### A South Carolina win over Florida State would...

- \* Give the Gamecocks wins in five of their last eight bowl contests. South Carolina lost its first eight bowl games before recording a victory in the 1995 Carquest Bowl over West Virginia.
- \* Give the Gamecocks 10 wins in a season for just the second time in school history (1984).
- \* Ensure a spot in the final Associated Press and Coaches' Top 25 for the first time since 2001.
- \* Give South Carolina its fifth win in its last six tries against the Atlantic Coast Conference.
- \* Give Steve Spurrier his 45th win at South Carolina, tying him with Jim Carlen for second all-time.
- \* Be the Gamecocks' first victory over Florida State since 1984, which was also the last time Carolina won 10 games.
- \* Be South Carolina's fourth win over a ranked opponent this season (#22 Georgia, #1 Alabama, #24 Florida).

### SETTING THE STAGE

• The No. 19/20 South Carolina Gamecocks (9-4, 5-3 SEC), the champions of the Southeastern Conference's Eastern Division, face the No. 23 Florida State Seminoles (9-4, 6-2 ACC), the champions of the Atlantic Coast Conference's Atlantic Division, in the 43rd annual Chick-fil-A Bowl on Friday, December 31, 2010. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, Ga.

• Both teams are the runners-up in their respective conferences. The Gamecocks fell to No. 1-ranked Auburn 56-17 in their first appearance in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 4. The same night, the Seminoles dropped a hard-fought decision to Virginia Tech, 44-33, in the ACC Championship Game. It will be the first time that the Chick-fil-A Bowl has featured the runners-up of both the SEC and ACC championship games.

### A LITTLE HISTORY

This is the 117th season of intercollegiate football at the University of South Carolina, dating back to 1892. It is the 104th consecutive year in which South Carolina has competed on the gridiron. The University did not field a team in either 1893 or 1906. Carolina owns an all-time record of 543-540-44. The school's only conference championship came in the 1969 season when it posted a perfect 6-0 record to win the Atlantic Coast Conference title under head coach Paul Dietzel. The 2010 season marked the first divisional championship for South Carolina as the Gamecocks won the SEC Eastern Division crown with a 5-3 league mark under head coach **Steve Spurrier**.

### IN THE NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

The Chick-fil-A Bowl represents the 10th time in 14 games this season that football fans across the country can watch the Gamecocks live, including seven appearances on either ESPN or ESPN2. CBS also carried two contests nationally, including the Gamecocks' upset of then-No. 1 Alabama. Carolina played on the SEC Network twice and once on FSN. Seven of Carolina's nine games against SEC competition were televised nationally.

### IT'S BEEN A WHILE

The Gamecocks have played in this bowl game once before, when it was called the Peach Bowl. And it's been a long time since that last postseason appearance in Atlanta - 41 years and two venues ago, as a matter of fact. South Carolina faced West Virginia in the second annual Peach Bowl on Dec. 30, 1969, at Georgia Tech's Grant Field. The Mountaineers defeated the ACC Champion Gamecocks 14-3 in that contest. Kicker Bill DuPre provided the only points for the Gamecocks with a second-quarter field goal, and WVU put the game away with two fourth-quarter interceptions and the game-clinching touchdown with 23 seconds remaining.

### IT'S ALSO NOT BEEN THAT LONG

It had been 13,578 days between indoor football games for South Carolina - Sept. 21, 1973 at the Astrodome, and Dec. 4, 2010, at the Georgia Dome. But the Gamecocks will only have 27 days between games at the Georgia Dome, marking the third indoor game in school history and the second straight game at the same neutral-site venue.

### GOING BOWLING

The 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl will mark Carolina's 16th bowl appearance overall. The Gamecocks are 4-11 all-time in bowl games. They dropped their first eight bowl appearances, won three straight, and now have lost three of their last four bowl contests. Here's a look at the Gamecocks' bowl appearances:

### ABOUT FLORIDA STATE

The Florida State Seminoles, at 9-4 overall and 6-2 in the ACC, are in their first year under head coach Jimbo Fisher. The Seminoles won the ACC's Atlantic Division this year and will be playing in their nation-leading 29th consecutive bowl game. Last season, longtime coach Bobby Bowden retired after leading FSU to a 7-6 mark, including a Gator Bowl victory over West Virginia.

### GAMECOCKS AND SEMINOLES

• This is the 19th all-time meeting between South Carolina and Florida State. The Seminoles hold a 15-3 advantage in the series, including a 7-2 mark in Columbia and an 8-1 edge





in Tallahassee. This will be the first meeting at a neutral site.

- Florida State won the last meeting 38-10 on Nov. 9, 1991; the Seminoles were ranked No. 1 in the nation at the time. Carolina would join the SEC and Florida State would move into the ACC the following season, ending a run of the two independents playing each other in 9 of the previous 10 seasons.

- The last Gamecock victory came during the "Black Magic" season of 1984 when No. 5 Carolina earned a 38-26 home win over the No. 11 Seminoles to improve to 9-0 and move up to No. 2 in the nation. That 1984 season remains the only time in school history that South Carolina has won 10 games. A win over the Seminoles in the Chick-fil-A Bowl would give Carolina its second-ever 10-win season.

- Florida State has been ranked in nine of the previous 18 meetings; the Seminoles are ranked No. 23 coming into this contest. The Gamecocks have been ranked in three meetings. This will be the second time that Carolina, at No. 19/20, has been the higher-ranked team when the squads have met; the other was 1984 when the Gamecocks were No. 5 and the Seminoles were No. 11.

### TIES WITH FLORIDA STATE

- South Carolina has 18 players on its active roster from the state of Florida, the most from any state other than South Carolina. Five players hail from Jacksonville - **Corey Addison**, **Eric Baker**, **Mike Triglia**, **Tramell Williams** and **Shaq Wilson** - the most from any one municipality outside of South Carolina.

- Florida State boasts two players from the state of South Carolina on its roster. S Justin Bright (Duncan) and DL Everett Dawkins (Spartanburg) both played at Byrnes HS alongside current Gamecocks **Marcus Lattimore** and **Nick Jones**.

### GAMECOCKS VS. ACC

South Carolina, a former member of the Atlantic Coast Conference from 1953-70, is 194-240-22 all-time against its former league. Clemson is the opponent Carolina has faced the most (107 meetings), followed by NC State (57), Wake Forest

(56) and North Carolina (55). The Gamecocks left the ACC in 1971 and the Seminoles joined the league in 1992.

### SPURRIER VS. FLORIDA STATE

South Carolina head coach **Steve Spurrier** is 5-8-1 all-time against Florida State with all 13 meetings coming while the Head Ball Coach for the Florida Gators. Almost all of those 13 meetings carried national championship implications as one or both teams were ranked in the nation's top 10 in all 14 meetings. The teams met twice on neutral fields, both at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans in the Sugar Bowl. Spurrier's Gators fell to Bobby Bowden's Seminoles 23-17 in the 1994 rematch following the series' only tie on Nov. 26 in Tallahassee. Then, in 1996, Spurrier and the Gators whipped Florida State 52-20 in the Sugar Bowl to earn Florida's first national championship.

### SPURRIER VS. FISHER

This will be the first meeting between **Steve Spurrier** and Jimbo Fisher as head coaches as this is Fisher's first year as a collegiate head coach. The two have, however, been on opposite sidelines before. During Spurrier's tenure at Florida, Fisher served as the quarterbacks coach at Auburn from 1993-98 and the offensive coordinator at LSU in 2000 and 2001. In those eight meetings, Spurrier was 6-2, falling to Auburn in both 1993 and 1994 before rolling off four straight wins over those Tigers, then defeating LSU in both 2000 and 2001.

### SPURRIER VS. ACC

**Steve Spurrier**, who was head coach at Duke from 1987-89 and won the 1989 ACC Championship, owns a 24-21-2 all-time record against current members of the Atlantic Coast Conference. He has faced Florida State 13 times, the most of any non-SEC opponent. He is 5-8-1 against the Seminoles, 4-5 against Clemson (3-3 at Carolina), 4-1-1 against NC State (2-0 at Carolina), 4-0 against North Carolina (1-0 at Carolina), 3-0 against Georgia Tech, 2-2 against Maryland, 1-2 vs. both Wake Forest and Virginia, and 0-1 against Miami. He has never faced Virginia Tech or Boston College.

### SPURRIER IN BOWL GAMES

**Steve Spurrier** owns a 7-9 record in his 16 bowl games as a head coach. He is 1-3 in bowl games while coaching at South Carolina. Spurrier dropped a 38-31 decision to Missouri in the 2005 Independence Bowl before getting past Houston 44-36 in the 2006 Liberty Bowl. He then fell to Iowa 31-10 in the 2009 Outback Bowl and dropped a 20-7 decision to Connecticut in the 2010 Papajohns.com. Spurrier is 1-1 in bowl games vs. Florida State, falling in the 1995 Sugar Bowl 23-17 and winning the 1997 Sugar Bowl 52-20 to clinch the 1996 national championship for Florida.

### WE TYPICALLY PLAY OUTDOORS

- And by "typically," we mean 1,125 out of 1,127 games in the 117-year history of South Carolina football. The 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl at the Georgia Dome will be just the third indoor game in school history - but the second in a row after the Gamecocks played in the SEC Championship on Dec. 4 in the same building.

### SPURRIER IN ELITE COMPANY

Head coach Steve Spurrier is one of just four coaches to record 100 or more wins as an SEC coach against SEC competition (he also has three wins against SEC teams while coaching at Duke). With the win over Alabama, he now ranks second all-time among SEC coaches in conference victories. Here is how he stacks up against some of the other great coaches in SEC history:

## In Memory of Kenny McKinley • 1987-2010

South Carolina's football family was stunned and saddened upon learning of the passing of former Gamecock standout wide receiver Kenny McKinley.

McKinley, 23, died Sept. 20 in Denver, Colo. He was drafted by the Denver Broncos in the fifth round of the 2009 NFL Draft and appeared in eight games for the Broncos in 2009 before being placed on injured reserve with a knee injury. He was back on IR in 2010 after another preseason knee injury.

McKinley finished his South Carolina career as the school's all-time leader in both career receptions (207) and career receiving yards (2,781). He also set a school record by catching a pass in 43 straight games from 2005-08. He scored 19 touchdowns during his Gamecock career.

South Carolina has worn a black decal with McKinley's #11 on its helmets in each game since McKinley's death.

• The only other indoor game in school history came on Sept. 21, 1973, as the Gamecocks traveled to the "Eighth Wonder of the World" to face Houston in the Astrodome. The Cougars took a 27-19 victory that day, and the Gamecocks have played in the great outdoors for 438 straight games until this month's SEC Championship.

• That 1973 game against Houston served as a footnote to another historic sporting event. The night before, in the same venue, Billie Jean King and Bobby Riggs squared off in the famed "Battle of the Sexes" tennis match. The Gamecock players and coaches skipped their customary pre-game movie to attend the match, and they watched along with 30,472 at the Astrodome and an estimated 50 million others on an ABC worldwide broadcast as King defeated Riggs 6-4, 6-3, 6-3, in the most-watched tennis match of all-time.

### NINE WAS FINE, BUT TEN? EPIC WIN

Prior to this season, South Carolina had reached the eight-win mark just nine previous times in school history. With wins over Troy and Clemson, the Gamecocks hit the 8-win mark for the 10th time ever and crossed the 9-win plateau for just the third time in Gamecock annals. Only once has Carolina logged a 10-win season: the 1984 "Black Magic" team posted a 10-1 regular-season record and earned a berth in the Gator Bowl. ### STRONG SCHEDULE

A total of 10 of South Carolina's 11 FBS opponents will participate in the postseason this year. The Gamecocks defeated Southern Miss, Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Florida, Troy and Clemson, who are all headed to bowl games. All four of Carolina's losses came to teams playing in the postseason, three of which were to teams participating in BCS bowls (Auburn twice, Arkansas, Kentucky).

### OUT OF THEIR LEAGUE

South Carolina finished the regular season 4-0 outside of SEC play after defeating Furman and Southern Miss in September and taking down Troy and Clemson to wrap up the season. They are 21-6 in non-conference games under **Steve**

**Spurrier**, including wins in 19 of their last 23 non-league tilts. The year-by-year breakdown: 2005 (2-2); 2006 (5-0); 2007 (3-1); 2008 (3-2); 2009 (4-1); 2010 (4-0). Carolina will have a chance to make it 5-0 with a victory over Florida State in the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

### ORANGE CRUSHED

South Carolina swept through the "Orange Crush" portion of its schedule with a perfect 3-0 record against Tennessee, Florida and Clemson, beating all three teams in the same season for the first time in school history. Only twice before had the Gamecocks managed a 2-1 mark in the season-ending stretch: the Gamecocks beat Tennessee and Clemson but lost to Florida in 1992, and Carolina earned victories over the Vols and Gators in 2005 before falling in the season finale to the Tigers.

### THE BEASTS OF THE EAST

Prior to South Carolina's victory over Florida, only the Gators, Georgia and Tennessee had ever won the SEC Eastern Division. In addition to becoming the fourth different SEC East team to head to Atlanta, the Gamecocks defeated the Gators, Vols and Bulldogs in the same season for the first time in school history.

### WINNING MORE OFTEN

• South Carolina has won nine games for the third time in school history (and eight or more for just the 10th time). But more impressive is the fact that the win over Clemson was the 29th in the last four seasons, which sets a school record for the best four-year stretch in history. The Gamecocks had managed four-year stretches of 28 wins on three occasions - the 1990, 2008 and 2009 senior classes experienced a 28-win career.

• With the win over Florida to secure their seventh victory of the year, the Gamecocks assured themselves of posting three straight winning seasons and seven consecutive seasons of at least a .500 record. Previously, the Gamecocks went 6-5 in 2004, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 6-6 in 2007, and 7-6 in both 2008 and 2009. The team has now equaled a school-record stretch from 1928-34 in which the Gamecocks had seven straight seasons at .500 or better.

### GAMECOCKS IN THE POLLS

South Carolina is ranked in the most recent Associated Press Poll and USA Today Coaches Poll for the 14th consecutive week. Only two other times in school history have the Gamecocks stayed in the polls for that many straight editions:

• The Gamecocks appeared at No. 19 in the AP poll the week of Oct. 31, 1987, then proceeded to defeat NC State 48-0. Carolina climbed as high as No. 8 before losing the regular-season finale to No. 2 Miami, then dropping a 30-13 decision to No. 7 LSU in the Gator Bowl; Carolina finished 15th in the final poll. The Gamecocks were then ranked No. 19 in the 1988 preseason ranking and stayed in the poll nine straight weeks until a 59-0 loss at Florida State on Nov. 5, 1988. Total weeks in the rankings: 18.

• After defeating Ohio State in the 2001 Outback Bowl, Carolina finished at No. 19 in the final AP poll of 2000. The Gamecocks then stayed in the rankings every week of the 2001 season, climbing as high as No. 9 in the polls and finishing at No. 13 after another defeat of the Buckeyes in Tampa. Carolina was then ranked in the first two polls of the 2002 season before a 34-21 loss at Virginia dropped them from the rankings. Total weeks in the rankings: 18.

### OPENING STATEMENT

• South Carolina has been at its best in the first half, outscoring opponents 259-138 in the first two quarters, including an 130-61 edge in the opening stanza. The Arkansas game and the second meeting with Auburn were the only time this season the Gamecocks have trailed at the half; Carolina has led by as many as 49 at the half (56-7 vs. Troy).

• This is a stark contrast from last season, when the Gamecocks were outscored 162-134 in the opening half, including





an 81-65 deficit in the first quarter. In 2009, the Gamecocks' best quarter was the third as they held an 87-39 scoring advantage; this year, the Gamecocks have controlled the third quarter by a 75-70 count.

### GAMECOCKS AS A RANKED TEAM

Under **Steve Spurrier**, the Gamecocks have been a ranked team heading into 28 contests. Carolina is 15-13 in those opportunities when appearing in the national rankings. In home games, Carolina is 10-4 when ranked under Spurrier, including a 7-1 mark at home over the last two seasons. Carolina is 5-8 in road contests as a ranked squad under Spurrier and 0-1 at neutral sites. This will be the first time Carolina has played in a bowl game as a ranked team since the 2002 Outback Bowl.

### SIZE MATTERS

The tallest player on the Gamecock roster is defensive end **Devin Taylor**, who checks in at 6-7. The shortest player is tailback **Bryce Sherman**, listed at 5-4. The Gamecocks have 11 players who tip the scales at 300 pounds or better, including eight offensive linemen: **Roquevious Watkins** (325), **Corey Robinson** (317), **Jarriel King** (324), **T.J. Johnson** (302), **Terrence Campbell** (305), **Kyle Nunn** (304), **Steven Singleton** (303), **Garrett Chisolm** (303). Defensively, junior college transfer **Byron Jerideau** (339) leads the way, along with **Kenny Davis** (303) and **J.T. Suratt** (300). Former track sprinters **Bryce Sherman** (155) and **Marty Markett** (168), freshman receiver **Ace Sanders** (165) and freshman punter **Patrick Fish** (170) are the only players that check in at 170 pounds or less.

### WORKING OVERTIME

The Gamecocks have played just two overtime games in their history, both at Tennessee. They dropped a 23-20 decision in Knoxville on Sept. 27, 2003, then fell by a 27-24 score on Oct. 27, 2007, also at Neyland Stadium. Every other SEC team has played at least three overtime games since the rule was established in 1996.

### THEY PAY TO SEE THE GAMECOCKS PLAY

- South Carolina averaged 76,668 fans for its seven home games at Williams-Brice Stadium this season. The largest crowd came on Oct. 9 as 82,993 fans packed Williams-Brice Stadium to witness the historic Gamecock upset of No. 1 Alabama. That crowd was the 19th-biggest in Williams-Brice Stadium history and the largest since 83,704 were on hand for the Gamecocks' contest against then-No. 2 Georgia in 2008.
- With more than 7,500 Gamecock fans in attendance, a total of 90,558 packed Ben Hill Griffin Stadium in Gainesville, Fla., as the Gamecocks clinched their first SEC Eastern Division title on Nov. 13 with a 36-14 win over Florida. It was the biggest crowd to watch South Carolina in 2010.

### SUCCESSFUL ERA

South Carolina is enjoying one of its most successful stretches in the history of the program. Since coach **Steve Spurrier's** arrival prior to the 2005 season, Carolina has:

- Won the school's first SEC Eastern Division title.
- Produced the winningest senior class in school history with 29 victories over the last four seasons.
- Had back-to-back senior classes leave with a school-record 28 victories in their four-year careers. Only once previously had 28 wins over four years happened (1987-90).
- Put together three straight seven-plus win seasons for the first time in school history.
- Posted seven straight non-losing seasons, the longest stretch since seven straight such years from 1928-34.
- Been bowl-eligible for seven consecutive years, the longest streak in the modern era.
- Won nine games in a season for the third time in school history.
- A head coach that has taken Carolina to five bowl games, the first coach in school history to do so, while needing just six years to accomplish the feat.
- Developed a distinct home-field advantage. The Gamecocks have gone 6-1 at home for two straight seasons and have won a total of 14 out of their last 16 home games, dating back to the penultimate home game of the 2008 season (a 27-6 win over Tennessee on Nov. 1, 2008).

### FIRST TIME FOR EVERYTHING

Leave it to a freshman and a sophomore to make Carolina history. For the first time in school history, South Carolina has a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver in the same season. With 102 yards vs. Troy, **RB Marcus Lattimore** eclipsed the 1,000-yard barrier to mark the ninth 1,000-yard rushing season in school history. Sophomore **WR Alshon Jeffery** had already topped the 1,000-yard receiving mark heading into the Troy game.

### MARVELOUS MARCUS

So much for freshman jitters. In 12 games (did not play at Vanderbilt), freshman tailback **Marcus Lattimore** has rushed for 1,198 yards on 248 carries and caught 26 passes for 364 yards, scoring 19 of South Carolina's 47 offensive touchdowns on the season. For some perspective:

- Lattimore is South Carolina's all-time leader in single-season touchdowns with 19, breaking Harold Green's record of 16 set in 1987. He is one shy of the SEC freshman record of 20, set by Tennessee's Reggie Cobb in 1987.
- His 114 points this season breaks a 23-year-old school record, previously held by **PK Collin Mackie** (113 points in 1987). He will be the first non-placekicker to lead South Carolina in scoring since 2005 when **Sidney Rice** scored 78 points.
- His 1,198 rushing yards gives him the third-best single-season in Carolina history, behind only the 1979 and 1980 seasons of **George Rogers**, who won the Heisman Trophy with 1,891 yards in 1980.
- Lattimore's 40-carry, 212-yard performance in the SEC East-clinching win at Florida ranked as one of the top performances in school history. The 40 carries broke a 36-year-old school record (Ron Bass, 39 vs. North Carolina in 1974) and the 212 yards marked the 8th-best rushing total in school history and the best ever against an SEC opponent. In the victory over Florida, Lattimore surpassed **Thomas Dendy** for the South Carolina freshman rushing record. Dendy had held the record since 1982, when he amassed 848 yards.
- His 184-yard effort against Tennessee ranked as the 16th-best game in school history, surpassing his own 182-yard effort against Georgia on Sept. 11. It also surpassed a 182-yard

effort by **Steve Wadiak** against George Washington on Oct. 27, 1950.

- Only **Brandon Bennett**, with a 278-yard outburst as a freshman against East Tennessee State on Oct. 5, 1991, has run for more yards in one game at South Carolina.

### ALSHON'S ALL RIGHT

Sophomore **WR Alshon Jeffery**, a finalist for the 2010 Biletnikoff Award, has put together the best season by a South Carolina wide receiver in history. He has amassed 1,387 yards on 79 receptions - both single-season Carolina records - and has scored nine touchdowns. He leads the SEC and is fourth in the nation in total receiving yards, and he has moved up to seventh on the all-time South Carolina receiving charts. With a 100-yard game against Florida State - of which he already has seven this season - he could move up to fourth on the Carolina receiving roll, passing **Jermale Kelly**, **Robert Brooks** and **Sidney Rice** on the all-time charts.

### THE 100 CLUB

- In its 21-7 victory at Vanderbilt, South Carolina had a player rush for 100 yards and two players receive for 100 yards in the same game for the first time in school history. **RB Brian Maddox** came off the bench to rack up 146 yards on 24 carries with one touchdown, while **WR Alshon Jeffery** caught nine passes for 155 yards - including a show-stopping 72-yard touchdown - and **WR Tori Gurley** shattered his previous career highs with a school-record 14 catches for 112 yards and a score.
- Two other times this season, Carolina has had a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in the same game. Against Georgia, **RB Marcus Lattimore** carried 37 times for 182 yards while **WR Alshon Jeffery** caught seven passes for 103 yards. The same duo combined went 100/100 again vs. Troy as Lattimore gained 102 rushing yards on just 7 carries while Jeffery hauled in five passes for 123 yards.
- Jeffery has topped the 100-yard receiving mark seven times this year, with a career- and season-best coming with 192 yards at Auburn. Lattimore has five 100-yard games - 212 vs. Florida, 182 vs. Georgia, 184 vs. Tennessee. 133 (rec.) at UK and 102 vs. Troy - and Maddox and Gurley have one apiece.

### GARCIA'S OUR GUY

- Junior **QB Stephen Garcia** has completed 205-of-315 passes (65.1%) for 2,816 yards and 20 touchdowns through 13 games. He will likely finish the year with one of the top 3 single-season completion percentages in school history; Steve Taneyhill holds the record at 67.1% in 1995. Garcia is third on the all-time passing charts at Carolina, amassing 6,510 yards on 509 completions in his three years as a Gamecock.
- Garcia has played in 34 games for the Gamecocks, starting 29 over three seasons (18-11 as a starter), including 27 consecutive starts. He is 13-3 when starting at home, 4-6 on the road and 0-3 at neutral sites.
- He posted back-to-back 300-yard passing games with a career-high 382 at Kentucky and another 355 at Vanderbilt, where he tied a career-best with 31 completions on 39 attempts.
- He had what coach **Steve Spurrier** called "the best game of his career" against No. 1-ranked Alabama, completing 17-of-20 passes (85%) for 201 yards and three touchdowns. He started the day 9-for-9 for 94 yards in the first half.
- Garcia ran for a pair of touchdowns against Southern Miss, the first time in his career to amass multiple TD runs in one game; he also had two scoring runs vs. Tennessee and one each vs. Florida and Troy.
- Garcia currently ranks in the all-time top 10 in the following:
  - Career Passing Yards: 3rd (6,510)
  - Career Completions: 3rd (509)
  - Career Pass Attempts: 3rd (863)
  - Career Passing TDs: 3rd (43)
  - Career Completion Pct.: 4th (58.1%)

### BUT SHAW'S BEEN SHARP

True freshman **Connor Shaw** has played extensively in six games, setting a career-high with 5 completions on 8 attempts vs. Troy. He was 4-of-5 in appearances vs. Southern Miss (where he threw his first career TD pass to D.L. Moore), Furman and the SEC Championship, and he was 4-of-8 with two interceptions at Auburn. He completed 2-of-2 passes for 20 yards and rushed four times for 23 yards vs. Arkansas before leaving the game after a late hit out of bounds. Shaw also played sparingly vs. Kentucky and Tennessee.

### WHAT A RUSH

- South Carolina has a strong running game, as evidenced by 54 carries vs. Florida, 52 carries against Georgia and more rushing yards than passing yards in four games this year. Freshman **Marcus Lattimore** is a big reason for that, gaining 1,198 yards on 248 carries and scoring 19 touchdowns (17 rush, 2 rec) in his first 12 games. His 40-carry, 212-yard, 3-TD performance against Florida was a game for the Carolina record books, as were his performances against Georgia and Tennessee.
- Senior **Brian Maddox** came off the bench to give an inspired performance at Vanderbilt, rushing for a career-high 146 yards on 24 carries. Of those 146 yards, 123 came in the second half.

### REVERSAL OF FORTUNE

Coming into this season, South Carolina had finished last in the SEC in rushing yards each of the last two years. Carolina ran for 121.23 yards per game in 2009 and just 94.08 yards per game in 2008. But this season, the Gamecocks' rushing attack has been one of their strengths as they now rank eighth in the league and 60th nationally with 155.54 yards per game.

### SOME GLORY FOR TORI

Sophomore **WR Tori Gurley** had a breakout game against Vanderbilt, hauling in 14 passes for 112 yards, setting career-highs in both categories. His 14 receptions also tied the school record for catches in a single game, matching **Zola Davis'** 14 catches vs. Vanderbilt in 1998 and **Kenny McKinley's** 14 receptions at Tennessee in 2007. Gurley has caught touchdown passes this year vs. Furman, Auburn, Vanderbilt and Arkansas.

### FAST LEARNER

Sophomore **T.J. Johnson** moved to center for the first time against Southern Miss after starting every game at right guard during the 2009 season. He obviously picked up some things quickly as he was named the **SEC's Offensive Lineman of the Week** after helping pave the way for 449 yards of total offense in the opener against Southern Miss. Johnson has started every game of his college career.

### NOT AS MUCH SHUFFLE THIS YEAR

South Carolina has settled into a groove with its starting offensive line, making few changes during the course of the season. This year, seven different Gamecocks have started on the offensive line as opposed to 10 different starters during the 2009 season. Through 13 games, Carolina has started four different offensive fronts; in 13 games last year, the Gamecocks started the game with 10 different combinations on the front line. Listed below are active Gamecock offensive linemen and their starts at each position (Game 13 starters in bold):

### IN THE CLUTCH, FIND THE BIG GUY

South Carolina is 14th in the nation in converting third downs as the Gamecocks have kept the chains moving 49.1% of the time (82-of-167). A big reason for that is the clutch performances of sophomore **WR Alshon Jeffery**. Of those 82 third-down conversions, 17 of those have been successful because of passes to Jeffery. On average, Carolina needed 6.1 yards on those third-down passes, and Jeffery's catches on those plays averaged 15.0 yards apiece. And keeping those drives alive has paid off tremendously: Carolina has scored on 14 of the 16 drives in which Jeffery made a third-down catch (10 TDs, 4 FGs).

## THE GAMECOCK DEFENSE

• So far in 2010, the Gamecocks have allowed 298 points through 13 games (22.9 avg.). The Gamecocks rank sixth in the SEC and 48th in the nation in scoring defense. However, the defense has been at its best against non-conference opponents allowing just 64 points in those four contests (16.0 game).

• Since **Ellis Johnson** took over the South Carolina defense prior to the 2008 season, success has come quickly. The Gamecocks finished in the nation's top 15 in total defense in each of the last two seasons, posting a 15th-place showing last season and a 13th place mark in 2008. Seven of 11 starters returned from a defense that gave up 300.69 yards per game in 2009.

## THOSE RESPONSIBLE HAVE BEEN SACKED

• As a team, South Carolina has set a school record with 39 sacks through 13 games, an average of 3.00 per game, which leads the SEC in overall total and ranks second in average. That number also rates the Gamecocks No. 10 in the nation in sacks per game. A total of 12 different players have recorded at least one sack this year, and nine of those have dropped the quarterback multiple times.

• Junior **DE Melvin Ingram** had his best game as a Gamecock with 2.0 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss in the victory over Alabama. He is having the best season of his career with 8.0 sacks among 23 total tackles this year, giving him the team lead and ranking him third in the SEC in sacks. He needs 2.0 more sacks this year to tie for South Carolina's single-season record.

• Sophomore **DE Devin Taylor** had a huge game against Georgia, picking up a career-high two sacks and equaling his high-water mark with 3.0 tackles for loss, including a sack of Bulldog quarterback Aaron Murray on the game's final play. Taylor also tallied 2.0 sacks in the win over Vanderbilt. Taylor now has 7.5 sacks on the year to rank fourth in the SEC.

• With seven sacks against Alabama and Furman, the Gamecocks had their best outings since recording eight sacks against Central Florida on Sept. 6, 1997.

• **CB Stephon Gilmore** had two sacks against Alabama and one against Arkansas, and he now has 6.0 for his career. He has done even more against the pass - he picked off a Furman pass and returned it 80 yards for a touchdown to seal the victory over the Paladins on Sept. 18. It was the second interception of Gilmore's career, and the first returned for a touchdown since **Eric Norwood** had a 35-yard runback against Georgia last season.

## CLIFF NOTES

**DE Cliff Matthews** moved into eighth place all-time at South Carolina with 14.5 career sacks, passing **Phil Ellis** (14.0) with 1.0 sacks against Clemson. He passed **Eric Sullivan**, **Fitzgerald Davis** and **Troy Duke** for ninth all-time as he had 2.0 sacks in the Tennessee game. Matthews needs 0.5 sacks to tie three Gamecocks for fifth in school history.

## WHAT A RUSH - OR NOT

• South Carolina has the SEC's No. 1 rushing defense and the ninth-best in the nation, holding opposing offenses to 104.3 yards per game on the ground. Opponents have been held under 100 rushing yards in nine of 13 games, including defending national champion Alabama, which rushed for 264 yards in last season's meeting, and two-time defending SEC East Champion Florida. Under **Steve Spurrier**, the Gamecocks are 21-3 when holding opposing offenses under 100 rushing yards.

• Florida rushed for just 35 yards in the Gamecocks' SEC East Division-clinching victory, marking the second-lowest rushing total allowed by a Spurrier-coached Gamecock squad. Only a 34-yard effort by Tennessee on Nov. 1, 2008, was lower than Florida's output that day.

• Alabama's potent rushing offense was held to just 36 yards by the Gamecocks on Oct. 9, the third-fewest rushing yards allowed by a Steve Spurrier-coached Carolina team.

• Furman managed just 51 yards on 27 carries (1.9 avg.), ranking as the fifth-fewest rushing yards by an opponent under Spurrier. Georgia and Clemson each managed just 61 yards on the ground.

## MOMENTUM CHANGERS

• South Carolina has scored six defensive touchdowns this season, including at least one defensive score in four of the last five games. It marks the most defensive scores by a Gamecock squad since joining the SEC in 1992; accurate records are spotty prior to that.

• Carolina had two defensive touchdowns in the 69-24 win over Troy. **SS D.J. Swearinger** picked off a pass and returned it 22 yards for a score late in the second quarter, and

then **DE Chaz Sutton** gained control of a batted ball on the final play of the half and raced 56 yards to give Carolina a 56-7 halftime lead. It was the first time for the Gamecocks to score two defensive TDs in a game since **Eric Norwood** returned a pair of fumbles for scores against Kentucky in 2007.

• **CB Stephon Gilmore** had the first defensive score with an 80-yard interception return vs. Furman. **DE Devin Taylor** picked off a Tennessee pass and raced 24 yards for a score in the third quarter of that game, and **DE Byron McKnight** scooped up an Arkansas fumble (caused by a Gilmore sack) at the 1-yard line and stepped into the end zone for another score. **SPUR Antonio Allen** was the latest Gamecock defender to put six on the board as he picked off a Kyle Parker pass and returned it 37 yards to give Carolina a 29-7 lead over Clemson.

## SEEING RED

A big reason for Carolina's success has been its red-zone defense. Opponents have been held scoreless in 13 of 45 trips inside the Carolina 20-yard-line, ranking the Gamecocks 10th in the country in that category. Below is a list of the nation's top teams in red-zone defense:

## DOUBLE DUTY

• Senior **Spencer Lanning** is in his second year handling both the kicking and punting duties. Last year, Lanning set a school record for consistency by connecting on 17-of-20 field goal attempts - including 12 in a row at one point - for an .850 field goal percentage. He also hit 28-of-29 extra point attempts with his only miss by virtue of a blocked kick. He led the team in scoring last year with 79 points, the sixth-best single season in school history. In addition, Lanning has a career punting average of 42.4 yards per kick over two seasons with a long of 58.

• Through 13 games, Lanning has punted 52 times for an average of 44.2 yards per punt, ranking him fourth in the SEC and 21st in the nation in punting average. He is also 16-for-23 on field goal attempts on the season, including a long of 51 yards. Lanning's longest streak of made field goals was seven in a row, beginning with the Arkansas game and ending against Clemson.

• Lanning has been named **SEC Special Teams Player of the Week** twice this year, earning the honor after the Florida and Clemson games. He connected on three field goal attempts in each game and was stellar in his punting duties as well.

### THE SHERMANATOR RETURNS

With **Chris Culliver** out for the season, 5-foot-4 sophomore **Bryce Sherman** is slated to handle the kickoff return duties for the rest of the season. Sherman has returned 33 kicks this year for 675 yards, an average of 20.5 yards per return. He had a career-long 37-yard runback into opponent territory against Arkansas.

### BOB FULTON - 1920-2010

Bob Fulton, the legendary "Voice of the Gamecocks," died Wednesday, Nov. 3, at age 89. Fulton retired in 1995 after 43 years as the radio voice of the Gamecocks, having announced thousands of Carolina football, basketball and baseball games. Fulton was an eight-time selection as the state of South Carolina's "Sportscaster of the Year." In 1990 he became the first non-coach or athlete to be inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame and in 1993 was inducted into the University of South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame.

### PLAYING AND BEATING THE BEST

South Carolina's best win over a ranked opponent came on Oct. 9, 2010, as the Gamecocks knocked off No. 1 Alabama, 35-21, at Williams-Brice Stadium. It surpassed a win in the 1981 season when it defeated No. 3 North Carolina by a 31-13 score.
