

The University of South Carolina is home to more than 200 years of history and tradition, rising from a single building in 1805 on what would become the heart of the campus, the Horseshoe.

Today, the 11 buildings that make up the Horseshoe frame a lush lawn that is an irresistible gathering place for students, faculty, staff and alumni and the scene of many important university events.

And while the Horseshoe will always be the symbol of Carolina's proud tradition, the University's presence and reach stretch across the Palmetto State, with baccalaureate universities in Aiken, Spartanburg (Upstate) and the sea islands (Beaufort and the gateway to Hilton Head), and two-year regional campuses in Allendale and Walterboro (Salkehatchie), Sumter, Lancaster and Union. Together, they are building economic prosperity; fulfilling the University's mission of teaching, research and service to the state, and preparing future leaders in business, law, education, the arts, tourism, communications, medicine and the health sciences.

- ◆ The University of South Carolina's Columbia campus has 324 degree programs through its 14 degree-granting colleges and schools.
- ◆ The South Carolina Honors College is ranked the No. 1 public university honors college in the nation based on honors college factors by the guidebook, "A Review of Fifty Public University Honors Programs."
- ◆ The Moore School of Business undergraduate international business program was ranked No. 1 by U.S. News & World Report for the 16th consecutive year.
- ◆ USC launched a new online degree completion program called Palmetto College in 2013. Palmetto College brings together the resources of the entire University of South Carolina system to combine the quality of a USC degree with the flexibility of online learning.
- ◆ Students at the University of South Carolina have earned 594 national fellowships and scholarships valued at \$16.7 million since 1994. In 2012 alone, 56 students earned more than \$1.4 million for academic study.
- ◆ University of South Carolina faculty generated \$238.3 million in funding for research, training and outreach programs in fiscal year 2012, a 5 percent increase from the previous year.

UNIVERSITY HISTORY

In 2001, the University celebrated the bicentennial of its charter, but 2005 also marked a watershed anniversary: 200 years since the first classes began at South Carolina College, as it was then known. Carolina has endured the Civil War and Reconstruction, closings, and name changes. Permanently chartered in 1906 as the University of South Carolina, it grew throughout the 20th century and today is building its reputation as a cutting-edge research institution.



- ◆ USC is ranked in the top 5 percent of U.S. public universities in the number of national awards its faculty have received.
- ◆ When completed in late 2013, the Darla Moore School of Business building will become the front door of Innovista, the University's research district, and a hub for creativity, research and entrepreneurial activity. The school is pursuing a net zero status and LEED Platinum rating for its cutting-edge new home.
- ◆ The USC School of Medicine pioneered the nation's first medical school curriculum that teaches first- through fourth-year students how to use leading ultrasound technologies for bedside diagnosis.
- ◆ Twelve USC students received Fulbright grants in 2012 for research, study or teaching abroad, and the Chronicle of Higher Education named USC a "Top Producer of U.S. Fulbright Students." Another six students were awarded National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowships.
- ◆ The International House at Maxcy College opened in fall 2012, bringing USC's American and international students together to experience and share each others' cultures.
- ◆ USC was recognized in 2013 by both Kiplinger's "Best Values in Public Colleges" and Princeton Review's "Best Value Colleges for 2013 — Public."
- ◆ USC is one of only 40 public universities to receive the Carnegie Foundation's top-tier research designation and community engagement designation and is the only university in South Carolina with the Carnegie top-tier designation for "very high research activity."



Dr. Harris Pastides, University President



Harris Pastides was named the University of South Carolina's 28th president on Aug. 1, 2008, after a decade of service as a professor, dean, and vice president. He was the first internal candidate to be elected President of the University of South Carolina in more than half a century. He has stressed leadership and civil discourse as primary values of the university and believes that athletic and academic success go hand-in-hand in preparing student-athletes to be successful on the court, the playing field and in the classroom.

With Focus Carolina, one of his first major initiatives as University president, Pastides has launched the most comprehensive strategic planning initiative in the University's history. The effort is expected to result in transformational goals that will steer a course for the University's long-term future.

Among the major goals Pastides has identified are:

- * Sustainability
- * Innovation
- * The university's role in the development of a knowledge economy
- * More access to education for South Carolinians
- * Stronger cohesion among the university's eight campuses

To accomplish these goals, he has solicited ideas from the University community and all South Carolina citizens through Carolina's Ideas, a Web-based suggestion box that is yielding a bounty of good counsel.

Before joining the South Carolina faculty, Pastides was a professor of epidemiology and chairman of the Department of Biostatistics and Epidemiology at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. He received his master's of public health and his Ph.D. in epidemiology from Yale University.

In 2011, Pastides was named to the NCAA Board of Directors Executive Committee to represent the Southeastern Conference for a four-year term. The Executive Committee ensures that each division operates consistently with the basic purposes, fundamental policies and general principles of the Association.

Harris Pastides and Patricia Moore were married April 27, 1980. They have two children: Katharine, an education specialist at the Getty Villa in Malibu, Calif.; and Andrew, an equity stage actor in New York City.

Dr. Zach Kelehear, Faculty Athletics Representative



Zach Kelehear assumed the duties as the University of South Carolina's Faculty Athletics Representative on July 1, 2010. Kelehear is the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and a professor in the Department of Educational Leadership and Policies. In his capacity as Associate Dean he is primarily responsible for all matters related to undergraduate and graduate studies. As a professor of educational leadership he has written multiple articles and books on the ideas of artful leadership practice in public schools and business. While at USC, Dr. Kelehear has also served on the Faculty Senate, on the University Athletics Advisory Committee, on the Graduate Council as Chair, as well as several other committees.

Kelehear provides leadership for multiple national and international professional organizations such as the American Educational Research Association and the Council of Professors of Instructional Leadership. Along with his peer reviewed publications, Kelehear has published in the *Journal of Staff*

Development, *American School Board Journal*, *The School Administrator*, *Principal Leadership* and *The Principal*. He also serves as editor and/or reviewer for multiple journals and publications.

Over the past 30 years, Kelehear has been a college professor, a personnel director, staff development director, and a teacher and coach in high school and middle school. He also was a college athlete at Furman University where he played football while completing a double major in Latin and history in 1981. He later earned his master's in education from Furman in 1982, then earned his doctorate from N.C. State in 1993.

Dr. Kelehear is married to Dr. Karen Heid, an associate professor of art education in the Department of Art at the University of South Carolina.

University of South Carolina president Dr. Harris Pastides announced July 13, 2012, that longtime Gamecock baseball coach Ray Tanner had been selected as the university's new director of athletics. Tanner began his new duties August 2.

"Sometimes you can search the world over for the perfect candidate and at times you know you have the right leader within your organization," said Dr. Pastides. "For USC, we knew we had the right person on our team already. Ray exemplifies all the qualities I am seeking in an Athletics Director: integrity, a winning attitude, a confident

leader and manager and an individual who puts the well-being of our student-athletes above and beyond all other things."

In his first season as AD, Tanner experienced a wealth of success. The football team turned in its highest national ranking in school history, while women's basketball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's tennis, women's indoor and outdoor track & field, men's outdoor track & field, equestrian, men's and women's swimming and diving, softball and baseball all reached the NCAA postseason.

A dedicated community leader whose charitable organization has made a difference in many South Carolina families, a three-time National Coach of the Year and Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year, Tanner completed 16 years as head coach at the University of South Carolina, establishing one of the premier programs in college baseball prior to being named AD. He led the Garnet & Black to two NCAA Division I Baseball Championships, a pair of national runner-up finishes, six College World Series appearances, three SEC championships, six SEC Eastern division titles, a SEC tournament crown and 13 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.

Under the direction of Tanner, South Carolina's postseason success from 2010-2012 is arguably the greatest run in collegiate baseball history. In the three-year span, the Gamecocks established NCAA records with 22 consecutive postseason wins and 12 consecutive wins in the College World Series. The Gamecocks won the NCAA Division I Baseball Championship in 2010 and 2011 with a national runner-up finish in 2012. South Carolina's 30-4 (.882) record over the past three seasons in the NCAA Tournament is the fifth best three-year postseason record in NCAA history.

In addition, the 2012 CWS trip marked the sixth time in 11 years that South Carolina had reached Omaha. No Division I baseball team has made more appearances than the Gamecocks over the last 11 seasons.

Tanner and the Gamecocks have created one of the top environments in college baseball at Carolina Stadium. After a successful run at Sarge Frye Field through 2008, the Gamecocks made the move to the new \$36 million Carolina Stadium where college baseball has continued to grow. South Carolina's total attendance of 295,389 in the 2012 season was second highest in the nation. The average attendance of 7,574 also was a Carolina Stadium record, besting the previous mark of 7,431 in the 2011 season. The Gamecocks also set a record for sellouts in 2012 with 15 games at a capacity of 8,242 fans. In addition, South Carolina set a record for season tickets sold with a total of 5,580 sold in the preseason before the 2012 campaign.

Under Tanner's leadership, South Carolina owns the longest current streak of NCAA Regional appearances among the 14 SEC schools with 13 straight trips to the tournament dating back to the 2000 season. In that span, Carolina has 10 NCAA Super Regional appearances (2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2007, 2010, 2011, 2012). South Carolina is one of only two schools in the nation to make at least 10 NCAA Super Regionals in the last 13 years and one of only six schools in the country to have reached the NCAA Regionals every season from 2000 to the present.

For all of his accolades, Tanner's uniform No. 1 was retired and the street outside Carolina Stadium was renamed in his honor. He was also inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame in May 2013.

The 2012 season was Tanner's 25th year as a collegiate head coach. He posted a 738-316 record at South Carolina with a .700 winning percentage, second highest all-time among SEC coaches. His career record was 1,133-489-3 for a winning percentage of .699. His final 12 teams featured 23 All-Americans.

Tanner gained valuable experience at an international level in his association with USA Baseball. He has served five stints with Red, White and Blue, including in 2003 as head coach for the USA National Baseball Team. At the helm of some of the top

freshmen and sophomores in the country, Tanner's club finished with a 27-2 record, the best record for a U.S. National Team (.931 winning percentage) and won a silver medal at the 2003 Pan American Games. He was named the U.S. National Coach of the Year for his work that season. Prior to his head coaching stint, Tanner served as an auxiliary coach under Tommy Lasorda for the 2000 Olympic Team that won a gold medal at the XXVII Olympiad in Sydney, Australia. He was also an assistant under former LSU coach Skip Bertman with the 1995 and 1996 USA teams that culminated in a bronze medal win at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Ga. Tanner also served alongside current Mississippi State coach Ron Polk on Bertman's staff. Tanner's first stint with USA Baseball came as an assistant coach to the national team in the summer of 1993.

Tanner was named the South Carolina head coach June 14, 1996, after nine successful seasons at North Carolina State. At NC State, Tanner led his alma mater to seven appearances in the NCAA postseason tournament and ranked second for most wins in school history. He was the 1990 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year and in 1993 was named Atlantic Region Coach of the Year when his team won 49 games.

Tanner was affiliated with the Wolfpack baseball program for more than 20 years. He came to the Raleigh campus in the fall of 1976 as a player following an outstanding career at South Johnston High School in Four Oaks, N.C. A four-year starter at shortstop and third base, he earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors his senior season and still ranks among the Wolfpack's all-time leaders in several categories.


Following his playing career, Tanner served as an assistant for NC State coach Sam Esposito, overseeing recruiting efforts and coaching third base. During his tenure as an assistant, the Wolfpack reached the NCAA Tournament twice. He had additional duties as assistant to the athletics director and as assistant athletics director in charge of game operations.

After Esposito's retirement, Tanner was named head coach at the age of 28 by the legendary late Jim Valvano, becoming one of the youngest head baseball coaches in the nation.

Tanner has a bachelor of science degree in recreational administration from NC State (1980) and a master's of public affairs, public administration (1983).

Born Donald Ray Tanner, Jr., March 25, 1958, in Smithfield, N.C., Tanner grew up in Benson, N.C. He is married to the former Karen Donald, a native of Charleston, S.C. A University of South Carolina graduate, she was formerly head women's athletic trainer at NC State. During the summer of 1997 she served as trainer for the Charlotte Sting in the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA). She is the former director of athletics and director of sports medicine at Columbia College.

They have two daughters, Bridgette Grace ("Gracie") and Margaret Pearl ("Maggie") and one son, Joseph Luke ("Luke").

IT'S THE GARNET WAY

South Carolina Athletics' mission centers on developing championship-caliber programs in the Southeastern Conference and nationally.

There are four components needed to create a championship program: a prominent university committed to its athletics program, a vibrant community that can be proudly presented to recruits, excellent coaches, and outstanding facilities. South Carolina is a distinguished university with an energized and supportive community in Columbia and throughout the state. The Gamecock coaching staff blends hall-of-fame experience and exciting new perspectives that, together with a seasoned athletics staff, give South Carolina Athletics a competitive advantage in the recruiting battle. It is time to focus on providing outstanding facilities for Gamecock student-athletes and fans.

The Garnet Way Capital Campaign serves as a road map for transforming Gamecock Athletics. The goal of this campaign is to generate \$200 million through donations by July 2015. Funds will be used to improve athletics facilities. When this goal is attained, Gamecock supporters will be able to take pride in the fact they have dramatically impacted South Carolina Athletics and the Gamecocks' ability to compete on a national stage.



NICKNAME: THE FIGHTING GAMECOCKS

The University of South Carolina is the only major college athletic program in the country that uses "Fighting Gamecocks" as its official nickname and mascot. The University's athletic teams have been known as Gamecocks for almost 100 years.

At the turn of the 20th century, after struggling for more than decade under numerous nicknames, the school's football team was the impetus of the new moniker. In 1903, Columbia's morning newspaper, *The State*, shortened the name to one word and South Carolina teams have been Gamecocks ever since.

Those early teams must have been a feisty and spirited group. A gamecock, of course, is a fighting rooster known for its spirit and courage. A cock fight, which was a popular sport throughout the United States in the 19th century, would last until the death of one of the combatants. Cock fighting has been outlawed by most states for humanitarian reasons, but it is still held surreptitiously in many areas.

The State of South Carolina has long been closely connected with the breeding and training of fighting gamecocks. General Thomas Sumter, famed guerrilla fighter of the Revolutionary War, was known as "The Fighting Gamecock."

SCHOOL COLORS

Garnet and Black were adopted near the turn of the century as the official colors of the University of South Carolina athletic teams. The colors are the dominant ones on the gamecock, which is the University's official mascot for its athletic teams.

THE SOUTH CAROLINA MASCOT

The Gamecock mascot, "Cocky," is a familiar sight at a variety of South Carolina athletic events. He appears at all home and road football and basketball games, and at home baseball games. In addition he can be found frequenting other Olympic sports events on the USC campus.



Cocky was chosen National Mascot of the Year in 1986, 1994, and again in 2004 and is recognized as one of the most colorful mascots in collegiate athletics.

In 1981, and 1982, the Gamecocks participated in the College Baseball World Series and "Cocky" was selected both years as the official mascot of the CWS.

"2001"

The University of South Carolina Gamecocks feature perhaps the most unique and electrifying pregame entry in all of college football. In fact, The Sporting News rated USC's "2001" as the most exciting pregame entry in all of college football. As the minutes wind down on the game clock prior to the opening kickoff, the Gamecocks leave the locker room following final pregame instruction from their coaching staff and assemble in the tunnel in the southwest corner of Williams-Brice Stadium. Then, as the crowd of more than 82,000 begins its roar of anticipation, the first notes of the them song from "2001-A Space Odyssey" blare over the stadium sound system. As the music continues, the enthusiasm of the crowd is feverish. Finally, at just the exact moment, in perfect coordination with the music, the Gamecocks hit the field running, and the stadium goes wild.

GAMECOCK WALK

Approximately two hours and 20 minutes prior to every home game, the South Carolina team buses drop the players off on the Garnet Way in The Commons at Williams-Bricee. The team walks on the Garnet Way, crosses Bluff Road and the stadium tarmac and heads to the locker room, located in the southwest corner of Williams-Brice Stadium. The team walks through the throng of Gamecock fans and well-wishers as they make their way to the locker room to prepare for the game ahead.

THE COCKABOOSE RAILROAD

What is perhaps the most unique form of tailgating and featured throughout the years in numerous magazines and television shows, the Cockaboose railroad has made its way to Columbia and University of South Carolina football. Twenty-two cabooses line a railroad track just outside of Williams-Brice Stadium - but these rail cars don't move and they certainly aren't something you would see passing by on the rear end of a train.



Several years ago, a local businessman and his wife finally had enough of the railroad tracks which sit just a stone's throw from the south side of the stadium. The next season, in 1990, the beautifully-designed Cockaboose Railroad began catering to the serious Gamecock tailgater with amenities never before associated with in tailgating: running water, cable television, air conditioning, and heating, and a living room highlight each and every Cockaboose.

The Carolina Cockabooses are stationary and many are wired with closed-circuit television to watch Gamecock away games if making the trip is not feasible.

"The Cockaboose Railroad" - it's different, it's unique, and it's exciting; and there's nothing else like it in the nation.

The Dodie Anderson Academic Enrichment Center, located at 1302 Heyward Street, is "the heart of the athletics department and the place where the ebb and flow of student-athletes' days are centered."

The three-story, 40,000-square-foot, \$13 million state-of-the-art facility, opened in the spring of 2010, strives to synthesize the traditional architectural values associated with the University of South Carolina and the dynamic movement of athleticism. The building appeals to student-athletes and also the recruits evaluating the role South Carolina may play in their development as a student-athlete. The building's primary purpose is to foster a sense of community among student-athletes as well as promote excellence in academics.

"The Dodie" is named for Dolores F. Anderson of Greer, S.C., whose philanthropic gift helped fund the center for University of South Carolina student-athletes. Anderson is the widow of Robert Anderson, the former president and chairman of Anderson Hardwood Floors, the largest privately-owned hardwood floor manufacturer in the United States. A 1981 graduate of USC Upstate with a degree in interdisciplinary studies, Dodie Anderson is co-owner of Anderson Hardwood Floors and a longtime supporter of USC Upstate's athletic programs.

The Dodie is the focal point and the first piece in the re-developed 41-acre footprint known as the Athletics Village. The area also includes the Rice Athletics Center, a new tennis complex, softball stadium, and parking garage and updated soccer practice fields.

Student-athletes are in and out of the Dodie throughout the day as they use computers and study areas, receive tutoring, counseling and advising and even eat their meals.

❖ The South Carolina football team posted its highest combined grade point average on record in consecutive semesters, first logging a 2.781 mark during the Spring 2012 semester, then exceeding that with a 2.918 team GPA in Fall 2012. The football team has registered a team GPA above 2.70 for six consecutive semesters, including a 2.724 in Spring 2013.

❖ For the seventh-consecutive year, the University of South Carolina led the way with 74 student-athletes on the SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll in 2012. Twenty-nine of those on the list from South Carolina were football players.

❖ The football program posted a 2011-12 single year APR (Academic Progress Rate) score of 960 and a multi-year APR of 966, matching 2010-11 for the top multi-year score on record.

❖ **Connor Shaw** was honored at halftime of the 2013 Garnet and Black Spring Game as the Harris Pastides Student-Athlete Award winner for Football.

❖ **Damiere Byrd** and **T.J. Holloman** were also honored at halftime of the 2013 spring game as recipients of the Harold White GPA Award for offense and defense, respectively.

❖ During the 2012-13 academic year, the football program graduated 18 student-athletes, bring the number of football graduates over the last three years to 69 student-athletes.

CAROLINA FOOTBALL

The Dodie Anderson Academic Enrichment Center employs a team of dedicated staff, mentors and tutors who work to assist student-athletes with day-to-day academic support. Their mission is to help all student-athletes realize their personal, academic and athletic potentials. The Athletics Department is dedicated to developing the total student-athlete.

GAMECOCK GALA: At the end of each school year, all Gamecock student-athletes attend the Gamecock Gala, where outstanding individual performers throughout Carolina's 21 intercollegiate sports are recognized in front of their peers and special guests.



ETIQUETTE SEMINAR: "MANNERS MATTER"

The Etiquette Dinner Seminar is presented to educate student-athletes on proper table manners and etiquette appropriate for business and other formal situations. This seminar will also prepare student-athletes for upcoming internships and job-hunting scenarios where interviewing may take place over a meal. It is an interactive dinner where they receive instruction during the course of a meal.

GAMECOCK ATHLETICS CAREER NETWORK

It is essential for student-athletes to plan for the future and to prepare for life outside of college athletics. A component of the Life Skills Program, the Gamecock Athletics Career Network has resources available for identifying practicum and internship experiences to enhance the career development process. Other programs include mentoring, assistance with resume development and job interviewing skills, student-athlete networking seminar and strong collaboration with the University Career Center.

NETWORKING SEMINARS

In the fall of each year, the Athletics Department invites South Carolina lettermen and members of the Gamecock Athletics Career Network to assist the staff in training student-athletes in the skills needed to begin their professional careers. This unique opportunity also provides the student-athletes with an opportunity to learn more about the concept of networking and to put it to practice while speaking to professionals working in the fields they aspire to work in after graduation.

DRESS FOR SUCCESS

In the spring of each year, the Athletics Department invites local business partners to assist the department in training student-athletes in the skills needed to appropriately present themselves in all professional settings. This seminar has a separate male and female presentation and covers all current trends of what is acceptable proper business attire.

Preparing the Student-Athlete

THE STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

South Carolina has a Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), which is made up of two student-athlete representatives from each team within the Athletics Department. SAAC represents the voice of all student-athletes to the administration about issues that affect them. They also have been active in promoting department-wide community service projects and facilitating student-athlete camaraderie.

SENIOR RING CEREMONY

At the end of each semester, the Athletics Department presents each of its graduating seniors with a South Carolina class ring. At the ceremony, individual recognition is provided to each graduate by their Academic Advisor and their ring is presented by their head coach.

MEDIA TRAINING

Through the Life Skills program and the Media Relations Department, Carolina student-athletes participate in media training sessions that are designed to make them more comfortable in dealing with members of the media. The sessions include tips on dealing with the media and give student-athletes the opportunity to practice interviewing and speaking publicly.

ORIENTATION/CONSEQUENCES FOR YOUR ACTIONS

Provided to all student-athletes, the objective of Orientation is to educate them on the expectations placed upon them as Gamecocks. They also receive information on the academic resources available in the Academic Enrichment Center and campus-wide. Additionally, the student-athletes are presented with information focused on the topic, "Consequences For Your Actions," where the objective is to encourage responsibility and mature behavior among the student-athletes and to teach them there are consequences for the decisions they make.

TEAM GAMECOCKS

"Team Gamecocks" are student-athletes who volunteer their time and effort to the local community in a variety of different ways. Each year, student-athletes engage in community service activities including reading to elementary school children, collecting food for the Harvest Hope Food Bank, visiting both hospitalized veterans and children, and interacting with kids in after-school programs. There are ongoing opportunities for Team Gamecocks as well as scheduled events. Student-athletes can select service opportunities in which they are most interested.

Williams-Brice Stadium

CAROLINA FOOTBALL

Williams-Brice Stadium, formerly Carolina Stadium, was first constructed in 1934 by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Then, it seated 17,600 Gamecock fans. It has undergone a number of expansions and revisions over the years, with the largest prior to the 1982 expansion coming in 1971-1972. A bequest from the estate of Mrs. Martha Williams-Brice helped boost the capacity then from slightly more than 43,000 to greater than 54,000.

Mrs. Williams-Brice's husband, Thomas H. Brice, was a Gamecock football letterman from 1922-24, and her family operated the Williams Furniture Company in Sumter. She left a substantial inheritance from the furniture fortune to her nephews, Thomas W. and Philip L. Edwards, much of which they passed on to the University of South Carolina. That included a bequest for the stadium project.

The name was officially changed from Carolina Stadium to Williams-Brice Stadium in dedication ceremonies during the Sept. 9, 1972 opener with Virginia.

Added in 2012 was a \$6.5 million state-of-the-art videoboard that sits above the north stands. It measures 36' x 124'.





- ❖ Williams-Brice is recognized as one of the finest facilities in all of college football. Carolina annually ranks among the nation's leaders in attendance, and Gamecock fans are regarded as some of the most loyal in the country.
- ❖ South Carolina established a school record for football season tickets sold in 2005, selling 62,604 season tickets, surpassing the previous mark of 62,103 set in 2002. The numbers do not include student tickets and tickets contractually obligated to visiting teams.



Gamecock Sports Marketing, a partnership between the University of South Carolina Athletics Department and the country's leaders in the collegiate sports marketing industry, IMG College, is the originating medium for radio coverage of the South Carolina Gamecocks.



This begins the sixth year of a nine-year, \$50 million contract between the University and IMG College that runs through 2017. 2013 also marks the first year of a four-year extension with Cumulus Media for WNKT-FM (107.5 The Game) to continue as the official flagship station of Gamecock Athletics through 2017.

Gamecock Sports Marketing is responsible for the overall management of the athletics program's corporate partnership effort, which includes producing, selling and distributing the Gamecock Radio Network (live play-by-play and call-in shows) and television programming (pay per view opportunities and coaches shows), print advertising in various athletics department publications, and selected signage in university athletic facilities.

The Gamecock Sports Network from IMG College counts two dozen affiliate stations for the 2013-14 season. For Sirius/XM subscribers, follow the Gamecock Radio Twitter page for weekly updates on channel information for Gamecock broadcasts.

Todd Ellis, the all-time leading passer in Gamecock history and the school's winningest quarterback, begins his 22nd season with the network and his 11th as the play-by-play voice of Carolina football. Ellis previously served as sideline reporter for the radio network and as a color analyst and play-by-play announcer for Comcast Sports Southeast for Gamecock telecasts. Ellis has also hosted the coaches television show and served on CBS's bowl game radio coverage. He hosts the Steve Spurrier Television Show and Carolina Calls with Steve Spurrier, the Head Ball Coach's weekly radio call-in show. Ellis set more than 20 school passing marks during his career (1986-89) while throwing for 9,953 yards.

Tommy Suggs, a former standout Gamecock quarterback, is back for his 40th year as color analyst for the radio network. Suggs played for Carolina from 1968-70 and is regarded as one of the school's all-time premier signal-callers. He led the Gamecocks to the 1969 ACC championship and Peach Bowl berth and was named MVP of the 1970 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic. Suggs was inducted into the University's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989 and is also a member of the state of South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. In 2012, friends and colleagues of Tommy and Jane Suggs established the Tommy Suggs Endowed Quarterback Scholarship to honor his long-time commitment to the University and Gamecock Athletics. The scholarship will be awarded to a quarterback each year and is the first endowed scholarship for the football program.

Former Gamecock and NFL lineman **Langston Moore** returns for his second season to handle the sideline duties for the game broadcasts.

Liz McMillan serves as the General Manager of Gamecock Sports Properties in Columbia. **Brent Johnson** serves as the Network Host. **Carroll Senn** is the broadcast engineer, **David Spence** is the spotter and **Doug Adams** is the statistician. **Rachel Senn** assists with production.

SEC NETWORK TO LAUNCH IN 2014

The Southeastern Conference and ESPN have signed a 20-year agreement through 2034 to create and operate a multiplatform network, which will launch in August 2014. The new network and its accompanying digital platform will air SEC content 24/7 including more than 1,000 events in its first year.

The network will televise approximately 45 SEC football games, more than 100 men's basketball games, 60 women's basketball games, 75 baseball games, and events from across the SEC's 21 sports annually. Programming will also include studio shows, original content such as SEC Storied, spring football games, signing day and pro days coverage. Hundreds of additional live events from various sports will be offered exclusively on the digital platform. The network and its digital extensions will connect with each SEC institution and create opportunities for each school to produce and develop content.

Each weekend throughout the season, the new network will air multiple top-tier matchups from the strongest conference in college football. Since 2006, the SEC has claimed seven consecutive football national championships. In 2011-12, SEC teams won eight national championships: football (Alabama), men's basketball (Kentucky), gymnastics (Alabama), men's indoor track and field (Florida), women's tennis (Florida), women's golf (Alabama), men's outdoor track and field (Florida), and softball (Alabama). Since 1990, the SEC has won 149 national team championships for an average of more than six per year.

As part of the agreement, ESPN will now oversee the SEC's official Corporate Sponsor Program. In addition, ESPN and the SEC also agreed to extend their existing media rights agreement through 2034. ESPN has televised the SEC since 1982. ESPN's existing networks present more than 1,600 hours of SEC action each year. The new network will focus exclusively on the SEC and add another outlet to deliver sports fans more SEC content than ever.

GAMECOCK TELEVISION HISTORY

South Carolina football has appeared on television many times, dating back to a local telecast of a game against Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 5, 1949. The first Gamecock home game to be televised was against the University of North Carolina in Carolina (now Williams-Brice) Stadium, Nov. 7, 1953.

That first home telecast was the first program aired by WIS-TV (Channel 10) when the Columbia NBC affiliate went on the air. The NBC network originally planned a "panorama" of four games nationwide on that date, showing one quarter of each game. When plans for that production did not materialize, NBC agreed to honor a commitment to WIS-TV, which had scheduled the football telecast as its inaugural program.

NBC sent a remote unit from Washington, D.C., and play-by-play was handled by WIS-TV Sports Director Ray Stanfield. South Carolina beat North Carolina 18-0 in the game, which was sponsored by General Motors. The teams split the \$50,000 rights fee for the one station network broadcast.

General

The University of South Carolina understands the importance of assisting the media in providing coverage of the institution, its athletics programs, administrators, coaches and student-athletes. To this end, the best attempt will be made to fill reasonable requests by recognized media outlets. Members of the media are encouraged to work with the South Carolina Athletics Media Relations staff to assist in that endeavor. It is not permissible for media members to contact any athletics department administrator, associate, coach or student-athlete directly without working through the media relations department.

Preseason Media/Photo Day

The University of South Carolina's annual Football Media Day is set for Sunday, Aug. 4. Photos are tentatively scheduled to be taken on the field beginning at 1 p.m. No interviews will be allowed on the field. Head Coach Steve Spurrier will hold a press conference beginning at approximately 1:40 p.m. in the Media Interview Room, located under the west stands at Williams-Brice Stadium. Requested student-athletes and assistant coaches will be available on the second floor of the Crews Building following Coach Spurrier's press conference.

Press Credentials

Working press credentials for the 2013 South Carolina home football games must be requested online through www.sportssystem.com/clients/seccredentials. Credential requests must come from the sports editors and the sports directors only.

It is not always possible to accommodate all requests. No one under 18 years of age will be issued a credential without prior approval.

Any questions or concerns can be directed to Assistant Media Relations Director Diana Koval at 803-777-7977 or by email at dkoval@mailbox.sc.edu. Requests for season passes should be submitted no later than August 12. Requests for single games should be made as far in advance as possible and no later than seven (7) days prior to game day. Once approved, all credentials must be picked up on game day at Media Will Call, located at Gate 5 on the west side of the stadium by the press elevators. Media Will Call will open three (3) hours prior to kick-off. A photo ID must be presented to receive the press credential. Parking passes will be mailed in advance through arrangements made with Diana Koval.

Note: Credentials will be considered only for those media members on specific assignment for a specific media outlet that meets the criteria below.

PRESS BOX PASSES

DAILY NEWSPAPERS will be issued a maximum of four (4) season approved press box credentials.

WEBSITES with a national affiliation will be issued a maximum of two (2) season approved press credentials.

TELEVISION stations will be issued a maximum of two (2) season approved press box credentials.

RADIO stations will be granted one (1) season approved credential per daily radio show. In addition, one (1) credential will be distributed per station for the sports director.

All other credential requests, including non-daily newspapers, magazines, out-of-market radio stations, etc. will be considered on a game-by-game, case-by-case and space available basis at the discretion of Steve Fink, Assistant AD/Media Relations.

Non-affiliated bloggers will not be credentialed.

FIELD PASSES

DAILY NEWSPAPERS and **WEBSITES** with national affiliations will be issued a maximum of three (3) season field passes to be used for photography.

TELEVISION stations will receive a maximum of two (2) field passes.

All other credential requests, including non-daily newspapers, magazines, etc., will be considered on a game-by-game, case-by-case and space available basis.

Only working photographers/videographers with professional-grade cameras will be allowed on the field.

Freelance photographers will not be credentialed.

Photographers/Sideline Policy

The University of South Carolina adheres to the NCAA and SEC guidelines regarding media representatives on the sidelines.

1. Photo credentials will be issued only to accredited media outlets prior to the game and photo identification must be provided.

2. Photographers must check in at Media Will Call on the west side of the stadium adjacent to the press elevator. Those photographers who will work on the sidelines will be issued a vest. This vest must be worn at all times to gain access to the sidelines. No other type of photo or media credential will allow an individual access to the sidelines. The vest must be returned to a member of the South Carolina media relations staff following the game.

3. Working photographers/videographers are permitted to shoot in the designated area (between the two marked dotted lines outside the 25-yard lines). All other media representatives on the field (announcers, reporters, etc.) must stand behind the designated area. This will ensure that photographers/videographers have the appropriate space to do their work. No photographer will be allowed to shoot from either end zone.

4. Photographers are encouraged to use the photo work room, located on the ground level of Williams-Brice Stadium. Wireless internet is available. While security in this area is provided, the University of South Carolina is not responsible for the loss of any items.

5. According to NCAA policies, the presence of any type of photographer (television or still) in the bench area for all sports is strictly prohibited. According to the NCAA Football Rules and Interpretations Manual (Rule 1, Section 2, Article 4b): "the team area shall be limited to squad members in uniform and a maximum of 40 other individuals directly involved in the game. The 40 individuals not in uniform shall wear special identification." (Rule 1, Section 2, Article 4e): "No media personnel, including journalists, radio and television personnel, or their equipment, shall be in the team area or coaching box, and no media personnel shall communicate in any way with persons in the team area or coaching box."

The SEC also prohibits photographers (television or still) from stopping and shooting from behind the bench area or into the bench area. The bench area is defined by each institution's facility guidelines.

Internet Credential Policy

The University of South Carolina adheres to the SEC policies regarding representatives of websites. The official website of the home and visiting schools will be credentialed. Also, the official online service of the national over-the-air or cable television network that owns broadcast rights to the game will receive credentials. Other websites will not be credentialed unless they meet the following specifications:

1. Must be a legal corporate entity that has been in business for at least one full calendar year and has provided coverage of South Carolina or the visiting team for at least one year.

2. Must provide daily coverage of all athletic teams of South Carolina or the visiting team with its own staff of full-time reporters, photographers and equipment.

3. Must travel to and cover all football away games and all major post-season events.

4. Must provide coverage of all press conferences of all athletic teams at South Carolina or the visiting team.

No credentials will be issued to any website that is not deemed by University of South Carolina Assistant Athletics Director/Media Relations Steve Fink to have adequate editorial oversight.

SEC Internet Real Time Policy

By acceptance and use of an SEC media credential, the holder agrees to the following conditions for any and all athletic events hosted by the SEC and its member institutions:

1. The SEC and its member institutions grant a media organization a limited license to use certain gathered information on the media organization's own Internet or online site beginning at the start of an athletic event and up to the conclusion of such event, all subject to the following limitations and conditions:

(a) No more than 10 still photographs may be used for news coverage of the game and other editorial purposes. Such still photographs must be used on a time-delayed basis, that is at least five (5) minutes after the happening of the event depicted by the still photograph.

(b) It is agreed that video is NOT to be used on an Internet or online site with the following stipulations:

(i) video may be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of a television station's regularly-scheduled news program.

(ii) footage may be broadcast or otherwise distributed on the Internet or via any other online service or computer service, using the following limitations: a maximum of three (3) minutes from Satellite Feed Footage, Practice Footage and Event Footage.

(iii) Footage may not be used, sold, traded, loaned or given away to any other entity for any sports entertainment programs, specials, home videos, commercials and promotional use or in any other manner not specifically set forth in these policies without prior expressed written permission of the Southeastern Conference or the University of South Carolina.

(c) While a game is in progress, the use of textual statistical information is time-delayed and limited in amount so that an organization's Internet or online game coverage does not undercut the authorized and rights-paying fee organization's rights to play-by-play accounts of the game and/or exclusivity as to such rights.

2. Any proposed media use on an Internet or online site of the game information that is more detailed and/or more than described above will require separate written authorization by the SEC and/or its member institutions. However, such written authorization will not permit the use of game information in entertainment contexts and will not authorize game coverage that, due to immediacy of detail, constitutes or approaches a play-by-play account of a game.

3. Should any of these conditions be breached, the SEC and/or its member institutions will issue a written warning for the first violation. A second violation of this policy will result in revocation of credentials to cover future football games hosted by the SEC and/or its member institutions.



Press Box/Services

South Carolina's press box has seats for 144 members of the media, along with television and radio booths, coaches' booths and public address and stadium operations/security booths. Located just above the press level is the photo deck. All members of the media covering the game are invited to a catered meal, which is served beginning two hours prior to kickoff.

Wireless internet is available for use. Wired outlets for photographers and videographers are available in the back of the press box. The photo workroom, located on the ground level of Williams-Brice Stadium, also has wireless internet access.

Any media outlet that wishes to install its own telephone should contact South Carolina Telephone Communications at (803) 777-1800.

The Athletics Media Relations department supplies quarterly play-by-plays and quickie stats, halftime statistics, final team and individual statistics and coaches and players quotes. An inside public address announcer also keeps the media informed of play-by-play, records and game notes.

The Carolina press box is for the working media only. In accordance with the Football Writers Association of America, no cheering will be allowed.

In-Game Statistics

Media should utilize StatMonitr live stats for all the latest statistical information during games. Visit gamecocks.statbroadcast.com for live scoring of all home football games. Upon clicking the link for the game you will be prompted for a password that is available in your media packet.

Postgame Interviews

The press box elevator will be held at press level midway through the fourth quarter for anyone needing postgame interviews. South Carolina's postgame interviews take place in the Media Interview Room, located underneath the stands on the west side of Williams-Brice Stadium. The visitors' locker room and postgame interview room are located under the west stands at the north end. The Gamecock locker room will be closed following the game. Coach Spurrier will be available in the postgame interview room approximately 10 minutes after the game. Selected student-athletes will also be brought to the interview room following the cool-down period. Admittance to postgame interviews is by credential only. The South Carolina press conference will be televised live to the press box.

Satellite Truck Parking

Limited parking is available for TV station live/satellite trucks and those vehicles will need to be approved prior to game day. Please contact Diana Koval at least three days prior to the game to schedule live/satellite truck parking.

Visiting Radio

The visitor's radio network must be designated by the opponent's athletic director. Booth space will be assigned by Steve Fink, Assistant Athletics Director/Media Relations. Any non-designated stations will be admitted on a space-available basis. The Gamecock Sports Network will be handled by IMG College. Stations requesting information regarding the network should contact: Liz McMillan, IMG College, (803) 777-8254.

Television Stations/Broadcast Networks

For information on receiving mid-week press conference videos, post-game press conference videos, and other football related footage, please contact Assistant Media Relations Director Matt Freed at mfreed@mailbox.sc.edu or Multimedia Coordinator Cory Burkarth at burkarth@mailbox.sc.edu. Login information to the department's media FTP site will be provided. Please credit all footage to GamecocksOnline when using footage from the FTP site.

Live Broadcasts

It is not permissible for any non-rightsholder to broadcast over the air, stream over the internet (audio or video), or transmit in any other way, any live event without the consent of the University of South Carolina Athletics Department. Live events include varsity contests, press conferences (including but not limited to weekly scheduled and postgame press conferences) and any other group media availability. Exceptions may be made for any major news-breaking event.

Archiving of Event Audio/Video

It is not permissible for any non-rightsholder to archive audio or video Event content that exceeds five (5) minutes in length. Events are defined as varsity contests, press conferences and any other group media availability. Archiving may not begin until the conclusion of the entire event. WNKT-FM (107.5) is the only radio station that can carry press conferences live and/or archived in their entirety.

Non-Rightsholder Radio Appearances

USC coaches will be limited to one appearance from one member of a sport's coaching staff per seven-day period on any radio station or any radio show that is aired as part of a state-wide, regional or national network in the Columbia market. The length of the interview should be no more than one segment, defined as "commercial-break to commercial-break." The segment shall run no longer than 10 minutes. In addition, the same member of a sport's coaching staff or South Carolina administrator cannot make appearances in consecutive seven-day periods on the same radio station. Media outlets in which the institution or the SEC is contractually affiliated is exempt from this language. Exceptions can be made in the occurrence of a major "breaking news" event. Please work through the team's media relations contact to help coordinate any request.

Game Day Availability

No University of South Carolina Athletics department member may appear live on a non-rightsholder radio show on the same day as any USC contractual programming, including live game action or coaches' call-in shows, without prior consent of the Athletics Media Relations department.

Student-Athlete Radio Appearances

South Carolina student-athletes may not participate in any live radio show other than during a regularly scheduled newscast and for no longer than four minutes, post-game interview times, conference media days and structured media opportunities during NCAA championships, without the consent of the South Carolina Athletics Media Relations department. This policy is in effect year-round and does not apply to institutional networks. It does apply to internet chat rooms that are sponsored by a media outlet for the sole purpose of conducting Q&A sessions with the viewing public concerning the student-athlete's athletic career.

SEC Weekly Teleconference

The Southeastern Conference hosts a weekly press teleconference each Wednesday from Aug. 28 through Nov. 20. The teleconference features the head coach from each team every week. Each coach issues an opening statement followed by questions from the media for seven minutes. To participate, please contact either the SEC Media Relations office at (205) 458-3010 or the school's Media Relations department for the telephone number, which will be assigned at a later date.

"The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."



THE SEC

The Southeastern Conference was formed in 1932 and consists of 14 member institutions:

Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Missouri, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas A&M, and Vanderbilt. The league currently sanctions championship play in nine men's sports and 12 women's sports. Its headquarters has been located in Birmingham, Ala., since 1948.

BCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

The SEC has captured the BCS National Championship for seven consecutive seasons. Since the inception of the BCS in 1998, the SEC leads all conferences with nine national champions. Tennessee won the BCS's first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida claimed the national championship in 2006 and 2008, LSU took the title in 2007, Alabama was crowned the National Champion in 2009 and again in 2011 and 2012, while Auburn took the top spot in 2010. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with 11. During that time, the SEC has had more teams (5) with national titles than any other conference.

SEC IN THE NFL

The SEC has had more of its former players on NFL rosters in the last five seasons than any other conference. Since 2006, the SEC has averaged 266.1 players per year on NFL opening weekend rosters. The league had a high of 314 on 2012 rosters and has outpaced all conferences every year.

SEC TOPS IN FAN SUPPORT

The Southeastern Conference has led the nation in total attendance in football every year since 1981 (32 straight years). Since 1988, the SEC has led the nation in average attendance. More than eight million fans witnessed first-hand, the excitement of SEC football in 2012. The average capacity of the 14 SEC stadiums during the last 10 years has been over 97 percent. Every year since 1988, the SEC has had at least four teams ranked in the top 10 in average attendance.
