

About Glasgow Building Preservation Trust

Glasgow Building Preservation Trust is a charity that works to rescue, repair, restore and rehabilitate historic buildings at risk across the city. The Trust also organises the annual Glasgow Doors Open Days Festival in September, which celebrates and promotes the city's architecture and rich built heritage.

Since 1982, Glasgow Building Preservation Trust has completed 23 capital heritage projects across the city. In addition to this impressive record, GBPT has delivered countless options appraisals and feasibility studies for groups and charities across the city.

The retention of our historic built environment is pivotal to our sense of place and contributes to making Glasgow a beautiful and vibrant place to live, work and visit. We work in partnership with others to give redundant buildings a new purpose and return them to their communities.

- Saving buildings at risk from demolition
- Facilitating local economic regeneration
- Supporting local organisations in the delivery of capital projects
- Attracting investment for projects within the City

- Promoting the development of traditional building skills
- Promoting regular maintenance and responsible ownership of historic buildings

With over 115 listed buildings across Glasgow on the Buildings At Risk Register, there is clearly a continuing demand for our work.

Since 1990, GBPT has organised and delivered the Glasgow Doors Open Days Festival. The Glasgow event was the first Doors Open Day event in the UK as part of the 1990 City of Culture. Since then, the event has grown in size and range of activities and events on offer with the 2018 event hosting over 78k visits to venues, 800 volunteers contributing almost 4,500 volunteer hours – all contributing towards a direct economic impact of over £300k.



Our Governance

The Board of GBPT meets quarterly and has the capacity to form an Executive Committee, drawn from the Board, to meet monthly or more frequently as required. The current Board of 9 volunteer trustees are a mix of longstanding directors elected from the membership and directors nominated by our corporate member organisations.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of GBPT impose no restrictions on its field of operation but the Trust has chosen to concentrate its activities within the city of Glasgow boundary. It is the view of the Trust that Glasgow needs a building preservation trust that concentrates its efforts on the City as a key part of Glasgow's toolkit for ongoing development and regeneration. Where the Trust has sufficient staff capacity it may from time to time undertake projects outwith the Glasgow boundary.

Our Staff

The Trust currently has 4 full-time employees. On occasion, the Trust will procure specialists to carry out specific tasks such as historical research and conservation plans. The staff team reports to the Staff Director, who in turn reports to the GBPT Board. The principal responsibilities of the staff are as follows:

- development of potential projects;
- management of current projects;
- sourcing new projects;
- keeping the Board of Directors fully informed on all operational matters;
- forging and strengthening links with stakeholders;
- managing the Trust's finances; and,
- managing resources.

The GBPT staff team work from a main office base in Glasgow and meet together regularly to discuss project and strategic matters. The staff team has a portfolio of relevant skills to deliver the Trust's programme of projects. Staff expertise includes project management, finance and funding management, architectural conservation best practice, architectural history, working with voluntary organisations and event organisation and promotion.

Our Finances

GBPT only undertakes projects for which it can secure adequate funding. The Trust raises funds to cover its running costs in the following ways:

- project co-ordination fees charged by GBPT to each project;
- fees charged by GBPT for services given to others;
- revenue grant support from Glasgow City Council;
- grants and donations from public and charitable bodies;
- · gifts and legacies from individuals;
- membership subscriptions.

As a charitable organisation with voluntary directors, any surplus funds from consultancy work is used to further the charitable objectives of the Trust.

Strategic Review

The Trust has been supported by Historic Environment Scotland and National Lottery Heritage Fund to undertake a strategic review of our organisation. Independent consultants have made 40 recommendations to help strengthen GBPT for the future. These recommendations are across governance, membership, marketing, business planning, partnership working and asset management. The Board have approved an Action Plan to deliver on the recommendations.

Title: Director

Summary of role

Directors of the company will be required to contribute to the effective governance and legal and financial control of the company at all times, and will provide strategic direction to the staff team, via the Trust Director. This strategic management role will be crucial in drawing in ongoing commitment, resources and investment from the public, voluntary and private sectors whilst ensuring the participation of local communities.

Directors of the company are bound by Company Law and Charity Law and all relevant legislation in this respect and are also responsible ultimately for health and safety, public liability and financial liability for the company (although it is recognised that much of the day to day management role in these respects will be performed by the staff team employed for this purpose, under the management of the Staff Director).

To deliver heritage projects, GBPT requires access to funding from a wide range of sources including the Glasgow City Council, Historic Environment Scotland, the National Lottery Heritage Fund, Architectural Heritage Fund and various charitable trusts. The company also requires to generate income (with annual targets) from selling its services and activities and charging for these.

The post holder should be able to demonstrate knowledge and-or commitment to all of the above roles.

Hours of Work / Level of Time Commitment Required

- The Board currently meets 10 times a year (approximately 2 hours per meeting).
- Time is also required each month to read and digest Board papers and seek further information / answers to any queries in this respect.
- It is anticipated that commitment would be along the lines of 5-10 hours per month.
- All Trustees would also be required to attend an induction process at the start of their term
- Term of office is initially for three years with scope to extend for up to six

General Responsibilities as a Trustee

- To be a strategic sounding board and critical friend to the Staff Director
- Ensure an effective and transparent system of governance
- To maintain effective working practices as a Board, and between Board and staff
- Provide financial oversight and approve annual budgets to ensure financial sustainability
- Ensure an effective and appropriate system of Health and Safety
- Ensure compliance with our governing documents, UK charity and company law and all
 other relevant legislation and regulations to ensure GBPT uses its resources in pursuance of
 its objects.
- In all other respects to fulfil the fiduciary and statutory duties of a charity trustee and company director.



Strategic Review

In addition to the normal operation of the Trust, new Board members will be joining at a time of Organisational Change and will be expected to be supportive of the recommendations as adopted. Previous experience of organisational change, governance, improving diversity, membership services and fundraising will be of particular relevance.
