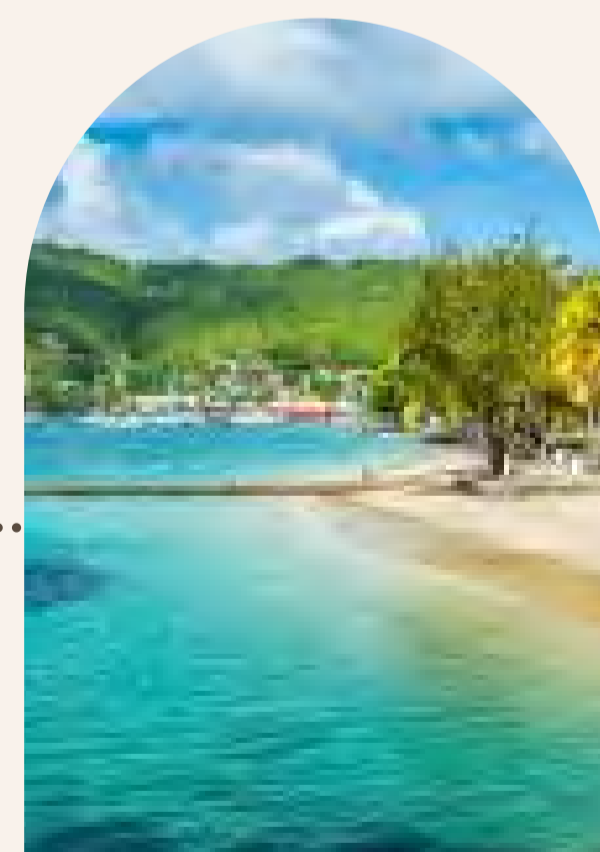

DAY 1

. MARIGOT BAY TO PITONS (SAINT LUCIA)

Start your St Lucia to Grenada Itinerary in Marigot Bay, a stunning landlocked inlet used by Nelson to hide his fleet from the French. After a detailed chart and boat briefing set off for a short sail to the Pitons, one of the most dramatic locations in the Caribbean where the cone-shaped peaks drop almost vertically into the sea. Shore side excursions include the World's only "drive-in volcano". Spend the night on a mooring in the Pitons Marine Park and enjoy dinner at one of the local restaurants.

RESTAURANT: CAP MAISON

Under open-sided cabanas on a cliff with stunning sunset views, The Cliff at Cap offers Caribbean classics served with a French twist. You can also enjoy grilled steaks and spectacular seafood on a palm-topped terrace at the Naked Fisherman on Smugglers Cove Beach

ACTIVITY: MARIGOT BAY RESORT

Visit the Spa Village where modern products and innovative treatments are combined with relaxation techniques handed down through generations.



26 FEBRUARY

DAY 2

PITONS

Spend the day exploring the Pitons and Soufriere area – a fascinating location ideal for those who like snorkeling, diving, and hiking. Book an excursion to take in the volcano, hot springs, and botanical gardens just outside Soufriere. Enjoy a BBQ as the sun sets over the Pitons.

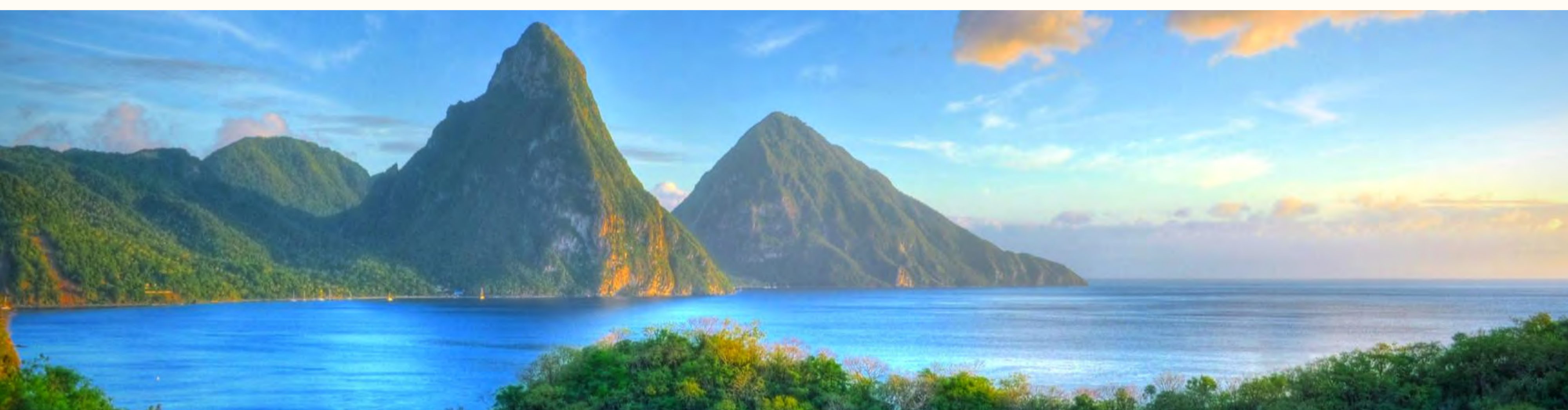


The island's iconic twin peaks, Gros Piton and Petit Piton, at 2,530ft and Petit Piton at 2,438ft respectively, rise vertiginously from the Caribbean clad in dense rainforest. Explore by foot for some spectacular views or admire them from the deck.

Activity: Climbing the Pitons

These incredible twin peaks are a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a trek to the top of Gros Piton in particular, is a sure way to get your adrenaline going.

Saint Lucia is a great diving location, and it is possible to snorkel or go scuba diving at the foot of the Pitons while on the island.



27 - 28 FEBRUARY

DAY 3 - 4

PITONS TO BEQUIA

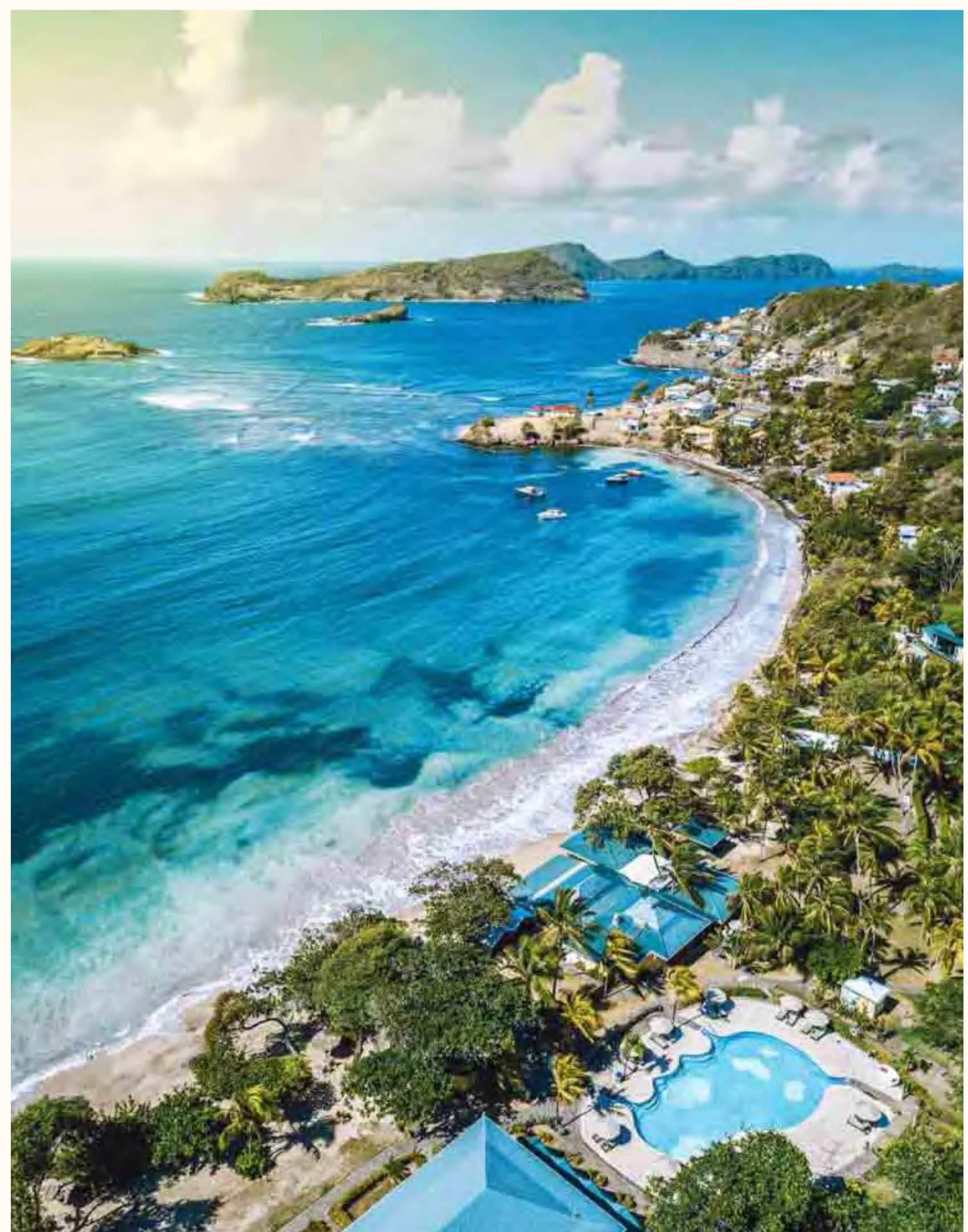
After Breakfast, set sail for Bequia, Bequia has a unique, magical charm which is hard to find anywhere else in the Caribbean. The island combines an enduring seafaring heritage with a wonderful laid back atmosphere. Pick up a mooring in Admiralty Bay. Bequia Island, the second largest in this paradisiacal archipelago. Bequia has managed to preserve its ancestral practices for constructing boats and you can admire this craftsmanship in the naval shipyard.

ADMIRALTY BAY:

Anchor off Princess Margaret Beach and enjoy pristine shallow, sheltered waters and a fine sand beach. Take the tender north around Princess Point to visit the floating bar!

FRIENDSHIP BAY:

This anchorage, quite shallow at 5-7m, is well sheltered from the north and east. The clean water and long sand beach has a few eateries ashore for lunch. Pick the right season and you might spot turtles as they come ashore to nest.



01 MARCH

DAY 5

BEQUIA TO MUSTIQUE

Enjoy a short sail to Mustique, stopping at Petit Nevis for a swim. Mustique is a private island that offers a rare combination of elegance and informality to those who seek privacy and luxury. Pick up a mooring before heading over to the World famous Basil's Bar; home of the Mustique Rhythm and Blues Festival

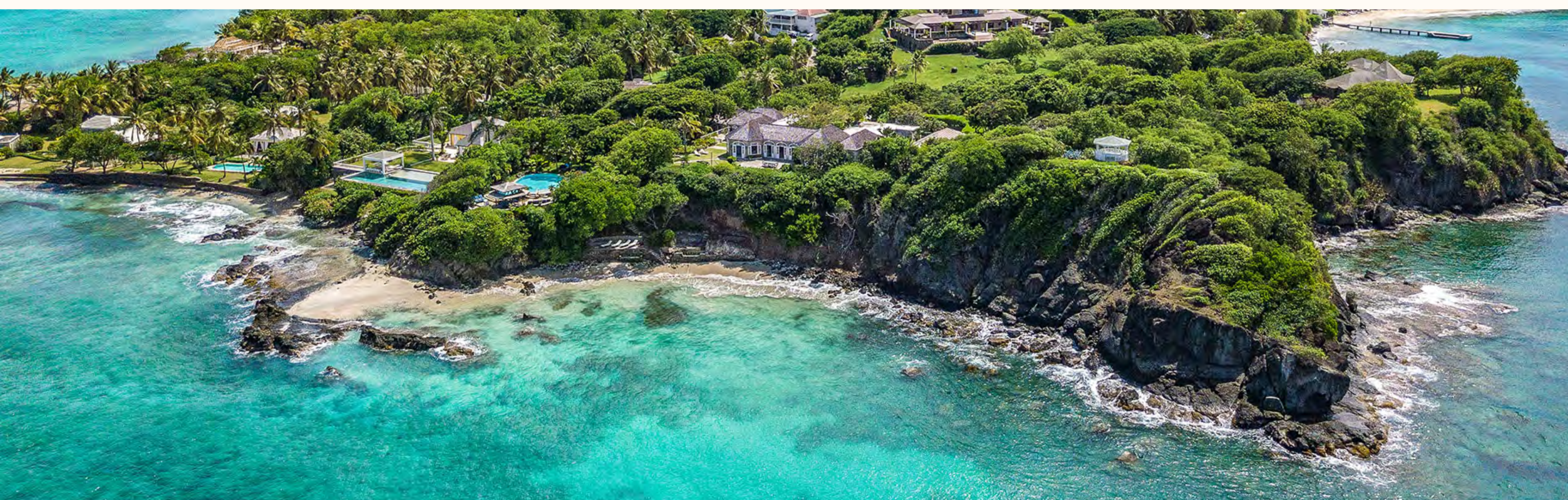


RESTAURANT: BASIL'S BAR DINING

Basil's Bar is legendary. For nearly fifty years it has been the cultural heartbeat of Mustique where generations of homeowners, guests, fisherman and pirates come to let their hair down. Offering laidback beach bar dining overlooking one of the most recognisable spots on island; Britannia Bay.

02-03 MARCH

DAY 6 -7

MUSTIQUE TO TOBAGO CAYS

Sail south to the Tobago Cays, one of the most beautiful anchorages in the World. Anchor or pick up one of the moorings inside the Cays with the huge horseshoe reef in front of you to protect from the ocean swell. There are no restaurants or bars in the Cays – light up the BBQ and dine under the stars.



At the mid-point of your St Lucia to Grenada itinerary, spend the day snorkeling and exploring the Cays – since the area is protected the wealth of sea life is extraordinary. Just off the little island of Baradel is an area cordoned off for turtles to feed, and it's an incredible experience to get close and swim with these remarkable animals. Explore the islands ashore and climb to their summits for the stunning views and watch the almost tame iguanas and land tortoises lumbering around.



04 MARCH

DAY 8

TOBAGO CAYS TO SALT WHISTLE BAY, MAYREAU

A short sail to Mayreau in the morning, dropping anchor in Salt Whistle Bay, a palm-fringed semi-circle of white sand. There's some good walking here, but most worthwhile is the short hike to the top of the hill and the breath taking view from the Catholic Church. For dinner dine flintstone style on rock tables at the Salt Whistle Bay Resort or anchor in Saline Bay and enjoy a dinner under the stars..

Abundant with shady palm trees, the beach features soft pristine white sand and crystal clear water with boats docked just offshore. It receives protection from the strong currents of the Atlantic Ocean by a small piece of land that extends into the ocean, creating great snorkeling and swimming conditions. Dip into the warm water or head to the beachside restaurant and enjoy some local cuisine as you take in views toward the sea.



05 MARCH

DAY 9

MAYREAU TO CHATHAM BAY, UNION ISLAND

Sail downwind for an hour to Chatham Bay, Union Island. This large anchorage has a sweeping beach under high hills. There is excellent snorkeling along the north side of the bay and some great walking ashore. For dinner enjoy a beach BBQ.

Chatham Bay is one of the wildest and most pristine places of Union Island, complete with turquoise waters and a white sand beach surrounded by green hills. The coastline located north of the bay is also perfect for a snorkeling session. Many species can be observed in its shallow waters: Moray eels, porcupinefish, angelfish and even lobsters, which seem to appreciate the bay's rocky seabed.



Restaurant suggestions:

Tenuta resort:

The restaurants offer a detailed choice of local dishes with Italian infusions and A La Carte menu enriched by fresh ingredients which represent the culinary styles of the Island; like callaloo soup and traditional breadfruit.



06 MARCH

DAY 10

UNION ISLAND TO PETIT ST. VINCENT

Sail from Chatham to Clifton Harbour, clear out of the Grenadines then sail on to Petit St Vincent for the night. Anchor off PSV Resort, dine exclusively at the resort

Dine at Petit St. Vincent's private resort, from freshly grilled seafood and authentic Trinidadian curries to decadent desserts infused with locally distilled rum, the dishes are inspired by traditional flavours and the timeless beauty of the island.

Embark on an island hopping adventure, swim with sea turtles, or visit Ashton Lagoon - one of the top places in the Caribbean for kite surfing.

Diving and snorkelling:

Discover dazzling displays of coral, colourful collections of fish, and majestic sea creatures that call our surrounding waters their home.



07 & 08 MARCH

DAY 11 & 12

PETIT ST. VINCENT TO TYRREL BAY, CARRIACOU

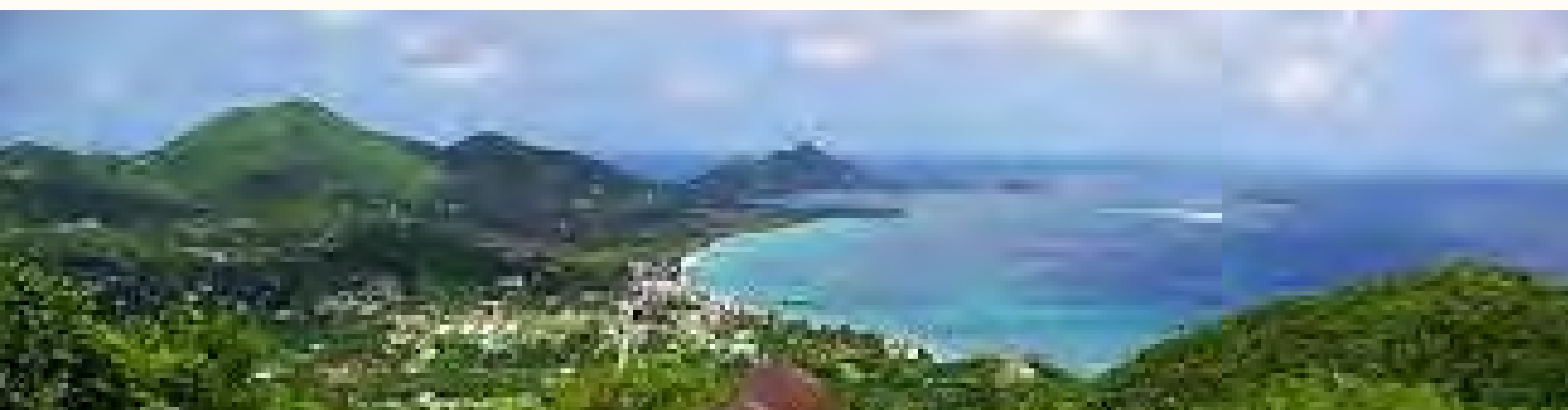
A downwind 1.5-hour sail to Carriacou, anchoring off Hillsborough to clear into Grenada before moving onto a mooring at beautiful Sandy Island. Spend the afternoon snorkeling and walking the beach and either overnight here or motor the short distance round to Tyrrel Bay where you will find local restaurants and bars. It's worth spending the time to explore Carriacou.



It is the destination's second-largest island, measuring just 13 square miles, with a population of 8,000. The tiny island is known as an excellent dive and snorkel destination with clear waters, pristine coral reefs, and magical drifts. It also has the distinction of being the largest Grenadine island. Carriacou boasts a dynamic culture, steeped in ancestral traditions

Activity:

Snorkeling Tyrrel Bay, the marine life of this natural bay is spectacular, while the white sand is soft to touch.



09 MARCH

DAY 13

CARRIACOUS - PINK GIN BEACH

The Pink Gin beach just 1.7 kilometres from the settlement's centre, it is one of Calliste's most beautiful beaches. Among the mountains, the beach is located in a natural setting with picturesque views. It is a straight coastline with crystal turquoise water and pure golden fine sand. An idyllic beach with clear water and gleaming sand, good snorkeling, and a picture-perfect view



Enjoy a morning swim and snorkel, after lunch sail to Mourn Rouge bay.



09 MARCH

DAY 13 cont.

PINK GIN TO MORNE ROUGE

Sail around the south coast of Grenada and explore one of the many sheltered anchorages on the south side of the island. Morne Rouge is fully covered in greens, and its waters are calm and clear. The descent is smooth and the waters are shallow, perfect for children.

Activity:

The infrastructure isn't well-developed, but water attractions aren't hard to come by. Wreck diving (exploring sunken ships) enthusiasts can enjoy an interesting site here - the remains of Bianca C passenger ship. The town is home to the National Museum and an 18-century fort whose cannons still fire during holidays.



Rhodes Restaurant, Calabash Hotel
Located on the marvelous island of Grenada, Rhodes Restaurant is an elegant and upscale restaurant that allows you to taste all the culinary delights of the Caribbean in a simply beautiful setting.



10-11 MARCH

DAY 14 & 15

ST GEORGE'S

An exhilarating downwind sail to St George's passing the isolated islands of Kick 'em Jenny and Isle De Ronde. On arrival at St George's anchor off Ross Point. St. George's is the capital city of the Caribbean island of Grenada. In the town center, the 18th-century Fort George offers panoramic views of the island and St. George's Bay.



Wander the narrow streets of St. George's say that it's almost like walking through an oil painting. The vivid, brightly painted houses exude an aura of colonialism. In fact, Grenada's capital city—located on Grenada Island's southwestern shore—has earned the unofficial title of the most beautiful harbor town in the Caribbean.



Grenada is the southernmost Windward Island and is brimming with the scents of cinnamon and nutmeg, which led to its nickname as “the spice island”.
