For the 10th consecutive season, the South Carolina Gamecocks earned a berth in the NCAA Regionals. The Gamecocks got hot near the end of the season with a productive May that saw Carolina compile a 17-13 SEC record for a second place finish in the SEC Eastern Division on its way to a 40-23 overall record and a trip to the NCAA Tournament. Carolina's finish marked the 10th straight year with 40 or more victories. The year also got off with a bang and the dawning of a new era with the opening of a brand new state of the art facility in Carolina Stadium. The team finish ranked No. 4 in the nation in average and total attendance for the 2009 season. In the inaugural season at Carolina Stadium, the Gamecocks totaled 231,360 fans compiling an average of 6,804 fans in 34 contests. Both the marks set school records at South Carolina. This is the 10th consecutive season that South Carolina has ranked among the top 15 in the nation in attendance.

The Gamecocks gave the capacity crowd at the new complex something to cheer about in the opener as three South Carolina pitchers combined for a one-hitter in a 13-0 victory over Duquesne in front of 8,153 fans on Opening Day of the 2009 season. DeAngelo Mack and Justin Dalles added homers as Carolina christened its new facility with a big win in front of the Garnet & Black faithful. Carolina starting pitcher Sam Dyson was effective in five innings of work allowing just one hit and two walks while striking out six batters to earn the win. The winning would continue over the next two days as the squad added victories of 8-4 and 6-0 to sweep the series vs. the Dukes. South Carolina's pitching staff had a strong first weekend allowing just four runs on 10 hits in 27 innings for a 1.33 ERA. Eleven Gamecock pitchers saw action and struck out 31 Duquesne batters.

Momentum carried into the next week as the Gamecocks made the trek north to the Upstate for a battle with in-state rival Clemson. With the score deadlocked at 1-1 in the top half of the ninth, Carolina outfielder DeAngelo Mack knocked a 3-2 pitch from Clemson reliever Graham Stoneburner for a solo homer to left center pushing the Gamecocks ahead by a run. The solo homer was then followed by three straight hits by the Gamecocks including a RBI single by Bobby Haney to score Andrew Crisp and give Carolina a two-run edge. Left-handed reliever Alex Farotto would close out the game in the ninth inning as South Carolina earned a 3-1 victory over Clemson at Doug Kingsmore Stadium.

After earning a pair of wins over Georgia State and Charleston Southern in the midweek, the Gamecocks faced a new foe for the first time with perennial Big West power Long Beach State traveling to Columbia for a three-game set. Carolina's offense dominated the first two games on the way to a series victory over the Dirtbags. The Carolina offense combined for 29 runs scored in three games vs. the Dirtbags as the team hit .363 (41-for-113) in the series with 10 home runs. A 19-hit total helped lead the Gamecocks to a 15-8 win in the series opener. Nick Ebert was 3-for-3 with a homer and four runs scored in the victory. Mack would provide most of the offense in Saturday's 7-5 win over Long Beach State as he tallied his first multi-homer game of his career. Long Beach State would salvage the final game of the series on Sunday handing the Gamecocks their first loss of the year, 10-7.

The middle of March saw Carolina head back to the Upstate for a non-conference tilt vs. Furman at Fluor Field, home of the Greenville Drive, a minor league affiliate to the Boston Red Sox. With many garnet & black clad fans in attendance, the Gamecocks pounded out 22 hits and scored in six of nine innings at the plate on its way to a 15-0 victory over Furman. The offense backed up a solid start by Gamecock junior right-hander Blake Cooper, who worked six scoreless innings and combined with four relief pitchers to limit the Paladins to two hits to earn the victory. Playing in front of his hometown crowd, second baseman Scott Wingo tied a career-high in hits with a 3-for-5 performance vs. the Paladins.

That victory would be followed up that weekend with an impressive 7-3 victory over nationally ranked LSU at Carolina Stadium. South Carolina homered four times and received seven innings of two-hit ball from sophomore right-hander Sam Dyson, who outdueled LSU ace Anthony Ranaudo. With a 2-1 lead entering the bottom of the eighth, the Gamecocks were able to put some insurance runs on the board with a five-run inning against the LSU bullpen. After Paul Bertuccini walked Jackie Bradley, Jr. to lead off the inning, Whit Merrifield drove a home run to left field to put Carolina on top 4-1. Into the game for LSU came reliever Jordan Nicholson. With two outs and runners on second and third base, the Gamecocks got another spark from Andrew Crisp, who launched a three-run homer to left center to give Carolina plenty of cushion.

Carolina continued to travel the state near the end of March with a trip the low country and a road contest at Patriots Point vs. the College of Charleston. South Carolina broke out of the gates early with eight runs in the second inning and added six more in the middle innings on its way to a 14-2 victory over College of Charleston.

Cooper notched his second straight quality start as he limited the Cougars to one run on five hits with three strikeouts and two walks in 5.2 innings of work to earn the win. The Gamecocks belted out three homers in the game with the middle of the order providing the power. Ebert, Kyle Enders and Andrew Crisp (4-5-6 in the lineup) all homered.

The win would set up a big weekend for Carolina in the Bluegrass vs. SEC East foe Kentucky. The weather was not too nice in Lexington when the Gamecocks arrived and the Friday opener had to be postponed with the two teams opening the series on Saturday in a doubleheader.

It was wild and crazy in the opener at Cliff Hagan Stadium as South Carolina jumped out to a double-digit lead behind a season-high 25 hits and held off a late Kentucky rally to hold on for a 20-19 victory in game one of the doubleheader.

South Carolina's 25 hits tied for the fifth highest total in a game under head coach Ray Tanner. It was a career day for several Gamecock hitters with personal bests set. Jackie Bradley, Jr. Whit Merrifield and Justin Dalles all had four hits for career highs. Andrew Crisp also had four hits for a season-high and tallied two homers, the second multi-homer game of his career and the second by a Gamecock player this year. Seven of the nine Gamecock position starters had at least two hits.

Things looked good in the nightcap for Carolina as the team went ahead 4-3 in the top of the ninth inning. Kyle Enders drew a leadoff walk and advanced to third base on a single by Adam Matthews. On the play, Matthews was gunned down at second base attempting for double. With two outs and Enders still on third, the Gamecocks went ahead on a RBI bunt base hit by Scott Wingo. With a 4-3 lead, the Gamecocks went to the bullpen in the bottom half and brought in left-hander Alex Farotto. The senior, who recorded a save earlier in game one of the doubleheader, got the first out of the inning on a groundout and was 1-1 in the count to Chris Wade before an inside pitch just grazed the Kentucky shortstop allowing him to reach base on a hit by pitch. Enter Kentucky's Andy Burns, who went after Farotto's first pitch and lofted a ball opposite field to right, where it just cleared the fence for a game-winning homer.

With the rubber game on Sunday, head coach Ray Tanner went with veteran Blake Cooper in hopes to clinch the series. The junior right-hander didn't disappoint as he hurled his second career complete game as Carolina held on for a 4-2 victory on a brisk, cold afternoon. Tied 1-1, the Gamecocks made their move in the top of the seventh inning. Bobby Haney got things going with a one-out base hit and Jackie Bradley, Jr. singled up the middle and off reliever Tyler Henry's glove to give Carolina a pair of runners. Merrifield then drove in the go-ahead run with a RBI double down the right field line. Merrifield and Bradley, Jr. then would score as Nick Ebert drove a RBI single down the left field line to give Carolina a three-run cushion. The four runs were enough for Cooper, who was stellar throughout the cold afternoon in Lexington. Cooper limited Kentucky to two runs on eight hits with five strikeouts.

As the calendar turned to April, the Gamecocks would host Clemson for the first time at Carolina Stadium. An exciting midweek tilt would go the full nine innings with the Gamecocks winning in dramatic fashion as DeAngelo Mack's two-run single in the bottom half of the ninth lifted Carolina to a 7-6 come-from-behind victory over the Tigers. Trailing by a run in bottom half of the ninth, South Carolina mounted a rally against Clemson reliever Casey Harman. Pinch hitter Adam Matthews got it started with a base hit to left field to lead off the frame and pinch hitter Casey Rihn followed with a walk giving Carolina a pair of runners with no outs. Jackie Bradley, Jr. then did his job as he laid down a perfect sacrifice bunt to advance both runners to second and third base. Clemson elected to intentionally walk Whit Merrifield to set the stage for Mack. The Gamecock outfielder, who also hit a game-winning homer earlier in the season at Clemson in a 3-1 win on Feb. 28, roped a 1-1 pitch for a RBI base hit to right field that scored both Matthews and Rihn and sealed a one-run victory for the Gamecocks. Mack later earned the Tom Price Award, given to the Gamecock MVP for the series vs. the Tigers.

# 2010 Baseball

The 7-6 victory over Clemson was not the only highlight of the week though, as Carolina had a tough conference road test at 14th ranked Ole Miss on the weekend. The Gamecocks would put together a pair of quality games and earned a series victory in Oxford with wins of 12-10 and 8-1 over the Rebels. The 12-10 win over Ole Miss saw Carolina rock Ole Miss starting pitcher Drew Pomeranz in the first innings to jump out to a 9-2 lead. Whit Merrifield had a career day at the plate going 5-for-6 and Justin Dalles went 3-for-4 with a homer and four RBI as Carolina held on for the victory. The Rebels wouldn't fare better the next day as Gamecock left-handed pitcher Nolan Belcher hurled his first complete game and was backed by a two-homer game from Bobby Haney and another home run by Nick Ebert in the 8-1 win.

Riding the momentum from the road series win over the nationally ranked Rebels, the Gamecocks won a second straight SEC series taking two of three games from the Auburn Tigers at Carolina Stadium. Dyson hurled his first career complete game and tied a career-high with eight strikeouts as the Gamecocks defeated Auburn 8-3 on Friday evening. Dyson kept getting stronger as the night went on as he did not register his first strikeout until the final batter of the fourth inning. He worked hard through the final stretch and retired the last nine batters he faced. After falling on Saturday afternoon, the Gamecocks bounced back in the rubber game with a 10-4 win vs. Auburn. Justin Dalles tallied his first multi-homer game of his Gamecock career and DeAngelo Mack added a homer and three RBI as well.

May would prove to be the Gamecocks' best month as Carolina got on a roll, winning eight of nine SEC games to cement the team's spot in the SEC Tournament in Hoover, Ala., and a second place finish in the Eastern Division. The hot start began at Carolina Stadium with a three-game sweep of Vanderbilt. Dyson would get the better of future MLB first round selection Mike Minor in an 8-5 win in the series opener. South Carolina tallied three home runs in the first three innings with Bradley, Ebert and Dalles all connecting for Carolina. Carolina's offense continued the next night as Saturday's win saw the Gamecocks outlast Vanderbilt 14-5 behind DeAngelo Mack's second two-homer game of the season. South Carolina totaled 16 hits on the evening. Eight of nine Gamecock starters drove in runs. Ebert had four RBI, with Mack, Andrew Crisp and Jeffery Jones driving in two apiece. The top part of the order for Carolina (Mack, Merrifield, Bradley Jr. & Ebert), went 11-for-15 with eight RBI and 11 runs scored.

The offense continued to dominate the Commodores as an 11-3 win in the series finale gave Carolina a sweep. Another 16-hit out put saws Bangs, Ebert and Mack homer that was backed up by a complete game by junior right-hander Blake Cooper. The Carolina offense finished the weekend with a combined 42 hits and 33 runs scored in three games vs. Vanderbilt as well as 10 home runs. Bradley, Jr. was 9-for-14 (.643) for the series. Mack finished 7-for-12 (.583) against the Commodores and Ebert was also 6-for-11 with eight RBI.

It didn't stop there though as a weekend trip to Knoxville featured one of the most dramatic comebacks in school history. After falling in the series opener, South Carolina stormed back in game two from an early eight-run deficit and rallied with nine runs in the final three innings to stun Tennessee 15-12. The win saw Carolina take the lead in the ninth inning with four runs, including a two-run, game-winning single by DeAngelo Mack to break a 12-12 tie. Gamecock reliever Parker Bangs, who also homered in the game, worked two perfect innings of relief and struck out all six batters he faced to pick up the win.

Carolina then won the series with a 15-6 win over Tennessee in the rubber game. South Carolina belted five home runs including a grand slam by Andrew Crisp, on its way to the win. The Gamecocks busted out of the gates for four runs in the first, third and fifth innings to go ahead by 12 and were backed a solid start from junior right-hander Blake Cooper. Crisp finished the day 3-for-5 with two runs scored and four RBI. Whit Merrifield also had a productive day going 2-for-5 with a homer, three runs scored and three RBI. Jackie Bradley Jr. also homered and scored three runs and drove in three. Justin Dalles finished 2-for-3 with a homer and two runs scored. Bobby Haney was 2-for-4 with a run scored as well.

With the offense coming on strong and the pitching staff shaping into form, the Gamecocks closed out conference play with a series sweep of Georgia at Carolina Stadium. Dyson set a career-high with 13 strikeouts and hurled his second career complete game and Ebert tallied two homers including a grand slam as South Carolina upended Georgia 7-2 in game one. In game two, Nolan Belcher did not allow an earned run in 6.1 innings of work and struck out a career-high 11 batters and home runs by Ebert and Dalles for the second straight day helped lift South Carolina to a 7-4 victory. Ebert continued his productive weekend in the series finale as he homered for the third consecutive day and Carolina broke open a close game with four runs in the bottom of the eighth inning on its way to a 6-1 victory over Georgia to sweep the Bulldogs.

With a 17-13 conference record, the Gamecocks headed to Hoover, Ala. and the SEC Tournament. The highlight for Carolina at the tournament would be the opener, as South Carolina scored four runs in the top of the 11th inning on its way to a 9-5 extra inning victory over local favorite and fourth seed Alabama. The three hour-57-minute game had several moments of truth before the Gamecocks broke the deadlock in the 11th inning. Haney jumpstarted the inning with a one-out double over the head of left fielder Kyle Moore and a bloop single by Scott Wingo and a hit by pitch against Whit Merrifield loaded the bases for Carolina. The go-ahead run would score then as reliever Jimmy Nelson threw low and past catcher Vin DeFazio allowing Haney to score. The Tide would then intentionally walk DeAngelo Mack, to load the bases for a second time for Nick Ebert. On a 3-2 pitch, Nelson threw low of the strike zone to walk Ebert and give Carolina a two-run cushion. With two outs and the bases still jammed, Justin Dalles gave Carolina some insurance with a two-run double off the left field wall putting Carolina ahead by four.

Determined after a solid showing in conference play, the Gamecocks earned a berth into the NCAA Tournament and a trip to Greenville, N.C. for NCAA Regionals. Seeded No. 2 in the four-team regional, Carolina opened postseason action against the Colonial Athletic Association's conference champion, George Mason. Solid offense and pitching continued to be the story for Carolina as the squad opened with a 11-3 victory over the Patriots. All nine position starters recorded at least one hit and the Gamecocks scored eight runs in the middle innings. Sam Dyson went seven innings and allowed three runs on seven hits to earn the win on the mound.

The Gamecocks would showcase another complete performance against top seed and host East Carolina in game two. Justin Dalles and Adam Matthews each homered twice, including a grand slam home run from Dalles, and starting pitcher Blake Cooper hurled his third complete game of the season as South Carolina defeated East Carolina 12-2. Cooper picked up his fourth win in five starts for the month of May as he allowed two runs on 14 hits with six strikeouts and two walks.

East Carolina bounced back in game three with an 8-6 win over South Carolina that would set up a showdown for a spot to reach the NCAA Super Regionals. South Carolina led most of the way after going ahead 6-0 in the third inning and despite a Pirate rally to close it within one run in the bottom of the seventh inning at 7-6, pushed the advantage back to three when Jackie Bradley, Jr. hit a two-run homer in the top of the eighth inning to give the Gamecocks a 9-6 lead. East Carolina, as they had done the entire regional, mounted a comeback. In the bottom of the ninth inning, Brandon Henderson drew a leadoff walk, which sent the Gamecocks back to the bullpen for senior right-hander Curtis Johnson. Johnson would walk the first batter he faced, Dustin Harrington, bringing Devin Harris up to the plate with a pair of runners on base. On a 0-1 pitch, Harris drove a slider from Johnson over the left centerfield wall to tie the game up at 9-9. Johnson battled back though and would get three of the next four batters out he faced to force the game into the extra innings.

South Carolina looked to go back ahead with the potential tying run on second base with one out in the top of the 10th but East Carolina reliever Mike Wright would get the next two outs to send ECU back to the dugout for the bottom of the 10th inning. With one out, designated hitter Kyle Roller roped a double into the gap in left center. After an intentional walk to Dustin Harrington, Johnson dug deep and got the second out on Dustin Harrington with a pop up to right field. Carolina went to the bullpen again and brought on right-hander Sam Dyson to face Harris. The ECU right fielder knocked a hard single up the middle with Gamecock center fielder Whit Merrifield throwing home. Roller just beat the throw at home plate for the game-winning run and ECU clinched the regional over the Gamecocks, 10-9.

South Carolina had four players named to the All-Tournament team with catcher Justin Dalles, infielder Bobby Haney, outfielder Jackie Bradley Jr. and pitcher Blake Cooper.

Despite the heartbreaking loss, it was another successful season for the Gamecocks. Freshman outfielder Jackie Bradley Jr. was a consensus Freshman All-America selection and four Gamecocks earned All-SEC accolades (Dalles, Ebert, Haney, Mack).
