



# STEVE SPURRIER

SOUTH CAROLINA HEAD COACH

■ **STEVE SPURRIER** was recognized as the 2005 SEC Coach of the Year by the *Associated Press* after leading South Carolina to a bowl game in his first season at the helm of the Gamecock program.

■ Coach Spurrier led the University of Florida to the 1996 National Championship.

■ As a college quarterback, Spurrier won the 1966 Heisman Trophy. As a college head coach, he helped direct the 1996 Heisman Trophy winner, Florida quarterback Danny Wuerffel.

■ As one of the greatest minds in the history of college football, Coach Spurrier has seen five of the quarterbacks he has coached in college get drafted into the NFL, along with four running backs, nine wide receivers, two tight ends and 11 offensive linemen. The defensive side has also been well represented in the NFL Draft under the "Head Ball Coach," as four defensive linemen, four linebackers and five defensive backs has been selected. In 2009, Ryan Succop became the first kicker who played under Coach Spurrier to be drafted.

■ Steve Spurrier is one of only four coaches to record 100 or more wins as an SEC coach against SEC competition (he also has three wins against SEC teams while coaching at Duke). Only Bear Bryant (159), John Vaught (106) and Vince Dooley (105) have won more SEC conference games than Coach Spurrier's 102.

■ Coach Spurrier has been named his conference's coach of the year eight times (1988 and 1989 in the ACC with Duke, in 1990, '91, '94, '95 and '96 in the SEC with Florida and in 2005 in his first year at South Carolina).

■ Coach Spurrier was honored with the 2007 Davey O'Brien Legends Award.

■ Spurrier was a 1986 inductee of the College Football Hall of Fame.

■ **Steve Spurrier Jr.** has been part of two national championship coaching staffs. He was on Coach Spurrier's staff at Florida that won the 1996 national title and on Bobby Stoops' staff at Oklahoma that captured the 2000 national crown.

■ **Eric Wolford** begins his first season with the Gamecocks as the offensive line coach and running game coordinator. In the previous two seasons as the offensive line coach at Illinois, Wolford's troops helped the Illini lead the Big Ten in rushing (2007) and in passing (2008).

■ **Jay Graham** gained over 2,600 yards and is among the all-time top-10 rushers in Tennessee Volunteer history. He played six years in the National Football League.

■ **Jeep Hunter** was an offensive coach at Memphis when All-America running back DeAngelo Williams led the nation in rushing.

■ **G.A. Mangus** was a quarterback under Coach Spurrier at Florida and worked on the Gator coaching staff following his graduation. He has been a collegiate head coach for four seasons.

■ **Ellis Johnson** was one of five finalists for the 2008 Defensive Coordinator of the Year Award as selected by *FootballScoop.com*.

■ **Lorenzo Ward** takes over as the Gamecocks' defensive coordinator in 2009. Ward spent seven seasons as the secondary coach under Frank Beamer at Virginia Tech and also logged a stint with the Oakland Raiders in the National Football League.

■ Like Steve Spurrier Jr., **Shane Beamer** comes from excellent coaching bloodlines. Shane's father, Frank, is the longtime head coach at Virginia Tech. The elder Spurrier and Beamer have combined for 389 career wins as collegiate head coaches.

■ **Brad Lawing** is in his second stint at South Carolina. Between his stops in Columbia, Lawing worked as an assistant coach at North Carolina and at Michigan State. This is his 14th season with the Gamecocks.

## STADIUM FACTS AND HISTORY

Williams-Brice Stadium, formerly Carolina Stadium, was first constructed in 1934 by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Then it seated 17,600 Gamecock fans. It has undergone a number of expansions and revisions over the years, with the largest prior to the 1982 expansion coming in 1971-1972. A bequest from the estate of Mrs. Martha Williams-Brice helped boost the capacity then from slightly more than 43,000 to greater than 54,000.

Mrs. Williams-Brice's husband, Thomas H. Brice, was a Gamecock football letterman from 1922-24, and her family operated the Williams Furniture Company in Sumter. She left a substantial inheritance from the furniture fortune to her nephews, Thomas W. and Philip L. Edwards, much of which they passed on to the University of South Carolina. That included a bequest for the stadium project.

The name was officially changed from Carolina Stadium to Williams-Brice Stadium in dedication ceremonies during the Sept. 9, 1972 opener with Virginia.

### WILLIAMS-BRICE STADIUM FACTS

- First game as Carolina Stadium: Oct. 6, 1934 (SC 22, VMI 6)
- Dedicated as Williams-Brice Stadium: Sept. 9, 1972 (Virginia 24, SC 16)
- Capacity: 80,250
- When the Gamecocks take the field on gameday, Williams-Brice Stadium is packed with 80,000+ screaming Gamecock fans, making it more populated than all but three cities in the state of South Carolina.
- Williams-Brice is recognized as one of the finest facilities in all of college football. Carolina annually ranks among the nation's leaders in attendance, and Gamecock fans are regarded as some of the most loyal in the country.
- South Carolina established a school record for football season tickets sold in 2005, selling 62,604 season tickets, surpassing the previous mark of 62,103 set in 2002. The numbers do not include student tickets and tickets contractually obligated to visiting teams. The 2008 season marked the eighth-consecutive year that Carolina sold out its season tickets.

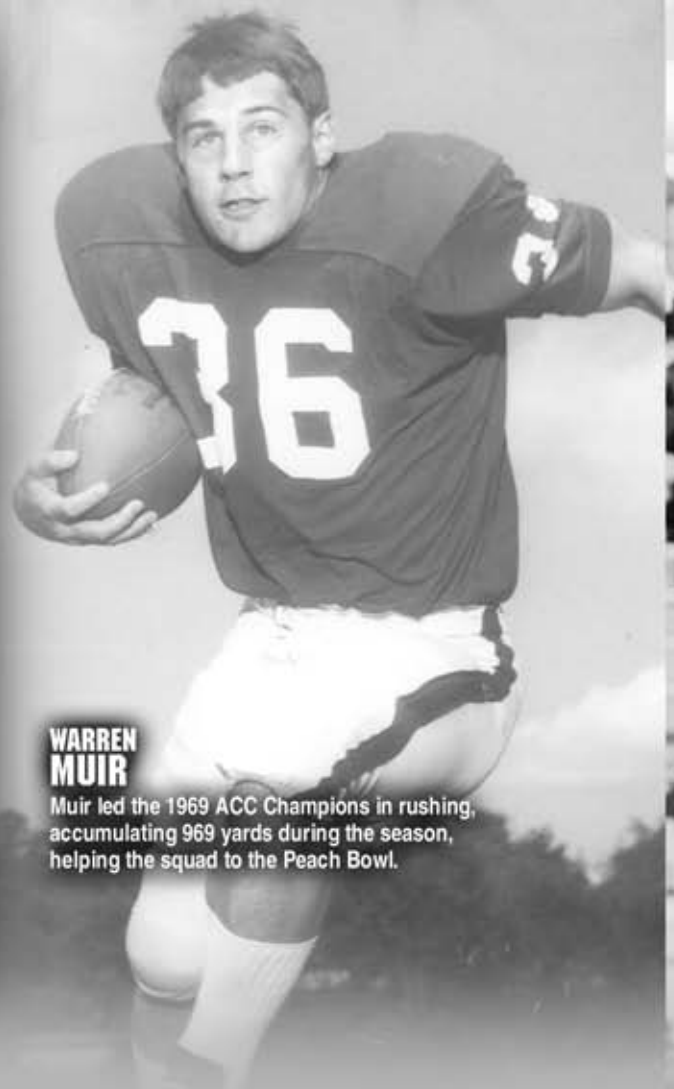

## THE GAMECOCKS WIN THE ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

- Entering the 1969 campaign, South Carolina had not had a winning season since 1959.
- Paul Dietzel was in his fourth season as the Gamecocks' head coach.
- Carolina opened the regular season with conference wins over Duke and North Carolina.
- Wins over conference rivals NC State and Maryland highlighted the month of October. A 24-6 win at Wake Forest gave Carolina a 5-0 conference mark and the ACC title, its first championship in 75 years of collegiate competition.
- In the regular-season finale, the Gamecocks scored the first three times they had the ball against Clemson, opening up a 17-0 lead. The Tigers cut the deficit to 17-13 by halftime, but Carolina tallied another 10 points in the second half to walk away with a 27-13 win.
- A 7-3 regular-season record propelled the Gamecocks into the Peach Bowl where they met West Virginia. It marked Carolina's first bowl appearance since 1945.
- Warren Muir was a consensus All-American. Freddy Zeigler, who came to Carolina as a walk-on, broke all conference reception records and was named to the All-ACC team. Tommy Suggs, Billy DuPre, Jimmy Poston, Pat Watson and Dave DeCamilla were also named All-ACC. DeCamilla won the Jacobs Blocking Trophy.
- Other standouts included Rany Yoakum, Jim Mitchell, Tyler Hellams, Billy Ray Rice, Don Buckner, Tony Fusaro, Rudy Holloman, Andy Chavous, Lynn Hodge, Dave Lucas, George McCarthy and Dickie Harris.

# 1984 BLACK MAGIC

## THE GAMECOCKS' WINNINGEST SEASON EVER

- Joe Morrison was in his second year as the head coach at South Carolina and was coming off a 5-6 season in 1983.
- A desperation trick play, a halfback pass, with Quinton Lewis tossing a 40-yard strike to Chris Wade in the final two minutes of the game, rescued Carolina from embarrassment in a 31-24 win over the Citadel in the season opener.
- Easy wins over Duke and Kansas State sandwiched around an upset win over highly-favored Georgia gave Carolina a 4-0 record, its best start since 1928.
- A second-half flurry lifted Carolina over mighty Pittsburgh, then an amazing 22-point fourth quarter in front of a national television audience propelled the Gamecocks to a 36-32 win at Notre Dame in what has been regarded as one of the greatest wins in school history.
- Wins over East Carolina and NC State set up a showdown between the fifth-ranked Gamecocks and 11th-ranked Florida State. The "Fire Ants" were magnificent that night in Columbia, intercepting seven Seminole passes in a 38-26 win before another national television audience.
- At 9-0 and ranked No. 2 in the nation behind only the Nebraska Cornhuskers, "Black Magic" became known throughout the land.
- Despite a disappointing loss at Navy, Carolina rebounded with another heart-stopping, come-from-behind win, defeating Clemson, 22-21, to finish the regular season with a 10-1 record and earn an invitation to the Gator Bowl.
- Del Wilkes, James Seawright and Bryant Gilliard were named to the All-America team. Carl Hill was a Freshman All-American, and Joe Brooks made the All-Independent team.
- Joe Morrison, "the man in black," was named National Coach of the Year.

### BRYANT GILLIARD

Gilliard collected a school-record nine interceptions during the 1984 season.

## GEORGE ROGERS AT SOUTH CAROLINA

All-America running back George Rogers won the 1980 Heisman Trophy following his senior season at South Carolina, as he was recognized as the nation's top collegiate football player. The Duluth, Ga., native was a consensus first-team All-America selection that year after leading the nation in rushing with 1,894 yards. Rogers went on to become the first player chosen in the 1981 NFL draft and starred for the New Orleans Saints before moving on to the Washington Redskins, where he helped lead his team to a Super Bowl Championship in 1988. Rogers was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1997.

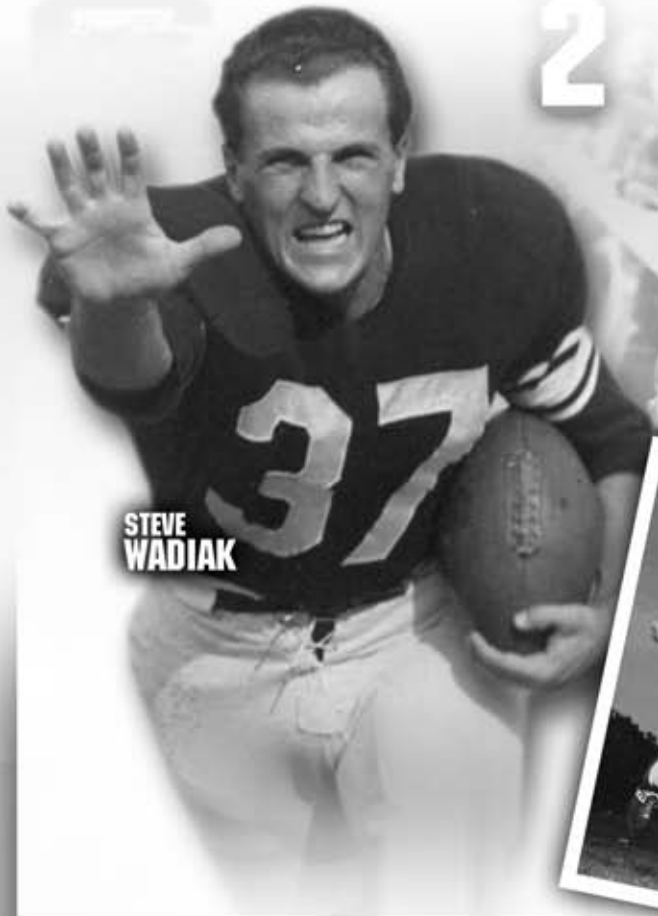

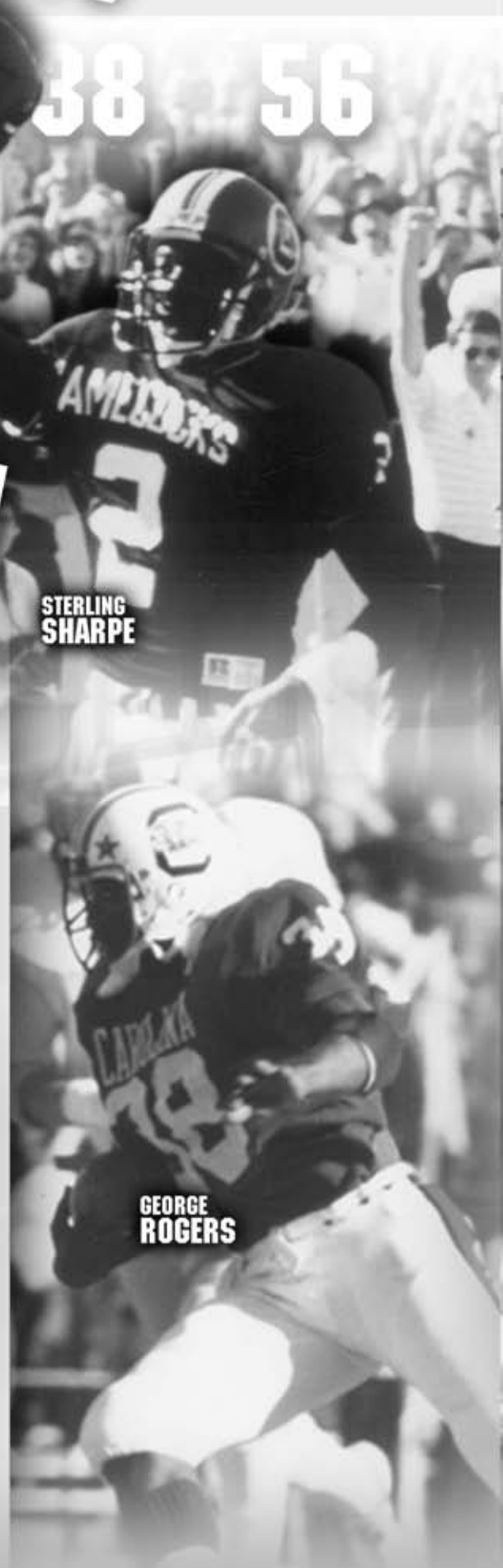
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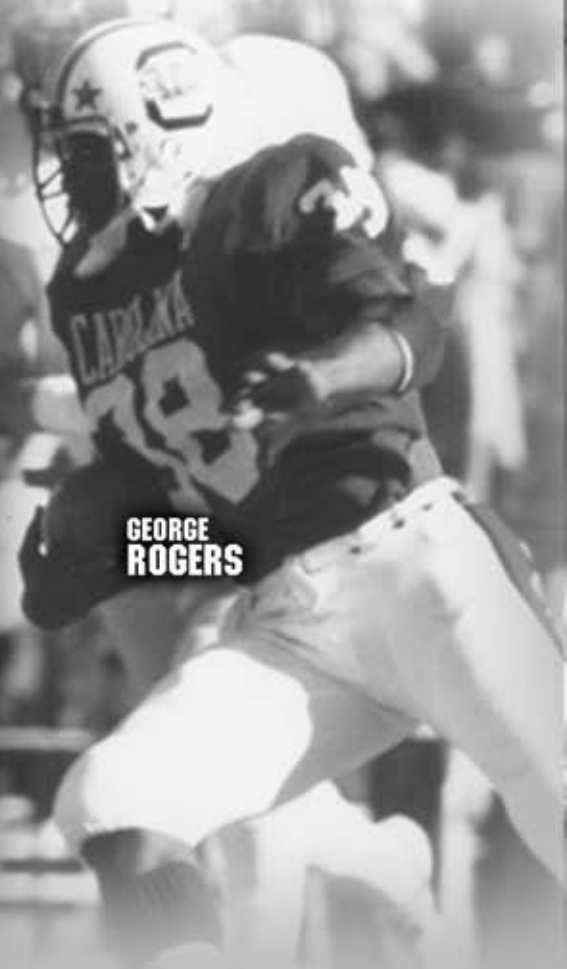

## A SPECIAL PLACE IN GAMECOCK HISTORY

Four Gamecocks have had their jersey numbers retired through the years.

■ **Sterling Sharpe**, who wore No. 2, concluded his career as the school's all-time leading receiver with 169 catches for 2,497 yards and 17 touchdowns. Sharpe had his jersey retired following the 1987 regular season. He became only the second Gamecock to have his jersey retired while he was still active at the school. Sharpe was a first-round draft pick by the Green Bay Packers in 1988.

■ 1980 Heisman Trophy winner **George Rogers** had his No. 38 jersey retired during halftime ceremonies at Carolina's final 1980 home game. Rogers was the first South Carolina player to have his jersey retired while still active at the school. Rogers was the first player chosen in the 1981 NFL Draft by the New Orleans Saints.

■ Running back **Steve Wadiak**, who wore No. 37 for Carolina from 1948-51, was the first to have his number retired, after a tragic automobile accident claimed his life. Wadiak, who still appears throughout the South Carolina record book, was the school's all-time rushing leader for 28 years after his senior season. Wadiak, who rushed for 2,878 yards in his career, had his mark passed by Rogers in 1980. Wadiak led the team in scoring and rushing all four years he played.

■ Center **Mike Johnson**, No. 56, became gravely ill before the start of his junior season and the illness cut short a potentially great football career. Johnson had finished his sophomore campaign as the regular center. His number was retired following his death in 1965.

### **CRAIG FITZGERALD** DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Craig Fitzgerald is in his first season overseeing the Gamecocks' Strength & Conditioning program.

Fitzgerald comes to Columbia from Harvard University where he held the title of Director of Strength and Conditioning. While at Harvard, Fitzgerald trained the football, men's and women's basketball, wrestling, men's and women's tennis and men's and women's crew teams. The Harvard football squad won back-to-back Ivy League titles over his final two years. The University of Maryland grad and former Terrapin football player oversaw the training of all 41 NCAA teams at Harvard, the largest number in the country.

# SPORTS MEDICINE

KEEPING STUDENT-ATHLETES HEALTHY

Health care is provided by the USC Sports Medicine Center, a collaboration between USC Department of Orthopaedic Surgery and Department of Family and Preventive Medicine. The USC Sports Medicine Center is one of the premier Sports Medicine groups in the city of Columbia and the state of South Carolina. The USC Sports Medicine Center is the official sports medicine healthcare providers for Carolina football, men's and women's basketball and softball. Orthopedic care is provided by **Dr. Jeffrey Guy**, who serves as medical director for the Athletics Department, and **Dr. Christopher Mazoué**, both sports medicine fellowship trained orthopedic surgeons. General medical care is provided by USC Family and Preventive Medicine. **Dr. Jason Stacy** and **Dr. Ramon Ylanan**, who both specialize in primary care sports medicine, work hand-in-hand with the surgeons to provide superior care for Gamecock athletes. Although the South Carolina team physicians' specialty is working with athletic populations, they also provide care for individuals of all ages and activity levels.

The athletic training staff provides the day-to-day care of South Carolina student-athletes. The South Carolina athletic training staff consists of nine full-time certified athletic trainers and 10 certified graduate assistant athletic trainers who are responsible for emergency care, initial evaluation and diagnosis of injuries, and post-injury treatment and rehabilitation of Gamecock student-athletes.

Healthy eating can be challenging for busy student-athletes attempting to excel in the classroom and on the field. The University of South Carolina Athletics Department recognizes the need for a well-balanced diet and proper hydration to thrive in sports and academics. To help student-athletes minimize nutritional challenges and optimize their performance, the athletics department's sports dietitian serves as an involved member of the sports medicine team. The sports dietitian provides nutrition education and counseling to student-athletes, coaches and athletic training staff. Understanding that appropriate food choices and meal timing enhance performance and gains, the sports dietitian is also involved in planning travel meals, one-on-one and team nutrition education, nutritionally related health issues and designing Training Table menus.

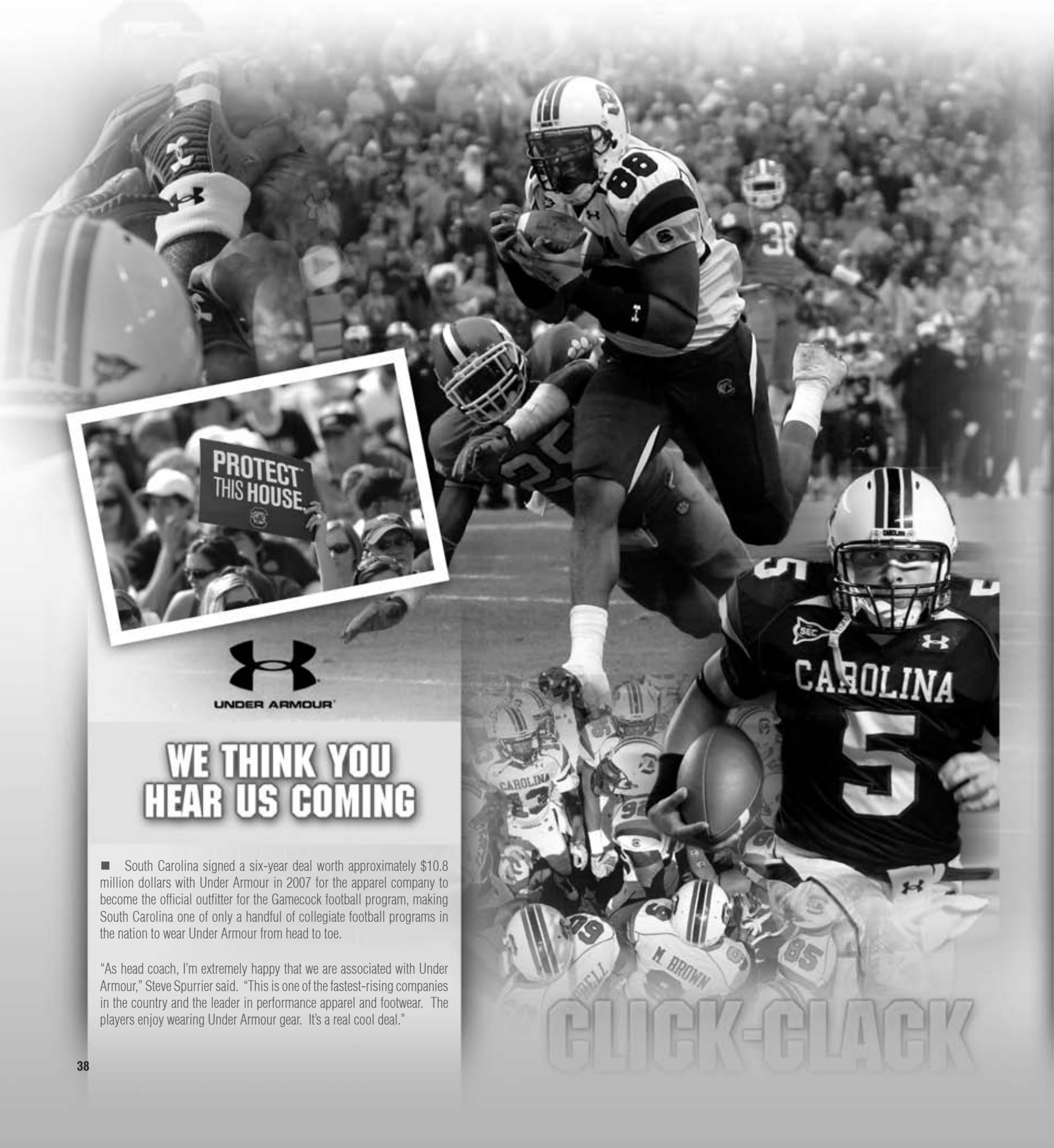
Training Table, which opened in 2007, provides student-athletes with a variety of well balanced, nutritious meals. For breakfast, a buffet, a yogurt/granola bar and a complete hot line are available, while a stir-fry station, salad bar, smoothie machine, a hot line and ice cream machine are provided for dinner. Breakfast is served Monday through Friday and dinner is served Monday through Thursday.

Injuries are unfortunately a common part of participation in intercollegiate athletics. The University of South Carolina is strongly committed to providing its student-athletes the best medical care possible to maximize performance in the athletic arena and in the classroom. South Carolina's student-athletes are provided medical care 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This includes daily medical clinics in the athletic training room by team physicians including specialists in family and preventive medicine and orthopedic surgery. In addition, numerous consultants are available to South Carolina student-athletes including optometry, dentistry, cardiology, sports psychiatry and sports nutrition.

### ■ BCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

The SEC has captured the BCS National Championship for three consecutive seasons. Since the inception of the BCS in 1998, the SEC leads all conferences with five national champions. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida claimed the national championship in 2006 and 2008, and LSU took the title in 2007. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

### ■ NATIONAL CHAMPIONS SINCE 1992

Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with seven. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

SEC: Florida (1996, 2006, 2008), LSU (2003, 2007), Tennessee (1998), Alabama (1992)

Big 12: Texas (2005), Oklahoma (2000), Nebraska (1994, 1995, 1997)

Big Ten: Ohio State (2002), Michigan (1997)

Pac-10: Southern California (2003, 2004)

ACC: Florida State (1993, 1999)

Big East: Miami, Fla. (2001)

### ■ TOP 25 FINISHES

Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 43 teams ranked in the last nine final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 36 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for the lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last nine seasons.

### ■ SEC LEADS NATION IN 2009 NFL DRAFT SELECTIONS

The SEC had the most selections in the 2009 National Football League player draft. The SEC had 37 of its players selected followed by the ACC with 33, the Pac-10 with 32, the Big 12 and Big Ten with 28 each and the Big East with 27. The Mountain West Conference had 16 players selected while the Western Athletic Conference and Conference USA had 10 each.

### ■ SEC TOPS ALL CONFERENCES IN BCS WINS

Since the inception of the Bowl Championship Series in 1998, the SEC has won the most BCS games with a record of 12-5 (.706). The winning percentage is tops of conferences that have played in three or more BCS games. The Pac-10 is second at 9-4 (.692), followed by the Big East at 6-5 (.545), the Big 12 at 7-9 (.438), the Big Ten at 8-11 (.421) and the ACC at 2-9 (.182). The Mountain West is 2-0, and the WAC is 1-1 in BCS games.

## PRIME TIME COVERAGE

- Of the Gamecocks' 13 games in 2008, eight were broadcast nationally by either the ESPN family of networks or CBS. South Carolina was featured in two ESPN Thursday Night Prime Time games in 2008. The 2009 season opener at NC State marks the fourth time in Steve Spurrier's five seasons at South Carolina that the season opener has been televised on ESPN.
- South Carolina played host to ESPN's College Football GameDay during the 2006 season, its third-consecutive season hosting the highly popular college football show. College Football GameDay has broadcast live from Columbia in four of the last eight seasons.
- Even South Carolina's practices garner national attention. The Garnet and Black Spring Game has been televised nationally by ESPN2 and ESPNU in previous seasons.

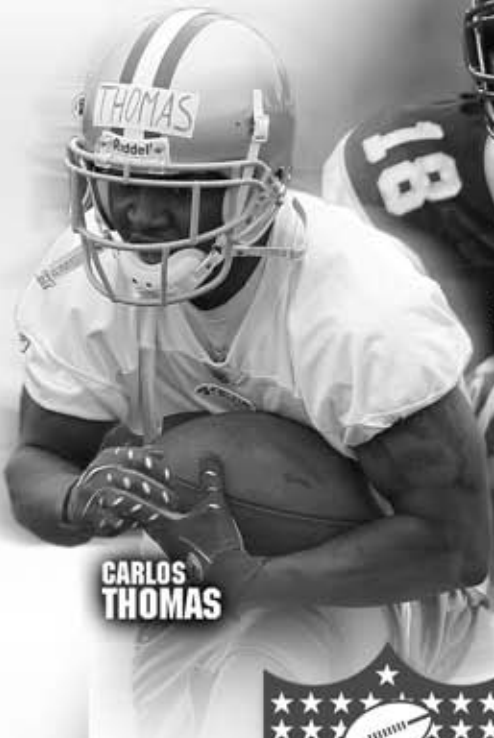

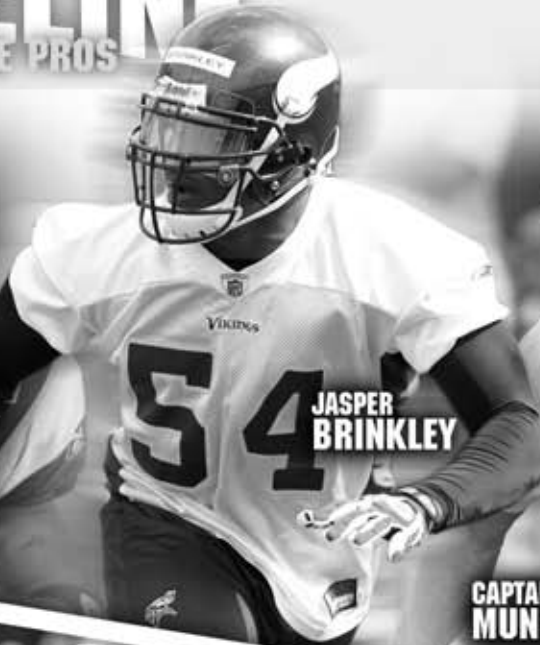

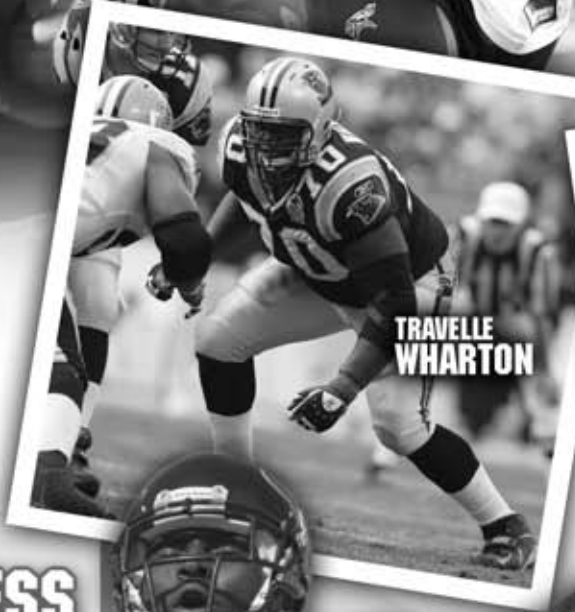

## GAMECOCKS WORK OUT TO IMPRESS NFL SCOUTS

It's the culmination of four or five years of blood, sweat and tears left on the Carolina practice fields known as the "Proving Grounds"; competing on a weekly basis against the best the nation has to offer under the bright lights and capacity crowds of the Southeastern Conference; and seemingly countless hours spent toiling in the Crews Building weight room – with one final opportunity to keep the dream of a lifetime alive.

Every March, two dozen or so NFL scouts make their annual pilgrimage to Columbia for South Carolina's Pro Timing Day. Former Gamecocks assemble for the final time, intent on impressing the scouts one last time prior to the NFL Draft. The NFL hopefuls go through a battery of tests and measurements in the weight room, including the standing broad jump, vertical leap and bench press. Then they move to the manicured playing surface at Williams-Brice Stadium where they are timed in the 40-yard dash and shuttle drills, before finishing up with individual workouts.

For those who have the God-given ability and have made the sacrifices necessary to reach their maximum potential, this is when all the hard work finally pays off and the dream to play at the next level stays alive for another day.

■ South Carolina has produced nine first-round draft picks all-time, with four coming since 2000.

■ South Carolina running back George Rogers was selected with the No. 1 overall pick of the 1981 NFL Draft after winning the Heisman Trophy with the Gamecocks in 1980. Rogers earned NFL Rookie of the Year honors after leading the league in rushing in 1981. He was a two-time Pro Bowl selection in 1981 and 1982.

■ A total of 28 South Carolina players have been drafted since 2000, an average of three draftees per year.

■ A Gamecock has been selected in each of the last eight NFL Drafts.

■ A total of 24 South Carolina defensive backs have been selected in the NFL Draft, with 10 chosen since 2002.

■ South Carolina has seen 171 of its players get drafted all-time.
