CAROLINA FOOTBALL

The University of South Carolina is home to more than 200 years of history and tradition, rising from a single building in 1805 on what would become the heart of the campus, the Horseshoe.

Today, the 11 buildings that make up the Horseshoe frame a lush lawn that is an irresistible gathering place for students, faculty, staff and alumni and the scene of many important university events.

And while the Horseshoe will always be the symbol of Carolina's proud tradition, the University's presence and reach stretch across the Palmetto State, with baccalaureate universities in Aiken, Spartanburg (Upstate) and the sea islands (Beaufort and the gateway to Hilton Head), and two-year regional campuses in Allendale and Walterboro (Salkehatchie), Sumter, Lancaster and Union. Together, they are building economic prosperity; fulfilling the University's mission of teaching, research and service to the state, and preparing future leaders in business, law, education, the arts, tourism, communications, medicine and the health sciences.

- ◆ The University of South Carolina's Columbia campus has 319 degree programs through its 14 degree-granting colleges and schools.
- Students at the University of South Carolina have earned 538 national fellowships and scholarships valued at \$15.3 million since 1994.
- ◆ University of South Carolina faculty generated \$218.8 million in funding for outreach, research, and training programs in fiscal year 2010.
- Six professors at the University of South Carolina have been named 2011 fellows in the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), the world's largest general scientific society.
- ◆ The Arnold School of Public Health is meeting the professional development needs of the state's vital public health workforce through the new S.C. Public Health Training Center.
- ◆ The Ernest F. Hollings Special Collections Library, which was dedicated in July 2010, has earned LEED Gold certification. The building houses the S.C. Political Collections, the Irvin Department of Rare Books and Special Collections and Digital Collections and features exhibition areas and meeting spaces for classes and special events.
- ◆ The University continues to expand west toward the Congaree River. When completed in 2013, the Darla Moore School of Business building will become the front door of Innovista, the University's research district, and be a hub for creativity, research, and entrepreneurial activity.

UNIVERSITY HISTORY

In 2001, the University celebrated the bicentennial of its charter, but 2005 also marked a watershed anniversary: 200 years since the first classes began at South Carolina College, as it was then known. Carolina has endured the Civil War and Reconstruction, closings, and name changes. Permanently chartered in 1906 as the University of South Carolina, it grew throughout the 20th century and today is building its reputation as a cutting-edge research institution.



- ◆ In 2010-11 academic year, six USC law students held key positions with the American Bar Association Law Student Division, the largest USC representation in ABA history.
- ◆ The William P. and Lou W. Kennedy Pharmacy Innovation Center, established with a \$30 million gift from alumni William and Lou Kennedy, is bringing together the nation's top minds in entrepreneurship, health sciences, communications and other disciplines with leading pharmacy practice faculty to foster research and prepare students to be regional and national leaders in the profession.
- ◆ Three colleges and the School of Law have new deans. They are Rob Wilcox, law; Dr. Lemuel Watson, education; Dr. Anna Scheyett, social work, and Dr. Steven Lynn, South Carolina Honors College.
- ◆ Dr. Michelle Martin, a specialist in children's literature and African American children's literature and community literacy programs, has joined the faculty as the first holder of the Augusta Baker Chair in Childhood Literacy in the College of Mass Communications and Information Studies.
- ♦ A newly renovated Patterson Hall reopened its doors to 544 female freshmen this fall. Patterson features suite-style accommodations, a cyber lounge, smart classrooms, a green roof terrace and was built to LEED silver standards.
- ◆ The Ronald E. McNair Center for Aerospace Innovation and Research (McNAIR) has been established with a \$5 million gift from alumna and financier Darla Moore. The center's activities will focus on three distinct areas: basic research anddevelopment of novel materials and devices; applied research in support of advanced manufacturing tools and processes; and the development of a business and economic model that will build and support South Carolina's growing aerospace cluster through education, research and development.









































Dr. Harris Pastides, University President



Harris Pastides was named the University of South Carolina's 28th president on August 1, 2008, after a decade of service at Carolina as a professor, dean and vice president. He was the first internal candidate to be elected President of the University of South Carolina in over half a century. He has stressed leadership and civil discourse as primary values of the University and believes that athletic and academic success go hand-in-hand in preparing student athletes to be successful on the court, the playing field and in the classroom.

In 2011, Pastides was named to the NCAA Board of Directors Executive Committee to represent the Southeastern Conference for a four-year term. The Executive Committee ensures that each division operates consistently with the basic purposes, fundamental policies and general principles of the Association.

Before joining the Carolina faculty, Pastides was a professor of epidemiology and chairman of the Department of Biostatistics and Epidemiology at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. He received his master's of public health and his Ph.D. in epidemiology from Yale University.

Harris Pastides and Patricia Moore were married April 27, 1980. They have two children: Katharine, an education specialist at the Getty Villa in Malibu, Calif., and Andrew, an equity stage actor in New York City.

Dr. Zach Kelehear, Faculty Athletics Representative



Zach Kelehear took over the duties as the University of South Carolina's Faculty Athletics Representative on July 1, 2010. Kelehear is a professor in the Department of Educational Leadership and Policies. He has written multiple articles and books on the ideas of artful leadership practice in public schools and business. He currently serves as Director of Curriculum and Graduate Studies for the College of Education as well as Program Coordinator for the Education Administration Program. While at USC, Dr. Kelehear has also served on the Faculty Senate, on the University Athletics Advisory Committee, on the Graduate Council as Chair, as well as several other committees

Dr. Kelehear provides leadership for multiple national and international professional organizations such as the American Educational Research Association and the Council of Professors of Instructional Leadership. Along with his peer reviewed publications, Kelehear has

published in the *Journal of Staff Development*, *American School Board Journal*, *The School Administrator*, *Principal Leadership* and *The Principal*. He also serves as editor and/or reviewer for multiple journals and publications.

Over the past 29 years, Kelehear has been a college professor, a personnel director, staff development director, and a teacher and coach in high school and middle school. He also was a college athlete at Furman University where he played football while completing a double major in Latin and history in 1981. He later earned his master's in education from Furman in 1982, then earned his doctorate from N.C. State in 1993.

Dr. Kelehear is married to Dr. Karen Heid, an assistant professor of art education at the University of South Carolina.

Regarded as an architect of championship programs, an advocate for academic success and a skilled administrator, Athletics Director Eric Hyman began his duties at South Carolina on July 1, 2005.

Hyman has developed an outstanding reputation as a leader among his peers. He was named the 2003-04 Street and Smith's Business Journal National Athletics Director of the Year and was also selected as the Division I-A West Regional Athletics Director of the Year by the National Association of

Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). In September 2008, he assumed the duties as President of the Division 1A Athletic Directors' Association. More recently, he was named to the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee and was selected as the 2010-11 Under Armour Southeast Region Athletics Director of the Year by NACDA.

Hyman has been a featured speaker at numerous conventions, including the NCAA Champions Forum, to speak on diversity issues in athletics, and the American Football Coaches' Association, guiding young assistant coaches on how to become a head coach. He is also a regular presenter at the I-A Athletic Directors Institute.

Under Hyman's leadership, the South Carolina Athletics Department has made tremendous strides in becoming a nationally prominent program with the goal of competing for championships in all sports, as exhibited by the school's first men's national championship with the baseball team's title in June 2010. During the 2010-11 academic year, the football team captured its first SEC Eastern Division title, the men's and women's soccer teams advanced in the NCAA Championships, the women's golf team participated in the national championships and the baseball team made it back-to-back National Championships. In addition, women's indoor track & field crowned an individual national champion. Since January 2010, Carolina has posted wins over six top-ranked teams in three sports - Alabama in football, Kentucky in men's basketball, and Arizona State, Florida, Vanderbilt and Virginia in baseball.

His hiring of successful head coaches, the development of a \$200 million master plan of facilities, and the school's first athletics capital campaign have taken South Carolina athletics to new heights. Hyman has successfully guided the department through a football seat donation initiative, which, along with philanthropic gifts and money guaranteed through the television agreement, has provided the financial resources to begin bringing the Gamecock facilities up to the standards of their SEC rivals.

Under Hyman's tenure, the Carolina Stadium state-of-the-art baseball facility opened in the spring of 2009, and the Dodie Anderson Academic Enrichment Center opened its doors in February 2010, with an adjacent parking garage and tennis complex set to open in 2011. The new Coaches' Support Building is expected to open its doors in 2012. In addition, the athletic training room, locker room, coaches' locker room, players' lounge and entryway at Williams-Brice Stadium have all received major upgrades. Men's and women's basketball locker rooms have been renovated along with the coaches' offices. Major suite renovations are taking place at William-Brice following the successful addition of the Champion Club suites. Upon Hyman's arrival the stadium was dressed up with graphics and recognition of record-holding players.

Over the next couple of years, Hyman's master plan includes converting the Farmers' Market into a football parking lot and tailgate area for the fans, further improvements to Williams-Brice Stadium including a new state-of-the-art videoboard, and renovating the softball and track facilities at the new Athletics Village.

Off the field, South Carolina student-athletes have combined to surpass the 3.0 grade point average plateau for nine consecutive semesters and are regularly among the leaders in the SEC Academic Honor Roll. In Spring 2009, a record 15 of 17 athletic teams topped the 3.0 standard. South Carolina APR scores have continually improved under Hyman's watch. with 15 of 19 sports either matching or surpassing its previous highest mark in the 2011 statistics.

Hyman came to South Carolina from TCU, where he served as the athletics director for over seven years. Under his direction, TCU teams recorded 32 conference titles and consistently posted a graduation percentage rate higher than that of the overall student body. Hyman was instrumental in orchestrating TCU's invitation to join Conference USA in July 2001 and spearheading the effort for the Horned Frogs to join the Mountain West Conference in July 2005, moving the program from the Western Athletic Conference it was in when Hyman arrived. During Hyman's tenure, the TCU football team went to six bowl games in seven seasons, boasted a Heisman Trophy candidate in LaDainian Tomlinson and was ranked as high as sixth in the BCS polls; the women's basketball team went to five straight NCAA Tournaments; the baseball team earned back-to-back regional appearances for the first time in school history; and the men's indoor and outdoor track and field and men's tennis teams finished its seasons ranked among the top five in the nation.

As TCU's athletics director, Hyman worked diligently to improve athletic facilities. He helped raise over \$30 million in facility improvements and directed a three-phase building plan that completely renovated the athletic department's facilities.

Prior to his stint in Fort Worth, Hyman was the athletics director at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, and VMI in Lexington, Va., and Executive Associate Athletics Director at North Carolina State University in Raleigh, N.C., and Associate Athletics Director at Furman University in Greenville, S.C. He also coached football at Furman University for nine years under Art Baker and Dick Sheridan.

Hyman graduated from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where he was an all-ACC football player, on the Dean's list and selected for the Hula Bowl.

Hyman earned a master's degree in educational administration from Furman in 1975.



He and his wife, Pauline, together coached the women's basketball team at North Greenville University in Tigerville, S.C., leading the team to national rankings in the 1970s.

Pauline is a native of North Carolina and also has her undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She did some post-graduate work at South Carolina in the early ë80s. Pauline played and later coached women's college basketball, taught sociology and psychology and served as a college administrator. Pauline developed and taught the NCAA CHAMPS Life Skills course and various seminars for student-athletes at both Miami University and TCU. Since coming to South Carolina, she has taught the Etiquette Seminar in the Gamecocks' Life Skills course and assists with other seminars in preparing the student-athletes for their futures, such as the Dress for Success and Networking and Interviewing seminars.

The Hymans have a daughter and son-in-law, Corrine and Michael Quast, and a son and daughter-in-law, Ryan and Carolyn Hyman. Corrine is a real estate agent; Michael is a financial analyst; Ryan is in the property and casualty insurance business; and Carolyn is an attorney. They all reside in Fort Worth, Texas.

When University of South Carolina Athletics Director Eric Hyman talks about "the Dodie," the \$13 million state-of-the-art facility that opened in the spring of 2010, he enthusiastically refers to it as, "the heart of the athletics department and the place where the ebb and flow of student-athletes' days are centered."

"The Dodie" is named for Dolores F. Anderson of Greer, S.C., whose philanthropic gift helped fund the center for University of South Carolina studentathletes. Anderson is the widow of Robert Anderson, the former president and chairman of Anderson Hardwood Floors, the largest privately-owned hardwood floor manufacturer in the United States. A 1981 graduate of USC Upstate with a degree in interdisciplinary studies, Dodie Anderson is co-owner of Anderson Hardwood Floors and a longtime supporter of USC Upstate's athletic programs.

The three-story, 40,000-square-foot center is located across Heyward Street

from Stone Stadium, the Gamecocks' soccer facility, in the 41acre footprint known as "the Roost." It is the focal point of and the first piece in the re-developed area that eventually will include a coaches' support building, a new tennis complex, a basketball practice facility, a parking garage and updated soccer pracfields, softball stadium and outdoor track facilities.




GAMECOCK ATHLETICS CAREER NETWORK

THE STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE


South Carolina has a Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) made up of student-athlete representatives from each team within the Athletics Department. A panel of members from the community, including judges, solicitors, head coaches, attorneys, and judicial staff members, answer questions and address many issues student-athletes face. The purpose of the event is to encourage responsibility and mature behavior among students and to teach them that there are consequences for the decisions they make.

TEAM GAMECOCKS

The Athletics Department's community service program, "Team Gamecocks," represents a continuing commitment by Gamecock student-athletes, coaches and staff to respond with both time and effort to the needs of their local communities.

Gamecock Traditions

NICKNAME:

THE FIGHTING GAMECOCKS

The University of South Carolina's athletics teams were first referred to as the Fighting Gamecocks at the turn of the 20th century. More than 100 years later, we remain the only Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) member athletics program in the country known as the Gamecocks.

After competing for several years under various nicknames, the University's football team was the impetus of the new moniker in the early 1900s. Observers began unofficially referring to the feisty and spirited squad as the Fighting Gamecocks.

In 1903, Columbia's morning newspaper, The State, shortened the name to one word, and South Carolina's athletics teams have been the Gamecocks ever since.

The original "Carolina Gamecock" was Thomas Sumter. One of the great heroes of the American Revolution in the South, Sumter acquired the nickname for his fierce and courageous fighting tactics. A British general commented that the Brigadier General of the South Carolina Militia "fought like a gamecock." After the War, Sumter served as a member of the U. S. House of Representatives and as a member of the U.S. Senate from South Carolina.

COCKY THE SOUTH CAROLINA MASCOT

South Carolina's official mascot, Cocky, appears at many Gamecock athletic events. Cocky is widely recognized around the country and makes countless appearances at events throughout Columbia and The Palmetto State. Cocky first took action at Carolina events in 1980 when he came in to take his father's (Big Spur) place. Cocky soon won the hearts of Gamecock fans all over and now is one of the most recognizable figures to young and old at Carolina. Cocky has also captured national attention in the UCA (Universal Cheerleading Association) Mascot Competitions. In 1986, Cocky brought home his first UCA Mascot Championship. Cocky was chosen National Mascot of the Year in 1986, 1994, 2004 and again in 2009. Cocky is recognized as one of the most colorful mascots in collegiate athletics.



"2001"

The theme "2001" corresponds with the University's Bicentennial, which was celebrated 10 years ago. The theme song from "2001 - A Space Odyssey" is played at nearly all Gamecocks Athletics events and is most widely recognized for its use with the Carolina Football team's pregame entrance, which is regarded as perhaps the most unique and electrifying in all of college football.

GAMECOCK WALK

Approximately two hours and 20 minutes prior to every home game, the South Carolina team buses drop the players off on Bluff Road at the southwest corner of Williams-Brice Stadium. The team walks through the throng of Gamecock fans and well-wishers as they make their way to the locker room to prepare for the game ahead.

THE COCKABOOSE RAILROAD

The Cockaboose Railroad is like no other tailgating tradition in the country. Twenty-two cabooses line a railroad track just outside Williams-Brice Stadium - but these rail cars don't move, and they certainly aren't something you would see passing by on the end of a train. Running water, cable television, air conditioning and heating, and a living room highlight each and every Cockaboose.



Preseason Media/Photo Day

The annual Football Media Day is tentatively set for Sunday, Aug. 7. Photos are tentatively scheduled to be taken on the field beginning at 1 p.m. No interviews will be allowed on the field. Head Coach Steve Spurrier will hold a press conference beginning at approximately 1:40 p.m. (subject to change) in the Media Interview Room, located under the west stands at Williams-Brice Stadium. Requested players and assistant coaches will be available on the second floor of the Crews Building following Coach Spurrier's press conference.

Press Credentials

Working press credentials for the 2011 South Carolina home football games must be submitted online through www.sportssystems.com/clients/seccredentials

Any questions or concerns can be directed to Diana Koval in the South Carolina Media Relations Department at 803-777-7977 or by email at dkoval@mailbox.sc.edu. Requests for season passes should be submitted no later then Aug. 26. Requests for single games should be made as far in advance as possible and no later then seven (7) days prior to game day. Once approved, all credentials must be picked up on game day at Media Will Call, located at Gate 5 on the west side of the stadium by the press elevators. Media Will Call will open three (3) hours prior to kick-off. Credential requests should come from the sports editors and the sports directors only. A photo ID must be presented to receive the press credential. Parking passes will be mailed in advance through arrangements made with Diana Koval.

PRESS BOX PASSES

DAILY NEWSPAPERS will be issued a maximum of four (4) season approved press box credentials.

WEBSITES with a national affiliation will be issued a maximum of two (2) season approved press credentials.

TELEVISION stations based in the Columbia area will be issued a maximum of two (2) season approved press box credentials. Television stations based outside of the Columbia area will be issued a maximum of one (1) season approved press box credential

RADIO stations will be granted one (1) season approved credential per daily radio show. In addition, one (1) credential will be distributed per station for the sports director.

All other credential requests, including non-daily newspapers, magazines, out-of-market radio stations, etc. will be issued on a game-by-game, case-by-case and space available basis at the discretion of the media relations director.

Non-affiliated bloggers will not be credentialed.

Please note: Due to the high number of applications, it is not possible to accommodate all requests. No one under 18 years of age will be issued a credential without prior approval of the media relations director.

FIELD PASSES

DAILY NEWSPAPERS and **WEBSITES** with national affiliations will be issued a maximum of three (3) season field credentials to be used for either photography or videography.

TELEVISION stations based in the Columbia area will receive a maximum of two (2) field passes. Stations based outside of the Columbia area will receive one field pass.

All other credential requests, including non-daily newspapers, magazines, etc., will be issued on a game-by-game, case-by-case and space available basis.

Only working photographers/videographers with cameras will be allowed on the field.

Freelance photographers will not be credentialed.

South Carolina Sideline Policy

The University of South Carolina adheres to the NCAA and SEC guidelines regarding media representatives on the sidelines.

- Photo credentials will be issued only to accredited media outlets prior to the game and photo identification must be provided. Photo credentials will not be mailed. Freelance photographers will not be issued credentials.
- 2. Photographers must check in at Media Will Call on the west side of the stadium adjacent to the press elevator. Those photographers who will work on the sidelines will be issued a vest. This vest must be worn at all times to gain access to the sidelines. No other type of photo or media credential will allow an individual access to the sidelines. The vest must be returned to a member of the South Carolina media relations staff following the game.
- 3. Photographers and videographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines. Working photographers/videographers are permitted to shoot in the designated area (between the two marked dotted lines outside the 25-yard lines). All other media representatives on the field (announcers, reporters, etc.) must stand behind the designated area. This will ensure that photographers/videographers have the appropriate space to do their work.

Internet Sites

The University of South Carolina adheres to the SEC policies regarding representatives of websites. The official website of the home and visiting schools will be credentialed. Also, the official online service of the national over-the-air or cable television network that owns broadcast rights to the game will receive credentials. Other websites will not be credentialed unless they meet specifications outlined below:

- 1. Must be a legal corporate entity that has been in business for at least one full calendar year and has provided coverage of South Carolina or the visiting team for at least one year.
- 2. Must provide daily coverage of all athletic teams of South Carolina or the visiting team with its own staff of full-time reporters, photographers and equipment.
- 3. Must travel to and cover all football away games and all major post-season events.
- 4. Must provide coverage of all press conferences of all athletic teams at South Carolina or the visiting team.

SEC Internet Real Time Policy

By acceptance and use of an SEC media credential, the holder agrees to the following conditions for any and all athletic events hosted by the SEC and its member institutions:

- 1. The SEC and its member institutions grant a media organization a limited license to use certain gathered information on the media organization's own Internet or online site beginning at the start of an athletic event and up to the conclusion of such event, all subject to the following limitations and conditions:
- (a) No more than 10 still photographs may be used for news coverage of the game and other editorial purposes. Such still photographs must be used on a time-delayed basis, that is at least five (5) minutes after the happening of the event depicted by the still photograph.
- (b) It is agreed that video is NOT to be used on an Internet or online site with the following stipulations:
- (i) video may be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of a television station's regularly-scheduled news program.
- (ii) footage may be broadcast or otherwise distributed on the Internet or via any other online service or computer service, using the following limitations: a maximum of three (3) minutes from Satellite Feed Footage, Practice Footage and Event Footage.
- (iii) Footage may not be used, sold, traded, loaned or given away to any other entity for any sports entertainment programs, specials, home videos, commercials and promotional use or in any other manner not specifically set forth in these policies without prior expressed written permission of the

Southeastern Conference or the University of South Carolina.

- (c) While a game is in progress, the use of textual statistical information is time-delayed and limited in amount (e.g., updates pertaining to score, injuries and national, conference or institutional record-breaking performances, a condensed half-time story) so that an organization's Internet or online game coverage does not undercut the authorized and rights-paying fee organization's rights to play-by-play accounts of the game and/or exclusivity as to such rights.
- 2. Any proposed media use on an Internet or online site of the game information that is more detailed and/or more than described above will require separate written authorization by the SEC and/or its member institutions. However, such written authorization will not permit the use of game information in entertainment contexts and will not authorize game coverage that, due to immediacy of detail, constitutes or approaches a play-by-play account of a game.
- 3. Should any of these conditions be breached, the SEC and/ or its member institutions will issue a written warning for the first violation. A second violation of this policy will result in revocation of credentials to cover future football games hosted by the SEC and/or its member institutions.

Press Box

South Carolina features a state-of-the-art press box. This press facility has seats for 144 members of the media, along with television and radio booths, coaches' booths and public address and stadium operations/security booths. Located just above the press level is the photo deck. All members of the media covering the game are invited to a catered meal, which is served starting two hours prior to kickoff.

The Carolina press box is for the working media only. In accordance with the Football Writers Association of America, no cheering will be allowed.

Satellite Truck Parking

Limited parking is available for TV station live/satellite trucks and those vehicles will need a specific pass. Please contact Diana Koval no later than 12 noon three days prior to the game for help in securing a parking pass.

Press Box Services

The press box is equipped with outside telephone lines and data jacks for electronic photo transmissions. These services are available to media members on a first-come, first served basis. In addition, the press box has wireless internet capabilities. Electrical outlets are available at each seat. Any media outlet that wishes to install its own telephone should contact South Carolina Telephone Communications at (803) 777-1800. The Media Relations Department supplies quarterly play-by-plays and quickie stats, halftime statistics, final team and individual statistics and coaches and players quotes. An inside public address announcer also keeps the media informed of play-by-play, records and game notes.

Visiting Radio

The visitor's radio network must be designated by the opponent's athletic director. Booth space will be assigned by the Media Relations Director. Any non-designated stations will be admitted on a space-available basis. The Gamecock Sports Network will be handled by Gamecock Sports Marketing. Stations requesting information regarding the network should contact: Liz McMillan, Gamecock Sports Marketing, (803) 777-8254.

Spotters and Statisticians

The Media Relations Department can supply radio and television broadcasters with spotters and stat personnel if notified of their needs in advance.

Postgame Interviews

The press box elevator will be held at press level with six minutes remaining in the game for anyone wanting postgame interviews. South Carolina's postgame interviews take place in the Media Interview Room, located underneath the stands on the west side of Williams-Brice Stadium. The visitors' locker room and postgame interview room are located under the West stands at the North end. The Gamecock locker room will be closed following the game. Coach Spurrier will be available in the postgame interview room approximately 10 minutes after the game. Players who have been requested to be interviewed by the media will also be brought to the interview room following the cool-down period. Admittance to postgame interviews is by credential only. The South Carolina press conference will be televised live back to the press level.

SEC Weekly Teleconference

The Southeastern Conference hosts a weekly press teleconference each Wednesday from Aug. 31 through Nov. 23. The teleconference features the head coach from each team every week. Each coach issues an opening statement followed by questions from the media for seven minutes. Gamecock Sports Marketing, a partnership between the University of South Carolina Athletics Department and the country's leaders in the collegiate sports marketing industry, IMG College, is the originating medium for radio coverage of the South Carolina Gamecocks.

This is the fourth year of a nine-year, \$50 million contract between the University and IMG College that runs through 2017. 2011 also marks the fourth year of a five-year agreement with Citadel Broadcasting that makes WNKT-FM (107.5) the official flagship station of Gamecock Athletics.

All Gamecock Football broadcasts are also available on Sirius XM.

Gamecock Sports Marketing is responsible for the overall management of the athletics program's corporate partnership effort, which includes producing, selling and distributing the Gamecock Radio Network (live play-by-play and call-in shows) and television programming (pay per view opportunities and coaches shows), print advertising in various athletics department publications, and selected signage in university athletic facilities.

Todd Ellis, the all-time leading passer in Gamecock history and the school's winningest quarterback, begins his 19th season with the network and his eighth as the play-by-play voice of Carolina football. Ellis previously served as sideline reporter for the radio network and as a color analyst and play-by-play announcer for Comcast Sports Southeast for Gamecock telecasts. Ellis has also hosted the coaches television show and served on CBS's bowl game radio coverage. He hosts the Steve Spurrier Television Show

and Carolina Calls with Steve Spurrier, the Head Ball Coach's weekly radio call-in show. Ellis re-wrote the school's passing records during his career (1986-89). He set more than 20 school passing marks, while throwing for 9,953 yards.

Tommy Suggs, a former standout Gamecock quarterback, is back for his 38th year as color analyst for the radio network. Suggs played for Carolina from 1968-70 and is regarded as one of the school's all-time premier signal-callers. He led the Gamecocks to the 1969 ACC championship and Peach Bowl berth and was named MVP of the 1970 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic. Suggs was inducted into the University's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989.

Former Gamecock and NFL standout **Terry Cousin** is in his third season working as the sideline reporter. **Brent Johnson** serves as the Network Host.

Liz McMillan serves as the General Manager of Gamecock Sports Properties in Columbia. **Carroll Senn** is the broadcast engineer, **David Spence** is the spotter and **Doug Adams** is the statisician. **Rachel Wilson** assists with production.

ESPN AND THE SEC REACH MILESTONE AGREEMENT

ESPN and the Southeastern Conference (SEC) reached a milestone 15-year agreement beginning in 2009-10 and continuing through 2023-24. The landmark deal - the longest national rights agreement in ESPN history - results in ESPN entities (ESPN, ESPN on ABC, ESPN2, ESPNU, ESPN Regional Television, ESPN360.com, ESPN Mobile TV, ESPN GamePlan, ESPN FULL COURT, ESPN International, ESPN Deportes, ESPN Classic) carrying more than 5,500 SEC



events - including football, men's and women's basketball, Olympic sports and SEC Championships.

ESPN has televised the SEC since 1982. All national programming falls under the branding "SEC on ESPN." As part of the agreement:

ESPN and ESPN2 offers premier SEC games, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday football games, triple the basketball offerings with three nights of men's basketball and presents SEC Championships in women's basketball, baseball, softball and gymnastics.

ESPN Regional Television is the over-the-air syndication home for SEC football and basketball games. In addition, ESPN and the SEC work together to offer multisport packages (including football, men's and women's basketball, Olympic sports and conference championships) of SEC content for regional cable syndication.

ESPNU offers exclusive SEC telecasts, including football and basketball and selected conference championships. In addition, the network presents a weekly, hourlong program on SEC sports throughout the academic year as well as sport-by-sport previews, reviews and specials.

South Carolina football has appeared on television many times, dating back to a local telecast of a game against Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 5, 1949. The first Gamecock home game to be televised was against the University of North Carolina in Carolina (now Williams-Brice) Stadium, Nov. 7, 1953.

That first home telecast was the first program aired by WIS-TV (Channel 10) when the Columbia NBC affiliate went on the air. The NBC network originally planned a "panorama" of four games nationwide on that date, showing one quarter of each game. When plans for that production did not materialize, NBC agreed to honor a commitment to WIS-TV, which had scheduled the football telecast as its inaugural program.

NBC sent a remote unit from Washington, D.C., and play-by-play was handled by WIS-TV Sports Director Ray Stanfield. South Carolina beat North Carolina 18-0 in the game, which was sponsored by General Motors. The teams split the \$50,000 rights fee for the one station network broadcast.

Williams-Brice Stadium

CAROLINA FOOTBALL

Williams-Brice Stadium, formerly Carolina Stadium, was first constructed in 1934 by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Then, it seated 17,600 Gamecock fans. It has undergone a number of expansions and revisions over the years, with the largest prior to the 1982 expansion coming in 1971-1972. A bequest from the estate of Mrs. Martha Williams-Brice helped boost the capacity then from slightly more than 43,000 to greater than 54,000.

Mrs. Williams-Brice's husband, Thomas H. Brice, was a Gamecock football letterman from 1922-24, and her family operated the Williams Furniture Company in Sumter. She left a substantial inheritance from the furniture fortune to her nephews, Thomas W. and Philip L. Edwards, much of which they passed on to the University of South Carolina. That included a beguest for the stadium project.

The name was officially changed from Carolina Stadium to Williams-Brice Stadium in dedication ceremonies during the Sept. 9, 1972 opener with Virginia.












- Williams-Brice is recognized as one of the finest facilities in all of college football. Carolina annually ranks among the nation's leaders in attendance, and Gamecock fans are regarded as some of the most loyal in the country.
- South Carolina established a school record for football season tickets sold in 2005, selling 62,604 season tickets, surpassing the previous mark of 62,103 set in 2002. The numbers do not include student tickets and tickets contractually obligated to visiting teams.

BCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

The SEC has captured the BCS National Championship for five consecutive seasons. Since the inception of the BCS in 1998, the SEC leads all conferences with seven national champions. Tennessee won the BCS's first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida claimed the national championship in 2006 and 2008, LSU took the title in 2007, Alabama was crowned the National Champion in 2009 and Auburn took the top spot in 2010. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

SEC IN THE NFL

The SEC has had more of its former players on NFL rosters in the last five seasons than any other conference. Since 2006, the SEC has averaged 264.6 players per year on NFL opening weekend rosters. The league had a high of 272 on 2010 rosters and has outpaced all conferences every year.

SEC TOPS IN FAN SUPPORT

The Southeastern Conference has led the nation in total attendance in football every year since 1981 (29 straight years). Since 1988, the SEC has led the nation in average attendance. More than 6.5 million fans witnessed first-hand, the excitement of SEC football in 2010. The average capacity of the 12 SEC stadiums during the last 10 years has been 97 percent. Every year since 1988, the SEC has had at least four teams ranked in the top 10 in average attendance.


