STONE STADIUM

Located in the heart of the South Carolina campus is the home field of the Gamecocks, Eugene E. Stone III Stadium, also known as "The Graveyard."

The stadium, which debuted in 1996, was made possible by the \$1 million gift given by the late Eugene E. Stone III. Stone, who passed away in 1997, was a Carolina graduate and Chairman of Stone Manufacturing Co. Inc., the parent company of UMBRO International. The surface of Stone Stadium was completely replaced during the summer of 2009. A state-of-the-art irrigation system was installed, along with new sod for the entire field surface.

Stone Stadium's west side houses permanent stands that hold 4,000 fans. It is equipped with a 70' by 8' press box with a camera deck on top. The press box houses both the brand new scoreboard operating system and the public address system as well as room to comfortably seat members of the media.

The facility includes two team rooms, an officials' dressing room, a concession stand for the fans and restrooms for both men and women on each side of the stadium. Also nicknamed The Graveyard because of its close proximity to the House of Peace cemetery, the area has proven to be a "graveyard" for opponents over the years.

MEMORABLE HOME MATCHES

Over the last 33 seasons, many great memories have been made at South Carolina home matches at The Graveyard, since named Stone Stadium. These memorable matches range from NCAA Tournament wins to strong individual showings, to wins that marked a specific moment in Carolina soccer history.

- 9/19/78 With a 12-0 shutout of Presbyterian College, USC's first-ever home match, Carolina began an excellent record at home.
- 11/17/85 Doug Allison and Scott Cook both add a goal and an assist, as USC wins its first NCAA home match, a 3-0 victory against the Duke Blue Devils.
- 10/12/86 Carolina secured its first home win against archrival Clemson, a hard-fought 4-3 victory.
- 11/27/88 A lone first half goal by Clark Brisson leads Gamecocks to first ever Final Four with a 1-0 victory over SMU.
- 11/4/89 A 3-2 win over UCLA became the first of two wins over the Bruins, helping USC go undefeated in 1989 Met Life Classic.
- 11/12/89 Scott Cook scored a miraculous goal from the near corner flag to defeat Duke, 2-1, in the NCAA Tournament.
- 10/28/90 A 2-1 win over powerhouse Indiana give Gamecocks second Met Life Classic tie.
- 11/1/92 The Gamecocks score just 15 seconds into the game and have their captain ejected at 56 seconds, however, they still win a 2-0 thriller over Clemson.
- 11/4/92 Senior All-American Tommy Loeber scored his first career goal with seconds left against College of Charleston to send the match into overtime, where the Gamecocks won.
- 11/28/93 USC reaches second Final Four behind six-goal outburst by six different Gamecock goal scorers to defeat Air Force.
- 10/14/94 Future MLS star Clint Mathis shows first signs of brilliance leading South Carolina to a 7-5 win over North Carolina.
- 10/29/97 Carolina erased a 4-2 second-half deficit to come back and defeat Wake Forest, 5-4, behind five Josh Wolff points.
- 11/23/97 First NCAA match at newly-named Stone Stadium showcases Clint Mathis and Kim Eriksen combine to score two goals, as Carolina defeated Charleston Southern, 3-0.
- 9/6/98 USC defeats top-ranked and defending national champion UCLA, 2-1, for Berson's 300th career win.
- 11/8/98 A bicycle kick by Nathan Watkins gives USC another one-goal win, Berson's 300th win at Carolina as he defeated his alma mater, North Carolina, 2-1.
- 10/10/04 Ryan Deter's goal in the 24th minute sends Carolina past archrival Clemson, 1-0, marking Berson's 375th career win.
- 9/27/06 Cory Lewis scores twice as the Gamecocks defeat UAB, 2-0, and give coach Mark Berson his 400th career victory.
- 10/27/07 Gamecocks defeat Marshall, 3-1, securing Berson's 400th victory at South Carolina
- 8/29/08 Record crowd of 6,102 watched the Gamecocks defeat archrival Clemson.
- 11/21/10 South Carolina defeats Duke, 1-0, on a golden goal by Bradlee Baladez in the NCAA Tournament
