## 2011 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Dreams do come true! Sometimes they come true more than once. In 2010, the South Carolina baseball team found a way to capture a national championship for the first time in school history. In 2011, the motivation was the same – the belief was the same – the attitude was the same. Roles may have changed. There were new players – new challenges – new obstacles – but that belief and that attitude and approach always was focused and as Carolina closed out 2010 and Rosenblatt Stadium with a national championship, the team returned to Omaha and opened up T.D.Ameritrade Park in Omaha the same way it left that heartland of America the previous year – as national champion in college baseball.

### OPENING DAY

The defending national champions opened the year with a three-game sweep of Santa Clara. Opening Day included many festivities with the United States Air Force conducting a flyover and the new national championship flag raised. Several former Gamecocks were also honored with 2010 All-America pitcher Blake Cooper throwing out the ceremonial first pitch along with teammates Parker Bangs, Kyle Enders, Bobby Haney, Jeffery Jones, Whit Merrifield and Jordan Propst. The 2011 squad followed that up with a dynamite offensive start as Jackie Bradley Jr. went 4-for-4 with a homer and three RBI and Christian Walker and Scott Wingo added homers as well as the Gamecocks defeated Santa Clara 12-5 in front of a capacity crowd.



Carolina rattled off two more wins vs. the Broncos to earn a weekend sweep. Sophomore left-hander Tyler Webb retired 12 consecutive batters in a 2-1 win in game two of the series with Matt Price earning his first save and the Gamecocks closed the weekend out with a 6-0 win as Christian Walker went 2-for-4 with three RBI and four Gamecock pitchers combined for a four-hit shutout.

South Carolina swept its second straight series the next weekend as the Gamecocks defeated Southern Illinois three times to improve to 6-0 on the year. A seven-run first inning that featured a three-run homer from Robert Beary helped lift Carolina to a 10-6 win in game one. Webb improved to 2-0 on the year with a career-high 7.1 innings and seven strikeouts and teamed with relievers Bryan Harper and John Taylor to hurl a five-hit shutout in a 4-0 victory in game two and a 14-hit offensive attack helped Carolina seal the series sweep on Sunday in a 9-4 victory over the Salukis.

### COLLEGE BASEBALL'S PREMIER RIVALRY

After a midweek win over Furman improved the squad to 7-0 on the year, it was time for college baseball's premier rivalry to take center stage again in the Palmetto State. For the second straight season, South Carolina and Clemson would meet in a unique three-game series in three different settings. First, Columbia and a raucous sellout crowd of 8,242 at Carolina Stadium saw Brady Thomas, Christian Walker and Scott Wingo each tally two-run homers and on the back of junior left-hander Michael Roth's quality start, the Gamecocks erased an early three-run deficit to defeat Clemson 6-3 to take the series opener. Clemson would tie the series up on their home turf with a 10-5 win at Doug Kingsmore Stadium.

That set up the rubber game at Fluor Field in Greenville, S.C. An emotionally charged matchup with a 50/50 crowd witnessed a competitive thriller that saw South Carolina score five runs in their final two at-bats on the way to a 5-4 victory to clinch the series victory in front of a packed house of 7,125 fans. Tied at 1-1 in the bottom of the seventh, junior Jake Williams made the most of a pinch-hit opportunity, blasting a three-run homer, the first of his Carolina career and the Gamecocks held on for a one-run win with Matt Price closing out the victory with a strikeout against Clemson pinch hitter Jon McGibbon.

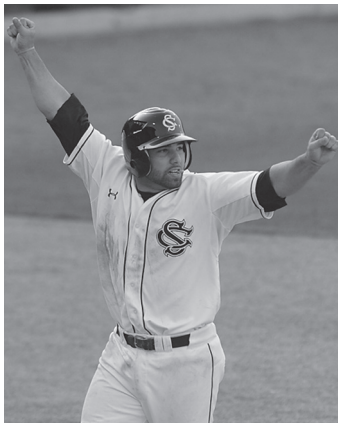




## SEC PLAY

With the emotional series win over Clemson, the Gamecocks returned home and kept the momentum going with a series victory over upstart Cal State Bakersfield. The Gamecocks would head into SEC play with a 12-3 overall record.

The first conference weekend of the season would feature Carolina against SEC Eastern Division rival Georgia. The Bulldogs would draw first blood in the three-game series as an uncharacteristic five-error contest by the Gamecocks would allow for Georgia to capitalize on their way to a 4-2 victory at Carolina Stadium. It was a pitcher's duel in game two between Georgia's Michael Palazzone and Carolina's Steven Neff as Carolina trailed 1-0 entering the bottom of the eighth inning. With two outs, the Gamecocks made their move as Adam Matthews tripled to the gap in right-center putting a runner in scoring position. The Gamecocks then tied the game as Christian Walker roped a double down the left field line scoring Matthews and tying the game. Entering the ninth inning, the Gamecocks went to closer Matt Price, who kept the Bulldogs at bay setting up the heroics in the bottom of the ninth. Adrian Morales singled to left field, his third hit of the game, to open the inning followed by a two-strike hit by Jake Williams to center field. Evan Marzilli would sacrifice both runners over. With two outs and runners still on second and third and the count full, Wingo ripped a hard shot that first baseman Jonathan Hester dove for. Hester kept the ball in front of him but Wingo hustled down the line and beat Georgia reliever Patrick Boling to the bag and Morales scored the winning run. Six different Gamecocks tallied at least one RBI in the series finale and four Carolina relievers limited Georgia to just one run on three hits in eight innings of work as Carolina sealed a series win with an 8-3 victory over the Bulldogs.



## SOUTH CAROLINA-FLORIDA ROUND ONE

A road trip to Gainesville would be next on the list as South Carolina and Florida met in a Top 5 showdown that served as a sign of things to come between the two schools. Michael Roth proved why he was one of the top pitchers in collegiate baseball as he stymied the Gator hitters throughout the series opener and was backed by an offense that pounded out 13 hits as Carolina upended the Gators 9-2 to take the first game of the series. After falling 2-1 in game two, the Gamecocks would rally from three runs down and clinch the series at McKethan Stadium with a 4-3 comeback win over the top ranked Gators. With a full count and the bases loaded in the eighth inning, Adrian Morales drew a walk to bring home the winning run.

## WINNING STREAK

With the series victory over the Gators under the team's belt, South Carolina returned home and swept Kentucky to climb to 7-2 in the SEC standings. Roth would outduel Kentucky starting pitcher Alex Meyer 3-1 in the opener, a Brady Thomas RBI single in the bottom of the 10th inning would lift Carolina to a 4-3 win, and freshman right-hander Forrest Koumas would pitch a career-high 6.1 scoreless innings in a 4-1 victory in the series finale. The effort by Koumas would help him earn SEC Co-Freshman of the Week honors.

South Carolina extended the conference win streak total to seven the next weekend in Knoxville as a series sweep of the Volunteers moved the Gamecocks to 10-2 in the SEC. The inaugural SEC Game of the Week on ESPN2 showcased Roth and Price combining for a seven-hit shutout backed by a 2-for-4 game from Bradley and three hits by Scott Wingo. Colby Holmes followed up Roth's start with an equally dominant performance as he struck out seven batters in seven innings and with a two-run homer by Christian Walker, the Gamecocks would defeat Tennessee 2-0. That set the stage for Forrest Koumas, who gave the Gamecocks a third consecutive quality start as Carolina nipped the Volunteers 2-1 to earn a series sweep. The Gamecock pitching staff had its best weekend of the season with just one run allowed in 27 innings pitched at Tennessee. The Volunteers has just 15 hits for three games with a .179 batting average and Carolina finished with 24 strikeouts and just six walks allowed as well. Holmes would pick up SEC Pitcher of the Week accolades also.

## GAMECOCKS & COMMODORES

Carolina Stadium would be home to the top series in college baseball in the middle of April as No. 3 South Carolina and No. 1 Vanderbilt faced off in front of three consecutive capacity filled crowds in Columbia. As he had done all season, Michael Roth continued to bring his "A" game to the field in the opener as he outdueled Vanderbilt junior flame thrower Sonny Gray as the Gamecocks drew first blood, 3-1, on Friday night. Scott Wingo, Evan Marzilli and Adam Matthews all had two hits apiece and Peter Mooney belted a solo home run to pace the Carolina offense. Vanderbilt returned serve in the Saturday night contest and evened the series with a 6-4 win.

The rubber game would be on display not just for the packed house at Carolina Stadium but also for a national TV audience on ESPN2. Trailing by a pair of runs, Carolina batted around in the seventh inning and scored four times to rally for a 5-3 victory over the Commodores and to clinch the series. The Gamecocks entered the bottom of the seventh against Vanderbilt starter Taylor Hill trailing 3-1 to the Commodores. Never down and never out, the Gamecocks battled back starting off with a leadoff double by designated hitter Steven Neff, who was making his first start of his career as a position player. Vanderbilt would go to the pen for left-handed reliever Corey Williams, who walked Peter Mooney giving Carolina a pair of runners with no outs. That would send Vanderbilt to the pen again, this time for right-hander Will Clinard. Robert Beary would execute a perfect bunt down the third base line that Clinard could not field and the bases were loaded with no outs after a base hit from Beary. Left-hander Kevin Zimek would be the fourth pitcher of the inning for Vanderbilt and Carolina would counter with pinch hitter Greg Brodzinski. Zimek

would hit Brodzinski to plate home a run and cut the deficit to 3-2. With the bags still full, Jackie Bradley Jr. laced a single to center field scoring Mooney and tying the game at 3-3. The bases still loaded Scott Wingo would have a quality at-bat and knock a ground out to second base that scored Beary giving Carolina a one-run lead. An intentional walk would load the bases one more time for Carolina as Vanderbilt decided to walk Walker to face the left-handed Brady Thomas. Thomas would deliver for Carolina as he lifted a sacrifice fly to center field scoring Brodzinski and giving Carolina a two-run advantage.

That would be enough for right-hander Matt Price, as the sophomore reliever hurled three scoreless innings and struck out seven batters to pick up the win. He struck out the side in the eighth inning, setting down the heart of Vanderbilt's order (3-4-5 hitters Aaron Westlake, Jason Esposito, Mike Yastrzemeski). In the ninth inning, Vanderbilt would put a pair of runners on base with one out. Price settled in though and struck out Conor Harrell looking for the second out of the game. After a wild pitch advanced runners, Price ended the game with a called third strike on Tony Kemp.



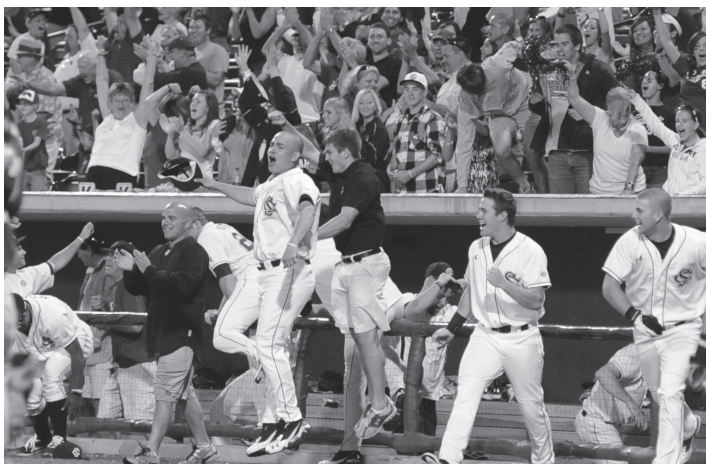
The three-game series attendance was 24,726, the best three-game mark in Carolina Stadium history. Roth picked up SEC Pitcher of the Week honors as well for his Friday night win.

## WIN ANYWAY

At the midpoint in the conference slate, the Gamecocks took an 11-4 conference mark to Starkville for a weekend series with the Mississippi State Bulldogs. Carolina scored in six of nine innings in the Friday night opener and Christian Walker was 4-for-5 with two runs scored as the Gamecocks set down MSU 8-2 with Roth improving to 9-1 as well. Carolina's 5-3 loss on Saturday was more painful than usual as center fielder Jackie Bradley Jr. sustained a broken left wrist diving for a ball in the outfield in the fifth inning. Heading into the rubber game, it was a "MASH" unit lined up for the Gamecocks with the entire Opening Day starting outfield not available. Along with Bradley's injury, Adam Matthews was back in Columbia after sustaining a serious hamstring injury in the Vanderbilt series and Evan Marzilli could not play on Sunday due to a medical condition.

"Win Anyway," became the motto from head coach Ray Tanner. And his players followed suit. Down 3-2 entering the top of the fourth, the Gamecocks made their move, batting around to score four runs on five hits and take a three-run lead. All four runs in the fourth would come with two outs. With runners on first and third, Christian Walker got it started as he singled up the middle to score Robert Beary tying the game at 3-3. Brady Thomas gave the Gamecocks the lead with a single to left field that was followed by RBI base hits from Jake Williams and Adrian Morales that extended Carolina's lead to three runs. That offensive output continued in the fifth as Carolina batted around for the second straight inning, this time scoring five runs to go ahead 11-3 on the Bulldogs. Wingo tallied a RBI sacrifice fly with the bases loaded. With one out and the bags still full, Thomas drove in three more runs with a triple down the right field line. Jake Williams added a RBI double as Carolina went ahead 11-3 on MSU. Christian Walker would pick up SEC Player of the Week honors after his weekend in Starkville. Walker had a phenomenal weekend at the plate batting .909 (10-for-11) along with a sacrifice fly RBI and four walks against the Bulldogs in 16 plate appearances. He had 14 total bases for the weekend and a .1273 slugging percentage as well.

That winning would continue through the Auburn series at home as the Gamecocks swept the Tigers to improve to 17-4 in conference play. Carolina tallied wins of 2-1, 10-2 and 7-3 to remain in a three-way tie atop the Southeastern Conference with nine games remaining on the schedule. After winning one of three games at Ole Miss, the Gamecocks returned home for the final home conference series of the year vs. the upstart Arkansas Razorbacks. After falling in the series opener 6-2 to the Hogs, the Gamecocks would respond in game two as Scott Wingo capped off a thrilling game with a walk-off homer in the bottom of the ninth to lift Carolina to a 6-5 victory. Wingo roped the 0-1 offering from Arkansas righthander Ryne Stanek just out of the reach of the Razorback right fielder and into the Carolina bullpen for his fourth home run of the year, sending the announced crowd of 7,765 fans home happy. It was Wingo's third walk-off hit of the year; he had the game-winning RBI single in a 2-1 win over Auburn on April 29 and also drove in the winning run in the ninth in a 2-1 win over Georgia. Senior Day was on Sunday and it would be all South Carolina then in the rubber game as Colby Holmes came within one pitch of a complete game shutout as Carolina won the series with a 7-1 win vs. the Razorbacks. Steven Neff was the offensive star for the Gamecocks as he went 3-for-4 with a pair of home runs and three RBI. The Gamecock lefthander, who had a total of five career hits coming into the weekend, finished the series 6-for-8 with three home runs, a double and five RBI.



## SEC CHAMPIONS

South Carolina had one thing in mind when the team made its drive to Tuscaloosa, Ala. for the final conference series of the season, a series victory and a conference championship. Despite a one-run loss to Alabama in the opener, Carolina knew that fate was in the team's hands. Win the final two games, South Carolina would earn a Southeastern Conference championship and the No. 1 seed at the SEC Tournament. Walker, Mooney, Wingo and Marzilli were a combined 9-for-14 in game two as Carolina held on for a 6-3 win over the Crimson Tide. That set the scene for the final day and with a championship on the line, the Gamecocks delivered as Carolina broke out of the gates with an early two-run lead off RBIs from Walker and Neff and behind solid work from Colby Holmes and three relievers the Gamecocks defeated Alabama 3-2 to claim the school's third conference championship. Matt Price came up big in the ninth inning going three up and three down to seal the championship. Price coaxed Taylor Dugas into a fly out to center field, tallied the second out on a ground ball and sealed the win with a strikeout looking against Jared Reaves.





# 2012 Baseball

## SOUTH CAROLINA (2) GEORGIA SOUTHERN (1)

A stellar pitcher's duel went South Carolina's way as the Gamecocks outlasted Georgia Southern, 2-1, at the NCAA Columbia Regional at Carolina Stadium.

Michael Roth (12-3) got the win for the Gamecocks, pitching seven-plus innings while allowing just two hits and one unearned run while striking out four. Matt Price picked up his 16th save of the season with 1.2 perfect innings, striking out three of the five hitters he faced.

Georgia Southern righthander Andy Moye (7-2) pitched his second complete game of the year but came up just short, giving up just two runs - one earned - on four hits while striking out four and walking two.

South Carolina managed four hits in the game and Georgia Southern had just two; those numbers marked a season-low total for both teams. No player for either team had more than one hit in the game.

Brady Thomas, Adrian Morales, Jake Williams and Robert Beary had the Gamecocks' four hits; Shawn Payne and Scooter Williams had the pair for the Eagles.

Georgia Southern would find its way onto the scoreboard first in the third inning. Brent Pugh reached on a fielder's choice, then moved to second on a wild pitch. A single from Scooter Williams put runners at the corners with one out. Then, an attempt to hold the runner at first was bobbled by the Carolina first baseman, allowing Pugh to score on the play and give the Eagles a 1-0 lead.

The Gamecocks would tie the game in the fourth when Scott Wingo was hit by a pitch to lead off the inning then advanced to third as an errant pickoff throw sailed into right field. A sacrifice fly to center by Thomas brought Wingo home to tie the game at 1-1.

Carolina would leave a pair of runners in scoring position in the fifth, but finally managed to capitalize in the sixth. After Christian Walker drew a one-out walk, Thomas executed a hit-and-run to perfection to put runners at the corners. Morales then came through with a base hit to score Walker and give the Gamecocks the lead at 2-1.

Meanwhile, Georgia Southern continued to struggle against the Gamecock pitching. In fact, no Eagle baserunner advanced past first base after the third inning. Roth retired 11 hitters in a row before he hit the first batter of the eighth inning, giving way to John Taylor. Taylor would then record a strikeout before being lifted in favor of Price, who proceeded to strike out the next to batters to end the inning.

Price then worked a 1-2-3 ninth, including a strikeout of the nation's leading home-run hitter, Victor Roache, to end the ballgame.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (11) STETSON (5)

South Carolina exploded for 10 runs in the third and fourth innings and advanced to the NCAA Columbia Regional championship game with an 11-5 win over Stetson at Carolina Stadium.

Colby Holmes (7-3) got the win with 6.2 strong innings of work, giving up four runs on seven hits while walking just one and striking out three. It was the sixth time this season Holmes went six innings or longer; in all six such outings, he earned a victory.

Four Gamecocks registered multi-hit outings with Robert Beary leading the way. He went 2-for-3 with a grand slam - Carolina's second of the season - to tie a career high with four RBIs. Evan Marzilli, Scott Wingo and Christian Walker all had two hits in the game - Wingo was also hit by a pitch twice to increase his school-record career total to 59 - and Jake Williams and Peter Mooney both drove in a pair of runs.

For Stetson, it was Mitchel Brennan taking top honors with a 2-for-4 day that included a three-run home run, his second of the Columbia Regional. Jeff Simpson, Robert Crews and Sean Emory all had two hits as well.

The Hatters got on the board first when, with two outs in the second, first baseman Trey Blackman hit his first home run of the season to give Stetson a 1-0 lead.

The Gamecocks then exploded in the third and fourth innings. After Marzilli led off with a double and Wingo moved him to third with a base hit, Walker was hit by a pitch to load the bases with no one out. Marzilli would score to tie the game at 1-1 when Brady Thomas hit into a double play, putting a runner at third with two outs. However, three consecutive walks to Morales, Williams and Mooney brought home Wingo to give the Gamecocks a 2-1 lead. Beary then came through with his first career grand slam to blow the game wide open, giving the Gamecocks a 6-1 lead and delighting the Carolina Stadium crowd of 7,335.

An inning later, it was more of the same as Marzilli and Wingo led off with back-to-back singles, then Walker singled up the middle to bring home Marzilli and make it 7-1. After a walk to Thomas and a fielder's choice by Morales erased Wingo at home, Williams ripped a 2-RBI double to left center to bring home Walker and Thomas and increase the lead to 9-1. A sacrifice fly by Mooney one batter later brought home Morales, moving the Gamecocks into double digits at 10-1.

Steven Neff then delivered his fifth home run of the season on the first pitch of the fifth inning, roping yet another one into the right-field bullpen, to increase Carolina's lead to 11-1.

Stetson would not go quietly, however. With two outs in the seventh, Mitchel Brennan roped his second home run of the Columbia Regional to bring home three Hatter runs and cut the Carolina lead to 11-4.

The Hatters would threaten again in the eighth and come away empty, but they managed to scratch out one more run in the ninth. Blackman was hit by a pitch to lead off the inning, moved to second on a walk to Emory, and then scored as Brennan singled to cut the Stetson deficit to

11-5. However, John Taylor would force a groundout and strike out the final two batters he faced to complete the victory.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (8) STETSON (2)

Almost 19 hours after it began, South Carolina clinched its second consecutive regional title on Monday afternoon, defeating Stetson 8-2 at Carolina Stadium in a game that was delayed overnight because of severe storms in Columbia.

John Taylor (5-1) picked up the win in relief for the Gamecocks as he went 1.2 innings, giving up one run on two hits while walking a pair. Matt Price earned his 17th save with 2.2 scoreless innings that included two strikeouts. Forrest Koumas got the start and went 4.0 innings, giving up just one run on three hits, but could not return after the game was halted Sunday night. Stetson starter Austin Perez (2-3) was charged with the loss; he gave up four runs on eight hits while walking three and striking out one in 4.1 innings of work.

The game, which began at 7 p.m. Sunday, did not conclude until mid-afternoon Monday after a severe thunderstorm nearly ripped the tarp off the infield and knocked power out to Carolina Stadium. Crews from South Carolina Electric & Gas also had to cut a fallen tree out of power lines behind the left-field bleachers where many gameday staffers and media were parked. Power was restored around 1 a.m., and the Carolina Stadium maintenance and facilities staff worked through the night to clean up debris and damage. As a result, the stadium looked no worse for wear when gates opened at 11:30 a.m. Monday.

Scott Wingo and Christian Walker led the Gamecock offensive effort as both went 3-for-4 and combined to score three runs on the day. Robert Beary and Steven Neff each went 2-for-5; Beary had a triple and Neff swatted a double for his 11th extra-base hit of the year.

For their efforts, Beary was named the Most Valuable Player of the Columbia Regional, and Wingo, Walker, Evan Marzilli, Adrian Morales and Michael Roth were named to the All-Tournament Team.

For Stetson, seven players had one hit apiece. Mark Jones and Mitchel Brennan accounted for two of the seven; both were also named to the All-Tournament Team.

The key to the Carolina victory was the success of their leadoff hitters. In six of the nine innings, the Gamecocks were able to get a leadoff runner on base. Five of those six times, that runner scored, accounting for five of the Gamecocks' eight runs in the game.

It took Carolina all of two pitches to find its way on the scoreboard. On the second pitch of the game, Marzilli ripped the 0-1 offering into the right field bullpen for a leadoff home run to give the Gamecocks a 1-0 lead.

However, Stetson would answer in its half of the first. A leadoff single by Jeff Simpson, followed by a sacrifice bunt, another single and then a sacrifice fly from Nick Rickles scored Simpson to tie the game at 1-1. From that point on, however, Koumas allowed just one hit through the next three innings while striking out three.

Meanwhile, the Gamecocks were padding their lead. A leadoff triple from Beary in the third led to another run as he scored on a sacrifice fly from Marzilli to give the Gamecocks the lead back at 2-1. Wingo and Walker would then record back-to-back singles to give the Gamecocks runners at the corners with two out, but they were stranded there.

In the fourth, a leadoff walk to Morales led to another run as Williams sacrificed him to second and a base hit from Beary brought him around to make the score 3-1. Steven Neff would then rip his 11th extra-base hit of the season to put runners at second and third, but again they would be stranded as a groundout ended the inning.

For the fourth time in five innings, the leadoff runner reached in the fifth when Wingo singled for the second time in the game. Another single by Walker put two on with no out, and a sacrifice bunt from Brady Thomas moved them to second and third. After an intentional walk to Morales loaded the bases with one out, Williams hit a deep fly to right that brought home Wingo to put the Gamecocks ahead 4-1. Another walk to Mooney loaded the bases just before the game was halted at 8:24 p.m.

Neither team could do much after the restart until the Hatters put together several great at-bats in the seventh. Back-to-back singles from Trey Blackman and Sean Emory, followed by a sacrifice bunt from Brennan, put runners at second and third with one out. A walk to Simpson loaded the bases for the Hatters, leading to Price getting the call to grind out the final eight outs. And grind he did - after a long at-bat, Robert Crews reached on an error and all runners advanced to bring Stetson to within a pair at 4-2, moving the tying run to second. But Price was able to fight through two more tough at-bats and induce a flyout to right - whereupon Jake Williams fired a strike to home plate to force the runner to hold at third base - and a sharp groundout to Wingo to end the inning.

After coming away empty in the eighth, the Gamecocks doubled their offensive output in the ninth. Another leadoff single for Wingo, followed by a hit-and-run from Walker, put runners at the corners with no out. Following a Brady Thomas strikeout, Stetson elected to intentionally walk Morales for the second time in the game (his third walk overall). Exactly like in the fifth inning, Williams hit a deep fly ball to bring home Wingo and give the Gamecocks a 5-2 lead. But unlike the fifth, Mooney followed up with a base hit to bring home Walker from second to make the score 6-2. Then, with two runners still aboard, Beary roped a fly ball to deep center field that the Stetson outfielder could not haul in, leading to a two-base, two-run error to increase the Gamecocks' lead to 8-2. After that, it was all but academic for Price, despite giving up a pair of singles in the ninth. He got a groundout, a strikeout and a flyout to end the ballgame and send Carolina back to the Super Regional.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (5) CONNECTICUT (1)

Lefthander Michael Roth pitched 8.1 solid innings, and second baseman Scott Wingo drove in two runs as South Carolina defeated Connecticut 5-1 in game one of the NCAA Columbia Super Regional at Carolina Stadium.

Roth (13-3) was his usual dominant self, allowing just one run - unearned - on six hits while striking out two and walking three in 8.1 innings of work. He has now gone 30.0 consecutive innings, spanning the entirety of his last four starts, without surrendering an earned run. It was Roth's seventh time this season to pitch eight or more innings. First-round draft pick Matt Barnes (11-5) took the loss for UConn, surrendering all five runs on eight hits while walking a pair and striking out six.

Wingo had his eighth two-RBI game of the season as he went 2-for-5, driving in runs in the third and fifth inning as the Gamecocks climbed out of an early hole. Evan Marzilli was also 2-for-5 in the game with a double, and Steven Neff had his fifth multi-hit game of the year with a 2-for-4 effort that included a double. On the year, 12 of Neff's 18 hits have gone for extra bases.

For Connecticut, six players had one hit apiece. Second baseman LJ Mazzilli extended his hitting streak to 10 games.

The Huskies jumped out to a 1-0 lead in the first when George Springer got a two-out single to center, then advanced to second as the ball was misplayed by the Gamecock outfield. He would score one batter later when Mike Nemeth singled through the left side to put the Huskies on the board.

Early on, Barnes was able to overpower the Gamecock hitters as he struck out the side in the first and fanned four total batters in his first trip through the Carolina order. But the second run through the lineup proved to be a different story.

With two out in the third, Marzilli doubled off the wall in left to put a runner in scoring position for Wingo. The Gamecock second baseman came through with a base hit, bringing Marzilli home to tie the game at 1-1.

An inning later, the Gamecocks again rallied with two outs as Jake Williams drew a walk to start things off. After Peter Mooney singled to put runners at first and third, Barnes would uncork a wild pitch that allowed Williams to score from third and give the Gamecocks a 2-1 lead.

Carolina would add some insurance and gain some breathing room in the fifth. Neff led off with a double and moved onto third base after a misplay in left field. After Marzilli struck out, Wingo came through again with a single to center, scoring Neff to put the Gamecocks up 3-1. It would be the first of four straight Carolina hits - a wild pitch moved Wingo from first to third, after which Walker singled to bring him home, increasing the Gamecock lead to 4-1. After Walker moved to second on a passed ball, Brady Thomas singled to bring home Walker and make the score 5-1. Another hit from Morales would chase Barnes from the game; the Gamecocks would get only two hits in the final 3.2 innings against the UConn bullpen.

Meanwhile, Roth was cruising. After allowing a leadoff single to John Andreoli in the third, the lefthander did not give up another hit until the seventh inning. In fact, from the third through the sixth, no UConn baserunner advanced past first base. Roth was able to get out of a jam in the seventh as Wingo started a 4-6-3 double play to erase the first hit, and then after UConn put runners at the corners with two out, he was able to get another grounder to Wingo to end the inning. He appeared to get stronger as the game went on - he recorded back-to-back strikeouts in the eighth, his first two punchouts of the game.

After Roth left to a thunderous ovation from the sellout crowd of 8,242, John Taylor only needed six pitches to end the ballgame.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (8) CONNECTICUT (2)

Christian Walker hit a go-ahead solo home run in the eighth inning, and South Carolina added five more insurance runs in the ninth as the Gamecocks advanced to the College World Series for the second straight year with an 8-2 victory over Connecticut at Carolina Stadium.

For the second straight year, Walker provided the eventual winning blast for Carolina as he roped a 1-0 offering from UConn starter Greg Nappo over the wall in left field to give the Gamecocks their first lead of the game at 3-2, sending the Carolina Stadium sellout crowd of 8,242 into a frenzy. It was in the eighth inning of the 2010 Super Regional against Coastal Carolina in Myrtle Beach that Walker hit a two-out, two-strike, three-run bomb that gave Carolina a 10-9 lead and propelled the Gamecocks to victory and kept alive the eventual national championship run.

The Gamecocks still needed an insurance run in the ninth. They batted around and got five - with just two hits.

Evan Marzilli led things off with a walk, then moved to third when Scott Wingo attempted a sacrifice bunt. He beat the throw to first for a base hit, and the UConn infield misplayed the ball, allowing Marzilli to move to third. The Huskies then intentionally walked Walker to load the bases and went to the bullpen for their closer, Kevin Vance. Brady Thomas would take Vance's first offering to deep left field, scoring Marzilli on the sacrifice fly to make it 4-2 Carolina as all three runners advanced. Another intentional walk, this one to Adrian Morales, brought Jake Williams to the plate, who entered the game 6-for-11 with the bases loaded. But the second pitch to Williams hit him in the leg, bringing home Wingo to make it 5-2.

Peter Mooney, who had hit several balls hard on the night, finally got one to fall. He ripped a double to the gap in right-center, scoring Walker and Morales to give the Gamecocks a 7-2 lead. A groundout from Robert Beary one batter later brought home Williams from third to make it 8-2 and give Carolina closer Matt Price a lot of breathing room.

He needed very little, actually. A one-out single and a walk were all the Huskies managed in the ninth as Price struck out the final two batters he faced, setting off the traditional "doggpile" celebration on the Carolina Stadium pitcher's mound.

John Taylor (6-1) earned the win with 1.2 innings of relief, allowing no runs on two hits while walking and striking out one apiece; he was the pitcher of record when the Gamecocks took the lead. Colby Holmes got the start and pitched quite well, save for one bad stretch in the second inning where he gave up four straight hits. He went 4.1 innings, giving up two runs on five hits while striking out two and walking none. Price earned his 17th save of the year with two scoreless innings, striking out four. UConn starter Greg Nappo (10-3) took the loss as he gave up three runs on 10 hits in 7.1 innings.

Williams, Mooney and Beary all finished with two hits and two RBIs on the night to lead the Gamecock offensive effort. Morales also had two hits and scored a pair of runs. Wingo was the fifth Gamecock to register two hits on the night as Carolina totaled 12 as a team, equaling their best output of the postseason.

For Connecticut, the 7-8-9 hitters in their lineup were a combined 6-for-11 while the rest of the Huskies were 4-for-24 on the night. Doug Elliot, Tim Martin and Billy Ferriter each had two hits.

UConn looked like it would take the life out of the ballpark early as the Huskies jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the second inning. After the first two batters to the plate failed to reach base, UConn put together four straight hits. Nick Ahmed started with a single, then went to third as Elliot had a base hit of his own. Martin then singled to bring home Ahmed and give the Huskies a 1-0 lead, and then Ferriter ripped a base hit to center, scoring Elliot to make it 2-0.

From that point on, however, the Gamecocks managed to keep Connecticut off the scoreboard. Holmes retired the next seven batters he faced and only allowed one more hit before giving way to Jose Mata with one in the fifth. Mata only faced two batters, but induced a double play and a groundout in his relief stint.

The double-play ball was quite nice to the Gamecocks as the fifth, sixth and seventh innings all ended on the twin killing. None was bigger than the bottom of the sixth, though. After Tyler Webb gave up a single to the one batter he faced, Taylor allowed another hit to Ryan Fuller that put runners at the corners with one out. An intentional walk to Ahmed loaded the bases. But the Gamecocks got what they were looking for - a one-hopper straight back to Taylor, who got the force out at home and then saw Beary fire to first to end the inning.

Carolina first got on the board in the fourth. Brady Thomas doubled with one out for the Gamecocks' second hit of the game, and then with two outs, Jake Williams ripped a double down the right field line to bring home Thomas and put the Gamecocks on the board at 2-1.

The Gamecocks would tie the game in the sixth as Morales singled to bring up Williams again. For his second straight at-bat, he came through with a base hit to put two on with one out. After Mooney flied out to right for the second out, Beary blooped a base hit into shallow center, allowing Morales to score and tie the game at 2-2; Williams was caught between second and third to end the inning.

After Walker's blast in the eighth, the Gamecocks continued to threaten. A double by Morales and an intentional walk to Williams put two on with one out for Mooney. He hit a frozen rope toward the gap in left center, but UConn center fielder George Springer made a diving catch for the second out, forcing the runners to return. After Beary reached on a fielder's choice and the runners advanced on an error, Steven Neff hit a deep fly to center, but again Springer made a highlight-reel, over-the-shoulder catch on the warning track to end the inning.

South Carolina finished its home season with a 36-4 record, its best at Carolina Stadium and the second-best under Tanner. The Gamecocks have won 19 straight postseason games at home, dating back to the 2002 Super Regional vs. Miami.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (5) TEXAS A&M (4)

Scott Wingo's bases loaded RBI single off the base of the right field wall in the bottom of the ninth inning lifted South Carolina to a 5-4 victory over Texas A&M (47-21) on day two of the 2011 College World Series. The Gamecocks advanced to the winner's bracket of the CWS to face top seeded Virginia.

Wingo, who had a career-high four hits on the night and reached base all five times, knocked a 1-2 pitch from Texas A&M reliever Nick Fleece with no outs and the bases loaded to lift Carolina to the one-run victory. Wingo's walk-off hit was his fourth of the season as well, with previous walk-off hits vs. Georgia, Auburn and Arkansas. The inning began with a double by Robert Beary off the right field wall that just missed a home run and was followed up by a base hit by Jackie Bradley Jr. and a walk to Evan Marzilli to set the stage for Wingo's heroics.

"I just saw they brought an outfielder in and I was really trying to get the ball in the air," said Wingo. "When I got two strikes on me, I just tried to battle and I think he threw me an inside fastball I just got it up."

Gamecock reliever Matt Price earned the win after retiring a pair of batters in the ninth inning. He is now 6-3 for the year. Texas A&M reliever Kyle Martin suffered the loss and is 2-3 for the season. He allowed the leadoff double to Beary in the ninth, the lone batter he faced.

Both starters competed strong in the CWS opener for both squads as Gamecock junior left-hander Michael Roth and Texas A&M junior right-hander Ross Stripling kept matching zeroes after both teams took advantage of a pair of errors to score four runs apiece in the first inning. After allowing three hits in the first two innings, Roth would allow just one hit the rest of the way as he went 7.1 innings and struck out eight batters while walking five. All four

runs yielded by Roth were unearned. He has a streak of 37.1 innings dating back to his May 13 start vs. Arkansas without allowing an earned run, that is five consecutive starts for Roth in that span. His season ERA is now 0.97. Stripling went eight innings for Texas A&M and allowed four runs, two earned, on seven hits with six strikeouts and a walk in a no-decision for the Aggies.

"It was a great college baseball game," said South Carolina head coach Ray Tanner. "Going into the first inning tonight, I have to admit that I had been paying attention to the other games and the other pitchers; it appeared that every pitcher seemed to scuffle a little bit in the first inning. Roth had to get in the battle mode and they had the four-spot and we came back and battled our way back into it with a four-spot. Roth did what he's accustomed to doing for us. He gave us a chance to win."

Texas A&M got on board first with four unearned runs in the top of the first inning. Tyler Naquin reached base to lead off the game on a fielding error by Gamecock first baseman Christian Walker. A one-out walk to Matt Juengel gave A&M a pair of runners and TAMU would score their first run on a RBI single up the middle courtesy of Jacob House. After Kevin Gonzales loaded the bases on a two-out walk, the Aggies plated home three runs on a three-run triple off the bat of Brandon Wood down the right field line.

The Gamecocks however answered and tied it up at 4-4 in the bottom half of the first. Marzilli had a leadoff walk followed by a single to Scott Wingo and a base hit by Christian Walker that loaded the bases for no outs. After Stripling balked in Marzilli for a run, Adrian Morales knocked in a run on a grounder to second baseman Andrew Collazo, who threw high to first base allowing both Wingo and Walker to score and advancing Morales to second base. With two outs and Morales on third base, Peter Mooney laced a RBI single through the right side that tied the game up.

South Carolina finished with 10 hits on the evening to just four for Texas A&M. Along with four from Wingo, the Gamecocks also got a 2-for-4 day from Beary. Junior outfielder Jackie Bradley Jr. made his first start since April 23 following a wrist injury, his first start in 26 games.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (7) VIRGINIA (1)

No. 4 national seed South Carolina (52-14) scored three times in the top of the first and never looked back as they handed top-ranked Virginia (55-11) a 7-1 setback in a winner's bracket game at the 2011 College World Series.

"We played probably one of our better games of the year tonight and we certainly needed it playing a team the quality of Virginia," said South Carolina head coach Ray Tanner. "We pitched extremely well. We played real tough defense, had some timely hitting. Really, probably can't play any better than that."

For the second straight game, the Gamecocks put together a productive first inning. After the first two batters were retired, Christian Walker reached on an error. Jackie Bradley Jr. followed with a run-scoring double into the right-centerfield gap for his first RBI since April 19. Adrian Morales bounced a single over the first baseman's head, scoring Bradley Jr. to make it 2-0. Morales was awarded third base on the play when Virginia errantly tossed the relay throw into the Gamecock dugout. Brady Thomas then belted a double that bounced at the foot of the centerfield wall, scoring Morales, and giving Carolina an early 3-0 lead.

Carolina extended its lead in the third. Morales, Thomas and Peter Mooney stroked consecutive two-out singles, plating a run and giving the Gamecocks a 4-0 advantage.

The Gamecocks chased Virginia starter Will Roberts in the fourth inning when Jake Williams led off with a triple to right-center and scored on Evan Marzilli's double to left. After Wingo sacrificed Marzilli to third, Walker greeted reliever Cody Winiarski with a double down the left field line, extending the lead to 6-0. Roberts was tagged with the loss, just his second of the season in 13 decisions. Williams' triple, his sixth of the season, ties the single-season record at South Carolina held by former Gamecock Brian Buscher.

Virginia finally got on the board in the bottom of the fourth when John Hicks hammered a 1-0 offering from Colby Holmes over the left field wall for a solo home run. Hicks's eighth of the season was the first hit allowed by Holmes on the evening.

The Cavaliers tried to mount a rally in the fifth. They loaded the bases on two hits and a walk with just one out, forcing head coach Ray Tanner to go to his bullpen. But senior reliever John Taylor worked out of the jam by inducing an inning-ending 1-2-3 double play to preserve the 6-1 advantage. Holmes left the contest after allowing just one run on four hits while matching his career high with seven strikeouts. Taylor was credited with the win after tossing a career-high 4.1 scoreless innings of one-hit relief, improving his record to 7-1 on the season.

"Colby gave us a quality start," added Tanner. "I really felt bad getting him out of there when I did, but we lost the pop-up in the sky there, and just felt like we needed to try to put a ball on the ground. It was 6-1 at that point and they were getting ready to get back in the game. Fortunately, J.T. rode a comebacker and we got out of that. As I said, that is a huge inning. We played extremely well on all fronts and won one of the biggest games of the year for us."

South Carolina added an insurance run in the eighth. Robert Beary led off with a walk, moved to second on a sacrifice bunt, advanced to third on a ground out and scored on Walker's RBI single to right.

An announced crowd of 22,027 was on hand to see the Gamecocks pound out 13 hits on the night, including three each by Morales and Thomas. Virginia was limited to five hits and committed all three of the game's errors.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (3) VIRGINIA (2)

The No. 4 national seed South Carolina Gamecocks took advantage of two throwing errors that led to the winning run and advanced to the Championship Series of the 2011 College World Series with a 3-2 13-inning walk-off win over the No. 1 national seed Virginia Cavaliers on Friday night at TD Ameritrade Park in Omaha.

"It really has been amazing," said South Carolina head coach Ray Tanner. "I just - I admire these guys and the players we've had the last couple of years. Their work ethic, their desire to play, to win - they show up and go every day and we've been very fortunate. These (players) do it between the lines. And that's just hard - it's so hard - and I coached for a long time and was unable to get to Omaha as a head coach and then we were able to be here for a few times. It's something you never take for granted. We played in the Finals last year and we get back there again. It's really hard to explain. I'm grateful. These guys deserve a tremendous amount of credit. They've been able to perform in the most difficult circumstances. We've had some outstanding players at different times step up. It's all I can say, really. I'm just ecstatic to be part of this group."

Brady Thomas led off the bottom of the 13th with a solid single to center for the Gamecocks (53-14). Cody Winiarski, the fourth Cavalier pitcher of the evening, tried to nail pinch runner Adam Matthews at second base on Peter Mooney's bunt attempt, but threw wildly and both runners were safe. Robert Beary then laid down a sacrifice bunt that Winiarski threw past the third base bag and bounced out of play, allowing Matthews to scamper home with the winning run. The win sends the defending national champion Gamecocks to the Championship round for the second straight year.

"I obviously knew we were bunting," said Matthews. "The pitcher, he made a heck of a play when I was going to second. Supposedly he swung it down there really good. He overthrew it a bit. I saw it get past him. Thought about going to third but I'm glad I didn't because the center fielder was backing up pretty good. Beary had a great bunt there then and I slid in head first to third. And the umpire motioned, signaled I was safe. I got up. I didn't know where the ball was. Coach Holbrook and everyone was telling me to go, go, go, so it worked out well."

Gamecock reliever Matt Price (7-3) pulled a Houdini act in escaping the top of the 13th inning, giving Carolina a chance for the win in the bottom of the frame. David Coleman opened the Virginia 13th with a leadoff walk. Colin Harrison followed with a single to short. Keith Wer- man bunted for a base hit to load the bases with no outs. After a strikeout, John Barr lined out to second baseman Scott Wingo, who flipped to shortstop Mooney, doubling Harrington off second. Price threw 5.2 scoreless innings of relief, allowing seven hits and five walks with five strikeouts while throwing 95 pitches. Price's 5.2 innings was a season-high and the fourth time that he has thrown at least 3.0 innings this year.

"I don't know where to begin," said Tanner. "That game had so much involved in that and I said to Michael (Roth) after the game, I said: Did you pitch tonight? It seemed like so long ago that he was in the game. But he had a great start for us and put us in a great position. We misplayed a couple of balls to give them a chance to tie it up and then it was off and running. We escaped a couple of jams. They got out of a couple. Coach O'Connor and his staff, they have tremendous players. And we knew it was going to be like this. We didn't expect to be extra innings so much, but this game certainly could have gone either way and we just kept hanging in there and were fortunate to get a couple of breaks at the end."

The Cavaliers (56-12) broke out in front with a run in the top of the second inning. Steven Proscia led off with a walk, moved to third on a single by Jared King and scored on a double play grounder by Kenny Swab.

The Gamecocks got on the board in the bottom of the fourth inning as they jumped on Cavalier reliever Kyle Crockett. Christian Walker belted a one-out double to the right field wall. Jackie Bradley Jr. followed with a single to short and Adrian Morales was hit by a pitch to load the bases. Brady Thomas lofted a two-run double to left, giving Carolina its first lead of the game at 2-1.

The one-run lead held until the eighth inning when the Gamecock defense, which had been steady all season, betrayed them. Curtis Taylor reached on a throwing error by Morales to open the inning. After he moved to second on a sacrifice bunt, John Hicks grounder scooted between the legs of Mooney for an error, scoring Taylor with the game-tying run.

The Gamecocks wasted a golden opportunity in the bottom of the eighth inning. Jake Williams singled to lead off the frame and moved to second on a sacrifice bunt. Wingo was hit by a pitch and Walker walked on four pitches to load the bases. But Cavalier closer Branden Kline was able to strikeout both Bradley Jr. and Morales, ending the threat. The Gamecocks fanned a season-high 18 times on the evening.

Both starting pitchers, the staff aces, were impressive. Carolina lefthander Michael Roth worked the first seven innings, allowing four hits and one run with two walks and three strikeouts. Virginia southpaw hurler Danny Hultzen, the second player taken in the MLB draft earlier this month, was outstanding in his 3.0 innings of work before leaving the game due to illness. He fanned eight of the 10 batters he faced, while throwing 32 of 40 pitches for strikes.

Cavalier hurler Branden Kline was effective in relief, hurling 5.0 scoreless frames, allowing just three hits with seven strikeouts.

Virginia's run in the top of the second inning was the first earned run allowed by Michael Roth since May 13, snapping a streak of 38.1 innings. Roth, who has a 0.98 ERA in 137.1 innings this year, has allowed two earned runs or less in all 19 starts. Brady Thomas' two-RBI game was his 13th multi-RBI game of the year.

# Carolina Gamecocks

## SOUTH CAROLINA (2) FLORIDA (1)

For the second straight game, the Gamecocks used a pair of throwing errors to score the winning run in extra innings, as No. 4 national seed South Carolina outlasted the No. 2 national seed Florida Gators, 2-1 in 11 innings, in the first game of the best-of-three College World Series Championship Series in Omaha.

With one out in the 11th, Christian Walker, who was playing with a fractured hamate bone in his left wrist, singled up the middle. With Walker attempting to steal second base, catcher Mike Zunino's throw sailed into centerfield, allowing Walker to scramble to third. Centerfielder Bryson Smith's throw then bounced past the third base bag and into the stands, allowing Walker to score the go-ahead run.

"I knew it was going to take a lot of pain specifically for me not to play," said Walker. I can't say enough about (South Carolina athletic trainer) Brainard Cooper and Dr. (John) Walsh and Dr. (Chris) Mazoue (of USC Orthopedics & Sports Medicine) and (also) everybody at Methodist Hospital for doing everything they did. And you know, for the last half of yesterday, I think I didn't think I was going to be able to play. But you know, they came out and really - I mean I'm speechless about it. They did a great job. I can't thank them enough."

Florida (53-18) got on the board first in the bottom of the third inning without the benefit of a hit. Tyler Thompson led off the inning with a walk, was sacrificed to second, moved to third on a wild pitch and scored on Cody Dent's sacrifice fly.

The lead lasted until the eighth when the Gamecocks (54-14) finally got to Gator starter Hudson Randall. Peter Mooney led off with a walk, moved to second on Robert Beary's sacrifice bunt, advanced to third on Evan Marzilli's fly to center and scored on Scott Wingo's clutch two-out RBI single up the middle. Wingo's hit was his first since going 4-for-4 in the MCWS opener against Texas A&M on June 19.

"Randall had my number all night," said Wingo. "That last at-bat, I think I swung through two sliders and I just said to myself: Stay late. If I get beat inside, I get beat inside. He threw another curveball and I was able to hit it up the middle."

The Gators had a strong opportunity to win the game in the bottom of the ninth. With John Taylor on the mound for Carolina, Zunino opened the inning with a walk. After failing on two sacrifice bunt attempts, Brian Johnson laced a single to right field, advancing Zunino to third. John Adams was intentionally walked to load the bases with no one out. With the infield pulled in, Wingo made a diving stop on Tyler Thompson's grounder and threw to the plate to nail Zunino for the first out. Daniel Pigott then bounced into a 4-2-3 inning-ending double play, sending the game into extra innings.

"After we got an out and the infield was in and Pigott comes up, he's a good runner," said South Carolina head coach Ray Tanner. "We turned it the hard way. Would we have been able to turn it had (the defense) been back and you would say, well, maybe, because it seemed like a tailor-made double play. But he runs really well and you can't be close, even if you don't get a double play you get the out at the plate and you're still playing. My coaches are sitting there and we were afraid that he's such a good runner that he could stay out of a double play. That's why I kept (the infield) in."

"I'm out there to make plays," added Wingo. "John gave us two ground balls, so that was big. I just focus on the ball. Big pick by (South Carolina catcher Robert) Beary. Real big pick by Beary."

Both teams had a chance to score in the 10th. The Gamecocks had runners on first and second with one out before Nick Maronde, the fourth Gator hurler, worked out of the jam. The Gators nearly plated the winning run in the bottom of the frame when Zunino singled to left, but Jake Williams gunned down Dent, who was trying to score from second base, to end the threat.

"I had one of those weird intuitions that the ball was going to get hit to me, honestly, and I was just ready to make an accurate throw and try to get it in the air and make it have a close chance for a play," said Williams. "The ball was sure enough hit to me and I got a good throw on it."

Taylor worked two scoreless innings of relief to earn the win and improve his record to 8-1, while Maronde (0-1) was tagged with the loss. Matt Price worked around a leadoff single in the 11th for his 19th save of the season.

Forrest Koumas, the Gamecock starter, was effective in his first experience at the College World Series. He worked 5.2 innings, allowing just three hits and one run with one walk and four strikeouts. The freshman hurler, who was making his first appearance since a four-inning stint against Stetson on June 5, threw 86 pitches, 54 for strikes.

"Coach Meyers just told me to stick to what I've been doing, hitting the spots and let the defense play behind me," said Koumas.

Hudson Randall, the Gators' sophomore right-hander, allowed just three runners through the first seven frames - a first-inning double by Christian Walker, an infield error on a ball hit by Adrian Morales in the second, and a fourth-inning single by Morales. He left the contest after tossing 7.2 innings in which he surrendered just three hits and one run with one walk and six strikeouts. He threw 84 pitches, 56 for strikes.

"Incredible college baseball game," said Tanner. "I thought we were going to have trouble getting a guy on base there for a long time against Hudson Randall. He was very special. You see (Danny) Hultzen (of Virginia) a few nights ago, and you see Randall go out there tonight. Although they are different guys, they have one thing in common: they're very special on the mound. We were just able to hang in there and keep to a minimum."

## SOUTH CAROLINA (5) FLORIDA (2)

The South Carolina Gamecocks rode the stellar pitching of Michael Roth to defeat the Florida Gators, 5-2, and sweep the best-of-three College World Series Championship Series Tuesday night at TD Ameritrade Park in Omaha in front of an announced crowd of 26,721. The win gave the Gamecocks back-to-back National Championships in Division I College Baseball. Carolina finished 10-0 in the 2011 NCAA Tournament (3-0 in Regional, 2-0 in Super Regional, 5-0 in MCWS) becoming the first team to go 10-0 in NCAA Tournament play in one season.

The Gamecocks, who entered the tournament as the number four national seed, have now established NCAA records with 16 consecutive postseason wins and 11 consecutive wins in the College World Series. While in Omaha, South Carolina defeated Texas A&M, number one seed Virginia twice, and number two seed Florida twice without a loss. Carolina becomes only the ninth repeat champion in MCWS history and first since Oregon State in 2006 and 2007.

"It's difficult to put into words what we've experienced in the last few days and having been at Rosenblatt last year and having the good fortune of closing that out and getting an opportunity to come to T.D. Ameritrade this year was very special," said South Carolina head coach Ray Tanner. "Of course you get here, you want to win a game or two and we've really played some great baseball while we were here and it's hard for me to understand it all right now. I'll have to let it sink in a little bit. I want to take a moment to recognize Coach O'Sullivan and the Florida Gators. What a great team, what a tremendous team, classy organization. They play the game the right way. You never like to lose games but you like to play people like the Gators and Coach O'Sullivan because you get after it and you play the game the right way. You can rest assured; he'll be back in Omaha time and time again. Our players, they've made it happen between the lines. They made plays. They made pitches. They got big hits. They always felt they had a chance to win. They believed. I thought they did a tremendous job of keeping baseball in perspective. We never thought that we were an awesome time; we just thought we were good enough to win at times. When the opportunity would present itself, we could try to find a way late in the game to win some games. And not often we go double-digit hits or double-digit runs but these guys believed they could win and they got in position to do that a lot."

The Gamecocks (55-14) broke out in front in the bottom of the third inning when they sent eight men to the plate, scoring three times off Florida starter Karsten Whitson (8-1). Peter Mooney led off the frame with a double down the left field line and advanced to third on Robert Beary's sacrifice bunt. After Evan Marzilli walked, Scott Wingo lofted a sacrifice fly to right, scoring Mooney with the game's first run. After Jackie Bradley Jr. walked, Christian Walker's bouncer to short eluded Nolan Fontana and rolled into centerfield for an error, allowing Marzilli to score and sending Bradley to third. Brady Thomas chopped an infield single over the pitcher's mound, scoring Bradley Jr. and putting Carolina on top 3-0.

Florida (53-19) answered with a single run in the top of the fourth. Mike Zunino led off the inning with a home run over the left field wall. The solo blast was his team-leading 19th round tripper and just the third home run allowed by Roth all season. Zunino had three of the Gators' six hits on the night.

The Gators had chances to get closer when they put their first two batters on base in both the fifth and sixth innings, but Roth was able to work his way out the jams unscathed.

South Carolina got an insurance run in the bottom of the sixth when Mooney crushed a 3-1 offering from reliever Tommy Toledo into the Gator bullpen beyond the right field wall for his fourth home run of the season, giving the Gamecocks a 4-1 advantage. Mooney's round tripper was the only home run hit by the Gamecocks in their five-game stay in Omaha.

Florida cut the deficit to 4-2 with a run in the top of the eighth. Zunino doubled to center off Roth and scored on John Adams' two-out single off reliever John Taylor, but Matt Price caught pinch-hitter Tyler Thompson looking to end the uprising.

Carolina came right back with one of its own in the bottom of the frame. Beary singled to center, moved to second on Marzilli's sacrifice bunt, advanced to third on a wild pitch and scored on Wingo's bouncer to right over the pulled-in infield.

Roth (14-3) was lifted after 7.2 innings of work. The junior southpaw allowed just five hits and two runs with two walks and six strikeouts. He threw 127 pitches, 77 for strikes. In 38.1 innings of work over the past two years at the College World Series, Roth has posted a 1.17 ERA, second-best all-time. Price worked the final 1.1 innings for his 20th save of the season. That 20th save ties for second on South Carolina's single-season list. He is also now tied with Rob Mosser (1990-93) for the career record at Carolina with 30 saves.

For the season, Roth now ranks on South Carolina's single-season charts in ERA (2nd, 1.06), starts (T1st, 20), Innings (3rd, 145) and wins (T5th, 14). Roth's 14 wins ties for the national lead with his ERA second nationally.

As a team, South Carolina finished with a 1.31 ERA in 10 NCAA Tournament games. The Gamecocks' bullpen finished 6-0 with five saves and a 0.53 ERA in 33.2 innings of work in the NAAs and did not allow an extra base-hit the entire tournament.

South Carolina had six players that made the 2011 NCAA Division I Baseball Men's College World Series All-Tournament Team. Catcher Robert Beary, first baseman Christian Walker, second baseman Scott Wingo, shortstop Peter Mooney, designated hitter Brady Thomas and pitchers Michael Roth and Matt Price. Wingo was named Most Outstanding Player as well. Wingo hit .333 over five games in the series with four RBI including three in the finals and also made several stellar defensive plays throughout the CWS. He has now been hit by 63 pitches in his career, extending school record. Wingo finishes his career having appeared in 254 games, one shy of South Carolina's school record (255 Michael Campbell (2003-06).

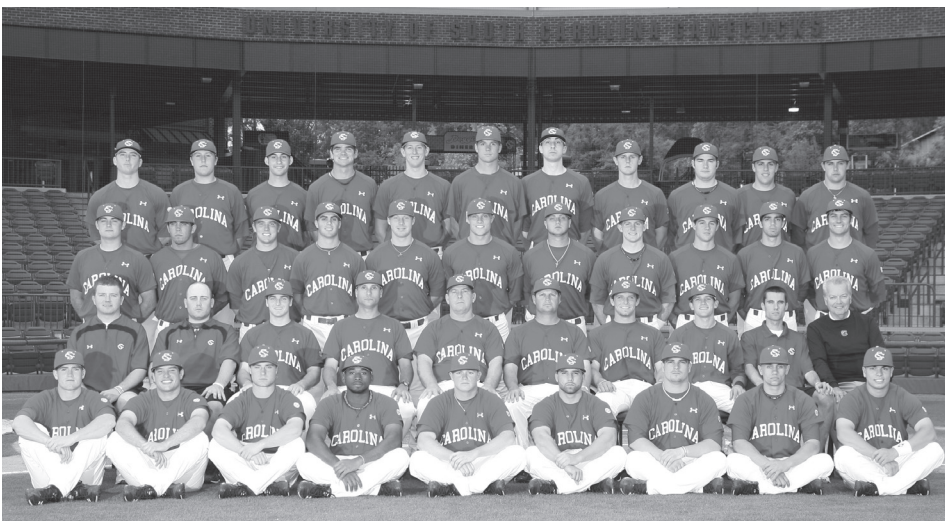
