2013 SEASON IN REVIEW

OPENING WEEKEND

A familiar face sat in the opposing dugout for Liberty as former South Carolina assistant Jim Toman brought his Liberty Flames to town for the opening weekend. Liberty proved to be a worthwhile adversary in all three games.

The Chad Holbrook era at South Carolina started off in victorious fashion as senior first baseman LB Dantzler homered and drove in two runs and sophomore left-hander Jordan Montgomery hurled six scoreless innings to pick up his first win of the season as fifth ranked South Carolina defeated Liberty 4-3 on Opening Day in front of a sellout crowd of 8,242 fans at Carolina Stadium. It was an emotional afternoon in Columbia as former head coach and current athletics director Ray Tanner was honored in several pregame ceremonies capped off by the retiring of his No. 1 jersey, the first retired jersey in South Carolina baseball history.

With Saturday's game rained out, the two teams met on Sunday in a doubleheader. Carolina stormed back from seven runs down in the final two innings to rally for an 8-7 win over Liberty in the first game of a doubleheader at Carolina Stadium. Kyle Martin knocked a RBI single that went off of Liberty pitcher Josh Richardson and after an errant throw by catcher Trey Wimmer, the Gamecocks would score the winning run as Graham Saiko crossed over home plate with the setting off the celebration.

Trailing 7-3 entering the ninth inning, the Gamecocks began the rally as TJ Costen walked, Dante Rosenberg singled and Tanner English walked to load the bases. A walk to Chase Vergason scored Costen and cut the deficit to three runs. After a second straight walk to Graham Saiko, the Gamecocks were within two runs with the bases loaded and no outs. Max Schrock would bring Carolina one run closer as a RBI groundout to the first baseman scored Tanner English. After an intentional walk to load the bases, Liberty would get the second out of the inning with a strikeout by reliever Josh Richardson. That set the scene for Martin. After working the count to 3-1, the Gamecock pinch hitter roped a line drive that caught Richardson on the leg on the mound. The ball rolled close to home plate. As Martin rushed down the line, Wimmer looked to make a play at first base. His throw wouldn't make it though and the ball got away from first baseman Alex Close allowing both pinch runner Shon Carson and Saiko to score leading the Gamecocks to the victory. Liberty won the nightcap 3-2 in seven innings to salvage the third game of the series.

The series marked the first time in school history that South Carolina has opened a season with three consecutive one-run games

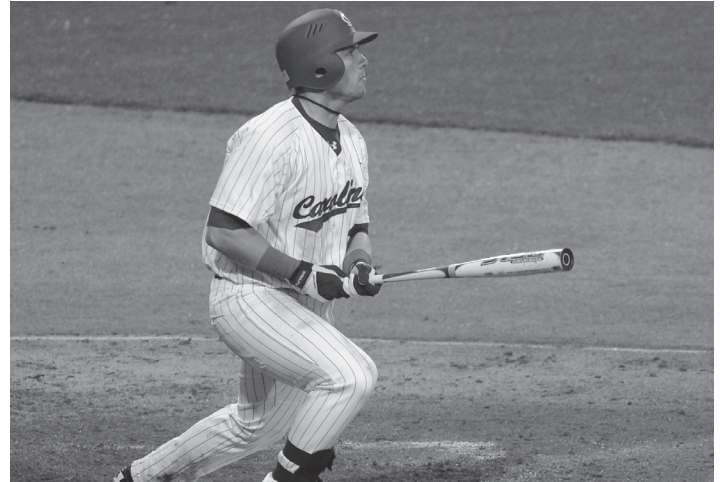


A NO-NO

A weekend sweep of Albany improved the Gamecocks to 5-1 on the year. It was a memorable weekend for South Carolina as a 14-1 victory on Sunday in game one of a doubleheader featured a combined no-hitter by Colby Holmes, Forrest Koumas and Josh Knab. It was the first by a Gamecock team in 38 years and the seventh no-hitter in school history and the first combined no-hitter as well. Holmes opened the outing with six innings of work allowing just one walk and an unearned run. He struck out three batters. Koumas followed with two scoreless innings in which he walked three and struck out one. Knab closed out the no-hitter with a perfect ninth inning inducing three consecutive groundouts.

PLAYER OF THE WEEK

South Carolina hitters were also disruptive the entire weekend including senior first baseman LB Dantzler. He went 9-for-13 (.692) at the plate with two doubles, two homers, six runs scored and 10 RBI. He had 17 total bases for the weekend with a .733 on-base percentage as well as a 1.308 slugging percentage. Dantzler tied three Carolina Stadium records for a three-game series with 17 total bases, nine hits and six runs scored. His efforts earned him SEC Player of the Week honors.



COLLEGE BASEBALL'S PREMIER RIVALRY

The third weekend of the season featured college baseball's premier rivalry. For the fourth straight year, South Carolina and Clemson met in the unique three-game series format with each team hosting the other school with the third contest at a neutral site. The Gamecocks bookended the weekend with wins vs. the Tigers at Clemson and in Columbia to win the season series. The Gamecocks have now won 20 of the last 28 games played vs. Clemson from the 2007 season to the present.

It would be southpaws Jordan Montgomery and Nolan Belcher that would steal the show for the Gamecocks.

Game one at Doug Kingsmore Stadium in Clemson featured Montgomery, who opened the series with eight scoreless innings of work in a 6-0 win over the Tigers. Montgomery did not allow a runner to reach third base as he limited the Tigers to three hits and two walks in the victory. Montgomery tied a career-high with eight innings pitched for the third time in his career and struck out a career-high nine batters in the victory.

Clemson answered in game two with a 6-3 victory at Fluor Field in Greenville, S.C. to set up a Sunday rubber game at Carolina Stadium.

That set the stage for Nolan Belcher and the senior delivered. A capacity crowd of 8,242 fans at Carolina Stadium witnessed Belcher's finest start in a Carolina uniform as the left-hander pitched a three-hit complete game shutout and was backed by an offense that scored five runs with two outs in the sixth inning as Carolina defeated Clemson 8-0 to clinch the weekend series. Belcher's complete game shutout was also the first by a Gamecock pitcher in the Clemson series since May 4, 1986 when Rodney Richey hurled a four-hit complete game shutout in a 5-0 victory vs. the Tigers at Sarge Frye Field.

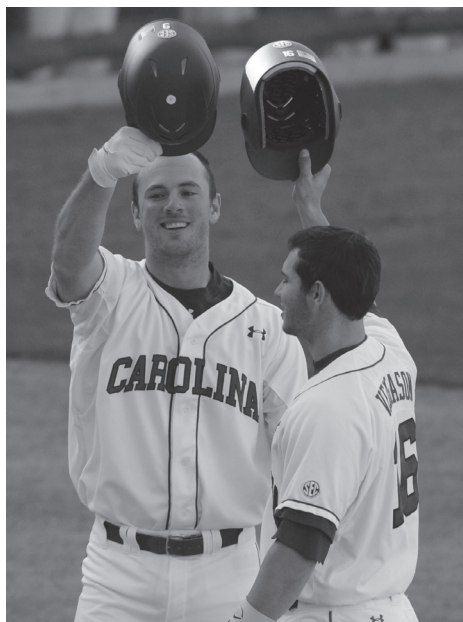

SHUTOUTS

After a pair of shutouts vs. the Tigers, the Gamecock pitching staff continued its dominance with three more shutouts the next week with a 10-0 victory vs. Ball State as well as victories of 2-0 and 1-0 over Rider. The five shutouts in eight games was the first time since 2004 that the Gamecocks had shut out five opponents in a span of eight games.

PLAYER OF THE WEEK PART II

Joey Pankake became the second South Carolina player to earn SEC Player of the Week honors after Carolina won a pair of games vs. Ball State and swept the three-game series vs. Rider. Pankake hit .438 (7-for-16) in the five games with four homers, seven runs scored and nine RBI. Pankake hit a pair of three-run homers in each of the wins over Ball State. He then homered in both Saturday and Sunday's victories over Rider.

FIRST TRIP TO COLUMBIA (MISSOURI)

South Carolina made its first trip to Columbia, Mo. to open the 2013 SEC slate. The Gamecocks won two of three games against the Tigers in the first visit to Taylor Stadium. A 4-1 victory in the opener featured sophomore right-hander Evan Beal striking out a career-high 10 batters, Grayson Greiner belting a homer and TJ Costen driving in a key pair of runs on the way to the victory. The two teams split a doubleheader the next day with Carolina taking the first game 2-0 behind 8.1 scoreless innings from Nolan Belcher. Senior Tyler Webb came on for the final two outs to combine with Belcher in a five-hit shutout.

STREAKS

Senior left-handers Nolan Belcher and Tyler Webb put together impressive streaks in the first month of the season. Beginning in the fifth inning vs. Albany and through starts vs. Clemson, Rider, and Missouri, Belcher went 31.2 consecutive innings without allowing a run. That streak ended in the sixth inning of his start vs. Arkansas. Webb's streak was almost as long and dated back to the 2012 season as he went 31.0 consecutive innings without yielding a run before the Razorbacks scored against him in the series finale in the 11th inning. It was Webb's 12th appearance of the 2013 season when the Razorbacks plated across a run.

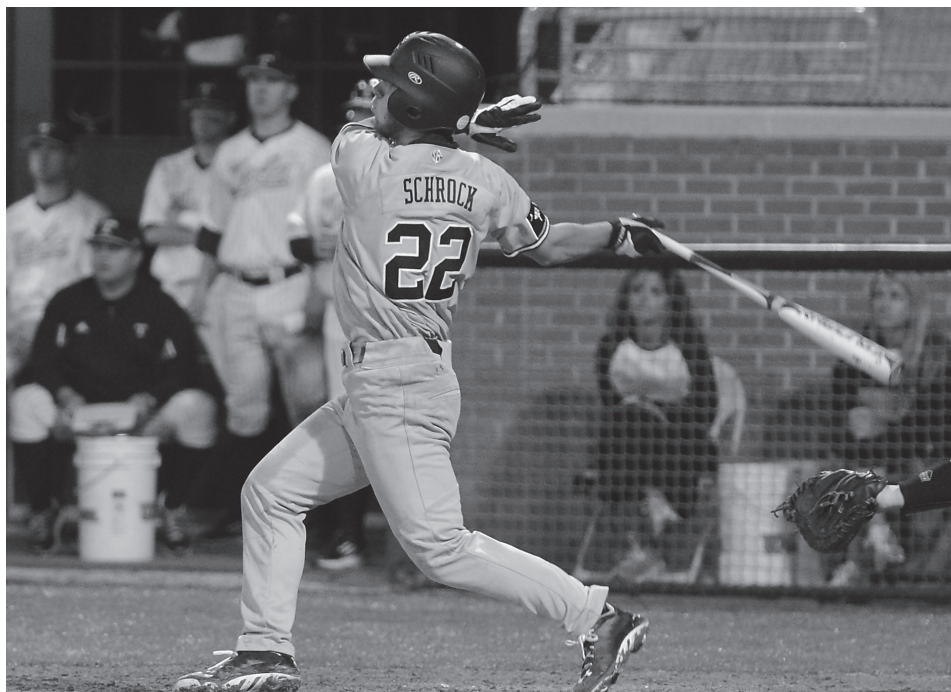
A&M'S FIRST VISIT TO CAROLINA STADIUM

South Carolina bounced back from a sweep by Arkansas by sweeping Texas A&M the week after in the Aggies' first visit to Carolina Stadium. The series opened with a 3-2 victory vs. A&M on ESPN's Thursday night SEC Game of the Week. In front of a nationally-televised audience, LB Dantzler tallied a two-run double in the sixth inning to bring the Gamecocks back from a two-run deficit and Graham Saiko followed up in the seventh inning with a fielder's choice to drive in a run as the Gamecocks earned a one-run victory. The win also saw Evan Beal, Adam Westmoreland and Tyler Webb combine to strike out 17 batters. A 6-4 victory the next day clinched the series as the Gamecocks staked Belcher five runs in the first inning. In the series finale, the two teams were tied 3-3 entering the bottom of the eighth inning. With one out, LB Dantzler drove the first pitch he saw from Aggie reliever Jason Jester into the bullpen in right field for his second homer of the game and ninth of the season to give the Gamecocks a one-run lead. It was only the second run allowed in the season by Jester. With the capacity crowd of 8,242 fans at Carolina Stadium in a frenzy, the Gamecocks added some insurance runs. Connor Bright followed with a double and Chase Vergason was hit by a pitch. With two outs, the Gamecocks scored a pair of runs as Dante Rosenberg lifted a fly ball into right field that A&M right fielder Brandon Wood lost in the sun allowing both runners to score and increasing the lead to 6-3. Westmoreland and Webb closed out the win with a scoreless ninth inning.

ON THE OFFENSIVE IN KNOXVILLE

South Carolina swept Tennessee the next weekend to improve to 8-4 in the SEC with the most offensive performance by the team for the season. The team's best weekend at the plate saw Carolina hit .375 (45-for-120) with 36 runs scored.

Freshman second baseman Max Schrock had his best weekend in a Gamecock uniform. His game-winning RBI double in the top of the ninth inning lifted the Gamecocks to a 5-4 win over Tennessee. He followed that up with a double, a homer and two RBI in the 12-8 win over the Volunteers. In the series finale, he had a career-high four hits with a career-high four RBI as well as two runs scored in the 19-2 win over Tennessee. Carolina belted out a season-high 21 hits with 10 different Gamecocks recording at least one hit on the way to the 19-2 win. The 19 runs on Sunday were the most in a game for Carolina since 24 vs. College of Charleston in 2011 and the most in a SEC game since scoring 20 in 2010 vs. Alabama.

BROOMS RETURN TO COLUMBIA WITH WEEKEND SWEEP OF WILDCATS

At the midway point in the conference season, the Gamecocks entered its weekend series vs. Kentucky 28-10 and 8-7 in the SEC. A sweep of a doubleheader vs. Kentucky kick started the second half of league play and led to a sweep of the Wildcats.

Game one of the doubleheader saw Kentucky score twice in the top of the sixth inning to take a 2-0 lead. South Carolina rallied with four runs in the bottom of the sixth and added an insurance run in the seventh to defeat Kentucky 5-2. Back-to-back home runs from Joey Pankake and LB Dantzler tied the game. With one out, Pankake drilled a 0-1 pitch from A.J. Reed over the wall in left field for his eighth home run of the season. Dantzler followed with his 11th homer of the year as he launched the first pitch he saw from Reed over the right field wall. The hit parade continued with Max Schrock, who knocked a double off the wall in right field. He would score on Brison Celek's RBI single to left-center. The Gamecocks took advantage of a UK miscue to score the fourth run of the inning. Connor Bright knocked a two-out double to left field. On the relay into the infield, UK shortstop Matt Reid threw past second baseman J.T. Riddle, allowing Celek to score from third to home. The Gamecocks added an insurance run in the seventh inning. Chase Vergason led off with a single with Pankake reaching base with a single for his second hit of the afternoon. With two outs and both runners in scoring position, Max Schrock lifted a sac fly into center field scoring Vergason and giving the Gamecocks a three-run cushion.

The nightcap was a heart racer that went back and forth and into extra innings before a RBI single from Brison Celek in the bottom of the 11th lifted Carolina to a 7-6 win. South Carolina led Kentucky 5-1 before the Wildcats struck back with a two-run homer by Greg Fettes and a three-run homer by A.J. Reed to go ahead 6-5. Carolina tied the game at 6-6 in the bottom of the eighth on a two-out RBI base hit from Graham Saiko. In the bottom of the 11th the Gamecocks rallied and secured the victory in walk-off fashion. Pankake and Kyle Martin opened the inning with consecutive singles and set the stage for Celek who knocked a 3-1 pitch to left field and drove in Pankake for the winning run.

A 3-1 win in the series finale gave the Gamecocks the series sweep. Jack Wynkoop hurled a career-high eight innings in the win and LB Dantzler hit a two-run homer to highlight the Gamecock offense. In only his third start vs. a SEC team, Wynkoop scattered nine hits and allowed just one run, unearned, while not walking a batter and striking out three. Wynkoop would pick up SEC Freshman of the Week for his performance.

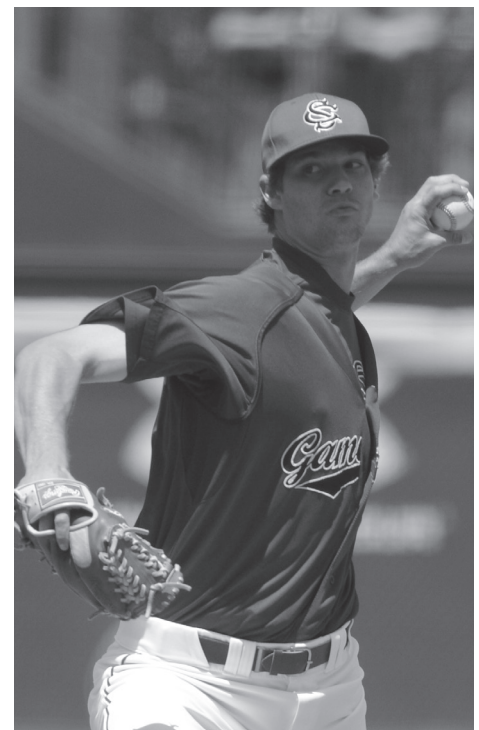


TRIUMPH ON THE BAYOU

South Carolina's first-ever visit to the new Alex Box Stadium at LSU was a success as the Gamecocks defeated LSU in two of three games for the first series win against the Bayou Bengals since the 2007 season. In the process, Carolina snapped LSU's 20-game home winning streak with a 4-2 win on Saturday following that up with a 4-0 victory in Sunday's series finale. The Saturday night game was played in front of an actual attendance crowd of 10,246 fans, the largest actual attendance in Alex Box Stadium history.

After falling in the opener, the Gamecocks and Tigers played a gem on Saturday night in Baton Rouge. Tanner English broke a 2-2 tie with a RBI triple in the top of the ninth inning and scored on a balk as Carolina defeated LSU 4-2 to even the series. With the score deadlocked at two entering the ninth, the Gamecocks caught a break to open the frame as Grayson Greiner reached base on a fielding error by LSU shortstop Alex Bregman, his second error of the game. With one out and Greiner still on first base, English worked a 2-1 count against LSU reliever Chris Cotton before drilling a triple into the gap in right-center. The three base hit was his second of the series vs. the Tigers. English then scored on a balk charged to Cotton, increasing the lead to a pair of runs. LSU looked to rally in the bottom of the ninth as JaCoby Jones doubled followed by an infield single by Jared Foster against Gamecock left-hander Tyler Webb to give the Tigers runners on the corners with no outs. Webb dug in and fanned Sean McMullen and Mark Laird with strikeouts and ended the game with a flyout by Bregman to left-center sealing the Carolina victory.

Just off his SEC Freshman of the Week performance vs. Kentucky, freshman left-hander Jack Wynkoop hurled seven scoreless innings and combined with Adam Westmoreland and Webb for a six-hit shutout as South Carolina defeated LSU 4-0 to win the rubber game of the series. The Gamecocks struck right away with two runs in the top of the first inning. Chase Vergason tripled with one out as he hit a liner that flew past a diving Jared Foster in right field. With two outs, Vergason would score on LB Dantzler's RBI double down the right field line. Schrock would then drive in Dantzler with a RBI single to right field giving Carolina a 2-0 lead. The lead increased to 3-0 in the top of the second. Tanner English drew a leadoff walk and advanced to third on a base hit to left off the bat of Graham Saiko. Vergason would drive in English with a sacrifice fly to right field. LSU looked to mount a rally in the eighth with a one-out single by Mark Laird and a two-out walk to Jared Foster. Webb entered and coaxed Alex Bregman into a flyout to right field to keep Carolina ahead by three runs. Carolina scored an important insurance run in the ninth inning as Sean Sullivan reached base with a leadoff walk. After a sac bunt by Tanner English was misplayed by Katz to give Carolina a pair of runners, both moved into scoring position on Saiko's sac bunt. Sullivan would score on Vergason's sac fly to right field, his second of the game. Webb worked a perfect ninth to seal the 4-0 victory. Wynkoop's outing earned him SEC Freshman of the Week for the second time.

SENIOR SEND-OFF

The Gamecocks concluded the home portion of the SEC schedule with a three-game sweep of Georgia. Nolan Belcher retired 16 consecutive batters at one point in the Friday opener on the way to a 7-2 win. Jordan Montgomery kept it going for Carolina on Saturday as he carried a no-hitter into the seventh inning with the Gamecocks scoring in five of eight innings at the plate as South Carolina defeated the Bulldogs 7-1 on Senior Day. The Gamecocks honored nine seniors (Nolan Belcher, LB Dantzler, Colby Holmes, Dante Rosenberg, Patrick Sullivan, Sean Sullivan, Chase Vergason, Tyler Webb and Adam Westmoreland) in a pregame ceremony. An 8-3 win gave the Gamecocks a sweep on Sunday and eight of nine position starters contributed with at least one hit.



DANTZLER NAMED CAPITAL ONE ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN OF THE YEAR

Senior LB Dantzler earned the prestigious Capital One Academic All-American of the Year award from the College Sports Information Directors of America, leading the way on the Academic All-America Division I baseball teams announced on May 31, 2013. A member of the 2013 Golden Spikes Award Watch List, Dantzler was the school's male nominee for the 2012-13 H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete of the Year award, the highest honor given by the SEC. In the classroom, he owned a 3.64 GPA in sport and entertainment management, and off the diamond he volunteered over 50 hours at the Epworth Children's Home among his community service projects. The eighth individual in South Carolina baseball history to earn Academic All-America status, it marked the third-consecutive year that the Gamecocks have had a first-teamer, following Michael Roth's back-to-back selections. Dantzler was the only SEC baseball player honored on this year's teams.

HOSTING

With a 39-18 record as well as a 17-12 mark in SEC play, South Carolina was selected as one of the 16 regional host institutions for the 2013 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship. The 2013 Columbia Regional marked the 15th time in school history that the Gamecocks hosted an NCAA Regional in baseball. Since the move to the Regional-Super Regional format in 1999, Carolina has hosted an NCAA Regional nine times (2000, 2001, 2002, 2004, 2007, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013). South Carolina was joined in the regional by Clemson (No. 2), Liberty (No. 3) and Saint Louis (No. 4).

GAMECOCKS WIN COLUMBIA REGIONAL

South Carolina opened Regional play with a 7-3 victory over Saint Louis. South Carolina held a 3-0 lead entering the top of the seventh before the Bilikens rallied with a run in the seventh followed by a pair of unearned runs in the eighth to tie the game. The Gamecocks took control again in the bottom half of the eighth. Sophomore shortstop Joey Pankake reached on an error to start the inning and promptly stole second. Greiner's single put runners on the corners for Martin, who delivered a hit through the right side to give South Carolina a 4-3 lead. A wild pitch plated Greiner, and Martin added another on Saiko's double to make the score 6-3. The second error of the inning scored Saiko from third to increase the Gamecock cushion to 7-3. Tyler Webb worked a perfect ninth to seal the win.

The Gamecocks would next meet Liberty after the Flames upset Clemson on the first day. South Carolina starting pitcher Jordan Montgomery tallied a career-high 11 strikeouts, and the Gamecocks collected 19 hits en route to a 19-3 victory over Liberty in game four of the NCAA Columbia Regional on Saturday night at Carolina Stadium. Montgomery allowed just three hits in seven scoreless innings of work to lead South Carolina. The Gamecocks were just as impressive at the plate, as 11 players finished with at least one hit and six tallied multiple hits. Carolina also drew seven walks, and the 19 runs scored are the second most in a postseason game in school history, falling just short of the 21 scored against Florida International in the 1998 Atlantic Regional. Sophomore Kyle Martin went 3-for-5 with a home run and four RBIs, while sophomore Tanner English delivered a 3-for-6 effort with a home run and three RBIs to lead the Gamecocks. Senior Chase Vergason, sophomore Grayson Greiner, sophomore Connor Bright and sophomore TJ Costen added two hits apiece, while freshman Max Schrock had a two-run home run.

It would take two more days to play one more game and clinch the Regional. South Carolina met Liberty one more time after the Flames eliminated the Tigers. Sunday night at Carolina Stadium the Gamecocks built a 4-0 lead through the first three innings. LB Dantzler led the way with a RBI single in the first as well a RBI double in the third. South Carolina held a 4-2 lead in the bottom of the fifth inning when a heavy storm made its way into Columbia and forced the game to be halted. The two teams would return to action on Monday afternoon. As the game resumed, South Carolina tacked on two more runs to increase the advantage back to four. Grayson Greiner ripped a single to right field to lead things off. Following a sacrifice bunt by Martin that moved Greiner to second, junior Graham Saiko singled up the middle to drive Greiner home. Two batters later, English perfectly laid down a bunt single toward first base to score Saiko, giving Carolina a 6-2 cushion. The Flames made one last charge at a comeback, scoring a run in the eighth on a double by pinch hitter Danny Grauer and a run in the ninth on a RBI groundout. However, with runners on the corners and two outs in the ninth, Webb put an end to the comeback bid by striking out Justin Sizemore to secure a 6-4 victory. The win secured South Carolina's fourth straight trip to the Super Regionals and South Carolina's 27th-straight postseason win at home. South Carolina is now 16-0 at Carolina Stadium in postseason contests.



GAMECOCKS & TAR HEELS BATTLE IN TREMENDOUS SUPER REGIONAL

South Carolina made the bus trek four hours north to Chapel Hill to face the national No. 2 seed North Carolina in the Super Regional. Weather turned out to be part of the story as rain postponed the Friday opener into Saturday. In game one, the Gamecocks broke out in front with a pair of runs in the top of the first inning off Tar Heel lefthander Kent Emanuel. Graham Saiko led off with a single to center and Chase Vergason followed with a single to right. One out later, LB Dantzler coaxed a walk to load the bases. Grayson Greiner put the Gamecocks on top with a two-run single to left, scoring Saiko and Vergason. North Carolina came right back with a pair of runs in the bottom of the inning. Landon Lassiter stroked a one-out single to center and scored on Colin Moran's double into the left field corner to cut the Gamecocks' lead in half. One out later, Cody Stubbs lined a ball to Saiko, but the Carolina left fielder was unable to handle it for a two-base error, tying the game at 2.

Carolina jumped back in front in the second. Kyle Martin, the Most Outstanding Player of the Columbia Regional, led off the inning with a single to right. He advanced to second on Tanner English's sacrifice bunt and scored on Saiko's single to center, putting the Gamecocks back on top, 3-2. South Carolina chased Emanuel, a third-round pick in the MLB Draft, in the third inning. Joey Pankake led off the frame with a booming home run over the left field wall to put the Gamecocks on top 4-2. Pankake's homer came on a 1-2 pitch and was his 11th round tripper of the season. Emanuel surrendered four runs, all earned, on seven hits over 2.1 innings of work, his shortest start of the season.

North Carolina got a run right back in the bottom of the third with the help of another Gamecock miscue. Moran stroked a one-out single to right. With two outs, Stubbs grounded one just inside the first base bag, past a diving Martin for a double. Connor Bright fielded the ball cleanly, but his throw back into the infield went awry for an error, allowing Moran to score the Tar Heels' third run of the game.

North Carolina took the lead for the first time in its half of the sixth. Skye Bolt led off with a single to center. Stubbs followed with a double to right, his second two-base hit of the game, ending the day for Gamecock starter Nolan Belcher. Adam Westmoreland relieved Belcher and got a groundout before Brian Holberton laced a single to center, plating both Bolt and Stubbs, giving UNC a 5-4 advantage. The Gamecocks used a double play ball for the third straight inning to end any further damage. Belcher was tagged for five runs, three earned, on eight hits over 5.0-plus innings of work.

The Gamecocks rallied to tie the game at 5 in the eighth. Martin led off with a single to center, his third hit of the game. English was unable to get down his third sacrifice of the contest and struck out, but Saiko singled to center for his third hit, advancing Martin to second. Vergason lined a ball just out of the reach of centerfielder Chaz Frank for a double, scoring Martin with the game-tying run. After Pankake fanned for the second out, Dantzler was walked intentionally to load the bases, but Greiner flied out to center to end the inning.

Tied at 5-5, Parks Jordan, the No. 9 hitter in the Tar Heel lineup, led off the ninth with a single to center off Gamecock closer Tyler Webb and advanced to second on a sacrifice bunt. With two outs and runners on first and second, Skye Bolt's grounder found its way through the hole between first and second into right field. Jordan would just beat Sean Sullivan's throw to give the Tar Heels the 6-5 victory. Westmoreland worked 2.2 innings of relief, allowing one hit and two walks with two strikeouts. Webb (3-3) was tagged with the loss after allowing one run on two hits in an inning of relief. Thornton (10-1) worked the final three innings, allowing three hits and a run with one walk and three strikeouts for the win.

With elimination on the brink in game two, South Carolina battled back and behind a four-hit shutout Jordan Montgomery, the Gamecocks parlayed eight hits, nine walks and five stolen bases into eight runs on the way to an 8-0 victory over North Carolina. Montgomery (6-1) was spectacular all day as he tossed the first complete game of his career, walking one while fanning three. Despite three fielding errors by the Gamecock infielders, only four Tar Heel runners advanced as far as second base and none reached third. He threw 121 pitches while quieting a record attendance crowd of 4,365.

The Gamecocks got all the runs they would need when they sent nine batters to the plate in a five-run second inning. Max Schrock led off the frame with a double down the first-base line and advanced to third on TJ Costen's ground out. After Kyle Martin coaxed a walk on a 10-pitch at-bat, Tanner English pushed a bunt single to first, scoring Schrock with the game's first run. After Graham Saiko's flyout advanced Martin to third, English stole second. Chase Vergason walked to load the bases. Joey Pankake delivered a key two-out, two-run double just inside the left field line, putting the Gamecocks on top 3-0. LB Dantzler capped the uprising with a two-run single to right, extending the lead to five and sending Tar Heel starter Hobbs Johnson to an early shower. Johnson (4-1) was tagged with the loss, his first in five decisions this season.

The Gamecocks extended their lead in the fourth without the benefit of a hit. North Carolina right-hander Reilly Hovis walked Saiko and Vergason to open the inning. Both runners advanced on Pankake's chopper in front of the plate. Dantzler was walked intentionally, then Greiner walked, forcing in Saiko with the Gamecocks' sixth run. Taylore Cherry replaced Hovis and worked out of the bases loaded jam, getting an infield pop out and a strikeout, to avoid any further damage. South Carolina used its speed to add a pair of runs in the fifth. English singled to deep short with one out and promptly stole second. After Saiko walked, both runners advanced on a double steal, giving English a career-high three stolen bases on the day. He entered the game with just six stolen bases on the season. Vergason hit a deep sacrifice fly to right, scoring English and sending Saiko to third. Third baseman Colin Moran was unable to handle Pankake's bouncer for an error, scoring Saiko and putting the Gamecocks comfortably ahead 8-0.

The rubber game of the Super Regional came two days later. South Carolina broke out to a 4-2 lead in the deciding game but the Tar Heels scored three times in the bottom of the sixth and held on for a 5-4 win ending the Gamecocks' season.

Trailing 2-1 entering the top of the fifth, the Gamecocks retook the lead in the top of the fifth with the help of some shaky Tar Heel defense. Kyle Martin walked to lead off the inning. English laid down a sacrifice bunt and reached base safely when first baseman Cody Stubbs was unable to handle the throw from Thornton. Both runners moved up a base on Graham Saiko's sacrifice bunt. Thornton appeared to have worked out of the jam as Chase Vergason struck out and Joey Pankake lofted a ball to medium-deep centerfield, but Chaz Frank dropped the routine fly for a two-base error, scoring both Martin and English, giving the Gamecocks a 3-2 lead.

South Carolina added a single run in the sixth to open up a two-run advantage at 4-2. Grayson Greiner and Max Schrock lined back-to-back singles to left to open the frame. Greiner was forced at third on Bright's bunt attempt and Kyle Martin fanned before English dropped one just inside the left field line for a double, scoring Schrock.

The Tar Heels responded quickly, batting around in the deciding three-run sixth. Landon Lassiter led off with a liner off the glove of Pankake at short for a single. Colin Moran laced a triple into the right field corner, scoring Lassiter and cutting the lead in half. After Skye Bolt was hit by a pitch, Stubbs lofted a shallow fly to center. Moran held at third on the catch, but Bolt tagged up and advanced to second on the throw from English that was cut off by Martin. Martin threw wildly to second trying to nail Bolt, allowing Moran to score the tying run and Bolt to advance to third. It marked the Gamecocks' third error of the game and ninth error of the series. Westmoreland was one out away from working out of the inning after Russell grounded out, but after Holberton was walked intentionally, Mike Zolk walked to load the bases. Tyler Webb relieved Westmoreland and, after getting ahead in the count 0-2, walked Parks Jordan, forcing in Bolt with the eventual game-winning run before getting Frank to fly out to end the uprising.
