

Hiram Gilbert Wentz (1824-1902), was a brother-in-law of John Hosie and worked with him on several railroad projects, including the Michigan Southern, Portland and Saco, and Covington and Ohio. Moving to Wilkes-Barre in 1862, where he oversaw coal sales for Hosie & Gray. He then worked in coal sales and as superintendent of the Port Bowkley Wyoming Colliery for Swoyer.

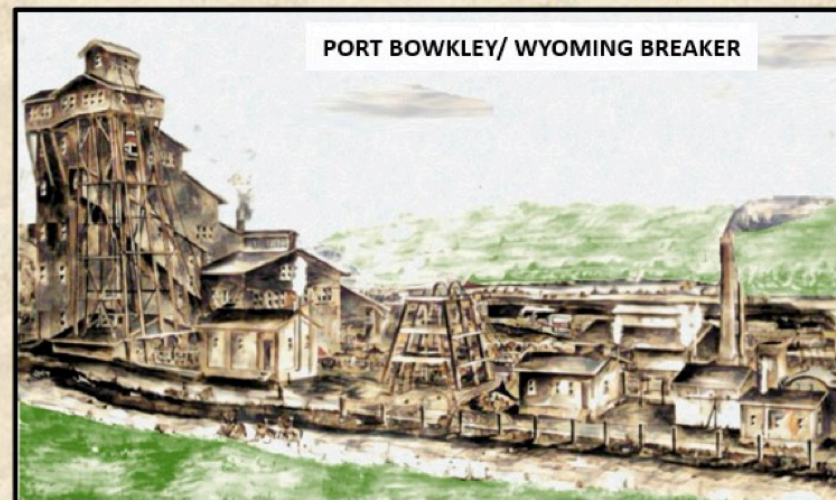
