



A Strong Finish

It is all about where a team finishes, not where it starts, and the Gamecocks finished as strong as they ever have in 2009. After sitting at a mere 7-7 in the middle of the season and falling to 40th in the ITA rankings. South Carolina finished the season by reaching the guarterfinals of the NCAA Championship for the first time since 1982. The Gamecocks narrowly missed making the Final Four after suffering a 4-3 setback to Georgia in the quarterfinals, further proof of just how well the team was playing at the end of the season. South Carolina was sent to Knoxville, Tenn., for the first and second rounds of the tournament and upended Wake Forest easily in the first round for the opportunity to play 10th-seeded and ranked Tennessee in the round of 32. After five-plus hours, the Gamecocks escaped with a 4-3 win to make the round of 16 for the first time since 1999. In their first match in College Station, Texas, they posted a 4-0 win against Washington to reach the quarterfinals and solidify themselves as the "Cinderella Team" of 2009.

Undefeated Gamecocks in the NCAAs

Junior Ana Marija Zubori went 4-0 in the team portion of the NCAA Championships with victories against Wake Forest, Tennessee, Washington and Georgia. For her career, Zubori is also a perfect 6-0 with all six victories coming at No. 2 singles. The Gamecocks' doubles teams at positions two and three also posted 4-0 records in the NCAA team tourney to help clinch the doubles point each time. Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic played the No. 2 spot while Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic secured court three.

20-Plus Dual Match Wins for Zubori

Junior Ana Marija Zubori recorded 23 dual match victories this season, making her the first Gamecock since 1995 to win at least 20 in one season. It also marked the most dual wins by a Gamecock since Biljana Mirkovic had the same number in 1987. An interesting note, Mirkovic coached Zubori at one point during Zubori's junior career prior to attending South Carolina. Rita Winebarger holds the record for most dual wins in a season with 31 in 1985. Second place belongs to Diane Commons with 24 in 1985 and Mirkovic and Zubori are now tied for third.

Petrovic Earns Regional Award

Gamecock assistant coach Katarina Petrovic was named the 2009 ITA Southeast Region Assistant Coach of the Year. Petrovic is the first assistant coach at South Carolina to pick up the honor. Petrovic has been the catalyst behind the Gamecocks' recruiting efforts, bringing in star athletes such as Gira Schofield, Natasa Vuckovic and Ana Marija Zubori. The trio has earned 10 allconference citations during their careers, received five bids to the NCAA Singles Championship and two to the NCAA Doubles Championship. They also helped propel the Gamecocks to the NCAA quarterfinals in 2009.

Gamecocks Earn NCAA Individual Bids

Senior Gira Schofield became the first player in school history to earn four consecutive bids to the NCAA Sin-

gles Championship in 2009. She was joined in the singles tournament by junior Ana Marija Zubori, who made her first appearance. Schofield made the second round and lost a tough three-set battle in the second round to LSU's Megan Falcon, while Zubori was beaten by the tournament's No. 2 seed Julia Cohen of Miami (Fla.) in the first round. Zubori also competed in the doubles championship with Natasa Vuckovic and the duo fell to the No. 1 seed in the tourney in the first round. It marked the first time since 2002 South Carolina competed in both individual tournaments in the same year.

Reaching 400

South Carolina head coach Arlo Elkins captured his 400th career victory when the Gamecocks defeated Washington in the NCAA Sweet 16 to reach the Elite Eight. The first coach in any sport at South Carolina to be named SEC Coach of the Year (1995), Elkins won his 100th match Jan. 20, 1990, against N.C. State. His 200th happened March 24, 1996, against Vanderbilt and No. 300 came Jan. 29, 2003, versus College of Charleston. During Elkins' tenure as head coach, the Gamecocks have been to the NCAA Tournament 17 times including the past 15 and finished in the top 25 of the final team rankings 14 times.

School First for Zubori

Junior Ana Marija Zubori pulled off something that had never been done at South Carolina this season when she finished the season ranked in singles and doubles for the third year in a row. A handful of Gamecocks had ended the season ranked in singles and doubles in consecutive years but none ever pulled it off three straight times. In fact, no player in school history had ever been ranked in doubles at season's end three times either. Senior Gira Schofield also pulled off the feat in doubles this season when she and Miljana Jocic snuck in the final rankings. Zubori completed her freshman year ranked 108th in singles and 40th in doubles, she was 73rd in singles and 34th in doubles in 2008, and she improved to 43rd in singles and 27th for doubles this past season.

All-SEC Teams

Senior Gira Schofield and junior Ana Marija Zubori snagged All-SEC honors for the Gamecocks this season. Schofield made the second team to become the first player in school history to earn All-SEC recognition four consecutive seasons. Schofield was a second-team honoree in 2006 and 2008 as well. As a sophomore, she became just the second player at South Carolina to earn first-team accolades. Zubori became the third Gamecock in school history to make the first team when she picked up the honor this season. She made the second team her first two years at Carolina and will look to join Schofield as a four-time award winner next year.

More School Firsts for Schofield

In addition to being the first player in school history to earn All-SEC honors four times and reach the NCAA Singles Championship four consecutive years, Gira Schofield accomplished another first by becoming the

first Gamecock to earn a national singles ranking at season's end four years in a row. As a freshman in 2006, she finished 54th, improved to 53rd in 2007, finished 40th as a junior and came in at 33rd as a senior. Her final ranking of No. 33 as a senior was the best finish for a Gamecock since 2000 when current assistant coach Katarina Petrovic ended the year 29th. Schofield also snuck in the final doubles rankings for 2009 with Miljana Jocic at No. 72 to join Ana Marija Zubori as one of the first players in school history to post a doubles ranking at season's end three times. Schofield was 40th in 2007 and 34th in 2008 when she and Zubori combined to form South Carolina's top duo.

Four Individuals Ranked

Senior Gira Schofield and junior Ana Marija Zubori ended the season ranked 33rd and 43rd in singles, while Zubori and senior Natasa Vuckovic were 27th in doubles and Schofield and Miljana Jocic placed 72nd. Vuckovic and Zubori were ranked the entire spring, whereas Schofield and Jocic were unranked until the final rankings in May. It marked the most ranked players for South Carolina since 2002 when three Gamecocks made the singles list and two doubles teams achieved a national ranking. With Schofield and Zubori both finishing in the top 50, it was the first time since 1987 that multiple Gamecocks earned final singles rankings in the top 50 and only the fourth time it has happened in school history.

Vuckovic Among Elite Company

Senior Natasa Vuckovic is among elite company at South Carolina having won at least 20 singles matches four straight years. Only five other Gamecocks have accomplished the feat, the most recent being Jennifer Radman, Tamara Sutton and Lynn-Yin Tan. All three players won at least 20 per season four straight years from 1999 to 2002. Rita Winebarger also posted four consecutive seasons of 20 or more wins from 1985 to 1988, as did Carolina Culik from 1987 to 1990. Winebarger actually won over 30 matches in three of her four years, a large reason why she owns the school's all-time record for singles wins at 127.

A Ranking Best for Schofield

Senior Gira Schofield surpassed her previous career record of a No. 23 national singles ranking when the Feb. 19 list had her pegged at 19th. Previously, Schofield was No. 71 heading into the spring, a jump of 52 spots. Schofield won 13 matches in a row dating back to last fall before losing at Clemson.

Zubori Comes Close to School Record

Junior Ana Marija Zubori's stellar fall season that saw her go 8-2 with four wins against players ranked in the top 50 of the fall preseason ITA rankings paid off with a No. 14 national singles ranking to begin the spring. Zubori's rating of 14th fell one short of tying the school record held by current assistant coach Katarina Petrovic. Petrovic reached the top recorded ranking in school history of 13th on March 29, 2000. She went on to finish the year ranked No. 29.



COLUMBIA, S.C. — The South Carolina women's tennis team earned a critical 5-2 victory over Ole Miss on Sunday at Maxcy Gregg Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks evened their SEC record at 3-3 and improved to 10-7 overall, while the Rebels dropped to 9-6 and 2-4 in the league. Ole Miss entered the match riding a four-match unbeaten streak and upended No. 14 Florida two days earlier before facing South Carolina.

Carolina got off to a sluggish start in doubles. The Gamecocks' Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic won easily against Mimi Renaudin and Laura van de Stroet on court two 8-1, but positions one and three went to Ole Miss. Abigail Guthrie and Gabriela Rangel first defeated Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic at three 8-5, and then the duo of Kristi Boxx and Karen Nijssen beat Natasa Vuckovic and Ana Marija Zubori 8-5 to put the Rebels ahead 1-0 heading to singles.

The Gamecocks came out firing in singles, winning the first set on courts two through six while losing the first set at No. 1 singles in a tiebreaker. Four straight-set victories at two through five singles secured the win for South Carolina.

"I was very displeased with our emotion and effort in the doubles," South Carolina head coach Arlo Elkins said. "We really turned it around in singles. We had great energy on every court and when we have it, we are a very tough team for anyone to beat."

Stojic got things rolling in singles with a convicing 6-2, 6-0 win over van de Stroet at the No. 3 spot. It marked the fourth consecutive victory for Stojic and upped her record on the spring to 6-4.

Jocic put the Gamecocks ahead 2-1 after she earned a 6-2, 6-2 triumph over Guthrie on court five. Jocic has won her last three matches in a row and is now 3-3 in the SEC this season.

Vuckovic extended the lead to 3-1 after beating Rangel 6-4, 6-4 at the No. 4 hole. It gave Vuckovic her 91st career singles victory and moved her into sole possession of fifth place on South Carolina's all-time list. Three more wins will tie her for fourth place with Tamara Sutton.

The Rebels got their first and only point in singles when Boxx defeated Schofield 7-6(4), 6-1 at the top slot. Schofield held a 5-4 lead in the first set before the two battled their way into a tiebreaker. After winning the first game of the second set, Schofield lost six straight games to give Boxx the victory.

Zubori provided the clinching point at No. 2 singles against Nijssen. After snagging the first set 6-4, some erratic play left Zubori in a 3-0 hole to start the second, but she recovered to win the next two games to cut the deficit to one. Nijssen claimed the next two games for a commanding 5-2 advantage, but Zubori caught fire and took three straight games. The two each held serve and then played a tiebreaker, which Zubori dominated 7-2 to lift South Carolina to victory.

Zubori has been nearly untouchable this spring, improving to 15-1 in dual matches at No. 2 singles this spring. She is a perfect 6-0 in SEC matches and owns a 23-3 overall record to go along with her No. 41 national ranking.

No. 6 singles was the last match to finish on the day. Mansour cruised in the first set 6-2 against Renaudin, but Renaudin won easily in the second 6-1 to force a third set. The two were tied 2-all once Zubori had clinched the match.

Mansour won the fifth game to lead 3-2 on the changeover, but Renaudin came back to win the next two. The two split the next two games to make it 5-4 for Renaudin. Fighting exhaustion, Mansour continued her steady play around the court and took advantage of opportunities against Renaudin to win three straight games for a 7-5 victory in the third.

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — The No. 30 South Carolina women's tennis team extended its unbeaten streak to four matches Friday in Fayetteville, Ark., with a 5-2 victory over 15th-ranked Arkansas. The Gamecocks improved to 11-7 overall and 4-3 in the SEC with the win while the Razorbacks dipped to 9-6 and 4-3 in the league.

South Carolina set the tone early by sweeping all three doubles positions for just the second time this season. Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic won first at the second slot over Aurelija MIseviciute and Ela Kaluder by an 8-4 score. After taking a 4-2 lead, Schofield and Jocic surrendered two straight games to Arkansas before ripping off four games in a row for the win over the No. 62-ranked doubles team.

Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic clinched the doubles point for the Gamecocks on court three. After going ahead 6-4, the two won a tightly contested 11th game to lead 7-4. Arkansas closed the margin to 7-5 before Mansour and Stojic closed it out for an 8-5 victory and a 1-0 South Carolina lead heading to singles play.

The final match on court one saw Natasa Vuckovic and Ana Marija Zubori of South Carolina leading the No. 29 duo of Nanar Airapetian and Anouk Tigu 7-6 before the Razorback duo evened the score. Vuckovic and Zubori, though, countered by winning the next two games to complete the sweep with a 9-7 triumph.

"I thought our doubles play was as good as its been all year today," Gamecock head coach Arlo Elkins said. "We came out with great intensity and it set the tone for the rest of the day. I'm very proud of our team because everyone contributed in this win."

Zubori continued her impressive play this spring by winning first in singles with a 6-2, 6-3 victory over Tigu at No. 2 singles. Zubori went down 2-1 in the second set before recovering to take a 3-2 lead and later was up 4-3. She could do no wrong in the final two games, breaking Tigu at love to lead 5-3 and then played a nearly flawless service game to earn the win. Zubori is 24-3 overall this season and 16-1 at the second singles position, including a 7-0 record in the SEC.

Vuckovic came through next for Carolina on court four. Her ball placement around the court frustrated Carbone the entire match en route to a 6-3, 6-2 victory. It was the fourth win in a row for Vuckovic and upped her record to 18-10 and 5-2 in league play.

Stojic clinched the match for the Gamecocks at No. 3 singles, upending Kaluder 6-4, 6-3. Stojic actually had a 5-0 advantage in the second set before Kaluder began creeping back in by winning three consecutive games, but Stojic broke her serve in the ninth game to snag her fifth win in a row.

Mansour scored South Carolina's final point of the day on court six to make the score 5-0. After blanking Lukomskaya 6-0 in the first set, she dropped the second 6-2 to force a third. Mansour then jumped ahead 5-1 in the third before eventually winning 6-3 for her second SEC win a row.

Airpetian scored the Razorbacks' first point at five singles. She lost the first set 6-1 to Jocic but came back to win the second 6-3. With the match already decided, the two played a super tiebreaker for the third set, and Airapetian claimed it 10-4.

Court one finished last with Miseviciute defeating Schofield 6-3, 7-6(6). Schofield held a 5-4 advantage and had a chance to take the set with Miseviciute serving at 30-40, but she saved the point and took the game. Miseviciute then broke Schofield's serve and Schofield returned the favor to force a tiebreaker. In the breaker, Miseviciute went up 3-0, but Schofield responded by winning six straight points. Then it was Miseviciute's turn for a streak, as she won five straight points to steal the set.

LSU snagged the doubles point by winning the second and third positions. Nicole Kantor and Staten Spencer won first on court three over Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic 8-3. Hannah Robinson and Whitney Wolf then defeated Miljana Jocic and Gira Schofield 8-5 to give the Tigers the point.

Wolf had a commanding 5-2 lead with 40-15 on her serve, but Stojic fought off both match points and eventually took the game to make it 5-3. After Stojic went ahead 30-15 in the next game, Wolf called for an injury timeout. Following the timeout, Stojic continued wearing down her opponent down to earn a 1-6, 6-3, 7-5 victory, her sixth in a row.

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Senior Gira Schofield from the South Carolina women's tennis team scored a win against the nation's No. 6-ranked player in helping the Gamecocks defeat Auburn on Friday at Maxcy Gregg Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. Carolina improved to 12-8 overall with the win and 5-4 in the SEC while Auburn dropped to 11-9 and 3-5 in league play.

Some outstanding doubles play on courts two and three earned South Carolina a 1-0 lead heading to singles play. At three, Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic defeated Fani Chifchieva and Jil Hastenrath 8-3, and then Schofield and Miljana Jocic ousted Myrthe Molenveld and Daniela Vukadinovic 8-4 at the No. 3 spot.

The last match to finish at court one went to the Tigers. The Gamecocks' Ana Marija Zubori and Natasa Vuckovic had a 5-4 lead on Alex Haney and Whitney Chappell, but Haney and Chappell came back to win four straight games and earn an 8-5 victory.

Needing just one point for the win, Stojic came through at three singles for South Carolina. She lost the first set to Chappell 6-4, but blanked Chappell in the second to force a third. Stojic then got behind 3-0 before mounting an amazing comeback. She began to grind and force Chappell to hit one more ball when it looked as if the point was over and it worked to perfection. Stojic ran off six consecutive games by wearing her opponent down to pick up her seventh straight victory.

Haney scored Auburn's final point with a 6-7(3), 7-6(0), 6-3 win against Zubori at the second position. Zubori trailed 5-2 in both the first and second sets before forcing tiebreakers, but Haney proved to be too tough in the third set.

Schofield's big win at No. 1 singles capped off the day for South Carolina. After losing the first set 6-2 to No. 6-ranked and 2008 SEC Player of the Year Chifchieva, Schofield changed up her strategy and began hitting heavy, deep topspin shots over and over. COLUMBIA, S.C. — The 24th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team recorded a decisive 6-1 victory against No. 26 Alabama on Sunday at Maxcy Gregg Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks improved to 13-8 and 6-4 in the SEC with the win while the Crimson Tide fell to 13-7 and 3-7 in the league.

South Carolina now has a chance to clinch a first-round bye in the SEC Tournament if it can defeat No. 21 Florida on Saturday in Gainesville, Fla., at 10 a.m. Both squads are 6-4 in the conference and the winner will earn either the No. 3 or No. 4 seed at the conference tournament, which takes place April 23-26 in Fayetteville, Ark.

For the second straight match, South Carolina's outstanding play on courts two and three in doubles earned it the doubles point. At No. 3 doubles, Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic came back from early deficits of 2-1 and 3-2 to Alice Tunaru and Shelley Godwin, taking the lead for good at 4-3. With a 5-4 lead, the Gamecocks' Mansour held serve and then a break put Carolina ahead 7-4. South Carolina held on Stojic's serve to win 8-4.

Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic's match at the second slot versus Paulina Bigos and Taylor Lindsey finished 8-4 in favor of the Gamecocks. After racing ahead 5-0, Alabama managed to win four of the next six games, but the hole was too deep to escape.

The Crimson Tide earned a victory at No. 1 doubles prior to the Gamecocks' win on court two. Tiffany Welcher and Courtney McLane trailed 2-0 after the first two games against Ana Marija Zubori and Natasa Vuckovic, but they recovered by winning the next six games for a commanding lead. Zubori and Vuckovic then won three straight and nearly made it four with Alabama serving down 0-40, but the Tide won five straight points to make it 7-5. After Vuckovic held to make it 7-6, Alabama held to pick up the 8-6 win.

The Gamecocks wasted no time in singles putting pressure on Alabama, as they won first sets on five of the six courts. Vuckovic ended up being the first to finish despite a 4-1 disadvantage in the first set to Meritt Emery. She won six of the next seven games to win the set 7-5 and then cruised in the next set 6-1.

The win gave Vuckovic her 20th singles victory of the year, making her just the sixth player in school history to win at least 20 singles matches four straight years. She is currently tied for fourth on the Gamecocks' all-time list for singles victories with 94.

No more than 15 seconds after Vuckovic's victory, Schofield finished off Welcher at the top position 6-0, 6-1. Schofield won nine straight games before giving up one to Welcher and then took three more in a row for the impressive victory.

Alabama scored its only point at the No. 6 slot, where Lindsey defeated Mansour 6-3, 6-3 to make the score 3-1.

Stojic provided the clinching point for South Carolina at No. 3 singles. She defeated the hard-hitting Bigos 6-2 in the first and then won 6-4 in the second. After a 2-4 start this spring, Stojic has rebounded to win eight consecutive matches, six of which have come in SEC play at No. 3 singles.

With the match decided, Alabama defaulted at No. 2 and No. 5 singles in order to get an early start on its trip back to Tuscaloosa. On court two, Zubori won the first set 6-2 versus McLane and trailed 4-3 in the second when the match was called. At five, Jocic won 6-2 in the first over Godwin and was behind 4-2 in the second before play was stopped.

South Carolina dropped to 13-9 and 6-5 in the SEC while Florida improved to 13-7 and 7-4 in the league to secure a first-round bye in next week's SEC Tournament in Fayetteville, Ark.

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — The 22nd-ranked and sixth-seeded South Carolina women's tennis team (14-9, 6-5 SEC) battled its way past No. 25 and 11th-seeded Kentucky (12-10, 3-8 SEC) on Thursday in the first round of the SEC Tournament by a 4-2 score in Fayetteville, Ark. The Gamecocks next face No. 10-ranked and third-seeded Tennessee (15-5, 8-3 SEC) on Friday at 2:30 p.m. CT.

"We knew coming in this would be a tough match and a real dog fight, which is exactly what it was," Gamecock head coach Arlo Elkins said. "I'm very proud of our effort and the way we picked it up after a slow start in singles. We are really looking forward to a competitive match with Tennessee tomorrow."

Like the regular-season meeting between the two squads, South Carolina won the doubles point by claiming positions one and two. Natasa Vuckovic and Ana Marija Zubori won first at the top spot by an 8-4 count against Carolina Escamilla and Caroline Lilley. Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic clinched the point at two with an 8-6 triumph over Megan Broderick and Christine Johnston.

The Wildcats' duo of Lauren Meier and Whitney Spencer led Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic 7-5 at No. 3 doubles when South Carolina had clinched the point.

South Carolina got off to a slow start in singles play, trailing on five of six courts after a few games had been played. Kentucky won four first sets on the six courts, but the Gamecocks forced a third set on three of them to make for an exciting match.

Spencer evened the score at 1-all after taking care of Mansour 6-2, 6-0 at the No. 6 position, but Vuckovic struck back for South Carolina on court four with a 6-2, 6-2 victory against Johnston to put Carolina back on top. With the victory, Vuckovic took over sole possession of fourth place on the school's all-time list for singles victories with 95.

Schofield put the Gamecocks within a point of clinching the match by upending Escamilla 6-3, 6-3 at the No. 1 position. It was the 20th singles victory of the season for the senior, marking her third 20-win season in four years with the team. One more singles win will allow Schofield to crack the school's top-10 list, which requires at least 86.

Broderick came through for Kentucky at the second slot with a 7-6(2), 4-6, 6-0 win over Zubori. Zubori missed out on several set points in the first before coming back to win the second. It was just the sixth loss of the season for Zubori and only her fourth of the spring at No. 2 singles.

The remaining two matches on courts three and five were well into the third set once Broderick snagged her victory. Jocic raced ahead of Lilley 4-1 in the third after losing the first set 6-4 and winning the second 6-1. Stojic lost the first set to Meier in a tiebreaker 7-1 but cruised to a 6-2 victory in the second.

Stojic proved to be the deciding match for South Carolina. After going ahead 4-2, Meier came back to win two straight games, but Stojic held serve to grab a 5-4 lead at the changeover. Stojic then broke Meier to propel South Carolina into the quarterfinals.

Jocic held a 5-2 lead in the third with Lilley serving at 0-15 when play was stopped.

The Gamecocks dropped to 14-10 overall with the loss while the Lady Vols improved to 16-5 and will face No. 7-seeded Ole Miss in the semifinals on Saturday.

"Even though the outcome was not in our favor, I can't ask for a better effort," Gamecock head coach Arlo Elkins said. "Our effort level toward the end of the season has been very high and that's the most important thing to me. We are looking forward to the NCAA selection show next week."

The 2009 NCAA Division I men's and women's tennis selection announcements will air Tuesday at approximately 5:20 p.m. on ESPNews. ESPNews is located on DirecTV channel 207/ DishNetwork channel 142. In addition, the ESPNews audio signal is available on the ESPNews channel on XM Radio and SIRIUS Radio.

The Gamecocks failed to take the doubles point, losing at positions one and three. At one, Caitlin Whoriskey and Natalie Pluskota dropped Ana Marija Zubori and Natasa Vuckovic 8-1, but South Carolina responded with an 8-2 triumph at two thanks to Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic topping Rosalía Alda and Zsofia Zubor.

The deciding match for the point came at the third slot. Maria Sorbello and Jennifer Meredith had a 5-4 advantage on Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic after Mansour managed to hold serve. UT then moved ahead 6-4, but Stojic held to make it 6-5. The Lady Vols then held serve and broke Stojic to claim the point.

Tennessee quickly moved forward with a 3-0 advantage after winning handily on courts four and six. Meredith took care of Vuckovic first at the No. 4 singles spot by scores of 6-2, 6-3. Soon afterward, Sorbello defeated Mansour 6-3, 6-1 on court six.

The Gamecocks then began coming back, first getting a point on court three with Stojic upending Samantha Orlin 6-4, 6-3. The victory avenged a 6-4, 6-4 loss Stojic took to Orlin in the regular season and upped her record to 12-5. Stojic has won 10 of 11 matches after starting the spring 2-4.

Next, Zubori posted a straight set decision over Pluskota 7-6(8), 6-3 at No. 2 singles to close the margin to 3-2. Zubori trailed 4-2 in the first-set tiebreaker before winning four straight points, but Pluskota came back to make it 6-all. After eventually winning 10-8, Zubori coasted through the final set to improve to 27-6 on the season and 19-4 at two singles.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — The 22nd-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament on Saturday with a 4-0 win over No. 40 Wake Forest (13-13) in Knoxville, Tenn. The Gamecocks (15-10) next face the winner of No. 10 Tennessee and East Tennessee State at 1 p.m. Sunday for the right to compete in the NCAA Championships in College Station, Texas, starting May 15.

"We came out and took care of business today," South Carolina head coach Arlo Elkins said. "This team has worked extremely hard since the SEC Tournament; as hard as any team I can remember in quite some time. The result of that hard work was quite evident today. We're very much looking forward to a great opportunity on Sunday."

The Gamecocks won the doubles point by claiming positions two and three for the early 1-0 lead. At three, Dijana Stojic and Suzanna Mansour stormed ahead on Ryann Cutillo and Katarina Reveche 5-0, but the Wake duo responded by winning four straight games. South Carolina then went ahead 6-4 and later 7-5 before winning 8-5.

On court two, Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic fell behind 4-2 versus Emilee Malvehy and Aileen Davis. Schofield and Jocic picked up their games and ran off five games in a row for a commanding 7-4 advantage. After the Demon Deacons cut the deficit to 7-5, Schofield served out the match for an 8-5 victory.

Just as singles play started, a brief rain shower suspended play. After more than an hour delay attempting to dry the courts, play was moved indoors when tournament officials determined more rain was on the way.

The Gamecocks snagged their first point in singles at the No. 2 position where Ana Marija Zubori defeated Sierra Poske 6-3, 6-1. Zubori trailed 3-2 in the first set before winning four consecutive games to take the set. In the second, she won the first two games before surrendering a game to Poske. She then closed it out by winning the next four games to record her 20th dual match victory of the season.

Schofield made the score 3-0 after taking care of Sasha Kulikova at the top slot 6-2, 6-3. Schofield got behind 2-0 in the second set before recovering to snatch her 21st win of the season. It also propelled Schofield into the top 10 on the Gamecocks' career list for singles victories with 86.

Stojic provided the final point for South Carolina at No. 3 singles. After winning the first set handily 6-2 over Malvehy, she faced a 3-0 hole in the second, but came back to tie the score 3-all. Malvehy, though, won the next three games to force a third set. Stojic dominated the third the same way she did the first. She ended the match win an overhead smash at the net on a short ball to put the Gamecocks in the second round for the 13th time in their 15-year streak of NCAA appearances.

"Everyone played very well," South Carolina freshman Dijana Stojic said. "I was very excited to have the chance to clinch our match today and thankfully it worked out. It's been a great experience for me playing in the NCAA Tournament and I'm happy I was able to help the team advance."

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — It took over five hours to decide and in the end, the No. 22 South Carolina women's tennis team (16-10) triumphed over No. 10-ranked and seeded Tennessee (18-7) 4-3 in Knoxville, Tenn., to reach the NCAA round of 16. South Carolina now faces Washington in College Station, Texas, on Friday, May 15, at 1 p.m. ET. Washington is the only other team besides the Game-cocks not among the tournament's top 16 seeds to reach the round of 16 after the Huskies stunned No. 7-seeded Southerm California 4-3.

"That was without a doubt one of the best college tennis matches I've ever seen or been a part of," South Carolina head coach Arlo Elkins said. "Both teams played so well on every court and competed so hard. I just can't say how proud I am of this team for what they've accomplished. We're very eager to get to College Station."

Gamecock senior Gira Schofield provided the clinching point for South Carolina at the No. 1 singles position against Caitlin Whoriskey of Tennessee. Schofield entered the match having lost her prior two match-ups with Whoriskey during the regular season and SEC Tournament but held on for a thrilling 7-5, 6-7(8), 6-4 triumph in front of a raucous Lady Vol crowd.

"It's the best feeling in the world, especially when you win and your teammates are hugging you and you put in so much work," Schofield said. "At the end, to have a victory and make the Sweet 16, it's just awesome."

After falling behind 5-1 in the first set, Schofield stormed back and took six straight games to win the set. In the second, she got down 5-2 but came back once again to force a tiebreaker. In the breaker, Schofield had one match point at 6-5, but Whoriskey played three excellent points in a row to send the match to a third set with the team score tied 3-all.

Schofield took an early break to lead 2-0, but Whoriskey rebounded with a break to put the match back on serve. The match stayed that way until Schofield recorded another break to push ahead 4-2. She nearly made it 5-2 after snagging a 40-0 lead on her serve, but Whoriskey dug deep, fought back to deuce and eventually broke Schofield to make the score 4-3.

With the UT crowd cheering loudly for Whoriskey, Schofield kept her composure and once again broke Whoriskey to take a 5-3 lead. Schofield then got up 40-15 on her serve, but Whoriskey managed to fight off the two match points and extended the match to a 10th game. It was in the 10th game that a final break of serve ended the Lady Vols' season. It looked as if the match would go to an 11th game after Whoriskey stormed ahead 40-0, but Schofield won five straight points, finishing the match off with a blistering crosscourt forehand winner on a short ball at the net.

"I was trying to play one point at a time, that was my main focus," Schofield said. "When I was serving, my focus was on my first serve, getting it in. On the returns, I wanted to put the first return deep because then I could set up the point and create different options where I could move her."

"It's always disappointing to lose, but this one is pretty tough," Whoriskey said. "She is a very talented player, though, and really played about as well as I've ever seen her play today. She came out and just had a couple more winners than I did and I think that is what decided the match."

South Carolina got off to a strong start by winning the doubles point. Dijana Stojic and Suzanna Mansour recorded the first victory at No. 3 doubles with an 8-2 triumph against Zsofia Zubor and Samantha Orlin. Schofield and Miljana Jocic secured the point by upending Jennifer Meredith and Maria Sorbello on court two by an 8-4 count.

In singles, Stojic took care of Orlin 6-2, 6-2 at No. 3 singles to put South Carolina up 2-0. Zubor scored Tennessee's first point when she defeated Mansour 7-5, 6-2 at six singles and Meredith tied the match thanks to a 7-6, 6-4 victory against Natasa Vuckovic on court four.

Ana Marija Zubori recorded a critical win for South Carolina at No. 2 singles when she outlasted Natalie Pluskota in three sets 6-2, 5-7, 6-4 to make it 3-2 for the Gamecocks. Shortly afterward, Sorbello pulled a come-from-behind 2-6, 6-3, 6-3 triumph over Jocic at No. 5 singles to set the stage for the exciting finish.

South Carolina is in the NCAA round of 16 for the first time since 1999, for the fourth time under Elkins and for the sixth time overall in the program's history since the NCAA first held a championship in 1982. Besides this season and 1999, the Gamecocks' other showings came in 1982, 1983, 1990 and 1995. Carolina's best finish was a quarterfinal appearance in 1982.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — The No. 22-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team (17-10) continued its NCAA run Friday afternoon with a 4-0 victory against No. 32-ranked Washington (18-8) in the round of 16 at the NCAA Championships in College Station, Texas.

The Gamecocks next take on No. 2-seeded and ranked Georgia (26-2) in the quarterfinals on Sunday at 2 p.m. ET at the Mitchell Tennis Center. Georgia recorded at 4-2 victory over No. 15-seeded and ranked Florida in the round of 16.

"It was a great effort," South Carolina coach Arlo Elkins said. "At the end of the season, we've been playing very well. I could tell when we were in final exams that we were going to play well. This team was really focused during finals week, and we practiced for an hour and a half to two hours every day. We were totally focused. They felt good about the opportunity of what we have in front of us. I think they really took advantage of it today."

Gamecock junior Ana Marija Zubori clinched the victory for South Carolina at No. 2 singles, earning her 30th victory of the season in the process to become only the second player in school history to post multiple 30-win seasons. Zubori went 31-6 her freshman year and now sits at 30-6 for the 2008-09 campaign.

After winning the first set handily 6-2 against Denise Dy, Zubori allowed Dy to get right back in the match when she faltered 6-2 in the second. It looked as though Dy might run away with the match after she snagged a 2-0 lead in the third, but Zubori recovered to win the next three games. Serving at 3-all, Zubori came away with a critical hold after Dy had break point to lead 4-3. The two continued to hold serve until Zubori broke Dy leading 30-40 in the 12th game when Dy hit a forehand that sailed beyond the baseline.

"The match was difficult because the weather was tough and it was really hot," Zubori said. "It was a good opportunity to go to the quarterfinals. We gave our best and gave 100 percent of our abilities, and at the end, it worked. I was the lucky one to finish, but all the girls, that was a team win because everybody gave 100 percent. In doubles, we were really good, and then we won 4-0, so it's everybody's win."

While Zubori and partner Natasa Vuckovic were defeated in their No. 1 doubles match against Dy and Joyce Ardies 8-5, the Gamecocks still won the point thanks to outstanding play on courts two and three. After court one finished, Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic ousted Venise Chan and Aleksandra Malovic 8-4 at No. 2 doubles. It did not take much longer for Suzanna Mansour and Dijana Stojic to upend Samantha Smith and Lina Xu 8-5 at three to give South Carolina the 1-0 lead.

The Gamecocks' doubles tandems at positions two and three are each 3-0 in the NCAA Tournament this season, helping South Carolina to win the doubles point in their victories against Wake Forest, Tennessee and Washington.

Schofield trailed Chan 2-0 in the early goings of her match at No. 1 singles but stormed back for a 6-4 victory in the first set. In the second, Schofield won a critical deuce game to push ahead 4-1. Chan called for an injury timeout during the changeover and Schofield went on to win the match 6-2 in the second.

In addition to putting her team on top 2-0, Schofield took over sole possession of seventh place on the Gamecocks' all-time list for singles victories with 88.

Stojic moved South Carolina to within one point of clinching the match with a 7-5, 6-2 triumph over Xu on court three. Stojic actually fell behind 4-1 in the first set but closed back to 5-4 and fought off a set point to make it 5-all. She dominated the second set to pick up her 13th victory in her last 14 matches.

After Zubori clinched the match, courts four, five and six were all suspended third sets. Vuckovic led Smith 3-2 in the third, while Jocic was ahead of Ardies 2-0. Mansour and Malovic had just started their third set when play was stopped.

The Gamecocks' top three singles positions have been unstoppable during this postseason. Schofield, Zubori and Stojic are each 3-0 in South Carolina's three victories thus far.

South Carolina's victory also gave Elkins his 400th career victory. Elkins is in his 26th season as head coach of the women's tennis program and is a member of the South Carolina Tennis Hall of Fame.

"Whether it was the 400th or the first or 10th or whatever, it was a heck of a win for us," Elkins said. "I'm really proud of the effort the girls put in. It was really hot and they put in an unbelievable effort, so the No. 400 is just a number. What I'm looking for is 401, 402 and 403 in this tournament. You know, you have to be proud of yourself for being involved with 400 wins, but on the other hand, I'm more proud of what the girls did today than it being my 400th win."

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — The No. 22-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team (17-11) saw its NCAA Championships run come to an end Sunday in the quarterfinals with an epic 4-3 loss to No. 2-seeded and ranked Georgia (27-2) at the Mitchell Tennis Center in College Station, Texas.

The deciding match came at No. 3 singles between Georgia's Nadja Gilchrist and the Gamecocks' Dijana Stojic. Gilchrist took the first set 6-4, but Stojic answered with a 6-4 victory in the second to force a third set that wound up deciding the fate for each team.

After falling behind 0-40 on her serve in the first game of the third set, Stojic managed to come back and hold for a 1-0 lead. Stojic had a chance for a break up 2-1 and 30-40 on Gilchrist's serve, but the Bulldog fought back to make it 2-all and then broke Stojic for a 3-2 advantage.

With fatigue hampering both players, the next four games ended up being service breaks, but Stojic had a critical hold in the ninth game to lead 5-4 with a chance to break Gilchrist for the match. With the score tied 15-all, Gilchrist won the next three points to continue the match and then broke Stojic in the next game after several deuces for a chance to serve it out.

Gilchrist called for an injury timeout heading to the changeover after taking a 6-5 lead because of cramping and Stojic received treatment as well. After trading points on the first two rallies of the 12th game, Gilchrist hammered two forehand winners to set up double match point. She hit one more forehand winner at the net after Stojic hit a short ball in the service box to lift the Bulldogs to victory 7-5 in the third.

"It was a real tough battle," South Carolina head coach Arlo Elkins said. "I looked at the draw last night, and there were all these teams that were like 28-1, and 27-4, and 26-2, and then you look at ours and we were 17-10. I think people thought we didn't belong there, but from this match today they showed that we did belong there. One of the reasons we had the record we did is that we played probably the toughest schedule, I think, in the country. Out of the 22 matches we had (in the regular season), 18 were in this NCAA Tournament. And, lalso think that's one of the reasons that it made us play so much better at the end of the year. We were pretty match tested, and I think that was proved today.

"This is what I told this team: I wanted them to set the standard not for this team here but for years to come and getting to the quarters was one and getting to the Final Four would have been it also. But, the reason they really set the standard is not for their wins and losses; they set the standard because of the attitude that they had. You know, we used to be satisfied with winning a round in the regional tournament and now they're really mad that they lost in the quarters, so that's a step forward and now we just have to take it from here."

Sunday's five-hour plus match began with the Gamecocks winning an incredible doubles point. Georgia's No. 1 team of Chelsey Gullickson and Gilchrist defeated Ana Marija Zubori and Natasa Vuckovic 8-4, but the final two matches would go to South Carolina.

Gira Schofield and Miljana Jocic of South Carolina found themselves down 7-6 against Monika Dancevic and Yvette Hyndman on court two and had to fight off a match point to extend the match to 7-all. They then took the next two games for a 9-7 victory to set up the deciding match at No. 3 doubles.

The Gamecocks' Suzanna Mansour and Stojic got off to a shaky start against Naoko Ueshima and Cameron Ellis, falling behind 4-1 after five games. They stormed back to take the next four games for a 5-4 lead, but Georgia answered by winning three games in a row to get within one game of taking the point. After closing the deficit to 7-6 and then tying it at 7-all, Georgia won the next game and South Carolina answered to send it to a tiebreaker. In the breaker, the Gamecocks dominated the Bulldogs 7-3 for the 1-0 lead heading into singles competition.

Žubori added to South Carolina's point total after defeating Hyndman 6-3, 6-3 at No. 2 singles to improve to 31-6 on the season and 23-4 at No. 2 singles. Her 23 dual match victories for the year is the most by a Gamecock since Biljana Mirkovic had the same number in 1987.

Gullickson got things rolling for Georgia after she posted a 6-4, 6-3 decision against Schofield at No. 1 singles to cut the margin to 2-1. Vuckovic, though, answered for South Carolina on court four by taking care of Dancevic 7-6(3), 6-3 to put South Carolina within a point of advancing to the Final Four for the first time in school history.

Ellis then came back after losing the first set to Mansour 6-2 at No. 6 singles to win the second 6-3 and the third 6-1. Ellis held a 3-0 lead in the second before Mansour raced back to make it 3-all, but Ellis closed out the match winning nine of the next 10 games to keep Georgia's hopes alive.

Ueshima and Jocic's match at No. 5 singles finished shortly after the No. 6 match with Ueshima winning 6-3, 6-3 to set up the match's thrilling ending on court three.
