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## PRESIDENT'S LETTER

I would like to tell you some of what has been going on over the last three and half years. This is not meant to be an exact timeline of events. We have endured a tornado, two major hurricanes, the restoration of the Rec Hall and office, two bad Managers and the problems that were created by them. These events created some very difficult hurdles to overcome. Today we are faced with completing old challenges and taking on new ones. Recent events have caused us to think about what needs to be done to stop the negative outcomes in the Village. The Board is very disappointed in the behavior of some of our owners and residents. There are owners and residents that just refuse to follow our documents and rules. We have provided the proper documents to everyone and still struggle to get owners and residents to abide by them. There are owners and residents that are disruptive at events and meetings. There are owners and residents that have their own agendas and expect us to accommodate them. We have Committee chairs and members resigning because of the actions of some of our owners and residents. These things put even more stress on the Board and the manager to accomplish what is really important. You have heard me say many times that creating a rule for every situation is not the answer. As stated before, owners and residents are not following the rules that we have and enforcing them is an even bigger challenge. Most of this is just common sense. We should all be thinking about what is best for the Village that we love and not our individual agendas. It is time for all owners and residents to take a look at the bigger picture and conduct themselves in a manner that is helpful and not destructive. Myself, the Board and the manager do not have all the answers. We are asking you, the owners and residents, to submit suggestions about how you believe we could accomplish taking care of the challenges that I have presented. We need owners to step up and get involved in your Village. There are many of you that have skill sets that would benefit one of our committees or the Board. We need your help to make this Village the place we all love. I will be reading a more detailed letter at the POA meeting March 23, owners should plan to attend. Please be part of the solution not part of the problem.

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## MANAGER'S REPORT

It was nice to see everyone enjoy a full season with all the buildings open, amenities being used and many, many functions. Special thanks to Mike S and Mike J, our maintenance personnel, for setting up prior to events and staying late on occasion to clean up after some late events and basically making sure your events go as smoothly as possible.

Quick reminder when scheduling an event... if you need to book an event, there will be a form at the office and on the website to complete. It will then be forwarded to the Rec Committee Chairs for approval, so we do not have any conflicts when scheduling since the schedule fills up so fast.

I apologize for the quality of the calendar in The Voice recently. We are going back to the calendar that I'm told was used in the past that I'm told everyone liked. It will have recurring events on one page, and single or one-time events on a separate page. We are also trying to group things together and work on improving the graphics.

The pool service company has asked me to remind everyone to use the shower before going into the pool. I'll be adding signs and trying to get the word out on this. He is having to clean the filter almost every visit because of the excessive suntan lotion and oil.

For seasonal residents that will be leaving VHL for the summer, please complete a departure form before you leave. The forms are available at the office and on the website. The information is very helpful in the office to be able to update your summer 'mail to' address in case we need to send you VHL related materials or reach you and to know who will watch your home and/or maintain weeds while you are gone. Departing residents should also ensure there is nothing loose outside your home that could blow around or become loose during a storm. Bring in items possible from outside or secure them, including your garbage barrels.

Another reminder is that if anyone needs to park in the upper parking lot, there is a new form that must be completed. We had issues with people outside the park, not even owners of VHL, parking their vehicles there. This is not allowed. Many of the vehicles had no identification or VHL stickers and that is now being enforced. We appreciate everyone's cooperation with this.

We spent quite a bit of time earlier this year inspecting all the properties, sending violations and in some cases issuing fines. All properties were re-inspected in late January of this year and,

for those that corrected the issues, we want to thank you again. The community's appearance has improved. However, due to other conflicting priorities, I could not complete the follow up for the remaining properties and the final violations were not issued. I am now doing final inspections again and will be issuing notices.

Over the past year, the office has worked with committees and other residents to institute better policies. As I mentioned before, the Rec Committee now approves function requests, as they did in the past.

We created the Village's EASYHOA portal and website for owners to access accounts about 7 months ago and the site has quite a bit of information available including governing documents, rules, forms, bylaws, insurance policies, meeting agendas and minutes. We continually try to improve the portal and, with help from some technical residents we have, we are now redesigning the pages to provide easy-to-access menus and links to the most common forms and pages.

As far as the finances, most of you know by now that we have a new accounting firm reconciling our accounts, filing tax returns and monthly reconciliation. They are currently preparing us for this year's financial reporting. He is working on the 2025 files now and we expect our tax return to be filed on time without the need for an extension.

I have worked very hard to go through each owner's account one-by-one to ensure the accuracy the best I can. I have completed a little over 300 of the 551 accounts. I had planned to provide a detailed report on financials using the new reports available but we're not quite there yet. I hope to have the new reporting available at the April board meeting.

Since July of last year, the office has received and processed over 190 environmental requests. 67 of those are from 2026 alone. The committee is currently meeting every other Tuesday, and, in the summer, they will only meet once a month.

Real estate sales have picked up significantly. In 2026, we already have more than 30 properties in VHL that have gone under contract with 15 already closed. We currently have 16 properties that are scheduled to close in late March and early April.

The Planning Committee worked hard to update the road repair history in VHL and create a new timeline for future projects. In March, the Committee submitted final recommendations and bids to the Board of Directors. Brian Henry was hired to repair the swales in 4 different areas of the

community. As of the date of this report, 2 of the 4 sections have been completed and the remaining 2 are expected to be completed in April. Brian will also be assisting with the repair of the head walls and catch basins.

A contract with S&H Paving out of Englewood, FL was signed. The work includes milling Delamere on Delamere and Thor Court, sealing roads at Arbela, Fulmar, Widness and Ratan. Additional sealing will also be scheduled for additional areas soon..

## NEW E-BIKE REGULATIONS

Charlotte County commissioners have approved new rules for e-bikes:

- Sidewalks: Maximum speed is 15 mph.
- Streets: Riders must obey posted speed limits.
- Safety: Riders age 16 or under must wear a helmet. Lights (white in front, red in back) are required between dusk and dawn.
- Right of Way: Riders must yield to pedestrians and provide an audible signal when passing.
- Restrictions: E-bikes remain prohibited on county trails, greenways, and greenbelts (e.g., Cape Haze Pioneer Trail Park).

## GOLF CART REGULATIONS

The commissioners have set a public hearing for revisions to the ordinances regulating golf carts.

## SCHOOL ZONE CAMERAS

Speed cameras became operational in installed school zones on February 27. Eventually, all school zones will be equipped with these cameras.

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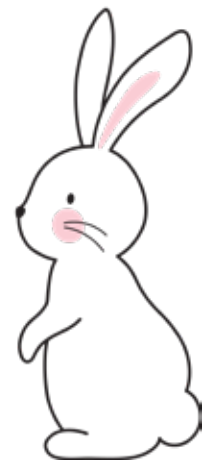

# HISTORY OF THE VILLAGE OF HOLIDAY LAKE

*Recapped by Barbara Balascio*

This is part II of the re-capping of our Village History which was written by Margaret Dey for our 25th anniversary.

## 1978

At this time General Development was requesting permission from Charlotte County Zoning Board to re-zone the area of Fulmar, Widness, and Arbella. No notice was sent to homeowners and none was posted at the Centre. This re-zoning was to change the type of buildings and increase the density of the population. It was later discovered that these would be wooden homes built on a cement slab, available at 10% down, with 40 year mortgages. These would have had a disastrous affect on the Ratan Circle properties. Dick Long and Ed Christie, with the help of Karen, corresponded with the homeowners up North. Roi Haefele joined forces after he moved in. The men attended every meeting of the Charlotte County Zoning Board and having gained approval from all homeowners, defeated General Development's petition. From that moment on, the homeowners knew that an organization was needed to protect themselves.

## 1979

The formation of an elected group took place in March. The name "Property Owners Association of Holiday Lake" was agreed upon. It was realized that this organization would need funds to do a proper job. Again, letters were sent to all homeowners and it was decided that a \$5.00 membership fee, plus dues of \$5.00 a year would be adequate. There was usually a social time after these meetings. A cup of coffee and a snack were enjoyed.

April saw the Second Award's Night. Men and ladies pool had been added to the tournaments.

When we walked to the Centre in the evening, we would walk down the centre ditch of the road, shining our flashlights down to watch out for snakes. At this time we were trying to get General Development to heat the pool and to get street lights installed. A letter was sent to Miami and finally General Development came through with promises. The Village was beginning to grow. Fulmar, Widness and Arbella were next and then Varley Circle and Swinton. The Village was rapidly expanding.

Back around 1979 to 1981, we began "shell" classes. The first year we had teachers from the Port Charlotte Cultural Centre and the second year several of us taught the newcomers. General Development was very generous in those days and for two or three Christmas' they supplied the roast beef for the Christmas parties. The pool table was covered by a sheet of plywood and this was our buffet table. The Christmas party of 1979 was a big event. Dot Barrett donated three beautiful cakes which she had elaborately decorated. We squeezed 85 people into the hall for the dinner party- 60 was the legal limit. At the December meeting it was suggested that we have name tags. There were still less than one hundred residents. At the New Year's Eve dance the idea was put forth to charge for the dances to get some money to use for the Village. Tony Carta, a renter, was the first to offer a dollar towards this fund.

## 1980

This was the start of Danvers Circle. The Pentillas had arrived and we discovered that Bill had won many important Horse Shoe Pitching Championships. The following season Bill transported special materials from his home state of Ohio to prepare courts for this sport.

The ladies of the Village had a beautiful 75th birthday party for Paul Bollinger. In March, General Development approached the Board of Directors with a proposal: In turn for a signed waiver and consent agreement (from homeowners) to add 118 more homes and General Development promised to build an additional hall and a larger pool and turn the park amenities and roads over to the homeowners at no cost when 75% of the lots had been sold. These lots would be on the outside perimeter of Delamere Blvd. The Village of Holiday Lake Homeowners' Association was dissolved in preparation for the POA, Property Owners' Association. An interim organization was formed with Bud Kleinfelder as President. Bud certainly learned the pleasures and the pains of that position as he guided the Board and residents through that transition period. It was a lot of hard work but it was a job well done.



**1981**

At a Board meeting in February, Bill Dey suggested that \$1.00 per person be charged for the dances in order to build up a fund for the necessities and luxuries that would be needed in the new Recreation Centre. Everyone agreed that it was an easy way to fulfill these needs and his idea snowballed. The Recreation Committee became official. General Development surprised the residents when ground was broken on time and the facilities were completed on schedule. Paul Bollinger and his helpers put on dinners and an extra quarter was charged to build up a fund for future dinners. There was soon enough in the fund to furnish most of the kitchen's needs and some to help in other areas. Art Hicks began collecting aluminum cans and this is still being done today. Several fairs were held and the money was well spent for the good of all. Rosemary Depew and Jean Johnston began a flower fund. Handmade flowers in ceramic vases were given to those hospitalized and cards were sent to those who were ill at home. \$40 was sent to the family in the event of a death. A monthly raffle covered all expenses. Laverne DeVors began the Art Class. LaVerne liked to tell the story of how this came about. In 1979, Bill and I went to the Port Charlotte Cultural Centre to take art lessons and in 1981 we went again, accompanied by Agnes and Roland Breton. As we sat around the pool one day that winter, I asked Laverne for advice. I couldn't get the water in my painting to lay flat. With her help, that painting still hangs on my dining room wall. That was when Laverne suggested that she start an Art Class in the fall and share ideas. Many handicraft workshops were formed at that time. The first bazaar was held in November. Many of the ladies had worked for a year both at the centre and at home. The Blood Bank was begun and I took over the trips for the village.

(This is the last of my re-caps of the Village History. There is much more for the years 1982 through 1996. I hope I have given you a little glimpse of the beginning days of our Village and what our early "settlers" experienced to make this Village the beautiful place it is today. 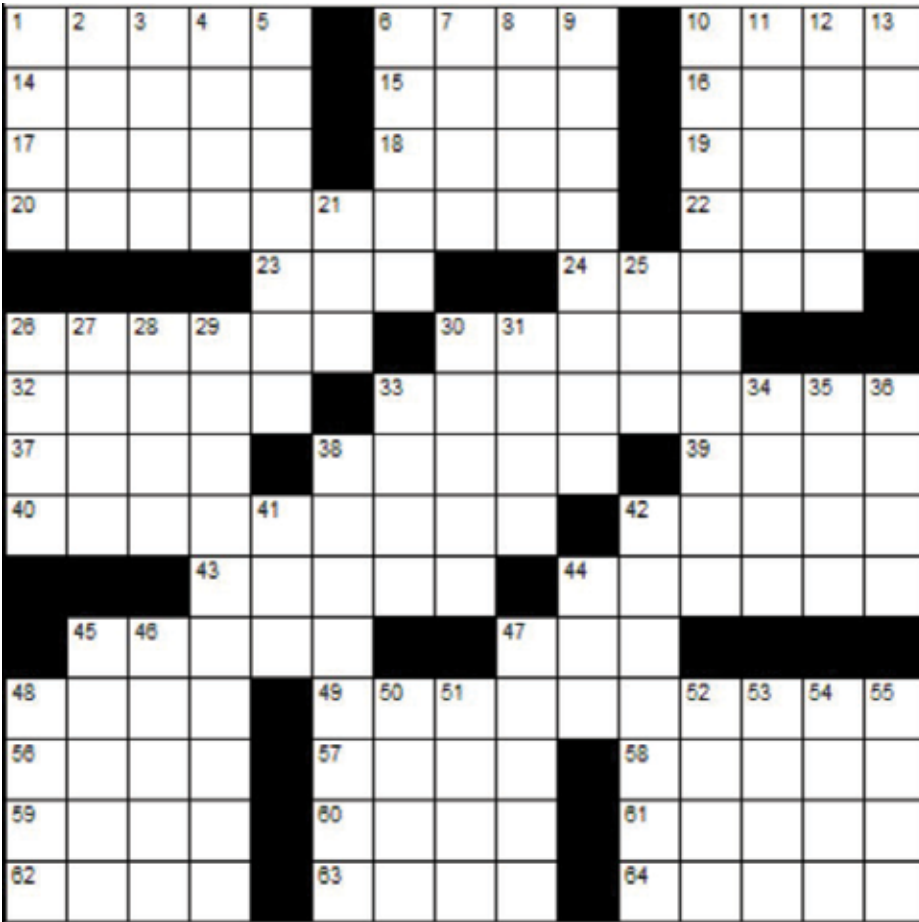

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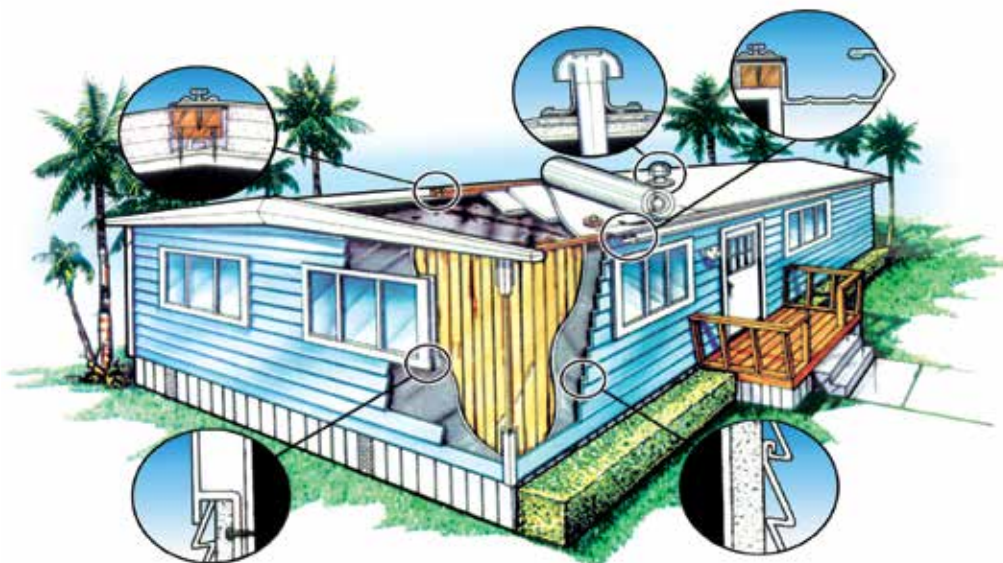
