Of particular note is **Table 7**, Graduate Degree Program Enrollment by Discipline. This table covers program enrollments for a full academic year, thus reflecting enrollments in those programs which occur primarily in the spring and/or summer terms. Also of note is **Table 21**, Undergraduate Semester-to-Semester Graduation, Attrition, and Persistence. Previous reports counted only students who registered at the University for two consecutive fall terms; thus, students who were newly admitted in the spring were never reflected in the persistence and attrition calculations. This table aims to address that issue so that spring admissions can be tracked.

This report also features new presentations of material, based on input from frequent users of the Enrollment Report. These new presentations include:

- The separation of information on degree-seeking vs. non-degree seeking students
- The inclusion of FTE calculations in Tables 1 and 8
- The tabulation of students from traditionally under-represented groups (TUGs) in Tables 3, 6, 8, and 14
- The ranking of the top five states and top three countries of origin for undergraduate and graduate students in Tables 10 and 11
- The inclusion of undergraduate declared minors in Table 12
- The ranking of the top five undergraduate and graduate degree programs in Tables 12 and 13
- The number of dual degree candidates accepted to the graduate school in Table 19
- The ranking of the top five undergraduate and graduate degrees awarded in Tables 26 and 27

One table was revised considerably and worth highlighting. **Table 18** contains demographics of new undergraduate students. This year, we have presented information for both first-time freshmen and transfer students. We also include breakdowns of previous institution(s) attended and self-rated sign skills for all new undergraduates. For first-time freshmen, we include average ACT scores; and for transfer students, we include their admissions status (as freshmen, sophomores, juniors, etc.).

Executive Summary

All of the Fall 2004 information in this report was derived from data taken from the Gallaudet PeopleSoft student data system on the University Census Date, which was September 15, 2004. Highlights from the findings are listed below.

Total University Enrollment Information (Tables 1 through 4)

- Undergraduate enrollment is almost equally split between men and women. However, the vast majority of degree-seeking
 undergraduates are enrolled as full-time students (Table 1).
- There are more women than men enrolled in graduate programs. Approximately 30% of all degree-seeking graduate students are enrolled part-time (**Table 1**).
- Professional Studies students are primarily women (Table 1).
- Enrollment has remained fairly consistent since 1998. The primary sources of spikes and drops in enrollment are in the Graduate Special/Graduate Extension and Professional Studies areas (**Table 2**).
- Total University enrollment features 10% international students and 25% students from TUGs (Table 3).
- Total University enrollment of students from each individual TUG has risen over the past 10 years. The Fall 2004 class experienced a sharp increase in the number of students who are Native American, jumping from 1% in 2003 to 3% in 2004 (Table 4).

Academic Year 2003-04 Information (Tables 5 through 7)

- The Spring 2004 term had the highest enrollment of any term in AY 2003-04. Much of this was due to the sharp increase in Professional Studies enrollment (**Table 5**).
- Although most undergraduate degree-seeking students enroll full-time in Fall and Spring, they tend to enroll part-time for the Summer term. The same trend holds true for graduate students. Aside from academic load, the other demographics of degree-seeking students remain constant across each term (Table 6).

Degree-seeking Students, Fall 2004 (Tables 8 through 13)

- Degree-seeking enrollment as a percentage of total enrollment at the undergraduate level has remained constant for the past 10 years. However, the graduate percentage has increased significantly, from 53% in 1995 to 94% in 2004. The overall percentage of degree-seeking students for the combined undergraduate and graduate programs has increased from 79% in 1995 to 85% in 2004 (Table 9).




Figure 4a: Dormitory Occupancy Rate 5-Year History Fall 2000 to Fall 2004

- On-campus residents are primarily undergraduate students. Less than 50% of all graduate students choose to live on-campus (Figure 4b).
- The top five states of origin for undergraduates tend to reflect the top states by population in the U.S. However, the top five states of origin for graduates tend to be more localized to the DC metro area (**Table 10**).
- Most degree-seeking international students are the only individual from their country enrolled at Gallaudet. Only 12 of the 28 countries represented in the undergraduate student body have more than one student from that country. The trend is more pronounced at the graduate level with only two countries sending more than one student (**Table 11**).
- The top undergraduate major, Social Work, is not among the top five undergraduate degrees awarded in 2004.
 Simultaneously, the second most popular degrees awarded in 2004 Family & Child Studies and Psychology are not among the top five majors declared (Tables 12 and 26).
- Of the top five graduate majors by enrollment and by degrees awarded, School Counseling & Guidance, Social Work, and Speech-Language Pathology appear on both lists (**Tables 13** and **27**).
- Of the six doctoral-level degree programs offered by the graduate school, three boast the highest program enrollments for Fall 2004: Audiology, Au.D.; Clinical Psychology, Ph.D.; and Special Education Administration, Ph.D. (**Table 13**).

Non-degree Seeking Students, Fall 2004 (Tables 14 through 16)

- Undergraduate non-degree seeking enrollment mirrors the demographics of degree-seeking enrollment except that there
 is a higher percentage of non-degree seeking international students. This difference can be attributed to the unique
 enrollment of the ELI program (Table 14).
- The percentage of deaf students among the graduate non-degree seeking students is higher than the degree-seeking population. The Professional Studies student population has a higher percentage of hearing students than any other category of student (degree-seeking or non-degree seeking) at the University (Table 14).
- The percentage of non-degree seeking students in graduate programs has dropped from 46% in 1995 to 6% in 2004. The overall percentage of non-degree seeking students at the University has dropped from 21% in 1995 to 15% in 2004 (Table 15).
- Non-degree seeking students tend to be from the metro DC area, especially those enrolled as PST students (Table 16).

Admissions, Fall 2004 (Tables 17 through 19)

- Both the undergraduate and graduate programs experienced a sharp drop in applications for the Fall 2001 term. Except
 for that year, the application, admission, and enrollment trend in the undergraduate program has remained fairly constant;
 at the graduate level, it has increased (Table 17).
- Transfer students are, on average, six years older than first-time freshmen. Over 50% of transfer students were admitted as freshmen (**Table 18**).
- The number of students who attended a residential or day school for the deaf vs. those who attended a mainstreamed program is fairly balanced (**Table 18**).
- The majority of new undergraduate students identified themselves as either good or excellent signers (Table 18).
- There are more deaf/hard of hearing than hearing individuals in the new graduate student class (Table 19).
- Deaf Education, M.A. and Social Work, M.S.W. were the most popular degree programs among new graduate students (**Table 19**).

Persistence, Attrition, and Graduation, Fall 2004 (Tables 20 through 27)

- Freshmen had a higher academic dismissal and withdrawal rate than any other undergraduate class. Sophomores had the highest persistence rate of all the undergraduate classes (**Table 20**).
- Six percent of juniors in Fall 2003 graduated by Fall 2004 (Table 20).
- Men and women were equally likely to be academically dismissed or to withdraw (Table 20).
- International and Hispanic/Latino students had the highest persistence rate of all the students by racial/ethnic background.
 Although Asian-American students had the highest academic dismissal rate, they also had the highest graduation rate.
 Native Americans had the highest withdrawal rate (Table 20).
- All the students from Fall 2003 who were academically dismissed were dismissed by the Spring 2004 semester (Tables 20 and 21).
- The one-year attrition rate has remained constant over the past 10 years (Table 22 and Figure 8).
- Transfer students have a higher graduation rate by cohort than first-time freshmen (**Table 23**).
- The number of doctorate degrees awarded each year has almost doubled since 1995 (Table 24).
- More women than men were awarded degrees both undergraduate and graduate in 2004 (**Table 25**).
- Of the 155 undergraduate degrees awarded, almost 30% were Bachelor of Science degrees (**Table 26**).

Figure 1: Total University Enrollment 10-Year History Fall 1995 to Fall 2004



Figure 2: Total University Unduplicated Headcount 5-Year History AY 1999-00 to AY 2003-04



Figure 3: Degree-seeking Student Fall Enrollment, 10-Year History Fall 1995 to Fall 2004




Figure 4b: Dormitory Occupants by Student Category Fall 2004



Figure 5: Non-degree Student Fall Enrollment 10-Year History Fall 1995 to Fall 2004





Figure 6a: Undergraduate Fall Application, Admission, and Enrollment History, Fall 2000 to Fall 2004







AY 1994-95 to AY 2003-04



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Glossary

Term	Definition
1st-Time Freshmen	First-time freshmen are students who have no previous college experience, who have satisfactorily completed the admissions process, and who have been accepted for study at Gallaudet.
6-year Cohort	A cohort is a specific group of students selected for tracking purposes. For federal reporting, the University generally follows students for six years to measure graduation, attrition, and retention rates.
Academic Dismissal	Academic dismissal is the involuntary withdrawal of a student based on unsatisfactory academic performance. There are two conditions under which a student may be academically dismissed: the student's GPA falls below 2.00 (1.75 for freshmen); the student does not satisfy conditions placed upon their admission to the University. Students must wait one full academic term to reapply for admission to Gallaudet; readmissions are not considered for summer terms.
Academic Year	The Gallaudet Academic Year (AY) includes the fall, spring, and summer semesters. For the purposes of this report, data is tabulated from the Fall Census Date to the final day for grade submissions for the Summer term. Generally, these dates are early September to late August.
Attrition	Attrition is the withdrawal of a student before the completion of degree requirements. Students may withdraw either voluntarily or involuntarily from the University. Students who leave the University may, upon successful reapplication, return and graduate from the University.
Census Date	The census date is the date on which student data in the Gallaudet PeopleSoft system is frozen; the resulting data set is then used to calculate all official University statistics. The census date falls on the 15th calendar day after the first day of classes for each term.
Certificate students	Certificate students are students who are enrolled in graduate-level courses and whose courses of study lead to Certificates in any of the following areas: Leadership, Management, Integrating Technology in the Classroom, and International Development.
Consortium students	s Consortium students are students who are matriculated at one of the member institutions of the Consortium of Universities in the Metropolitan Washington Area (CUWMA) and who are enrolled in courses towards their degrees at Gallaudet. Students may be deaf, hard of hearing, or hearing. For a full list of CUWMA member institutions, see www.consortium.org.
Doctorate students	Doctorate students are students who are enrolled in graduate-level courses and whose courses of study lead to a Doctorate of Philosophy (Ph.D.) or Doctorate of Audiology (Au.D.) degree.
Dual degree students	Students who are enrolled in two academic programs simultaneously and who have declared their intention to pursue two degrees to the University are considered dual degree students.
English Language Institute (ELI) students	ELI students are students for whom English and American Sign Language are second languages; they are usually international students who need supplemental instruction in English before taking University courses.
Enrollment	Enrollment is the count of registrations at Gallaudet during the course of one academic term or one academic year. For example, students who are enrolled as double majors are counted twice for enrollment purposes; however, they are counted only once for headcount purposes.
Enrollment Yield	Enrollment yield is calculated as the ratio between students who matriculated at Gallaudet to those who were offered admission.

Term Definition

Exchange students Exchange students are juniors or seniors who are matriculated at an accredited higher education

institution with which Gallaudet has an exchange agreement and who are enrolled in courses towards their degrees at Gallaudet. Currently, exchange institutions include Oberlin College (Oberlin, Ohio) and McDaniel College (Westminster, Maryland). Students may be deaf, hard of hearing, or hearing.

Freshman students Undergraduate students who have earned less than 25 semester hours of coursework towards a

degree can be counted as freshmen.

(FTE)

Full Time Equivalent Full Time Equivalent (FTE) is the count of enrollments at Gallaudet based on registered credit hours. It provides a formula by which to count part-time student enrollment as a proportion of full-time student enrollment. The formula which Gallaudet uses to calculate FTE is (Full-time enrollment) + (1/3 Parttime enrollment).

Full-time graduate enrollment

Graduate students must enroll for a minimum of 9 credit hours per semester to qualify as full-time graduate enrollments.

Full-time undergraduate Undergraduate students must enroll for a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester to qualify as fulltime undergraduate enrollments.

Graduate Degreeseeking students

Degree-seeking graduate students are those students whose courses of study are designed to result in the conferring of a degree from the University. They include students categorized as certificate, masters, specialist, and doctoral students.

students

Graduate Extension These are students taking graduate-level courses through Gallaudet's extension offerings, either at a regional center, via distance education instruction, or some combination of both. This category does not include those students who are matriculated as degree-seeking graduate students who elect to take an extension course to supplement their studies.

Graduate Nondegree seeking students

Non-degree seeking graduate students are those students whose courses of study do not lead to the conferral of a degree from Gallaudet University. They are enrolled as graduate extension students or international interns. Non-degree seeking students may receive a degree from another institution.

Graduate Special students

Students who do not intend to pursue a degree and who wish to enroll in graduate-level courses are considered Graduate Special students. Acceptance requires approval of the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, Sciences, and Technology or the Dean of the Graduate School and Professional Programs.

Graduation

Graduation is the University's official conferral of an academic degree upon a student. Only students who have completed their degree requirements and who remain in good standing with the University are eligible for graduation.

Headcount

Headcount is the count of unique individuals enrolled at Gallaudet during the course of one academic term or one academic year. For example, when determining academic year statistics, students who are enrolled in consecutive fall, spring, and summer terms are counted only once for headcount purposes; however, they are counted three times for enrollment purposes (once per term registered).

Term	Definition
International Interns	International interns are students from foreign countries who do not intend to pursue a degree and who are enrolled in academic courses at Gallaudet. They can be enrolled at either the undergraduate or graduate level.
Juniors	Undergraduate students who have satisfactorily completed at least 56 semester hours of coursework towards a degree can be counted as juniors.
Masters students	Masters students are students who are enrolled in graduate-level courses and whose courses of study lead to a Master of Arts (M.A.), Master of Science (M.S.), or Master of Social Work (M.S.W.) degree.
Other freshmen	Other freshmen includes students who have had some previous college experience, who have satisfactorily completed the admissions process, and who have been accepted for study at Gallaudet.
Part-time graduate enrollment	Graduate students who are enrolled for less than 9 credit hours per semester are considered part-time graduate enrollments.
Part-time undergraduate	Undergraduate students who are enrolled for less than 12 credit hours per semester are considered part time undergraduate enrollments.
PeopleSoft	PeopleSoft is the transactional data system used by Gallaudet to enter information about students, faculty, and staff.
Persistence	Persistence is the continuation of a student towards his/her academic degree from one academic term to the next.
Professional Studies students	Students who are enrolled in Professional Studies and Training (PST) courses at Gallaudet and who are not pursuing an undergraduate or graduate degree are considered Professional Studies students. PST courses earn credits but are not applied towards a degree; however, select PST courses may result in a professional certificate.
Racial/Ethnic Categories	The racial/ethnic category labels used in this report are taken from the U.S. Department of Education. These categories are the same as those used on federal reports related to diversity statistics.
Retention	Retention is the measure of students who return each term to continue their academic degree programs at Gallaudet. It does not include students who graduate from Gallaudet. Retention may be calculated on a year-to-year or semester-to-semester basis.
Second Degree students	Undergraduate students who have already received a baccalaureate degree from an accredited college or university and who have been accepted to Gallaudet to pursue a second baccalaureate degree are enrolled as second degree students. These students do not include those undergraduates who pursue two majors concurrently during their first enrollment at Gallaudet. However, they do include those students who received a bachelors from Gallaudet and return to the University for their second.
Seniors	Undergraduate students who have satisfactorily completed at least 90 semester hours of coursework towards a degree can be counted as seniors.
Sophomores	Undergraduate students who have satisfactorily completed at least 25 semester hours of coursework towards a degree can be counted as sophomores.

Term Special students	Definition See definitions for "Graduate Special students" and "Undergraduate Special students."
Specialist students	Specialist students are students who are enrolled in graduate-level courses and whose courses of study lead to a Education Specialist (Ed.S.) or Psychology Specialist (Psy.S.) degree.
Traditionally Under-represented Groups (TUGs)	Traditionally Under-represented Groups (TUGs) include those individuals who self-identify as either African-American, Asian-American, Native American, or Hispanic/Latino.
Transfer students	Students who have completed coursework at another accredited college or university may be accepted to Gallaudet as transfer students. Transfer students must be enrolled for at least their senior year (24 credit hours) and must complete at least half of their major requirements at Gallaudet.
Undergraduate Degree-seeking students	Degree-seeking undergraduate students are those students whose courses of study are designed to result in the conferring of a degree from the University. They include students categorized as freshmen, sophomores, juniors, seniors, transfers, and second degree students.
Undergraduate Extension students	These are students taking undergraduate-level courses through Gallaudet's extension offerings, either at a regional center, via distance education instruction, or some combination of both. This category does not include those students who are matriculated as degree-seeking undergraduate students who elect to take an extension course to supplement their studies.
Undergraduate Non- degree seeking students	Non-degree seeking undergraduate students are those students whose courses of study do not lead to the conferral of a degree from Gallaudet University. They are enrolled as special, exchange, visiting, Consortium, undergraduate extension, or English Language Institute students or as international interns. Non-degree seeking students may receive a degree from another institution.
Undergraduate Special students	Students who do not intend to pursue a degree and who wish to enroll in undergraduate-level courses are considered Undergraduate Special students. Acceptance requires approval of the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, Sciences, and Technology or the Dean of the Graduate School and Professional Programs.
Visiting students	Visiting students are sophomores, juniors, or seniors who are matriculated at an accredited college or university and who wish to take courses towards their degrees at Gallaudet. They may be deaf, hard of hearing, or hearing.
Withdrawal	Withdrawal is a voluntary leave of absence from the University. Students must complete a leave of absence form if they wish to re-enroll at Gallaudet in any future academic term. Students who do not complete a leave of absence form may be required to apply for readmission to the University.
