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#### MISSION STATEMENT

The University's mission is threefold: the education of the state's diverse citizens through teaching, research and creative activity, and service.

The University of South Carolina is home to more than 200 years of history and tradition, rising from a single building in 1805 on what would become the heart of the campus, the Horseshoe.

Today, the 11 buildings that make up the Horseshoe frame a lush lawn that is an irresistible gathering place for students, faculty, staff and alumni and the scene of many important university events.

And while the Horseshoe will always be the symbol of Carolina's proud tradition, the University's presence and reach stretch across the Palmetto State, with baccalaureate universities in Aiken, Spartanburg (Upstate) and the sea islands (Beaufort and the gateway to Hilton Head), and two-year regional campuses in Allendale and Walterboro (Salkehatchie), Sumter, Lancaster and Union. Together, they are building economic prosperity; fulfilling the University's mission of teaching, research and service to the state, and preparing future leaders in business, law, education, the arts, tourism, communications, medicine and the health sciences.

- The University of South Carolina's Columbia campus has 324 degree programs through its 14 degree-granting colleges and schools.
- Students at the University of South Carolina have earned 594 national fellowships and scholarships valued at \$16.7 million since 1994. In 2012 alone, 56 students earned more than \$1.4 million for academic study.
- University of South Carolina faculty generated \$238.3 million in funding for research, training and outreach programs in fiscal year 2012, a 5 percent increase from the previous year.
- Five professors at the University of South Carolina have been named 2012 fellows in the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), the world's largest general scientific society.
- The university's Honors College is ranked the No. 1 public university honors college in the nation based on honors college factors by the guidebook, "A Review of Fifty Public University Honors Programs."

#### **UNIVERSITY HISTORY**

In 2001, the University celebrated the bicentennial of its charter, but 2005 also marked a watershed anniversary: 200 years since the first classes began at South Carolina College, as it was then known. Carolina has endured the Civil War and Reconstruction, closings, and name changes. Permanently chartered in 1906 as the University of South Carolina, it grew throughout the 20th century and today is building its reputation as a cutting-edge research institution.



- USC is ranked in the top 5 percent of U.S. public universities in the number of national awards its faculty have received.
- When completed in late 2013, the Darla Moore School of Business building will become the front door of Innovista, the University's research district, and a hub for creativity, research and entrepreneurial activity. The school is pursuing a net zero status and LEED Platinum rating for its cutting-edge new home.
- The USC School of Medicine pioneered the nation's first medical school curriculum that teaches first- through fourth-year students how to use leading ultrasound technologies for bedside diagnosis.
- Twelve USC students received Fulbright grants in 2012 for research, study or teaching abroad. Another six students were awarded National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowships.
- The International House at Maxcy College opened this fall, bringing USC's American and international students together to experience and share each others' cultures.
- USC was recognized in 2012 by both Kiplinger's "Best Values in Public Colleges" and Princeton Review's "Best Value Colleges for 2012 Public."
- USC is one of only 40 public universities to receive the Carnegie Foundation's top-tier research designation and community engagement designation and is the only university in South Carolina with the Carnegie top-tier designation for "very high research activity."

# 2013 Baseball

## **Athletics Development**



The Gamecock Club, established in 1940, provides financial support to the more than 550 student-athletes representing the University of South Carolina. This aid is in the form of tuition fees, meal costs, housing costs, medical costs, injury assistance, and other educational needs. Gamecock Club membership is open to all alumni and friends of the University.

More than 14,000 South Carolina fans donate to the athletics department through annual Gamecock Club memberships. There are currently 47 local chapters throughout South Carolina and an additional 14 out-of-state chapters that span from Houston, Texas, to Washington, D.C.

The Gamecock Club is located at the Rice Athletics Center on 1304 Heyward Street in Columbia and is also online at GamecocksOnline.com/GamecockClub.

South Carolina Athletics' mission centers on developing championship-caliber programs in the Southeastern Conference and nationally.

The Garnet Way Capital Campaign serves as a road map for transforming Gamecock Athletics. The goal of the campaign is to raise \$60 million through philanthropic donations, all of which will be used to improve athletics facilities.

To date, more than \$44 million in campaign pledges has been raised since July 1, 2006. The fundraising goal for the 2012 fiscal year was set at \$6 million. More than \$15 million was raised, far surpassing the department's goal. The accompanying chart depicts the campaign's progress since it's inception, as well as gifts received in the 2013 fiscal year. All numbers are current as of July 31, 2012.

The Garnet Way Capital Campaign is part of the athletics department's \$160 million commitment to the university's Carolina's Promise campaign, which was publicly announced in November 2011. Carolna's Promise aims to raise \$1 billion, making it the largest capital campaign in the history of the Palmetto State. The campaign aims to sustain the university's educational, reserach and outreach efforts and has already achieved more than half of its goal.

#### **Compliance Information**

Dear Alumni, Fans and Friends,

As a University of South Carolina season ticket holder, alumnus, Gamecock Club member or fan, you are, by NCAA definition, a representative of University of South Carolina's athletics interests. Those who actively support Gamecock Athletics are an integral part of our program. Your support enables our student-athletes to train and prepare in quality facilities, compete for championships in the nation's top conference and pursue a college degree. Your level of support is vital to their overall success.

We value your interest and support, but we must remind you that an inappropriate action on your part can jeopardize the eligibility of a student-athlete, prospect and/or the compliance of the University with Southeastern Conference and NCAA regulations.

The NCAA has strictly limited the role you, as a Gamecock fan, may assume with regard to prospects and student-athletes. The following information is intended to provide you with a basic understanding of NCAA rules and regulations that you should know as someone who cares about intercollegiate athletics.

#### PROSPECTIVE STUDENT-ATHLETES

A prospective student-athlete (prospect) is a student who has:

- · Started classes for the ninth grade (seventh grade in the sport of men's basketball), or
- Ever received any financial assistance or other benefit prospective students do not generally receive.

An individual remains a prospect until one of the following occurs (whichever is earlier):

- The individual officially registers and enrolls in a minimum full-time program of studies and attends classes in any term (including summer) of a four-year collegiate institution's regular academic year.
- The individual participates in a regular squad practice or competition at a four-year collegiate institution that occurs before the beginning of any term.

Remember a prospect remains a prospect even after signing a National Letter of Intent with the University of South Carolina.

#### **EXTRA BENEFITS**

The NCAA defines an extra benefit as any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a representative of the institution's athletics interests to provide a student-athlete or the student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation.

Specifically prohibited financial aid, benefits and arrangements include, but are not limited to, the following:

- An employment arrangement for a prospect's relatives
- A gift of clothing or equipment
- The cosigning of loans
- Providing loans to a prospect's relatives or friends
- Cash or like items
- · Any tangible items, including merchandise

#### **EMPLOYMEN**

Boosters may contact a prospect to discuss a summer job ONLY after the prospect has signed a National Letter of Intent to attend the University of South Carolina. In addition, boosters MAY NOT employ or arrange employment of a high school prospective student-athlete until the prospect has completed all classes and graduated from high school.

Enrolled student-athletes are permitted to be employed during the regular academic year as well as during official vacation periods. PRIOR TO the student-athlete's employment, he/she must receive written approval from the Office of Compliance Services and complete the required paperwork.

Student-Athletes and/or employers may be asked to provide records related to employment. This information may include, but is not limited to, payroll records, tax documents and benefit statements.

Please note all employers are subject to NCAA regulations and penalties for any violations.

Compliance with NCAA rules is of the highest priority for our athletics program and institution. As a member of the NCAA, University of South Carolina is responsible for the actions of its alumni, supporters and fans. Even the best-intentioned action on your part may be a violation of NCAA rules.

The University of South Carolina appreciates its alumni and friends who strive for the highest level of ethical conduct while supporting the student-athlete's goals for both academic and athletic success.

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# A Salute To Ray Tanner

Ray Tanner made a difference. In a 16-year career as head coach of the baseball program, South Carolina reached unprecedented heights. Tanner led South Carolina to back-to-back NCAA Division I Baseball Championships in 2010 and 2011 as well as a pair of national runner-up finishes, six College World Series appearances, three SEC championships, six SEC Eastern division titles, a SEC tournament crown. He went to 10 NCAA Super Regionals in 14 NCAA Tournament appearances as well.

Under the direction of Tanner, South Carolina's postseason success from 2010-2012 is arguably the greatest run in collegiate baseball history. In the three-year span, the Gamecocks established NCAA records with 22 consecutive postseason wins and 12 consecutive wins in the College World Series. The Gamecocks won the NCAA Division I Baseball Championship in 2010 and 2011 with a national runner-up finish in 2012. South Carolina's 30-4 (.882) record from 2010-2012 in the NCAA Tournament is the fifth best three-year postseason record in NCAA history.
