satellite food service operations shall obtain appropriate permits as required by the California Retail Food Code and the Director of Environmental Health of San Diego County.
- B. No required parking spaces or access to the same shall be blocked or impeded in any way by direct-sales catering activity.
- C. No alcohol may be sold or served by any satellite food service operations unless approved by a Conditional Use Permit.

ORDINANCE NO. 2024 -

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NATIONAL CITY, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 9.07 (FOOD CATERERS AND CATERING EQUIPMENT RENTALS) OF THE NATIONAL CITY MUNICIPAL CODE.

WHEREAS, the City of National City (the "City"), pursuant to the police powers delegated to it by the California Constitution, has the authority to enact or amend laws which promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of its residents; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms and provisions of the Government Code of the State of California, proceedings were duly initiated for the amendment of the National City Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, staff is suggesting an amendment to Chapter 9.07 to address food vending covered under the existing Department of Environmental Health and Quality (DEHQ) permitting framework with the intent to allow smaller service businesses such as bars and markets that do not have kitchens to offer limited food sales on the property; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a published 10-day notice of the adoption of said ordinance, a public hearing was held by the City Council on April 16, 2024, and at said public hearing, all persons interested were given the opportunity to appear and be heard before the City Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NATIONAL CITY, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE and ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: The City Council of the City of National City hereby amends Section 9.07 (Food Caterers and Catering Equipment Rentals) to read as follows:

Chapter 9.07 FOOD CATERERS AND CATERING EQUIPMENT RENTALS

9.07.010 Definitions.

Whenever in this article, the following terms are used, they shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

- A. "Caterer" means a business which prepares food for a catering function for events such as, but not limited to, picnics, weddings, banquets, parties, gatherings.
- B. "Catering vehicle" means a vehicle upon which food, beverages and related service equipment are transported related to a catering function.
- C. "Catering function" means any event where a caterer provides food for a person or persons at other than an existing health regulated establishment. A catering function shall not include those functions that are conducted by persons engaged or employed in youth organizations, churches, church societies, private clubs or other nonprofit associations of a religious, philanthropic, civic improvement, youth development, social, political, or educational nature which purchase food, food products, or beverages, for service without

charge to their members or to the general public at fund-raising events, for consumption on or off the premises at which the food, food products, or beverages are served or sold, if the service or sale of such food, food products or beverages does not constitute a primary purpose or function of the club or association, and if no employee or member is assigned full-time to care for or operate equipment used in such an arrangement.

- D. "Catering equipment rental establishment" means an establishment that provides food service utensils such as dishes, tableware, pots and pans to caterers or to the public but does not provide catering services.
- E. "Department" means the San Diego Department of Environmental Health and Quality.
- F. "Direct-sales catering" means any catering where food is sold or served to individual consumers as members of the public (i.e., all catering other than private event catering).
- G. "Catering host facility" means a fixed facility established and regularly operated for purposes other than food service.

9.07.020 Application of legislation.

Adequate toilet and handwashing facilities, as determined by the deputy director of environmental health services, must be reasonably available in the vicinity of any location where food is prepared or served. 9.07.070 Catering vehicles.

No person or company shall operate or cause to be operated a catering vehicle without complying with the following:

- A. Such person or company shall have a valid health permit as required by Section 61.104 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances.
- B. Foods and food containers shall be carried in compartments with cleanable interior surfaces.
- C. Vehicles shall be maintained in a clean condition.

9.07.080 Catering equipment rental establishment.

- B. Direct-sales catering food service may only occur at a permitted catering host facility that meets the requirements of section 61.307 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances at the time the catered food is served.
- C. All catering host facilities shall obtain appropriate permits as required by section 61.303 of the San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances.
- D. No required parking spaces or access to the same shall be blocked or impeded in any way by direct-sales catering activity.
- E. A City business license shall be required for the entity engaged in direct-sales catering (separate from the licensed business premises).
- F. No alcohol may be sold or served by any direct-sales caterer.

9.07.100 Satellite Food Service.

No person or entity shall conduct satellite food service operations without complying with the following:

- A. All satellite food service operations shall obtain appropriate permits as required by the California Retail Food Code and the Director of Environmental Health of San Diego County.
- B. No required parking spaces or access to the same shall be blocked or impeded in any way by direct-sales catering activity.

No alcohol may be sold or served by any satellite food service operations unless approved by a Conditional Use Permit.

Section 2: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from the date of its passage, and before the expiration of fifteen (15) days after its passage, it or a summary of it, shall be published once, with the names of the members of the City Council voting for and against the same in the Star News, a newspaper of general circulation published in the County of San Diego, California.

Section 3: The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall publish in accordance with the law.

Ordinance for Introduction – Discharge of Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) to the Municipal Sewer System.

RECOMMENDATION:

Introduce Ordinance by First Reading, entitled, "Ordinance of the City Council of the City of National City, California, amending Section 14.06.190 – Industrial Wastes - Discharge Restrictions - Permit Required When, and adding Chapter 14.24 – Fats, Oils and Grease Discharge Control to Title 14 of the National City Municipal Code."

BOARD/COMMISSION/COMMITTEE PRIOR ACTION:

Not Applicable.

EXPLANATION:

The City of National City owns and operates the sanitary sewer system within city limits, which exists to collect and convey the waste collected from residential, commercial and industrial uses. The City proposes to amend Section 14.06.190 – Industrial Wastes - Discharge Restrictions - Permit Required When, and add Chapter 14.24 – Fats, Oils and Grease Discharge Control to Title 14 of the National City Municipal Code. The purpose of this proposed ordinance is to establish further regulations and compliance requirements that will support the City's FOG control program, which is an important factor in the operation of the sanitary sewer system.

The proposed amended and new language in the ordinance is expected to reduce the potential for sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) and protect public health and the environment by minimizing public exposure to unsanitary conditions. By controlling the discharge of fats, oils, and grease to the wastewater collection system, excessive buildup in sewer lines can be lessened, thereby increasing the system's operating efficiency and reducing the number of sewer line blockages and overflows.

As a sewer system operator, the City must implement FOG control as required by the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) Water Quality Order No. 2022-0103-DWQ. This ordinance will enhance the City's ability to implement and enforce the following required controls:

- Authority to inspect grease producing facilities, and provide enforcement to eliminate fats, oils, and grease from the sewer system.
- Implementation of source control measures for all sources of fats, oils, and grease reaching the sanitary sewer system.
- An implementation plan and schedule for a public education and outreach program that promotes proper disposal of FOG.

- The legal authority to prohibit discharges to the system and identify measures to prevent spills and blockages.
- Requirements to install grease removal devices (such as traps or interceptors), design standards for the removal devices, maintenance requirements, best management practices requirements, recordkeeping and reporting requirements.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

The revised ordinance will not increase the cost to the City as it already has had a FOG program in place for years, as required by state law. The approximate annual cost for the City to meet its obligation of oversight and compliance is typically less than \$50,000 through a service contract with an expert consultant, however, that cost is partially recovered through a fee charged to the grease-producing facility owners. If there are violation issues, the responsible parties are billed for additional costs incurred by the City.

ORDINANCE NO. 2024 -

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NATIONAL CITY, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 14.06.190 – INDUSTRIAL WASTES - DISCHARGE RESTRICTIONS - PERMIT REQUIRED WHEN, AND ADDING CHAPTER 14.24 – FATS, OILS AND GREASE DISCHARGE CONTROL TO TITLE 14 OF THE NATIONAL CITY MUNICIPAL CODE.

- **WHEREAS**, the City of National City may adopt ordinances in accordance with its police powers to ensure the public health, welfare, and safety of its residents, including the police powers vested in the City pursuant to article XI, section 7, of the California Constitution; and
- **WHEREAS**, pursuant to the terms and provisions of the Government Code of the State of California, proceedings were duly initiated for the amendment of the National City Municipal Code; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City of National City owns and operates the sanitary sewer system within city limits, which exists to collect and convey the waste collected from residential, commercial and industrial uses; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City proposes to amend Section 14.06.190 Industrial Wastes Discharge Restrictions Permit Required When, and add Chapter 14.24 Fats, Oils and Grease Discharge Control to Title 14 of the National City Municipal Code; and
- **WHEREAS**, the purpose of this proposed ordinance is to establish further regulations and compliance requirements that will support the City's FOG control program, which is an important factor in the operation of the sanitary sewer system; and
- **WHEREAS**, the wastewater collection system's operating efficiency can be increased by controlling the discharge of FOG to the system; and
- WHEREAS, FOG control is required by the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) Water Quality Order 2022-0103-DWQ; and
- **WHEREAS**, this ordinance will provide the authority to inspect grease producing facilities, and provide enforcement to eliminate fats, oils, and grease from the sewer system; and
- **WHEREAS**, this ordinance will allow for implementation of source control measures for all sources of fats, oils, and grease reaching the sanitary sewer system; and
- **WHEREAS**, this ordinance will provide an implementation plan and schedule for a public education and outreach program that promotes proper disposal of FOG; and
- **WHEREAS**, this ordinance will provide the legal authority to prohibit discharges to the system and identify measures to prevent spills and blockages; and
- **WHEREAS**, this ordinance will provide requirements to install grease removal devices (such as traps or interceptors), design standards for the removal devices, maintenance requirements, best management practice requirements, and recordkeeping and reporting requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NATIONAL CITY, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: The City Council of the City of National City hereby amends Section 14.06.190 of the National City Municipal Code to read as follows:

14.06.190 Industrial wastes—Discharge restrictions—Permit required when.

- A. Chemical or industrial liquid wastes shall not be discharged into the public sewer system without obtaining an industrial waste permit and the approval of the San Diego Metropolitan Sewerage System to discharge such wastes into the public sewer. Wastes that are known to be detrimental to the public sewer system or detrimental to the functioning of the sewage treatment plant shall be treated and disposed of as found necessary and directed by the San Diego Metropolitan Sewerage System or other authority having jurisdiction.
- B. Solid wastes resulting from the preparation of any food or drink prepared on premises where such foods or drinks are served or proposed to be served for consumption shall not discharge into the public sewer system in concentrations that may result in separation from effluent and adherence to sewer structures and appurtenances, accumulate and/or cause or contribute to blockages in the sewer system or at the sewer system lateral which connects the food service establishment to the sewer system. Premises where food or drink are served or proposed to be served for consumption are required to install, operate and maintain a grease control device of an approved type and adequate size in accordance with the current edition of the California Plumbing Code, see Chapter 15.20.
- C. Interceptors (including grease, oil and sand, etc.) shall be provided when, in the judgment of the director of building and safety or the public works director, they are necessary for the proper handling of liquid wastes containing grease, flammable wastes, sandy solids, acid or alkaline substances or other ingredients harmful to the building drainage system, the public or private sewer or to public or private sewage disposal facilities in accordance to the FOG Ordinance, see Chapter 14.24.

Section 2: The City Council of the City of National City adds Chapter 14.24 of the National City Municipal Code to read as follows:

Chapter 14.24 – FATS, OILS AND GREASE DISCHARGE CONTROL

Sections:

14.24.010 Title.

This chapter shall be known as "City of National City Fats, Oils and Grease Discharge Control Ordinance" and shall be so cited.

14.24.020 Purpose and intent.

The purpose of this ordinance is to provide for the protection and maximum beneficial public use of the City's sewer system while preventing blockages of the sewer resulting from discharges of

Fats, Oils, and Grease ("FOG") to sewer facilities, and to specify appropriate FOG discharge requirements for food service establishments ("FSEs").

14.24.030 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter certain terms are defined as follows:

- A. "Best management practices" means schedules of activities, prohibitions, practices, maintenance procedures, and other management practices to prevent or reduce the introduction of FOG to the sewer facilities.
- B. "Discharger" means any person who discharges or causes a discharge of wastewater directly or indirectly into a public sewer.
- C. "Fats, oils, and grease" (FOG) means any substance such as a vegetable or animal product that is used in, or is a by-product of, the cooking or food preparation process, and that turns or may turn viscous or solidify with a change in temperature or other conditions.
- D. "FOG control program" means the FOG control program required by and developed pursuant to State Water Resources Control Board Order No. 2022-0103.
- E. "Food grinder" means any device installed in the plumbing or sewage system for the purpose of grinding food waste or food preparation by-products prior to discharge in the sewer system.
- F. "Food service establishment" (FSE) means establishments of any size operating in a permanently constructed structure, such as a room, building, or place, or portion thereof, maintained, used, or operated for the purpose of preparing, serving, manufacturing, packaging, or otherwise handling food, or for consumption by the public, its members, or employees, and which has any process or device that uses or produces FOG. A limited food preparation establishment is not considered a FSE when engaged only in reheating, hot holding, or assembly of ready to eat food products without soiling non-disposable cookware, serving ware, dishes, or utensils, and as a result, there is no wastewater discharge containing a significant amount of FOG. A limited food preparation establishment does not include any operation that changes the form, flavor, or consistency of food.
- G. "Grease" means any material which is extractable from an acidified sample of a waste by hexane or other designated solvent and as determined by the appropriate procedure in standard methods. "Grease" includes fats and oils.
- H. "Grease control device" means any grease interceptor, grease trap or other mechanism, device, or process, which attaches to, or is applied to, wastewater plumbing fixtures and lines, the purpose of which is to trap, collect, or treat FOG prior to it being discharged into the sewer system. "Grease control device" may also include any other proven method to reduce FOG subject to the approval of the City.
- I. "Grease interceptor" means a multi-compartment device that is constructed in different sizes and, according to the current edition of the California Plumbing Code, is generally required to be located underground between a FSE and the connection to the City's sewer system. These devices primarily use gravity to separate FOG from the wastewater as it moves from one compartment to the next. These devices must be cleaned, maintained, and have the FOG removed and disposed of in a proper manner on regular intervals to be effective.
- J. "Grease trap" means a grease control device that is used to serve individual or multiple fixtures and have limited effect and should only be used in those cases where the use of a grease interceptor or other grease control device is determined to be impossible or impracticable.

- K. "Hot spots" means areas in sewer lines that have experienced sanitary sewer overflows or that must be cleaned or maintained frequently to avoid blockages of the sewer system.
- L. "Private Lateral Sewage Discharge" (PLSD)" means sewage discharges that are caused by blockages or other problems within privately owned laterals or collection systems which are tributary to the sanitary sewer system. This type of sewage discharge is the responsibility of the private lateral or collection system owner.
- M. "Remodeling" means a physical change or operational change causing increased FOG generation that exceeds the current amount of FOG discharge to the sewer system by the FSE in an amount that alone or collectively causes or creates a potential for SSOs to occur; or any remodeling of a food service establishment that requires a building permit.
 - "Sanitary sewer overflow" (SSO) means and includes any overflow, spill, release, discharge or diversion of untreated or partially treated wastewater from a sanitary sewer system. SSOs include: Overflows or releases of untreated or partially treated wastewater that reach waters of the United States;
 - 2. Overflows or releases of untreated or partially treated wastewater that do not reach waters of the United States; and
 - 3. Wastewater backups into buildings and on private property that are caused by blockages or flow conditions within the publicly owned portion of a sanitary sewer system.
- N. "Sewage" means the waterborne wastes derived from ordinary human living processes and of such character as to permit satisfactory disposal, without special treatment, into the public sewer, a private sewer, or by means of household septic tank systems and individual household aerobic units.
- O. "Sewer, Public." See definition in Chapter 14.06.010 of the municipal code.
- P. "Wastewater" means any liquid waste of any kind, whether treated or not, and whether animal, mineral or vegetable including sewage, agricultural, industrial and thermal wastes, which are discharged into or permitted to enter a public sewer.

14.24.040 FOG discharge requirement.

No food service establishment (FSE) shall discharge or cause to be discharged into the sewer system any FOG in concentrations that may result in separation from effluent and adherence to sewer structures and appurtenances, accumulate, and/or cause or contribute to blockages in the sewer system or at the sewer system lateral which connects the FSE to the sewer system. The following requirements shall apply to all FSEs:

A. Grease control device. FSEs are required to install, operate and maintain a grease control device of an approved type and adequate size in accordance with the current edition of the California Plumbing Code, see Chapter 15.20.005 -2022 CPC, (adopted Ordinance No. 2023-2513, §§ 3, 2-21-2023) to maintain compliance with the objectives of this chapter, subject to the variance and waiver provisions of Section 14.24.060. The grease control device shall be adequate to separate and remove FOG contained in wastewater discharges from FSEs prior to discharge to the sewer system. Fixtures, equipment, and drain lines located in the food preparation and clean up areas of FSEs that are sources of FOG discharges shall be connected to the grease control device. The grease control device shall be installed at a location approved by the County of San Diego or at the discretion of the City Engineer, where it shall be at all times easily accessible for

inspection, cleaning, and removal of accumulated grease. Compliance shall be established as follows:

- a. Newly constructed FSEs, and FSEs that open a new business within an existing building, shall install grease control devices prior to commencing discharges of wastewater to the sewer system. This includes FSEs that are remodeling the site as well as those that are not remodeling the site.
- b. Existing FSEs shall be required to install and operate a grease control device within 6 months of notification by the City, or at the discretion of the City Engineer, if in the determination of the FOG program manager any of the following apply:
 - i. The existing FSE has caused or contributed to the buildup of FOG, or a FOGrelated blockage, in the sewer system including private laterals, and has reasonable potential to adversely impact the sewer system.
 - ii. The existing FSE has a sewer lateral connected to a hot spot, and has reasonable potential to adversely impact the sewer system.
 - iii. The existing FSE has made any change in food preparation or business operations that is different than the original business application and those changes will lead to an increase in grease disposal which have reasonable potential to adversely impact the sewer system.
 - iv. The existing FSE undergoes remodeling, as defined in Section 14.24.040.A.a.
 - v. The existing FSE undergoes a change in ownership.
 - vi. The existing FSE has reasonable potential to adversely impact the sewer system.
- B. Private lateral maintenance. All FSEs are required to clean the sewer lateral from the facility to the sewer main at least annually, or more often as needed to ensure proper flow within the sewer lateral.
- C. Maintenance Records. A record of sewer lateral cleaning must be maintained and kept on file for review at the food service facility. FSEs with a grease control device shall keep records of cleaning, maintenance and grease removal. All such records must be retained on site by the facility for a minimum of two years. A separate maintenance log shall be maintained for each grease control device.
- D. Inspection. Each FSE shall allow *authorized* City officials or enforcement officers, or an authorized representative, access to the premises during normal business hours and at reasonable times, for purposes of sampling, inspections and review of records relating to grease disposal.
 - a. When offered by the City, inspections may be completed through a self-verification process. Failure to respond to a self-verification request or provide the necessary documentation will result in an onsite inspection by authorized City officials or enforcement officers, or an authorized representative.

14.24.050 FOG prohibitions.

The following prohibitions shall apply to all FSEs:

- A. Installation of food grinders in the plumbing system of new construction or remodeling of FSEs shall be prohibited.
- B. Introduction of any additives into a FSE's wastewater system for the purpose of emulsifying FOG or biologically/chemically treating FOG for grease remediation or as a supplement to grease control device maintenance is prohibited, unless a specific written authorization from the City of National City and the City of San Diego is obtained.

- C. Disposal of waste cooking oil into drainage pipes is prohibited. All waste cooking oils shall be collected and stored properly in receptacles such as barrels or drums for recycling or other acceptable methods of disposal.
- D. Discharge of wastewater from dishwashers to any grease control device is prohibited.
- E. Discharge of wastewater with temperatures in excess of 140 degrees Fahrenheit to any grease control device, including grease traps and grease interceptors, is prohibited.
- F. Discharge of any waste, including FOG and solid materials removed from the grease control device to the sewer system, is prohibited.

14.24.060 Variance and waiver of grease control device requirement.

- A. Variance from Grease Interceptor Requirements. An existing FSE may obtain a variance from the grease interceptor requirement to allow alternative pretreatment technology that is, at least, equally effective in controlling the FOG discharge in lieu of a grease interceptor, if the FSE demonstrates that it is impossible or impracticable to install, operate or maintain a grease interceptor. The City's determination to grant a variance will be based upon, but not limited to, evaluation of the following conditions:
 - a. There is no adequate space for installation and/or maintenance of a grease interceptor.
 - b. There is no adequate slope for gravity flow between the kitchen plumbing fixtures and the grease interceptor and/or between the grease interceptor and the private collection lines or the public sewer.
 - c. The FSE can justify that the alternative pretreatment technology is equivalent or better than a grease interceptor in controlling its FOG discharge. In addition, the FSE must be able to demonstrate, after installation of the proposed alternative pretreatment, its effectiveness to control FOG discharge through downstream visual monitoring of the sewer system, for at least three months, at its own expense. A variance may be granted if the results show no visible accumulation of FOG in its lateral and/or tributary downstream sewer lines.
- B. Conditional Waiver from Installation of Grease Interceptor. An existing FSE may obtain a conditional waiver from installation of a grease interceptor, if the FSE demonstrates that it has negligible FOG discharge and insignificant impact to the sewer system. Although a waiver from installation of a grease interceptor may be granted, the FSE may be required to provide space and plumbing segregation for future installation of a grease interceptor. The City's determination to grant or revoke a conditional waiver shall be based upon, but not limited to, evaluation of the following conditions:
 - a. Quantity of FOG discharge as measure or as indicated by the size of FSE based on seating capacity, number of meals served, menu, water usage, amount of on-site consumption of prepared food, and other conditions that may reasonably be shown to contribute to FOG discharges.
 - b. Adequacy of implementation of best management practices and compliance history.
 - c. Sewer size, grade, condition based on visual information, FOG disposition in the sewer by the FSE, and history of maintenance and sewer spills in the receiving sewer system.
 - d. Changes in operations that significantly affect FOG discharge.
 - e. Any other condition deemed reasonably related to the generation of FOG discharges by the City.
- C. Waiver from Grease Interceptor Installation with a Grease Disposal Mitigation Fee. For FSEs where the installation of a grease interceptor is not feasible and no equivalent alternative pretreatment can be installed, a waiver from the grease interceptor requirement

- may be granted with the imposition of a grease disposal mitigation fee. Additional requirements may be imposed to mitigate the discharge of FOG into the sewer system.
- D. Any FSE may request a conditional waiver or variance from the FOG program manager, in order to avoid compliance with the grease control device installation requirement. The FSE bears the burden of demonstrating, to the program manager's satisfaction, that the installation of a grease control device is either not feasible or not applicable. If a grease control device is determined to not be feasible, the applicant must demonstrate how acceptable alternatives will be sufficient to prevent FOG discharges to the sewer system from the FSE. If a grease control device is not necessary, the applicant must demonstrate that it has negligible FOG discharge and insignificant impact to the sewer system. The FSE will be given notice in writing that a conditional waiver or variance from the grease control device requirement has been approved.
- E. Terms and Conditions. The program manager may impose terms and conditions on the issuance of a waiver and may impose conditions on the FSE's business license in accordance with an approved waiver. A conditional waiver may be suspended or revoked at any time when any of the terms and conditions for its issuance is not satisfied or if the conditions upon which the conditional waiver was based change so that the justification for the exception no longer exists. The conditional waiver shall be valid only so long as the FSE remains in compliance with all requirements.

14.24.070 Commercial properties.

Property owners of commercial properties or their official designee(s) shall be responsible for the installation and maintenance of the grease control device serving multiple FSEs that are located on a single parcel.

Property owners of commercial properties or their official designee(s) shall be responsible for the maintenance of the sewer lateral serving multiple FSEs that are located on a single parcel.

14.24.080 Sewer System Overflows, Abatement Orders and Cleanup Costs.

Private sewer lateral failures and SSOs caused by FSEs, alone or collectively, are the responsibility of the private property owner and FSE. If, either at the request of a FSE or to abate an immediate threat to the public health, safety, welfare, or property, the City acts to contain and/or clean up an SSO or the blockage of a sewer lateral or the sewer system caused by a FSE, the City's costs for such abatement shall be entirely borne by the property owner of the FSE, or the discharger, and shall constitute a debt to the City and become due and payable upon the City's request for reimbursement of such costs.

Any person who discharges any waste and/or wastewater which causes or contributes to any sewer blockage, SSO, obstruction, interference, damage, or any other impairment to the City's sewer facilities or to the operation of those facilities shall be liable for all costs incurred to clean or repair the facilities together with expenses incurred by the City to resume normal operations. Any person who discharges waste and/or wastewater to the sewer system which causes or contributes to the City violating discharge requirements established by any Regulatory Agency shall be liable for any costs or expenses incurred by the City as a result, including but not limited to regulatory fines, penalties, and assessments made by other agencies or a court.

14.24.090 Requirements for best management practices.

All FSEs shall implement best management practices in accordance with the requirements and guidelines established by the City under its Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP).

14.24.100 Grease control device maintenance requirements.

All FSEs shall implement grease control device maintenance in accordance with the requirements and guidelines established by the City under its Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP).

14.24.110 Enforcement.

- A. The City Engineer, who is assigned to duties which include the enforcement of FOG Discharge Control regulations and laws, is responsible for enforcing the provisions of this chapter.
- B. The City Engineer shall have responsibility for enforcing all provisions of this chapter. Violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute grounds for issuing a Notice of Violation and assessing a fine by a City's Enforcement Official or representative. Enforcement Actions under this ordinance are the issuance of an administrative citation and assessment of a fine according to Section 1.20.010. However, nothing herein provided shall prevent the City Engineer from efforts to obtain voluntary compliance by way of warning, a notice of violation or educational means.

Section 3: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from the date of its passage, and before the expiration of fifteen (15) days after its passage, it or a summary of it, shall be published once, with the names of the members of the City Council voting for and against the same in the Star News, a newspaper of general circulation published in the County of San Diego, California.

Section 4: That the City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall publish in accordance with the law.

BOARD/COMMISSION/COMMITTEE PRIOR ACTION:

EXPLANATION:

In November 2004, San Diego County Voters approved local Proposition A extending the TransNet ½ cent sales tax to fund the region's transportation system for 40 years. As part of Proposition A and the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance, the Regional Transportation Congestion Improvement Program (RTCIP) was created to ensure that new development directly invests in the region's transportation system to offset the negative impacts of growth on congestion and mobility. One of the requirements of the RTCIP was that by July 1, 2008, each local agency must contribute \$2,000 from exactions imposed on the private sector for each new residence constructed within each jurisdiction. Failure to do so would result in an agency's loss of *TransNet* funding for improvement of local streets. Cities have the authority to impose impact fees under the *Mitigation Fee Act* contained in California Government Code sections 66000 through 66025.

Therefore, on April 1, 2008, to satisfy the requirements of the *TransNet* RTCIP for receipt and expenditure of *TransNet* funds, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2008-2310 amending Title 4 of the National City Municipal Code by adding Chapter 4.52 "Establishing and Approving a Transportation Development Impact Fee for Capital Improvement Projects Necessary to Maintain Acceptable Levels of Traffic and Transportation Service Within the City".

The *TransNet* Extension Ordinance requires that the RTCIP transportation mitigation fee charged by local jurisdictions be adjusted every year on July 1 in order to maintain the purchasing power of the program for improvements to the Regional Arterial System. On February 23, 2024, the SANDAG Board of Directors approved an adjustment to the RTCIP, raising the minimum fee from \$2,741.97 per new residential dwelling unit to \$2,875.06 per unit beginning July 1, 2024.

The following table summarizes the adjusted Transportation Development Impact Fee (TDIF) schedule for new residential development, which will go into effect on July 1, 2024, if adopted by City Council. The TDIF shall be collected prior to the issuance of any building permit for new residential development in the City of National City. A copy of the City's Transportation Impact Fee Program Report is available at the Office of the City Engineer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

Funds will be deposited into the following TDIF Revenue Accounts: 326-00000-3162 and 326-00000-3163. The revenues received from this fee vary greatly from year to year and are dependent upon the number of residential building permits issued. In fiscal year 2023, \$261,000 was collected. So far this fiscal year, \$71,400 has been collected.

Update on Bid Results for El Toyon Park Improvements (CIP No. 22-26)

EXPLANATION:

On November 7, 2023, the City Council of the City of National City entered into a Project Labor Agreement (PLA) with the San Diego County Building and Construction Trades Council and Associated Signatory Craft Unions. The PLA, which went into effect on December 14, 2023, applies to public projects with a construction value of at least \$1,000,000.

The City's first capital project subject to PLA requirements was El Toyon Park Improvements (CIP No. 22-26). The general scope of work is to construct minor landscape grading, pathways, pavements, pedestrian safety, utility, shade structures, splash pad play area, adult fitness area, fencing, landscape drainage, park lighting, communications, irrigation, planting, and park maintenance. Specific improvements will include site demolition, construction of curb ramps, castin-place concrete structures, walls and footings, porous concrete paving, aggregate base, grading, drainage improvements, signage, pavement markings, splash pad play features and filtration system, fitness equipment structures, wood and metal fencing and gates, park lighting, security, landscaping, and irrigation systems. Ancillary work will include mobilization, traffic control during construction, utility coordination, water pollution control, and construction surveying.

The initial project was ready to be advertised for public bidding in November 2023. Upon direction from City Council, staff delayed advertisement to update the project specifications and bid documents for compliance with the PLA. Staff posted the bid solicitation on PlanetBids on February 1, 2024, and subsequently advertised the project in the San Diego Union Tribune on February 5, 2024, February 7, 2024, and February 21, 2024. Staff set the bid due date as March 21, 2024, to allow ample time for contractors to review the bid documents and PLA.

Staff held two pre-bid meetings to provide contractors opportunities to ask questions. A total of ten contractors attended the first pre-bid meeting held on February 8, 2024, while one contractor attended the second pre-bid meeting held on February 22, 2024. Staff also sent letters to all 14 of the craft unions signatory to the PLA in February 2024, encouraging them to reach out to qualified contractors in an effort to garner interest in the project and increase opportunities for competitive bidding. Ultimately, a total of 16 contractors registered on PlanetBids to review the notice inviting bids, project plans and specifications.

On March 21, 2024, only one bid was received in the amount of \$7,785,997.87, which was more than double the Engineer's Estimate of \$3,665,000 for project construction. The sole contractor who submitted the bid was De La Fuente Construction, Inc. Staff contacted the remaining 15 contractors who registered on PlanetBids to gain a better understanding as to why they did not submit bids. Staff received responses from eight of the 15 contractors. Five of the eight contractors cited PLA requirements as the primary reason they did not bid the job. The other three contractors indicated they were either too busy, did not have capacity to take on the project, and/or were not interested after reviewing the scope of work.

Per Section 3.2 Exclusions of the PLA, the City reserves the right to reject all bids and readvertise the project not as a Covered Project or Covered Contract and not subject to this PLA for the following reasons:

- (h) there were less than three qualified bidders; and
- (I) the lowest apparent responsive and responsible bid is 10% or greater than the Engineer's estimate.

The City Engineer is responsible for implementing capital improvement projects consistent with applicable laws, including the California Public Contract Code, local ordinances and other public contracting requirements including the City of National City PLA. Based on the exclusions stated above, the City Engineer has rejected the one bid received and will be readvertising the project as a Non-PLA contract by the end of April 2024.

RECOMMENDATION:

EXPLANATION:

The purpose of this staff report is to provide an update on the use of ARPA funds as it pertains to National City, including an historic timeline of key actions taken by the City Council to allocate funds, expenditures to date, and options for use of remaining fund balance.

In March 2021, a \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill titled the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) was enacted by the federal government. Of the \$1.9 trillion, \$350 billion was allocated for state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments to respond to the COVID-19 emergency and promote economic growth. The Federal Government refers to this portion of the stimulus bill as the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. Of the \$350 billion, the City of National City received \$18,010,907.

The U.S. Treasury issued an Interim Final Rule with guidance on eligible uses for the funds in May 2021. In January 2022, the U.S. Treasury released a Final Rule, which confirmed the following four funding objectives of the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds:

- 1. Support urgent COVID-19 response efforts to continue to decrease spread of the virus and bring the pandemic under control.
- 2. Replace lost public sector revenue to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic.
- 3. Respond to the negative economic impacts of the pandemic, including assistance to households, small businesses, and non-profits, and aid to impacted industries.
- 4. Address systemic public health and economic challenges that have contributed to the unequal impact of the pandemic on certain populations.

In addition, the Final Rule confirmed National City's ability to take a standard allowance of \$10M in the revenue loss category without needing to prove specific revenue loss based on the calculation methodology previously defined by Treasury. The City Council ultimately decided to designate \$6,060,000 of the \$18M ARPA allocation as a revenue offset to General Fund expenditures spread over a three-year period.

Of significant importance is that ARPA funds must be obligated (through contract awards and/or other transactions) by December 31, 2024. Funds must be spent by December 31, 2026.

The following timeline summarizes the public engagement process and previous direction received from City Council on use of ARPA funds:

- August 3, 2021, City Council Meeting staff provided an overview of ARPA and summary of eligible uses.
- October 19, 2021, City Council Special Meeting, ARPA Workshop staff provided an overview of ARPA, strategic planning and CIP prioritization process, and preliminary recommendations for use of ARPA funds. City Council provided direction on use of ARPA funds via a series of motions and votes. All motions passed by unanimous vote.
- December 7, 2021, City Council Meeting City Council adopted Resolution to increase use of ARPA funds for premium pay for eligible City employees. Approved by unanimous vote.
- February 1, 2022, City Council Meeting City Council adopted Resolution to increase use
 of ARPA funds to offset General Fund expenditures for FY 23 & 24. Approved by
 unanimous vote.
- February 15, 2022, City Council Meeting staff provided and overview of ARPA fund allocations previously committed by City Council, report and recommendations to replace the Las Palmas Pool Building and Park Restrooms, and public engagement plan to prioritize remaining ARPA funds. City Council adopted Resolution to allocate ARPA funds for a new Municipal Pool Building / Wellness Center and new restrooms at Las Palmas Park. Vote was 3-2 in support.
- February through March 2022, ARPA Community Outreach members of the public participated in an online survey, written surveys at kiosks (located at Las Palmas Pool, National City Public Library and City Hall), an "Idea Wall," and Open House held at Las Palmas Park on March 17, 2022 to assist in prioritizing approximately \$3M in ARPA funds for projects or programs. The following tables summarize the results.

- April 19, 2022, City Council Special Meeting, Budget Workshop City Council allocates an additional \$3M in ARPA funds for the following projects based on feedback from the community and recommendations from City staff. All items were approved by unanimous vote, except for the Las Palmas Park Yoga & Fitness Lawn which was approved by a 3-2 vote.
- August 16, 2022, City Council Meeting City Council awards a contract to California Commercial Pool, Inc. in the amount of \$3,206,850 and appropriates remaining ARPA fund balance in the amount of \$660,907 to be applied to the base contract award, 10% contingency, and construction support services.

- May 16, 2023, City Council Special Meeting, Budget Workshop staff provided an update on the proposed improvements for Las Palmas Park. A major topic of discussion was consideration of budget enhancements to close the funding gap for the Las Palmas Pool Building / Wellness Center, Splash Pad, new Park Restrooms, and associated site work. The project had been advanced to 95% design, resulting in approximately \$700,000 in ARPA expenditures. The total project cost estimate (hard and soft costs) as presented by staff was approximately \$14.7M, with \$5.5M funded through ARPA appropriations and \$1M funded through State grant appropriations, resulting in a funding shortfall of approximately \$8.2M.
- June 12, 2023, City Council Special Meeting, Budget Workshop City Council directed staff to stop work on the Las Palmas Pool Building / Wellness Center, Splash Pad, and Park Restroom Replacement project and come back to City Council with a cost estimate to rehabilitate the existing pool building, replace the existing park restrooms, build a splash pad, and work with A Reason To Survive (ARTS) to include public art elements. The motion was approved by a 3-2 vote.
- November 2023 through March 2024, Alternatives Assessment for Las Palmas Pool Building staff put together a team of engineers, architects and former City Building Officials to evaluate two new options for the Las Palmas Pool Building, in addition to reviewing the cost estimate for the Wellness Center, and consideration of auxiliary prefabricated or portable facilities for showers, restrooms and changing areas. Current costs for construction of new public facilities or major rehabilitation range between \$900 and \$1,200 per square foot.

 Option 1 – Rehabilitate and retrofit the existing facility for Code compliance and to meet current programming needs, while preserving those elements which convey its historical, cultural, and architectural value.

The team conducted several walkthroughs of the existing, approximately 9,300 s.f. pool building and met with the Aquatics Manager (EXOS) to identify existing deficiencies that must be addressed for Code compliance, public safety and accessibility, and to better meet current programming needs include:

- Roof
- Exterior Walls
- Mechanical, Electrical and Plumbing Systems (MEP)
- Title 24 Accessibility (interior and exterior)
- Drainage
- Restrooms, Showers and Locker Rooms (including lack of private family changing areas)
- Existing Layout
- Front Glass and Windows
- Office and Storage Needs

Exhibit A includes the proposed floor plan and detailed cost estimate. Notable items of work, which will drive costs include:

- Testing of exterior walls for structural integrity; seismic retrofit vs. repair and restore based on results
- Demo existing slab to install new utilities and adjust grades near pool deck to address water intrusion issues.
- Remove most of the interior walls to reconfigure the layout to meet programming and accessibility needs.
- MEP upgrades
- Install new roof system

Cost Estimate: \$13M (could be higher based on unknown conditions such as structural integrity of exterior walls, type of roof system, presence of hazardous materials, extent of gas line replacement, etc.)

 Option 2 – Demolish the existing facility and construct a new, modern and energy efficient facility in the same location.

Exhibit B includes the proposed layout, architectural renderings and cost estimate. Notable elements of design include:

- Lobby and Community room with large glass panes providing natural light and direct access to the pool
- Addition of outdoor showers and lockers
- Shaded bleachers facing the pool
- Solar powered roofing system with natural ventilation above the locker rooms, showers and restrooms

 Efficient layout within a smaller building footprint to control costs, while meeting programming needs

Cost Estimate: \$13M (value engineered to target a cost of \$900 per s.f. for new building construction)

Option 3 – Construct new pool building / Wellness Center on east side of pool.

Exhibit C includes the proposed layout, architectural renderings and cost estimate. Items of note include:

- Modern, energy efficient design that meets programming needs
- Creates natural connections between the pool and Camacho Rec Center
- Requires more extensive site prep, grading, and utility relocations
- Efficient layout within a smaller building footprint to control costs, while meeting programming needs

Cost Estimate: \$14M (considers cost of \$1,000 per s.f. for new building construction; does not include cost to demo existing pool building)

 Option 4 – Prefabricated or portable facilities for showers, restrooms, locker rooms and changing areas.

Exhibit D includes example products. Benefits include:

- Offers an immediate, cost-effective solution until grants or other funding can be secured to build a new, permanent facility.
- Could be placed on existing concrete pads to the east of the pool, which are currently used for materials storage and snack shack
- Existing Pool Building lobby and offices could be refurbished and remain accessible for staff and the public; remainder of building would be closed to the public and could be repurposed for dry storage

Cost Estimate: \$2M (includes site prep, demo of snack shack, utility connections and refurbishment of existing pool building lobby and offices)

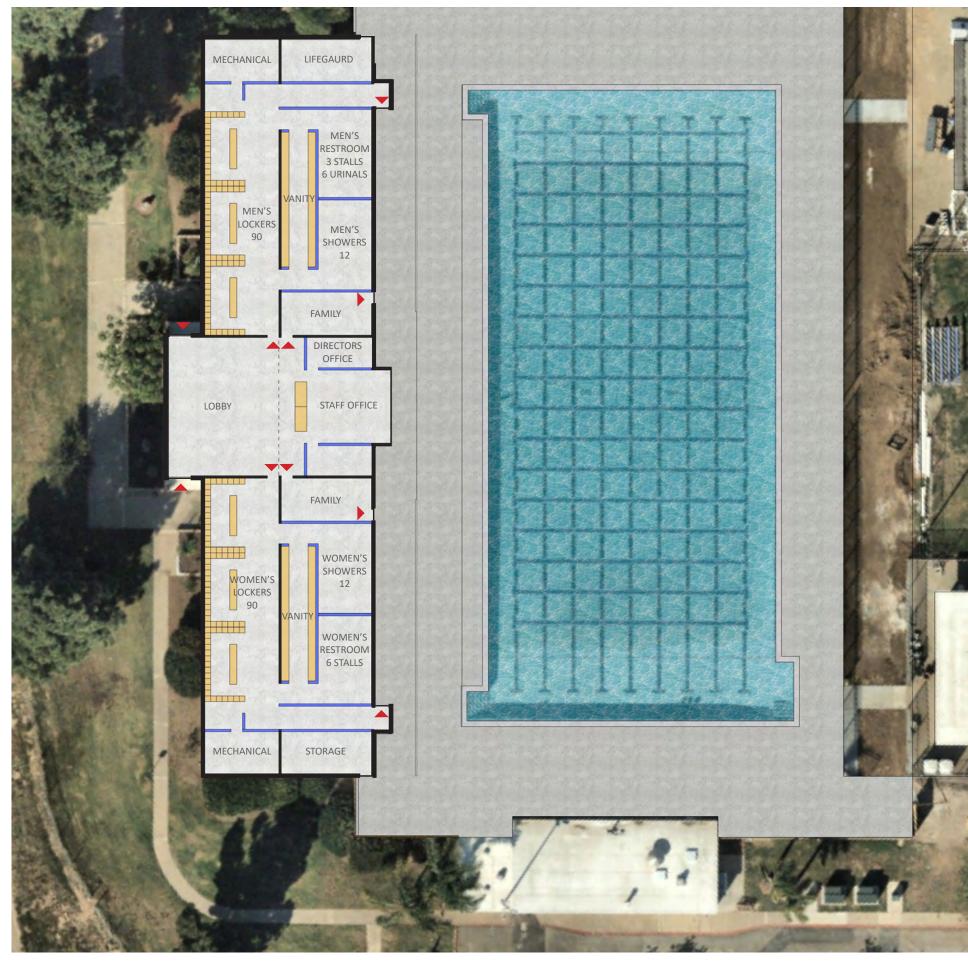

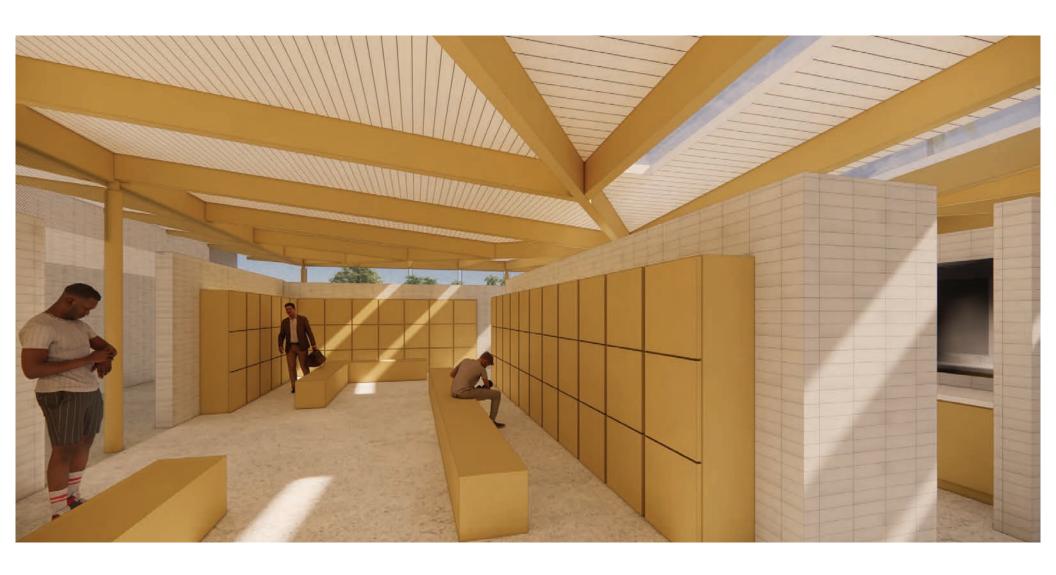
