**WARREN MUIR** is one of the most unsung of all Gamecock running backs. Muir, whom Coach Paul Dietzel described as "the toughest inside runner I've ever coached," helped lead Carolina to the 1969 Atlantic Coast Conference Championship and Peach Bowl berth against West Virginia.

**JEFF GRANTZ** goes down as one of the best two-sport athletes in Carolina history. In 1975, Grantz led the Gamecocks to the Tangerine Bowl against Miami of Ohio, where he threw for 228 yards against the Redskins. Grantz was named second-team All-America that season and also played on USC's baseball squad that advanced to the championship game of the College World Series earlier that spring.

**GEORGE ROGERS** led Carolina to back-to-back bowl games in 1979 and 1980. The Gamecocks played in the Hall of Fame Bowl against Missouri in 1979 and squared off against fourth-ranked Pittsburgh in the 1980 Gator Bowl. Rogers won the Heisman Trophy in 1980 when he led the nation in rushing and was a consensus first-team All-America pick. His 133 yards rushing vs. Missouri is a USC bowl game record.

**STEVE TANEYHILL** may have been one of the most flamboyant players to ever don the Garnet and Black. Taneyhill led USC to its first bowl win in school history – the 1995 Carquest Bowl over West Virginia – and was named MVP of that game. Taneyhill, whose long hair and swagger gave him a unique presence as the team's quarterback, threw for 227 yards and one touchdown and also ran for one score in the 24-21 Carquest Bowl victory over the Mountaineers.

**STANLEY PRITCHETT** played an instrumental role on South Carolina's 1995 Carquest Bowl championship team. Pritchett was an all-purpose back who rushed for 81 yards on 13 carries and scored one touchdown in Carolina's 24-21 victory over West Virginia.

**RYAN BREWER** turned in one of the most memorable performances ever by a Gamecock when he earned MVP honors at the 2001 Outback Bowl. Brewer dismantled Ohio State, rushing for 109 yards on 19 carries and catching three passes for another 92 yards. He was responsible for all of USC's touchdowns, scoring on runs of seven and two yards and was on the receiving end of a 28-yard TD pass early in the fourth quarter that put the game out of reach. In all, he tallied 214 all-purpose yards in helping lead the Gamecocks to a convincing 24-7 victory over Ohio State. The victory was even sweeter for Brewer, who was named Mr. Football his senior year in Ohio, but was not offered a scholarship by the Buckeyes.

**PHIL PETTY** put the finishing touches on USC's 9-3 season in 2002 by leading Carolina to its second straight Outback Bowl victory over Ohio State. Petty was named the game's MVP, after throwing for 227 yards and two touchdowns. Carolina had built a 28-0 lead, only to see Ohio State come roaring back to tie the score at 28 late in the fourth quarter. Daniel Weaver provided the game-winning three points, when he connected on a 42-yard field goal on the game's final play. Petty, who was a three-year starter for the Gamecocks, commandeered the most successful two-year period in the history of Carolina football, leading the Gamecocks to 17 victories (8-4 and 9-3) in 2000 and 2001.

**SHELDON BROWN** was a two-time All-American for the Gamecocks (2000-01) and turned in one of the biggest plays at the 2002 Outback Bowl, when he returned an Ohio State interception 37 yards to help set up Daniel Weaver's game-winning field goal that beat the Buckeyes. Brown was a semi-finalist for the Jim Thorpe Award and was also named first-team All-SEC.

**SIDNEY RICE** turned in one of the best receiving days in school history when he torched the Missouri defense for a bowl game record 12 catches and 191 yards, including nine receptions for 170 yards in the first half alone, in the 2005 Independence Bowl. He added eight catches for 139 yards and a touchdown in the 2006 Liberty Bowl win over Houston.


**BLAKE MITCHELL** was the 2006 Liberty Bowl MVP after completing 19-of-29 passes for a school-record 323 yards and four touchdowns in a win over Houston. In two bowl games, Mitchell completed 39-of-67 passes for 589 yards and six TDs.

lowa's Shonn Greene rushed for 121 yards and three touchdowns, helping the Hawkeyes defeat South Carolina 31-10 in the 2009 Outback Bowl.

lowa (9-4) won for the sixth time in seven games while South Carolina (7-6) lost its last three straight down the stretch.

Greene scored on a pair of 1-yard runs to help lowa build a 21-0 halftime lead, then added an 11-yarder to make it 31-0 late in the third quarter. South Carolina scored on Chris Smelley's 10-yard TD pass to Jared Cook and Ryan Succop's 48-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

After struggling offensively in losses to Florida and Clemson, Gamecocks coach Steve Spurrier decided to start quarterback Stephen Garcia, a highly-regarded redshirt freshman from Tampa.

But Garcia turned the ball over four times in the first half and was replaced by Smelley after going 9-for-18 for 79 yards and three interceptions.

His first pass was intercepted and returned 29 yards set up an lowa touchdown, then the dual-threat quarterback fumbled on his first run to give the Gamecocks turnovers on two of their first four offensive plays.

The next two South Carolina possessions ended with interceptions. After Bradley Fletcher picked off Garcia in the end zone, lowa drove 80 yards to take a 21-0 lead on Greene's second touchdown.

Stanzi was 13-for-19 for 148 yards, including a 6-yard TD throw to Trey Stross on the first drive of the game. Smelley finished 16-of-31 for 174 yards.



up with two turnovers for a defense that made the stops that mattered most, and South Carolina beat Houston 44-36 in the Liberty Bowl for its first bowl victory under Steve Spurrier.

Blake Mitchell tied a bowl record by throwing four touchdown passes, Cory Boyd ran for two more TDs as the Gamecocks (8-5) finished Spurrier's second season with their best record since going 9-3 in 2001.

Kevin Kolb, making his 50th start at quarterback for Houston (10-4) and leading the nation's sixth-best offense, finished 26-of-39 for 386 yards and three touchdowns.

Houston led 28-27 at the half — a Liberty Bowl record for points in a half — but South Carolina held the Cougars to 63 yards in the third quarter when the Gamecocks took control. They sacked Kolb three times, forced two turnovers and stopped the Cougars twice on fourth down in the fourth quarter.

The Cougars and Gamecocks combined for 588 yards in the first half, much of it just before halftime. The second quarter took 61 minutes, and a game that was tied at 7 went haywire. In the final three minutes of the half, four TDs were scored in a span 12 plays — the last a 77-yard TD catch by Houston's Vincent Marshall with 11 seconds left.

Mitchell, the game's Most Valuable Player, was 19-of-29 for 323 yards.



# 2005 Missouri 38 Independence Bowl South Carolina 31

South Carolina's game plan of keeping Brad Smith in check worked great – for a half, anyway.

Then, the Missouri quarterback broke loose, rushing for three touchdowns – including a 1-yarder in the final minutes – and passing for another to rally the Tigers for a 38-31 victory over the Gamecocks.

Smith accounted for 431 yards of Missouri's 504 yards as the Tigers staged their biggest comeback victory of the year.

Missouri (6-6) trailed 21-0 after the first quarter as Steve Spurrier's Gamecocks dominated the first half. South Carolina (7-5) outgained Missouri 312 yards to 174 in the first half and held the football almost 11 minutes longer (20:02-9:58). The Tigers didn't convert a third down until the final 58 seconds of the half.

The Gamecocks were led by quarter-back Blake Mitchell, who completed 20-of-38 passes for 266 yards and two touchdowns, wide receiver Sidney Rice, who caught 12 passes for 191 yards and freshman tailback Mike Davis, who ran for 125 yards on 18 carries.

With the Gamecocks on the verge of going up by four scores, Marcus King turned the momentum Missouri's way by grabbing Mitchell's pass at the goal line and returning it 99 yards to make it 21-7 in the second guarter.

# 2002 Outback Bowl

Daniel Weaver's 42-yard field goal on the final play of the game gave South Carolina its second-consecutive Outback Bowl victory, 31-28. USC finished the season with a 9-3 record, which marked only the second time in school history that the school recorded more than eight wins in a season (1984; 10-2).

For the first time in school history, USC won consecutive bowl games and its final national ranking of No. 13 was the program's highest since 1984.

USC thwarted a 28-point Ohio State second-half comeback after dominating the first three quarters. Andrew Pinnock ran for 49 yards on 12 carries and scored two touchdowns for the Gamecocks. Brian Scott had seven receptions for 83 yards and scored his seventh career touchdown on a seven-yard strike from Phil Petty. Andrea Gause scored on a 50-yard bomb from Petty in the third quarter.

Petty was named the MVP as he completed 19-of-37 attempts for 227 yards and two TDs.

With less than 30 seconds left in the game, USC's Sheldon Brown picked off a Steve Bellisari pass to end a potential OSU drive and raced 37 yards to the Ohio State 29-yard line.

Ohio State did not get on the board until the last play of the third quarter, and rallied to tie the contest at 28 with just less than two minutes to play.



South Carolina capped off its amazing turnaround season with an impressive 24-7 win over Ohio State in the 2001 Outback Bowl.

Claiming only the second bowl victory in the program's history, the Gamecocks ended the season 8-4 and ranked No. 19 in the AP rankings and No. 21 in the USA Today/ESPN poll.

Sophomore running back Ryan Brewer had a day to remember. The Troy, Ohio, native, who chose Carolina over his home-state university, dismantled the Buckeyes both on the ground and in the air. Brewer carried the ball 19 times, gaining 109 yards, and caught three passes for another 92 yards. The eventual game MVP was responsible for all of USC's touchdowns, scoring on runs of seven and two yards and a 28-yard TD reception early in the fourth quarter that put the game out of reach.

Also contributing on the offense for USC was quarterback Phil Petty. The junior was 9-of-19 for 175 yards and a touchdown. Jermale Kelly and Brian Scott each caught three passes.

Defensively, the Gamecocks were led by linebacker Kenny Harney who had a total of eight tackles (six unassisted), with two of those going for a loss. True freshman Deandre' Eiland contributed from his free safety position with two interceptions and tackles with three of them adding up to 17 yards of lost yardage for the Buckeyes.

The 1994 Gamecocks etched their names in the school's football record books by winning the first bowl game in school history with a 24-21 win over West Virginia at Joe Robbie Stadium.

Carolina took advantage of an early West Virginia fumble on the game's first play. Steve Taneyhill's touchdown pass to Boomer Foster staked USC to an early lead that it never relinquished.

The lead grew to 10-0 when Reed Morton was successful on a 47-yard field goal. The Mountaineers then marched 67 yards on five plays, with tailback Robert Walker running it in from 24 yards out to make the score 10-7.

Carolina retaliated with a 66-yard, 13-play drive of its own. Taneyhill, the game's MVP, ran four yards for the score, leaping into the end zone to give the Gamecocks a 17-7 halftime lead.

West Virginia scored on its first possession of the second half. After a Carolina punt, the Mountaineers began to drive again. Gamecock free safety Ben Washington made the defensive play of the day when he picked off a Chad Johnston pass. Seven plays later, Stanley Pritchett dove into the end zone and USC led 24-14.

WVU's Johnston found Lovett Purnell for a second TD to cut the lead to 24-21.

WVU threatened late in the fourth quarter before being held on downs with 3:52 left. While attempting to run out the clock, Pritchett broke free and was heading in for a score when Aaron Beasley came from behind and stripped the ball. WVU took possession at its own three with 1:14 left. However, two incompletions and a sack were all the Mountaineers could muster.



The Gamecocks suffered their eighth bowl defeat in as many tries as the Indiana Hoosiers won the 30th Liberty Bowl Classic, 34-10, in front of 39,210 in Memphis, Tenn., on a windy and cold

The game saw the Hoosiers roll up a Liberty Bowl record total of 575 vards. while holding South Carolina to 153. South Carolina quarterback Todd Ellis completed 15-of-37 attempts for 130 yards and threw three interceptions. The Gamecocks' only touchdown came as a result of a blocked punt by Keith McDonald and Antonio Walker. Mike Tolbert picked up the football and ran it into the end zone for six points. Collin Mackie's extra point was good. Mackie also connected on a 43-yard field goal.

Indiana was led by quarterback Dave Schnell who completed 16-of-31 passes for 378 yards. Running back Anthony Thompson led the Hoosiers with 140 yards rushing.

Thompson began the scoring with a seven-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, and the Hoosiers would add 10 more second-quarter points to take a 17-0 halftime lead.

The gamebreaking play occurred on the first snap of the fourth quarter when Schnell, the game's Most Valuable Player, hooked up with wide receiver Rob Turner on an 88-yard touchdown pass that upped the IU lead to 27-10.




Seventh-ranked Louisiana State struck early and never looked back in posting a 30-13 victory over ninth-ranked South Carolina before a Mazda Gator Bowl crowd of 82,119 on New Year's Eve afternoon in Jacksonville.

The Gamecocks' "50" defense designed by defensive coordinator Joe Lee Dunn was unsuccessful in stopping LSU's quarterback-wide receiver combination of Tom Hodson and Wendell Davis. Hodson completed 20 of 32 attempts for 224 yards and three touchdowns, two of which came in the first six minutes of play. Davis, the Gator Bowl Most Valuable Player for the Bengal Tigers, had nine receptions for 132 yards and three touchdowns.

Offensively for the Gamecocks, the "Run and Shoot" led by quarterback Todd Ellis, was ineffective against LSU's defense. Ellis was still able to pass for over 300 yards on 28-of-47 attempts. However, Ellis was intercepted four times. Louisiana State was able to return the interceptions for 132 yards total.

South Carolina running back Harold Green was named the Gator Bowl Most Valuable Player for the Gamecocks as he rushed 15 times for 72 yards and South Carolina's only touchdown.

Freshman placekicker Collin Mackie was good on field goals from 44 and 39 yards, both of which came in the first half.



South Carolina. Seventh-ranked leading ninth-ranked Oklahoma State 14-13, allowed a final 88-yard drive for a touchdown, capped off by tight end Barry Hanna's reception for a 25-yard touchdown play.

Hanna's effort got him into the end zone, running through Gamecock defenders down the sidelines and diving over the goal line. The loss ended South Carolina's season at 10-2 — the best record in school history.

South Carolina was plagued all night with fumbles, ending many critical drives in the first half. South Carolina was held to only 71 yards in total offense during that time while Oklahoma State built up a 13-0 lead. In less than two minutes of possession time. South Carolina took the lead 14-13. Quinton Lewis threw for a 24-yard touchdown to Chris Wade and minutes later quarterback Mike Hold fired a 57-yard touchdown pass to wide out Ira Hillary for the go-ahead score. But, the Gamecock defense, which had been on the field most of the night, could not hold off a fourth quarter Cowboy rally.

The Gamecocks were dominated in nearly every category and perhaps in the most crucial department, fumbles as well. South Carolina fumbled six times. losing three of them, including an early fumble that stopped a South Carolina drive inside the Cowboy 25-yard line.

South Carolina finished the season ranked 11th in the Associated Press poll and 13th in the United Press International poll. But, USC was Top 10 according to Sports Illustrated, USA Today, The Sporting News, ESPN, Football News and the Cable News Network.



South Carolina's second trip to the prestigious Gator Bowl was not much better than the first trip — 34 years before. The Pitt Panthers, gunning for a national championship, poured it on the Gamecocks, 37-9.

The game matched two nationallyranked teams. Pitt came in with the #4 national ranking and South Carolina was ranked 17th. In addition, two of the nation's best athletes. South Carolina's George Rogers and Pitt's Hugh Green, were showcased. Rogers, who rushed for 113 yards, had won the Heisman Trophy while Green, who recorded five tackles, was honored as the nation's finest lineman with the Outland Trophy.

An unusually cold evening with temperatures in the 40s and 15 mph winds greeted the teams and South Carolina didn't react to the adverse conditions from the word go. Rogers broke open for a nice seven-yard gain on the first play, but fumbled with the Panthers recovering on the South Carolina 29 yard line. Seven plays and four minutes later Pitt scored to take a 7-0 lead, a lead they would not relinguish.

South Carolina finally got on the scoreboard before the half on a 39-yard Eddie Leopard field goal. At the half Pittsburgh led 17-3 and led 34-3 by the end of the third quarter as turnovers and an inability to move the ball plagued the Gamecocks.

Pat Bowen picked off a pass and returned it 31 yards to the 14-yard line with 3:34 left to play in the game. Quarterback Gordon Beckham then connected with Tim Gillespie for South Carolina's lone touchdown.

West Virginia scored on its first possession of the game. Following a short punt, the Mountaineers set up shop on their own 34-yard line. They marched 66 yards in 10 plays capped by Gresham's 10-yard run to go up 7-0.

Carolina threatened to score late in the first half. Tommy Suggs passed the team down the field and had a first-and-goal at the West Virginia 10 before a fumble thwarted the drive.

But a West Virginia fumble of a punt set up a score just before the half and place kicker Bill DuPre booted through a 37yard kick to get on the board.

Neither team scored in the third quarter. The fourth quarter saw Carolina mount one serious drive that was stalled by a pass interception. West Virginia scored once more, thanks to another pass interception, scoring with just 23 seconds left in the game.

Williams rushed for 208 yards on 35 carries to account for most of the offense for the Mountaineers.

# 1946 Gator Bowl

Despite a record-breaking 90-yard pass interception return for a touchdown, the South Carolina Gamecocks fell to old nemesis Wake Forest, 26-14 in the inaugural Gator Bowl.

This was the first bowl outing for the Gamecocks and the first and last season for coach Johnnie McMillan. He was filling in for coach Rex Enright who was completing his military obligation. Enright had a lot to do with the Gamecocks receiving the bid as he was stationed in the Jacksonville area.

The game was a rematch of sorts since weeks before Carolina and Wake Forest had played to a 13-13 deadlock. But playing in 55 degree weather before a near capacity crowd did not serve well.

Wake Forest jumped off to an early 6-0 first-quarter lead on a three-vard run by Nick Sacrinty. But the Gamecocks used the one-yard burst by Bobby Giles and a Dutch Brembs extra point to grab a 7-6 half time lead.

Wake Forest regained the lead with a Dick Brinkley run and the kick was blocked to lead, 12-7. Brinkley scored another touchdown early in the fourth quarter and added a 25-yard Bob Smathers run to blow to a 26-7 lead.

The only joy left for South Carolina in its first bowl appearance was the recordsetting return by Brembs.
