COLUMBIA, S.C. (Jan. 22, 2011) — The No. 21 South Carolina women's tennis team opened 2011 with a 6-1 victory against South Carolina State on Saturday at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C.

The Gamecocks caught a break before the match even started, as South Carolina State only had five healthy players for the match. The Bulldogs forfeited the No. 3 doubles position as well as No. 6 singles to put South Carolina on top 1-0 to start.

South Carolina quickly made the score 2-0 after earning an 8-3 triumph at No. 1 doubles with Dominika Kanakova and Dijana Stojic downing Akilah James and Daria Sekerina. The Gamecocks completed the sweep in doubles with Anya Morgina and Katerina Popova winning 8-3 against Laura Bosneag and Aimy Chen on court two.

In singles, the Gamecocks took advantage of their 2-0 lead, adding to it first with Madeleine Saari-Byström defeating Bosneag in straight sets 6-1, 6-1 at No. 3 singles to improve to 9-1 in 2010-11. Kanakova clinched the match for South Carolina with a 6-1, 6-3 triumph over Chen on court four.

The Bulldogs managed to register a win on court one with Sekerina defeating Morgina in three sets. Morgina took the first 6-2, but faltered 6-3 in the second. With the team outcome already decided, the two played a super tiebreaker for the third set. Sekerina held a 7-5 advantage after the second changeover and then went ahead 8-5. Morgina countered to win the next two points, but Sekerina answered back by taking the next two rallies to earn a 10-7 win.

Stojic grabbed South Carolina's fifth point, coming back from an early 4-1 first-set deficit versus James at No. 2 singles to win 6-4, 6-1. Josefin Andersson closed out the day with a win on court five by defeating Fanni Fricska, taking the first set 6-2 and then earning the victory after Fricska retired in the second set with Andersson leading 1-0.

South Carolina returns to action Tuesday when it travels to Greenville, S.C., to face Furman at $4\ \text{p.m.}$

GREEVILLE, S.C. (Jan. 25, 2011) — South Carolina's women's tennis team improved to 2-0 this season with a 6-1 victory against Furman on Tuesday in Greenville, S.C.

South Carolina swept through the doubles matches, winning by scores of 8-3, 8-5 and 8-5 on courts one through three. All the matches were tight midway through, with South Carolina leading 4-3 at one and two doubles and Furman ahead 3-2 on court three.

The Gamecocks' No. 1 team of Dominika Kanakova and Dijana Stojic went on to win the next four games to finish first with an 8-3 victory over Margaret Boyette and Lauren Kline. Josefin Andersson and Madeleine Saari-Byström clinched the doubles point with an 8-5 triumph against Monica Arguello on court two. Anya Morgina and Katerina Popova finished off doubles play downing Jennifer Betts and Katherine Oudin 8-5 at the No. 3 position.

South Carolina and Furman battled back and forth on the Paladins' four indoor courts to open singles play. After nine games on each court, the scores all stood at 5-4, with two in favor of the Gamecocks and two for Furman.

On court three, Saari-Byström fell behind 5-3 in the first before coming back to defeat Oudin 7-5 in the first set. In the second, she raced out to a 3-0 advantage before taking the final set 6-1 to put South Carolina on top 2-0. Saari-Byström has now won 10 matches in a row dating back to the fall.

Kanakova pulled off a come-from-behind victory at No. 4 singles to give Carolina its third point. She quickly fell behind 3-0 in the first set to Boyette, but she managed to split the next four games to make it 5-2. Kanakova then got back to 5-all and then led 6-5, but Boyette forced a tiebreaker. In the breaker, the two were tied 6-all after the second changeover, and Kanakova took the next point on her serve to set up her second set point. Kanakova fought through a long rally on Boyette's serve and won to take the set 7-6. Kanakova led 5-2 in the second before finishing off the match 6-3 to improve to 2-0 this spring.

The Paladins grabbed their lone point of the match a few minutes later with Arguello defeating Morgina in straight sets at No. 1 singles. Morgina led 5-3 in the first, but Arguello came back to win four consecutive games for a 7-5 first-set victory. In the second, Morgina held a 3-0 advantage before Arguello fought back again to force a tiebreaker. In the breaker, Morgina won the first point, but Arguello took the next five for a commanding 5-1 lead at the changeover. Morgina got the score to 6-3 before Arguello won the breaker and match on her serve 7-3.

Stojic provided South Carolina's fourth point on court two for the win. She posted a 6-4 win for the first set over Kline, but her opponent rallied for the second set 6-3. In the third, Kline took the first game, but it was the only lead she would see. The two were knotted at 3-all, and Stojic took control from there to earn a 6-3 victory.

The last matches placed on court for spots five and six both ended in Gamecock wins. Miljana Jocic defeated Susan Bitetti first in straight sets 6-1, 6-3, while Andersson needed three sets to beat Murray 6-2, 2-6, (11-9). Andersson fell behind 8-4 in the super tiebreaker before claiming five straight points for match point. Murray fought it off, but Andersson claimed the next two points for the victory.

South Carolina now heads to Coral Gables, Fla., to face Arizona State in the ITA Kick-Off Weekend.

The win snapped a three-match losing streak by the Gamecocks, who will host No. 33 Alabama on Sunday at 1 p.m.

"I hope it gives us the confidence we've been looking for," head coach Arlo Elkins said. "Any time you lose the doubles point and can come back, I think that shows good fight and it shows good focus in what we're trying to accomplish out here in singles. We've done that a couple times this year. We did it against Illinois up at Illinois and now we do it here against Auburn. It's very good to see and hopefully that will give us the confidence we need going in to Sunday's match with Alabama."

South Carolina jumped on the Tigers at the No. 1 position in doubles with Dominika Kanakova and Dijana Stojic taking down Paulina Schippers and Olivia Bennett 8-2. Bennett and Schippers won the first game of the match, but it was Kanakova and Stojic who claimed eight of the next nine games.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (March 27, 2011) — The No. 34 South Carolina women's tennis team suffered a 4-1 loss Sunday at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C., to No. 29 Ole Miss, snapping a five-match winning streak for the Gamecocks. The Rebels improved to 9-6 and 2-4 in the SEC with the win, while Carolina fell to 11-5 and 3-3 in the conference.

"I really didn't think our effort was lacking today," South Carolina head coach Arlo Elkins said. "I think we're working hard in practice, and we worked hard in these matches here today, so it has to be something else. So, if it's not the effort that we're putting in you have to look at what it is and I really think the way the matches turned out today, when every one of these matches got close, their girls looked more determined than ours did. I think we really have to look at our determination and we have to start getting mentally tougher in these tight matches."

The Gamecocks faltered in the doubles point, losing the first and second positions. At one, Kristi Boxx and Abby Guthrie defeated Dominika Kanakova and Dijana Stojic 8-3. After they finished, South Carolina had leads of 7-5 on court three and 7-6 on court two. Ole Miss, however, fought off multiple match points on court three in getting back to 7-all and eventually Caroline Rohde-Moe and Vivian Vlaar took an 8-7 lead over the South Carolina duo of Katerina Popova and Madeleine Saari-Byström.

That means we all have to try 100 percent. It's all about attitude. If we have a positive attitude we can beat anybody out here."

The Gamecocks earned a sweep in doubles to get the afternoon underway. South Carolina substituted Adriana Pereira for Miljana Jocic at the No. 2 spot to play with Anya Morgina and it proved to be an effective combination. Pereira and Morgina won the first six games against Misha Testerman and Marni Venter before closing out the contest with an 8-1 victory.

It appeared Dominika Kanakova and Dijana Stojic would have to win in order for the Gamecocks to snag the doubles point with Katerina Popova and Madeleine Saari-Byström trailing 6-2 on court three against Jessica Stiles and CeCe Witten. Popova and Saari-Byström, though, regrouped and claimed six consecutive games to earn an 8-6 win and clinch the point for South Carolina

At one, several games went to deuce in the early portion of the match, but Kanakova and Stojic grabbed a 4-1 lead after five games versus Megan Broderick and Khristina Blajkevitch. The Gamecocks answered back with a big upset on court one. Anya Morgina and Dominika Kanakova trailed No. 9-ranked Chelsey Gullickson and Kate Fuller 5-3, but the Carolina duo charged back to take a 7-5 lead. Morgina had her serve broken to make it 7-6, but the Gamecocks broke back against Gullickson in the next game to win 8-6.

At three, South Carolina had a 6-5 lead and nearly went up 7-5 after earning a 40-15 advantage on Miljana Jocic's serve, but Georgia's Cameron Ellis and Alex Anghelescu fought back to take the game. The two teams continued trading games back and forth until reaching a tiebreaker. With the score tied 2-all in the breaker, Jocic and Katerina Popova won four points in a row before winning 7-3 to lift Carolina to a 1-0 lead heading to singles.

"That match was amazing," Jocic said. "First of all, I was a little bit nervous. It's my last match playing at home and I wanted to play well so much that I couldn't really focus on the game. Pereira fell behind 4-1 in the second set before fighting her way into a tiebreaker to force a third set. GAINESVILLE, Fla. (April 16, 2011) — The No. 38 South Carolina women's tennis team dropped a 7-0 decision in Gainesville, Fla., on Saturday to No. 1-ranked Florida to wrap up regular-season play in 2011. South Carolina moved to 12-9 and 4-7 in the SEC with the loss, while the Gators improved to 22-1 and finished the year 11-0 in the conference for the outright SEC regular-season title.

Florida won two of three doubles contests to earn a 1-0 lead heading to singles play. On court two, No. 43-ranked Lauren Embree and Sofie Oyen held a 2-1 lead after the second changeover and then won five straight games to up 7-1 on Dijana Stojic and Josefin Andersson. Stojic and Andersson claimed the next two games to cut the margin to four, but Embree and Oyen snagged the next game for an 8-3 triumph.

At one, No. 32 Anya Morgina and Dominika Kanakova trailed 6-4 versus No. 8 Alex Cercone and Allie Will after 10 games. Morgina and Kanakova had a 0-40 advantage in the game on Will's serve and appeared poised to get the match back on serve. Will and Cercone, however, managed to win five straight rallies to up the margin to 7-4 on the changeover. They broke the Gamecocks in the next game to clinch doubles for the Gators.

After falling behind 3-0 at No. 3 doubles, Miljana Jocic and Katerina Popova mounted an impressive comeback against Joanna Mather and Olivia Janowicz. Jocic and Popova won five consecutive games before Mather and Janowicz got another game. The Gamecock tandem then won another three games in a row after a 5-4 lead to win 8-4.

The Gators proved to be too much in singles play. Oyen, ranked No. 104, made the score 2-0 after defeating No. 108 Popova 6-4, 6-0 on court three. Shortly afterward, No. 7 Will beat No. 29 Morgina 6-2, 6-1 at the top position to make the score 3-0 in favor of Florida. No. 37 Mather provided the clinching point on court four with a 6-2, 6-2 victory against Kanakova.

On court two, No. 20 Embree had a 6-0, 5-3 lead on No. 82 Stojic when the Gators had clinched the team victory. The two played out the next game and it gave Embree a 6-0, 6-3 win. The final two matches on court were recorded as defaults against South Carolina. No. 51 Cercone picked up the win over Jocic at five after winning the first set 6-4 and leading 3-2 in the second. At six, No. 49 Janowicz won the first set 7-6 (7-2) over Madeleine Saari-Byström but trailed 1-0 in the second set.

South Carolina will head to the SEC Tournament in Knoxville, Tenn., next week and face No. 37 Ole Miss in the first round on Thursday. A time for the match has not been announced.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (April 21, 2011) — The 36th-ranked and ninth-seeded South Carolina women's tennis team (13-9, 4-7 SEC) won a near-five-hour match Thursday in the first round of the SEC Tournament over No. 37 and eighth-seeded Ole Miss (11-10, 4-7 SEC) in Knoxville, Tenn. The 4-3 victory for the Gamecocks has them pitted against top-seed and No. 2-ranked Florida (22-1, 11-0 SEC) in the quarterfinals Friday at noon.

"I believe we were in control of the first two hours of the match," associate head coach Katarina Petrovic said. "After that, a couple people lost, but this is the SEC Tournament and every team in the conference is competitive."

Unlike the regular-season match between the two schools, the Gamecocks claimed the doubles point with wins on courts two and three. At two, Dijana Stojic and Madeleine Saari-Byström jumped out to a 3-1 lead on Connor Vogel and Gabby Rangel. They later ran the score to 5-2 and still led 7-3 after 10 games. The Rebels broke Stojic's serve but the Gamecocks countered in the next game with a break to win 8-4.

At the same time that Stojic and Saari-Byström had match point versus Vogel and Rangel, Miljana Jocic and Katerina Popova had their own match point against Caroline Rohde-Moe and Laura van de Stroet at No. 3 doubles. The Rebels fought it off and then won the next two points to make the score 7-5 with Popova serving next. Down 30-40, the Gamecock duo got to deuce after Jocic poached a ball at the net. On the next two points, Ole Miss missed a forehand volley at the net and then hit a forehand in the net from the baseline to give South Carolina the doubles point.

On court one, South Carolina's Anya Morgina and Dominika Kanakova fell behind 3-0 against Kristi Boxx and Abby Guthrie, but the two cut the deficit to 4-3. Boxx and Guthrie then pushed ahead to 7-3 with Morgina serving in the next game. After the Gamecocks won the first point in the 11th game, play was suspended since the doubles point had been clinched.

The Gamecocks ran the score to 2-0 with Kanakova winning 6-1, 6-4 over van de Stroet at the No. 4 singles position, but the Rebels quickly answered back with a 6-3, 6-4 win from Vivian Vlaar over Saari-Byström on court six. Rohde-Moe then held off a late charge by Popova to win 6-1, 7-6 (7-5) on court three to tie the score at 2-all. She had a 4-1 lead on Popova before falling behind 5-4 in the second set.

Boxx gave the Rebels the lead with a come-from-behind victory at No. 1 singles against Morgina. After losing the first set 6-1 and trailing 5-3 in the second, Boxx came back to win the second set in a tiebreaker 7-2. In the final set, she cruised to a 6-2 victory.

The Rebels were in control of the final two matches on court with Vogel up a set on Stojic at two and Guthrie ahead 4-2 in the third over Adriana Pereira at No. 5 singles. Pereira, though, continued to fight and ran off four games in a row for a 7-5, 1-6, 6-4 victory over Guthrie.

On court two, after losing the first set 6-3, Stojic had a 5-4 lead on Vogel in the second set, but Vogel came back to grab a 6-5 advantage with a chance to serve out the match. Vogel earned herself two match points at 40-15, but Stojic came to the net on the next two points and hit consecutive forehand volley winners to force deuce. After winning the ensuing two points, Stojic raced through the tiebreaker to win 7-0 and force a third and decisive set.

"I felt very confident when the whole team started cheering for me," Stojic said. "It's a different feeling when it's 3-all. I feel better on the court and I started hitting well."

By winning the first point of the third set, Stojic won 12 consecutive points against Vogel before finally losing a rally after facing two match points at 6-5 in the second set. In the third, Stojic blanked Vogel 6-0 to lift South Carolina to a 4-3 win and avenge the 4-1 loss the Gamecocks took in the regular season to the Rebels.

The win marked the sixth time this season Stojic has provided the clinching point for the Gamecocks. She improved to 21-9 on the year with the victory and 15-6 in dual matches at No. 2 singles.

The Gamecocks dropped the doubles point to Arizona. At one, Anya Morgina and Dominika Kanakova fell 8-3 to Natasha Marks and Lacey Smyth. South Carolina answered with Dijana Stojic and Adriana Pereira's 8-4 triumph over Susan Mc Rann and Jane Huh on court three.

The deciding match at No. 2 doubles saw South Carolina's Miljana Jocic and Katerina Popova take a 5-3 lead over Sarah Landsman and Kim Stubbe.
