NEW MINOR FORCING CONVENTION: ALERT PROCEDURE

Many partnerships agree to play the bid of a new minor suit by responder as forcing after opener's 1NT rebid, using the New Minor Forcing (NMF) convention. Since the bid is strictly conventional and says nothing about the new minor, it needs to be alerted.

In face-to-face games, the partner of the bidder alerts the bid. However, the procedure is different when playing online. *The bidder self-alerts – but must do so BEFORE the bid is made.* Here's an example of how to correctly alert the NMF bid on BBO and in face-to-face games.





FACE-TO-FACE GAMES: ALERT PROCEDURE

In face-to-face games, the bidder does not self-alert. Instead, the partner of the bidder alerts the bid.

In the above auction, the auction will proceed normally until South's 2 + rebid. When South bids 2 +, North needs to immediately say "Alert." However, North does not offer an explanation unless asked by West, the opponent who is next in turn to bid. If asked, North could simply state something like: "2 + is artificial and forcing, asking about the major suits – three spades or four hearts."

The auction proceeds.
