COLUMBIA, S.C. (Jan. 21, 2013) — The No. 31 South Carolina women's tennis team opened the 2013 season with a 6-1 victory against Winthrop on Monday at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C. Carolina faces USC Upstate at 3 p.m. today in the second match of a double-header

In doubles, South Carolina dominated on both courts one and two with a pair of 8-1 victories. At one, No. 46-ranked Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova raced out to a 5-0 lead on Yasmine Alkema and Andressa Garcia before the Eagles registered their first and only game. Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova provided the clinching win for doubles, winning seven straight games on court two after a 1-all tie versus Alice Garcia and Giovanna Portioli.

The No. 3 doubles match between South Carolina's Adriana Pereira and Ximena Siles Luna, and Winthrop's Caitlin Cridland and Ekin Gunaysu was suspended following Andersson and Popova's triumph. The match was on serve with the Gamecocks leading 5-4.

The Gamecocks pushed ahead 2-0 thanks to Kanakova's straight set 6-3, 6-3 victory against Alice Garcia at the No. 3 spot. Kanakova improved to 4-1 on the season with the win.

Carolina had to wait a considerable amount of time to score its next point with matches on courts five and six going three sets. At five, Pereira won easily in the first set 6-1 versus Cridland but faltered 6-2 in the second. With the score tied 1-all in the third, Pereira managed to grab a 3-1 lead and held on for a 6-4 victory to put her team on top 3-0.

The next two matches finished within minutes of each other. Portioli won a hotly contested match at the No. 4 singles position against Siles Luna to make it 3-1. Portioli sprinted to a 3-0 advantage in the first set before Siles Luna cut the gap to 4-3. Siles Luna came back to make it 5-all and eventually forced a tiebreaker, but Portioli dominated in the breaker for a 7-1 win. In the second, Portioli recorded a 6-2 victory to seal the victory and snap Siles Luna's seven-match unbeaten streak.

Andersson provided the Gamecocks with the clinching point at the No. 6 spot. After blanking Gunaysu 6-0 in the first set, Gunaysu recovered to take the second 6-4. Andersson claimed the first three games in the third, however, Gunaysu fought back to make the score 3-2. Andersson then won two straight and survived a late push by Gunaysu to take the match 6-4.

Popova wasted no time making the score 5-1 for the Gamecocks with a 6-0, 6-0 triumph over Andressa Garcia on court two. Alawi closed out the day for South Carolina by earning a 6-2, 6-3 win against Alkema at the top singles position. It marked Alawi's 10th win of the 2012-13 season.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (Jan. 21, 2013) — The 31st-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team won its second match of a doubleheader Monday at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C., with a 4-0 victory over USC Upstate. Earlier in the day, the Gamecocks upended Winthrop 6-1.

The Gamecocks quickly took the doubles point, partly because of some misfortune for USC Upstate. On court two, South Carolina's Katerina Popova and Josefin Andersson led Isabel von Stryk and Talia Rojas 3-1. After five rallies in the fifth game, von Stryk went down with an injury and was unable to continue, giving the Gamecocks the victory. Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova then clinched the doubles point with a convincing 8-0 triumph against Julie Bell and Taylor Cohen at the top position.

At No. 3 doubles, South Carolina's tandem of Alex Martin and Adriana Pereira trailed the Spartans' Constanze Kuerten and Allison Beller 5-2 when play was suspended. The match was tied 2-all before USC Upstate ran off three consecutive games.

South Carolina won three quick matches in singles play to improve to 2-0 on the year. Pereira picked up a 6-0, 6-2 win from Rojas at the No. 4 position after winning a three-set match in her first contest of the day versus Winthrop. Pereira won eight games in a row before surrendering a game to Rojas and moved above .500 for the year with a 4-3 record.

Siles Luna recovered from a disappointing straight set loss to Winthrop by serving up a 6-0, 6-0 triumph over Beller on court five to make the score 3-0 for Carolina. The freshman upped her singles mark to 13-3 with the win, the top record for the Gamecocks this season.

Fellow newcomer Martin gave the Gamecocks their fourth and final point of the tilt with a 6-1, 6-2 victory against Bell at No. 6 singles. Martin actually dropped the first game of the match before storming back to win nine straight versus Bell. Once Bell cut a 3-0 second set deficit to 3-2, Martin responded by claiming the next three games.

Once the match had been decided, Kanakova and Cohen agreed to finish the first set tiebreaker they had started. Kanakova fell behind 5-2 in the first set to Cohen before mounting a comeback to force the breaker. Kanakova was down 2-1 in the tiebreaker once Martin secured the match for the Gamecocks, but she went on to win six of the next seven rallies to earn a 7-3 victory.

"I think everyone was a little nervous, it being the first match," South Carolina head coach Kevin Epley said. "I think the initial match, we were a little bit frustrated with some of the energy and those sort of things, but they cleaned it up pretty good for the second match. So, I feel like we grew throughout the day. By the end, I feel like we at least have created a base by which we can go into nationals next week."

South Carolina returns to the courts Saturday taking on Missouri in the first round of the ITA Kick-Off Weekend in Ann Arbor, Mich.

Auburn has now lost two straight after winning 14 in a row and is 14-3 overall and 4-2 in the league.

Auburn entered the match having won 15 consecutive doubles points, with the Tigers' only loss coming in their first match of the season versus No. 1 North Carolina. The Gamecocks, though, came out and dominated all three positions to grab a 1-0 lead heading to singles. It became a race between courts one and two as to which duo would finish first, as both jumped out to 6-2 leads. Katerina Popova and Josefin Andersson ended up defeating Jackie Kasler and Emily Flickinger first on court two by an 8-4 count.

At the No. 1 spot, Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova continued to lead 7-3 after 10 games, but 54thranked Pleun Burgmans and Plamena Kurteva recovered to win two straight games to cut the deficit to 7-5. Alawi, however, used her powerful serve to help propel the Gamecocks to the win in the next game. It marked the 12th time in 16 matches South Carolina has won the doubles point.

"We obviously work a lot on doubles," Gamecock head coach Kevin Epley said. "It's just one of those things where we are turning the corner confidence wise. I still think we could play a lot better than we did today, quite frankly, but they're growing into their skin and thinking of themselves as one of the better doubles teams out here. It's been sort of a transition for them because they used to think of themselves as not being doubles players, but now they're starting to realize they are and they're going to expect to win going in to every match. Today, we made a goal to finish if we get leads, and I think we could have even been a little better, but overall, we finished the matches and I think that as a team, we're starting to realize that we are one of the better doubles groups out there.'

Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna held a 6-4 advantage on court three versus Paulina Schippers and Jen Pfeifler and also were ahead 15-0 on the Tigers' serve when played stopped.

The Gamecocks continued their tough play in singles and No. 102 Popova quickly put them ahead 2-0 with her 6-4, 6-0 triumph over Michala Kucharova on court two. With the win, Popova improved to 16-7 on the season and 10-4 in dual match play, both team highs. Not long afterward, Kanakova ended her winless drought in league matches with a 6-4, 6-3 win over Pfeifler at the No. 4 position. It would take some time, though, for South Carolina to pick up the clinching fourth point.

Less than three minutes after Kanakova put USC ahead 3-0, Kurteva held off Andersson 6-1, 6-4 on court six. The remaining matches on courts one, three and five were all in third sets once Kurteva gave Auburn what turned out to be its only point of the match.

No. 78 Alawi had fought back from a 6-1 loss to No. 51 Burgmans in the first set to win the second 6-4 and she held a 4-3 lead late in the third. At three, Lechemia also lost her first set to Flickinger 6-4, but she won the second 6-2 and raced ahead to a 4-2 advantage in the third. Siles Luna won 6-3 in the first set against Kasler at five, lost the second 6-2 and took a 2-0 lead to start the third.

Alawi and Burgmans continued to trade games back and forth until eventually reaching a tiebreaker. Lechemia, meanwhile, went ahead 5-2 and had two match points on Flickinger's serve, but she was unable to close out the contest and it advanced to 5-3. Siles Luna continued to cruise on court five, pushing ahead 4-1

Lechemia managed to hold serve in the ensuing game to pick up the 4-6, 6-2, 6-3 win over Flickinger to lift the Gamecocks past the Tigers. In the process, it kept South Carolina's perfect all-time record against Auburn in Columbia in tact, pushing it to 14-0. Lechemia improved to 5-3 on the season and 2-3 at No. 3

"Eli is a player who had a lot of pro experience, and the game is just different out there," Epley said. "Out here, in the SEC, you're getting girls who may not have the ability in terms of striking the ball, but they certainly have more heart than what you're going to find on the lower pro level. These girls are fighting hard for their schools and teams and competing; that's the name of college tennis, it's competing. I think it has kind of taken Eli back a little that they are going to make her work for points. Adjusting to that, the screaming and the yelling, adjusting to the American culture and not having a fall to kind of build that confidence, it's a difficult thing to ask her to do. I think that she is coming along, she's plugging away and working hard and has a good attitude

Alawi trailed 4-3 in the tiebreaker when play was suspended and Siles Luna was still ahead of Kasler 4-2 in the third.

South Carolina will return to action Sunday hosting No. 8 Alabama at 1:30 p.m. at Carolina Tennis Center. In the event of inclement weather, the match will move indoors to the USC Field House

COLUMBIA, S.C. (March 24, 2013) — The 49th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team lost a tough 4-1 battle with No. 8 Alabama on Sunday at the USC Field House in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks dropped to 9-8 with the loss and 2-5 in the SEC, while the Crimson Tide improved to 14-2 overall and 6-1 in league play.

The Gamecocks took the doubles point from the Crimson Tide to get the afternoon underway. South Carolina's No. 1 duo of Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova scored a big upset to finish first, beating sixth-ranked Alexa Guarachi and Mary Anne Macfarlane. Kanakova and Alawi pulled ahead 5-3, but Guarachi and Macfarlane countered to win three straight games for a 6-5 lead. The Gamecocks bounced back, though, and went up a break at 7-6 with Kanakova serving. At 30-30, Kanakova delivered two huge first serves that neither Guarachi or Macfarlane could handle on their respective sides, giving the Gamecock duo the 8-6 victory.

Down on court three, it appeared that Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna would cruise to an easy win over Natalia Maynetto and Emily Zabor. The Gamecocks led 7-2 at a changeover, however, the Crimson Tide responded and ripped of four consecutive games to cut the deficit to just one. At 7-6, Lechemia put her powerful left-handed serve to work and Siles Luna chipped in with some strong putaways at the net to propel South Carolina forward with the doubles point in hand.

At No. 2 doubles, Alabama's Antonia Foehse and Maya Jansen held a 7-5 advantage on the Gamecocks' Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova. Play stopped once Lechemia and Siles Luna clinched the doubles point for South Carolina.

Alabama came back to tie the match at 1-all with No. 60 Guarachi defeating No. 102 Popova 6-1, 6-4 on court two. Popova fought hard in the second set, coming back from a 4-2 hole to make the score 4-all, but Guarachi claimed the next two games to take the match. It marked just the third loss of the season for Popova at No. 2 singles.

No. 25 Macfarlane gave the Crimson Tide the lead after picking up a straight set victory on court one over No. 78 Alawi. Macfarlane grabbed the first set by a 6-3 score, but Alawi managed to snag a 3-1 advantage in the second. Macfarlane recovered and got the match back to 4-all and then used a break of serve to push ahead 5-4. She served out the match in the next game to complete her 6-3, 6-4 triumph.

The Tide took a pair of three set matches to finish off the Gamecocks in singles. Lechemia took the first set from No. 73 Jansen 7-5 after trailing 5-2, but Jansen responded by winning the second in 6-3 fashion. In the third, Jansen took control from the beginning and won 6-1 to put Bama on top 3-1. On court four, Foehse came back from a 6-3 loss to Kanakova to win 6-3 and 6-4 in the second and third sets to clinch the match for Alabama.

Both matches for the Nos. 5 and 6 spots were in the first set when play stopped. Siles Luna had just taken a 5-4 lead heading to the changeover against Zabor at No. 5 singles when Foehse clinched the match. Andersson and No. 115 Maynetto were tied 4-all at the sixth singles position.

(March 29, 2013) — The 31st-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team won its second SEC contest in three tries Friday in Fayetteville, Ark., downing No. 44 Arkansas by a 5-2 score to improve to 10-8 and 3-5 in the league. The Razorbacks dropped to 10-11 and 3-6 in conference play.

The Gamecocks picked up the doubles point for the 14th time in 18 matches this season, but Arkansas claimed the first contest at No. 3 doubles. Kimberley-Ann Surin and Ana Lorena Belmar Hernandez defeated Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna 8-3, handing the Gamecock duo just their second loss in SEC competition.

South Carolina responded quickly with a win at No. 1 doubles from the 50th-ranked duo of Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova. They upended No. 74 Claudine Paulson and Segou Jonker 8-3 to mark their third win in a row against a ranked doubles opponent. The win also marked the 21st of the season for Alawi and Kanakova, making them the winningest Gamecock duo since the 2001-02 season.

Carolina's No. 2 squad of Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova secured the doubles point for the Gamecocks. Trailing 5-4 to Yang Pang and Brittany Huxley, the Gamecocks strung together four of the next five games to snag the 8-6 victory. They improved to 16-8 and 12-3 in duals with the win.

The Gamecocks wasted no time in singles, securing the team win with four consecutive victories. Lechemia won first, bouncing back from her defeat in doubles play to beat Surin 6-1, 6-4 at the No. 3 position. Andersson made the score 3-0, coming out on top of the first set 7-5 after it was tied 5-all and then coasting to a 6-1 triumph in the second versus Hernandez on court six. Kanakova, the current SEC Player of the Week, provided the clinching point on four by ousting Sarah McLean 6-3, 6-3.

The Razorbacks managed to take the final two matches on court. Huxley beat Siles Luna in straight sets 7-5, 6-2 at the No. 5 spot and No. 87 Alawi fell short against No. 47 Pang at the top slot 5-7, 6-4, (10-3).

No. 98 Katerina Popova also dropped just three games in upending Mary Jeremiah 6-2, 6-1 at the No. 2 spot to improve to a team best 18-8 and 12-5 in dual matches. Dominika Kanakova, the reigning SEC player of the Week, continued her hot streak of play with a 6-1, 6-1 disposal of Ariel Morton on court four to make the score 3-0.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (April 5, 2013) — The 29th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team survived a tough contest with Mississippi State on Friday evening at Carolina Tennis Center in Columbia, S.C. The Gamecocks' 4-3 victory marked their third straight SEC win and improved their overall record to 12-8 while getting their conference ledger to 5-5. The Bulldogs dropped to 7-11 and 1-9 in league play.

The Gamecocks had little trouble taking the doubles point from the Bulldogs. After dropping the first game on court three, Alex Martin and Adriana Pereira jumped ahead to a 3-2 lead on Petra Ferancova and Lien

Van Geel. After trading games for the next two frames, Carolina won four straight games with Pereira serving it out for an 8-3 triumph.

At two, Erin Stephens and Iris Verboven jumped ahead of Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova 6-2 and later led 7-3. At the No. 3 position, Julia Jones and Allie Robbins took a 5-2 advantage on Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna

South Carolina dug deep and mounted a furious comeback on both courts. On court two, Andersson and Popova broke Ole Miss at love to get back to 7-4 down and in the next stanza, the Gamecocks fought off a match point on Andersson's serve at 30-40 to extend the match further. After holding for 7-5, the Gamecocks won the next three games to give Andersson a chance to serve out the match. Ole Miss countered punched, sending the match to a tiebreaker and took command of it by snatching a 3-0 lead.

Meanwhile, on court three, Lechemia and Siles Luna recovered from their 5-2 deficit by winning three games in a row for 5-all. After losing the 11th game, they broke Ole Miss's serve to deadlock the match once again, and Lechemia followed with a hold of serve at love, the same thing she did the previous time she served. With Ole Miss ahead 6-5 in the tiebreaker on court two with a chance to serve it out, Lechemia and Siles Luna received a double fault from Ole Miss on court three that gave them an 8-6 victory. With the point in hand, the No. 2 doubles match was abandoned.

The momentum Carolina gained in the doubles translated into big gains in singles play. The Game-cocks secured the first set in five of the six matches, and Lechemia finished her opponent quickly on court three to make the score 2-0. She won the first set against No. 82 Mai El Kamash 6-1 and charged ahead 4-0 to begin the second. After El Kamash got the score back to 4-2, Lechemia closed the door on El Kamash for a 6-1,6-2 win to cap a perfect weekend on the court. The junior from France improved to 8-5 on the spring and 5-5 in SEC match play.

Siles Luna used the confidence boost she received from her comeback victory with Lechemia in doubles to add the next point for the Gamecocks. She battled her way to a 6-3 first set win against Milutinovic at the No. 5 spot but fell behind 2-0 to get the second underway. Siles Luna kept her calm and recovered by winning six consecutive games for a 6-3, 6-2 win that upped her overall record on the season to 18-10.

It appeared No. 98 Popova would provide the clinching point soon after Siles Luna won, as she held a 6-2, 4-1 lead on Jones on court two. Jones had different plans and continued to fight, taking five games in a row off Popova to force a third set.

Fittingly on Senior Day, it was one of Carolina's three seniors who provided the final point required for a team win. On court one, No. 87 Alawi flew past No. 45 Rohde-Moe 6-2 in the first set. The two traded games back and forth in the second set, but Rohde-Moe gained a break and found herself in a position to serve out the set up 5-4. Alawi continued her aggressive play, fighting off multiple set points until she eventually broke back for 5-all. Each player had her serve broken in the ensuing two games to set up a tiebreaker. Alawi earned a 3-1 advantage in the breaker before Rohde-Moe won three of the next four rallies to tie it up at 4-all. Alawi kept her composure and strung together three well-played points for her highest ranked win of the spring.

Popova and Jones were tied 1-all in the third when play stopped with Alawi's victory. At the No. 4 spot, Kanakova led Stephens 3-0 in the third after winning the first 6-3 and dropping the second 6-2. Alawi's classmate Andersson lost the first set to Verboven 7-5 on court six, but Andersson had a 4-3 advantage in the second

South Carolina's four straight SEC victories are the most since the 2010 campaign when the Game-cocks won four in a row against the likes of Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Kentucky and Vanderbilt. Carolina will look to continue its streak when it closes out the regular season on the road next weekend playing No. 17 Vanderbilt on Friday at 5 p.m. and No. 47 Kentucky at noon on Sunday.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (April 12, 2013) — The 18th-ranked Vanderbilt Commodores ended the No. 27 South Carolina women's tennis team's four-match unbeaten streak Friday in Nashville, Tenn., at the Currey Tennis Center. Vandy beat the Gamecocks 6-1 to improve to 14-9 and 7-5 in the SEC while dropping Carolina to 13-9 and 6-6 in league play.

South Carolina lost the doubles point for just the fifth time this season. Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova finished first with an 8-5 victory over Vanderbilt's Ashleigh Antal and Marie Casares at No. 2 doubles to improve to 18-8 on the season. The two teams were deadlocked at 5-all before Andersson and Popova managed to string three games together in their favor to earn the victory.

The Commodores responded with 21st-ranked Courtney Colton and Lauren Mira downing No. 35 Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova by an 8-4 count at the top position. Alawi and Kanakova fell behind 5-2 but managed to cut in to the deficit by getting the match back to 6-4. Colton and Mira then closed out the contest by claiming the next two games for the win.

Vanderbilt's Frances Altick and Georgina Sellyn overtook Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna on court three to give the Commodores a 1-0 advantage heading to singles. The two duos traded games back and forth to begin, but with the score tied at 3-all, Altick and Sellyn won five of the next six games to triumph over the Gamecocks.

Carolina lost the first set in four of the six singles contests and was unable to recover in any of the matches. Antal added Vandy's second point of the match with a 6-3, 6-4 triumph over Siles Luna at the No. 5 singles position and No. 59 Mira upended No. 77 Alawi 6-2, 6-3 on court one to pull the Commodores within one of clinching the match. Casares then beat Kanakova at the No. 4 spot 7-5, 6-2 to give Vanderbilt a 4-0 lead and the overall team win.

Altick finished soon afterward with a 7-6, 6-2 triumph over Andersson at No. 6 singles to make the score 5-0. No. 108 Popova tried putting the Gamecocks on the board after winning the first set on court two versus Colton in a tiebreaker, but Colton responded by winning the second 6-4 and then claimed a super tiebreaker for Vandy's sixth point. Lechemia closed the evening with a three-set victory against No. 83 Sellyn at No. 3 singles, winning a super tiebreaker for the third after the two split a pair of tiebreakers for the first and second sets. It was Lechemia's second win in a row against a ranked opponent.

The Gamecocks will end the regular season in Lexington, Ky., on Sunday facing No. 47 Kentucky at noon.

LEXINGTON, Ky. (April 14, 2013) — The No. 27 South Carolina women's tennis team lost its regular-season finale Sunday at No. 47 Kentucky to finish 13-10 overall and 6-7 in the SEC. The Wildcats finished up 13-11 and 4-9 in SEC matches. South Carolina will head to the SEC Tournament next week in Starkville, Miss., as the No. 8 seed and take on No. 9 seed Ole Miss on Thursday at 9 a.m. ET.

Doubles went sour for the Gamecocks again, marking the first time this season they lost the point in consecutive matches. South Carolina struck first, just as it did two days ago against Vanderbilt with Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova making short work of Stephanie Fox and CeCe Witten 8-2 at the No. 2 slot. Andersson and Popova improved to 19-8 on the year with the win and ended the regular season with an impressive 15-3 record in dual matches, including a 7-2 mark in SEC play.

Kentucky's Cailtlin McGraw and Nadia Ravita recorded UK's first victory at the top position versus No. 35 Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova. McGraw and Ravita jumped ahead to a 6-3 advantage, but Alawi and Kanakova won three games in a row to cut the margin to just one. The Wildcats then answered with two games of their own to exit the court with an 8-5 triumph.

Just like Friday's matchup, the doubles point was decided on court three. South Carolina's Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna trailed for most of their match against Khristina Blajkevitch and Jessica Stiles. Down 6-4, Lechemia and Siles Luna fought back to take a 7-6 lead on Blajkevitch and Stiles and appeared poised to complete the come-from-behind victory. The Wildcats, though, were unfazed and closed out the match by winning three straight games to record the 9-7 triumph

Four of the six singles matches went three sets and unfortunately for the Gamecocks, three of them resulted in losses. Initially, South Carolina stormed back to take a 2-1 lead thanks to Lechemia and Kanakova on courts three and four. Lechemia beat Edmee Morin-Kougoucheff 6-0, 7-6 (7-0) at the No. 3 spot and Kanakova finished just before her with a 6-2, 6-1 win over Blajkevitch to take No. 4 singles. For Lechemia, it marked her fourth victory in a row and upped her overall record to 10-5 on the spring.

No. 77 Alawi was looking for her first win of the spring against a top-25 opponent and it appeared she might get it versus No. 22 Ravita on court one. After Ravita took the first set 7-5, Alawi trounced her in the second 6-0 and then had a 4-3 lead in the third. Ravita, though, claimed the next three games to tie the team score at 2-all with a 7-5, 0-6, 6-4 win.

At No. 6 singles, Andersson recovered from a lost tiebreaker in the first set to Fox to win easily in the second 6-1. For the third set, the two were tied 1-all before Fox went on a tear by winning five games in a row to pick up the 7-6 (8-6), 1-6, 6-1 win and give the Wildcats the lead once again. McGraw then held off Siles Luna's comeback bid on court five to lift UK over the Gamecocks with a 6-3. 3-6. 6-3 victory.

South Carolina finally took the last three set match on court at the No. 2 position. No. 108-ranked Popova dropped the opening set to Stiles 6-4 but recovered to win 7-5, 6-4 in the ensuing two sets to give South Carolina its third point of the match. The victory made Popova Carolina's first 20-match singles winner of the season, moving her to 20-9 overall and 7-5 in SFC matches

STARKVILLE, Miss. (April 18, 2013) — The 30th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team suffered a 4-3 setback to No. 39 Ole Miss in the second round of the SEC Tournament on Thursday in Starkville, Miss. The Gamecocks, seeded eighth for the tournament, fell to 13-11 overall for the year, while the ninth-seeded Rebels improved to 16-12. Ole Miss will next play top-seeded and No. 3-ranked Georgia in the quarterfinals Friday at 9 a.m. ET.

The Gamecocks rebounded from consecutive losses in doubles to end the regular season with a strong performance against the Rebels to get the match underway. At the top position, No. 33-ranked Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova of South Carolina held a 4-3 lead over Iris Verboven and Erin Stephens with the match on serve. The Gamecocks then picked up a break to go ahead 5-3, but Ole Miss countered with a break of its own to put the contest back on serve. South Carolina then rattled off three straight games in its favor to snag the 8-4 victory. Alawi and Kanakova improved to 23-10 on the season while Alawi picked up her 26th doubles win as an individual, the most since Laura Ganzer won 26 for the entire 2006-07 campaign.

On court two, the Gamecocks' Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova quickly jumped out to a 6-2 lead on 40th-ranked Caroline Rohde-Moe and Marija Milutinovic, but Ole Miss came storming back. After facing a 7-3 deficit, the Rebel duo claimed the next three games to cut South Carolina's lead to just one at 7-6. After a long 14th game, Andersson and Popova escaped with the 8-6 triumph to clinch the doubles point for the Gamecocks. Rohde-Moe and Milutinovic are the highest ranked tandem Andersson and Popova have beaten in their time together. The Gamecock team improved to 20-8 on the season and an impressive 16-3 in dual matches while extending their unbeaten streak to six matches.

Carolina's Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna led Julia Jones and Allie Robbins by a 6-4 count on court three when play was suspended after the Gamecocks clinched the point. The match was on serve at 3-all until Lechemia and Siles Luna picked up a break and then won two more games to go ahead 6-3.

South Carolina got off to a slow start in singles, losing the first sets on courts one through four. On court three, initially, it appeared Lechemia might make quick work of Stephens, as she sprinted to a 4-1 lead. Stephens, though, responded by winning 11 games in a row to take the match 6-4, 6-0 to knot the match up at one point apiece. The Gamecocks countered quickly, however, using Andersson's 6-3, 6-1 victory against Verboven at the No. 6 spot to regain the lead.

At the No. 5 spot, Siles Luna fell behind Milutinovic 3-1 in the first set but fought back to take a 5-3 advantage before closing out the set with a 6-4 victory. She pulled ahead 5-2 in the second, but Milutinovic took a pair of games to cut the margin to just one. Siles Luna then confidently took care of Milutinovic in the next game for the 6-4, 6-4 win and a 3-1 Gamecock lead.

Unfortunately for the Gamecocks, the third team point they received from Siles Luna was the last they would get on the day. On court four, Kanakova lost the first set 6-0 to Mai El Kamash, but she recovered nicely by taking a 2-0 advantage to begin the second set. El Kamash then countered and looked as if she would put the match away up 5-3, but Kanakova would not go quietly, taking three games in a row for a 6-5 lead. El Kamash then forced a tiebreaker and despite having set points, Kanakova could not force a third, as El Kamash squeezed out a 10-8 win for the second set tiebreaker.

Courts one and two were the last to finish, and No. 83 Alawi had just entered a third set versus No. 44 Rohde-Moe at the top position and No. 105 Popova was attempting to force a third set with Jones at two after dropping the first. At 3-all in the second, Jones managed to string together three games in a row to defeat Popova 6-4, 6-3 and put the match squarely on the shoulders' of Alawi and Rohde-Moe.

Alawi trailed in the third set 3-1 once Popova was beaten despite having won the first game. After getting the score back to just 3-2 down, Rohde-Moe closed the door on Alawi by claiming the next three games to earn a 6-3, 4-6, 6-2 triumph. It marked Rohde-Moe's first career win against Alawi after losing to the Gamecock senior in straight sets in their previous two meetings.

The Gamecocks will now wait to see if they are selected as an at-large bid for the NCAA Tournament for the 19th season in a row. The selection show is scheduled for Tuesday, April 30, at a time that has not yet been determined.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (May 10, 2013) — The 34th-ranked South Carolina women's tennis team ended the 2013 season with a 4-3 loss to No. 30 Purdue in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on Friday at the Neil Schiff Tennis Center in Coral Gables, Fla. South Carolina finished the year with a 13-12 record, while Purdue improved to 18-5. The Boilermakers will face the winner of No. 6 Miami and North Florida on Saturday at 1 p.m.

The Gamecocks dominated the doubles point versus the Boilermakers, marking the 18th time in 24 tries this season they claimed the 1-0 lead heading to singles. Carolina's No. 3 duo of Elixane Lechemia and Ximena Siles Luna jumped out to a 3-0 advantage against Tess Bernard-Feigenbaum and Gisella Pere, but Purdue sliced the margin down to one at 4-3. The Gamecocks then won four games in a row to pick up the 8-3 victory in finishing first among the three contests

It became a race between courts one and two to see which duo would give the Gamecocks the point. The No. 2 squad of 65th-ranked Josefin Andersson and Katerina Popova appeared likely to snag the win up 6-1, but Lynda Xepoleas and Daniela Vidal won two straight to make it 6-3. On court one, 29th-ranked Jaklin Alawi and Dominika Kanakova led No. 27 Krisztina Kapitany and Mara Schmidt by a slim 5-4 margin, but the Gamecocks then ran off three straight games to record an 8-4 triumph. Alawi and Kanakova improved to 24-10 on the season with the win and 15-5 in dual matches. Andersson and Popova had their match suspended with a 7-3 upper hand.

Siles helped run the Gamecocks' lead to 2-0 after finishing first in singles play. The freshman recovered from a 0-2 start against Kapitany by winning 12 of the next 13 games to crush her opponent 6-3, 6-0 at the No. 5 spot. It marked the 20th victory of the season for Siles Luna, making her the second Gamecock this season to reach the 20-win plateau.

Lechemia pulled South Carolina within a point of securing the win after she recorded a straight set victory against Vidal on court three. With the score tied 2-all in the first set, Lechemia pulled away for a 5-2 advantage and then closed out the set after surrendering a game to Vidal. In the second, the two traded games back and forth until Lechemia broke loose from a 5-all tie to win consecutive games to end the match. She improved to 11-6 this spring and 10-5 at No. 3 singles.

Andersson was the Gamecocks' best hope of winning the match after Lechemia's triumph. After losing the first set to Pere on court six by a 6-3 count, she recovered quickly to win the second 6-2 and then led 4-2 in the third when Lechemia won her match. Pere, though, fought back to secure the next two games, but Andersson countered to go back ahead 5-4. Pere then tied the set up once again at 5-all.

While Andersson was fighting her way through the third set, Kanakova continued her battle with Bernard-Feigenbaum on court four. Kanakova faltered in the first set 6-4 and after trailing for much of the second set, she was able to snatch a 5-4 advantage and then took the ensuing game to force a third set.

The Boilermakers then finally got on the board with a win on court two with Xepoleas defeating No. 109 Popova 6-3, 7-5. Purdue then swiftly added a couple more points with Pere coming back to upend Andersson 6-3, 2-6, 7-6 and Schmidt downing No. 94 Alawi 6-7, 6-3, 6-2 on court one.

On court four, Kanakova fell behind 2-0 to start the third but then recaptured the lead at 3-2 on Bernard-Feigenbaum. The match was tied 3-all when Alawi took the loss on court one to put the No. 4 singles match as the deciding contest. Unfortunately for South Carolina, Bernard-Feigenbaum ended the match by winning four consecutive games after trailing 3-2 to win 6-4, 4-6, 6-3 and propel her team into the second round.

Alawi and Kanakova will now wait to compete in the 32-team NCAA Doubles Championship that begins May 23 in Urbana, III. The draw for the tournament will be determined at a coaches meeting May 21.
