## CAROLINA OUICK HITS

- South Carolina is in its 35 th season of varsity soccer in 2012.
- South Carolina head coach Mark Berson is in his 36th season overall and his 35th season as head coach of the Gamecocks. He is assisted by former players Spencer Lewis and Joey Worthen, both in their first season. Another former player for the Gamecocks, Clark Brisson, is the volunteer assistant coach.
- South Carolina travels to Marshall on Saturday, its first road contest since a Sept. 24 match at SMU. Marshall's field is undergoing a renovation, so the match will be played in Hurricane, W.Va., at the high school stadium.
- The Gamecocks exploded for three goals vs. No. 25 UAB on Wednesday in a
 match at Stone Stadium, but the Blazers tallied three goals in the final minutes of play to collect the victory.
- Freshman midfielder Jeffrey Torda scored the first goal of his college career vs. UAB. The Colleyville, Texas, native has 17 shots on the year and two assists.
- South Carolina snapped a three-game winless streak with a 2-1 victory vs. UCF on Oct. 7 at Stone Stadium. Sophomore midfielder Hunter Wyer tallied the first Gamecock goal of the match, while freshman midfielder Ryan Arambula netted his first-career game winner.
- Hunter Wyer has played in three career matches, posting an assist in one, and his first-career goal vs. UCF on Oct. 7.
- Former South Carolina goalkeeper Warren Lipka was honored with selection to the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame for the 2012 class. Lipka was inducted on Thursday, Sept. 13, in a ceremony at Williams-Brice Stadium.
- South Carolina is the reigning Conference USA Co-Regular Season champions, as both the Gamecocks and

UAB finished the 2011 league campaign with a 6-1-1 record.

- Carolina made its 20th appearance all-time in the NCAA Tournament in 2011, earning hosting duties for the first round.
- Baladez and sophomore midfielder Braeden Troyer were both named to the Preseason All Conference USA squad earlier this season published by College Sports Madness, while Baladez was tabbed a Third-Team Preseason All-American by CollegeSoccerNews.com.


## SCOUTING MARSHALL

Marshall is in the middle of one of its best seasons in recent history. The squad has allowed just three goals in 11 matches this season. Goalkeeper Daniel Winthrow ranks first in the nation in save percentage and second in goals against average, with a stellar 0.27 mark. As a team Marshall ranks first in the nation in shutout percentage ( 0.82 ), and 10th in scoring offense with 2.27 goals per game. Tom Jackson paces the squad offensively with seven goals

and three assists, while Jack Hopkins has four goals. Marshall has played just two home games in 2012 due to field renovations. The Thundering Herd's only loss on the year came in C-USA action at Tulsa, with their only tie in a double overtime shutout at Bowling Green. The Herd is led by Bob Gray in his 18th season.

## LAST TIME VS. MARSHALL

South Carolina overcame a one-goal deficit to defeat Marshall, 3-1, last season at Stone Stadium. Then-sophomore Bradlee Baladez collected two assists and freshman midfielder Braeden Troyer netted the first game winner of his career. Junior defender Kevin Stam and Baladez also scored in the match. The Thundering Herd attempted to rally in the final minute with two shots on goal, but fell short. Then-junior defender Eric Martinez saved one shot on the goal line and goalkeeper Alex Long saved another just 10 seconds later, as South Carolina earned the 3-1 C-USA victory.

## MARTINEZ, STAM NAMED TO GAMECOCK CLASSIC ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM

South Carolina defenders, and team co-captains, junior Eric Martinez and senior Kevin Stam put forth stellar play in two matches at the Gamecock Classic vs. No. 15 St. John's and No. 25 Northwestern. With hot and humid temperatures during both matches, the duo played all 90 minutes vs. the Red Storm and all 110 minutes against the Wildcats. The Gamecock defense earned its second shutout of the season against Northwestern.

## Warren lipka honored with selection to hall of fame

Former South Carolina goalkeeper Warren Lipka (1982-85) was honored with selection to the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame as part of the 2012 class. Along with the other honorees, Lipka was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Thursday, Sept. 13, in a ceremony at Williams-Brice Stadium. Lipka, the 1985 National Goalkeeper of the Year, was also an All-American during his time at Carolina. He was the team captain of the 1985 squad that compiled the most wins in school history (20) and advanced to the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals.

## DID YOU KNOW?

Out of all active Division I men's soccer coaches, Mark Berson has been to the D-I NCAA Tournament more times (20) than any other coach, including in 19 of the last 27 seasons.

## conference usa preseason poll

The South Carolina men's soccer team was picked to finish first in the 2012 Conference USA Preseason Poll, while junior forward Bradlee Baladez was selected to the 13-member Men's Soccer Preseason All-Conference Team for the second-consecutive season, as announced by the league office in mid-August. 2012 marks the first time the Gamecocks have been selected as the preseason favorite in the league. Their previous high mark was when the team was projected to finish second in 2006. The Gamecocks were the 2011 regular season co-champs of the league last year. SMU was picked to finish second, followed by UCF, UAB, Memphis, Tulsa, Kentucky, Marshall and FIU.

35TH SEASON AT SOUTH CAROLINA (443-188-63) 36TH OVERALL (454-193-63)

Mark Berson, the reigning Conference USA Coach of the Year, and one of three coaches all-time to post 450 Division I victories, begins his 35th season at the helm of the South Carolina soccer program in 2012. Below are some of Berson and the team's accomplishments:

- Has the most NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Tournament appearances among active coaches (20)*

- Among NCAA men's soccer coaches across all divisions, has the 17th-most victories all-time
- Reigning Conference USA Coach of the Year

Berson has been at South Carolina from the beginning. He was hired to move the program to varsity status in 1978, and he quickly put Carolina on the map. He has gone on to mold the Gamecocks into consistent winners that compete for championships.

Before coming to Carolina in 1978, Berson went 11-5-0 in one season at The Citadel, making his overall record 450-187-61, a winning percentage of 68.8 percent. In 2006, Berson became one of five active (at that time) Division I coaches and the 10th alltime to reach the 400 -victory milestone when his Gamecocks defeated UAB, 2-0, in a televised contest at Stone Stadium. Berson now has a 439-182-61 record at South Carolina.
Berson has made his mark on the college soccer world by taking the Gamecocks to 20 NCAA Tournaments. The Gamecocks have advanced to at least the second round 11 times and have four quarterfinal and two Final Four appearances. In 1993, the Gamecocks advanced to the NCAA Championship game.

Though Carolina has been independent during the majority of the program's tenure, the Gamecocks have captured four conference titles under Berson's leadership. Carolina won the 1993 Metro Conference Championship in one of its two years competing in the conference. The Gamecocks joined Conference USA in 2005 and promptly claimed the league's tournament championship and automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament, while Carolina also won the C-USA Championship Tournament in 2010 and collected the regular season championship in 2011.

South Carolina saw continued success during the 2011 campaign, earning the Conference USA regular season crown with a stellar 6-1-1 mark in league contests. The Gamecocks earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament and held hosting duties in the event's first round. Several Gamecocks earned postseason accolades from the league and NSCAA, including C-USA First Team member Bradlee Baladez and AllFreshman honoree Braeden Troyer.

South Carolina won the 2010 Conference USA Tournament Championship, earning the No. 7 national seed in the NCAA Tournament en route to a first-round bye. The home field advantage propelled the Gamecocks to a 1-0 win over Duke during the second round, advancing the squad to the Round of 16 . South Carolina concluded the season ranked No. 12 in the final NSCAA Top 25 Poll, while the team also earned the NSCAA's top team academic award.

South Carolina is very successful in its recruiting, bringing in a top-20 recruiting class in 2006, while in 2007 the South Carolina recruiting class ranked No. 10, the 2008 class ranked No. 14, the 2009 class No. 23 , the 2010 class ranked No. 16 and the most recent 2011 class ranked No. 11 in the nation according to CollegeSoccerNews.com.

A 1971 graduate of Summit (N.J.) High School, Berson attended the University of North Carolina and received his bachelor of arts degree in journalism in 1975. Berson played on the Tar Heel soccer squad for four years, one as a midfielder and the other three in goal. As a senior, Berson received the UNC Educational Foundation Award and was a member of the Academic ACC Honor Roll. Berson earned his master's of education degree in sport administration from Ohio University in 1977.

Born March 16, 1953, in Hartford, Conn., Berson is married to the former Shauna Hopkins, a South Carolina alum, of Columbia. They have two children, Erin Rhea, and Luke William. Erin graduated from South Carolina in 2009, and Luke is currently enrolled at the University of South Carolina in the Moore School of Business.
