

Kristi Coggins

Head Coach • 13th year at Soyith Carolina

In her 13th year at the helm of the South Carolina women's golf program, Kristi Coggins has directed the Gamecocks to 11 trips to the post-season as a team, highlighted by eight NCAA Championship appearances and an SEC title in 2002. For her efforts, Coggins was honored as the 2002 SEC Coach of the Year.

In addition to the team's success during the Coggins era, three of her players have qualified for the NCAA Championships as individuals.

With a cumulative grade point average of 3.752 for the 2004-05 academic year, Coggins' team was recognized as the inaugural recipient of the National Golf Coaches Association All-Scholar Team G.P.A. Award. The team came back to win the same award again in 2005-06.

Under Coggins, academic excellence has become a staple of the Gamecock women's golf program. The women's golf team finished the 2004 fall semester with a 3.671 overall GPA, which marked the highest team GPA since the Carolina athletic department began charting the figure on team-by-team basis in 1996, then turned in a combined 3.832 GPA in the spring semester to shatter the record it had just set. More than half of the student-athletes on the 2004-05 roster earned a spot on the President's List (perfect 4.0 GPA for a semester). Never before has any team in the South Carolina athletic department combined for such academic success.

Coggins has coached two different players who went on to win the prestigious Dinah Shore Trophy, as Adrienne Gautreaux received the honor in 2004 and Erica Battle was the 2006 recipient. The Dinah Shore Trophy honors the top women's golfer in the nation who combines success on the golf course with success in the classroom, service to the community and extraordinary leadership.

In addition, Coggins also coached the 2006 SEC Women's Golf Scholar-Athlete of the Year in Whitney Simons

Recognized by her peers as one of the top coaches in the country, Coggins was named as the head coach at South Carolina on July 8, 1994.

In her 22nd year of collegiate coaching, Coggins believes that you can only improve if you play the best teams on a consistent basis. Her Gamecock teams see the best week-in and week-out in the highly-competitive SEC. In fact, Carolina played one of the top-five most challenging schedules of any team in the country in 2004-05, according to the Golfweek/Sagarin ratings. That tough competition has translated into postseason appearances for Coggins' teams during her entire career, as she has led 15 of her teams to postseason action, including nine to the NCAA Championships.

Coggins has coached 12 individuals over the years who have gone on to professional golfing careers, including Kris Tschetter, Ellie Gibson, Siew Ai Lim and Clarissa Childs, who are currently on the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) Tour. Her list of "Who's Who" could soon be extended by two as 2003 SEC Player of the Year Kristy McPherson and Adrienne Gautreaux are both close to earning spots on the Tour. All totalled, Coggins has tutored six All-Americans and 11 different individuals who have garnered 20 All-SEC and All-Southwest Conference honors.

Emphasizing the total student-athlete concept in her coaching career, 19 individuals she has coached have earned Academic All-America honors — including 13 at South Carolina — while the graduation rate of Coggins' teams has been 100 percent. Adrienne Gautreaux was named a CoSIDA first-team Academic All-American in 2004 and Erica Battle was a CoSIDA District All-America honoree in 2006.

Kristy McPherson earned her third All-American honor in 2003 and was named as the 2003 SEC Player of the Year. In 1995, Siew Ai Lim was also named as the SEC's best golfer under Coggins' watchful eye.

"Everything is in place here at South Carolina for us to be successful," says Coggins. "Our facilities, the academic excellence and our administration's support. It is all geared towards our success. The attitude is directed towards the student-athletes here and that has been a key to our success in attracting quality student-athletes and seeing them through to solid accomplishments on the course and in the classroom."


In 2002, South Carolina accomplished something never before done in USC's women's or men's golf history: win a Southeastern Conference title. In fact, the women's golf team is one of five Gamecock teams with an SEC title to its credit. South Carolina broke both the school and conference scoring record in capturing the crown while one of Coggins' players, Kristy McPherson, captured her second-straight individual title.

In 2001, the Gamecocks put together a solid late-season run, finished third in the SEC Championships, sixth in the NCAA Regional and qualified for the NCAA Championship. In 1999, after South Carolina's consistent top five finishes and a 14th-place showing at the NCAA Championships, Coggins was recognized as the SEC Coach of the Year, her second such coach of the year honor.

Coggins led USC to its highest ranking ever --seventh -- near the end of the 1995 season and a ninth-place finish at the NCAA Championship, marking a school best. South Carolina finished in the top five in nine tournaments during Coggins' first year after accomplishing the feat only twice the previous season.

Coming to South Carolina following nine highly-successful seasons at Texas Christian University, Coggins took over a program which had finished in the lower division of the Southwest Conference in 1985, and proceeded to guide the Lady Frogs to nine consecutive upper-division finishes in the SWC. Coggins led TCU to three runner-up finishes in the Southwest Conference Championships (1988, 1989, 1993), with the squad finishing third place or better in all but one season.

Coggins led TCU to five NCAA appearances, with three of her squads advancing to the NCAA finals. Her 1989 team ranked as high as third in the nation at midseason, earning Coggins Southwest Conference Coach of the Year honors. All of Coggins' TCU squads finished the season ranked 26th or better in the nation.

Coggins received her bachelor of science degree in recreational administration from Southwest Texas State University in 1984. Prior to taking the head coaching post at TCU, Coggins was a teaching professional at Brookhaven Country Club in Dallas, Texas, from 1984-86.

Coggins is currently the secretary for the National Golf Coaches Association after serving as Director At-Large in 2003-04. She has served on the NCAA Regional Advisory Committee for Women's Golf and was appointed to the NGCA Awards Committee for four years. She and her husband, Buck, were married June 8, 1997. They have three children: Daniel, 21, and twins Charlie and Melanie, 15. The family also has two chocolate labs, Sunny and Cache.

USC earns eighth NCAA postseason bid and 3rd consecutive trip to NCAA Championships, a school record ... Gamecocks finish 2nd at Lady Paladin and 4th at SEC Tournament ... Kristy McPherson was named SEC Player of the Year.

2003-04 NCAA Regional

Senior Adrienne Gautreaux receives prestigious Dinah Shore Trophy and earns first-team Academic All-America honors ... Gautreaux finished tied for 22nd at the NCAA Championships ... Gamecocks make ninth straight postseason appearance at NCAA Regionals ... Also finish second at Lady Gamecock Classic

2004-05 NCAA Regional

Fielding a lineup of three freshmen, a sophomore and a junior, the Gamecocks finish ninth at the NCAA East Regional, just one spot and three strokes away from earning a berth to the NCAA Championships. Sophomore Jenna Pearson qualifies for the NCAA Championships as an individual and finishes 60th, carding a 72 and a 73 in the last two rounds.

2005-06 NCAA Regional

The Gamecocks win the Chrysler Invitational during the fall season, defeating a field that consisted exclusively of teams from the ACC and the SEC. Carolina competes at the NCAA Regionals. Carolina wins its second consecutive NGCA All-Scholar Team GPA Award for posting the highest combined team grade point average in the country. Senior Erica Battle wins the Dinah Shore Trophy and sophomore Whitney Simons wins the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Gamecocks

Marci Kornegay

Assistant Coach • Third year at South/Carolina

Marci Kornegay joined the South Carolina women's golf program as an assistant coach in July of 2004. Kornegay serves as the Gamecocks' recruiting coordinator in addition to assisting with the women's golf budget, arranging all team travel, working with the strength and conditioning staff to coordinate the team's weight program and working with the academics staff to monitor the team's academic process. Her coaching philosophy is to develop and foster an environment for athletic, academic and social success and to keep positive visibility to the public by reflecting the values of the University, the SEC and the NCAA with integrity and loyalty. She also believes in ensuring that student-athletes have competitive success as well as a postive overall collegiate experience upon graduating.

Kornegay's time at South Carolina has been marked by success both on and off the course, as the Gamecocks advanced to the post-season in each of her seasons in Columbia and the team was recognized as the NGCA All-Scholar Team of the Year in both 2005 and 2006. The team set a new school record for higest combined grade point average in 2005 by posting a 3.832 GPA. With Kornegay on the coaching staff, Erica Battle was honored as the 2006 Dinah Shore Trophy winner for being the top women's golfer in the nation who combines success on the course with success in the classroom, service to the community and extraordinary leadership. Whitney Simons was recognized as the 2006 SEC Women's Golf Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

A talented golfer in her own right, Kornegay was the 2004 USGA Mid-Am Qualifier Medalist and advanced to the round of 32 at the 2005 Southern Women's Amateur.

Kornegay came to USC from Winthrop University, where she served as an associate head coach for both the men's and women's golf programs since January of 2003, primarily serving as women's head coach.

Kornegay has ties to the Southeastern Conference both as a student-athlete and as a coach. She lettered four years at the University of Mississippi from 1997-2001 and served as an assistant coach at LSU from 2002-03.

Kornegay appeared on the SEC Academic Honor Roll in all four of her years at Ole Miss, highlighted by a spot on the Dean's List in 2001. She earned Rebel Ringer honors for having the lowest cumulative score on the team in 1999, 2000 and 2001. In addition, Kornegay earned the team leadership award in 2000 and 2001 and was named team captain her senior year.

Immediately after graduating, Kornegay moved into an assistant coach role at LSU, where she stayed for a year before moving on to Winthrop.

Clarissa Childs

Volunteer Assistant Coach • 10th year at South Carolina

One of South Carolina's most decorated women's golfers ever, Clarissa Childs is in her 10th season on the Gamecock women's golf staff. Childs, who finished her Lady Gamecock career in 1996, was an assistant coach for five years but is participating on the LPGA Tour and serves as a volunteer assistant coach for Coach Kristi Cooglins' team.

A four-year all-Southeastern Conference honoree who competed at South Carolina from 1992-96 and was a key member of Gamecock teams that advanced to the NCAA Championships in 1993, 1995 and 1996, Childs earned first-team all-SEC honors in 1994 and 1995. She finished third at the 1995 SEC Championships and finished 14th at the 1995 NCAA Championships with a score of 71-75-74-76=296 to help Carolina to a ninth-place finish at NCAAs, marking the school's best showing ever at the NCAA Championships. Childs was South Carolina's top finisher at the 1996 NCAA East Regional, finishing 12th with a score of 77-71-78-226. She had seven top-five finishes during her career as a Gamecock, a mark that ranks third in school history. Childs earned medalist honors at the 1993 Carolyn Cudone Intercollegiate and graduated from Carolina in 1996 with a degree in interdisciplinary studies.

Childs joined the LPGA Tour in 2002, competing in eight events. In 2003, she competed in six events on the Futures Tour and posted two top-10 finishes, then returned to the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament, where she tied for fifth to earn exempt status for the 2004 season. In 2002, Childs recorded her career-low 69 at the Sybase Big Apple Classic Presented by Golf Magazine, where she tied for 31st for her career-best finish. Childs returned to the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament and tied for 51st to earn non-exempt status for the 2003 season. In 2001, she tied for 31st at the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament to earn non-exempt status for the 2002 season. From 1997–2001, Childs competed on the SBC Futures Tour and posted 10 top-10 finishes and recorded a hole-in-one at the 1998 U.S. Women's Open.

2005-06 (Junior Year)

Compiled à career-best 76.17 stroke average as a junior ... Posted a very impressive top-10 finish at the SEC Championship, tying for seventh with a 75-74-72=221 ... Pearson's performance at the SEC Championship marked the lowest 54-hole score of any Gamecock player this spring and was the third-lowest 54-hole total of her career ... In finishing seventh, Pearson became the 10th Carolina player ever to finish in the top 10 at the SEC Championship and the first since Kristy McPherson finished third in 2003 ... Finished ahead of five of the nation's top 28 players who competed at the SEC Championship ... Turned in a solid 79-71-74=224 performance at the Bryan National Collegiate that resulted in her tying for 21st on the individual leader board at the event, placing her ahead of six players in the field who were ranked among the nation's top 50 players ... Her second-round 71 at the Bryan National Collegiate set an 18-hole low for her during the spring portion of the schedule ... Has been a mainstay in the South Carolina lineup in each of the last two years ... Posted the best finish of her career by finishing in a tie for sixth on the individual leader board at the Chrysler Invitational with a 70-72-83=225 ... Her performance at the Chrysler Challenge led the Gamecocks to the victory ... Her first-round 70 at that event set a season low for any South Carolina player in 2005-06 and was only one stroke off her career-low round ... Posted a top-25 finish at the Lady Tar Heel Invitational with a 79-75-72=226, tying for 25th at the event.

2004-05 (Sophomore Year)

The only Gamecock to compete in every tournament in 2004-05...Competed at the 2005 NCAA Championships, carding a 79-79-72-73=303 to finish in a tie for 60th on the individual leader board...Qualified for the NCAA Championships by finishing with the second-lowest score at the NCAA East Regional among players representing schools that did not qualify as a team, carding a 70-77-72=219...Had a 77.09 stroke average...Notched three top-20 finishes as a sophomore, carding a 69-74-74=217 to finish 14th at the NCAA Fall Preview, an 81-79-79=239 to finish 19th in very windy conditions at the Lady Gamecock Classic and a 70-77-72=219 at the NCAA East Regional...Turned in her two lowest round of the spring when she carded a 70 in the first round and a 72 in the final round at NCAA Regionals....Also shot a 72 in the third round at the NCAA Championships.

Summer, 2004

Competed at the USGA Public Links Championship, advancing to the quarterfinals in match play before falling to golf superstar Michelle Wie...Carded a 71 in the first round of stroke play and a 66 in the second round... Pearson's second round was highlighted by seven birdies, four of which came on the back nine...Her two-round stroke play score of 137 was the second-best of any competitor in the field and was four strokes better than Wie's stroke play total of 141...Also competed at the U.S. Amateur Championship, advancing to the round of 16 after a convincing five-up victory in the round of 32 over Spain's Tania Elosegui.

2003-04 (Freshman Year)

Competed in seven tournaments during her first year at the collegiate level, compiling a 78.6 stroke average... Low round was a 72 at the Lady Gamecock Classic...Shot a 73 at the Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic, where she finished with a 78-73-76=227...Matched her three-round low of 227 at the SEC Tournament, where she fired a 76-75-76.
