

# THE NON-CONFERENCE SLATE

Complete with a roster composed of 14 freshmen and only one senior, Coach Shelley Smith set out in 2008 to build upon the momentum gained after leading the 2007 squad to the program's first NCAA Tournament appearance in 10 years. Despite an admittedly disappointing start to the new season with a scoreless draw at UNC Wilmington, the Gamecocks would progress to go unbeaten in their first eight games.

Following the draw at Wilmington, South Carolina returned home for a four-game homestand. Samantha Diaz-Matosas scored the first goal of the season with a penalty kick in the 43rd minute against East Carolina to give the Gamecocks their first win of the season with a 1-0 shutout. Another 1-0 shutout victory followed three days later after Lindsay Small scored her first career goal to put away the Boston Terriers.

In-state opponents Clemson and Furman travelled to Columbia the next weekend to participate in the fourth annual Carolina's Cup, and the Friday night marquee matchup featured rivals South Carolina and Clemson in a match played in front of 1,254 fans, the third largest crowd to watch a women's soccer match at Stone Stadium. Small once again stepped up to hit the gamewinner in the 48th minute as the South Carolina defense limited the Tigers to only four shots in 90 minutes of action. With the tournament title on the line, the Gamecocks defeated Furman 2-1 courtesy of a Kim Miller penalty kick in overtime to give South Carolina the championship for the second consecutive season. Furman's goal in the 25th minute to tie the match was the first given up by South Carolina on the year, ending a streak of 434:23 shutout minutes to start the season by new starter Mollie Patton – the longest shutout streak in program history.



A trip to the Auburn Soccer Classic was next and featured strong opponents in Marguette and nationally ranked Florida State. The Gamecocks found themselves on the fortunate side of yet another 1-0 shutout as freshman Kayla Grimsley scored a goal in her second consecutive game off an 87th minute corner kick by Shannon Bigbie. Sunday's morning match featured the Gamecocks against No. 7 Florida State, the 2007 national runner-up. Miller and Grimsley both scored in the opening 25 minutes to give the Gamecocks a comfortable lead against the ACC frontrunner, but the Seminoles responded with three goals in a 20-minute span to threaten Carolina with its first defeat. Freshman Idana DeCecco would be the surprising hero after subbing into the midfield and tying the score in the 75th minute. Following 110 minutes of thrilling soccer, the teams finished in a 3-3 draw, a result that due to the lack of experience on the roster almost resonated as loud as South Carolina's 1-0 victory against ACC opponent North Carolina in the 2007 season opener.

The showing against Florida State propelled the Gamecocks into the national polls for the first time this season, and the No. 20 Gamecocks responded with a 4-0 win against ETSU. Grimsley was one the goal scorers in the match and gave her the distinction of being the first freshman and only the second player in South Carolina history to register a goal in four consecutive games. Riding a nine-match unbeaten streak, Carolina traveled to Cullowhee, N.C., for the non-conference finale but suffered a devastating blow when lone senior Danila Monteiro went down in the second minute with a hard foul that would ultimately cause her to miss six games. With forward Brooke Jacobs also missing the game due to injury, Western Carolina used its physical play on the pitch to frustrate the Gamecocks before a Catamount corner kick in the 65th minute deflected into the goal to send the Gamecocks to their first loss of the season.

Coupled with a tie in the 2007 NCAA Tournament game against Duke, Carolina's nine-match unbeaten streak set a program record as the Gamecocks headed into conference play with a 6-1-2 record.

### **SEC PLAY**

Fresh off a stunning defeat at Western Carolina, the Gamecocks regrouped quickly as the team competed against Tennessee and Georgia to open up the Southeastern Conference slate. After going winless in the first 13 matches against the Lady Vols, the Gamecocks made it two in a row with a 2-1 victory at Stone Stadium. Junior Blakely Mattern and sophomore Brittiny Rhoades hooked up for the second of four times this season on a corner kick-header combination for the game's first goal before an own goal tied the match in the 67th. Tennessee native Natalie Aaron responded six minutes later with her first career goal to move the Gamecocks to 1-0 in SEC play. Georgia came to town two days later seeking a turnaround after nonconference play left the Bulldogs 2-7-0. Georgia struck first before Aaron once again shined bright for the Gamecocks with a goal as the game ended in a 1-1 draw.

In the farthest road trip of the season, No. 24 South Carolina shutout Kentucky 2-0 courtesy of two goals from Grimsley who began to position herself in the running for conference Freshman of the Year honors. Grimsley also scored her SEC-leading seventh goal of the season two days later at Vanderbilt, but the Gamecocks were not able to overcome a 2-0 deficit as the Commodores upended Carolina.

A return to Stone Stadium was welcomed as the Gamecocks looked to build on a 10-game unbeaten streak at home dating to the 2007 season. Mississippi State was first on the docket, and it was apparent right away that Carolina was upset with its showing at Vanderbilt as the Gamecocks recorded goals by Grimsley and Jacobs in the opening eight minutes. The team settled for a 2-1 win after letting a goal slip away in the 79th minute due to a miscommunication on a Carolina corner kick that gave the Bulldogs a free breakaway from midfield. Ole Miss was next, and a scoreless first half was the exact opposite of a frenetic second half that saw the teams combine for four goals in a 16-mintue span. Mattern and Rhoades connected vet again just 42 seconds into the half before Grimslev and Diaz-Matosas assisted a Shannon Bigbie goal 90 seconds later for a 2-0 lead. The assist marked the sixth consecutive game that Grimsley earned a point. The Gamecocks went on to win the match after Diaz-Matosas hit the gamewinner just yards in front of the net in the 88th minute following a

With a 10-2-3 overall record and 4-1-1 mark in SEC play, the Gamecocks were riding high as they traveled west to take on Alabama and Auburn. Unfortunately, bad fortune befell the Garnet and Black as they dropped a 1-0 match at Alabama despite outshooting the Crimson Tide 20-6 and holding them

without a shot for the entire second half. With a trip to Auburn following, neither the defense nor the offense clicked as the Tigers earned a 2-0 victory, marking the first time that South Carolina dropped a match by more than one goal.

The next week featured a home date with the conference's most potent offensive attack in No. 13 LSU, but the Tigers offense was no match for a reawakened Carolina defense that limited LSU to only four shots in the match. However, despite strong looks on goal, the Gamecocks could not get one to blow past LSU's Freshman All-American keeper as the teams settled for a scoreless draw. The shutout was the seventh of the season for Patton, tying a South Carolina record in just her first season in goal. With a trip to Arkansas to end the weekend, Miller ended South Carolina's three-game scoreless streak with two first half goals in a 3-1 victory.

For the regular season finale, national television cameras focused on the South Carolina program for the second consecutive season as the Gamecocks welcomed No. 7 Florida to Stone Stadium in the NSCAA Game of the Week televised by the Fox Soccer Channel. Dominated by Carolina's backline throughout the match, the Gators were only able to get off five shots in the match but the fifth shot proved to be the difference after a rebound of a Patton save gave Florida the opportunity it needed. The Gamecocks earned the No. 5 seed in the SEC Tournament after concluding the season with an 11-5-4 (5-4-2 SEC) record.



# POSTSEASON PLAY

For the third consecutive year the Gamecocks headed to Orange Beach, Ala., to participate in the SEC Tournament. Fifth-seed Carolina drew fourth-seed Georgia in the quarterfinals in a rematch of a 1-1 draw in the regular season. For yet another time this season, the Gamecock defense put on a clinic in limiting the Bulldogs to three shots in 90 minutes of action — including holding Georgia without a shot in the second half — but the Bulldogs were able to convert on two of their three opportunities to claim a 2-1 victory. Mattern scored Carolina's lone goal in the match courtesy of assists from Grimsley and Rhoades as South Carolina awaited word from the NCAA Selection Committee regarding a spot in the tournament.

Thanks to a strong strength of schedule and a collection of dazzling defenses performances throughout the year, South Carolina was selected for the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year as the Gamecocks drew William & Mary in the first round of the Durham regional. Despite leading 2-1 in the second half courtesy of goals from Monteiro and Jacobs, Carolina gave up a late goal against the Tribe to send the match into overtime. In the extra period, William & Mary was able to score in the 93rd minute to deny the Gamecocks their first NCAA victory in a game that was filled with foul calls and yellow cards against a South Carolina team that had the fewest in the SEC throughout the season.

Following the season, two Gamecocks earned All-SEC honors in Blakely Mattern (First Team) and Kayla Grimsley (Second Team, Freshman Team). Mattern also earned First Team Academic All-America honors, marking the fourth consecutive year that a Gamecock earned the distinction.

Samantha Diaz-Matosas scored on a penalty kick in the 43rd minute as South Carolina continued its strong play at Stone Stadium in a 1-0 victory Thursday against East Carolina. The Gamecocks improve to 10-3-1 in home openers and move to 16-1-3 at Stone Stadium since the start of the 2006 season.

In a match where they dominated with a 15-3 shot differential, an ECU handball in the 18' led to Carolina's first goal of the season. Maria Petroni played a ball at the top of the penalty box that was originally intended to be a shot, but the ball hit the hand of a Pirate defender inside the 18' to set up the penalty kick at 42:31. Playing in the back line, Diaz-Matosas pushed up for her first career PK and snuck it past goalkeeper Amber Campbell for her first goal of the season. The strike came one game after Campbell, a preseason All C-USA selection, moved into first on the ECU record books with 23 career shutouts.

Junior midfielder Lindsay Small could pick no better time to score her first career goal as she led Carolina to a 1-0 victory against Boston Sunday at Stone Stadium. The match was the first between the Gamecocks and Terriers as the two 2007 NCAA Tournament teams battled in a close match that was decided in the midst of heavy rain for the final 20 minutes of action.

Despite outshooting the Terriers 12-10, Carolina couldn't seem to get shots on the frame as they went into the half with zero of their five shots on goal. Small's goal in the 56th minute was only Carolina's second to the net as the Gamecocks finished with four on frame. It went slightly better for the Terriers as six of their 10 shots hit the mark, but Gamecock goalkeeper Mollie Patton continued her strong play in her first year in goal with six saves in the shutout. Patton has posted three shutouts to begin the season, a stretch that includes 290 minutes of shutout play.

# **GAME 4: CLEMSON**

Midfielder Lindsay Small stepped up for the second consecutive game to lead South Carolina to a 1-0 victory against rival Clemson in front of 1,254 fans at Stone Stadium, the third largest crowd to watch a women's soccer match at the stadium. The win is the third consecutive home victory for the Gamecocks against the Tigers and marks the 10th straight shutout victory in the series as the winning team has stifled the opponent in every match since 1999.

With the victory, South Carolina continues the unbeaten shutout streak for goalkeeper Mollie Patton to begin the season. Courtesy of a tough Carolina defense that limited the Tigers to four shots, Patton only registered two saves in the match but saw her season-opening shutout streak improve to 380 minutes (380:00) in her first season in goal, a South Carolina record to start a season.


