Sheri Mortola, OTR/L, SWC Pediatric Occupational Therapist/Feeding Therapist

Sheri Mortola is a champion for children, helping them develop the skills needed to be as independent as possible to perform purposeful activities that make up everyday life.

For 30+ years, Sheri has worked as a pediatric occupational therapist alongside families with little ones— particularly those who require special assistance in feeding and swallowing. For babies born prematurely, of a difficult birth, or with underlying health issues, it is paramount to discern red flags that could hinder basic nutrition— a fundamental building block for children to thrive. Sheri believes strongly in child-centered care that cultivates functional skills. This includes improving strength, grasp and coordination of hand movements for play and self-feeding; building mouth muscle control for safe eating; and fine motor, feeding and sensory skills to eat within the social context of an early learning setting or at the family table.

Sheri provides occupational and feeding therapy to infants and young children in a variety of capacities: at an out-patient clinic through the Public Health Department (California Children's Services), in homes as a Feeding Therapist through Tri-Counties Regional Center (Early Start), in the High-Risk Infant Development Clinic at Sierra Vista Regional Medical Center, and in private practice (Eat Play Grow Slo).

Like many others, Sheri's work has become more complex due to COVID; however, she says the challenge has brought new insight and opportunity. Being online with families as they are in their homes and holding sessions at the actual time activities are taking place (eating breakfast, getting ready for the day, playing in the backyard) has opened new windows to building skills.

Colleagues say Sheri leaves no stone unturned in her work; she truly listens to parents and believes they know their children best. By meeting kids and families where they are, Sheri is able to empower them with the right tools to succeed. This is Sheri's greatest reward. She is humbled by the strength of her families and realizes that the earlier we identify children with needs and connect them to services that can help— the better path we set them on to meeting their full potential!
