2003 YEAR IN REVIEW

Despite completing the 2003 season on a down note, the Gamecocks' bright future of athleticism and talent could still be seen as a light at the end of the tunnel. Although the young Gamecocks ended the season on a five-match losing streak, USC finished sixth in the SEC, fifth in the eastern division and garnered a SEC Freshman of the Year recipient. It was a season that lessons from every angle were learned by everyone involved with the team. The bright side is that mostly everyone returns, this time with more experience, determination and balance.

"Our 2003 season was a learning experience for all of us. It is not typical to have so many freshmen in one class. The youth brought enthusiasm and a real eagerness to learn," said head coach Kim Hudson. "We had an

extremely difficult preseason schedule that I felt was good for our program in the long run. It was stressful, but we were able to find the balance needed to endure the length of a season. We had many bright moments during the year. It was hard because our expectations are to be a playoff team and each one of our players has a championship background. They are accustomed to being the best."

Although USC suffered its first losing season since 1993, it was also the toughest schedule the program had ever played. The Gamecocks faced seven ranked teams, including top-ranked Southern California. This marked the first time ever the Gamecocks had played a No. 1 team. With the Florida Gators in the SEC, the Gamecocks are the only team in the conference that can say they played both the national champion and the runners-up of the 2003 NCAA Championship match.

In addition to facing the No. 1 and No. 2 teams, the Gamecocks also played top 25 teams in Northern Iowa, Michigan State, Santa Clara, Notre Dame and North Carolina. South Carolina recorded two top 25 victories as they defeated then ranked No. 17 North Carolina, to snap a two-match losing streak to the Tar Heels, and No. 15 Notre Dame, the first win ever over the Fighting Irish for the Gamecocks. According to Hudson, the tough schedule built a future team of character.

"I believe we benefited most from the experience of playing such tough competition. The experience of not reaching our goals has made our team hungry to have a much better 2004 season," said Hudson. "We went through some real battles on and off the floor. Losing is really difficult, but I made the schedule with a vision in mind for the future. It

takes real strength to overcome the difficulties that losing can create."

The most prestigious honor the Gamecocks received in 2003 was the selection of redshirt freshman Lynae Vanden Hull as SEC Co-Freshman of the Year. This marks the first time a Gamecock volleyball player has ever earned this honor. Vanden Hull led South Carolina in kills with 314 and averaged 2.93 kills per game. In SEC matches, she ranked among the conference's top ten in hitting percentage and service aces.

"Lynae worked extremely hard to develop as a player. Her desire is to be the best she can be and she makes no excuses," said Hudson. "She trains with a focus to be good and it is that simple for her. I am happy for her that the other SEC coaches recognized her efforts because she is deserving of the honor."



Vanden Hull showed signs of her worthiness as she recorded a career high, 27 kills in a match, just one shy of tying the school record of 28. That marked the most kills in a match by any Gamecock player since Kori Ermigarat, who posted 26 back in 1995.

Despite setter Katelyn Panzau adjusting to life as a freshman student-athlete of a Division-I program, and tackling a very personal situation with the near loss of one of her sisters in a serious car accident, the Belleville, Ill. native proved she was just as tough as her problems. Panzau became only the fifth Gamecock setter to record 1,000 assists as a freshman and with this accomplishment, she joined the ranks of Megan Hosp, Ashley Edlund, Kelly Morrow and Jodi Thompson, some of Carolina's best setters of the program.

Another shining star on the Gamecock's 2003 roster was outside hitter Shonda Cole. Cole was second on the team in kills, behind Vanden Hull, and averaged 2.74 kills per game. She was the co-leader in total blocks among the freshman class and was one of two Gamecocks to record over 100 kills in SEC play.

Defensively, sophomore transfer Lauren Ford led the Garnet and Black as she posted 97 total blocks to lead the Gamecocks and averaged 0.98 blocks per game. The Indianapolis, Ind. native is the top returning leader in hitting percentage for the team. One of four Gamecocks to record more than 30 aces, Ford hit .458 in a match to record the third best percentage on the team for the year.

One constant on the 2003 squad was sophomore outside hitter Sarah Morgan. Morgan played in all 30 matches including all 57 SEC games and 109 of 111 total possible games. She is also

the team's top returning leader in digs with 132.

Nicole Miller revealed some of her talents in 2003 as she led the team in different categories on several occasions. Miller recorded the team season high for a match when she hit .611 (12k, 1e, 18ta) against Ole Miss, and against Southern California she led the team with a .448

percentage (16k, 3e, 20ta). When she was not playing at the net, Miller saw action in the libero position, where she was one of three Gamecock players to record at least 20 digs in a match. Among the returning players, Miller was the second highest block leader and third best dig leader.

Iris Santos was a versatile player for the Gamecocks as she played in the

outside hitter position and the libero position. As a libero, Santos was second on the team in digs and recorded a career and team season high 22 digs.

In 2003, the Gamecocks second go-to player at the setter position was Alexcis Thomson. Thomson was the only player to record more than 60 assists in a match for the season when she registered 62 against Kentucky in October.

It is each of these accomplishments and potential that still lies within the individual players that Coach Hudson believes the 2003 season made her team stronger. With 2003 in the record books, the Gamecocks hope to take the experiences learned from the unpleasant season and look to move forward with more determination, experience and spirit than before.

"Each day we make choices and when you are coaching or playing on a struggling team, it takes a gut check every minute to continually make the choice to work harder, be determined and believe that 'tough times do not last, but tough people do'," said Hudson.
