
In 2017, Japanese Government "MEXT" selected Kanazawa University for "World Premier International Research Center Initiative (WPI)." MEXT launched WPI in 2007 in a drive to build within Japan "globally visible" research centers with very high research standard and outstanding research environment and has selected 11 institutes so far until now. Having been selected for WPI, KU established the new Nano Life Science Institute and will receive intensive support from the government for the next 10 years.





#### **Privately Financed Foreign Students**

We support privately financed students go gain scholarship granted by Kanazawa University Foundation or private foundations.

Scholarships available to international students are offered by approximately 30 private foundations per year.

#### Foreign-government Sponsored Students

When a request for acceptance of a foreign-government sponsored student is made through the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology of Japan (MEXT), a foreign government or an embassy of a foreign country, we make a decision regarding the acceptance or non-acceptance, taking into account the applicant's major field.

At present, Kanazawa University receive students who are dispatched from the government of Malaysia, Indonesia, Vietnam, Thailand, Myanmar, etc. Applications and acceptance procedures for international students dispatched from foreign governments, in which the Japanese government is not involved, are the same as for privately funded international students.

### Exchange Students

Exchange programs are designed for students from the institutions that have an exchange agreement with Kanazawa University who intend to study at Kanazawa University for one semester up to one year. While remaining enrolled at their home institutions, they study in a non-degree

program at Kanazawa University for the purpose of taking credited classes or participating in independent research under the guidance of a supervisor.

## What Makes Kanazawa Special?



Kanazawa balances the unique character of its cultural history with the conveniences of a modern city.

### A city of tradition and beauty

Kanazawa began to take shape during the Edo Period (1603-1867) at the hands of the Maeda clan who ruled the region. In its prime, the city was Japan's 4th largest city after Edo, Osaka, and Kyoto, boasting a population of 1,000,000. The heritage and scenic beauty from this prosperous time remain in the city where they continue to attract people from all over world.

This rich culture has permeated the lives of citizen while the policies of the Maeda clan continue to raise citizens' interest in arts and crafts. The multitudes of traditional industries live on in the new generation.





### A city of colleges and students


There are 19 institutions of higher education in the Ishikawa Prefecture, giving it the 2nd highest per capita after Kyoto, and the 5th highest number of university students. This rich academic tradition goes back to the Meiji Period, when the government began opening schools to educate the future elite of the country. Kanazawa University began as the first such institution established on the Sea of Japan, which attracted the brightest and best students in the literary arts.

### A city of comfort and convenience

Ishikawa Prefecture has a population of 1,140,000, and 450,000 call Kanazawa their home. As the capital city located in the center of its prefecture, Kanazawa is the heart of politics, culture, and economics for the Hokuriku Region. The surrounding mountains and oceans afford breathtaking ambiance, while its fresh seafood and indigenous local vegetables tantalize your taste buds.

By opening of Hokuriku Shinkansen, it has been much more improved to raech Kanazawa from Tokyo area.





## A city rich in the expressions of nature

Kanazawa enjoys four clearly defined seasons that paint the already stunning landscape with vibrant strokes. Springs and summers are pleasant, and the year-round moisture has seeped into the industry, crafts, and culture.



### A city rich in tourism and the arts

In January 2009, several government ministries certified Kanazawa and four other cities as Level One Historic Cities. In June of the same year it became the 17th member of the UNESCO Creative Cities Network, the 3rd in Japan after Nagoya and Kobe, for its renaissance in the arts and music. Its professional performing group, the Orchestra Ensemble Kanazawa, has earned high praise for its performances overseas.

### A city of abundant nature and traditional architecture

Another factor that led to the flourishing of traditional culture in Kanazawa is the region's distinctive scenery in each of the four seasons. Seasonal changes keep life interesting — in spring cherry blossoms color the city pink; in summer sweetfish dance in clear streams; in fall crimson foliage resembles swaths of brocade; in winter the world turns white. In addition to two large gently flowing rivers, Saigawa River and Asanogawa River, a network of water canals runs through the city, making a pleasant babbling sound. Because Kanazawa was not damaged by the war, it still has historical and cultural buildings that are over 400 years old. When you stroll around town, you will find old temples, shrines, and merchant houses with lattice doors. Because Kanazawa has many sightseeing spots such as Kenrokuen Garden — one of the three most beautiful gardens in Japan, Kanazawa Castle and samurai houses, it is also a tourist city.

## Study in Kanazawa

### Integrated Japanese Language Program

### What is the Integrated Japanese Language Program ?

We offer Japanese classes to our undergraduate and graduate students.

In general, all international students enrolled in Kanazawa University are eligible for this program, which is held in each quarter throughout the year. It offers a wide range of classes that cater to all levels of Japanese language ability, from beginners to advanced.

The aim of the IJLP is to improve students' Japanese language ability to help them fit into university and life in Japan. The ultimate goal, of course, is to give them enough language ability to be able to understand lectures in Japanese.

#### **Eligible Students**

Any international students enrolled in Kanazawa University (undergraduates, graduates, research students, auditors, etc.) whose native language is not Japanese are eligible.

#### Curriculum

This program consists of comprehensive classes, kanji classes and skill-specific classes. Students can select the appropriate level to fit their needs in each area.

- Comprehensive classes: Seven different levels, from zero (never studied Japanese before) to advanced. Learn Japanese comprehensively in a class that matches your own level.
- Kanji classes: Divided into difficulty levels, students learn how to read and write kanji, and how to use kanji vocabulary.
- Skill-specific classes: A range of classes for the four different skills of "talking," "listening," "writing," and "reading." Students can choose the class that best suits their learning goals and level.

### Advising System

When students encounter problems in their studies, classes, private life, or any other areas, they should feel free to consult their academic advisor, tutor, international student advisor, counselor, students affairs section or related divisions.

Tutors are domestic students who assist international students with their studies, living arrangements, and inter-personal relationships so that they can focus on their studies and social life. For example, tutors offer Japanese language support, help with submitting documents, and advise about life in Japan. They are an invaluable resource for international students getting used to life in Japan. They meet generally once or twice a week. Tutors will be your first friends in Japan!

Kanazawa University supports international students to find employment in Japan through "Hokuriku-Shinshu Employment Promotion Program for International Students." We offer business Japanese language training, career education, internship opportunities, and career counselling to the international students.





### Studies on Japanese Culture and Society

### Outlines

School of International Education offers an opportunity to learn, through hands-on experiences, about the culture and society of Japan in the "Program for the Studies on Japanese Culture and Society".

This program consists of subjects such as Budō (martial arts), Japanese Art Performance and Music, and Pottery. It is open to both international and Japanese students, so that both can interact with each other through coming into contact with the traditional culture and society of Japan and deepening their understanding in terms of both knowledge and experiences.



### **National Health Insurance**

All foreign nationals who stay in Japan longer than 3 months are required to join the National Health Insurance system. This insurance covers about 70% of the medical charges, including hospitalization.






