# 1. Receive a Status Update on the Highland Village Animal Shelter

City Manager Michael Leavitt reported the lease with the Animal Medical Center of Highland Village, which is where the City's Animal Shelter is located, will end on May 31, 2022. He provided background information relating to the area leased by the City, as well as associated costs. Mr. Leavitt stated a shelter evaluation was conducted utilizing the Guidelines for Standards of Care in Animal Shelters. A resulting list of shelter related items were presented, including areas in need of updates or that need to be added.

Mr. Leavitt presented three (3) options for moving forward:

- Option 1 Remodel and expand the current Animal Shelter (a cost estimate is being prepared)
- Option 2 Contract with the Town of Flower Mound Animal Shelter (only preliminary costs have been provided by Flower Mound)
- Option 3 Build a stand-alone animal shelter in Highland Village

Councilmember Fiester asked the average occupancy rate at the shelter, and if a fee is charged when someone picks up their animal. Mr. Leavitt reported the average monthly population in 2019 was 10.6 cats and 3.8 dogs, with an average length of stay of 34 days for cats; 11 days for dogs; 28 days for birds; and 6 days for other small animals. He added that most fees are waived. The shelter is a no kill shelter, unless an animal meets certain criteria. Mr. Leavitt reported there were 830 animal related calls received in 2019.

Mr. Leavitt stated the goal is to have a new long-term shelter agreement completed by October 1, 2020. City staff will work with the Animal Shelter Advisory Committee to gather additional information and will provide a future update for Council.

# 2. Receive an Update on FM 407 Water Well

Public Works Director Scott Kriston provided a history of the water wells in Highland Village, including average usage during summer conditions. He reported that in July 2019, the City's FM 407 water well, located in the 2000 block of Justin Road, was taken out of service. After troubleshooting the well, City staff and consultants determined that the FM407 well has reached the end of its useful life.

City staff and consultants put together a twenty-five (25) year cost analysis and analyzed three (3) options to discuss repair and/or replacement of the City's FM 407 water supply.

- Option 1 Purchase additional surface water from Upper Trinity Regional Water District (UTRWD) – Approximate cost is \$30,751,588 over 25 years
- Option 2 Drill a new water well on or near the existing site Approximate cost is \$6,274,870 over 25 years
- Option 3 Install a smaller well inside the existing FM 407 well casing, which will yield approximately 60% less AND drill a new smaller well near the site at Lake Vista well lot to make up the difference – Approximate cost is \$7,728,281 over 25 years. This is staff's preferred option.

Councilmember Kixmiller asked if there was enough demand for the Lake Vista well. Mr. Kriston stated with potentially three (3) new subdivisions in Highland Village over the next several years, there would be. City Manager Michael Leavitt added that in addition to having enough capacity for regular usage, the City also has to have enough capacity for firefighting capabilities. Consensus of Council is Option 3.

Stephen Thomas (4705 Manor Court, Flower Mound) – Mr. Thomas, Executive Director for Salvation Army of Denton County, thanked the City Council for their recent grant allocation and thanked the Police Department for the toy drive that helped supply items for their Angel Tree. Mr. Thomas reported Mayor Durham of Lewisville issued a challenge

between Lewisville, Flower Mound and Highland Village to see which Mayor could collect the most in donations for Salvation Army on a specific day, with Highland Village collecting the most for the 2<sup>nd</sup> year in row. Mr. Thomas presented Mayor Wilcox with a Salvation Army "bell" in recognition of the win in the 2019 Red Kettle Mayoral Challenge.

Addison Rice, McKinnon Rice, and Gabi Gilbert (students from Marcus High School) –The students thanked the City Council for their help with constructing a sidewalk along Briarhill Boulevard.

# 9. City Manager/Staff Reports

Relating to Agenda Item #13, City Manager Michael Leavitt stated the students that spoke during Visitor Comments brought their concerns to staff and Council regarding construction of a sidewalk on Briarhill Boulevard from Shannon Lane to The District at Highland Village property. This was evaluated and through the budgeting process, funds were approved by Council. This agenda item authorizes execution of a task order for construction of the Briarhill Boulevard sidewalk.

Mr. Leavitt also updated everyone regarding changes being made to the street lights in Highland Village, which are the property of CoServ. CoServ is currently in a phased conversion program changing all street lights from a yellow sodium to LED. In addition, he reported Tequesta, a new 11-lot planned development located in the 1400 block of Highland Village Road, will soon be under construction. The tentative schedule is to mobilize and begin constructing the infrastructure in mid-January, with home construction likely to begin in April/May 2020.

# 16. Consider approval of a Replat for a 2.728 +/- acre tract of land located at Lot 1R, Tract 3A, Barnett Subdivision, generally known as 107 Barnett Boulevard <u>REPLAT APPROVED (6- 0)</u>

Public Works Director Scott Kriston reported City staff has received and reviewed an application for a replat of a tract of land located at 107 Barnett Boulevard, for future use as Village Green Memory Care Center. The proposed replat does not create any additional lots and the applicant desires to dedicate additional easements on the property that are needed for the development of the memory care center and prefer to dedicate those easements through a replat of the property as opposed to executing and recording separate instruments dedicating those needed easements.

He further added that City staff and the City's Engineer have reviewed the application relating to drainage, utilities, and submitted comments back to the applicant. The applicant has resubmitted the application and has addressed all comments. He reported City staff is of the opinion the replat drawing itself is found to comply with the current provisions of the City's subdivision regulations. At the December 17, 2019, Planning and Zoning meeting, the Commission recommended sending the replat forward for approval as presented with a vote of (5-0).

Motion by Councilmember Kixmiller, seconded by Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Fleming, to approve a replat for a 2.728 +/- acre tract of land located at Lot 1R, Tract 3A, Barnett Subdivision, generally known as 107 Barnett Boulevard. Motion carried 6-0.

17. Consider approval of a Site Plan for a 2.728 +/- acre tract of land located at Lot 1R, Tract 3A, Barnett Subdivision, generally known as 107 Barnett Boulevard, for the Village Green Memory Care Center SITE PLAN APPROVED (6 – 0)

Mr. Kriston reported an application was received for a site plan to construct an approximately 12,969 square foot building for the Village Green Memory Care Center, which will be a 20-unit memory care facility. The site plan package includes a site plan, building elevations, signage, lighting plan, and landscape plans. City staff and the City's Engineer have reviewed the site plan package and are of the opinion that the proposed site plan conforms with all applicable City ordinances.

At the December 17, 2019 Planning and Zoning meeting, the Commission recommended sending the site plan forward with a vote of (5-0) with the applicant addressing "housekeeping" items. As of January 6, 2020, the applicant has revised the site plan drawings in accordance with the Commission's recommended changes.

Motion by Councilmember Fiester, seconded by Councilmember Heslep, to approve a Site Plan for a 2.728 +/- acre tract of land located at Lot 1R, Tract 3A, Barnett Subdivision, generally known as 107 Barnett Boulevard. Motion carried 6-0.

# BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to the City Charter and Texas Election Code, the City's General Election is held on the uniform election date on the first Saturday in May. The Charter further requires that the offices of Council Member Places 1 (Mayor), 2, 4, and 6 be elected at the General Election in even-numbered years. All members shall be elected under the place system, at large, for two (2) year terms. A candidate for an elected office shall have been a resident of the City for a period of twelve (12) months prior to the date of the election and a qualified voter of the State of Texas.

The City Secretary's Office is responsible for conducting municipal elections as prescribed by the Texas Election Code. In accordance with the Texas Election Code, the City's election will be conducted jointly with other political subdivisions of Denton County. The proposed resolution calls for the May 2, 2020 general election, provides for the appointment of election officials, provides for early voting and election day procedures, authorizes a joint election agreement and contract for election services with Denton County.

The proposed resolution authorizes the City Manager to execute an agreement for a joint election and contract for election services with Denton County.

# **IDENTIFIED NEED/S:**

The Council is required to call an election no later than 78 days prior to Election Day.

# **OPTIONS & RESULTS:**

# **PROGRESS TO DATE: (if appropriate)**

Denton County Elections Administrator Frank Phillips will serve as the administrator of the Joint Election, with each participating entity remaining responsible for decisions and actions as required by law.

The contract provides for the following:

- Denton County will coordinate, supervise and conduct the Joint Election pursuant to provisions of the Texas Election Code;
- All election officials, including the Early Voting Clerk, shall be officials appointed by Denton County;
- Denton County will procure, prepare and distribute supplies and equipment for Early Voting and Election Day;
- Denton County shall be responsible for appointment of presiding judge and alternate judge for each polling location;
- Early Voting will be conducted jointly with all participating entities beginning April 20, 2020 and concluding April 28, 2020 at the locations and times established by the County. Highland Village voters may vote early at any joint early voting location;
- Denton County shall be responsible for releasing unofficial cumulative totals and precinct returns from the election to joint participants, candidates, press and general public;
- Denton County is the general custodian of voted ballots and all records of the Joint Election;
- Runoff election, if needed, will be conducted on Saturday, June 20, 2020.

In accordance with Texas Election Code 2.051-2.053, the City may cancel the General Election if Places 1 (Mayor) 2, 4, and 6 are unopposed.

**Section 1.** A general municipal election is hereby ordered to be held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of May, 2020 for the purpose of electing Council members to Places 1 (Mayor), 2, 4, and 6 by the qualified voters of the City of Highland Village.

**Section 2**. The election will be conducted jointly with other political subdivisions in Denton County on May 2, 2020, pursuant to Chapters 31 and 271, Texas Election Code.

**Section 3.** The election precinct and voting place of said elections shall be as follows:

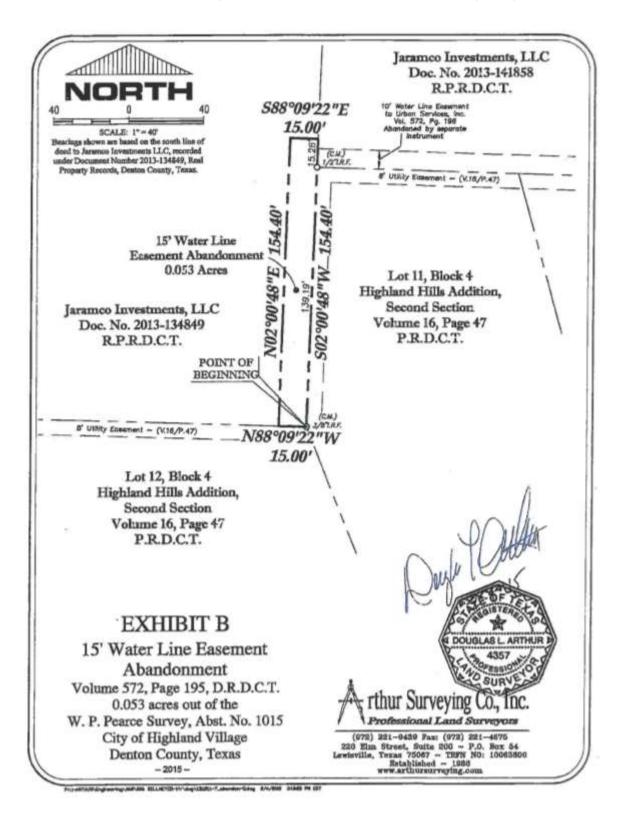

# **BACKGROUND:**

An application was received for a Conditional Use Permit (C.U.P.) for an amusement arcade business to be located in approximately 4,188 square foot lease space in The District of Highland Village. The applicant is proposing to utilize the space for a business consisting of an area for playing electronic games.

# **IDENTIFIED NEED/S:**

The use of this building for this type of business, amusement arcade, requires the approval of a Conditional Use Permit in accordance with the City of Highland Village Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance in a Retail Zoning District. Public Hearings are required prior to considering an application for a Conditional Use Permits. All notification requirements have been satisfied. As of the date of this briefing, January 22, 2020, staff has received no calls or written comments as a result of the public hearing notices.

# **OPTIONS & RESULTS:**

Options are to (1) approve as submitted, (2) approve with modifications, or (3) deny the request. The City Council may also postpone any action in order to receive any additional information which it requests be presented.

# **PROGRESS TO DATE: (if appropriate)**

City staff has reviewed the application and all staff comments have been addressed by the applicant. The applicant will be present to address any questions or comments the City Council may have.

At the January 21, 2020, Planning and Zoning meeting, the Commission recommended sending the ordinance forward for approval as presented with a vote of 4 in favor and 1 opposed.

FOR AN AMUSEMENT ARCADE FOR A 4,188 SQUARE FOOT AREA OF A BULDING LOCATED ON LOT 1R, BLOCK A, THE DISTRICT OF HIGHLAND VILLAGE, SAID PROPERTY BEING MORE COMMONLY KNOWN AS 2630 FM 407, #106; APPROVING A SITE PLAN; PROVIDING FOR TERMINATION ON ABANDONMENT OR DISCONTINUANCE OF THE CONDITIONAL USE; PROVIDING FOR A CONFLICTS RESOLUTION CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY OF FINE NOT TO EXCEED THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000) FOR EACH OFFENSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

**WHEREAS**, the Planning and Zoning Commission and the governing body of the City of Highland Village, Texas, in compliance with the laws of the State of Texas and the Ordinances of the City of Highland Village, Texas, have given the requisite notices by publication and otherwise, and after holding due hearings and affording a full and fair hearing to all the property owners generally and to all persons interested and situated in the affected area, and in the vicinity thereof, and in the exercise of its legislative discretion, and upon a finding that the proposed conditional use is consistent with the standards for approval set forth in Section 12.3 of the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance of the City of Highland Village, Texas, the City Council has concluded that the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance and Zoning District Map of the City of Highland Village, Texas, as previously amended, should be further amended as follows:

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND VILLAGE, TEXAS, THAT:

**SECTION 1.** The Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance of the City of Highland Village, Texas, as amended ("Zoning Ordinance"), shall be further amended by granting a Conditional Use Permit (C.U.P.) for an Amusement Arcade for a 4,188 square foot portion of a building located on Lot 1R, Block A, The District of Highland Village, City of Highland Village, Denton County, Texas, and more commonly known as 2630 FM 407, #106, Highland Village, Texas ("the Property"), the location of the Property being depicted in Exhibit "A," attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

**SECTION 2.** If the use of the Property for the purpose of operating an Amusement Arcade (a) does not commence before the first anniversary of the effective date of this Ordinance or (b) is discontinued or abandoned for a period of six (6) consecutive months, such use shall not resume and this Ordinance and the Conditional Use Permit granted herein shall be deemed to have terminated. For purposes of this Section 2, whether or not the required use has been discontinued or abandoned shall be determined in the same manner as the abandonment or discontinuance of a non-conforming use as set forth in Section 7 of the Zoning Ordinance, as amended.

**SECTION 3.** All ordinances of the City of Highland Village related to the use and development of the Property heretofore adopted and in effect upon the effective date of this Ordinance are and shall remain in full force and effect except to the extent amended by this Ordinance or to the

extent there is an irreconcilable conflict between the provisions of said other ordinance and the provisions of this Ordinance, in which case the provisions of this Ordinance shall be controlling.

**SECTION 4.** Should any word, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or section of this Ordinance, or of the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance, as amended hereby, be adjudged or held to be void or unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of said Ordinance or the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance, as amended hereby, which shall remain in full force and effect.

**SECTION 5.** An offense committed before the effective date of this Ordinance is governed by prior law and the provisions of the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance, as amended, in effect when the offense was committed, and the former law is continued in effect for this purpose.

**SECTION 6.** Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions or terms of this Ordinance shall be subject to the same penalty as provided for in Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance as previously amended, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not to exceed the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) for each offense.

**SECTION 7.** This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage on Second Reading and publication of the caption in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Highland Village, and it is accordingly so ordained.

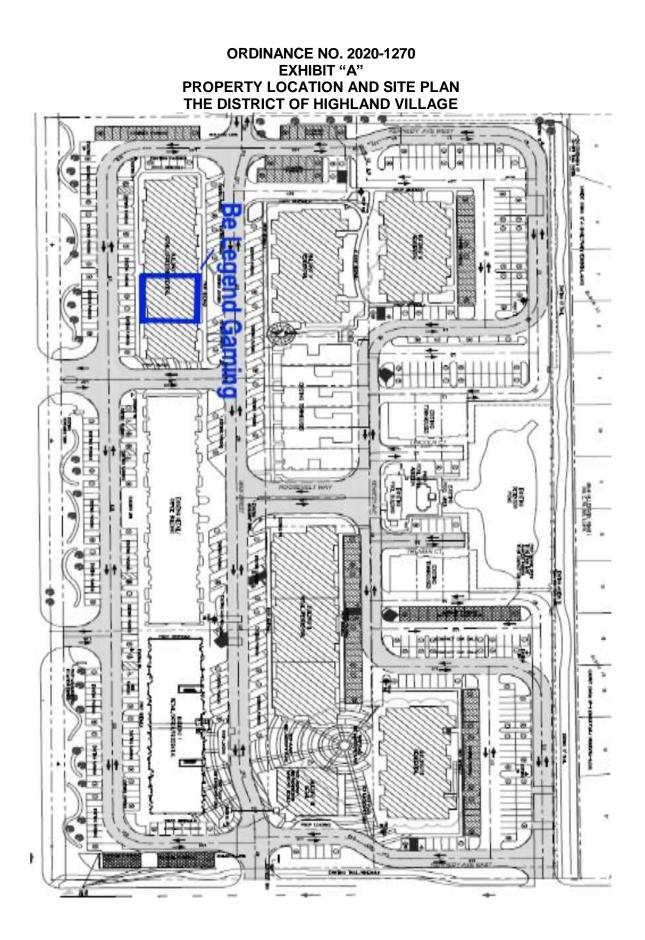

# **BACKGROUND:**

On November 1, 2019, Mr. Lozano presented to the City Council playground surfacing options for the new Kids Kastle Playground ("the Project"). Mr. Lozano stated he preferred a unitary surface that would satisfy the Council's intent of providing an all-inclusive and all-abilities surface for the new playground. Council discussed the various options and expressed a consensus to bid a unitary surfacing for the entire play area.

Bids for the Project were received on January 9, 2020, from two vendors. City administration reviewed the amounts of the base bid and the amounts bid for the three alternates. Only one bidder, ForeverLawn Texas, satisfied the bid specification. Totals for each contractor are provided in the table below:

WHEREAS, City administration, having solicited, received, and reviewed the bids to furnish and install synthetic turf surfacing for the Kids Kastle Playground Project (the "Project"), has determined that ForeverLawn Texas is the sole bidder that satisfied the required specifications in an amount of \$273,427.35, inclusive of Bid Mobilization, Bonds, and Insurance, Bid Alternate No 1, Bid Alternate No 2, Bid Alternate No 3 and recommends awarding a contract for the Project to said bidder; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Highland Village, Texas, finds it to be in the public interest to accept the recommendation of the City administration and authorize the above-described contract; and

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND VILLAGE, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1.** The City Manager is hereby authorized to negotiate and execute a contract for the purchase and installation services with Coats Landscape Systems, LLC, DBA ForeverLawn Texas relating to the Project, inclusive of Bid Alternate No 1, Bid Alternate No 2, Bid Alternate No 3, and Mobilization, Bonds and Insurance for a fee in the amount of \$273,427.35, and, subject to applicable state laws, city policies, and, in the event change order(s) result in an increase in the contract amount, the availability of funds for such purpose, to negotiate and sign such change order(s) to said contract as the City Manager determines to be in the best interest of the City.

**SECTION 2.** This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon approval.

# **BACKGROUND:**

Effective September 1, 2001, the Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 1074, which statutorily defined and prohibited racial profiling and set forth provisions for the implementation of policies, education and training programs, and the collection and reporting of certain information regarding racial profiling relating to motor vehicle stops by Texas Law Enforcement Authorities.

# **IDENTIFIED NEED/S:**

This law requires each law enforcement agency in the state to adopt a written policy on racial profiling and prohibit its practice. Each local law enforcement agency is required to submit a report containing the information compiled during the previous calendar year to the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency in a manner approved by the agency NLT March 1st.

# **OPTIONS & RESULTS:**

Policy prohibiting racial profiling in place. Required data captured electronically via Brazos Technology. Mobile video storage capacity allows for 90 day archival. Required racial profiling training and local report completed.
