COLUMBIA, S.C. (Jan. 26, 2010) — The 17th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team opened the 2010 season with a 6-1 victory Tuesday evening against No. 72 Furman (0-2) at the USC Field House.

South Carolina opened play by winning courts one and two in doubles to take an early 1-0 lead. Ana Marija Zubori and Dijana Stojic finished first with an 8-2 victory over Monica Arguello and Lauren Kline at the No. 1 spot. Miljana Jocic and Anya Morgina secured the point at No. 2 doubles by upending Jennifer Betts and Michele Stanford 8-4. The Paladins picked up a 9-8(2) triumph on court three thanks to Olivia Maurice and Jessica Preeg in their match-up with Rita Maisak and Adriana Pereira.

Morgina pushed the lead to 2-0 after defeating Stanford 6-3, 6-3 at three singles and Zubori made it 3-0 with a 6-2, 6-2 victory against Arguello at the top position. Stojic provided the clinching point after winning 6-1, 6-2 over Kline at No. 2 singles.

The Paladins scored their lone point of the evening in the next match to finish when Preeg came back to beat Josefin Andersson in three sets at four singles. Andersson won the first set quickly 6-1 but faltered in the second 6-3. In the third set, Andersson trailed 3-1 and later was down 5-4 before going ahead 6-5. Andersson had a match point in the 12th game, but Preeg managed to force a tiebreaker and won 7-1.

Pereira snagged South Carolina's fifth point with a 6-2, 6-1 decision over Maurice on court six and Jocic finished off the day with a 6-0, 6-3 triumph versus Susan Bitetti at No. 5 singles.

The Gamecocks will now head to Fayetteville, Ark., to face No. 20 Michigan in the first round of the ITA Kick-Off Weekend on Friday.

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (Jan. 29, 2010) — The No. 16 South Carolina women's tennis team (1-1) dropped a 4-3 decision to No. 19 Michigan (2-0) on Friday in Fayetteville, Ark., in the opening round of the ITA Kick-Off Weekend.

A sluggish beginning in doubles proved to be the difference in the match for the Gamecocks. The Michigan tandems of Whitney Taney/Rika Tatsuno and Mimi Nguyen/Michelle Sulahian won by scores of 8-2 and 8-0 on courts two and three against Josefin Andersson/Madeleine Saari-Byström and Miljana Jocic/Anya Morgina.

South Carolina did manage to claim the top position in doubles after the point had been decided. Dijana Stojic and Ana Marija Zubori trailed Michigan's Tania Mahtani and Denise Muresan 4-1 before coming back to force a tiebreaker at 7-all. The Gamecock duo won the breaker 7-5.

The Gamecocks stormed back in singles, winning three consecutive matches on courts two, three and four to lead the match 3–1. Dijana Stojic won first at two, beating Tatsuno 7–5, 6–0. Morgina then recorded a 7–5, 6–4 triumph over Mahtani at three and Andersson provided the third point with a 6–3, 6–4 win against Taney at No. 4 singles.

The Wolverines went on to win the match by capturing three matches that all went to three sets. Nguyen defeated Saari-Byström 6-3, 1-6, 6-3 at the No. 5 spot to cut the margin to 3-2 and Sulahian held on to upend Jocic 5-7, 6-4, 7-5 at No. 6 singles.

Muresan and Zubori decided the team outcome at the top of the singles lineup. Zubori claimed the first set 6-3, but Muresan raced out to a 4-0 lead in the second before Zubori came back to win four straight games to knot the second set at 4-all. Muresan went on to take the set in a tiebreaker 7-4. In the third, Zubori held a commanding 5-1 advantage but was unable to win another game, as Muresan pulled out six games in a row to take the set and the match 7-5.

South Carolina will face the loser of No. 18 Arkansas and No. 23 Washington on Saturday at noon.

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (Jan. 30, 2010) — The No. 16 South Carolina women's tennis team (1-2) suffered a 4-3 setback to No. 23 Washington (3-1) on Saturday in Fayetteville, Ark., in a consolation match of the ITA Kick-Off Weekend.

South Carolina won the second and third doubles positions to win the doubles point against Washington. The first mach to finish, though, was at the No. 1 slot where the Huskies' No. 11-ranked tandem of Denise Dy and Joyce Ardies upended Dijana Stojic and Ana Marija Zubori 8-2.

The Gamecocks then won on court two, as Josefin Andersson and Madeleine Saari-Byström cruised to an 8-3 triumph over Venise Chan and Samantha Smith. Miljana Jocic and Anya Morgina then clinched the point at three by beating Aleksandra Malovic and Lina Xu 8-5.

Washington responded by winning five first sets in the singles matches, losing only the first on court one. Third-ranked Dy finished first with a 6-1, 6-3 victory over Stojic at two and Ardies held off Saari-Byström 6-4, 6-4 at No. 5 singles to put the Huskies ahead 2-1.

(**April 4, 2010**) — The 19th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team (14-4, 7-1 SEC) posted its sixth victory in a row Sunday with a 5-2 win over No. 24 Vanderbilt (9-8, 4-4 SEC) at Maxcy Gregg Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. With the victory, the Gamecocks are now tied for second in the SEC with Georgia following the Bulldogs' loss at Ole Miss today.

South Carolina faltered in the doubles point, losing at the first and second positions. The Commodores struck first on court two with Catherine Newman and Erica Robertson recording an 8-3 victory against Miljana Jocic and Madeleine Saari-Byström. Newman and Robertson were ahead 3-2 and pushed the lead to 6-2 before Jocic and Saari-Byström closed the margin to 6-3.

The Gamecocks answered back with Anya Morgina and Adriana Pereira's 8-6 win at three doubles versus Hannah Blatt and Rachael Dillon. Morgina and Pereira stormed out to a 4-0 advantage before losing the next six games to trail 6-4. Morgina and Pereira then won another four oames in a row to take the match.

The deciding match came at one with Jackie Wu and Chelsea Preeg outlasting Ana Marija Zubori and Dijana Stojic 8-6. Zubori and Stojic missed out on a great opportunity to tie the match at 6-all after getting ahead 0-30 on Preeg's serve, but she held to make it 7-5. Zubori held in the next game and Wu went on to serve out the match at love to give the Commodores the 1-0 lead heading to singles play.

Carolina fought back in singles, but the Commodores claimed the No. 3 singles match first with Preeg defeating Morgina 6-3, 7-5. Stojic tied the team score at 2-all with a dominant performance at No. 2 singles. After taking the first set from the 27th-ranked Wu 6-3, the unranked Stojic shut out Wu 6-0 in the second to pick up her team-leading 15th dual match victory of the spring. Wu is the highest ranked player Stojic has beaten in her career and it avenged a 6-1, 6-1 loss Stojic suffered to Wu at the SEC Fall Coaches Classic last September.

Jocic pulled the Gamecocks to within a point of clinching the match at No. 4 singles with her 7-5, 6-2 win against Ulery. Jocic leads South Carolina in victories this season with a stellar 25-5 overall record, and she is 14-2 in duals.

Saari-Byström, who had been out of the lineup with an injury to her lower right arm for nearly a month, came back from a 6-4 first-set loss to Blatt on court six to win the match for the Gamecocks. Serving with a 5-4 lead in the second set, Saari-Byström and Blatt battled back and forth in a deuce game that lasted nearly 20 minutes. Eventually, Saari-Byström prevailed to force a third set. In the third, Saari-Byström had leads of 2-0 and 4-1, but Blatt was able to close the margin to 4-3 on the changeover. Saari-Byström's steady play paid off in the next two games, though, as she outlasted Blatt for the 6-3 triumph.

With the match decided, Zubori provided the icing on the cake for South Carolina at No. 1 singles against No. 23-ranked Newman. Zubori took the first set 6-4, but lost the second 7-5 despite a 4-2 lead. In the third, Zubori got a critical hold in the seventh game to go up 4-3 and then broke Newman to lead 5-3. Zubori continued her aggressive approach, constantly moving forward to get to the net and the end result was a 6-3 victory in the third. She extended her winning streak to six matches with the victory and now stands 23-10 on the season and 11-7 in duals at No. 1 singles.

More SEC Eastern Division rivals await the Gamecocks next week when they travel to Athens, Ga., to take on No. 13 Georgia on Friday at 5 p.m. followed by a showdown with No. 14 Tennessee at 1 p.m. Sunday in Knoxville, Tenn.

In singles, Stojic recorded the Gamecocks' first point with a 6-1, 6-3 triumph over Gilchrist on court. Gilchrist came in having won all three prior career match-ups with Stojic. Gilchrist is the second-highest ranked player Stojic has beaten in her career at No. 41.

Pereira continued her impressive freshman campaign with a 7-6(8), 6-1 victory against Ellis at the No. 5 singles slot to improve to 24-9 overall and 16-4 in dual matches. In the tiebreaker, Pereira was down 3-1 and 5-3 before getting it back to 5-all. On her fourth set point of the breaker, Pereira forced Ellis into an unforced error to gain the momentum heading to the second set. Pereira needed less than 45 minutes to win the second set to put Carolina on top 3-0.

The Bulldogs scored their first and only point at No. 1 singles with Gullickson defeating Zubori 6-1, 6-7(6), 6-2. Zubori faced a 5-2 deficit and two match points in the second set before charging back to win the set in a tiebreaker. Gullickson, though, was on point with her shots in the third set, hitting powerful winners to take the match.

Jocic lifted South Carolina to victory with her straight-set victory over Ueshima on court four. Jocic grinded her way to a 7-5 victory in the first-set tiebreaker and then took a 5-3 lead in the second. Ueshima countered to take the next game to make it 5-4, but Jocic continued to play long points in the 10th game and it paid dividends with a 6-4 victory. Jocic improved to 27-6 on the season with the win and 16-3 in dual matches.

"I am just so full of emotion right now," Jocic said following the match. "This feels so good. We've had a great season so far and have really had to adjust to having five freshmen. We lost two players at the beginning of the season in doubles so we also had to adjust there. We've just worked really hard and have been waiting for the postseason because we knew we could get here, we just needed time."

The Gamecocks were in control of the two matches suspended. Morgina and Hyndman split sets and Morgina had a 5-3 lead in the third, while Saari-Byström and Fakhoury split sets as well and Saari-Byström led 5-1 in the third set

South Carolina's 4-1 win snapped a 12-match losing streak to Georgia, marking their first win over the Bulldogs since beating them 4-2 on April 20, 2002, in the semifinals of the SEC Tournament in Columbia, S.C. Georgia was ranked No. 1 at the time.

The Gamecocks are making their third appearance in the semifinals of the SEC Tournament and their first since 2002. South Carolina's first trip to the semis came in 1999 when the Gamecocks lost to Florida 5-1 in Baton Rouge, La.

ATHENS, Ga. (April 24, 2010) — The No. 16-ranked and fifth-seeded South Carolina women's tennis team (16-8, 7-4 SEC) had its SEC Tournament run end Saturday with a 4-0 loss to third-ranked and top-seeded Florida (23-2, 11-0 SEC) in the semifinals at the Dan Magill Tennis Complex in Athens, Ga. South Carolina will now await its fate in the NCAA Tournament, set to be announced Tuesday, May 4, on ESPNEWS.

The two teams began with singles play on Georgia's four indoor courts due to the rainy weather in Athens. All four courts had tight scores early in the competition. At one, the Gamecocks' Ana Marija Zubori held a 4-3 lead over 11th-ranked Lauren Embree after the first seven games, and Miljana Jocic led Florida's Anastasia Revzina 3-0 at No. 4 singles. Anya Morgina and Marrit Boonstra of the Gators were tied 2-all at three singles and No. 7-rated Allie Will of Florida led Dijana Stojic 2-1.

Florida then took control of all four courts. Embree came back to win three straight games to take the first set off Zubori and then raced out to a 5-0 lead in the second before surrendering a game. Boonstra won 10 consecutive games against Morgina to win 6-2, 6-0 and finished seconds ahead of Embree, who topped Zubori 6-4, 6-1.

Jocic had a 4-3 lead in the first set before Revzina claimed nine games in a row to win 6-4, 6-0 and put Florida on top 3-0. Stojic fought back from a 5-2 deficit in the first set to make it 5-4, but Will grabbed the next game to earn the set and then won the second 6-0 to send the Gators to Sunday's championship match between the winner of Ole Miss and Tennessee.

The Nos. 5 and 6 singles matches were in their fourth games of the first sets when played stopped. Joanna Mather from Florida had a 2-1 lead on Adriana Pereira and the Gamecocks' Madeleine Saari-Byström was on top of Caroline Hitimana 2-1.

Stojic earned a place on the SEC All-Tournament Team for her performances in South Carolina's three matches. After not finishing singles or doubles against Kentucky, Stojic played a huge role in the Gamecocks' win Friday over Georgia. She and Zubori defeated the nation's No. 6-ranked doubles team to clinch the doubles point against the Bulldogs. Stojic then won her singles contest 6-1, 6-3 over Nadja Gilchrist, ranked No. 41, to put South Carolina ahead 2-0 in the match.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (May 14, 2010) — South Carolina's 18th-ranked women's tennis team (17-8) downed No. 54 TCU (10-17) 4-2 in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on Friday in Tallahassee, Fla. The Gamecocks next face No. 15 Florida State (15-10) after the Seminoles beat North Florida (20-3) 4-0 in the afternoon match. South Carolina and FSU will square off at 1 p.m. Saturday.

South Carolina got off to a slow start by losing the doubles point, falling on courts one and three. TCU won first at No. 3 singles with Gaby Mastromarino and Indunn Hertzberg winning 8-2 against Adriana Pereira and Madeleine Saari-Byström. The Gamecocks countered with Miljana Jocic and Anya Morgina's 8-4 triumph over Nina Munch-Soegaard and Maria Babanova on court two.

On the deciding match at No. 1 doubles, the Horned Frogs' Kayla Duncan and Katariina Tuohimaa took a 7-5 lead on Dijana Stojic and Ana Marija Zubori. In the 13th game, Stojic and Zubori fought off two match points before getting the score to 7-6 and then fought off two more match points in the next frame to make it 7-all. The Gamecock duo then pushed ahead 8-7.

With Tuohimaa serving in the 16th game, South Carolina took a 15-40 advantage. TCU saved one match point and then Duncan hit a volley at the net on the next rally that just dropped over the net for deuce. South Carolina got the ad for its third match point, but Tuohimaa and Duncan came back to win the game and forced a tiebreaker. In the breaker, TCU raced ahead 6-3 and ended up winning the match on its sixth match point for a 7-4 final in the tiebreaker.

The Gamecocks dominated in the singles competition, dropping one match while winning four others in straight sets. Morgina tied the score at 1-all when she upended Duncan 6-1, 6-0 at No. 3 singles to notch her 20th win of the season. She is the fifth Gamecock this season to post at least 20 victories in singles.

Jocic, South Carolina's team MVP this year, won handily as well on court four by a 6-2, 6-0 count versus Hertzberg to put Carolina on top 2-1. Jocic has the most wins in singles play this season with a 28-7 record and she is 17-4 in duals.

TCU scored its final point of the day with Mastromarino defeating Pereira 6-3, 6-2 at five singles. Within seconds of the match ending, Zubori scored a 6-3, 6-3 victory over Munch-Soegaard to make the score 3-2 for South Carolina.

Stojic led Tuohimma 6-2, 4-2 at No. 2 singles when Zubori won her match. Stojic broke Tuohimma to make the score 5-2, but Tuohimma broke back to make it 5-3. In the ninth game, Tuohimma had a game point at 40-30, but Stojic rallied to win the next three points to win the match and send South Carolina into the second round. Stojic has the most dual match victories for South Carolina this season with an 18-6 record.

The No. 6 singles match saw Saari-Byström leading Shalini Sahoo 7-5, 2-1 when Stojic provided South Carolina's fourth point.

South Carolina has now won at least one round in the NCAA Tournament 14 times during its current streak of 16 NCAA appearances in a row. The Gamecocks own a 20-19 all-time record in NCAA matches and have advanced as far as the quarterfinals two times (1982, 2009).

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (May 15, 2010) — The 18th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team (17-9) suffered a 4-0 setback to No. 15 Florida State (16-10) in the second round of the NCAA Tournament on Saturday in Tallahassee, Fla.

The Gamecocks faltered in doubles for the second straight day, losing on courts one and three. At three, Amy Sargeant and Katie Rybakova defeated Adriana Pereira and Madeleine Saari-Byström 8-1, followed by Lauren McCreless and Francesca Segarelli's 8-4 triumph over Dijana Stojic and Ana Marija Zubori at No. 1 doubles.

South Carolina held a 5-2 lead on court two thanks to Miljana Jocic and Anya Morgina. The two were pitted against the Seminole duo of Federica Suess and Jessica Sucupira.

Florida State carried the momentum in doubles over to singles by winning first sets on five of six courts. South Carolina's lone first set went to Pereira on court five against Suess, as Pereira snagged a 7-4 victory in a tiebreaker.

McCreless recorded a 6-2, 6-1 triumph at No. 1 singles over Zubori to put the Seminoles ahead 2-0. Next, Sargeant pulled out a 6-3, 6-2 decision versus Jocic at No. 4 singles to put FSU within a point of advancing to the NCAA Championships in Athens. Ga.

It appeared Segarelli would give FSU its fourth point at three singles after she won the first set 6-4 against Morgina and held a 5-4 advantage in the second with Morgina serving 15-40. Morgina, though, fought off both points to get to deuce and then saved two more match points before holding serve. Morgina broke Segarelli in the next game to lead 6-5 before having her match suspended.

Sucupira provided the final point on court six, defeating Saari-Byström 6-2, 6-3. Saari-Byström had a 40-15 lead on her serve trailing 5-3 in the second set, but Sucupira managed to come back and take the game to end the Gamecocks' season.

Zubori and Stojic will now represent South Carolina in the NCAA Doubles Championship that begins May 27 in Athens. Zubori will also compete in the singles tournament that starts May 26.
