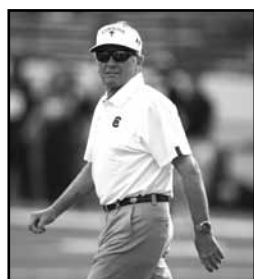

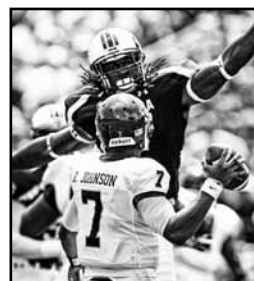

A South Carolina win over Michigan would...

- ◆ Give the Gamecocks 11 wins in a season, matching the school record set last season. The Gamecocks won 10 games in 1984 and nine games in both 2001 and 2010. The 2012 season marks just the 12th season in school history with eight or more wins.
- ◆ Give the Gamecocks their sixth bowl victory in 18 tries and back-to-back bowl wins for the first time since they captured the 2001 and 2002 Outback Bowls (both over Ohio State).
- ◆ Be the first for Carolina over the Wolverines since the 1980 season when George Rogers led Carolina to a 17-14 win in Ann Arbor. Michigan won the last meeting between the two schools in 1985.
- ◆ Give Coach Spurrier his third bowl victory at South Carolina. He is 2-4 in bowl games since coming to Columbia. Lou Holtz is the only other Carolina coach to log a pair of bowl victories.

SETTING THE STAGE: The No. 11/10 South Carolina Gamecocks (10-2, 6-2 SEC) face the No. 19/22 Michigan Wolverines (8-4, 6-2 Big Ten) in the 2013 Outback Bowl in Tampa, Fla. on Tuesday, January 1. Kickoff is set for 1 p.m. ET.

MEDIA COVERAGE: The 2013 Outback Bowl will be televised nationally on ESPN with Mike Tirico providing the play-by-play, Jon Gruden handling the color commentary and Shannon Spake patrolling the sidelines. A trio of former Gamecock greats handle the radio call for the Gamecock Sports Network. Todd Ellis is the play-by-play voice with 2009 SEC Legend Tommy Suggs providing the color commentary, while former NFL lineman Langston Moore works the sidelines.

A LITTLE HISTORY: 2012 marked the 119th season of intercollegiate football at the University of South Carolina, dating back to 1892. It was the 106th-consecutive year in which South Carolina has competed on the gridiron, the last 21 as a member of the Southeastern Conference. The University did not field a team in either 1893 or 1906. Carolina is 19 games over the .500 mark with an all-time record of 564-545-44. The Gamecocks were nine games under .500 until head coach Steve Spurrier took the reins in 2005, but are plus-28 since.

MAKING HISTORY: The Gamecocks followed up a school-record 11-win season in 2011 with another 10-win season in 2012. It's the first time Carolina has logged back-to-back double-digit winning seasons, and just the third 10-win campaign in school history. The 1984 team is the only other 10-win squad.

IN THE NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT: The Outback Bowl represents the 10th time in 13 games this season that football fans across the country can watch the Gamecocks live, including seven appearances on either ESPN or ESPN2. CBS carried three contests nationally. All eight of Carolina's SEC games were televised nationally.

BEEN HERE BEFORE: This is the Gamecocks' fourth trip to the Outback Bowl. They are 2-1 in previous Outback Bowls, defeating Ohio State in back-to-back years in 2001 (24-7) and 2002 (31-28), before falling to Iowa in the 2009 Outback Bowl by a 31-10 score.

GOING BOWLING: The 2013 Outback Bowl marks Carolina's 18th bowl appearance. The Gamecocks are 5-12 all-time in bowl games. They dropped their first eight bowl games, won three straight, lost four of the

next five, but captured last year's Capital One Bowl. Here's a look at the Gamecocks' bowl appearances:

CAROLINA VS. MICHIGAN: This is the third time these two schools have met on the gridiron. The teams split the first two meetings, with the road team winning on both occasions. Carolina went into Ann Arbor and defeated the Wolverines by a 17-14 score on Sept. 27, 1980, then Michigan posted a 34-3 win in Columbia on Sept. 21, 1985.

REMEMBERING 1980: Behind Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers, the Gamecocks overcame a 14-3 halftime deficit to post a 17-14 win over Michigan on Sept. 27, 1980. John Wangler and Anthony Carter hooked up on a pair of second-quarter touchdown passes to put the Wolverines in front, but behind Rogers' 36-carry, 142-yard effort, Carolina rallied with a pair of third-quarter scores and hung on for the win.

THE LAST TIME THEY MET: As was the case in 1980, Michigan opened up a 14-3 halftime advantage, but this time Carolina was not able to respond, falling by a 34-3 count in Columbia on Sept. 21, 1985.

CAROLINA VS. THE BIG TEN: The Gamecocks are 4-9 all-time against teams that currently comprise the Big Ten Conference. However, that number is somewhat skewed in that they were 0-5 combined against Nebraska (0-3) and Penn State (0-2) when neither of those schools was member of the Big Ten at the time of the game. The Gamecocks are 4-4 against teams that had Big Ten affiliation when the game was played. Carolina is 2-0 against Ohio State, 1-0 against Nebraska as a member of the Big Ten, 1-1 versus Michigan, and 0-1 when playing Iowa, Indiana and Northwestern.

SENIOR SALUTE: The Outback Bowl is the final game for 29 Gamecock seniors including: Akeem Augustine, Jacob Baker, Reginald Bowens, Kaleb Broome, Andrew Clifford, Justice Cunningham, Travis Ford, Aldrick Fordham, Qua Gilchrist, Chaun Gresham, DeVonte Holloman, Walker Inabinet, Damario Jeffery, Byron Jerideau, T.J. Johnson, Blair Lowery, Kyle Madden, Kenny Miles, Davis Moore, D.L. Moore, Jared Shaw, DeAngelo Smith, Quin Smith, Seth Strickland, D.J. Swearinger, Devin Taylor, David Wilkins, Shaq Wilson and Adam Yates.

FOUR-YEAR WIN TOTALS: The 2012 Carolina senior class has produced 37 wins over the past four seasons (7 in 2009, 9 in 2010, 11 in 2011 and 10 in 2012), surpassing last year's senior class total of 34 for the most in school history. It's the third-straight year a new standard has been set, as the 2010 seniors posted a then-school record 29 wins.

THE HEAD BALL COACH: Steve Spurrier is in his eighth season directing the Gamecock football program. He has logged a 65-37 mark (.637) in Columbia. The Head Ball Coach is Carolina's winningest coach with 65 victories and is second in games coached with 102, behind Rex Enright (140). Spurrier owns a 207-77-2 mark (.727) in 23 seasons as a collegiate head coach, with previous stops at Duke and Florida.

AT THE TOP OF THE LEADER BOARD: Head coach Steve Spurrier recorded his 65th victory at South Carolina in his 102nd career game as the Gamecocks' head coach in the regular-season finale at Clemson. He surpassed Rex Enright (64) for the most coaching wins in school history. He is already the winningest coach at Florida with 122 victories. The legendary Bear Bryant (60 at Kentucky and 232 at Alabama) is the only other coach to own the most wins at two SEC schools.

TOPS IN HIS FIELD: Steve Spurrier became the 71st head college football coaches (all divisions) and the 22nd in Division I history to record 200 wins when he accomplished that feat against UAB. He ranks fourth among active Division I coaches with 207 wins. In addition, the HBC has 47 wins as a head coach at the professional level, giving him 254 career coaching wins.

UNCHARTED TERRITORY: The 2013 Outback Bowl will mark the seventh time Coach Spurrier has taken Carolina to a bowl game. They have been bowl-eligible in each of his eight campaigns. No other coach in Carolina history has taken the Gamecocks to more than three bowl games (Jim Carlen and Joe Morrison). Coach Spurrier is 2-4 in bowl games at South Carolina. He and Lou Holtz are the only Gamecock coaches to post two bowl victories.

SPURRIER VS. MICHIGAN: Steve Spurrier has never faced Michigan in his career. They will be his 63rd different opponent in his 23 years as a college head coach.

THE LAST TIME OUT: The No. 13/12 Gamecocks held the ball for nearly 40 of the 60 minutes as they throttled the No. 12/9 Clemson Tigers in Death Valley by a 27-17 count on November 24. The victory marked Carolina's fourth-straight win over their in-state rivals, matching their longest winning streak in the series, accomplished only once previously (1951-54). Sophomore quarterback **Dylan Thompson**, subbing for the injured Connor Shaw, completed 23-of-41 passes for 310 yards and three touchdowns in the contest. The Carolina defense, led by **Jadeveon Clowney's** school- and Clemson Memorial Stadium-record 4.5 sacks, limited the high-octane Clemson offense to just six minutes and 41 seconds of possession time in the second half.

OUT OF THEIR LEAGUE: The Gamecocks have done an excellent job when playing teams from outside the Southeastern Conference in recent years. Over the past four seasons, they are 17-2 in non-conference action, losing only to UConn in the 2010 PapaJohns.com Bowl and to Florida State in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl. They have won 16-straight regular-season non-conference games, going 4-0 in regular-season non-conference action for four straight seasons. South Carolina's last regular-season non-conference loss came at Clemson in 2008. Including bowl games, the Gamecocks went 5-0 in non-conference action in 2011 after going 4-1 in non-league games in both 2009 and 2010. They are 30-7 in non-conference games under head coach Steve Spurrier, including wins in 28 of their last 33 non-SEC tilts. The year-by-year breakdown including bowls: 2005 (2-2); 2006 (5-0); 2007 (3-1); 2008 (3-2); 2009 (4-1); 2010 (4-1); 2011 (5-0); 2012 (4-0).

WINNING MORE OFTEN: The Gamecocks have put together five-straight winning seasons and a school-record nine-straight seasons of at least a .500 record, surpassing the previous mark of seven-straight seasons of .500 or better set from 1928-34. The Gamecocks went 6-5 in 2004, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 6-6 in 2007, and 7-6 in both 2008 and 2009 before logging a 9-5 record in 2010 and a school-best 11-2 mark in 2011.

GOOD HOME COOKIN': The Gamecocks have won their last 11 games at Williams-Brice Stadium, including a perfect 7-0 record at home in 2012. The Gamecocks were 6-1 in each of the previous three seasons. The only home losses in the last four years came to top-ranked Florida in 2009, to 17th-ranked Arkansas in 2010 and to defending national champion Auburn in 2011. Carolina is 27-3 in its last 30 home games.

PERFECT AT HOME: The Gamecocks went 7-0 at home in 2012. It marked the first time they ran the table at home since joining the SEC. The last time they went undefeated at home was in 1987. They have been undefeated and untied at home 10 times: 1902 (6-0), 1907 (2-0), 1912 (4-0), 1958 (5-0), 1969 (5-0), 1979 (7-0), 1980 (7-0), 1984 (7-0), 1987 (7-0) and 2012 (7-0).

TOP HOME STREAKS: The Gamecocks have won 11-straight home games, their longest stretch since joining the SEC and the third-longest streak in school history. Here are the top home winning streaks:

AND NOT BAD ON THE ROAD EITHER: Carolina went 3-2 on the road this season, with both losses coming at Top-10 teams (LSU and Florida), but has won nine of its last 12 true road games. The Gamecocks had their school-record six-game road winning streak snapped at Arkansas late in the 2011 season.

BEATING THE EAST: The Gamecocks went 5-1 against SEC Eastern Division foes this season, with the

only loss coming at Florida. Carolina posted a perfect 5-0 mark against SEC Eastern Division rivals in 2011, a first in school history. They have won 13 of their last 14 and 14 of their last 16 contests within the division. They had never won more than four games in the division prior to Coach Spurrier's arrival. He has posted four+ wins in the division four times in eight seasons:

BEATING YOUR OWN: The midseason loss at Florida snapped Carolina's 12-game winning streak against Eastern Division opponents. That streak was the fourth-longest winning streak among SEC Eastern Division teams in intradivisional matchups since the two-division format was established. Head coach Steve Spurrier owns three of the top four streaks:

AN SEC SIX-PACK: With a 6-2 SEC mark, the Gamecocks reached six SEC victories for the second year in a row. They had never had six SEC wins in a season prior to 2011. They finished the 2000, 2001, 2005 and 2010 seasons with 5-3 SEC marks. Carolina finished with at least a .500 SEC mark for the 10th time in 21 seasons and have put together three-straight .500-or-better SEC records for the first time in school history.

GAMECOCKS IN THE SEC: The Gamecocks wrapped up their 21st season of league play in the SEC. They have played 168 SEC regular-season contests since joining the league. Here's a breakdown of the Gamecocks in three-year segments in conference regular season action:

KEEPING THE FANS HAPPY: The Gamecocks have taken care of business against their top rivals in recent seasons. Over the past three years, they are an impressive 11-1 against SEC Eastern Division rivals Georgia (3-0), Florida (2-1) and Tennessee (3-0) and against in-state rival Clemson (3-0). In fact, Carolina has won the Palmetto State Championship four years in a row, the longest winning streak over the Tigers since 1951-54.

IN THE POLLS: The Gamecocks have been ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 for 46 consecutive polls, starting with to the second week of the 2010 season. That is the longest consecutive streak in school history. According to research compiled by "The Blitz," South Carolina was ranked in the A.P. poll 148 times from 1936-2011, 14 times as a member of the ACC (1936-1970), 57 times as an Independent (1971-1991) and 77 times since joining the SEC prior to the 2012 season.

THE BEST FINISH ON RECORD: With a win over Michigan, the Gamecocks should finish in the final Associated Press Top 10 for the second-straight season. The Gamecocks finished ninth in the AP poll in 2011, the first time they have finished in the Top 10. The Gamecocks will also finish among the nation's Top 25 for the third-straight season, something that's never been accomplished. The 2010 and '11 Gamecocks finished among the nation's Top 25, joining the 2000 and 2001 squads under Lou Holtz as they only squads to finish in the Top-25 in back-to-back seasons. Here are South Carolina's final AP Top-25 rankings: YEAR (FINAL AP): 1958 (13); 1984 (11); 1987 (15); 2000 (19); 2001 (13); 2010 (22); 2011 (9).

AND THE BEST STARTING POSITION: The Gamecocks opened the 2012 season ranked ninth in both the AP and USA Today/Coaches' polls. It was the first time the Gamecocks were ranked in the preseason Top-10 in history. Carolina climbed to No. 3 after opening the season with six-straight wins, its highest ranking since the 1984 season, before two-straight losses dropped them out of the Top-10. They come into this contest ranked 11th in the AP poll, 10th in the Coaches' poll and 10th in the BCS Standings.

YES THEY CALL IT A STREAK: The Gamecocks are tied for the fifth-longest current streak of being ranked in the Associated Press's Top 25. Carolina and Stanford have been ranked for 46 consecutive weeks, trailing only Alabama, LSU, Oregon and Oklahoma.

THE TOP 10: The Gamecocks were ranked in the Top 10 for a school-record 10-consecutive Associated Press polls, the final two of the 2011 season and the first eight of the 2012 campaign, before falling out after successive losses at LSU and Florida. The Gamecocks have been ranked in the AP Top 10 30 times in school history, 16 under head coach Steve Spurrier and 13 times in the last two seasons. POST-SEASON ACCOLADES: Sophomore **Jadeveon Clowney** ranks as the most decorated Gamecock of the 2012 season. Clowney, a 6-6, 256-pounder from Rock Hill, S.C., was the recipient of the Hendricks Award as the nation's top defensive end. The three-time SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week became the first sophomore to win that award, securing nearly two-thirds of the final votes. He also was a finalist for the Nagurski Trophy (top defensive player), Rotary Lombardi Award (lineman or linebacker) and Bednarik (top defensive player) awards, all of which went to Notre Dame senior linebacker Manti Te'o. Clowney was a first-team All-American, the coaches choice as the SEC Defensive Player of the Year, and a first-team All-SEC selection. He became the first Gamecock to earn SEC Defensive Player of the Year honors. Junior wide receiver/punt returner **Ace Sanders** was the co-SEC Special Teams Player of the Year according to the league's 14 coaches, the first Gamecock to earn that honor. He had the unusual distinction of making both the All-SEC first team (return specialist) and second team (all-purpose) as selected by the coaches. He was a second-team All-SEC choice by the Associated Press as an all-purpose performer. Senior safety **D.J. Swearinger** and senior center **T.J. Johnson** were second-team All-SEC selections, while junior running back **Marcus Lattimore** earned honorable mention. Offensive tackle **Brandon Shell** earned a spot on the SEC All-Freshman team and was a first-team Freshman All-American. He was joined on the SEC All-Freshman squad by tight end **Jerrell Adams** and defensive back **T.J. Gurley**.

FOUR IN A ROW: Jadeveon Clowney earned All-America accolades, extending Carolina's streak for four-consecutive years in which they've featured a first-team All-American, three coming on the defensive line. Defensive end **Eric Norwood** was touted in 2009, wide receiver **Alshon Jeffery** earned A.A. distinction in 2010 and defensive lineman **Melvin Ingram** was a 2011 consensus All-American.

SHAW AT THE HELM: Connor Shaw is 16-3 as a starting quarterback (10-0 at home), the best record after 19 games of any signal-caller in Carolina history. The 6-1, 207-pounder junior from Flowery Branch, Ga. has completed 67.3 percent of his passes for 1,732 yards and 15 touchdowns with just seven interceptions this season. He is third in the SEC and 13th in the country in efficiency rating (156.9).

3000-1000 CLUB: Junior quarterback Connor Shaw became just the second player in South Carolina history to pass for over 3,000 yards in a career and rush for over 1,000 yards. Shaw went over both plateaus against Tennessee and now has 3,403 yards passing and 1,029 yards rushing. Jeff Grantz is the only other Gamecock to do so. Grantz threw for 3,440 yards while rushing for 1,577.

THROWING STRIKES: When the Gamecocks pitch it around the park, there's been no one who has been more accurate in school history than Connor Shaw. The top two and three of the top five quarterbacks in completion percentage have worked under Coach Spurrier:

THROWIN' IN THE WIND: Redshirt sophomore Dylan Thompson made his first start in place of an injured Connor Shaw against East Carolina and responded with an impressive performance. After entering the game with just two completions in five career attempts for 17 yards, Thompson connected on 21-of-37 passes for 330 yards with three TDs and no picks. He came off the bench against UAB after Shaw was re-injured and produced again, hitting 5-of-10 passes for 177 yards and two TDs. With Shaw hampered by a foot injury, Thompson was called on again in the regular-season finale against Clemson. He led the Gamecocks to a 27-17 win, throwing for 310 yards and three touch-

downs For the season, Thompson is 59-of-117 for 910 yards with eight touchdowns and one interception.

LATTIMORE OUT: All-American Marcus Lattimore suffered a right knee injury late in the first half against Tennessee in the season's ninth game. He underwent surgery on Friday, Nov. 2. It was the second straight season in which the Gamecocks lost their leading ground-gainer midway through the season. He suffered a left knee injury in the seventh game of the 2011 campaign at Mississippi State. The Gamecocks have been able to overcome that setback both years, winning five of six games after the injury in 2011 and all three games in 2012. For more on Lattimore, see page 18.

MAKING MUSIC WITH MILES & DAVIS: With the season-ending knee injury to Marcus Lattimore, the Gamecocks turn to the duet of Kenny Miles and Mike Davis. Miles, a fifth-year senior, has carried 99 times this season for 358 yards, but set career highs with 27 carries for 127 yards against Wofford. It was his fourth career 100-yard day. Miles has 310 career totes for 1,340 yards, a 4.3-yard average. Davis, a true freshman, has carried 52 times for 275 yards, 5.3 yards per carry.

JOINING THE 1,000-YARD CLUB: Earlier this season, fifth-year senior running back Kenny Miles (1,340 yards) and junior quarterback Connor Shaw (1,029 yards) became the 39th and 40th players in Gamecock history to rush for 1,000 yards in a career.

SANDERS IS SPECIAL: Junior punt returner Ace Sanders has put together a record-setting season. Sanders, a co-SEC Special Teams Player of the Year and a two-time SEC Special Teams Player of the Week, has seven returns of 27 yards or more, including a 70-yarder for a score against Georgia and a 50-yarder at LSU. He is averaging 14.5 yards per return, first in the SEC and third in the nation.

HE'S NO. 1: Ace Sanders holds the school record for punt return yards in a season with 363, one more than Dick Harris logged during the 1971 campaign. Sanders is averaging 14.5-yard per punt return. Bobby Bryant holds the school record by returning 13 punts for 242 yards, an 18.6-yard average in 1966. Here are the single-season punt return leaders by yards in school history:

COMING UP ACES: Junior wide receiver Ace Sanders has done it all this season. He is second on the team with 36 receptions for 439 yards and a team-high

seven touchdown receptions. He had a career-best day with a six-catch, 119-yard effort with a touchdown in the season finale against Clemson. Sanders also has returned 25 punts for a 14.5-yard average - tops in the SEC and third in the nation - and completed a 16-yard touchdown pass in the win over East Carolina. It was his third career pass, his second completion and TD pass.

BRUCE ALMIGHTY: Sophomore **Bruce Ellington** has shown he can excel on the gridiron as he has done on the hardwood. The starting point guard for the Carolina basketball team each of the past two seasons, Ellington leads the team with 38 receptions for 564 yards, a 14.8-yard average, and six touchdowns, and has returned 16 kickoffs for a 22.2-yard average, including a 50-yarder against Missouri. Ellington has been hot of late, catching 21 passes for 299 yards with four touchdowns in the last four games, including the first two 100-yard receiving games of his career - 101 versus Tennessee and a career-high 104 yards against Arkansas. Ellington is a rare breed that has earned SEC All-Freshman honors in both football and basketball. Since the regular season ended, Ellington rejoined Frank Martin's men's basketball team and averaged over 10 points per game through his first three contests.

THIS BYRD CAN FLY: Damiere Byrd was on the receiving end of a 94-yard touchdown pass against UAB. It was the fourth-longest touchdown pass in school history and ranks in a tie for the second-longest pass play in the Division I play this season. Byrd has 12 receptions this season for 303 yards, a gaudy 25.2 yards per catch average, with two scores. He also competes in the 60-meter dash for the Carolina track team and competed in an international track meet for the U.S. in Japan.

TRENDING TIGHT ENDS: The Gamecocks have brought the tight end back into vogue. Senior Justice Cunningham has 22 catches this season for 287 yards. He had just 27 receptions for 257 yards from 2009-11. Sophomore Rory "Busta" Anderson has become a big play threat. He has 13 catches this season for 264 yards, a 20.3-yard average, with five touchdowns. In his brief career, Anderson has eight TDs among his 21 catches with a 21.5-yard per catch average. In addition, **Jerell Adams**, the third tight end, was an SEC All-Freshman selection after catching four passes for 90 yards.

RECEIVING BY COMMITTEE: Without a standout receiver, the passing game has gone more by committee. Here are the wide receivers' and tight ends' season and career numbers:

STABLE ON THE O-LINE: Senior center **T.J. Johnson**, a second-team All-SEC selection by the league's coaches, anchors the line. He has started every game over the past four seasons, making a school-record 52 career starts. He is the only Gamecock in history that started in four wins over in-state rival Clemson. Red-shirt sophomore **A.J. Cann** has become a fixture at left guard. He started all 13 games last season as a red-shirt freshman and has started 24 of the last 25 games. Junior right guard **Ronald Patrick** has started all 12 games this season, his first career starts. The tackle position was more fluid, but settled late in the season. Redshirt freshman tackle **Brandon Shell** made his first career start at Vanderbilt as the left tackle and has gotten the call each of the last eight games at right tackle. He earned SEC All-Freshman accolades and was a FoxSportsNext first-team Freshman All-American. Red-shirt sophomore tackle **Corey Robinson** has been the starting left tackle in eight of the last nine contests, his first career starts. True sophomore **Mike Matulis** (10 career starts) made five starts this season, three at left tackle and two at right tackle, but is out for the season after undergoing shoulder surgery. Redshirt sophomore tackle **Cody Gibson** has made six career starts, including two this season.

NO ONE HAS MORE: Senior center **T.J. Johnson** has made 52-consecutive starts, matching Nevada's offensive lineman Chris Barker, for the top spot among active Division I players.

Carolina is also 13th in scoring defense, allowing just 17.4 points per game, while Michigan is 16th. STRONGMAN COMPETITION: One of the strongest players to ever don the Garnet and Black is fifth-year senior defensive tackle **Byron Jerideau**. Jerideau, a 6-1, 316-pounder from Green Pond, S.C., is a beast in the weight room, logging a 670-pound squat, a 500-pound bench press and has the strength to power clean well above 300 pounds.

SENIOR 'BACKERS: First-year linebackers coach Kirk Botkin is blessed with a group of experienced players. The two-deep at the Mike, Will and Spur positions features five seniors who have combined for 14 varsity letters. **Reginald Bowens** (20 starts) and **Damario Jeffery** (6 starts) handle the Mike position; **Shaq Wilson** (32 starts) and **Quin Smith** (4 starts) man the Will position; and **DeVonte Holloman** (34 starts) gets the call at the Spur position.

SHAQ ATTACK: Senior linebacker **Shaq Wilson** has been outstanding this season. Wilson, the quarterback of the defense, leads the team with 77 tackles, including a career-high 14 stops at LSU. He also has two interceptions, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

I SWEAR HE CAN PLAY: Senior safety **D.J. Swearinger**, considered the biggest hitter of the defense, is one of the team's top playmakers as well, with 70 tackles (second on the team), two interceptions including a 69-yard "pick-six," five pass breakups, two fumble recoveries including a 65-yard fumble return for a touchdown, and a forced fumble this season. He logged a season-best 13 stops against Arkansas and, with his interception return for a score, was named the Walter Camp Defensive Player of the Week. He was recognized as a second-team All-SEC performer by both the coaches and writers.

CALL ME MAYBE: Senior cornerback **Akeem Auguste** returned to action at Kentucky in game 5. It was his first active duty since the Georgia game in 2011 and just his second game since the 2010 season. Auguste, who missed all but one game last season with a foot injury while getting a medical redshirt season, missed the first four games this season with a groin injury. He also was sidelined for the Tennessee game with a groin injury, not related to the first one. He notched his first pass interception late in the win over Arkansas and returned a fumble 31 yards for a score versus Wofford.

PICK THIS: The Gamecocks picked off a season-best four passes against East Carolina and have 14 interceptions for the season. Senior **DeVonte Holloman** leads the way with three this season (including his third in four games against Clemson) and with seven career interceptions. **Jimmy Legree** returned one of his for a touchdown against East Carolina and his other 70 yards to the one at LSU. **D.J. Swearinger** added a "pick-six" against Arkansas.

MADAM I'M ADAM: Senior kicker **Adam Yates** has put together a solid season. The Sparks, Md. product was just 3-of-5 through the first seven games before catching fire. He hit 3-of-4 at Florida, including a career-long 51 yarder, and has made eight of his last 10 attempts. The 51-yarder was the longest for a Gamecock kicker since Spencer Lanning hit from the same distance against Furman in 2010 and tied for the ninth-longest field goal in school history. For the season, Yates is 11-of-15 in field goal attempts. He is a perfect 46-for-46 in extra point attempts. Yates made the biggest kick of his career when he hit a 42-yarder midway through preseason camp, earning a scholarship. He has also assumed the kickoff duties and has produced 31 touchbacks on 56 kicks.

HULL OF A PUNTER: Sophomore **Tyler Hull** did not arrive on the Carolina campus until a week after fall camp began but quickly asserted himself as the team's top punter. The Mount Airy, N.C. product kicked at Guilford (N.C.) College in 2010 before transferring to Surry Community College. For the season, Hull is averaging 39.4 yards on 51 punts with 11 inside the 20, 20 fair catches and six that have traveled 50+ yards. Both Hull and backup punter **Patrick Fish**, wear number 13.
