(Jan. 18, 2014) — The No. 33 South Carolina women's tennis team opened the season with a 4-3 victory over an injury-riddled East Tennessee State squad on Saturday in match one of a doubleheader at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks return to the indoor courts this afternoon for a 3 p.m. match-up against College of Charleston.

The Gamecocks actually won the match before playing a single point since the Buccaneers only had three healthy players. As a result, ETSU forfeited all the doubles matches and singles positions four through six to give Carolina an automatic 4-0 lead.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (Jan. 18, 2014) — The 33rd-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team earned a 6-1 victory over College of Charleston on Saturday in the second match of a doubleheader at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks dispatched East Tennessee State in the first match and are now 2-0 to start the season.

South Carolina needed just 30 minutes to clinch the doubles point with dominating performances on courts one and two. Katerina Popova and Ximena Siles Luna won first by a 6-1 count against Mara Argyriou and Kelly Kambourelis. Minutes later, Meghan Blevins and Elixane Lechemia clinched the 1-0 lead after beating Jamie Harrell and Katherine Schofield 6-1 at the No. 1 position.

On court three, the Gamecocks' Caroline Dailey and Brigit Folland trailed Samantha Maddox and Brooke McAmis 4-3 when Lechemia and Blevins clinched the point. Their match was suspended with the doubles point already decided.

Lechemia wasted no time putting Carolina ahead 2-0 after she made short work of Kambourelis at No. 1 singles, winning 6-1, 6-0 to improve to 7-4 on the season. As she was wrapping up her match, Folland took the first set from Argyriou at three, 6-4, and Blevins beat Schofield 6-3 in the first set of their match at the No. 4 position.

Popova eventually won her first set 6-3 against McAmis on court two but she cruised in the second to win 6-0 and put the Gamecocks within a point of clinching the match. With the win, Popova improved to 6-4.

Folland and Blevins finished within seconds of each other to provide the winning point. It was Blevins who snatched the win right before Folland with a 6-3, 6-1 decision and Folland secured a 6-4, 6-1 victory. Blevins upped her record to 5-7, while Folland earned her teamleading ninth triumph.

With the match in hand, Dailey already had the first set under her belt against Maddox on court five by a 6-1 score. Maddox managed a 2-1 advantage after the first three games in the second, but Dailey recovered to pull back in front 3-2. Brigit Folland and Katerina Popova had little trouble defeating Dakota Brown and Nynke Van Der Goot by an 8-2 score at No. 2. Dailey now leads the Gamecocks in overall singles wins this season with a 13-6 record.

Once Dailey upped the margin to 5-1 for South Carolina, Looney found herself tied 2-all in the second with Brown at six. Looney scored three straight games in her favor for a chance to serve out the match up 5-2, but Brown posted a break after several deuces to extend the match. Looney bounced back with a break of her own in the ensuing game to pick up the 6-4, 6-3 triumph.

(Feb. 23, 2014) — The 33rd-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team posted its fifth shutout of the season Sunday with a 7-0 win over No. 55 William & Mary at Carolina Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks wrapped up regular-season non-conference play with a 9-2 record. The Tribe fell to 3-9 on the year with the loss.

William & Mary did not have enough healthy players to field three doubles team, so the Tribe had to forfeit the No. 3 position before play began. Needing just one victory to clinch the doubles point, the Gamecocks' post productive duo this spring came through again, as Katerina Popova and Brigit Folland defeated Julia Casselbury and Sydney Smith 8-0 on court two. Popova and Folland improved to 7-0 this spring overall.

The Tribe's Nabila Farah and Melanie Roy jumped ahead of Dominika Kanakova and Elixane Lechemia 4-1 at the top slot, but the Gamecocks rallied. COLUMBIA, S.C. (Feb. 28, 2014) — The 42nd-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team opened SEC play Friday night with a 6-1 triumph over Missouri at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks improved to 10-2 on the season, while the Tigers fell to 4-7.

The doubles point was never in question, as South Carolina earned big leads on all three courts. About an hour into the matches, the Gamecocks held 7-3 leads on all three courts and it became a matter of which two duos would record wins to give Carolina a 1-0 lead. Elixane Lechemia and Dominika Kanakova ended up finishing first with an 8-3 victory against Cierra Gaytan-Leach and Rachel Stuhlmann on court one. Less than two minutes later, Meghan Blevins and Caroline Dailey beat Tracy Dong and Cassidy Spearman at No. 3 doubles by an 8-3 score as well.

Popova and Lechemia appeared to be the two who would clinch the match for South Carolina with Popova leading 5-1 at two and Lechemia on top 5-3 at one. Lechemia had her serve broken to still lead 5-4 at the changeover and Hine held for 5-2 to give Popova a chance to serve out the match. The Tigers would not give away the matches without a fight, though, as Gaytan-Leach held for 5-all and Hine broke Popova to trail 5-3.

Before either of those matches could finish, though, Stuhlmann held off Folland at No. 3 singles, winning 6-3, 6-3 to make the score 2-1 for South Carolina. Folland trailed 4-1 in the second before trimming the Mizzou lead to 4-3 but could not hold on to the final two games.

Popova responded quickly by finishing off Hine at the second spot with a break of serve to win 6-4, 6-3. Popova ran her impressive spring record to 10-1 and improved to 15-5 overall for her senior season. The native of Moscow also posted her ninth win in a row in the process.

With the loss, the Gamecocks dropped to 10-3 and 1-1 in the SEC, while the Aggies improved to 7-3 and 1-1 in league play.

The Gamecocks lost a tight doubles point, falling on courts one and two. (April 11, 2014) — The No. 35 South Carolina women's tennis team picked up its fifth consecutive SEC win Friday evening by defeating No. 30 Kentucky 4-1 at Carolina Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks improved to 15-8 overall and 6-6 in the SEC with the win, while the Wildcats fell to 15-9 and 5-7 in league play.

South Carolina dug itself in a hole quickly in doubles play, as No. 76 Meghan Blevins and Katerina Popova failed to register a game to No. 62 Nadia Ravita and Aldila Sutjiadi on court two. Following their defeat, No. 30 Elixane Lechemia and Dominika Kanakova had their serve broken to trail 3-2 and later 4-2 versus No. 45 Caitlin McGraw and CeCe Witten at the No. 1 spot. On court three, Ximena Siles Luna and Caroline Dailey held a 4-1 advantage on Kirsten Lewis and Edmee Morin-Kougoucheff.

Unfortunately for the Gamecocks, the No. 1 duo never managed to get closer than 6-5 down. McGraw and Witten went on to claim an 8-5 victory to put the Wildcats ahead 1-0 heading to singles play. At No. 3, Siles Luna and Dailey still led Lewis and Morin-Kougoucheff 7-5 when play stopped.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (April 13, 2014) — The No. 35 South Carolina women's tennis team fell short against No. 5 Vanderbilt on Sunday, dropping a 4-2 decision at Carolina Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks finished the regular season with a 15-9 record overall and went 6-7 in the SEC. Vandy finished up 18-5 with an 11-2 mark for league play.

South Carolina came out much different than it did two days ago when it lost the doubles point to Kentucky. On court two, No. 76 Meghan Blevins and Katerina Popova bounced back from an 8-0 loss to UK by upsetting No. 40 Sydney Campbell and Ashley Antal by an 8-3 score. With the win, Blevins and Popova improved to 4-1 on the spring at the No. 2 spot in SEC play.

The Gamecocks' Caroline Dailey and Ximena Siles Luna led No. 58 Frances Altick and Marie Casares 6-3 on court three when Popova and Blevins finished their match-up. In a back-and-forth affair at one, No. 30 Elixane Lechemia and Dominika Kanakova of Carolina led No. 32 Courtney Colton and Lauren Mira 4-3 with the match on serve.

Altick and Casares held serve to make it 6-4 and Dailey did likewise to keep the Gamecocks ahead 7-4 at three. The Commodores held again to cut the deficit to 7-5, but Siles Luna took care of her serve, winning the match at 40-30 with a picture perfect lob that hit the back wall on the bounce out of Vandy's reach.

At one, the match was still on serve with South Carolina ahead 6-5 when play was suspended.

The Commodores faced an even bigger uphill climb in singles, as they pulled their top two singles players, No. 67 Campbell and No. 70 Georgina Sellyn, because of injuries. The remaining four players in the lineup had to move up two places from their normal positions and Mira came in to fill the No. 5 spot and Maggie Leavell the No. 6 court.

The singles matches began with three favoring the Gamecocks and three headed Vandy's direction. As those first sets finished, Folland was making a furious comeback on Antal on court four. COLUMBIA, Mo. (April 17, 2014) — The 30th-ranked and eighth-seeded South Carolina women's tennis team advanced to the quarterfinals of the SEC Tournament on Thursday with a 4-2 win over No. 33 and ninth-seeded Ole Miss in Columbia, Mo., at the Mizzou Tennis Complex. The Gamecocks improved to 16-9 on the season, while the Rebels dropped to 13-9. Carolina will next face No. 3-ranked and top-seeded Alabama on Friday at 3 p.m.

The Gamecocks dominated Ole Miss from start to finish for the doubles point. Ximena Siles Luna and Caroline Dailey earned the first win at the No. 3 spot versus Julia Jones and Zalina Khairudinova by an 8-2 score. From there, No. 47 Meghan Blevins and Katerina Popova secured the point with an 8-1 triumph over Caroline Rohde-Moe and Marija Milutinovic on court two. At one, No. 43 Dominika Kanakova and Elixane Lechemia led No. 87 Erin Stephens and Iris Verboven 6-4 when play was suspended.

Lechemia snagged her 20th victory of the season to push the Gamecocks ahead 2-0 with a 6-1, 6-4 triumph on court one against Rohde-Moe. The junior from Lyon, France, became South Carolina's first 20-match winner this season and improved to 10-5 at the No. 1 singles position.

The Rebels answered back, though, at the No. 5 slot with Stephens picking up a 6-3, 7-5 decision over Dailey. Blevins was just a game away from advancing South Carolina to another two-point advantage when Stephens got the win, leading 5-4 in the second against Khairudinova after winning the first 6-4. (April 18, 2014) — The 30th-ranked and eighth-seeded South Carolina women's tennis team gave top-seeded and No. 3-ranked Alabama all it could handle in a 4-2 loss to the Crimson Tide in the quarterfinals of the SEC Tournament in Columbia, Mo., at the Mizzou Tennis Complex on Friday. South Carolina dropped to 16-10 on the season, while the Crimson Tide improved to 21-3.

The Gamecocks fought hard in the doubles competition but came away empty-handed as Alabama took two of three matches. At No. 2 doubles, the Crimson Tide's No. 41-ranked duo of Mary Anne Daines and Danielle Spielmann led from the outset against No. 47 Katerina Popova and Meghan Blevins en route to an 8-4 triumph. South Carolina answered right back with No. 43 Elixane Lechemia and Dominika Kanakova upsetting seventh-ranked Maya Jansen and Erin Routliffe 8-4 at No. 1 doubles.

The deciding match at No. 3 doubles with Alabama's No. 48 Emily Zabor and Luicelena Perez saw the duo take a 5-3 advantage on Caroline Dailey and Ximena Siles Luna. Zabor and Perez still had a 6-5 lead with a break, but Dailey and Siles Luna broke back to get to 6-all and Dailey then held her serve to give the Gamecocks the lead. When Dailey concluded her match, No. 84 Lechemia led No. 55 Daines 7-5, 4-3 at the No. 1 position, while Blevins had just lost the second set to No. 73 Routliffe at three after winning the first. Folland was tied 2-2 in the third set against Jansen at No. 4 singles.

Lechemia earned a break of serve to take a 5-3 lead on Daines for a chance to serve out the match and pull the Gamecocks within a point of tying the contest. Lechemia grabbed a 40-0 advantage to set up triple match point, but Daines fought her way back to deuce and after fending off two more match points, Daines stole the game to get the set back on serve. The Gamecocks' 26th-ranked duo of Elixane Lechemia and Dominika Kanakova jumped on No. 62 Noelle Malley and Grainne O'Neill at the No. 1 spot. They took a 3-0 lead to start and then extended the advantage to 7-2 before closing out the match by an 8-3 score. It marked the 10th win of the season for Lechemia and Kanakova and upped their mark at the top position to 10-4.

The doubles point ended up being decided by a pair of tiebreakers at the Nos. 2 and 3 spots. At two, No. 51 Meghan Blevins and Katerina Popova trailed 3-1 early against Gabriella De Santis and Sandy Niehaus, but they fought back to take a 5-4 lead. OSU then earned a break of serve to lead 6-5, but the Gamecocks broke back and the match staved on serve to force the tiebreaker. The Gamecocks end the season with a 17-11 record, while Duke improves to 26-4 and moves on to the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. Play begins for the round of 16 Thursday.

South Carolina got a quick win in doubles at the second position where No. 51 Katerina Popova and Meghan Blevins upset No. 36 Ester Goldfeld and Alyssa Smith by a dominant 8-1 score. The Gamecocks, though, faced deficits in the other two matches at one and three. No. 26 Elixane Lechemia and Dominika Kanakova trailed No. 5 Beatrice Capra and Hanna Mar 5-2 at one, while Ximena Siles Luna and Caroline Dailey faced a 5-3 hole versus No. 69 Annie Mulholland and Chalena Scholl.

Unfortunately, the Gamecocks did not claim another game in either of the two matches. Mulholland and Scholl won first with the 8-3 triumph over Siles Luna and Dailey at three. Lechemia and Kanakova made Capra and Mar work for the win at one facing a 7-2 deficit with several break point opportunities, but Duke eventually prevailed with the 8-2 victory for a 1-0 advantage heading to singles play.

The Blue Devils continued to pile on the pressure in singles by taking leads in the first sets of every court except for six. After around an hour of play, though, lightning in the area forced play into suspension. At the break, No. 7 Capra led No. 73 Lechemia 4-3 at one, No. 27 Goldfeld was up 5-2 on No. 107 Popova, and No. 36 Mar led Brigit Folland 6-0, 1-0 at three. In the bottom half, Blevins and No. 116 Scholl were tied 5-all at four, Dailey trailed Kahan 6-1, 2-0, and Siles Luna had a 5-1 upper hand on Mulholland at No. 6 singles.

After about a 40-minute break, play resumed and the Blue Devils continued to push forward. Kahan ended up winning first with a 6-1, 6-0 decision over Dailey at five to make it 2-0. Soon afterward, Mar gave Duke its third point with a 6-0, 6-2 triumph against Folland, and Goldfeld dispatched Popova 6-2, 6-2 on court two to propel Duke forward in the NCAA Tournament.
