2008 Season in Review

The 2008 football season at the University of South Carolina was a bit like a good roller coaster ride. There was the anticipation for something special prior to the start, some peaks and valleys along the way, consistent heart-stopping action with a requisite amount of bumps and spins, tosses and turns, and finally, a feeling that left most Gamecock loyalists looking forward to 2009 and the opportunity to hop on board for another ride.

The Gamecock Nation entered the 2008 season, the fourth of the Steve Spurrier Era, with cautious optimism. On paper, the Gamecocks had maybe their most talented and deepest squad since Coach Spurrier's arrival in Columbia. With 53 lettermen and 16 of 22 starters returning, including 10 on defense, Carolina had the nucleus and depth in place to withstand the rigors of another challenging SEC schedule. However, the squad was coming off a season-ending five-game losing streak, which thwarted a 6-1 start to the 2007 season, and no proven quarterback ready to assume the reins. In addition, the defense and special teams would have to take on a new look with Ellis Johnson taking over as defensive coordinator and Ray Rychleski hired as the new special teams coordinator. Most preseason prognosticators had the Gamecocks penciled into their usual slot as the fourth-place finisher in the ultra-competitive SEC Eastern Division.

The Gamecocks figured to be tested in their season-opener as they hosted the NC State Wolfpack out of the ACC in a special Thursday night contest televised by ESPN to kickoff the college football season. Both squads showed that the defenses were ahead of the offenses early in the season. Only a late second-quarter Wolfpack turnover set up a Ryan Succop field goal just before the half, and Carolina went into the intermission with a 3-0 lead.

No one knew at that time that the three points would be enough for the Gamecocks on this night in Columbia. The Carolina defense continually bottled up the NC State attack. The Wolfpack mustered just 138 yards and 10 first downs in the contest. Meanwhile, the Gamecock offense had problems of its own getting untracked. Junior quarterback Tommy Beecher, making his first career start, was intercepted four times and sacked on five occasions before leaving the game with a head injury in the fourth quarter with the Gamecocks clinging to a 13-0 advantage.

Redshirt sophomore Chris Smelley replaced Beecher in the final period and made a case to gain the starting position by leading Carolina to three touchdown drives. His 5-of-5 passing performance included sharp scoring throws of 20 yards to Dion LeCorn and 13 yards to Jared Cook. Mike Davis contributed 101 yards on the ground for his fourth career 100-yard game, and the Gamecocks rolled to a convincing 34-0 shutout win, giving Coach Spurrier his 16th-consecutive season-opening win and snapping the Gamecocks' five-game losing streak.

Another Thursday night ESPN game was on tap the following week, this time on the road, as the Gamecocks traveled to Nashville to take on the Vanderbilt Commodores. The Gamecocks still had a bad taste in their mouths after losing to Vandy at home in 2007, a loss that sent Carolina on its season-ending downward spiral.

Things looked good early on for Coach Spurrier's squad. Smelley hit Kenny McKinley on a pretty 19-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter, and with Coach Johnson's defense looking strong again, the Gamecocks held a 10-3 advantage heading into the locker room at halftime. However, the Gamecocks received some ominous news when it was revealed that McKinley would not return to action after suffering a first quarter hamstring injury.

With McKinley out, the Gamecocks resorted to draw plays for Davis and passes to Cook, who set career highs with eight receptions for 111 yards.

Things went from bad to worse for the Gamecocks when Vanderbilt tied the score on a 31-yard pass early in the third quarter, then recovered a fluke fumble on a short punt that careened off the leg of Addison Williams and scored again to take a 17-10 advantage. Another touchdown gave the Commodores a 24-10 lead with just over nine minutes remaining.

The Gamecocks pulled within seven on Freddie Brown's first career touchdown, a 5-yard reception that made it 24-17 with 7:39 remaining.

Carolina got the ball right back after Vanderbilt went three-and-out. After a short punt gave the Gamecocks the ball in Commodores' territory, South Carolina picked up a first down at the 34-yard line. But the drive stalled when Vandy sacked Smelley on consecutive plays.

Coach Spurrier elected to punt on a fourth-and-18, giving the Commodores possession at their 5 with 2:34 remaining. The strategy failed when Vanderbilt rushed for a pair of first downs and ran out the clock, earning its second-straight win over Carolina.

The second-ranked Georgia Bulldogs made their way to Columbia the next week for a nationally-televised game on CBS. The Bulldogs were a popular preseason pick for a national title, but the Gamecocks knew they could hold their own against their highly-touted opponents after winning in Athens in 2007.

The yards are tough to come by and the points even tougher in most years when Georgia and South Carolina square off on the gridiron, and the 2008 edition was no different.

Georgia's Blair Walsh connected on a 42-yard field goal early in the second period to draw first blood, but Carolina came back on a Smelley to Moe Brown 34-yard streak pattern down the sideline to take a 7-3 lead. Walsh hit again from 23 yards out as the first half expired, cutting the margin to one.

Knowshon Moreno's sliding four-yard touchdown run and a two-point conversion put Georgia on top at 14-7 midway through the third stanza. South Carolina had three chances in the fourth quarter to tie things up. The Gamecocks drove to Georgia's 2 midway through the period, but linebacker Rennie Curran smacked the ball free as Davis tried to leap the pile, and it bounced into the arms of Georgia defensive back Asher Allen. South Carolina got to Georgia's 17 in the final minute before Smelley was intercepted to seal the Bulldogs' victory and drop the Gamecocks to an 0-2 start in the SEC.

The Gamecocks hosted in-state rival Wofford the following week. Playing an FCS team was not the answer to Carolina's offensive woes, as they managed just two touchdowns despite gaining 376 yards and not punting

in the contest. Smelley threw a pair of interceptions and fumbled once, which helped keep Wofford in the game.

The Terriers never strayed from their patient option running game. They ran for 185 yards, well under their average of 400, but 50 of those yards came on a Ben Widmyer touchdown burst in the second period, which gave Wofford an early lead.

This one wasn't out of reach until the Gamecocks put together a grinding drive of nearly six minutes in the fourth quarter that ended with Smelley's 17-yard touchdown pass to LeCorn, which put South Carolina ahead 23-13 with 1:58 to go.

After the less-than-stellar play from Smelley against Wofford, Coach Spurrier elected to give redshirt freshman quarterback Stephen Garcia his first significant playing time the next week against UAB. The highly-touted signal-caller entered the game on the second series and completed 13-of-20 passes for 131 yards and a touchdown and ran for 86 more yards and another score in a 26-13 win.

Even with Garcia's lift, the South Carolina offense sputtered. Succop, the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week, made all four of his field goals, a career best, but the Gamecocks still scored 17 points less than the Blazers had given up to fellow Football Bowl Subdivision foes coming into the game. Carolina gained 353 yards, well below the 568 yards UAB had been allowing major college teams.

Meanwhile the Gamecock defense was stout again as UAB had just 26 total yards midway through the second quarter and had been penalized seven times for 55 yards. The Blazers did not record a first down until 6:39 remained in the second stanza. The Gamecocks held UAB out of the endzone until 24 seconds remained in the contest and second- and third-teamers dotted the lineup. The Blazers finished the night with just 207 yards of total offense.

The Gamecocks took their modest two-game winning streak on the road and back into SEC action the next week when they traveled to Oxford to take on the Ole Miss Rebels. Mississippi was flying high, as it was coming off an improbable 31-30 win at Florida, and the Rebels got off to a fast start against Carolina, scoring two touchdowns in the first period to open up a 14-3 cushion.

The game turned Carolina's way early in the second quarter. Smelley hit Jason Barnes with a TD pass on a third-and-goal from the 20-yard line, then defensive tackle Nathan Pepper scooped up a Jevan Snead fumble and rumbled 29 yards for a 14-point swing in exactly a minute to give Carolina a 17-14 advantage.

2008 Season in Review

Ole Miss answered to take a 21-17 lead into intermission, but another fumble in the second half turned the game for the Gamecocks.

Chris Culliver forced Dexter McCluster to fumble at the South Carolina 6, and Emanuel Cook recovered and raced to the 42. From there, Smelley, who earned SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors, took over with the drive culminating on a 6-yard touchdown pass to Barnes to put the Gamecocks on top for good.

Carolina opened up a 10-point advantage in the fourth quarter when Smelley, who completed 22-of-32 passes on the afternoon for 327 yards, hit Hills on a 4-yard pass, his third touchdown strike of the day. Meanwhile, the Gamecock defense, which surrendered 21 points and 232 yards in the first half, held the Rebels to just three points and 129 yards in the second half, and the Gamecocks came away with a hard-earned 31-24 win for their first conference victory of the season.

Another SEC road test awaited the Gamecocks the following week as they traveled to Lexington to face the Kentucky Wildcats. The Wildcats, who had lost all 15 of their previous encounters with a Steve Spurrier-led team, felt confident that this would be the year they would finally break the hex.

However, thanks to some special special teams play, it was not to be.

Captain Munnerlyn picked up a Jordin Lindsey blocked field goal and returned it 81 yards for a touchdown and set up another score with an 84-yard kickoff return in a 24-17 Carolina win.

The game remained tight through the first three periods with Kentucky holding a 17-14 lead heading into the final stanza. That's when Coach Spurrier elected to bench Smelley in favor of Garcia. As good as Smelley had been the previous week at Ole Miss, he struggled on this afternoon, completing just 9-of-23 passes for 105 yards with two interceptions.

Garcia led four consecutive drives into Wildcat territory, which the Gamecocks turned into 10 fourth-quarter points. It could have been more if not for the rare off day by Succop, who missed four of five field goal attempts.

With the game tied at 17, Garcia found tight end Weslye Saunders open in the endzone from 8 yards out for the game-winner. Garcia finished the day by completing 10-of-14 attempts for 169 yards in limited duty. The teams combined for six turnovers, with Culliver's second interception sealing the win for Carolina.

The Gamecocks, now 5-2 overall and 2-2 in the SEC, returned home with a four-game winning streak in tow to face 13th-ranked LSU on October 16. Garcia, fresh off his stellar play at Kentucky, would get his first collegiate start against the defending national champions.

The Tigers held a 10-3 advantage late in the second quarter, but South Carolina scored two touchdowns in the final 2:28 of the first half, highlighted by a Garcia to McKinley 41-yard completion followed by a 26-yard touchdown pass to Saunders for one score. Carlos Thomas intercepted a pass on the next play and returned it 46 yards to the LSU 8, setting up a Davis 1-yard plunge and a 17-10 halftime lead.

However, the LSU defense stiffened in the second half, blanking Carolina after intermission. The Tigers held the Gamecocks to just 42 total yards after halftime and recorded six sacks on the evening. The LSU offense

was efficient, as it tied the game late in the third quarter, then went on a time-consuming 11-play, 83-yard drive midway through the fourth quarter, culminating with a Charles Scott 2-yard run, and LSU escaped Columbia with a 24-17 win.

Embattled coach Phillip Fulmer brought his Tennessee squad into Columbia on November 1. Garcia was named the starter for the second-straight week, but it was the Carolina defense that once again proved to be the difference.

Coach Johnson's troops held the Vols to just 207 yards of total offense and one score in the 27-6 rout. Tennessee gained 34 rushing yards on 28 carries and completed less than half of its 32 pass attempts. Stony Woodson put the exclamation point on this one early with a 68-yard interception return for a touchdown in the second quarter, which gave Carolina a 14-0 lead.

Garcia turned in a solid but not spectacular performance, completing 9-of-19 passes for 139 yards with two touchdowns before leaving the game in the third period with a knee injury. The victory was Carolina's first over the Vols at Williams-Brice Stadium in 16 years.

The Gamecocks carried the momentum of the win over Tennessee into their home game with Arkansas the following week. With neither quarterback having separated himself as the clear front-runner, Coach Spurrier resorted to his old bag of tricks — he alternated signal-callers on every play.

Although neither Smelley nor Garcia put up impressive numbers, the system worked well enough to generate 34 points, matching the season's high water mark.

The Gamecocks jumped out to a 10-0 lead after the first quarter, highlighted by a 54-yard Succop field goal, the second-longest of his career.

Both Gamecock quarterbacks showed flashes, with Garcia running 14 yards for the game's first score. It was Smelley who found Cook on a 66-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter, the longest pass play of the season.

The turning point of this one again came via the Gamecock defense.

With Arkansas trailing 20-14 late in the third but with momentum on the Hogs' side, defensive end Jordin Lindsey stretched to snag a Casey Dick pass. He returned it 40 yards to the Razorback 15. Two plays later, Garcia lofted a pretty pass to McKinley in the endzone for a 27-14 lead that Carolina would not relinquish. McKinley had seven catches for 130 yards and became the school's all-time career receiving yardage leader.

Meanwhile, the Gamecock defense, which had been torched for 542 rushing yards by Arkansas in 2007, held the Razorbacks to 54 yards on the ground this time around, helping Carolina to its seventh win of the year.

The 24th-ranked Gamecocks' biggest challenge awaited them the following week as they traveled to Gainesville to take on the third-ranked Florida Gators. The Gamecocks nearly pulled off the upset in The Swamp in 2006 when only a blocked field goal kept them from knocking off the eventual national champions, but this year's game was, unfortunately for Gamecock Nation, not going to be a repeat.

The Gamecocks used the rotating quarterback system again, but the offense could not regain the magic it had found during its midseason run, and the defense finally broke under a plethora of turnovers.

The teams battled evenly for the first 10 minutes of the game, but then disaster struck Carolina. Brandon Spikes returned a Smelley interception 12 yards for a touchdown, then Ahmad Black got Smelley again on the next possession, intercepting a deflected pass. One play later Percy Harvin was in the endzone, and the Gators had a 14-0 lead.

The Gamecocks tried a trick play on the ensuing kickoff, but it backfired into another turnover, and it was 21-0 Gators in a nightmarish 135-second span that took out any drama to this one.

The rest of the game was simply style points for Florida as it tried to impress the pollsters. The Gators rolled up 519 yards of offense, more than twice the number Carolina had averaged throughout the season's first 10 games, in a convincing 56-6 win.

The Gamecocks had two weeks to recover from the loss at Florida before they wrapped up their regular season with the traditional Palmetto State Bowl against rival Clemson. Unfortunately for the Gamecock faithful, like the Florida game, this one turned sour early.

In playing its finest half of the season for interim coach Dabo Swinney, Clemson put 24 points on the board before Carolina responded with a 16-yard pass from Smelley to fullback Patrick DiMarco with just seconds remaining in the first half.

When Smelley hit Saunders on a 23-yard touchdown strike early in the third period to narrow the deficit to 24-14, it looked like Carolina might be able to sneak back into this one.

But it was not to be.

James Davis scored his third touchdown of the game late in the third quarter and, with Smelley tossing a career-high four interceptions, the Gamecocks could not generate enough offense to make this one interesting in a 31-14 setback.

The Gamecocks found themselves in a New Year's Day bowl game for the first time since the 2001 season, returning to the Outback Bowl in Tampa to face the Iowa Hawkeyes. Unfortunately for Gamecock fans, the magic was all but gone from their midseason success, and this one had an all too familiar ring.

The Gamecocks sputtered from the start and never gave themselves a chance, turning the ball over five times, including four in the first half, as Iowa rolled to an easy 31-10 win. Carolina finished its season with a 7-6 record, its fifth straight non-losing season, a feat not accomplished since the 1930s.

South Carolina overcame four interceptions by first-time starter Tommy Beecher to give Steve Spurrier his 16th-straight opening game victory, 34-0 over North Carolina State.

Mike Davis and Taylor Rank had rushing touchdowns, and Dion LeCorn and Jared Cook caught TD passes from backup Chris Smelley to lift the Gamecocks and keep alive Spurrier's first-week streak, which began in 1990 at Florida.

Beecher looked shaky from the start. He was intercepted by Jimmaul Simmons less than three minutes in, then took the first of his five sacks to end South Carolina's next series.

Beecher was picked off twice more before the half.

Beecher left in the final quarter with a head injury. He finished the night 12 of 22 for 106 yards.

Lucky for the Gamecocks' their defense was there to clean up the mess.

The group, headed by new coordinator Ellis Johnson, bottled up the Wolfpack throughout. North Carolina State had just 117 yards and eight first downs through three quarters.

The closest the Wolfpack came to scoring was Josh Czajkowski missing a 49-yard field goal attempt.

South Carolina linebacker Eric Norwood recovered a botched shotgun snap at the Wolfpack 9 right before halftime that led to Ryan Succop's 29-yard field goal and a 3-0 lead.

Then on the Wolfpack's second play after halftime, Carlos Thomas stepped in front of a Daniel Evans pass for an interception at the North Carolina State 9. Four plays later, Davis leapt into the end zone.

Succop added a 46-yarder at the end of the third quarter.

That was more than enough points to hold off the Wolfpack.

Smelley made a push to regain the starting job he had for six games last season, leading three touchdown drives in the fourth quarter. His 5-of-5 performance included sharp scoring throws of 20 yards to LeCorn and 13 yards to Cook.

Davis finished with 101 yards, the senior's fourth career game of at least 100.

After falling behind 10-3 in the first half, Vanderbilt stormed back for 21 second-half points to stun No. 24 South Carolina 24-17 for the second year in a row before a crowd of 36,850 at Vanderbilt Stadium.

Trailing 24-10, the Gamecocks pulled within a score on Freddie Brown's first career touchdown — a 5-yard reception that made it 24-17 with 7:39 remaining.

Quarterback Chris Smelley had the big play on the drive — a career-long, 24-yard scramble on first-and-20 from the 50.

Carolina got the ball right back after Vanderbilt went three-and-out. After a short punt gave the Gamecocks the ball in Commodores territory, South Carolina picked up a first down at the 34-yard line.

But the drive stalled when Vandy sacked Smelley on consecutive plays when the Commodores blitzed. Smelley almost escaped the rush on second down, but defensive tackle Greg Billinger got enough of Smelley to drop him for a 6-yard loss.

When Smelley went down for a 2-yard loss on third down, Spurrier elected to punt on fourth-and-18 from the Carolina 42-yard line, giving the Commodores possession at their 5 with 2:34 remaining.

After the defense forced a quick punt the previous series, Spurrier said he was hoping it would stop the run and give the Gamecocks one final shot.

But tailback Jared Hawkins carried five consecutive times for 24 yards and a pair of first downs, and Vandy ran out the clock.

The Gamecocks had a few special teams miscues — two missed field goals by Ryan Succop, the first of which was blocked, and a fluke fumble on a punt that hit the leg of Addison Williams.

South Carolina played the final three quarters without All-SEC receiver Kenny McKinley, who left with a hamstring injury. McKinley scored the Gamecocks' first touchdown on a 19-yard pass with six minutes left in the first quarter.

With McKinley out, the Gamecocks resorted to draw plays for tailback Mike Davis and passes to tight end Jared Cook, who set career highs with eight receptions for 111 yards.

Knowshon Moreno's 4-yard touchdown run in the third quarter put the No. 2 Bulldogs ahead and the defense kept turning the Gamecocks back for a Georgia 14-7 victory.

Reshad Jones sealed the victory for the Bulldogs, intercepting Chris Smelley's pass with 13 seconds left inside the Georgia 10.

The Bulldogs had all offseason to remember how last September's 16-12 loss to South Carolina kept them from playing for the SEC and national titles.

For much of this one, it looked like the Gamecocks could do it again as the Bulldogs trailed 7-6 midway through the third quarter. Georgia had already muffed a scoring chance near the goal line, settling for Blair Walsh's 23-yard field goal after having a third-and-goal at the South Carolina 1.

Moreno didn't squander the Bulldogs' next opportunity. He ran left, then took a hard cut up the middle with his feet sliding out from under him. Moreno steadied himself with his right hand, then slipped through for the score.

Stafford converted the 2-point try on a pass to Kris Durham, and Georgia led 14-7.

Moreno's TD was the first Georgia scored in the past eight quarters against the Gamecocks. South Carolina had three chances in the fourth quarter to tie things up.

The Gamecocks drove to Georgia's 2 midway through the period. But linebacker Rennie Curran smacked the ball free as tailback Mike Davis tried to leap the pile, and it bounced into the arms of Georgia defensive back Asher Allen.

South Carolina got to the Georgia 17 in the final minute before Smelley was intercepted by Jones to keep the Gamecocks winless against teams ranked in the top two.

Georgia's first two series dissolved into punts. It had two scoring drives that took a combined 28 plays and ate up more than a quarter of the first half, but both ended with field goals.

But the Gamecocks finally got something going midway through the second quarter. Smelley found Moe Brown for a 19-yard gain to get inside Georgia territory. Two plays later, Brown slipped behind defender Ramarcus Brown for a 34-yard TD pass from Smelley.

Quarterback Chris Smelley had 204 yards passing as South Carolina struggled before putting away Wofford 23-13 on Saturday night.

The Gamecocks (2-2) managed just two touchdowns, and the crowd booed the offense twice in the second half when it settled for field goals.

South Carolina did gain 376 yards and never punted, but Smelley threw two interceptions and fumbled. Spurrier stuck with the sophomore the whole game.

This one wasn't out of reach until the Gamecocks put together a grinding drive of nearly 6 minutes in the fourth quarter that ended with Smelley's 17-yard touchdown pass to Dion LeCorn to put South Carolina ahead 23-13 with 1:58 to go.

The Terriers (2-1) never strayed from their patient option running game. They ran for 185 yards, well under their average of 400 yards. Fullback Dane Romero led the team with 75 yards on 17 carries, while quarterback Ben Widmyer ran 10 times for 59 yards and completed 8-of-13 passes for 100 yards.

Wofford gave South Carolina fits in 2006, when the Gamecocks had to stop the Terriers on fourth down at South Carolina's 10 to escape with a 27-20 win. The Terriers never led in that one.

On Saturday, they took a 7-3 lead early in the second quarter on Widmyer's 50-yard scoring run. Two Gamecocks defenders took the pitch man on the option, leaving Widmyer to scamper untouched into the end zone.

South Carolina responded with a quick drive that ended with three Brian Maddox runs, the last one 7 yards for a TD, to put the Gamecocks back ahead 10-7.

The Gamecocks moved the ball for most of the game, but struggled to get into the end zone. An 18-play, 75-yard drive ended with a 22-yard field goal from Ryan Succop that put South Carolina ahead 3-0.

Spurrier used several players who hadn't seen a lot of playing time this season. Freshman Eric Baker hadn't carried the ball before Saturday, but ended with 49 yards on 11 carries.

Maddox led the Gamecocks with 12 carries for 52 yards, while starting tailback Mike Davis caught six passes for 51 yards. South Carolina didn't have a passing play gain more than 20 yards.

Stephen Garcia was 13-for-20 for 131 yards and ran for 86 more in the first significant action of his career, giving South Carolina's offense enough of a kick to beat UAB 26-13 on Saturday night.

Garcia came in on the second possession for the Gamecocks (3-2). Over the next five first-half possessions, the redshirt freshman accounted for all but six of the Gamecocks' yards and either passed the ball or ran it on 26 of the next 32 plays.

South Carolina's defense took care of the rest, holding the Blazers (1-4) to 207 yards and forcing three turnovers as the Gamecocks won back-to-back games for the first time since starting 6-1 last season.

Bobby Wallace ran six times for 51 yards, and Jason Barnes led the eight players for South Carolina who caught a pass with three receptions for 46 yards.

Joe Webb was 17-of-26 for 140 yards and two interceptions for UAB. He also was the Blazers' leading rusher with 22 yards on nine carries and a touchdown in the final moments. Brandon Carlisle had both of UAB's interceptions.

Even with Garcia's lift, the South Carolina offense still sputtered at times. Ryan Succop made all four of his field goals, a career best, and the Gamecocks scored 17 points less than the Blazers were giving up to fellow Football Bowl Subdivision foes coming into the game. They gained 353 yards, well below the 568 yards UAB had been allowing major college teams.

Garcia's biggest contribution to the offense is his mobility. Coach Steve Spurrier's prize 2007 recruit had 67 yards on 14 carries in the first half, much of them coming on scrambles when he couldn't find anyone open. His 6-yard touchdown run put South Carolina up 17-3 in the second quarter. He also completed 9-of-12 passes in the opening half for 101 yards, including a 13-yard TD on a swing pass to running back Brian Maddox.

South Carolina's top 10 in the nation defense was again strong. UAB had just 26 total yards midway through the second quarter and had been penalized seven times for 55 yards. The Blazers didn't get a first down until 6:39 remained in the second quarter.

Chris Smelley threw three touchdown passes, South Carolina's No. 1 defense held Mississippi to a field goal in the second half and the Gamecocks beat the Rebels 31-24 on Saturday.

Smelley completed 22-of-31 passes for a career-high 327 yards and led an 11-play, 95-yard drive midway through the fourth quarter to put away Ole Miss, which stumbled a week after knocking off then-No. 4 Florida.

The Rebels (3-3, 1-2 SEC) appeared to take control early, but a pair of fumbles helped the Gamecocks (4-2, 1-2) earn a critical win.

Smelley made several strong throws in the game and only one big mistake, a third-quarter pick that didn't hurt.

After Smelley hit Jason Barnes with a touchdown pass on third-and-goal from the 20 early in the second quarter, Gamecock defensive lineman Nathan Pepper scooped up Jevan Snead's fumble and returned it 29 yards for a 14-point swing in exactly a minute that gave South Carolina a 17-14 lead.

Ole Miss answered to take a 21-17 halftime lead on a 24-yard pass from Snead to Brandon Bolden, but another fumble in the second half turned the game for the Gamecocks.

Chris Culliver forced Dexter McCluster to fumble at the South Carolina 6 midway through the third quarter. Emanuel Cook returned the fumble to the 42. It was McCluster's second critical fumble near the opponent's goal line in the last three games. A similar play at the 1 helped Vanderbilt beat Ole Miss two weeks ago.

Smelley was especially sharp on the ensuing drive, converting a pair of first downs with quarterback sneaks, including fourth-and-inches at the Ole Miss 10. That set up the second of his two touchdown passes to Barnes, a 6-yarder that put the Gamecocks up 24-21.

After Ole Miss downed the ball at the 5 following a punt on the ensuing drive, Smelley and tailback Mike Davis marched South Carolina down the field. Davis rushed for 28 yards on the drive, and Smelley hit 5-of-6 passes for 54 yards, including a 4-yard touchdown pass to Joe Hills.

In the second half, a Gamecocks defense led by Cook's 14 tackles held the Rebels to 129 yards and a field goal.

Captain Munnerlyn returned a blocked field goal 81 yards for a touchdown and set up another score with an 84-yard kickoff return as South Carolina defeated Kentucky for the ninth-straight time, 24-17, improving Steve Spurrier's record to 16-0 against the Wildcats.

The game, billed as a field position showdown between two of the SEC's top defenses, lived up to that hype, at least until midway through the third quarter. That was when Spurrier made a change that paid immediate dividends.

Stephen Garcia replaced a struggling Chris Smelley and led four consecutive drives into Wildcat territory, which the Gamecocks turned into 10 points. It could have been more if not for three missed second-half field goal attempts by Ryan Succop.

With the game tied at 17, South Carolina took the lead for good when Garcia found Weslye Saunders open in the end zone off a play-action pass from 8 yards out. The play was set up by a 38-yard post pattern from Garcia to Jason Barnes. Garcia completed 10-of-14 passes for 169 yards in limited duty.

Kentucky quarterback Mike Hartline got the ball back with an opportunity to tie the game, but an interception by Chris Culliver clinched it for the Gamecocks.

The teams combined for six turnovers. Kentucky's defense got three of its four takeaways in the first quarter but could muster no better than a tie score heading into the second.

First, Smelley appeared to connect with Kenny McKinley for an 8-yard gain, but Kentucky's Trevard Lindley ripped the ball out of his hands and took it 28 yards to put the Wildcats ahead 7-0.

It didn't take long for South Carolina to respond. Munnerlyn returned Tim Masthay's kickoff 84 yards and was stopped only when Masthay shoved him out of bounds at the Kentucky 16.

Given new life, this time Smelley threw the ball to a place only McKinley could get it--the corner of the end zone, tying the game at 7.

After the teams combined for three turnovers, the Wildcats had a chance to grab momentum. But Ryan Tydlacka's 29-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Jordin Lindsey and returned 81 yards for a score by Munnerlyn.

Jarrett Lee went 16-of-26 for 189 yards and LSU held South Carolina to minus-7 yards in the fourth quarter as the No. 13 Tigers beat the Gamecocks 24-17 on Saturday night.

LSU (5-1, 3-1 Southeastern Conference) took the lead for good on Charles Scott's 2-yard touchdown run with 4:16 to go. It capped a grinding, 83-yard drive that took more than six minutes off the clock.

Then Curtis Taylor picked off Stephen Garcia two plays later, souring an otherwise remarkable game for the freshman, who accounted for 230 of 254 yards for South Carolina (5-3, 2-3) in his first career start.

The Tigers had a season-best six sacks. The last one ended South Carolina's final drive into LSU territory. LSU held South Carolina to 42 total yards in the second half after allowing two touchdowns in the final 2:28 of the first half.

LSU trailed by a touchdown at half-time and failed to get a first down in its first two drives of the second half. But the Tigers finally got going late in the third quarter as Andrew Hatch, who usually comes in for running plays, rolled right, then threw back to a wide open Ricky Dixon for a 6-yard touchdown that tied the game at 17 with 44 seconds left in the third quarter.

Keiland Williams led LSU with 72 yards on 15 carries, while Scott, the SEC's third-leading rusher, ran for 61 yards on 16 carries. Demetrius Byrd caught three passes for 65 yards.

Garcia was 14-of-26 for 215 yards with a touchdown. He also carried the ball 19 times for 15 yards. The Gamecocks had just 39 yards rushing. Kenny McKinley caught four passes for 77 yards, and tight end Jared Cook had five receptions for 74 yards.

With LSU up 10-3, South Carolina scored two touchdowns in the final 2:28 of the first half. Garcia led the Gamecocks on a four-play drive highlighted by the freshman's 41-yard throw to McKinley and a 26-yard TD pass to tight end Weslye Saunders.

On LSU's next play, Lee threw an interception that Carlos Thomas returned 46 yards to the Tigers 8. Mike Davis then fell into the end zone on fourth-and-1 to give the Gamecocks a 17-10 halftime lead.

Freshman Stephen Garcia threw two touchdown passes and South Carolina piled on the problems for Tennessee and embattled coach Phil Fulmer with a 27-6 victory on Saturday.

The victory was just the fourth over the Vols for the Gamecocks (6-3, 3-3 SEC), who sent Tennessee to its second losing SEC record in the past four seasons.

A big reason was the heady play of Garcia, who passed for 139 yards and his two scoring throws before a third-quarter knee injury sent him to the sidelines.

Tennessee's stagnant offense had no solution for South Carolina's top-rated SEC defense.

Garcia, starting his second career game, went 4-for-4 for 80 yards on the opening drive, ended by the 12-yard pass to Davis.

Gamecocks cornerback Stoney Woodson jumped in front of Nick Stephens' pass and took it 68 yards for a touchdown to give South Carolina, at 14-0, its largest lead ever over the Vols in 16 years in the SEC.

The interception was Stephens' first of his career and Tennessee's first turnover in 193 snaps. The Vols didn't take nearly that long for their next one.

A play later, tailback Lennon Creer fumbled after catching a pass from Stephens' replacement, Jonathan Crompton, and Captain Munnerlyn returned it to the Vols' 4.

Garcia hit Kenny McKinley on a slant pattern for an all-too-easy score and a 21-0 lead.

Things were ugly for the Vols. Stephens and Crompton were sacked six times, and Tennessee was held under 10 points for the third time this season, a first in the Fulmer era.

The Vols finished with minus-2 yards rushing in the opening half, and their most productive play was a completion intended for Gerald Jones that bounced off him and landed in Arian Foster's hands for a 26-yard gain.

That drive would end soon enough, along with the Vols' chances of resuscitating an SEC season gone wrong.

Tennessee's third-quarter TD on Arian Foster's 1-yard leap averted an end to their streak of scoring in every game, which coincidentally began in 1994 after Spurrier's Gators blanked Fulmer and the Vols' 31-0.

Steve Spurrier shuffled things up again Saturday, alternating quarterbacks Stephen Garcia and Chris Smelley most of the way in South Carolina's 34-21 victory over Arkansas.

The Gamecocks (7-3, 4-3) have won four of their past five Southeastern Conference games since starting 0-2 in the league, snapped a two-game losing streak to Arkansas (4-6, 1-5) and put themselves in position for a New Year's Day bowl game.

And they did it through one of the South Carolina coach's quirkiest trademarks.

Smelley got first chance, overthrowing receiver Jason Barnes. Then Garcia entered and hit Kenny McKinley with a 30-yard pass to the Arkansas 14. After Smelley was incomplete on the next play, Garcia rushed past the Razorbacks for a touchdown.

Spurrier kept up the pattern much of the opening period: Smelley, a sophomore, would start the sequence, with Garcia coming in every other play.

The two shared time in leading a drive that ended with Ryan Succop's 54-yard field goal--missing the senior's career mark by a yard.

It was Smelley who found tight end Jared Cook for a 66-yard touchdown pass and a 17-7 lead.

Down 20-7, Arkansas got back into it with a 15-play, 8-minute drive that ended with Casey Dick's 4-yard TD throw to Mitchell Bailey.

Dick had the Razorbacks driving again moments later when defensive end Jordin Lindsey stretched up to snag the interception and take it 40 yards to the Arkansas 15.

On Garcia's play, he lofted a pretty pass into the waiting hands of McKinley to put the Gamecocks up 27-14.

Smelley was more productive at 9-of-19 for 148 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions. Garcia was 4-of-11 for 71 yards and an interception for South Carolina's lone turnover.

Dick had three interceptions, and Arkansas was sacked six times. The Razorbacks rushed for 54 yards. It didn't help when Michael Smith, the SEC leader at 123 yards a game, left with a shoulder injury right before halftime. He had just 25 yards on seven carries.

The third-ranked Gators (9-1, 7-1) turned three South Carolina turnovers into 21 points Saturday and buried the No. 24 Gamecocks 56-6, on a gray, damp day at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium.

The Gamecocks' defense allowed a season-high 519 yards, more than twice its league-leading average (256.5) entering the game.

Reigning Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow accounted for three touchdowns. Percy Harvin was the star with 167 rushing yards on eight carries, highlighted by touchdown runs of 26 and 80 yards.

Carolina's defense started out strong, forcing a turnover and a punt on the Gators' first two possessions.

But it all fell apart for the Gamecocks during a nightmarish 2:15 span that unfolded in the shadow of the north end-zone stands.

Chris Smelley, who alternated with Stephen Garcia nearly every play for the second game in a row, threw a pair of interceptions in a three-play sequence of a scoreless game to start the bleeding.

Linebacker Brandon Spikes picked off an ill-advised pass by Smelley, who threw it off his back foot while retreating from the Gators' rush, and returned it 12 yards for a touchdown.

Ahmad Black got Smelley on the Gamecocks' next possession, intercepting a deflected pass on a hitch route. On the Gators' first play, Harvin darted through the heart of Carolina's defense for a 26-yard touchdown run and a 14-0 lead.

Next, the Gamecocks tried a trick play that blew up on them.

On the ensuing kickoff, Dion LeCORN threw a lateral across the field to Chris Hail, a backup receiver who has not caught a pass all season.

Hail failed to pull this one down, too. James Smith scooped up the loose ball and appeared to dive into the end zone. The replay official determined Smith was down at the 1, but the ruling just delayed the inevitable.

Three plays later, Tebow barreled in for a 1-yard touchdown that put the Gators up three touchdowns with 2:22 left in the first quarter.

Leading big, Florida spent the rest of the game showing poll voters, at least those still watching, its team speed as the Gamecocks' spirits sank.

A blocked punt set up a 22-yard field goal by Mark Buchholz.

Chris Clemons intercepted Smelley early in the second quarter, and Cullen Harper made the Gamecocks pay with his long touchdown pass to Ford.

Harper, on his knees, pumped his fists, and Swinney leaped into the arms of former Gamecock coach and current Clemson offensive line coach Brad Scott for a bear hug.

It wasn't long before Smelley's next mistake and Clemson's next touchdown.

Safety Michael Hamlin stepped in front of Smelley's throw on the following drive.

It took only three plays for the Tigers to capitalize, Davis rushing around the left side for a 20-yard TD.

South Carolina closed things to 24-14 on touchdown receptions of 16 yards by Patrick DiMarco and 23-yards by Weslye Saunders.

Davis regained momentum for Clemson two series later with his 2-yard touchdown run.

Iowa's Shonn Greene rushed for 121 yards and three touchdowns, helping the Hawkeyes defeat South Carolina 31-10 in the Outback Bowl.

Iowa (9-4) won for the sixth time in seven games since losing three straight to fall to 3-3. South Carolina (7-6) lost three straight down the stretch.

Greene scored on a pair of 1-yard runs to help Iowa build a 21-0 halftime lead, then added an 11-yarder to make it 31-0 late in the third quarter. South Carolina scored on Chris Smelley's 10-yard TD pass to Jared Cook and Ryan Succop's 48-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

After struggling offensively in lopsided losses to Florida and Clemson, Gamecocks coach Steve Spurrier decided to start quarterback Stephen Garcia, a highly-regarded redshirt freshman from Tampa who was the centerpiece of his recruiting class in 2007.

But Garcia turned the ball over four times in the first half and was replaced by Smelley after going 9-for-18 for 79 yards and three interceptions.

His first pass was intercepted and returned 29 yards to set up an Iowa touchdown, then the dual-threat quarterback fumbled on his first run to give the Gamecocks turnovers on two of their first four offensive plays.

The next two South Carolina possessions ended with interceptions. After Bradley Fletcher picked off Garcia in the end zone, Iowa drove 80 yards to take a 21-0 lead on Greene's second touchdown.

Ricky Stanzi was intercepted twice before halftime, but neither mistake really hurt the Hawkeyes. Iowa was trying to turn Garcia's third interception into a quick TD when South Carolina's Chris Culliver made a leaping pick in the end zone.

Smelley, who started nine games for South Carolina this season, replaced Garcia at the start of the second half. Moe Brown fumbled on the quarterback's first completion to set up an Iowa field goal, but the Gamecocks did have some success moving the ball the rest of the game.

Stanzi was 13-for-19 for 148 yards, including a 6-yard TD throw to Trey Stross on the first drive of the game. Smelley finished 16-of-31 for 174 yards and no interceptions.
