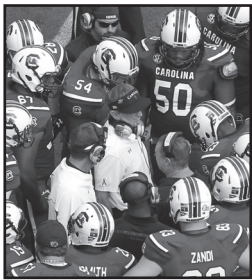

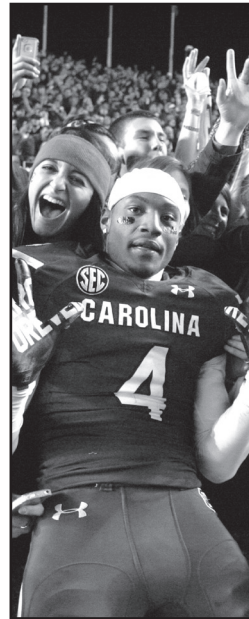

A South Carolina win over Wisconsin would...

- ◆ Give the Gamecocks an 11-win season for the third-consecutive year. South Carolina had never won 11 games in a season prior to 2011.
- ◆ Be the 42nd Gamecock win in the last four years, extending their school record for most wins by a senior class. The current four-year win total of 41 (9-11-11-10) surpasses the mark of 38 set by last year's senior class. Carolina is one of 11 schools in the country that has registered 40 wins over the past four seasons.
- ◆ Give Connor Shaw his 27th career win as a starting quarterback, extending his school record. Shaw is 26-5 as a starter for the Garnet & Black. Previously, Todd Ellis held the record for most wins with a 24-16-3 mark.
- ◆ Extend the Gamecocks' winning streak against non-conference opponents to 15 games. The Gamecocks have not lost a non-conference game since the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, a 26-17 loss to Florida State.
- ◆ Give the Gamecocks' three-straight New Year's Day Bowl wins. They defeated Nebraska, 30-13 in the 2012 Capital One Bowl and defeated Michigan, 33-28, in the 2013 Outback Bowl.

SETTING THE STAGE: The No. 8/8 South Carolina Gamecocks (10-2, 6-2 SEC) face the No. 19/19 Wisconsin Badgers (9-3, 6-2 Big Ten) in the 2104 Capital One Bowl in Orlando, Fla. on Wednesday, January 1. Kickoff is set for 1 p.m. ET. The game will be televised nationally on ABC. ESPN will have the national radio broadcast. Todd Ellis and Tommy Suggs handle the call for the Gamecock Radio Network with Langston Moore on the sidelines. WKNT in Columbia (107.5 The Game) is the flagship station for Gamecock Athletics.

A LITTLE HISTORY: 2013 marks the 120th season of intercollegiate football at the University of South Carolina, dating back to 1892. It is the 107th-consecutive year in which South Carolina has competed on the gridiron. The University did not field a team in either 1893 or 1906. Carolina is 28 games over the .500 mark with an all-time record of 575-547-44. The Gamecocks were nine games under .500 until head coach Steve Spurrier took the reins in 2005, but are 37 games over since.

SEC HISTORY: The 2013 season marks South Carolina's 22nd year in the Southeastern Conference. South Carolina and Arkansas joined the league prior to the 1992 campaign. The Gamecocks earned their first SEC Eastern Division title in the 2010 season. The Gamecocks are 78-97-1 all-time in SEC regular-season play, but are 23-9 since 2010 in conference action.

MAKING HISTORY: The Gamecocks have followed up back-to-back school-record 11-win seasons with another 10-win campaign. Prior to the 2011 season, South Carolina had just one 10-win season in its history, that coming in 1984.

BEEN HERE BEFORE: This is South Carolina's second Capital One Bowl and third bowl visit to Orlando. The Gamecocks defeated Nebraska 30-13 on January 2, 2012. Several current Gamecocks played in the game including quarterback Connor Shaw, who was 11-for-17 in the air for 230 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He added 42 rushing yards as well including a 1-yard score. South Carolina held Nebraska to just 253 yards of total offense in the game with just 64 yards allowed in the second half. The Gamecocks sacked Nebraska quarterback Taylor Martinez six times including 1.5 sacks by Jadeveon Clowney. South Carolina also appeared in a bowl game in Orlando following the 1975 season. They suffered a 20-7 loss to Miami (Ohio) on December 20, 1975 in front of 20,247 fans in the Tangerine Bowl.

GOING BOWLING: The 2014 Capital One Bowl marks Carolina's 19th bowl appearance. The Gamecocks are 6-12 all-time in bowl games. They dropped their first eight bowl games, won three straight, lost four of the next five but now have won two straight. Here's a look at the Gamecocks' bowl appearances:

CAROLINA VS. WISCONSIN: The 2014 Capital One Bowl will mark the first time these two state universities have ever met on the gridiron.

CAROLINA VS. THE BIG TEN: The Gamecocks are 5-9 all-time against teams that currently comprise the Big Ten Conference. However, that number is somewhat skewed in that they were 0-5 combined against Nebraska (0-3) and Penn State (0-2) when neither of those schools was a member of the Big Ten at the time of the game. The Gamecocks are 6-4 against teams that had Big Ten affiliation when the game was played. Carolina is 2-0 against Ohio State, 1-0 against Nebraska and Chicago as members of the Big Ten, 2-1 versus Michigan, and 0-1 against Iowa, Indiana and Northwestern.

SENIOR SALUTE: The Gamecocks list just five seniors on their roster. The quintet of **Jimmy Legree, Ronald Patrick, Connor Shaw, Chaz Sutton** and **David Wilkins** will be playing in their final game for the Gamecocks. That is the fewest number of seniors in Division I FBS football in 2013.

LEAVING EARLY?: Three juniors, **Jadeveon Clowney, Victor Hampton** and **Kelcy Quarles** took part in the "Senior Day" ceremonies at Williams-Brice Stadium prior to the regular season finale against Clemson. All three are exploring their options of either returning for their senior year or entering the 2014 NFL Draft.

SHEEPSKIN IN HAND: Eight Gamecocks will have earned their degree by the bowl game. Those eight include **A.J. Cann, Ryland Culbertson, Bruce Ellington, Sharrod Golightly, Jimmy Legree, Ronald Patrick, Chaz Sutton** and **David Wilkins**.

41 IN 4: Although small in numbers, this year's senior class will go out as the winningest class in school history. Only 12 Division I-A schools have recorded 40 or more wins over the past four seasons, including South Carolina. Here are those squads and their win totals:

STREAKING OUTSIDE THE SEC: South Carolina has won 14-straight games against non-conference opponents. It's last non-conference loss came to Florida State in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl. Since that loss they have defeated East Carolina (twice), Navy, The Citadel, Clemson (3 times), Nebraska, UAB, Wofford, Michigan, North Carolina, UCF and Coastal Carolina.

NO BCS, NO PROBLEM: Despite a third-straight 10-win season, Carolina was left out of the BCS bowls. However, the Gamecocks are the only school that has wins over two BCS teams this season. Carolina handed UCF its only loss of the season, a 28-25 win in Orlando on September 28, and knocked off Clemson for the fifth-straight season with a 31-17 victory in Columbia on November 30. As senior quarterback **Connor Shaw** said, "I'd rather be in our scenario where we beat them rather than they beat us and we go to a BCS game."

THE LAST TIME OUT: The No. 10/9 Gamecocks capped another successful regular season with a 31-17 win over in-state rival and No. 6/4-ranked Clemson on Saturday, November 30. It was Carolina's school-record fifth-straight win in the Palmetto State Showdown. The Gamecocks forced six turnovers in the contest as senior quarterback **Connor Shaw** finished his career with a perfect 17-0 record at Williams-Brice Stadium. Shaw posted 246 yards of offense in the contest, throwing for 152 yards and rushing for another 94. The Carolina defense slowed the high-powered Tiger offense to just 352 yards while recording five sacks, including a career-high 2.5 by **Kelcy Quarles**. Tajh Boyd was sacked 16 times in three games against the Gamecocks.

TOP-10 MATCHUP: The Carolina-Clemson match was just the eighth time the Gamecocks have played a game in which both teams were ranked in the Top-10, but the fifth time since 2011. The Gamecocks are now 2-6 in those contests, but 2-0 when playing at home.

TOP-10 PROGRAM: The Gamecocks have put together back-to-back Top-10 finishes for the first time in school history, finishing ninth in 2011 and eighth in 2012 according to the A.P. They finished one spot higher (eighth and seventh) in the Coaches' poll each year. The Gamecocks have finished among the nation's Top 25 for three-straight seasons, another "first" in school history.

YEAR (FINAL AP): 1958 (13); 1984 (11); 1987 (15); 2000 (19); 2001 (13); 2010 (22); 2011 (9); 2012 (8).

2013 RANKINGS: The Gamecocks entered the 2013 season with the highest national ranking in school history, opening the season sixth in the A.P. poll and seventh in the Coaches poll. The previous high to open a season came in 2012 when they opened at No. 9 in both major polls. They have been as high as sixth in both polls and as low as 20th in both polls this season. They finished the regular season ranked eighth in both polls.

YES THEY CALL IT A STREAK: The Gamecocks are tied for the fifth-longest current streak of being ranked in the Associated Press's Top 25. Carolina and Stanford have been ranked for 63-consecutive weeks, trailing only Alabama, LSU, Oregon and Oklahoma. Carolina's streak started with the second week of the 2010 season and is the longest consecutive streak in school history.

THEY PAY TO SEE THE GAMECOCKS PLAY:

The winning on the field has translated into fans in the stands. Carolina sold out all seven of its home games this season. Buoyed by 51,967 season tickets, the Gamecocks rank 14th in the nation in average attendance at 82,401, which is a new school record. The single-game high this year was 84,174 for the Clemson contest, ranking seventh on the all-time list, in the 80,250-seat Williams-Brice Stadium.

THE HEAD BALL COACH: Steve Spurrier is in his ninth season directing the Gamecock football program. He has logged a 76-39 mark (.661) in Columbia. The Head Ball Coach is Carolina's winningest coach with 76 victories and is second in games coached with 115, behind Rex Enright (140).

REACHING 300: The Capital One Bowl will mark the 300th career game for Steve Spurrier as a collegiate head coach. Coach Spurrier owns a 218-79-2 mark (.732) in 24 seasons as a college head coach, with previous stops at Duke (20-13-1) and Florida (122-27-1).

ATOP THE LIST: Steve Spurrier became the all-time winningest coach at Carolina in the 2012 the regular-season finale at Clemson, surpassing Rex Enright (64) for the most coaching wins in school history. He is also the winningest coach at Florida with 122 victories. The legendary Bear Bryant (60 at Kentucky and 232 at Alabama) is the only other coach to own the most wins at two SEC schools.

TOPS IN HIS FIELD: Steve Spurrier became the 71st head college football coach (all divisions) and the 22nd in Division I history to record 200 wins when he accomplished that feat against UAB in 2012. He ranks third among active Division I coaches with 218 wins behind Frank Beamer (266) and Mack Brown (244). In addition, the HBC has 47 wins as a head coach at the professional level, giving him 265 career wins.

BOWL ELIGIBLE AGAIN: The Gamecocks have been bowl-eligible in each of Coach Spurrier's now nine campaigns. No other coach has taken Carolina to more than three bowl games. Coach Spurrier is 3-4 in bowl games at Carolina, including back-to-back bowl wins over Nebraska (Capital One Bowl) and Michigan (Outback Bowl) in the last two seasons. He is the only Gamecock coach to post three bowl victories.

LEADER OF THE PACK: Senior quarterback **Connor Shaw** is 26-5 as a starter, including a perfect 17-0 mark at Williams-Brice Stadium. With 5,762 yards passing and 1,636 yards rushing, he became not only the first 4,000-1,000 yard player in school history, but the first 5,000-1,000. He is the school's all-time leader in completion percentage at 64.7 percent, is second with 53 touchdown passes, and is fourth in total offense with 7,398 yards. Shaw was named one of 16 semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien Award and one of 10 finalists for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award.

THROWING STRIKES: When the Gamecocks pitch it around, there's been no one who has been more accurate in school history than **Connor Shaw**. Shaw is hitting 64.7 percent of his career pass attempts. He had gone a career-best and school-record 177 pass attempts without an interception before getting picked at Tennessee. He has now gone 301 passes with just the one INT. This season he ranks fifth in the SEC and 16th in the country in pass efficiency with a mark of 156.2, tossing 21 touchdowns with one interception while completing 61.0 percent of his passes.

'THROWN' IN THE WIND: Junior **Dylan Thompson**, a 6-3, 218-pounder from Boiling Springs, S.C., has proven to be a solid backup for Shaw. Thompson is 3-0 as a starter in his career. His two starts in 2012 came against East Carolina and at Clemson, and he responded by throwing for over 300 yards with three touchdowns in both of those contests. In addition, he was 7-of-10 for 117 yards and two touchdowns in the bowl win over Michigan, including the game-winning 32-yard pass to Bruce Ellington with 11 seconds remaining in the contest. In 2013, Thompson has made one start, getting the nod at Missouri. He went 15-for-27 for 222 yards with one INT in that contest. He also saw significant action at UCF, going 15-for-32 for 261 yards with one pick. For the season, he is 52-of-89 (58.4 percent) for 783 yards and four touchdowns with three interceptions.

BE LIKE MIKE: Sophomore running back **Mike Davis**, a second-team All-SEC selection, has put together seven 100-yard rushing games this season. A semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award, the Lithonia, Ga. product is fourth in the SEC in rushing, averaging 103.1 yards per contest and fourth in all-purpose yardage at 134.2 yards per game. He has scored a touchdown in eight games this season with 11 TDs total, tops on the squad. With 1,409 career yards, he is currently in 26th place on the all-time list. Alex Hawkins is 25th with 1,490 yards.

A GRAND SEASON: **Mike Davis** has 1,134 yards in 11 games. It's just the 10th 1,000-yard rushing season in school history, and he is the eighth player to accomplish the feat (George Rogers did it three times). Smith, more than doubling their total from a season ago when they got three from Marcus Lattimore and one from Kenny Miles. The Gamecocks have five players on the roster with 100-yard rushing games under their belt, with Davis (7), Carson (1) and Smith (1) joining **Brandon Wilds** (3) and **Connor Shaw** (1). Both Wilds and Shaw turned in their 100-yard efforts in 2011.

GO THE DISTANCE: **Mike Davis** has logged four rushes of 50 yards or more in his first two seasons. He had a 50-yarder against UAB last season. His 75-yard burst against North Carolina in the 2013 season opener and his first career start was the longest by a Gamecock since Bobby Wallace went for 88 against Middle Tennessee in 2006. He matched that with another 75-yard sprint at Georgia. Of the 14 runs in school history of 75 yards or longer, Davis is the only one to do it twice. His fourth-career 50-yard jaunt came at UCF, a 53-yard TD run. Only Derek Watson has more runs of 50-plus yards at Carolina. Here's the list of those with three or more:

RETURN OF WILDS: Sophomore tailback **Brandon Wilds** returned to the playing field late for the final two regular season games. Wilds had been sidelined since dislocating his left elbow at UCF in the season's fourth game. When the elbow healed a hamstring flared up, keeping him on the bench. For the season, he has rushed 40 times for 205 yards, an average of 5.1 yards with three touchdowns. He has added eight catches for 111 yards with two TDs. The Blythewood, S.C. product has three 100-yard rushing games in his career.

CARSON CITY: The Gamecocks got a big lift from little-used tailback **Shon Carson** in the win over Florida. Carson, a 5-8, 219-pound sophomore from Scranton, S.C., rushed 13 times for a career-high 102 yards against the Gators, including a key 58-yard burst from the Carolina 5-yard line in the fourth quarter, that led to the game-winning field goal. Carson entered the game with just 114 rushing yards through the season's first nine contests. It was his first career 100-yard game. He made his first career start against Coastal Carolina and responded with 38 yards on 11 carries. For the season, Carson has 60 carries for 256 yards and one score.

MR. SMITH COMES TO COLUMBIA: True freshman **Jamari Smith**, who is fourth on the depth chart, made his first impact for the Garnet & Black in the win over Coastal Carolina. The Jacksonville, Fla. product entered the game with just four carries for five yards on the season, but rushed 10 times for 103 yards and a score against CCU, including a 52-yard burst.

ON THE RECEIVING END: The Gamecocks have spread the wealth in the passing game this season with 19 different players getting receptions and four different players leading the team in receiving. The Gamecocks list no seniors on the three-deep at the three wide receiver positions.

♦ **Bruce Ellington** is the top receiver. He had 40 receptions for 600 yards and seven touchdowns last season. After a slow start this year, he broke loose against Vanderbilt, catching eight passes for 111 yards, both then-career highs. He topped that with a 10-catch, 136-yard, 2-touchdown effort at Missouri. For the season, he has a team-high 43 catches for a team-leading 635 yards with six touchdowns, including two against both Arkansas and Missouri. Ellington went over the 1,000-yard receiving mark for his career in the win at UCF. With 14 career touchdown receptions, he is ninth on Carolina's all-time list. With 100 career catches, he is the 14th player in school history to reach that plateau.

♦ **Damiere Byrd**, the fastest player on the squad, has come on strong after a slow start. After logging just three catches for 34 yards in the first three contests, he has 30 receptions for 541 yards in the last nine games. He caught a career-high five passes for 74 yards at UCF, then logged another five-catch game against Kentucky, this time for 98 yards, including a 62-yard touchdown reception. He added a 45-yard scoring pass at Arkansas. At Tennessee, he had four catches for a career-high 121 yards, including a 76-yard TD. He has 33 catches on the season for 575 yards with four touchdowns.

♦ **Shaq Roland**, the 2011 "Mr. Football" recipient in the state of South Carolina, caught four passes for 72

yards and a score against Coastal Carolina. He averages 18.1 yards per catch with five of his 19 receptions going for touchdowns, including four of his last 10.

♦ **Nick Jones** is not the biggest guy on the roster or have the most raw talent. All he does is catch passes. The 5-7, 174-pounder from Moore, S.C. had his best game as a Gamecock, catching six passes for 97 yards and two touchdowns in the loss at Georgia, all career highs. His previous highs were four receptions (4 times) and 78 receiving yards. For the season, he has 24 catches for 256 yards and five scores. He had just one career touchdown coming into the season.

THE O-LINE: The Gamecocks boast a veteran offensive line with four returning starters. Junior left guard **A.J. Cann** is the most experienced of the group with 37 career starts, the most on the squad. He was a midseason first-team All-SEC selection by Phil Steele. Senior right guard **Ronald Patrick** started all 13 games last season and has started 24 of the last 25 games, missing the Tennessee contest with a high ankle sprain. Junior left tackle **Corey Robinson** started nine of the final 10 games a season ago, while right tackle **Brandon Shell** was a Freshman All-American while making 10 starts in 2012. The two tackles have started every game this season. A pair of redshirt freshmen, **Cody Waldrop** and **Clayton Stadnik** split time at center. Waldrop started the opener, but suffered a foot sprain in the win over North Carolina. He was replaced by Stadnik, who started the next two games before Waldrop returned to face UCF. Waldrop continued to be plagued by injuries, so Stadnik started the next five games before Waldrop returned to the starting lineup against Florida and has held that position since. Clayton's twin brother, **Brock**, is also a member of the Carolina offensive line, and was the more highly-recruited of the two. The two played side-by-side at the collegiate level for the first time in the win at Arkansas.

AS GOOD AS IT GETS: The 2013 Gamecocks feature one of the game's top players in junior defensive end **Jadeveon Clowney**. Clowney entered the season regarded by most as the top defensive player in the country and a likely top pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He was just the second Gamecock to earn unanimous All-America honors in 2012, joining George Rogers from his Heisman Trophy season in 1980. Clowney was named the Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end, and the All-America Player of the Year, presented by AT&T as selected by the fans on ESPN.com. He finished sixth in the Heisman race and was a finalist for the Nagurski Trophy, Rotary Lombardi Award and the Bednarik Award after being named the SEC Defensive Player of the Year by the league's coaches. Clowney was named one of 12 semifinalists for the 2013 Rotary Lombardi Award and was selected to the first-team All-SEC squad by both the Associated Press and the league's 14 coaches.

THE MAGNIFICENT SEVEN: Coming off his trip to L.A. to receive the ESPY Award for the top play of the year, **Jadeveon Clowney** continues to cause havoc for quarterbacks around the southeast. As a

sophomore, Clowney set school records last season for sacks in a game (4.5 at Clemson), sacks in a season (13.0) and tackles for loss in a season (23.5). The 6-6, 274-pounder was on everyone's preseason All-America list. With 3.0 sacks and 10.5 tackles for loss this season, he continues to move up the all-time Carolina charts in those categories. In addition, he has a school-record nine career forced fumbles. Here is where the junior ranks on Carolina's all-time lists:

FIRST LINE OF DEFENSE: Junior **Kelcy Quarles** is reaping the benefits of the attention Clowney draws. Quarles leads the team and is second in the SEC in sacks (9.5) and leads the team and is tied for second in the SEC in tackles for loss (13.5), surpassing his 2012 totals of 3.5 sacks and 8.0 TFLs en route to first-team All-SEC accolades. Fifth-year senior **Chaz Sutton**, who has spent the past two years backing up Clowney and Devin Taylor, is third on the team with 7.5 tackles for loss and has 19.0 in his career.

BEHIND ENEMY LINES: The Gamecocks have tallied 83 tackles for loss, an average of 6.9 tackles for loss per game, including a season-high 14 in the loss at Tennessee. 23 different players have contributed to the TFLs, led by **Kelcy Quarles** (13.5), **Jadeveon Clowney** (10.5), **Chaz Sutton** (7.5) and **Sharrod Golightly** (6.0).

SHARING THE WEALTH: The Gamecocks have used the team approach in stopping their opponents this season. Eight players, **Skai Moore** (51), **Jimmy Legree** (47), **Marcquis Roberts** (46), **Kaiwan Lewis** (45), **Victor Hampton** (45), **Sharrod Golightly** (44), **Brison Williams** (43) and **T.J. Holloman** (43) have between 43 and 51 tackles this season. An additional four players have 30 or more stops.

YOUNG 'BACKERS: The Gamecocks graduated five seniors who manned the linebacker and Spur positions a year ago and have a host of youngsters to fill in those slots this season. True freshman **Skai Moore** took over the starting duties at the Will linebacker slot and leads the team with 51 tackles, earning a spot on the Freshman All-SEC squad. **Marcquis Roberts**, who also plays the Will position, is third with 46 stops. Mike linebackers **Kaiwan Lewis** (45) and **T.J. Holloman** (43) also rank among the team's top eight tacklers.

SECONDARY IN NATURE: South Carolina returned three starters in the secondary in junior cornerback **Victor Hampton**, senior cornerback **Jimmy Legree** and junior safety **Brison Williams**. Hampton, a second-team All-SEC selection, is considered the shutdown corner and was the SEC Defensive Player of the Week against Mississippi State, while Legree has played both corner and safety during his career. Legree has six picks in his career, one more than Hampton. The Gamecocks intercepted three passes against Mis-

THE FRISCO KID: True freshman **Elliott Fry** walked on to the Gamecock squad this summer, earned the starting placekicking chores and eventually a spot on the Freshman All-SEC team. The six-foot, 150-pound Frisco, Texas product is 15-for-18 in field goal attempts. He was successful on his first six kicks, missed two straight, and has now connected on nine of his last 10 attempts. At Missouri, he hit from 20-yards out in the fourth quarter then nailed the eventual game-winner in the second overtime from 40-yards away, earning SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. His career-high four field goals against Florida, including a career-long 45-yarder, proved to be the difference in the game and earned him SEC Freshman of the Week accolades. He is seventh in the SEC in scoring and fourth among kickers, at 7.9 points per game. He became the first true freshman placekicker to kick in the Gamecocks' season opener since Courtney Leavitt in 1996.

BEATING THE BEST: The Gamecocks have been frustrated by defeating the SEC Eastern Division champion in each of the past three years (Georgia in 2011 and 2012; Missouri in 2013) yet did not represent the East at the SEC title game in any of those seasons.

AN SEC SIX-PACK:

The Gamecocks went 6-2 in the SEC for the third-straight season. They had never logged six SEC wins in a season prior to 2011. They finished the 2000, 2001, 2005 and 2010 seasons with 5-3 SEC marks. Carolina posted at least a .500 conference mark for the 11th time in 22 seasons and have put together four-straight .500-or-better SEC records for the first time in history.

GOOD HOME COOKIN':

The Gamecocks have established a school record by winning their last 18 games at Williams-Brice Stadium. They are also 34-3 (.919) in their last 37

home games. The only home losses since 2009 came to top-ranked Florida in 2009, to 17th-ranked Arkansas in 2010 and to defending national champion Auburn in 2011. The Gamecocks' 18-game home winning streak is the longest in the nation, one more than Stanford and two more than Ohio State. Northern Illinois has won 26-straight games in its home stadium, but the NCAA considers its loss to Iowa at Chicago's Soldier Field in the 2012 season opener as a "home" loss and credits them with an 12-game home winning streak.

TOP HOME STREAKS: The Gamecocks have won 18-straight home games, the longest streak in school history, surpassing the mark of 15 set from 1978-80. Here are the top home winning streaks in Carolina football history:

PERFECT AT HOME: Carolina went 7-0 at home in 2013 for the second-straight year. 2012 marked the first time they ran the table at home since joining the SEC. The last time they had gone undefeated at home prior to 2012 was in 1987. They have been undefeated and untied at home 11 times.

ROAD WARRIORS: The Gamecocks are 12-5 in their last 17 true road contests. Four of the five road losses in that stretch came to nationally-ranked opponents: at No. 8 Arkansas in 2011, at No. 9 LSU and No. 3 Florida in 2012 and at No. 11 Georgia in 2013, before losing to unranked Tennessee earlier this season. Those are the only five losses for **Connor Shaw** as the starting QB.

COMEBACK OF BIBLICAL PROPORTIONS: The Gamecocks rallied from 17 points down in the fourth quarter on the road to the No. 5 team in the country to pull out a 27-24 double-overtime win against Missouri

earlier this season. That victory has to be considered as one of the greatest come-from-behind wins in school history. It was the largest comeback by the Gamecocks at any point of a game since rallying from a 17-point second-quarter deficit vs. East Carolina on Sept. 3, 2011. **Connor Shaw** (offense), **Kelcy Quarles** (defensive line) and **Elliott Fry** (special teams) all earned SEC Player-of-the-Week honors for their efforts.

BUT PROBABLY NOT THE G.O.A.T.: Although it didn't have the same conference and national implications as the win at Missouri, Carolina's 32-27 win at North Carolina on September 28, 1968 has to be recognized as the greatest of all time, at least in modern times. The Gamecocks trailed in that one, 27-3, entering the fourth quarter, but scored 29 points in 10:01 to pull out the victory. Playing the role that **Connor Shaw** reprised at Mizzou was none other than **Tommy Suggs** back in the summer of '68.

IT'S NEVER EASY: The Gamecocks have faced one of the top non-conference slates in the country this season. Their four non-conference foes of Clemson (10-2), UCF (11-1), Coastal Carolina (12-2) and North Carolina (6-6) have a combined record of 39-11, a .780 winning percentage.

IN THE CLASSROOM: The Gamecocks placed 29 players on the 2012 SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll while posting a team GPA of 2.918, highest in school history. Among those who made the SEC Honor Roll include returnees **Landon Ard**, **K.J. Brent**, **Damiere Byrd**, **A.J. Cann**, **Shon Carson**, **Gerald Dixon Jr.**, **Phillip Dukes**, **Bruce Ellington**, **Deon Green**, **Mason Harris**, **Tyler Hull**, **Kadetrax Marcus**, **Drew Owens**, **Ronald Patrick**, **Kelvin Rainey**, **Corey Robinson**, **Brandon Shell**, **Brock Stadnik**, **Clayton Stadnik** and **Dylan Thompson**.

FIRST TIMERS: 23 Gamecocks have made their first career starts this season. Eight made their first career start in the season-opening win over North Carolina, including four on offense (TB **Mike Davis**, TE **Drew Owens**, WR **Shaq Roland** and OC **Cody Waldrop**) and four on defense (Spur **Sharrod Golightly**, LB **Kaiwan Lewis**, SS **Kadetrax Marcus** and LB **Marcquis Roberts**). OC **Clayton Stadnik** and CB **Ahmad Christian** both made their first career starts at Georgia. **Mason Zandi**, who has spent the majority of his young career at tackle, made a start at tight end against Vanderbilt. Tight end **Jerrell Adams** earned the start at UCF. Fullback **Connor McLaurin**, defensive end **Darius English** and linebacker **T.J. Holloman** all made their first start against Kentucky. Cornerback **Rico McWilliams** and safety **Chaz Elder** both made their first starts at Arkansas. Offensive guard **Will Sport** and wide receiver **Pharoh Cooper** made their first starts at Tennessee. Safety **Chaz Elder** made his first start against Mississippi State. Tailback **Shon Carson**, defensive tackle **Phillip Dukes** and defensive end **Gerald Dixon** all got the nod for their first start against Coastal Carolina.

KEEPING THE FANS HAPPY: The Gamecocks have taken care of business against their top rivals in recent seasons. Since 2010, they are an impressive 13-3 against SEC Eastern Division rivals Georgia (3-1), Florida (3-1) and Tennessee (3-1) and against in-state rival Clemson (4-0). In fact, Carolina has won the Palmetto State Championship five years in a row, the longest winning streak over the Tigers in school history.

EVERY TIME OUT: Seven players have started every game this year, three on offense: junior offensive guard **A.J. Cann**, junior offensive tackle **Corey Robinson**, and sophomore offensive tackle **Brandon Shell**; and four on defense: junior spur **Sharrod Golightly**, senior cornerback **Jimmy Legree**, junior defensive tackle **J.T. Surratt** and senior defensive end **Chaz Sutton**.

BROTHER ACT: The Gamecocks have two sets of brothers on the squad. Redshirt freshmen offensive linemen **Brock and Clayton Stadnik** are twins. On the defensive line, **Gerald Dixon and Gerald Dixon Jr.** are half-brothers. They share the same father, Gerald Dixon Sr., who played at Carolina in the early 90s.

THE LEGACY CONTINUES: The Gamecocks roster features four players whose fathers also donned the Garnet & Black: junior defensive tackle **Kelcy Quarles** and his father, Buddy (1984-87); sophomore defensive linemen **Gerald Dixon** and **Gerald Dixon Jr.** and their father, Gerald (1990-91); and redshirt freshman **Jordan Diggs** and his father, Shed (1984-87).

TWO-SPORT STARS: Head coach Steve Spurrier is not adverse to having his players participate in other sports at Carolina. Wide receiver **Bruce Ellington** has been the starting point guard for the basketball team for the past three seasons, while tailback **Shon Carson** and cornerback **Ahmad Christian** spent the spring with the Gamecock baseball team. In addition, wide receiver **Damiere Byrd** was a sprinter during the indoor track & field season. Byrd was named a team captain for the 2014 track team.

WORKING OVERTIME: The Gamecocks have played just three overtime games in their history, the first two came at Tennessee. They dropped a 23-20 decision in Knoxville on Sept. 27, 2003, then fell by a 27-24 score on Oct. 27, 2007, at Neyland Stadium. They finally got on the winning ledger with a 27-24 double-overtime win at Missouri on October 26, 2013. It was the longest game in school history.

WHO'S PAYING FOR THIS?: Three walk-ons were rewarded with scholarships for the 2013-14 school year this fall. Junior fullback **Connor McLaurin**, junior cornerback **Sidney Rhodes** and senior wide receiver **David Wilkins** will have their school tabs paid for.
