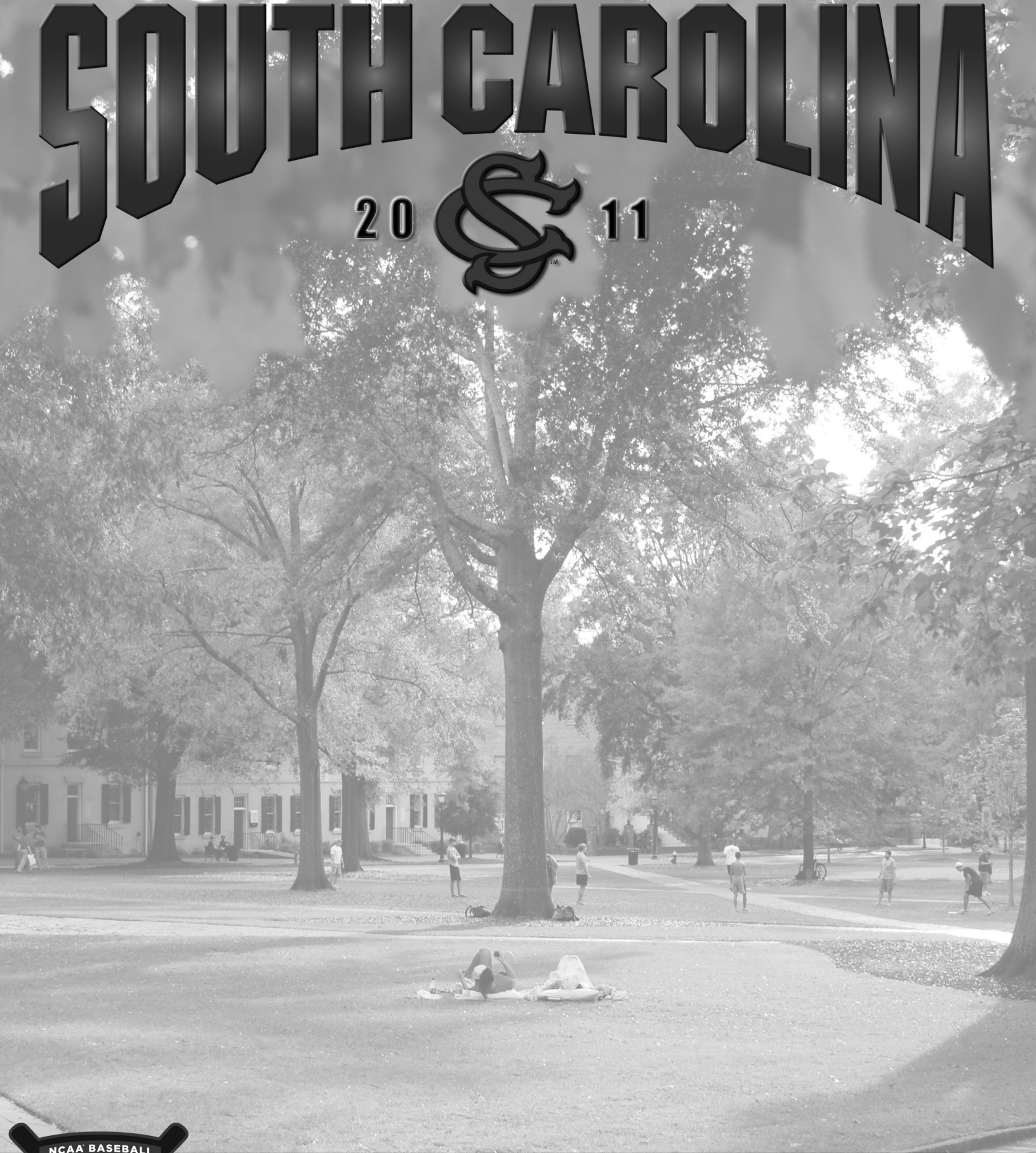

UNIVERSITY HISTORY

In 2001, the University celebrated the bicentennial of its charter, but 2005 also marked a watershed anniversary: 200 years since the first classes began at South Carolina College, as it was then known. Carolina has endured the Civil War and Reconstruction, closings, and name changes. Permanently chartered in 1906 as the University of South Carolina, it grew throughout the 20th century and today is building its reputation as a cutting-edge research institution.



◆ The Darla Moore School of Business' undergraduate program in international business earned the top ranking in U.S. News & World Report's 2011 college guide. The Moore School's undergraduate insurance program is ranked No. 10.

◆ University research awards totaled more than \$218 million for the fiscal year 2010 an increase of 4 percent from the same time last year. An increase of 18.7 percent in federal grants includes an \$11.6 million award to the department of mechanical engineering in the College of Engineering and Computing from the U.S. Department of Energy to study nano-structure design and synthesis.

◆ The University's three-part mission – teaching, research and outreach – received significant applause from the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching recently when the University joined that organization's "Curricular Engagement and Outreach & Partnerships" classification. Carolina is the only University from this state and one of only 23 public Universities nationwide to receive the foundation's highest ranking in both research and service to their communities.

◆ University of South Carolina researchers have received a multi-million grant from the National Institutes of Health to study and improve health disparities in South Carolina. The five-year grant from NIH's National Center on Minority Health Disparities is a continuation of a previous \$7.5 million, five-year NIH grant. South Carolina has some of the highest rates of health disparities in the country, with cancer, HIV, infant mortality, cardiovascular disease and stroke rates higher among minority populations. USC is one of the nation's leaders in health-disparity research, particularly among African Americans and rural residents.

◆ The Board of Trustees recently approved a plan to address the state's growing shortage of primary-care physicians and improve access to healthcare in the Palmetto State. The plan calls for expanding medical education in Greenville through its partnership with Greenville Hospital System, as well as exploring opportunities with Palmetto Health to increase capacity for training more physicians at the School of Medicine in Columbia.

The University of South Carolina is home to more than 200 years of history and tradition, rising from a single building in 1805 on what would become the heart of the campus, the Horseshoe. The 11 buildings that now make up the Horseshoe frame a lush lawn that is an irresistible gathering place.

This year the University welcomed its largest freshman class. The numbers show that USC is educating more South Carolinians and is clearly a destination of choice. They arrive at a time when the University has been singled out in U.S. News & World Report's "America's Best Colleges" guide for its outstanding programs that encourage student success and for having the nation's top undergraduate international business program. A section titled "A Strong Focus on Student Success" singles out the nation's institutions with the best student-enrichment offerings and cites USC for having one of the nation's best programs for First-Year Experience, Learning Communities and Undergraduate Research/Creative Projects.

Joining the flagship campus in Columbia, are four-year campuses in Aiken, Beaufort, and Upstate (Spartanburg-Greenville). Four two-year campuses-Lancaster, Sumter, Salkehatchie (Allendale and Walterboro), and Union-help the University cover the state.

In addition, the University of South Carolina's:

* Columbia campus has more than 350 degree programs through its 14 degree-granting colleges and schools.

* Students and recent alumni have won 478 national fellowships totaling more than \$13.8 million for advanced academic study since 1994.

◆ On July 23, the University dedicated its new Ernest F. Hollings Special Collections Library, with Vice President Joe Biden recognizing the breadth and depth of collections and paying homage to his friend and former colleague Sen. Hollings. The Hollings library, connected to the Thomas Cooper Library by a glass-enclosed walkway on the main level, is home to the S.C. Political Connections, the Irvin Department of Rare Books and Special Collections and Digital Collections. The \$18 million, 50,000-square-foot facility was designed and constructed to LEED Gold certification level.

◆ Researchers at the College of Engineering and Computing are part of a national team that will develop technologies to assess the structural health of the nation's aging bridges. The National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) awarded the \$14 million dollar project, which will include the Physical Acoustics Corp. (PAC) of Princeton, N.J., the University of Miami and Virginia Tech as partners, with \$4 million going to Carolina for its part of the study.

◆ Archaeologist Steven D. Smith has been awarded a grant by The American Battlefield Protection Program, part of the National Park Service, to research Union Gen. William T. Sherman's campaign across South Carolina. Smith, an associate director of applied research in the S.C. Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology, will begin the two-year project in the fall.

◆ The University recently unveiled the SCRA USC Innovation Center on Catawba Street. The facility will house knowledge-base and light-manufacturing companies emerging from research at the university and in the marketplace. The center will be an intermediate step for companies before they move into their own facilities and commercialize their research.

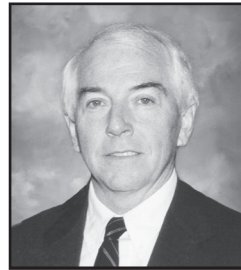

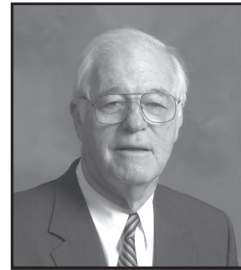

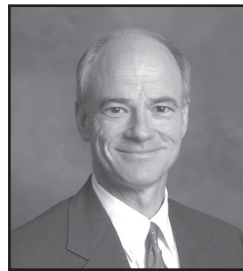

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Dr. Harris Pastides, University President



Harris Pastides was named the University of South Carolina's 28th president on August 1, 2008, following a decade of service at Carolina as a professor, dean and vice president. He was the first internal candidate to be elected as President of the University of South Carolina in over half a century.

Under Pastides' leadership as Vice President for Research and Health Sciences, research funding and sponsored programs at South Carolina increased 89 percent since 2002, reaching a record \$206 million for fiscal year 2008. Pastides continues to take a leading role in the development of Innovista, the research innovation district he helped design and launch during his tenure.

With Focus Carolina, one of his first major initiatives as University president, Pastides has launched the most comprehensive strategic planning initiative in the University's history. The effort is expected to result in transformational goals that will steer a course for the University's long-term future.

Pastides has identified sustainability, innovation, the University's role in development of a knowledge economy, more access to education for South Carolinians, and stronger cohesion among the University's eight campuses among his major goals. To accomplish those goals, he has solicited ideas from the University community and all South Carolina citizens through Carolina's Ideas, a Web-based virtual suggestion box that is yielding a bounty of good counsel.

Before joining the South Carolina faculty, Pastides was a professor of epidemiology and chairman of the Department of Biostatistics and Epidemiology at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. He received his master's of public health and his Ph.D. in epidemiology from Yale University.

Harris Pastides and Patricia Moore were married April 27, 1980. They have two children: Katharine, an education specialist at the Getty Villa in Malibu, Calif., and Andrew, an equity stage actor in New York City.

Dr. Zach Kelehear, Faculty Athletics Representative



Zach Kelehear took over the duties as the University of South Carolina's Faculty Athletics Representative on July 1, 2010. Kelehear is a professor in the Department of Educational Leadership and Policies. He has written multiple articles and books on the ideas of artful leadership practice in public schools and business. He currently serves as Director of Curriculum and Graduate Studies for the College of Education as well as Program Coordinator for the Education Administration Program. While at USC, Dr. Kelehear has also served on the Faculty Senate, on the University Athletics Advisory Committee, on the Graduate Council as Chair, as well as several other committees.

Dr. Kelehear provides leadership for multiple national and international professional organizations such as the American Educational Research Association and the Council of Professors of Instructional Leadership. Along with his peer reviewed publications, Kelehear has published in the *Journal of Staff Development*, *American School Board Journal*, *The School Administrator*, *Principal Leadership* and *The Principal*. He also serves as editor and/or reviewer for multiple journals and publications.

Over the past 28 years, Kelehear has been a college professor, a personnel director, staff development director, and a teacher and coach in high school and middle school. He also was a college athlete at Furman University where he played football while completing a double major in Latin and History in 1981. He later earned his master's in education from Furman in 1982, then earned his doctorate from N.C. State in 1993.

Dr. Kelehear is married to Dr. Karen Heid, an assistant professor of art education at the University of South Carolina.

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR ERIC HYMAN

Regarded as an architect of championship programs, an advocate for academic success and a skilled administrator, Athletics Director Eric Hyman began his duties at South Carolina on July 1, 2005.

Hyman has developed an outstanding reputation as a leader among his peers. He was named the 2003-04 *Street and Smith's Business Journal* National Athletics Director of the Year and was also selected as the Division I-A West Regional Athletics Director of the Year by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). In September 2008, he assumed the duties as President of the Division 1A Athletic

Directors' Association.

Hyman has been a featured speaker at numerous conventions, including the NCAA Champions Forum, to speak on diversity issues in athletics, and the American Football Coaches' Association, guiding young assistant coaches on the on how to become a head coach. He is also a regular presenter at the I-A Athletic Directors Institute.

Under Hyman's leadership, the South Carolina Athletics Department has made tremendous strides in becoming a nationally prominent Division 1-A athletics program with the goal of competing for championships in all sports, while winning the school's first men's national championship in any sport with the baseball team's College World Series title in June 2010. In November of 2009, the women's soccer team brought home its first SEC championship, and in May of 2010, the women's golf team captured the East Regional title. During the 2009-10 school year, nine of the school's 20 intercollegiate programs finished in the top 25 of the nation and nearly every athletic team has competed in postseason play since Hyman's arrival. Recently, the football team went to its sixth bowl game, having been eligible for each of the last seven seasons, a modern record for consecutive winning seasons.

His hiring of successful head coaches, like men's basketball coach Darrin Horn and women's basketball coach Dawn Staley, the development of a \$200 million master plan of facilities, and the school's first athletics capital campaign have taken South Carolina athletics to new heights. Hyman has successfully guided the department through a football seat donation initiative, which, along with philanthropic gifts and money guaranteed through the new television agreement, has provided the financial resources to begin bringing the Gamecock facilities up to the standards of their SEC rivals.

Under Hyman's tenure, the Carolina Stadium state-of-the-art baseball facility opened in the spring of 2009, and the Dodie Anderson Academic Enrichment Center opened its doors in February 2010. In addition, the athletic training room, recruiting room, locker room and entryway at Williams-Brice Stadium have all recently received major upgrades. The football coaches' offices and entry are currently being renovated, and a players' lounge has also been added. Men's and women's basketball lockerrooms have been renovated along with the coaches' offices. Major suite renovations are taking place at William-Brice following the successful addition of the Champion Club suites over the past two years. Upon Hyman's arrival the stadium was dressed up with graphics and recognition of record holding players.

Over the next couple of years, Hyman's master plan includes converting the Farmer's Market into a football parking lot and tailgate area for the fans, further improvements to Williams-Brice Stadium, building a coaches' support building, a parking garage and tennis courts, and renovating the softball and track facilities at the new Athletics Village, whose cornerstone building is the new Dodie Anderson Academic Enrichment Center.

In 2008-09, South Carolina football, men's basketball and baseball all finished with a .500 or better league mark for the first time since joining the SEC. In addition, the women's tennis team reached the NCAA Elite Eight, while the men's outdoor track & field team posted a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. Men's basketball tied for the SEC Eastern Division title and baseball went to the regionals.

Off the field, South Carolina student-athletes have combined to surpass the 3.0 grade point average plateau for seven consecutive semesters and are regularly among the leaders in the SEC Academic Honor Roll. In Spring 2009, a record 15 of 17 athletic teams topped the 3.0 standard, with football, men's basketball and men's soccer all achieving their highest team GPAs on record. South Carolina APR scores have continually improved under Hyman's watch.

Hyman came to South Carolina from TCU, where he served as the athletics director for over seven years. Under his direction, TCU teams recorded 32 conference titles and consistently posted a graduation percentage rate higher than that of the overall student body. Hyman was instrumental in orchestrating TCU's invitation to join Conference USA in July 2001 and spearheading the effort for the Horned Frogs to join the Mountain West Conference in July 2005, moving the program from the Western Athletic Conference it was in when Hyman arrived. During Hyman's tenure, the TCU football team went to six bowl games in seven seasons, boasted a Heisman Trophy candidate in LaDainian Tomlinson and was ranked as high as sixth in the BCS polls; the women's basketball team went to five straight NCAA Tournaments; the baseball team earned back-to-back regional appearances for the first time in school history; and the men's indoor and outdoor track and field and men's tennis teams finished their seasons ranked among the top five in the nation.

As TCU's athletics director, Hyman worked diligently to improve athletic facilities. He helped raise over \$30 million in facility improvements and directed a three-phase building plan that completely renovated the athletic department's facilities.

Prior to his stint in Fort Worth, Hyman was the athletics director at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, and VMI in Lexington, Va., and Executive Associate Athletics Director at North Carolina State University in Raleigh, N.C., and Associate Athletics Director at Furman University in Greenville, S.C. He also coached football at Furman University for nine years under Art Baker and Dick Sheridan.

Hyman earned a master's degree in educational administration from Furman in 1975. He and his wife, Pauline, together coached the women's basketball team at North Greenville University in Tigerville, S.C., leading the team to national rankings in the '70s.

Hyman graduated from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where he was an all-ACC football player, on the Dean's list and selected for the Hula Bowl. His wife, Pauline, is a native of North Carolina and also has her undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She did some post-graduate work at South Carolina in the early '80s. She played and later coached women's college basketball, taught sociology and psychology and served as a college administrator. Pauline developed and taught the NCAA CHAMPS Life Skills course and various seminars for student-athletes at both Miami University and TCU. Since coming to South Carolina, she has taught the Etiquette Seminar in the Gamecocks' CHAMPS Life Skills course and assists with other seminars in preparing the student-athletes for their futures, such as the Dress for Success and Networking and Interviewing seminars.

The Hymans have a daughter and son-in-law, Corrine and Michael Quast, and a son and daughter-in-law, Ryan and Carolyn Hyman. Corrine is a realtor; Michael is a financial analyst; Ryan is in the property and casualty insurance business; and Carolyn is a lawyer. They all reside in Fort Worth, Texas.

South Carolina Athletics' mission centers on developing championship-caliber programs in the Southeastern Conference and nationally.

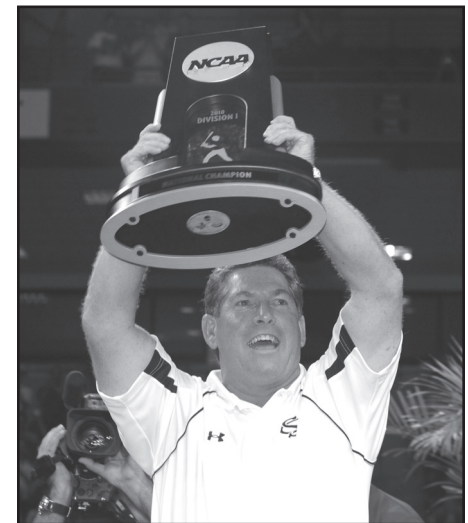

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DODIE ANDERSON ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT CENTER

When University of South Carolina Athletics Director Eric Hyman talks about "the Dodie," the \$13 million state-of-the-art facility that opened in the spring of 2010, he enthusiastically refers to it as, "the heart of the athletics department and the place where the ebb and flow of student-athletes' days are centered."

"The Dodie" is named for Dolores F. Anderson of Greer, S.C., whose philanthropic gift helped fund the center for University of South Carolina student-athletes. Anderson is the widow of Robert Anderson, the former president and chairman of Anderson Hardwood Floors, the largest privately-owned hardwood floor manufacturer in the United States. A 1981 graduate of USC Upstate with a degree in interdisciplinary studies, Dodie Anderson is co-owner of Anderson Hardwood Floors and a longtime supporter of USC Upstate's athletic programs.

The three-story, 40,000-square-foot center is located across Heyward Street from Stone Stadium, the Gamecocks' soccer facility, in the 41-acre footprint known as "the Roost." It is the focal point of and the first piece in the re-developed area that eventually will include an athletics administration building, a sports medicine facility, a volleyball facility, a Gamecock Club building, a new tennis complex, soccer practice fields and an outdoor track.

Student-athletes are in and out of "the Dodie" throughout the day as they use computers and study areas, receive tutoring, counseling and advising and even eat their meals.
