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The need for a Humanist voice in Scotland

The place of Humanism in Scottish public life has shifted significantly in the past thirty years of the existence of Humanist Society Scotland. As



Scotland's national charity for Humanists, we have witnessed huge changes in both public policy and everyday life, as well as our own organisational history.

We have seen Humanist ceremonies grow in popularity in Scotland with Humanist marriage now being the most popular choice of belief ceremony in the country, something even we did not expect when our registered celebrants first married couples in 2005.

There is a renewed democratic discourse ever since the establishment of the Scottish Parliament – a fundamental value for Humanists the world over. This has delivered progressive changes including same-sex marriage, protection of children from physical violence and the repeal of Section 28.

All these successes have a common Humanist principle at their heart – protecting individual autonomy and dignity.

However, there is still much to be done. Scots are denied the right to an assisted death, young people's right to freedom of belief is not respected in our school system and we have the stain of being one of Europe's last remaining countries with a Blasphemy law.

Humanist Society Scotland goes into this new decade with a renewed aim and mission set out in this strategic plan. But our place as the Scottish organisation who speaks out for Humanist values, helps mark key life events in the Humanist tradition, and provides a community for likeminded people remains the same.

Aim A: We will champion Humanism and help it flourish in Scotland as part of the global **Humanist movement.**

Objective 1 We shall connect more members, supporters and partners in the work and aims of the society.

Objective 2 We will provide more volunteering opportunities for members and supporters to engage in and help further the aims of the charity.

Objective 3 We will proactively participate in the global Humanist movement through our membership of Humanists International and the European Humanist Federation.

Aim B: We will influence and shape public policy and civil society using reason and evidence.

Objective 1 We will engage with Government and Parliament on issues which are important to Humanists and encourage our members to be part of public debate.

Objective 2 We will work constructively and in partnership with other organisations who share our key objectives in order to achieve success.

Objective 3 We will work creatively to communicate our key messages in order to engage new supporters and members.

Celebrate and Community

We recognise the important role that **Humanist Society** Scotland and our far-reaching network of registered celebrants play in people's lives.



We believe that everyone in Scotland should be able to access ceremonies to mark key life events carried out by someone who shares their beliefs. We will continue to build on the fantastic service offered to couples, families and others through our registered celebrants. We aim to be a world leader in the provision of Humanist ceremonies and build on the hard work put in by celebrants and staff so far. Our charity also acts as a community for people who share a common Humanist approach to life, and we will nurture this community's growth.

Aim C: We will be the most trusted choice for Humanist ceremonies in Scotland.

Objective 1 We will make our services more visible and accessible to an increased number of people.

Objective 2 We will expand our availability to new geographic areas and focus on increasing our diversity. Aim D: We will work to attract and maintain levels of membership from across Scotland.
